MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

A phone call to my house the other night by a parent with a problem that I thought only I was faced with, opened by eyes to the fact that maybe a lot of us are in the same condition. How many of you as parents share this problem. All winter you have saved to go somewhere the following summer, I don't mean a summer cottage or camping but maybe a trip to New York or L. & Angeles. If your child is like my daughter, she would not enjoy it at all, a trip to a large city or even a small city and if we were only to sight see, it would not be very long before she soon tire of this. If you face the additional handicap of a child who is unable to travel any distance the problem becomes even worse.

The problem is one that is shared by each one of us who is the parent of a child and could be shared by all of us and maybe even whereat by all of us if we got together. Have we were given any thought to the idea as was suggested in the conversation with the parent of maybe, I could look after your child for a couple of weeks and you or someone could do the same for me. I guess what I am trying to say is this, "Do you think this is a workable idea"?

We would hopefully establish a list of parents who require some one to look after their child for a period of time along with a list of parents who are willing to look after these children.

Even if we were to establish a short term residence in our area, it could prove impossible to look after all the requests that might come in. Remember also this arrangement could be very useful in the case of sickness or something along those lines. We should look to our our group for this type of help before we look elsewhere.

What do your think? Is it a workable idea or shall we organize to depend on relatives and good friends for this type of help.

INCREASE IN DISCREED PERSONS ALLOWANCE

Many of our young adults who are over 18 and are receiving D.P.A. are eligible for a raise in their monthly payments. Parents, guardians, advocater and landlords have to contact the field worker for the handicapped person at the local office of the Ministry of Community and Social Services. (They won't come to you)

All recipients of the D.P.A. who rent accommodation automatically got an increase in their January cheques. If the person is registered as paying room and board they are not eligible for increase. However you can change the registration to a rent basis. You must inform the Field Worker that your child is now paying pant and purchasing his or her meals separately. You will have to supply receipts for the rent paid.

The difference in the allowance can be as much as \$45.00 per month. Because you can now show up to \$57.00 per month for shelter (rent), \$78.00 per month for Household Needs, and \$15.00 for Travel Allowance, for a total of \$150.00.

All of you who have been getting the D.P.A. should apply now but by prepared to wait a while until the field worker gets around to you.

RESIDENTIAL CARE

The field of Mental Retardation service is entering a period of rapid change. Community residences are being developed to enable retarded persons who might otherwise be placed in institutions to remain in the community. Today, we see an emphasis on the discharge of hospitalized retarded persons into the Community and an effort to integrate retar ed persons into the normal stream wherever possible, and to the degree possible. Your Board of Directors of the Essex County Association in keeping with the above trend, which we heartly approve, and in view of the fact that retardates have left the old Sun Parlor School for the new school provided by the Essex County Board of Education, your Board of Directors have decided to launch a survey to determine the extent and type of need of residential services in our area.

We are seeking to have this old Sun Parlor School checked by the proper Government representatives to determine whether this building should be renovated for use as a place of residence and also if the gymnasium could be used for a Nursery School. If this building is not available and suitable for this prupose we must begin to plan on building a new place for a residence and Nursery School If any case, we must show the deciding Government Branch (which will contribute a large part of the cost) the necessity for such a residence in this area. With this in mind, we will be launching a survey of parents of retarded children in this area.

Parents will be asked if they feel a need of a Community residence for their retarded family member, and if so, when it will be required and what type of care would be needed. Staffs of schools for the retarded and sheltered Workshops will be asked if they know of potential students or trainees who might attend the facility if there is accommodation nearby. The Ontario Hospital School or other mental retardation facility serving the area, will be asked how many residents from this area were being considered for discharge and what their residential need might be. The local Children's Aid Societies will be approached with regard to the needs of their retarded wards. The Family Service Agency, the Mental Health Clinic, the local Health Unit and the Court will be made aware of the proposed residential facilities so they may propose prospective residents.

Have you been blessed with a retarded child?

God works in mysterious ways, His wonders to perform.

Who can say what lies in the heart of a child? A retarded child? Any child, for that matter. How often do we forget - that within each one of these, our unfortunate ones, is a Soul, perfect and lovely, serving its creator - here for a purpose - to praise God?

So - the housing is warped or crippled -- so the mental circuit is damaged or incorrectly wired. But the Soul is there, perfect, quiet, trying to do its work as best it can - with what has been given it.

Today, April 18th, 28 children from Sun Parlor School visited Jack Miner's Bird Sanctuary at Kingsville. They fed the geese and swans and ducks - and listened to Jasper Miner explain about the birds and how they were caught and banded.

They seemed rather inattentive - they wriggled and giggled and shuffled their feet, restless - like the birds. Later, Mr. Miner allowed us a special privilege. He took us to a lovely, green place, surrounded by evergreens that he and his Dad had brought from Point Pelee many years ago. FINANCE COMMITTEE

I wish to thank the new Board for the confidence they have shown in me by appointing me Finance Chairman for the year 1964. I hope this year willprove as successful as the past year.

The budget has been set and presented to the Special Finance Committee of the County Council, and it appears we are headed for a stormy session. If you read the Windsor Star County page February 22, 1964 you will have read the following item.

GRANT CUT IN PROSPECT
School requires \$38,702 in 1964

Little information was given Essex County Council on the decision, but the special finance committee is prepared to recommend a reduction in grants to the Sun Parlor School for Retarded Children at Essex.

The school has estimated it will require \$38,702\$ to operate this year. Of the total, \$415,600 is expected in government grants and the remaining \$423,102 is sought from the county.

This was when Warden Ellison Bell, reeve of Mersea Township, said the special finance committee was recommending a cut in grants including the one to the school.

The amount sought from the county is about \$300 less than the grant received last year. Reeve Lawrence Brunet noted that all transportation costs were paid at the Sun Parlor School, while Churchwood School parents who could afford transportation costs paid them. He said he knew of one family who had a child attending the Sun Parlor School which was in the millionaire category or close to it.





This is the month of the Lion and the Lamb - of those capricious little friends of St. Patrick, and this year - the glorious wonder of Easter in all its aspects.



An Excerpt from "Mental Retardation"

Brothers and sisters compare feelings about retarded siblings:

At a "sibling seminar" held in Calgary for brothers and sisters of retarded children, it was noted that different age groups among the young people participating seemed to stress particular areas of concern.

The six to ten year olds were becoming aware of how the retarded sibling affect their daily lives. The discussion was specific about incidents. This age group was particularly concerned about their privacy being invaded, and having a shadow.

The eleven and twelve year olds were particularly concerned about their responsibility to the retarded child. They seemed to feel this responsibility was their problem, and not just that of their parents. The children believed that their mothers worried most, and so were the most upset when something went wrong. They felt that their mothers needed help at times.

The thirteen to sixteen year olds, most of whom had lived with the child for many years, were quite well adjusted to their retarded siblings. Their main concern was embarrassment. At this age, of course, the adolscent is very much aware of himself. Every child mentioned the embarrassment they felt when the retarded child was over affectionate with their friends, strangers and parents. They also felt that their social activities were curtailed as they had to baby-sit. The parents seem to rely on them a great deal for the physical care and supervision of the retarded sibling.

The other side of the coin was seen when the young people mentioned their pride in some special ability of the retarded child, such as music or art. Many of them remarked that the retarded child was particularly loving, helpful and sumpathetically aware of his sibling's unhappiness or illness.

From the Grapevine:

Summer Course Oversubscribed

For five weeks during July and August the Metropolitan Toronto School for Retarded Children was the scene of the most intense summer school program ever offered to teachers of trainable retarded children.

Ninety-three local Associations had at least one of their teaching staff in attendance. A total of 155 teachers took the course. Eighty-five were enrolled in the introductory course and 70 in the advanced program.

Sun Parlor School has Mrs. Frances McNaughton taking the course and two of our teachers, teaching the courses, Mrs. Louise Rock, our Music Teacher and Mrs. Sunny Ray.

The summer course was sponsored by the Ontario Department of Education. The number of applications received from teachers surpassed expectations with the result that both the introductory and advanced courses were oversubscribed.

The next General Meeting of the Association ESEX ONT at the Sun Parlor School, on Thrusday, January 14, 1965 at 8:00 p.m. 6-7556

On January 1st, 1965 we will enter a new phase of our history. On this date the responsibility of administrating, maintaining and financing the school operation and transportation becomes the duty of the newly established "Essex Retarded Children's Education Authority". It will be their duty to control all aspects of the school operation, but they do not have any concern for other activities of the Association.

This Authority is authorized by an amendment of the Schools Administration Act, known as Bill 131. This bill in brief states that such an Authority must be established by Municipal Council in any community that has a school for retarded children. And that this Authority shall comprise of 6 members, 4 of whom will be appointed by the Municipal Council and the other two by the local Association.

The members of this new Authority for Essex are:

- 1. Mr. George Rogers, Essex
- 2. Mr. Donald Wilson, Essex
- 3. Mr. Arthur Michael, Essex
- 4. Mr. Mac Simmers, Kingsville
- 5. Mr. Stanley Welsh, Oldcastle
- 6. Mr. Arnold MacLean, Cottam

Bill 131 also provides that admission and dismissals will be handles by an Admissions Board to be made up of:

- (1) School Principal
- (2) Psychiatrist or qualified Medical Practitioner
- (3) Public School Inspector
- (4) Separate School Inspector
- The Principal shall be the Chairman of this Board.

The Department of Education will advance money to the Authority in January 1965 so that they can carry out their duties.

Nothing contained in Bill 131 will affect the present relationship of employees of the Association (teachers, drivers, secretary, etc.) and the Essex County Association for Retared Children.

Now that the large burden of operating the school has been lefted from our shoulders we must not relax. I am sure we all realize there is much more to the total program for the retarded than just schooling. We must provide for pre-school nursery, recreation, home care, religious education, residential care and adult service. We must continue to do all these or else we are not fulfilling our avowed purpose of helping the retarded.

HOME CARE

Over our 1964 term the Home Care Committee has contacted several parents with retarded children and have found these contacts very rewarding. Letters have also been sent to professional people in the county, who in turn have helped us with our work.

I would also like to thank the members of my committee for their efforts. I wish all a Happy New Year.

DID YOU KNOW

That the most important factor in helping the mentally retarded is to treat them as much as possible like normal persons?

WHY WE NEED OUR GYM

When retarded children are given the chance to develope, their improvement can be amazing. In some cases their strength has been increased as much as 50%, and their endurance as much as 30%. And once the basic skills or throwing, catching, dodging, striking and dancing have been mastered, retarded children can even become regular playing members on school athletic teams/

But for this kind of success, the learning process must be carefully guided to give the retarded child the kind of confidence that leads to self-respect. The estimate that the retarded have of themselves is often very low, because of the failures they inevitably meet in life. Their first real taste of success may come from mastering a physical problem. A good program takes away the emphasis on what the retarded can't do...and gives them confidence in what they CAN accomplish.

One of the most frustrating and heartbreaking experiences of the retarded is watching the other children in the family and the neighbourhood troop off to activities from which they are barred or for which no consideration has been made even for them to watch from the sidelines.

A few years ago, the retarded were thought to be "unemployable." Now they are being employed...successfully. The revolution is understanding and education give the retarded their chance, and the list of jobs they have successfully filled proves that they were entitled to it.

The retarded worker is usually stable and takes pride in his job. He does not easily become bored by repetition. Jobs calling for simple skills, repeated acts and esthlished routines are often done BETTER by the retarded.

If we take people as they are, we make them worse. If we praise them for what they should be, We make them what they can be.

Have You a Quiet Mind?

The surface of the ocean constantly changes. Now it is smooth and quiet. Again, it becomes violent and tempestuous. But in its depths, down under the storms that whip the surface into a fury, there is a zone of eternal calm; which no storm ever reaches, no hurricane ever ruffles.

Dear Sirs: Ladies:

It has been nearly a month since our first "Newsletter " was sent to you, and as it suggested, we want to keep before you the Walkathon scheduled for Saturday September 26, 1970, being held to provide a much needed Rehabilitation Centre for Retarded Adults.

May we now share with you 3 areas you will be interested in knowing about:

- 1) Size and Cost of the Building: Specialists in the rehabilitation field tell us that a building comprised of 4,000 square feet is required. The building proposed is not fancy or luxurious in any way, but is planned to be functional and practical. Total cost of such a building is \$60,000.00 to \$65,000.00.
- What about Government Grants? The Government of Ontario will assist by providing \$3.75 per square foot OR 25 % of the building cost, whatever is the lesser amount. It appears as if the \$3.75 per square foot will be the rule, and this would figure to \$15,000.00.
- What about the Essex County Association? We have been assured that the Essex County Association for Retarded Children are prepared to put in approximately \$20,000.00 towards the new Rehabilitation Centre.

You readily see then that if the building costs \$65,000.00, we will need a balance of \$30,000.00. We propose, with your co-operation and the support of all residents of Essex County, to raise this amount. Thus, we have adopted the slogan "ESSEX COUNTY WALKS FOR THE MENTALLY RETARDED".

Thank you for your interest and your concern. Do your best to share this information with your young people and adults. We will need everyone's help and support. Thank you for yours.

TRAVELLING TO A FOREIGN COUNTRY

It has been noted that the Customs and Immigration have been taking a lighter view point on the Mentally Retarded unless in very severe retardation or if communication is impossible.

If a retarded person is travelling with their parents to a foreign Country (USA etc.) and the parents can satisfy the officer that the visit is recreational and sufficient funds are available for the trip, no problems should be had. One very important factor that must be stressed is to have the proper identification for parents and the M. R. Child, to prove you are a Canadian Citizen. It may be beneficial to have the name and address of whom you are going to visit or to the place you are going to stay.

Application may be made to the Immigration Office, for a fee, to obtain a waiver of law for six months to cross a M. R. Child. This may be convient if you were crossing quite frequently, but is not necessary for a once a year family vacation.

The main thing to remember is you must satisfy the Immigration Officer that you are Canadian Citizens and are going on a family vacation.

The Essex County Association for Retarded Children would like to inform you that Canada's National Week for the Mentally Retarded is approaching fast. Every year the Flowers of Hope campaign is used throughout Canada to highlight this week in May 13-19 this year. The Flowers of Hope Program is a multi-purpose program designed to raise operating funds and sometimes capital, to enlist new membership, to thank the public for its support in the past, and to inform you the public what has been done and what is still needed for the mentally retarded in public education programs.

WHAT DOES THE ASSOCIATION DO IN ESSEX COUNTY? Many of the residents of the county may not realize the work which the Association has accomplished in the past. A Nursery Program for children from the age of two to the school age of five years old is operated and financially supported by the Association. From the age of five years to twenty-one years a mentally handicapped child goes to the Sun Parlor School which is under the Essex County Board of Education. This school provides a social and academic program to their learning level. But when the retarded person reaches 21 years of age he can no longer attend the Sun Parlor School and in many cases the retarded are not able to compete in the work force in our present day society. In order that these persons can continue their education and training the Association has provided and operated a supervised work shop known as the A.R.C. Industries. This new building, situated in Essex serves people from all parts of the county and has a present enrollment of 38 with additional applicants anticipated. Along with the nursery and preschool training, the day school and workshop the Association also supports residences summer camps and religious training. A great deal has been accomplished but a great deal more must be accomplished for the future.

Without the help of those who have so generously supplied in the past, none of this would have been made possible. Continued help and support is desired.

FROM YOUR ADULT SERVICES CHAIRMAN: Our future plans for the Workshop is to endorse the "Guid lines for Workshop" program development by the . Ontario Rehabilitation Bureau of the Ministry of Community and Social Services.

Through these efforts we hope to have our Workshop accreditated under the Ontario Rehabilitation Workshop Council Standard Manual. You, and the members of your organization as community minded citizens, are being asked to volunteer your time and energy, so that this canvass will be a success. 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In the United States alone, some 430 retarded babies are born daily; and 3 or 4 out of every hundred persons are mentally retarded. Generally speaking one out of every eight or nine persons is as conselved related to a retardate as mother, father, sister, brother, uncle or aunt.

Almost every family which is involved in the problem of mental retardation goes through at least 3 stages.

- In Stage 1 the question asked is, "Why has this happened to me" Fortunately, not many people remain long in this first stage. A man said to me recently, "When I learned that my child was retarded, I kept asking myself, "Why did this happen to me"? You see, he said, "I was thinking only about myself, and not about my retarded child."
- Stage 2 In this stage the normal reaction is to ask, "What can I do to help my child?" But we must go beyond this stage to the next stage.
- Stage 3 In this stage we ask the question "What can I do to help all mentally retarded children"?

When we get involved in helping others, then we learn to look at our own problems in a different light, and our whole attitude begins to change.

SUN PARLOR NURSERY SCHOOL

As everyone is aware, we are in a new era in the training of the mentally retarded and the younger a child has the opportunity of enrolling in school, the better his chance of reaching the potentiality of his capabilities. With this in mind and armed with love, concern and patience, Mrs. Mae Ganderton opened the Sun Parlor Nursery School in the Baptist Church across the street from Sun Parlor School in 1967 with three pupils. Mrs. Ganderton felt that something could be done for these little ones, and set about operating a program in her own inimitable way. Not without growing pains and increasing problems her little "family" grew from three to six and then in June, 1968 half of the class graduated to Kindergarden in Sun Parlor School. In September of that year, Rev. Thistle announced that a new church was being built for his congregation and of course this meant new quarters, preferably near Sun Parlor or with adjacent playground facilities. Who would be so generous as to donate the use of a building again? Money was as scarce as ever. Eventually the Town of Essex gave the Association permission to use the bungalow school on Irwin Ave., just in the rear of the new Town Offices. This building hadn't been used for a number of years and was badly in need of cleaning and repairs, so a crew of volunteers spent one day cleaning and scrubbing and then slowly but surely as funds were being donated by different interested groups, renovations began. It was in this set-up that Mrs. Ganderton and Mrs. Walters and three pupils moved in January, 1969, but as of May, 1969 there are eleven pupils attending school and two applications pending with a probable three more in September. In June of this year, five of the ten pupils will attend Sun Parlor School in Kindergarden.

The bungalow school is at long last beginning to look something like a Nursery School, although much remains to be done. The school now boasts a new inside paint job, drapes, floor coverings, new plumbing with hot water being installed shortly, nursery school furniture and equipment and accordingly a nursery school license is being applied for and it is expected that by September of this year, the nursery school will be operating according to their rules. In order to teach nursery school pupils, a teacher is required to have a Part 1 Certificate and be attending classes to earn a Certificate for Parts 11 and 111 and the Assistant should have at least some training in the Part 1 programme; also certain rules and routines are outlined so the teacher and her assistant can follow a program that is most beneficial to the child.

We have just received an electric kiln for firing ceramics from Mrs. F. Langan of Maidstone, along with patterns and equipment to go with it. We all certainly appreciate very much her kindness in giving to us so much that will certainly be a big help to us here. We'll all have to learn the ceramic business to get the most out of the kiln and equipment. It opens up a whole new field for the Training Centre.

Another successful camp was held for the children of the Sun Parlor School and ten children from Churchwood in Windsor. Miss Mimi Vipond, of London, was the Camp Director this year. The children enjoyed a picnic at Point Pelee and swimming every day at the Kinsmen Pool in Leamington.

We hope to see some action on our new addition by the end of October, or early November. We need it badly, and are working in 'tight quarters' but the plans are encouraging.

October 11th, the Windsor-Essex Chapter of the Council for Exceptional Children will visit the school to see the classes in session. The children will attend school later hours than usual, so that the classrooms will be open to visitors from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. If you are interested in seeing what your child is doing, this is a good time to come, and bring anyone interested.

NEWS FROM THE ADULT WORKSHOP

The Training Centre is looking forward to another year of progress and of course always hoping that the new will be better than the old.

We have our trials and tribulations, but this always leads to greater understanding of our overall function - service to those less fortunate than ourselves. This desire becomes intensified when one meets with dedicated people in all phases of work in mental retardation.

We have lost one of these people with the passing of Wilfred Treaves. To Mrs. Treaves and the family our deepest sympathy. Our trainees miss him very much.

At the recent Training Course for Directors and Staff at York University, Toronto, we met with many dedicated people and none more so than the lecturers themselves.

To have been able to discuss mutual problems with others during leisure hours was a course in itself. Mrs. Wighton and I are grateful for the opportunity to attend the course and congratulations to the people who arranged the program for it was excellent.

Mrs. Frank Kane of Maidstone has joined our staff part time. There are 10 trainees attending at present and includes the new comers Larry Shanahan, Donnis Plant and Joe McLeod. Our Robert Pillon has gone to Goodwill Industries in Windsor. We wish him every success.

We are bac's to the rivets but hope to add a new job which will be less tedious.

Word has been received that our young men may be registered under the district Scouting Association as Rovers. Parents will be hearing more about this soon.

Dear Friends:

The past five years have brought many changes in our Association and with this thought in mind, I am taking this opportunity to try and bring you up to date.

Enclosed you will find a book that has been compiled to answer many of the questions that have arisen.

It has now become the thought of a great many of our members and friends that it is no longer necessary to be up to date on what is happening, however, this is farther from the truth to-day than it was in the past.

Let me take but a moment of your time to tell you about the things we hope to see realized in the near future.

(1) Workshop Training Centre -

Without a doubt this is of prime interest to each and everyone of us because it is solely supported by the Association and necessary because it provides a program of self sufficing and satisfaction for the Retarded and Handicaped Adult.

(2) Pre-School Program -
