ROSELAND WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

1906 - Fifty Years of Activity - 1956

We were organized in January 1906 as the Oldcastle Women's Institute by Mrs. Colin Campbell. Mrs. Dave Robinson was the only Charter Member to remain a member until her death in March, 1951.

There are no records prior to May, 1923, all minute books having been lost in a fire. It is too bad, for there would have been a lot of rich information of those early days, especially during the period of World War I. They must have lived up to our Motto "For Home & Country."

Mrs. Charles Allen has always been referred to as the "Mother of our Institute." While not a charter member, she was a member of long standing. When Mr. & Mrs. Allen moved from Oldcastle to what was then known as Jackson's Corner she brought the Women's Institute with her. We would have folded up several times in those those early days had it not been for her persistent fortitude and insight into the future.

We were Jackson's Corners until 1926 when a change of name contest was sponsored by Dr. Raymond Morand. From then on we were known as Roseland. In 1930 the lot the hall now stands on was purchased from Mr. Chas. Allen for \$800.00. In 1933 we started talking hall and put on a fund raising drive. Sides were chosen with Mrs. Percy McConnell and Mrs. Leo Russette as captains.

If ever a group worked hard it was then. There were were afternoon and evening card parties, Baked Goods Sales, Raffles, Auctions, Teas and Talent Money. One member invited us over for lunch followed by cards. She locked the bathroom door and charged a nickle to get in. She made \$1.75 with that key. Mr. Frank Jessop paid admission to one card party with a \$20 bill and would accept no change. The McConnell side won with \$255.39 against the Russette side with \$152.95. A total of \$408.34 was raised, all in two months time.

In October 1933 we bought our present hall for \$370.00. It had been a hut school situated near the Essex County Sanatorium. In order to own property we had to become incorporated. The secretary was

sworn in. She had to contact every member and witness every signature. Some of the members were dubious about signing, not being too sure what they might be letting themselves in for. So two or three visits had to be made before all were convinced. One member in particular just would not sign so Mr. Hennin, then Reeve of Sandwich South advised us to send the petition on to the Registrar General. It was thought they would not object for lack of one name. But back it came, That name had to be on. Well, after three or four more trips she finally signed, then in two months quit the Institute. Now wouldn't you know!

The Roseland branch was the first Institute to own their hall in Ontario. Mr. Hennin was a great help to us always. He helped to draw up our first incorporation papers and with the filing of them each year, all free of charge.

The hall was moved on to our lot in November 1933. The first meeting was held in our hall in March, 1934 with Mrs. Charles Wright, now of Guelph, our first hostess. There were thirty six members present. Our first visitor was Mrs. Edward Bondy of Mount Clemens.

We carried on under very trying conditions for some time. Then we had the hall painted, the roof repaired and the building sided with Johns Mansville shingles. And ever since have been making improvements. In 1948 the new addition was built and we celebrated the opening of our bigger and brighter hall in November 1948 with a turkey dinner. In 1943 a much needed new floor was laid.

During Coronation Year we paid honor to our Queen with purchase of a lovely door. The plaque was paid for by life members of the Institute and the hardware findings by the Roseland Girl Guides.

Since their organization in 1934, the Girl Guides, Scouts, Brownies and Cubs have had free use of the hall. From time to time they have made contributions to our funds. It is only right that they should come to us for it is in keeping with our Motto "For Home & Country". They are not your children or my children. They are not only the youth of today but they are the men & women of tomorrow.

We have always donated towards all charity drives. Children's Hospital, Mental Institutions Schools for Retarded Children, Home & Overseas Flood & Tornado Disaster Funds, Greek Unitarian Service, Essex County Sanatorium and Riverview Hospital. We united with North Essex and South Essex in furnishing a room at Riverview Hospital. We have always helped at home where ever misfortune fell.

During the years of World War 2 we worked hand in hand with the Canadian Red Cross, We made over 4760 pounds of jam, made garments of all description, as well as knitted articles. We have pledged the use of our hall, and our services if needed, for Civil Defence work.

In 1935 after we had finished a home nursing course and had gone to the Y.W.C.A. to receive our diplomas, Mrs. Story of the Red Cross paid us this tribute. "I wish you people could see the hall at Roseland. To my mind it stands as a monument representing thrift, energy and co-operation. I think the Women's Institute of Roseland is to be congratulated for the wonderful spirit that predominates and is extended to all visitors."

In 1949 we of Roseland joined all of Essex Kent and Lambton Counties in a separation from the London Convention Area. These three counties now comprise the Southwestern Convention Area. Our first area chairman was Mrs. Fred Gallie Forest and our first Area secretary, Mrs. James McCarthy.

It has not always been sunshine. There were dark days when one of our members has passed away. There have been sunny days when there were births, marriages and anniversaries. There have been tears, smiles, headaches and heartaches and hard work which has been mingled with pleasures. And there have been wonderful friendships formed as we look back to the 50 years of activity and progress of our Women's Institute.

I started this little history with praise for the "Mother of the R.W.I!" I close with Praise, Good Wishes and Long Life to our husbands, for without their co-operation we could not function.

THIS IS HOW AND WHERE THE FIRST WOMEN'S INSTITUTE ORIGINATED

STONEY CREEK, Feb. 19, 1897 — One hundred and one women and one man, Erland Lee, attended a meeting tonight at Squire's Hall here. The following are the minutes of the meeting:

"Mr. Lee was chairman and an address was given by Mrs. John Hoodless.

"Moved by Mrs. Melson and seconded by Mrs. E. Lee, that we organize a Women's Department of Domestic Economy in affiliation with the Farmers' Institute. — Carried.

"It was decided that the name should be the "Women's Department of the Farmers' Institute of South Wentworth.

"The following officers were elected: Honorary president, Mrs. John Hoodless; president, Mrs. E. D. Smith of Winona; vice-president, Mrs. J. J. Dean of Fruitland; secretary, Miss M. Nash of Stoney Creek; treasurer, Mrs. J. H. McNeilly of Fruitland."

SQUIRE'S HALL, Feb. 25, 1897 — The second meeting of the Women's Department of the Farmers' Institute of South Wentworth met here this evening. The following are the minutes:

"Name of society discussed.

"Moved by Mrs. F. M. Carpenter, seconded by Mrs. Melson, that the name be changed to "The Women's Institute of Saltfleet." — Carried.

"The constitution and by-laws are prepared by the committee was submitted. After the constitution was read it was moved by Mrs. Dean, seconded by Mrs. Melson, that said constitution be adopted. — Carried.

"Letter read by secretary from Hon. John Dryden, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, to Sec. Erland Lee in reply to a request for a grant.

"Address by Miss Watson who gave an interesting paper on foods.

"Directors were then appointed.

"Moved by Mrs. Carpenter, seconded by Mrs. Petit, that Mrs. Erland Lee be a director. — Carried.

"Moved by Mrs. McNeilly, seconded by Mrs. Melson, that Mrs. C. Dewitt of Tapleytown be a director. — Carried.

"Moved by Mrs. Marcus Lee, seconded by Mrs. Dean, that Mrs. F. M. Carpenter be a director. — Carried.

"Auditors were then appointed.

"Moved by Mrs. Melson, seconded by Mrs. McNeilly, that Carlotta Orr be an auditor. — Carried.

"It was also moved and seconded that Mrs. (Dr.) Thompson be an auditor. — Carried.

"It was decided to hold meetings once every fortnight, Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Roseland W. I.

In 1906, a branch of the Women's Institute was organized by Mrs. Colin Campbell. The first pres. was Mrs. George Welsh and the first secretary was Miss J. McCarthy.

In 1916, one of its members, the late Mrs. Chas. Allen, moved to Jackson's Corner (now Roseland) and the Inst. was brought here. Meetings were held in the homes of members until the membership grew to large to be accommodated.

In 1925 the name Jackson's Corner was changed to Roseland and the Inst. became the Roseland W. I.

In ~~1925~~ 1929 a drive for funds was put on with Mrs. Percy McConnell and Mrs. Leo Russett as Captains. Card parties were held with some of the men paying in a \$10.00 bill for admission. In two months \$408.34 was raised.

In June, 1930, the lot on which the Hall now stands was purchased from the late Mrs. Chas. Allen for \$800.00.

Mr. Joe Kennin drew up the Incorporation papers, the charter was presented and each member signed the Bond guaranteeing payment for the land. There are still 9 members on the present roll that were on the original charter in 1930.

On the morning of August 24, 1914, 250 volunteers for overseas service from the 21st Essex Fusiliers entrained at the Canadian Pacific Railway depot enroute to Valcartier Camp. Notification for departure came suddenly one day. The next morning the men assembled at Windsor Armories on London Street East. At 8:10 a.m. the train pulled out of the station.

During the ensuing years thousands of brave young men left Essex County for their training camps.

November 4, 1914, Colonel E.S. Wile left with a detachment of volunteers and his officers Captain Alan Prince, A.B. Laing and Harold Emery and Lieutenant C.P. Laing.

A record crowd accompanied the men on their march from the armories to the railroad station.

In the autumn of 1915 when the scheme of County Battalions became popular, recruiting on a large scale began throughout Essex County to organize the 99th Battalion.

Prominent leaders such as Major the Rev. J.C. Tomie and Judge O. Dromgole urged Essex County men to respond to the call. This recruiting drive continued throughout 1915 and 1916.

The secretary Adelle Roberts read the correspondence.
