EDUCATION WEEK

This history of the Roseland School will be included in a History of Roseland, being compiled by Dick Roe, to be printed by Harold Fisher and published for the Roseland Home and School Association.

THE ROSELAND SCHOOL

By Mrs. Ron Allen. Edited by Uncle Dick.

The first record we have of the establishment of a school in Roseland is a petition circulated by Mr. Mazaire Lassaline in the three Townships. This was followed by the organising on August 22nd. 1914 of a public school district, comprising parts of Sandwich Last, Sandwich West and Sandwich South. The meeting was held in the store of Mr. Joe Hennin, situated where Morris Hutson has his fine store today. This store was moved later and is now the home of Ellis Loyst.

The first Board consisted of Charles Allen, Mazaire Lassaline, Alex Lassaline and Ira Ford. Joe Honnin was the only one with a pencil so he was made Secretary.

There were no chairs, so everyone sat on the floor, and Joe laid down flat to write the minutes. The school site was purchased from the Straus Land Co. for \$525.00 on September 4th. 1913. At a meeting on October 3rd. it was decided that debentures be issued for the sum of \$4000.00 on the credit of the section known as Union S.S. # 20. The cost of the building was estimated at about \$3,500.00. It was a one room school, with a small teachers room, and constructed of brick.

The School opened Easter 1914 with an attendance of 25 pupils. Records list the following as the school's first pupils:-

In 1915, tress were planted on the ground, by the late Mr. Charles Allen.

On July 27th. 1925, a meeting of the ratepayers was held, authorizing the School Board to borrow \$11,000.00, through debentures, from Sandwich East, for the erection of a new two room school, to replace the old one. At this time the attendance had increased to 54 pupils. Miss Fisher, who had been Principal for five years, resigned because of ill health, in 1926. One year later she died. Miss Lulu McKellar was engaged as primary teacher. In January 1927 Miss Olive Lapaine was engaged as Principal.

On May 4th. 1928, a contract for the construction of two additional rooms was given to Llorand and Russette for the sum of \$20,700.00. Debentures were issued for \$23,000.00 by Sandwich East.

The School now consisted of four class rooms, a teachers room, separate lavatories and a small basement with furnace and sump pump. An official opening of the new School was held in September 1928, with Mr. Thomas Preston, Inspector of Public Schools presiding.

The staff at that time consisted of Miss Olive Lapaine, Principal; Miss McKellar, Intermediate Room and Miss C. Lapaine, primary room. These rooms were equipped and the attendance about 110.

The Roseland Women's Institute organized a Committee under Mrs. P.J. McConnell to beautify the grounds. A terrace was built and the ladies planted shrubs and flowers around the school. In 1940 the attendance was about 150 and the fourth room was equipped and opened.

Cupid with his bow and arrow struck Miss Olive Lapaine - ping! And she became Mrs. Marcoux. Mrs. Louise Morrison was engaged for the fourth room and taught intermediate. Miss Lyons came in 1937 to teach the junior class, becoming Mrs. Dalaire in 1942. Mrs. Gladys Morgan was engaged in 1932 for the primary rooms, and gave hundreds of Roseland children their first lessons in reading, writing and arithmetic. Mrs. Morgan's first husband died in Canada shortly after returning from World War I, through illness contracted in the trenches. She was left with a little six year old daughter to bring up alone. Mrs. Morgan resigned in 1947 to marry again.

In 1941, the entire school was redecorated and a stoker installed. Up to that time the school had been heated by gas - free of charge. The teachers who taught in the one room school from 1914 to 1925, besides those already mentioned were Miss Wills; Miss Anna Briody; Miss Florence Hans and Miss Pauline Conly.

In 1942 there was an enrolment of 170 pupils. In September 1947 the attendance was approximately the same. Also, when school opened this September Mrs. Gladys Armstrong took over Grades 1 and 2. Miss Marion Millar took Grades 3 and 4. Mrs. Watts resigned and Mr. Pierini was engaged for Grades 5 and 6.

The name S.S. "20 was dropped, the school now being Roseland Public School. In 1946 approximately three acres were purchased for the school grounds, giving ample room for additions and playing fields. The outstanding debt against the school now stands at about \$24,000.00 reflecting the dark days of the depression when many Townships were unable to meet their financial obligations. The last trustees, before the large Area Board took over was Mr Ivor Chandler, Mr. Ron Allen, Mr. C. Lassaline with Mr. Bert Bedford as Secretary. Under the larger Area A, there is of course a larger Board. Mr. Ivor Chandler is Chairman.

Roseland became a police village in 1925 at which time the fld grame Chran good so a traveling THE ROSELAND SCHOOL (Contd.) Machanista Mr. John Judge is Supervising Principal. Under the new system the children

enjoy many benefits, including Nurse, Music Teacher, Manual Training and Home Economics.

Mr. Ernie Souliere was a trustee for 18 years. Mr. Ron Allen for 13 years (still serving). A Home and School Association was formed in October 1946.

Since the opening of the one room school, many other teachers and trustees have played a part, and down memories lane pass Miss Hazel Hawes, Miss Gladys Lyons, Miss Evelyn O'Neil and Mr. Leo Russette. To these and to all those who served with love and devotion we say, with a full heart:-
