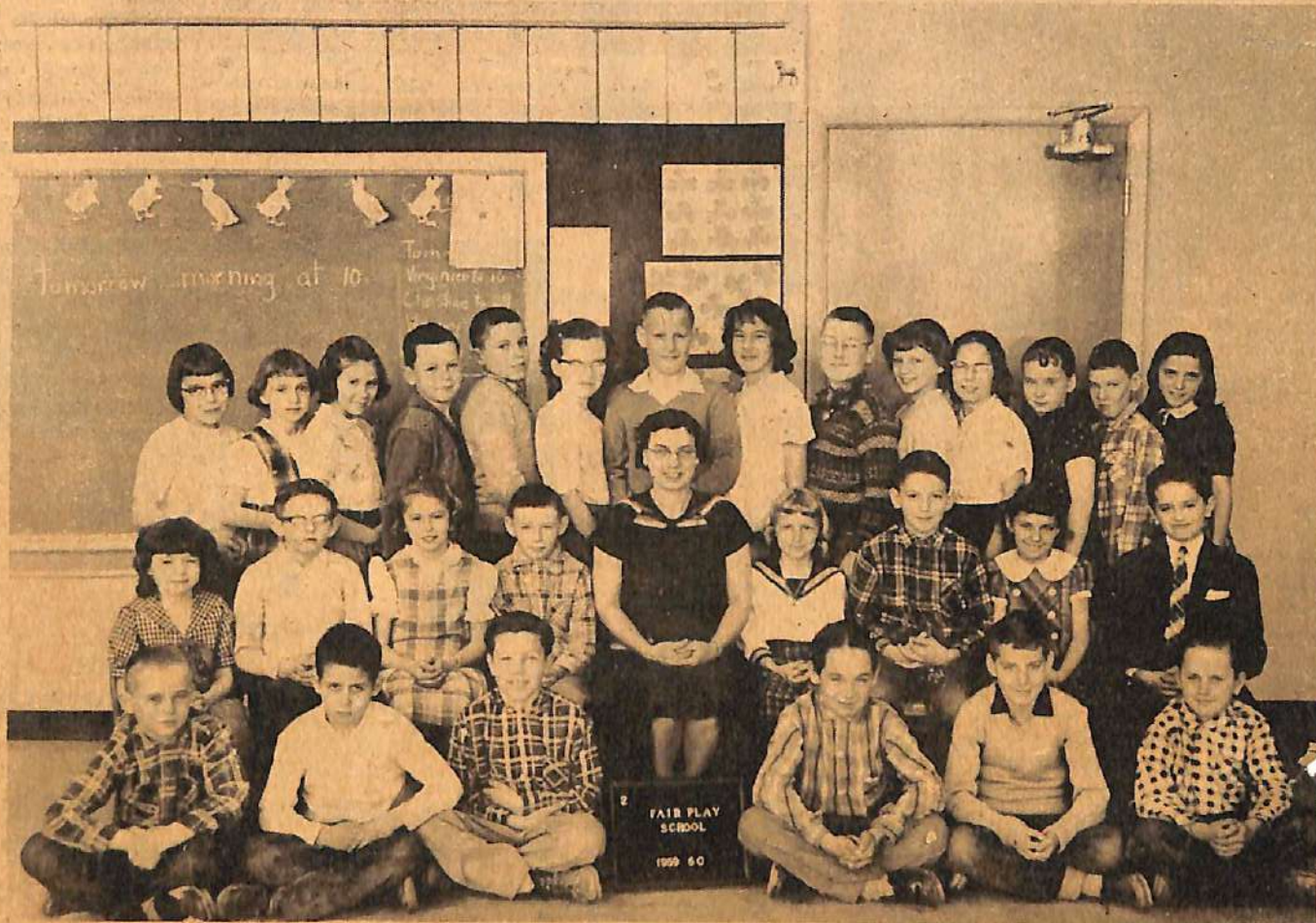

Armstrong, asking him to arrange with Mr. George MacKenzie for a time to make a survey of the land to be purchased by the Board, forwarding a copy of this survey to Forbes B. Geddes, of Essex; and (2) that the secretary contact Mr. Geddes asking him to search the title of the

property and prepare a deed.

It was moved by Mr. Banwell, seconded by Mr. Ure, that the chairman and secretary be given power to sign papers in connection with the sale.

On motion of Mr. Banwell, seconded by Mr. Hartley, the chairman was asked to call John R. Boyd, of Windsor, inviting him to attend a meeting of the board, either the 21st or 22nd of June, and the secretary was asked to call J. W. Storey, of Chatham, inviting him to attend the regular meeting of the Board, on June 15th, or, if this is inconvenient, another date during the same week, the regular meeting date to be dependent upon Mr. Storey's visit.

Changes requested included a second door into the west classroom, moving of the door into the teachers' room to allow for placing of a studio couch or cot along one wall, and installing a sink in the teachers' room.

The secretary was authorized to phone Mr. Storey advising of the Board's decision and requesting him to proceed with drawings for presentation to the Department of Education for approval, such drawings to be brought to a special meeting of the Board within a week if possible.

The meeting adjourned at 10:15 p.m.

Sandwich South Township School Area.

A special meeting of the Board of Sandwich South was held on Monday evening, September 27th, 1954, at School No. II, with the following members present: Kenneth MacKenzie, chairman; Bruce Banwell, Henry Hartley and Elmer Ure.

Tenders previously received for construction of Fairplay Public School were again considered, and on motion of Bruce Banwell, seconded by Elmer Ure, it was decided to award the contract to Arthur Fairburn for \$34,800, this price to include a pumping system of 420 gallon capacity but not including the heating system, which is estimated at \$2,800, contract to be let separately.

It was moved by Henry Hartley, seconded by Elmer Ure, that the secretary be authorized to write to Arthur Fairburn advising that the contract has been awarded to him, pending final approval of the Municipal Board and the Department of Education.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 11 p.m.

Sandwich South Township School Area.

The regular September meeting of the Board of Public School Trustees of Sandwich South was held on Tuesday evening, September 21st, at 8 p.m. in School No. II with the following members present: Kenneth MacKenzie, chairman; Arnold Axcell, Bruce Banwell, Henry Hartley, Elmer Ure. Also present was Mrs. Harvey Thorne, as well as J. W. Storey.

Minutes of the special meeting held September 13th, were read and adopted on motion of Mr. Banwell, seconded by Mr. Ure.

Mrs. Harvey Thorne requested that transportation be provided to School No. V for her children. The Board repeated its former statement that there is no bus service going to No. V School this year as such service is provided only when overcrowding of schools necessitates transporting pupils from one school to another. Mrs. Thorne had a letter from the Department of Education stating that the Board may transport pupils who live more than two miles from the school, but that it is not required to do so.

The salary of the janitor of No. II school was increased to \$15 per month on motion of Mr. Banwell, seconded by Mr. Ure.

A letter was read from the Home and School Association of No. II School requesting that the stove be cleaned once a month. On motion of Mr. Ure, seconded by Mr. Hartley, it was agreed that the stove should be cleaned once a month and the pipes at Christmas recess.

On motion of Mr. Hartley, seconded by Mr. Banwell, the secretary was authorized to write to Mr. Geddes informing him that he should incorporate into the deed for additional property the provision that no trees should be planted within 25 feet of the lot line between school yard and adjacent farming land, with the exception of ornamental shrubs.

Tenders were opened and entertained for the construction of Fairplay Public School but final decision was reserved until the next special meeting of the Board.

Disbursements in the amount of \$4,793.32 were read and passed for payment on motion of Mr. Banwell, seconded by Mr. Axcell, and the meeting adjourned at 12:30 a.m.

Fairplay Home and School, of S.S. No. 2 Sandwich South, heard J. A. McWilliams outline the entire curriculum taught in the rural public schools of Ontario as part of the meeting held under the convenership of Mrs. Jean Robert, in charge of knowledge of our school committee.

Reports from three delegates to the Windsor and district Home and School Council were read by Mrs. Jean Roberts, Mrs. Florence Reeb and George Talbot, health, parent education, and program planning, respectively. These were the workshops attended and the excellent instruction and help from the council workshop was emphasized.

Mrs. Margaret Talbot pointed out that subscriptions and group rates were now being taken for Parent Magazine and Canadian Home and School—two exceptional monthly magazines for aid in family living.

Mrs. Emmy Gullick, health convener, read an interesting article on mental health, pointing out that mental health broadcasts will begin very shortly over the CBC and CFCO Chatham under the title of Mental Health, and will deal with psychology for parents. CFCO every Monday night at 9 p.m. It will be worth more to you than any TV program for that half hour.

Mrs. Jean Robert introduced the speaker, J. A. McWilliams, supervising principal of Sandwich East Public Section 3. Mr. McWilliams said "the principle of education in Canada is based on the Christian ideal to prepare the child for a democratic way of life. Environment in the school should be such that the child learns to want to go to school and develop skills and broaden intellect." He pointed out that the environment should be (a) to develop good human relationships, (b) to create acceptance of organized society (c) to harmonize physical environments. "The educational system endeavors to assist the child in choosing and accepting as his own the ideals of conduct and endeavor of our society and to train him to master certain skills," said Mr. McWilliams.

He said the curriculum is not just a course of study, but is that body of experiences that touches the whole life of the child and includes the home, the school, the church and the community where contributions are made to his experience.

Health—mental and physical; English—as it forms the basis for learning through reading; social studies—history and geography—to understand the workings of our society, government, peoples and places; science—to stimulate the desire to learn to observe carefully and accurately, to learn to form opinions on fact and reason, not emotion; music—spiritual and mental stimulation, concentration, discipline and the ability to listen and appreciate the artistry and genius of music and musicians; art—the ability to see and enjoy the beauty of the world about

him and to give him a mode of expression that can be original, "these," said Mr. McWilliams, "are the integral components of our school curriculum."

An enjoyable social evening was punctuated with delicious sandwiches, tea and cookies served by Mrs. Greta St. Louis and Mrs. Florence Reeb and Mrs. Emmy Gullick.

'Art' Is Topic of Address At Meeting of Fairplay H.-S.

Addressing this week's meeting of the Fairplay Home and School Association, Mrs. Gertrude Shearer, former art instructor for Sandwich South district, outlined the place art must take in the child's education. The music and fine arts convener, Miss Anne Brydone, introduced Mrs. Shearer, who said, "art education offers a whole new field of learning and expression."

"Youth at every age level possesses a power of communication and interpretation. It is known best as the power of language—expression and interpretation. The baby uses elementary language or a form of expression which the mother interprets."

"Secondly, oral expression begins early, and continues endlessly, and thirdly, written expression begins in school and continues to develop and improve."

"Here ended the early educators idea of necessary education and the expanse of training for expression, but the new approach involves a fourth capacity of expression, art, and it is as natural as any of the three recognized expressions. It is within the power of the child to express certain fundamental principles in his art work."

"Learning the proper principles of expression in good pictures requires guidance," she went on. "A new generation of art-conscious teachers in our schools is the aim. Art should express feeling, individuality, personality, character—a part of the person. The free expression found in art is definitely the right of every child. Art must

say something, and every child has something to say."

"Teachers are attempting to prepare the child to meet life at his level now, hoping that he will be prepared for tomorrow's eventualities. He must learn self respect, respect for work, respect for God the Creator; must learn to share—, to give and take, with a readiness to contribute to the group and learn to live in a democratic, Christian world. Art is no longer a subject on the curriculum but an experience expressed in all avenues of life," Mrs. Shearer concluded.

Samples of art work of all ages of pupils were shown.

The Home and School selected graduation pins for the 1953-54 pupils.

History of Fairplay School

A special meeting of School Section No. 13, Sandwich East, was held on the 6th day of January, 1881, for the purpose of choosing a site for a new school.

John Copeland presided and Dennis Perrin acted as secretary. Among those entering the discussion were Messrs. Fairbairn, F. Bruliet, P. Lavin, G. Little, J. MacKenzie, E. Mooney, T. Perry and R. Hurst.

Of three sites suggested, the one chosen was on the farm owned by James MacKenzie.

On February 7th, 1881, a tender was accepted from Wright and Sedgewick, of Kingsville, for the erection and completion of the school building at a cost of \$600.

Until the fall of 1881 when the first well was dug, each child was assessed 5c to pay for water hauling.

There was a platform in the center front of the school on which the teacher's desk and two arm chairs were placed. The desk and chairs were purchased for \$7 and \$2.50 respectively.

A large box stove was bought for \$6. Cordwood at that time was worth \$1.25 a cord. The strap cost 10c.

A board fence was put up at the time the school was built. A stile was used as an entrance to the school yard and remained until 1911 when it was replaced by 40 rods of Sarnia fence costing \$13.

Rosie I. Burke was the first teacher.

She received a salary of \$300 a year.

Things were pretty rough in 1882 when the Board had to borrow \$25 to pay the teacher's salary.

School Section No. 13, Sandwich East, became Section No. 2 Sandwich South in 1895.

In 1907 a woodshed was built for \$14. It stood on the property until the late forties.

In 1915 an upright furnace with jacket and cold air pipes was purchased for \$50.15. It also served until the late forties.

In 1922 the old fashioned folding desks were replaced with a more modern type.

In 1931 inside toilets were installed and a few years later one of the outside Parliament Buildings was sold for \$4.

The present well was drilled 100 feet 8 inches to the rock and four feet into the rock in 1936.

The Books of Knowledge were purchased in 1939 and perhaps by coincidence, Hydro lighting was installed at about the same time.

The Township School Area of Sandwich South was inaugurated in January 1946.

Since the school by this time had passed its 65th birthday and was becoming cold and drafty, repairs were made during the Easter vacation. The foundation was repaired, new doors and window frames were put on and the outside was covered with insul brick siding. Oil heating was also installed.

Two years ago the interior was covered with tentest. Green boards were put up and other efforts made to make the classroom brighter and more attractive. The Home and School Association was also organized at that time.

By September 1954, the attendance had climbed to 55 pupils. It was decided that additional space would have to be provided and plans were begun for the new school.

The last class was held in the old Fairplay School on April 7th, 1955.

The building was sold by tender for \$400. It was moved to Comber on May 20th, 1955, to be remodelled as a home.

3 School Contracts Awarded

Sandwich South Planning Trio Of 2-Room Units

OLDCASTLE — Contract for construction of three two-room schools in Sandwich South Twp. has been awarded to Collavino Brothers Construction Co. Ltd., Tecumseh Blvd. E., Windsor, for \$113,650.

The township area school board has made the awards subject to the approval of the Ontario Department of Education.

Five tenders were received with bids on individual schools and on all three.

Two of the schools will be replacements for outdated units while the third one is for a new area.

The unit the board is most anxious to complete as soon as possible is the one in the new area. It will be located on North Talbot Rd., east of Walker Rd. It has been given no name.

Replacement schools will be for S.S. No. 6 at School Lane and Highway 3 and S.S. No. 1, on Con. 9, south of Highway 2. The latter new school will be on Con. 8 just south of Highway 2.

When these three are completed it will mean that all school area pupils will be attending classes in new buildings.

Township Council is also awaiting approval of its debenture issue. The issue, for \$137,000, was sold to J. F. Simard Co. at six percent interest for a discount price of 97.57. This is the first time in many months that a municipal issue has sold at six percent in this area.

Supporters of Separate School Section No. 2 Sandwich South voted 16-4 in favor of a union with S.S. No. 2 Sandwich East Wednesday at a heated meeting in the now-vacated St. Peter's School on Highway 2.

Most of the protests launched Wednesday came from a small group of supporters from S.S. No. 10 Maidstone, which claimed the meeting slated to capture the support of S.S. No. 2 for S.S. No. 6 was illegal.

Trouble was anticipated prior to the meeting and Provincial Police were requested to stand by. However, nothing developed beyond the shouting stage.

School Reopens

Damage of \$3,000 Repaired Overnight

Classes were resumed today at the Fairplay Public School in Sandwich South Twp. after maintenance men, working well into the night, completed temporary repairs to the building.

The three-classroom school was one of two Sandwich South Twp. buildings heavily damaged by vandals at the weekend. The school suffered an estimated \$3,000 damage, and about \$2,000 damage was done to the Skyway Drive-in on Highway 2.

Robert Penny, school principal, said the 73 students were called back to school today.

Provincial police who are investigating believe the same gang is responsible for both acts. Police described the attacks as "the worst ever investigated in this area."

The school was ransacked, furniture and fixtures smashed, and the walls sprayed with ink, and fire extinguisher fluid. Glue was poured on the floors and torn paper was ankle deep in places on the floor.

The projection room, office, and storage room at the drive-in were raided, and debris was scattered over the floor.

At the refreshment counter there will be on sale, hot dogs, soft drinks, chocolate bars, etc. and coffee for the adults.
