Series of events to honor ECAMR

ESSEX — Stan Welsh doesn't feel comfortable at the centre of attention.

But over the next week he will be in the spotlight as he is honored twice for his contributions over the last 25 years in founding and developing the Essex County Association for the Mentally Retarded (ECAMR).

The first event is tonight when Welsh, a retired Bell Canada worker, will be honored at a dinner and dance in McGregor's Knights of Columbus hall along with 12 other founding members and the association's four original students.

Thursday, he will be honored in Kitchener at the Southwestern Ontario Volunteer Awards by John Sweeney, minister of Community and Social Services.

Others being honored are Henry Hartley, Eve and Howard Market, Doris and the late Chester Marshall, Eleanor and Brien Pettypiece, Violet and Gerald Shanahan, Doreen Welsh, Sunny Ray and Pat Tierney. The four students are Terry Market, Nancy Welsh, Larry Shanahan and Helen Pettypiece.

Welsh's involvement began in the

late 1950s when he was having trouble finding a school for his mentally impaired daughter Nancy.

The regular system "wanted to dump her in a corner and forget about her," he said Thursday.

He helped other parents form and operate a half-day program out of an abandoned one-room school house at the junction of South Talbot Road and Malden Road.

THE PREDECESSOR of the Windsor Association for the Mentally Retarded, the Windsor Association for Retarded Children, took the Essex group under their wing, supplying a teacher, supplies and a station wagon. The first class was in January 1959.

By 1961, the Essex Town and District Association for Retarded Children had a charter and moved into a large Essex home they purchased for \$20,000. In September 1961, it was incorporated as the Essex County Association for Retarded Children.

When schools boards were consolidated in Essex County in the late 1960s, they assumed the role of educating mentally retarded children and the association established workshops to train retarded adults.

Today the association operates vocational centres in Essex, Amherstburg and Tecumseh, where sales of manufactured craft goods reached \$170,000 last year. In addition, the association provides developmental, residential, vocational, transportation and support services to more than 200 developmentally handicapped persons in Essex County.

The association's budget has grown to \$3 million, \$2.6 million from the province's social services ministry and the remainder from other sources, including Essex County council, and fundraising activities.

To Welsh the last 25 years have meant a change in attitude toward the mentally retarded.

"WHEN WE FIRST opened the school here in Essex the high school kids used to go by and make faces at the children," Welsh said. "Now they want to help these kids. There seems to be an acceptance there that didn't exist with the older generation."

A number of events are planned May 11 through May 15. There will be an open house Monday at ARC Industries in Essex, Tuesday at North Industries in Tecumseh, Wednesday at Sun Parlor Nursery in Essex, Thursday at Children's Residence in Essex, and Friday a reception at the main office in Essex.

On their first day in their new school the 90 pupils of the Sun Parlour School greeted their 12 teachers in their shiny new classrooms on Monday morning.

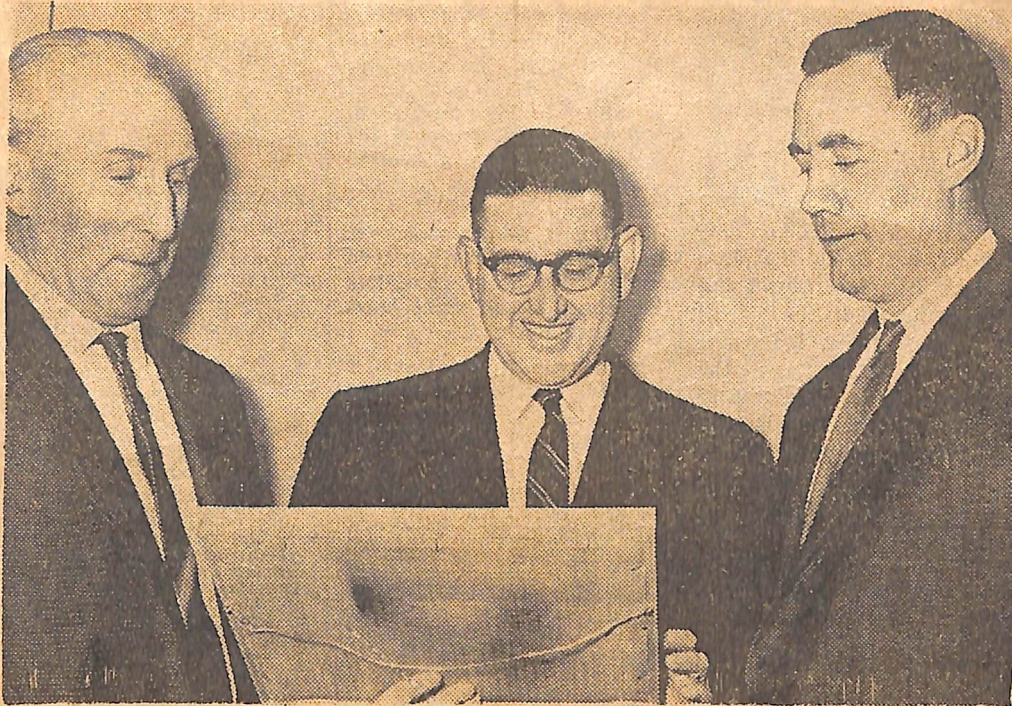
The \$350,000 building contains 11 classrooms, a gymnasium, home economics room, and an industrial arts workshop. It includes classes for those from kindergarten to age 21 of both separate and public school status.

Students come to the school from all of Essex County and the town of Wheatley. The first school for Children with learn-

ing disabilities was opened in 1959 with 4 pupils. By the end of that year there were 12 pupils and by 1961 there were 36.

The home of Dr. D.W. Clark was purchased and used as a school at that time and facilities were offered to children of all the county.

Principal Mrs. Sunny Ray said, "Our other building served our needs while we were there but it became too small. That's Progress. We now have the facilities to do the things we need to do."
