The true citizen will defend his friends and neighbors, protect the property of others as he would his own. He will see to it that the taxes he pays are used wisely.

Mr. Chandler went on to say that the obligation of a true citizen is to uphold the rights of others and to see that the poor or uneducated are heard with the same respect as his more fortunate neighbor. Finally then we come to citizenship in education. This is the obligation of a citizen to see to it that his and his neighbor's children get the best possible in schools and teachers.

He went on to explain how new schools are obtained and used, as an illustration, one that was badly needed and obtained in his own community of Sandwich West.

This proved to be most interesting to his listeners and gave us an idea of the work that had faced our Sandwich South School Board before the fine new school at Fairplay could be built, thus relieving the pressure from our own S.S. No. 1. This, says Mr. Chandler, is citizenship in education.

OLDCASTLE — Outdoor toilet facilities, some of which are no better than they were 30 years ago, are still in use at some public schools in Essex County, according to one of the county's public school inspectors.

C. R. Crawford, of Kingsville, speaking at the opening of S.S. No. 1, Sandwich South, said life has changed since the days when the little red school was ideal. The days of the one-room school are gone, he said.

He criticized school trustees in the province who have to be convinced that they should install sinks in schools, when they are a part of the fixtures in every home nowadays.

A farmer, he said, will spend a vast amount of money on equipment for his buildings and the maintenance of his animals, but when asked to pay more towards bringing similar conveniences into the schoolroom he asks "why?"

People are beginning to think of children as human beings and the present generation is demanding conveniences for schools that are comparable with those in the home, he said. You as taxpayers have to supply these conveniences.

## No Royalty For School

### Queen Rules Out Children's Names

OLDCASTLE — Sandwich South Twp. School Board, which planned to officially name the new S. S. No. 1 "Prince Charles Public School" has been advised that Queen Elizabeth II, will no longer permit public buildings to be named after the Royal children.

The board received word Friday morning, about 10 hours before the official opening of the school was scheduled, that the name they had chosen for the modern two-room structure on Con. 8, just south of Highway 2, could not be used.

The name was chosen by the pupils of the school because they moved into the new building on the Prince's birthday.

A speedy change in the program and the words "Prince Charles Public School" were altered to just plain S. S. No. 1.

Henry Hartley of Maidstone, school board chairman, said a name will be sought.

Only memento of the school's original name will be that inscribed on a new Bible presented to the school by the Ontario Trustees and Ratepayers Association, who ordered the Bible imprinted with the school's name in gold before word was received from England of the Queen's decision.

Until the new name is chosen the school will simply be called S.S. No. 1. But residents of the area and pupils of the school will likely find it hard to change their reference to it as Prince Charles School, because it has unofficially been called that for some months.

## Expansion Predicted For Sandwich South

OLDCASTLE—Sandwich South Twp. is going to be faced with a population influx from Windsor, similar to that experienced by Sandwich East and West Twps., according to an Essex County public school inspector.

C. R. Crawford of Kingsville, in an address Friday night at the official opening of S.S. No. 1, on Con. 8, just south of Highway 2, commended ratepayers on the improvements in educational facilities in the township, but warned further expansion would be necessary within the next 10 years because of increased population.

Mr. Crawford, a former inspector for the area, recalled how the former one-room S.S. No. 1 on Con. 9, south of Highway 2 had been a typical rural school just 10 years ago, said the educational facilities and number of pupils has doubled since 1950.

He said pupils are getting more time from teachers because of the conversion to two-room schools. The township has three of the new schools, all built in 1960. He commended the school board for having the foresight to have the building constructed in such a manner that more rooms could be added without extra expense.

Mr. Crawford said he anticipated five or six rooms will be added to the school in the future. Build a school and people will build their homes nearby. In 10 years, he said, this area will be overflowing with new homes.

It won't only be the farmer who pays for the extra rooms

and new schools, he said. The newcomer will have to pay his share.

We have to have a system of education that will appeal to the children of today. He said a system similar to that of 20 to 30 years ago can no longer meet the needs of today's children, who are living in the atomic age.

It was decided to have Martin Sheet Metal clean the oil furnaces and the Gas Company the gas furnaces before the heating season starts.

It was decided to renew the policy on No. IV School, \$39,000 on the building and \$2,000 on the contents.

Disbursements in the amount of \$620.66 were read and passed for payment on motion of Mr. Farough, seconded by Mr. McKee.

# Reunion stirs school memories

The old school in the former Sandwich South may be gone, but it's far from forgotten.

As many as 200 former pupils of elementary school SS No. 1 are flying in from as far away as Texas and California to attend the school's first reunion. Since the school was sold in the mid-

1960s and the property converted into housing, they will be gathering at St. Mary's Hall in Maidstone.

"That school was a special place for all of us," said Shirley Meloche, 65. "There are so many people who went there that still keep in touch. I made friends that I've kept all my life...."

Meloche's father and grandfather were also pupils there.

The first school, a one-room log cab-

in built about 1900, burned to the ground in 1919. It was rebuilt nearby at the location most pupils remember, at Baseline Road and Con. 9.

Little Erma St. Antoine could never have imagined when she attended the first classes of S. S. #1, Sandwich South, that she would be 103 when she attended the first school reunion.

When she received her invitation she commented, "If I'm still here, I'll be there."

She was there, alert and splendid in her best finery. And she met one of the students of the last classes before the school was closed in 1961, Sue Verbridge Shuttleworth.

They were among 200 who came from as far as California, Arizona, Oregon, and in Canada from Calgary and Ottawa, to see their classmates again.

One couple, Phyllis and Jack Smyth, came to celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary with long ago school friends.

Geraldine Ure Johnson left this area after completing nurse's training. "I came to renew friendships and see what my classmates look like after they grew up," she said.

She recalled, "Dad was the janitor before I went to school and if he had to go to make repairs I went with him and everybody wanted me to sit with them. Now I'm glad I came to remember."

Her grandfather, David Ure, donated the property for the original school and for Bethel United Church which was next door.

Betty Ayres Simons, also of California, said they had the best teachers. "I remember Miss Eva O'Keefe. She made us eager to learn. She was strict but she never had to punish us."

The forgotten side of school days was recalled by Jack Smyth who learned what happens when human flesh touches steel on a frosty day.

"The old pump. We had to pump the handle with one hand and we'd cup the other hand to catch the water to drink," explained Geraldine Johnson.

The alternative was for everyone to drink from the same cup. Or hold their mouth under the spout to catch the water.

It was her first school and she had 40 students in four grades.

"My salary was \$100 a month but they gave me an extra \$100 because I had such a large class. Believe me, I earned that one hundred dollars. It was hard work but the people treated me with great kindness."

She recalled preparations for a school Christmas play for which she made the costumes and involved all the students.

Being at the reunion was "absolutely wonderful".

"When the invitation came I could barely believe they would remember me," McLennan said.

The children were attentive and respectful, Greer said. "They were very obedient but I kept them working all the time and I tried to make them interested."

She used tactics that are used today; by letting the older children help the younger ones.

The reunion has been in the planning since 1992. The committee responsible for it happening was Armand DeGuire, Annette DeGuire Scurr, Marguerite DeGuire Santarossa, Tom Weir, Dorothy Howling Verbridge and Doreen Hicks Phillips. Grace was offered by a former student, Rev. George Shuttleworth.

The reunion was held at the St. Mary's Hall in Maidstone.
