Public help sought in sexual assault

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is another in a Crime of the Week series that appears in The Windsor Star in cooperation with Windsor and Essex County Crime Stoppers Inc., a program which seeks the public's help to crack major unsolved crimes.



Crime Stoppers is asking for the public's help in solving a sexual assault which took place in November of last year.

About 11:40 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 21, a 61-year-old South Windsor woman returned to her home after an evening out. The woman, a widow, lived alone.

While preparing for bed, she heard a noise from a spare bedroom and went to investigate. As she walked into the living room she was grabbed by a man.

SHE WAS dragged into her bedroom and thrown onto the bed. The attacker then used adhesive tape to bind the woman's hands together before sexually assaulting her.

During the assault, the man began to speak quietly, almost chanting, in a foreign language. He spoke with a heavy accent, telling the woman to be quiet or he would kill her.

The victim was tied to the bed frame while the suspect searched the house. Stolen were the woman's purse, wedding rings, pension cheques and a quantity of jewelry.

A relative who stopped in the following morning found the woman who'd been left tied to the bed.

Police are looking for a white man, believed to be in his 30s. He is approx-

imately 163 cm (five feet, four inches) tall and was described as having a medium but strong build.

The victim noticed a strong smell of kerosene or gasoline on her attacker.

In the past year, there have been two similar assaults in southeastern Essex County. All the victims were widows living alone on corner lots in remote areas.

Crime Stoppers is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to an arrest in this case. The special Crime Stoppers number is 258-TIPS (258-8477).

Additional rewards of up to \$1,000 will be paid for information telephoned to Crime Stoppers which leads to an arrest in any serious crime. Callers do not have to give their names or testify in court.

To guarantee anonymity, tipsters will be given a code number which they will use to identify themselves in all dealings with police and when collecting a reward.

Runaway Steer Now Hamburger

A runaway Hereford steer which led its owner, the Sandwich East dog catcher, and 15 or 20 helpers, a merry chase for 13 days, was caught and killed Wednesday.

Bert R. Bedford, owner of the steer, and clerk-treasurer of Sandwich South Township, lost two steers New Year's Eve when the animals fled his Snake Lane farm. One of the steers was found within a week following an intensive air-and-land search.

The second had continued to elude its searchers until Wednesday.

Sighted Sunday night by Ontario Provincial Police officers, the steer vanished into the area of Sandwich East Twp. bounded by Highway 2, Jefferson Blvd., Pillette Rd., and E. C. Row Ave.

At this point the Sandwich East dogcatcher, Pat Bellaire joined the chase. Certain that the steer could be found and caught, the searchers intensified their efforts Monday and Tuesday.

Alarmed by the fact that the 1,000-lb. steer crossed and recrossed Highway 2 during its wanderings, the searchers obtained permission Tuesday from the police to shoot the animal.

An elusive beast, the steer decided things were getting too hot and left the district Tuesday night.

On Wednesday morning Mr. Bedford received a phone call from a resident of Sandwich South near Fisher's

Flowers on Highway 3. The steer had been seen once again but had fled at the sight of people on foot.

Mr. Bedford enlisted two horsemen and about 15 helpers and the search was on again. This time they met with success.

The horsemen cornered the animal and were heading it back toward the Bedford farm. Two innocent bystanders were repairing a car nearby and the sight of them scared the steer.

It took another hour to catch and lasso the animal. By that time, it was about one mile from the Bedford farm on Snake Lane.

On examination, the animal was found to have been injured by a bullet wound and had lost a lot of blood.

"We let him sit for about an hour but he was still too tired to get up," Mr. Bedford said. The steer was slaughtered on the spot.

"I've been up half the night every night for a week and when I got to bed I couldn't sleep," Mr. Bedford said. "I am glad it's all over. I don't think we would have caught it if everybody hadn't been so helpful."

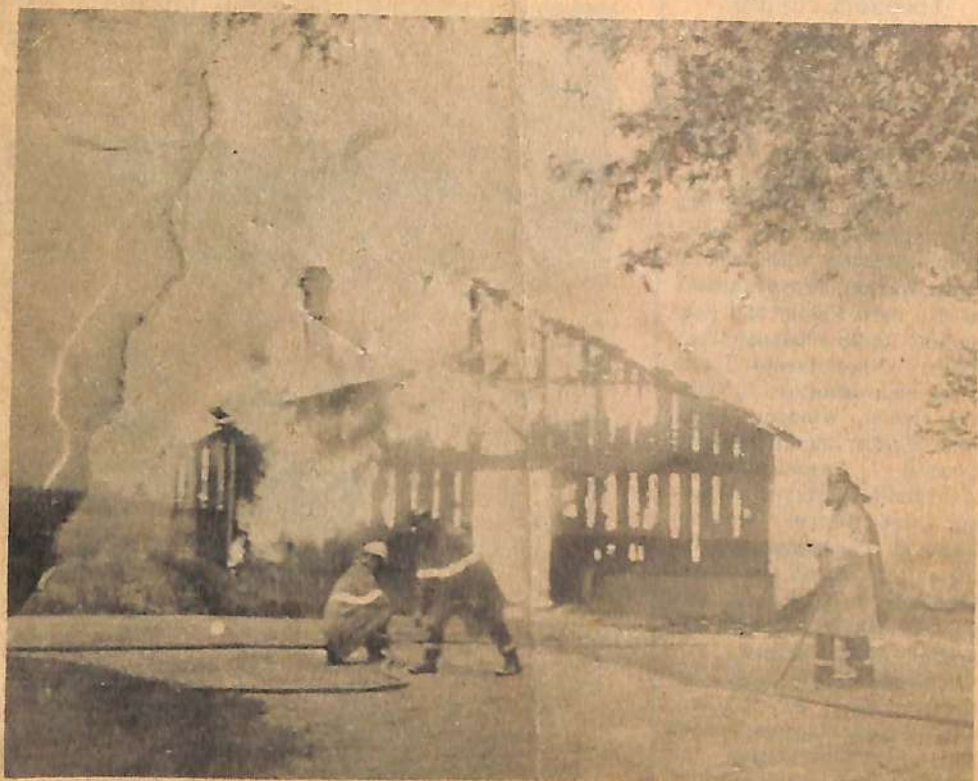

Death of first child born in Essex

Mrs. Emma Bennett, one of the first residents of Essex died recently in Windsor.

Believed to be the first child born in the new settlement of 1873, Emma Lickman was the eldest child of Mr. and Mrs. George Lickman (Emma Ford). She was born November 27, 1873, the same year that the little hamlet had its beginning with the opening of its first store in February. At that time there were two log houses in the area that was to become Essex.

The Lickman residence was located near the present location of the curve of Arthur Ave., at the end of the Maidstone townline. A short time later the brickyard was established nearby and Mrs. Bennett told her children of childhood experiences while playing in the brickyard. Her father, George Lickman was employed in one of nearby

lumber mills.

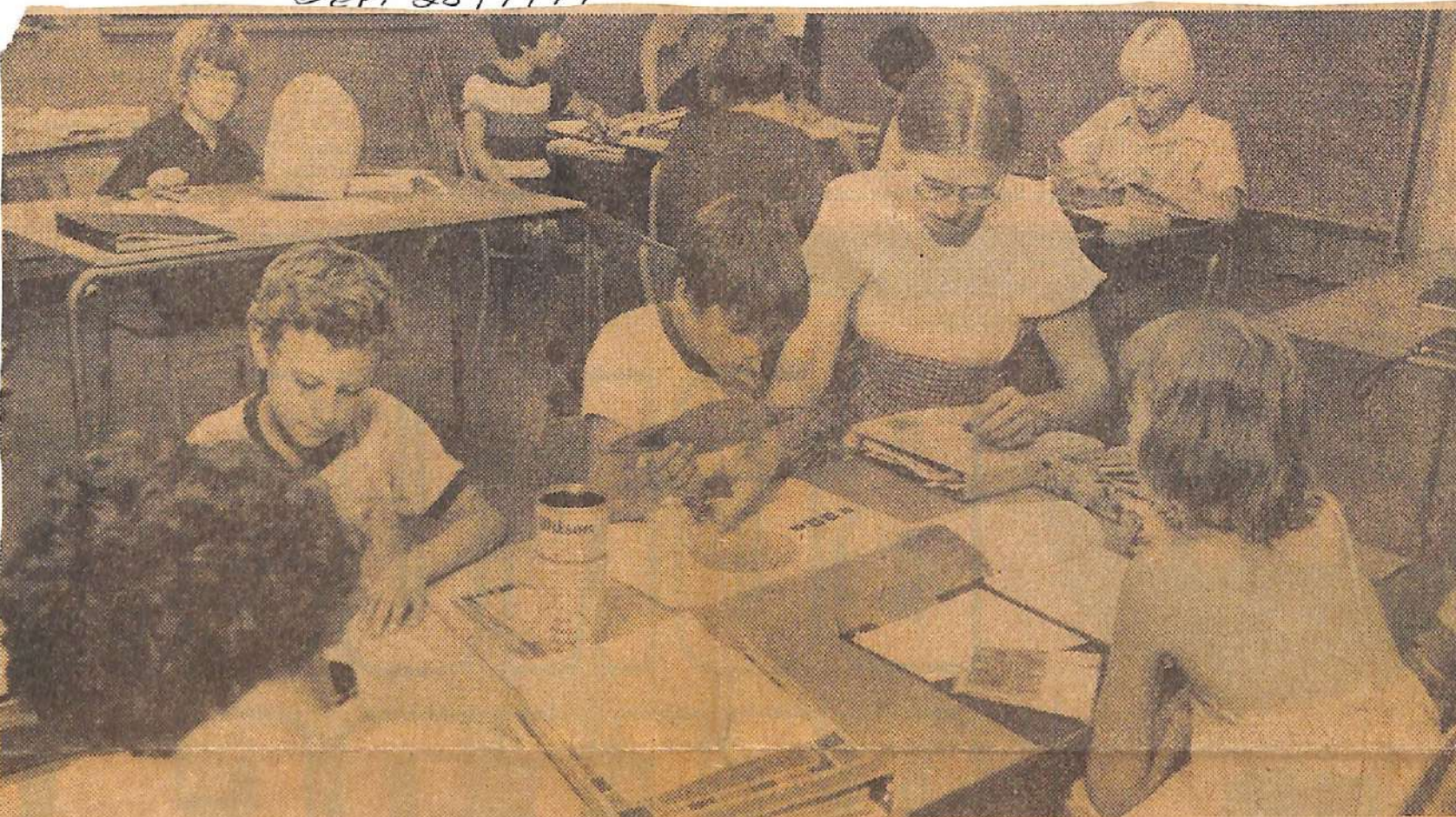

The 1-room school is back again

The one-room school house has reappeared in Windsor.

Star Thrower Christian School, tucked into the education wing of Glenwood United Church on Grand Marais Road made its debut without bells or packed classes.

Here 20 kindergarten to Grade 8 students work, study and play under the guidance of two qualified teachers.

Felt cutout posters with the words "sharing" and "love" hang on the walls and each day begins and ends with prayers, hymns and scripture readings.

It's all based on the school's three founding principles — creativity, community and Christian values, according to co-ordinator Sunny Ray.

And the school reflects a growing trend away

from the rigid and institutional setting of traditional separate and public schools, she added.

A second church school also has started in the city. The Windsor Christian Academy at Windsor Baptist Temple has enrolled 50 children from kindergarten to Grade 12.

Both alternate schools are funded by tuition fees paid by parents as well as voluntary donations. Both are required to meet ministry of education curriculum guidelines. Both espouse the value of their students' individuality and independence.

Two years of organizing and the endorsement of five south Windsor churches have led to Star Thrower's modest beginning.

Teacher Ruth Parr, who attended a one-room school house herself and taught at Malden Christian Academy on Malden Road before it closed this year, said the advent of Star Thrower parallels developments in other areas.

Sarnia, Chatham and London all have private Christian schools, she said.

"The parents have agreed they want their chil-

dren educated in a Christ-centred environment," Miss Parr said.

"We are going to be unapologetically and radically Christian," Rev. Robert Giuliano said in an interview about the school earlier this year.

"The difference between Star Thrower and traditional schools is that children have the benefits of small classes, individual attention, and the opportunity to work at their own speed, he said.

Ken Heaton, one of the school's three Grade 8 students and a former Malden academy student, said he prefers "the personal attention" of the smaller school.

Colleague Jonathan Lang, who attended public school in the county, believes he is also receiving a better education in the Christian school.

"I was at an open concept school in the county and you could never concentrate...this is much quieter," he said.

Mrs. Ray said a school committee is studying the feasibility of opening a Grade 9 class next September based on this year's success.

13 in bus 'get run-around'

OLDCASTLE — A Sandwich South Township family of 13, living in a school bus bought for \$75 after their home burned last June, needs a \$5,000 loan to complete a new home.

The mother, Mrs. Robert Bennett, said she tried loan and trust companies all over the city, "but they just gave me the run-around."

The bus, located on the site of the burned home, on Base Line between Con. 10 and Con. 11, "has cold floor." Already one of the children, Michael, 7, is sick with pneumonia and another has a high fever.

Mrs. Bennett is worried about the health of the other children. The 11 youngsters range in age from three months to 15 years.

The family has been living for three months in the \$75 school bus which had \$200 in renovations. After the fire, Mr. and Mrs. Bennett sent their older children to live with relatives in North Bay.

"But they wanted to come home, so we bought the bus," Mrs. Bennett said.

Bunks were installed and the family set up housekeeping in the crowded quarters.

The one-room situation is adversely affecting the work

of the children attending school, Mrs. Bennett said.

"My husband is working night and day to finish the new home." Two of the older boys help when they come

home from school, she added.

With initial funds, the family was able to complete the basic structure of the new home, on the same site as the burned house. However they

need more money to complete the job.

"We can't wait long," Mrs. Bennett said. "I know Mike is going to end up in the hospital."

The Bennett home burned on June 10, 1968 and the Oldcastle Women's Institute held a community shower for them in the old Township Hall on No. 3 Hwy. Clothes, food, furn.

Father, daughter die -- wife, son injured in crash

A Maidstone-area man and his daughter were killed and his wife and son critically injured in a grinding car-truck crash on Highway 3 near Essex Tuesday night.

Dead are:

Raymond Gerald Benoit, 36, of Highway 3, Maidstone.
His daughter, Nancy Benoit, 8.

Essex provincial police said this morning Benoit's wife, Velma, 33, and son, Raymond, 4, were both critical in Metropolitan Hospital.

All were pinned in their crumpled car following the collision with a feed truck about 6 p.m., 1½ miles west of Essex.

Driver of the truck, David

Gordon Williams, 18, of RR 2, Fletcher, escaped injury.

When OPP arrived they found Benoit's 1960 Chevrolet partly under the four-ton truck, owned by J. Smith Ltd., Chatham.

With wrecking bars they were able to free the two injured. Mrs. Benoit had severe facial and leg lacerations but was reported improving this morning.

Her son, who had critical facial lacerations and head injuries was reported not improving. The daughter died in hospital.

Suburban Ambulance crews had to pull Benoit's car apart for two hours to free his body. He died before he could be

freed. During the rescue the pressure bent windshield of the car "exploded" in the face of attendant John Redmond.

He was taken to Metropolitan Hospital with extensive face cuts and was released about 9 p.m. Eye damage had not been determined by this morning.

Police said the straight

stretch of road was damp at the time of the crash, but the scene was whipped by rain, hail and high winds after the crash.

Spanish villa in Maidstone

Like a storybook castle, the colorful Spanish home of glazed, white brick topped with a red, baked, enamel roof rises majestically out of the cornfields.

Situated on 21 acres of wooded land off County Road 46 and 12th Concession, the eye-catching dwelling is already a landmark for Maidstone area residents although it is less than a year old.

Truly a dream home of dream homes, its dominant, exterior features include: quadruple arches at the entrance; symmetrical, long windows with black, wrought-iron railings and a spacious roof garden with multiple access points.

A breath-taking foyer with green, antique, marble floor, Strass crystal chandelier and spiral staircase in black wrought iron grace the interior which is extremely airy in feeling because of a series of cut-away, Roman windows on the second storey.

Custom built by Heinz Wahl, fellow countryman of its owners Helmut and Alma Bernard, both of German descent, the home fulfills the desire for freedom and expression.

Near the house is a fish pond and all around — the grounds are carefully landscaped.

Because he trusted his wife's taste and his main interests were location and basic design, Mr. Bernard left virtually all major selections to her.

Mrs. Bernard and Mr. Wahl collaborated on the project for over six months. The family moved in just after Christmas '73.

The carpeting in the rectangular living room and dining room is mist green in color while that of the family room and spiral staircase is vivid red. Furniture in the living room and family room is typically Spanish in keeping with the architecture of the home.

There is a deep-cut-velvet sofa with high arms, high-backed chairs, tables from the Chicago collection and ornate, crystal lamps.

The kitchen has both beauty and convenience with custom, solid-walnut cupboards with ameroock hardware and a side-by-side refrigerator with exteriorally-located, custom ice and water dispenser as well as counter-top, barbecue grill, garbage compactor, built-in oven, dishwasher and all other modern conveniences.

A games room with a scenic view of the woods is located off the family room. An oak poker table with an overhanging lamp occupies the centre of the room.

On the second floor a square, balcony-like hallway enables the occupant of each of four, spacious bedrooms to exit into the hall, peer through interior roman windows and look down into the family room which sports an inviting, shimmering-quartz fireplace.

Most interesting of the upstairs rooms are the main bath with its sunken tub on an antique marble elevation, marble countertop, jacquard-print wallpaper and baroque, gold mirrors and the master bedroom with its magnificent, Strass crystal chandelier, heavily-decorated, Spanish bedroom suite and private bath with simulated-leather countertop.

REV. EDGAR J. HEALEY TO PARISH OF THEDFORD AND PORT FRANKS

Rev. Edgar James "Ed" Healey has been appointed rector of the Anglican parish of St. Paul's, Thedford and St. Anne's, Port Franks, effective August 15, 1986.

A native of Sarnia, Healey received a Master of Social Work degree from University of Windsor in 1971, pursuing a social work career in Essex County, St. Catharines and Lambton County until 1976 when he entered Huron College to study theology.

Upon graduation, he was made a deacon in 1979 and appointed assistant curate at Trinity Church, Cambridge. Ordained priest in 1980, he became incumbent of St. Peter's, Chsweken and St. Paul's, Sour Springs on the Six Nations Reserve in 1981.

Two years later, when the Parish of Six Nations East comprising Christ Church, St. John's and St. Luke's were joined with the Six Nations West parish of St. Peter's and St. Paul's, Healey assumed charge of the largest Indian parish in Huron Diocese.

As a member of Huron's Diocesan Native Ministries Committee, he helped to strengthen Indian lay leadership through Native Leadership for Christ conferences. He is also a Cursillo area spiritual advisor.

Healey's wife, Joan, a Registered Nurse with a public health diploma, has worked part-time in the Six Nations home care program. They have two children: Elaine, 15 and Jamie, 13.

The former rector of the Thedford and Port Franks parish, Rev. Tony Koning, retires July 31, 1986. He and his wife, Jean, will live in London.

Six Nations preserves old ideas, follows new thoughts

Six Nations Reserve lies along both sides of the Grand River in Brant County on the eastern edge of Huron Diocese. Known as "the largest populated Reserve in Canada", Band membership numbers almost 12,000 with about 7,000 Reserve residents.

The settlement of Ohsweken bustles around the Six Nations Band Administration building which houses Chief Wellington Staats' office. His wall map shows that the homeland of "Haudenaushonee Ongweh" ("People of the Longhouse"), known as No. 40 Six Nations and No. 40B Glebe Farm in the Department of Indian Affairs (DIA) Reserve list, is also the Township of Tuscarora, Brant County, Province of Ontario.

Ten miles square, the Reserve comprises 44,000 acres with 128 miles of road. "Except for Ontario Hydro, we are self-reliant (as a municipality)", Chief Staats said, "with our own bylaws, roads, fire, health and welfare, housing, Children's Aid Society, nursing home, medical centre with drug store and our own recreation facilities."

Six Nations has its own schools on the Reserve with DIA funding provided directly to the Band Council under the direction of

education administrator Harvey Longboat and a School Committee.

Staats is serving his third term as Chief but "I'm thinking of retiring." A millwright by trade, "I haven't really any education," he said. He and his wife operate "two little businesses - a grocery store, also a variety store and restaurant and do some farming."

The Haudenaushonee have a strong tradition of hereditary chiefs. "There are still some traditional chiefs," Staats said. "The elected people administer the Reserve but the hereditary system remains in place... (the traditional chiefs) are political." Staats shares their position that "there is one alliance for Indian people (which is) with the Queen as the British monarch."

Her Majesty's Chapel of the Mohawks is tangible evidence of that alliance. "The only Royal Chapel outside the British Isles, for many people it is primarily a church building used as a sacred place of worship," Staats said, since services are held there every Sunday, "but for non-church people it is of interest historically".

Combining the pragmatism and business acumen which are becoming hallmarks of the economic development policies of

many Indian Band Councils, a project "to capitalize on the Chapel as a tourist attraction" has been launched. "We don't want to impinge on the sacredness of the Chapel," Staats said, so the Henry House (a farmhouse beside the Chapel, given to the Band Council) is being converted into an Interpretation Centre.

"We try to preserve old ideas while following new thoughts," Staats explained. The Chapel is "taken care of by a perpetual care fund," he added, "but we have to find the operating and maintenance costs. It will help if we can get contributions from the general public." Ten or twelve people will be hired as maintenance workers, etc., and as guides who will lead tours through the Chapel to explain its history to visitors, "thus ensuring the Chapel building itself will be used first and foremost as a place of worship."

Speaking of general economic development on Six Nations, Staats said: "We are not as interested in profit as in providing opportunities for our people to work."

Six Nations Band is not a member of the Union of Ontario Indians (UOI) nor the Association of Iroquois and Allied Indians (AIAI) organizations.

"We're big enough to have a voice on our own," Staats said, but if other Bands need organizational clout, "we support them." Evidence of the respect Staats commands among leaders of native Indian organizations is the fact that he helped formulate and then signed the Declaration of The First Nations in December, 1980.

Staats nominated Georges Erasmus who was elected earlier this year to succeed David Ahenakew as leader of the Assembly of First Nations. "Ahenakew had a difficult time," he said, but the Assembly, national voice of status Indians in Canada, is "only three years into the operation so what can you expect?"

A member of the Chiefs of Ontario Council, Staats heads a

ferent than they used to... I'm pleased to see what's there... People are really cousins under the skin."

In 1983 amalgamation of the five Anglican congregations on the Reserve created one parish with former Six Nations West incumbent, Rev. Ed Healey, in charge. (Rev. Erwin Oliver, Walpole Island Band member and incumbent of the East parish, was appointed to the Norwich, Dereham and Scotland parish.)

Ed, his wife Joan, and Elaine, Grade 10 student at Hagersville and Jamie, in Grade 7 at J.C. Hill senior elementary school on the Reserve, live in the rectory beside St. Peter's Church in Ohsweken.

Each congregation has its own history. St. Peter's and the church on Sour Springs Road known as St. Paul's (Kenyengeh) or ("meeting place") are mainly Mohawk congregations. St. Luke's, the church of the Delaware; Christ Church, Cayuga; and St. John's, Tuscarora are on the east side of the Reserve which is the longhouse area.

Four catechists

Following amalgamation, Ed said, the parish recognized the need to develop their own training program for lay ministry. Volunteers produced a curriculum which includes study of the Bible, catechism and learning to lead Morning Prayer in part A; part B means learning to develop their own short sermons or "meditations", as the volunteers prefer to call them.

"They are doing a credible job," Ed said, with 12 to 15 people taking part. At the June 23 confirmation service, there were "two confirmees - a small class for us" while "four catechists: Band members Joe Green, Syd Henhawk, and Olive Moses; and Holy Trinity Church, Brantford, parishioner Rob Ferrell; received Part B certificates." People say the volunteers "are doing a good job" but Ed knows they feel "it's not the same (as having ordained clergy)."

Ed says "numbers have held," however, and "finances are doing as well or better." Amalgamation meant a decrease in Diocesan mission grants of

almost \$18,000.00 so "they've been struggling for two years" but parishioners have been able to put new roofs on St. Peter's, St. Paul's and St. John's and its parish hall at a cost of \$13,000, now almost fully paid. "They may need a small loan." Another encouraging sign is new families "coming back home" to live on the Reserve who are attending church. "Nobody wanted the changes but it had to happen," he said.

Several parishioners are also Band Councillors. St. Paul's installed new front steps and a ramp with employment-creation funding provided through the Band Council.

A "ministerial fellowship" of Anglican, Baptist, Pentecostal, Salvation Army and United Church pastors meets monthly for breakfast and prayer. They are invited, on rotation, to open Band Council meetings with prayer, take part in the opening ceremonies at community events, and one Thursday each month they minister at Iroquois Lodge Nursing Home on the Reserve.

Martin returns

Last August 18, Rev. Steele Wade Martin, rector of Christ Church (Episcopal), Quincy, Massachusetts, returned to his homeland.

Martin's grandfather was removed from the Band list when he became a medical doctor since, according to the Indian Act, an Indian who acquired a university degree was automatically enfranchized; that is, assimilated into white society. Martin's father was also a doctor.

Researching his past in that area, Martin continually came across mention of the New England Company which had settled in the Grand River Valley, and decided to visit Six Nations.

He celebrated Holy Eucharist at St. Paul's (Kenyengeh), followed by brunch and a time to visit with his family. He also celebrated the Eucharist at the Mohawk Chapel using the communion set presented to the Chapel by Kenyengeh Pottery, a cooperative founded by the Martin family which produces distinctive pottery handcrafted from local materials.

committee on economic development on Indian Reserves as well as an advisory committee to the DIA Ontario Regional Director regarding policies affecting "status Indian people in Ontario."

The Federal Government's recent amendment to repeal a section of the Indian Act under which aboriginal peoples lost their Indian status will force Indian Bands to examine and probably re-write their own Membership Codes. "We were always in favor of women not losing their status through marriage," Staats said, "but we want the right to decide who will live on the Reserve and how." The Government now says all Indian people who request reinstatement "can go on the Federal Band List" but this may impose an intolerable burden on some Bands to try "to come up with a membership code to satisfy the terms of the Canadian Constitution. Some Reserves in the north may want more people while southern Reserves may be already overcrowded. With no land mass, housing, education, etc., how can you take more people?"

Staats believes the only answer is for the Canadian people to "understand our position and come to an agreement on a system of self-determination for Indian people." Federal Government decisions are expected to apply to all people across the country but "when are we going to learn that Indian people are so diverse that one law for all simply can't work?" he said.

What part does the longhouse religion play in the life of Six Nations? Staats explained the word "longhouse" is used by Indian people to denote the traditional Indian religion but worship takes place outside. The "long house"

was built for inclement weather. "The Indian religion teaches us to worship every day as we give thanks for creation - for trees, rocks, water," he said. "My wife and I like to go to church... I believe there's enough room for both (church and longhouse). I enjoy going to the longhouse to give thanks in each of the four seasons."

The longhouse religion has been passed on by word of mouth "to keep it alive," Staats said. Translation has been discouraged "since the religion loses its life in translation."

Language lost

He and his wife are both Mohawk but only his wife speaks the language. "My family went to the church and schools a generation earlier than hers. They still believed in the traditional longhouse and the language was spoken at home... Our children went to school and college and have lost the language entirely."

Staats feels loss of the language has meant losing the ability to appreciate the values inherent in the Indian way of life. He would

like to see people "get back to the basic of being able to go to a longhouse funeral... in death, we look at what the dead person has taught us through his life and we try to learn from that." What Indian people have had in the past was good, he said. "We understood what it was to respect our friend and neighbor. We believed that everyone can make a contribution." As a Band Chief, he knows the "need to modernize (but) development means concern for people... we must keep the values of our people."

Mrs. Rose Bomberry, a Cayuga great-grandmother and Christ Church delegate to Huron Synod, lives at RR2, Ohsweken. "My folks were longhouse people... when I married 53 years ago, my husband's folks were longhouse but his father went to church so we did too."

There are four "longhouses" on the Reserve: Upper and Lower Cayuga, Seneca and Onondaga. As "the only Christian people" living in the midst of Cayuga longhouse families, Rose remembers "they tried to run us off." But they have "learned to get along," she said, and everyone is "much friendlier" now.

There have been other changes as well. "When I was young, I was afraid to talk to white people but that's all changed now," Rose said. Mixed marriages, especially among Indian and non-Indian which results in much visiting on and off the Reserve, and the breaking down of divisions through education, means children are "growing up dif-

Police and fire officials investigating an early morning barn fire Sunday in Sandwich South Township turned up a lot more than just warm ashes.

Essex OPP said a total of 395 "cultivated" marijuana plants were discovered near the barn on Con. 10, of the township, and a 30-year-old man was arrested.

John Chadwick appeared in provincial court this morning and was charged with cultivating marijuana. If convicted, the maximum possible sentence is seven years in prison.

Police said a policeman on routine cruiser patrol on Highway 401 noticed the barn on fire about 3 a.m. and went to the scene, with firefighters.

While investigating the blaze, which destroyed the unused barn, police and firemen stumbled onto the two patches of marijuana plants.

The plants were uprooted and seized and later taken to be stored at the Essex detachment. Police couldn't estimate the street value of the plants, but they also seized about 145 grams of the drug, valued at about \$400.

Windsor hero Silver Star in Viet Nam

By ANGUS MUNRO

The war in Viet Nam came a bit closer to Windsor today, but its shadow has heroic and pleasing overtones, gently intermingled with romance.

A 23-year-old Windsor-born U.S. soldier, Specialist Four Sidney Coe, son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Malenfant, 1253 Surrey Rd., has been awarded the Silver Star for bravery in the field. His parents, absent on a holiday, are unaware of their son's distinction, but his wife-to-be, Karen Reed, a Nebraska girl he met while serving with his unit in Columbus, Ga., presently is staying in Windsor.

She heard the news first from The Star. Today, she is proudly awaiting the return of her betrothed, whom she explains is due to complete his three-year hitch in the army Aug. 5. They hope to set a date for their wedding soon.

According to the citation, the major award was given for unusual bravery in contact with the enemy. It reads:

"SP 4 Coe distinguished himself on 30 January 1966, while serving as a forward observer during a search-and-destroy mission in the Bong Son River Valley, Republic of Vietnam.

"On this date his company encountered intense Viet Cong automatic weapons fire. With complete disregard for his safety, Coe immediately organized an attack upon the Viet Cong position. He organized and led a squad across a river while receiving intense hostile fire.

"Although wounded when given the order to withdraw, Coe would not let anyone come to his aid, and delayed

pulling back until all of the men of his squad had withdrawn to safety.

"His brave action instilled confidence in his fellow-soldiers and contributed immeasurably to the successful destruction of the Viet Cong position."

The award was presented at a ceremony in Viet Nam, July 15, by Col. William F. Brand Jr., division artillery commander and by Lt. Col Ernest P. Terrell Jr., commanding officer of the 21st Artillery.

The young Windsor soldier is a member of the First Battalion, 21st Artillery, First Cavalry Division (Airmobile). He had written home about being wounded, but did not write of his award.

A graduate of Ivor Chandler Public School, he attended Kennedy Collegiate and wanted to be a writer. He wrote several articles for U.S. magazines and actually finished a novel titled: "Among The Mighty," which has not yet been accepted for publication. For a short time before enlistment three years ago, he worked at odd jobs in Windsor, including a period at Woolco stores.

His unit left for Viet Nam just about a year ago and has been engaged in much of the bitter fighting in that divided country.

Efforts are being made to reach his parents with word of his award. They are somewhere on the road on a brief holiday. Norman Malenfant, his stepfather, is in charge of the meat department in Vizzard's Market, 1494 Lincoln Rd.

The Silver Star is listed as the fourth highest decoration in the U.S. forces.

Return to 'ordinary' life

Viet Nam veteran back at typewriter

At 23, Sidney Coe is a decorated war veteran who is trying to settle back to civilian life.

Mr. Coe returned to Windsor this week after serving three years in the U.S. Army. In his last, served in Viet Nam, he received the Silver Star for bravery in action against the Viet Cong and two Purple Hearts.

With the war behind him, he is now ready to settle down to a job in Windsor while indulging in his spare time in his favorite pastime: studying and writing.

"I feel that my education is lacking," he said today in the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Norman Malenfant, 1253 Surrey Rd.

"I don't want to wait long before I get a job and start studying again in the fall."

His ambition is to teach.

However, his desire to publish a novel remains undiminished. In the past he wrote several articles for U.S. magazines and a novel which remains unpublished.

"I have collected too many rejection slips to stop now," he said.

With a full year's experience in Viet Nam, he now has a rich background from which to draw for his next literary venture.

Mr. Coe, a graduate of Ivor Chandler School and Kennedy Collegiate, served with the First Cavalry Division (Airmobile) 21st Artillery unit, First battalion as an artillery spotter.

Before his release he was urged by his commanding officer and the Army's public relations office to attend Officer Candidates School to qualify for a commission. But he preferred to leave the service and return to civilian life.

As a reconnaissance specialist Four, he often had to move

ahead of the main U.S. forces to reconnoiter enemy positions, then direct artillery fire on these positions.

He feels that while the U.S. and South Viet Nam forces are winning the war, guerrilla activity in that country will continue for a long time because of the influence exercised by the North Viet Nam in the area.

He said information from prisoners in recent months indicated that while North Vietnamese are solidly behind the Communist regime's war effort, in the south, they are becoming war weary.

Mr. Coe felt that U.S. bombings of the de-militarized zone along the border between North and South Viet Nam is justified since, from his experience, both guerrilla units and North Vietnamese forces find refuge in the area.

He found the enemy well-trained, well-armed and extremely resourceful in jungle warfare. This accounted for the initial setbacks suffered by the U.S. and South Vietnamese troops.

"However, we are now learning, and learning fast, how to deal with them. I feel the helicopter, which provides us with extreme mobility, is the main weapon in our fight against the Communists," he said.

He added that the Geneva convention provisions are not applicable to Viet Nam where the war is waged under severe conditions.

North Vietnamese and the Viet Cong rarely keep prisoners, unless they are officers. All other ranks are executed after capture. Wounded U.S. soldiers and South Vietnamese are also killed in the hands of the Communists.

He said torturing of prisoners often takes place for the sake of expediency.

"They have information

which is vital to us, so we do what we can to get this information," he commented.

He added that torturing Viet Cong prisoners is more common among Vietnamese troops who "have been in this longer than we have and are losing patience at times."

He commented that the average U.S. in Viet Nam is aware that he is fighting under the constant threat of a Chinese intervention.

"Such an eventuality would, perhaps be better for us, since then the war would assume a fixed-line aspect in which we are far superior," he said, "instead of the guerrilla, hit-and-run methods they employ now."

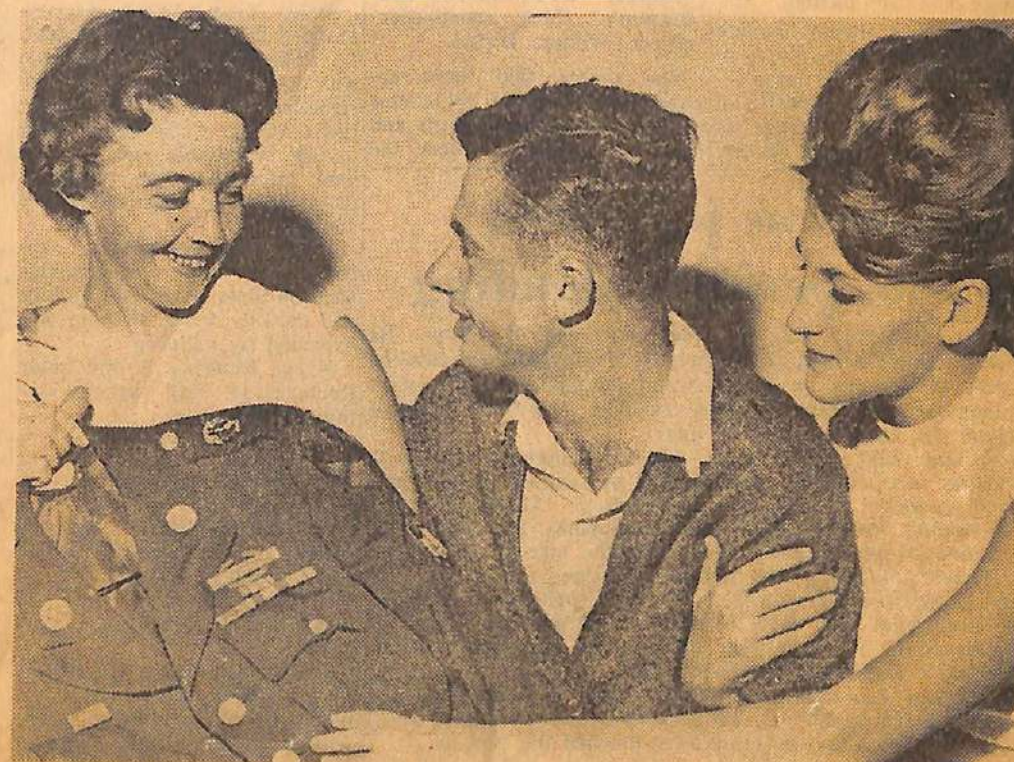

Volunteers use Helping Hands to aid needy

Twenty-one years ago the idea started in a small way.

Volunteers from the church would meet regularly to pack boxes for the needy and to socialize while they sewed quilts or made useful items from discarded fabrics.

Alice and Stafford Adams lived in Dorval, Quebec, for a while, where she observed a successful Helping Hands group in action. When they returned to Windsor, she thought their church, Lincoln Road United, could also sponsor such a project. The Adamses offered space in their own home and Helping Hands was soon a success.

Since 1965 there have been 119 different women in the organization, some right from the start. An average of 14 women meet once a month to do whatever has to be done. In 1986 they shipped 18 cartons with 343 pieces of clothing to such places as Zaire, Nepal, Indonesia and Haiti.

A recent shipment went to Dr. Betty Bridgeman, a United Church missionary in Zaire. It included cotton and knitted bandages, medicine bottles, hospital gowns, a dress, skirt, blouses, sweaters, shorts, crib quilts and sheets and some men's shirts.

When Bob Chappell, former administrator of Huron Lodge, was working as hospital administrator in Ghana, he also was the recipient of life-sustaining equipment. Used shirts are converted into hospital gowns if collars and cuffs are frayed. Plastic medicine bottles are saved for hospital shipments because prescriptions have to be measured into envelopes otherwise, from the large hospital-size bottles.

Two women were packing boxes; two were working at sewing machines, stitching bandages and hemming quilt pieces; one was pinning hems on a quilt; one was working at the ironing board; one was ripping up white materials to uniform sizes; five women were quilting and Alice was fitting in where necessary — besides talking to me. She emphasized it was a particularly busy day, with lots of odds and ends to finish.

Her daughter, Dorothy Boyle, said Alice probably spends about 60 hours of work a week herself. She bleaches, washes and irons materials in readiness for the workers.

Seniors from the church's Friendship Centre help by rolling bandages and cutting quilting blocks. Since many of the Helping Hands are retirees, they welcome younger members who will keep the work going.

In 1972 the group nominated her as citizen of the week, an award presented by CKWW radio "in recognition of outstanding services toward community betterment in making Windsor a better place in which to live, work and play." She also treasures a distinguished-service award for valued service in 1983, presented by Hiatus House, and made certain that I realized these awards were for the Helping Hands, not her personally.

WHEN I VISITED the Helping Hands at the Adams home, Alice emphasized they do not need anymore donated materials. Friends and church members have been generous and storage was becoming a problem.

Her husband Stafford came to the rescue after he retired. The group was using the downstairs family room anyway, so he made alterations in the rest of the basement for storage purposes, saving one little corner in the recreation room for his own use. He also made shallow trays to keep squares of cloth separated; each large tray is filled with fabrics of different colors.

A side room is piled to the ceiling with cartons of stretch materials, cottons and woollens separated, packing boxes and plenty of empty prescription bottles. "We use practically anything," Alice said.

Quilt-making is one of their specialties. Stafford helps by cutting out blocks for them. When everything is humming, the basement looks like a small factory or cottage industry hard at work. Quilts made by the members stay in Windsor at various facilities.

Besides the overseas shipments, last year they delivered needed items to Albright Manor in Beamsville, a United Church retirement home, Brentwood, Children's Aid, Hiatus House, Huron Lodge, Leone Residence, Riverview Hospital and VON.

They are aware of the needs of these organizations and agencies. For example, VON uses double-bed quilts for patients' needs and Leone Residence uses pillow cases, sheets and bedspreads.

Statistics kept by Alice Adams show they have made more than 700 quilts since 1965, averaging 45 a year.

better citizens in the world they live in... 'What is taught with Pleasure is learned full measure' is our motto."

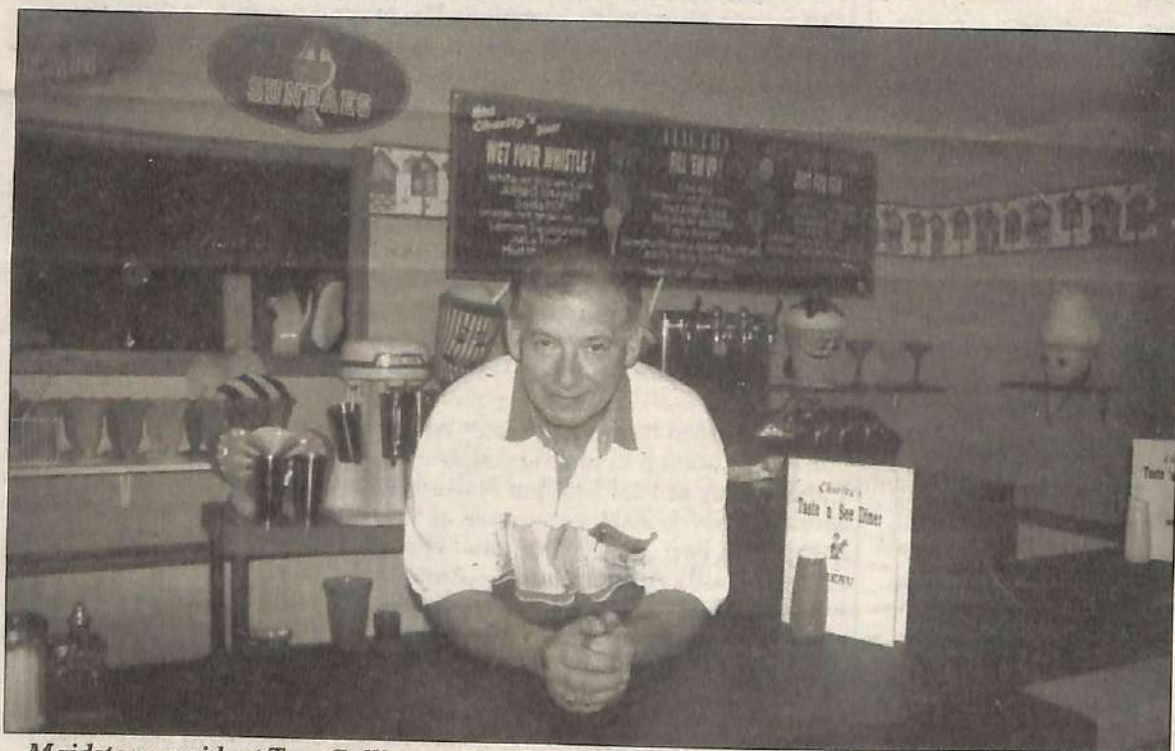

Sandwich South Dairy Man Suffers Big Loss.

Forty-seven head of cattle burned to death Saturday night in a \$35,000 blaze that levelled an L-shaped barn filled with hay, feed and straw; a recently filled silo and farm implements, at the Tom Croft farm, Con. 11, Sandwich South, between Highways 98 and 401.

Mr. Croft was in the barn less than 20 minutes before the blaze was noticed. "Everything was all right when I left," Mr. Croft said. "I had barely been in the house a few minutes when the barn was blazing from one end to the other. I could not get back in."

Thirty-two milk cows, burned to death in their stanchions. A pure bred Jersey Bull and fourteen heifers were also lost.

The purebred Jersey herd had been acquired in recent months. Some of the cows were of exceptionally fine pedigree and came from Brampton's top Jersey herds.

Besides the cattle, the front end of one tractor was badly damaged by fire; a combine, hay baler, forage blower and milking machine are a complete loss.

The Anderton Fire Department and the Tecumseh Fire Department were on hand, but the fire had spread so rapidly they could do little more than confine the blaze to the barn.

No longer is 'Joe Who'

Conservative party leader

Michael Meighen wishes the media would stop referring to his party leader as "Joe Who?"

Mr. Meighen, president of the federal Progressive Conservative party and grandson of a former prime minister, said in an interview Thursday that party leader Joe Clark has become well-known since his surprise victory at the 1976 PC leadership convention.

"Joe Clark is highly recognized. Everybody knows him," Mr. Meighen protested.

The Tories are building support across Canada due to the work of the party leader and the public's increasing disenchantment with the federal government, he said.

"Almost a million votes have come to us since the Tory leadership convention," he claimed.

Mr. Clark has been keeping a low profile as part of a three-step plan to reunite the party which was badly split toward the end of the Diefenbaker years, Mr. Meighen said.

The plan was to rebuild the party caucus, then the party and finally go to the voters, Mr. Meighen said.

Mr. Clark is now moving into phase three of the plan, he said.

"The party is more united than it ever has been and Clark has paid all his calls on the party members. Now, he's meeting increasing numbers of independent groups," he said.

He expects Mr. Clark to pay his first visit to Windsor later this year, but no date has been arranged.

Windsor has long been a stronghold for the federal Liberals, but the Tories could have a chance in two ridings in the next election, Mr. Meighen said.

Referring to Agriculture Minister Eugene Whelan, who represents Essex-Windsor, he said that ministers spend much of their time on cabinet business and neglect their constituents.

Windsor West could be the site of a Tory win, too, he claimed, because former cabinet minister Herb Gray "is not enchanted with his own party. I wouldn't be surprised to see him step down."

The Tories' problem is attracting good candidates, Mr. Meighen admitted. "It's hard to attract top-notch people when you haven't been successful in the past."

Later, at a meeting of the Essex-Windsor Progressive Conservative Federal Riding Association, he promised a good candidate to run against Mr. Whelan.

"Whelan is a nice guy, but his wife wants him back on the farm again and we'll do a favor for Liz (Mrs. Whelan)," he said.

Mr. Meighen, in the interview, said many PC policies are aimed at labor groups, among them wage and price controls which the party introduced in the last election campaign.

The Tories, however, would have consulted with labor and business before implementing controls rather than presenting a fait accompli as the Liberals did, he said.

"That's the policy the party will follow. The party welcomes greater participation by labor in government," he said.

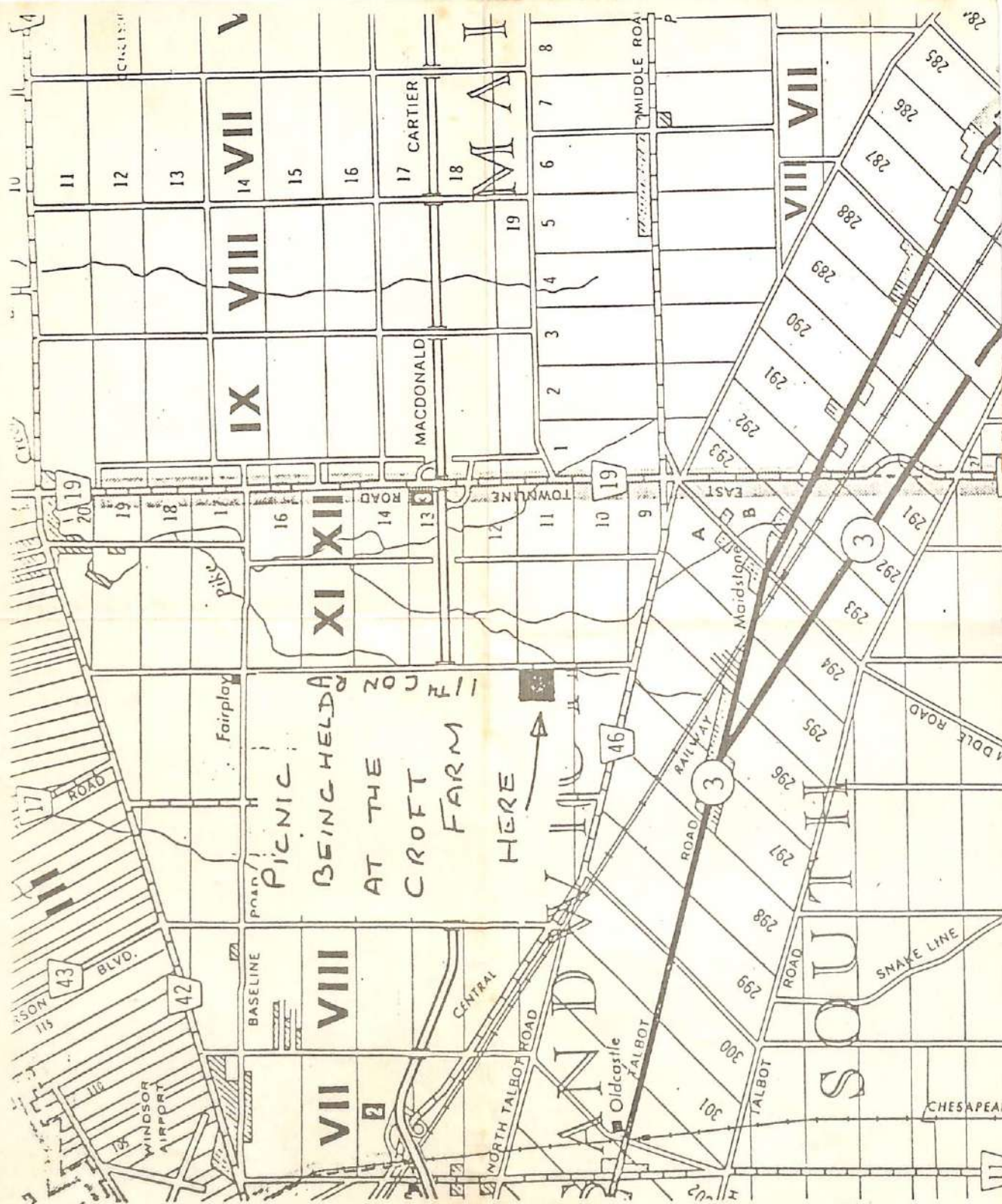

This Nonagenarian Remembers The First Car, Electricity, Radio and Telephone

Mrs. Gordon Purser celebrated her 90th birthday on Sunday.

And those 90 years take her in time back before cars, telephones, and electricity.

With her memory of her first car ride as clear as if it were yesterday she said,

"I ached for two days after. There were no springs and the roads were so rough. I enjoyed the ride, but it was afterward. They soon made them better."

The smoothest street in Windsor was paved with round wooden blocks set on end and Mrs. Purser says that was fine for bicycling for those of us who could afford a bicycle.

Her memories of teen years in Windsor seem to be all happy ones as she talked of rowing across the Detroit River to Belle Isle.

"We had a good time in those days. If you were lucky enough to have a boyfriend who had a boat you could row across the river. There was a very fast boat called the Tashmoo. We'd wait until that boat was coming and then start out. We'd go up in the air as we were hit by the backwash," she laughed and then grew serious with the comment, "I wouldn't do that today. Anyway the boys knew how to handle it and we thought it was fun."

Can you imagine Windsor when Tecumseh Road was truly a road with almost no built-up area; when Wyandotte and Riverside were the two thoroughfares across town; when a man came along the streets every evening to light the gas lamp. Mrs. Purser can remember it vividly.

As she sat in her Sandwich South home where she does her own housework, she found the memories of her life good, mostly happy ones and recalled with sadness the unhappy ones of personal loss of dear ones. But the same courage and perseverance that saw her through sorrow and difficult times, and the same brilliant and enquiring mind keep her on top of life's activities today with a continued zest for life and enjoyment of each day and her family and friends.

Later when she married Gordon Purser, one of the first three plumbers in Windsor, her home was on Ouellette Ave. near Tecumseh Road until they moved to Sandwich South township. She recalls the soldiers training on Ouellette Ave. during the first world war. The area south of Tecumseh was all open land then and they set up a barracks in the area that is now Jackson Park, she recalled.

After the war the government built homes but when the depression came there were hundreds and hundreds of houses empty in Windsor and a well-equipped home on Ouellette Ave. would rent for \$16. a month.

Mrs. Purser is one of 5 remaining charter members of Westminster United church in Windsor and a life member of the United Church Women.

She is a branch director of Oldcastle Women's Institute.

Convinced that courage and patience are the greatest assets for a life that can overcome adversity her philosophy has been "You do what's right and right will come to you." It has made life good for her and as she looks back she says, "I've lived in a lovely time I think."

Her family celebrated her birthday with her. They are James Purser of Windsor; Mrs. Frank Barron, Marjorie, of Amherstburg; Mrs. Thomas Croft, Dorothy, of Sandwich South; along with 4 granddaughters and 3 great granddaughters.

Busy, Busy, Busy!

Heads Many Groups, Dedicated to Them All

(Editor's Note: This is the 18th in a series of articles about Windsor and area's very busy women . . . the ones who get things done at home, on the job, and in their various clubs and organizations. Other articles will follow from time to time.)

Here is a fairly typical day in the life of Oldcastle's Mrs. William A. Crowder, surely one of Windsor area's busiest women:

In the morning, she had a "summary day" meeting of Oldcastle Women's Institute dessert course that she is instructing.

In the evening, she had to choose between a St. Patrick's Tea that St. Stephen's Women's Auxiliary was holding, and catering with the same church's Ladies' Guild at the Oldcastle Co-operative. She was program convener of the tea, so it won out.

As charter member of five area organizations, and a member of a few others, Mrs. Crowder's days are always filled. If she isn't attending meetings or social affairs of these groups, she's phoning members on business or writing reports or publicity notices. She has also handled several money-raising drives in the area.

Mrs. Crowder is also unofficial historian for her township of Sandwich South. She has

been compiling a history of the county for her Women's Institute ever since it was founded 15 years ago.

She also helped compile some of the information used in Dr. Neil F. Morrison's history of Essex County, which the Women's Institute sponsored. In fact, she raised most of the money she has used to compile the W.I. history of Sandwich South by selling 100 copies of Dr. Morrison's book! She hopes someday to write a book of her own on Sandwich South's history.

Her interest in history is probably quite natural, since an uncle of Mrs. Crowder's was a history professor at the University of Toronto. She is also descended from township pioneers on both sides of her family.

Mrs. Crowder also serves as an unofficial "walking encyclopedia" for information regarding her township and the county. People and organizations call her for widely assorted pieces of information, and, as she says, if she doesn't have the information, she usually knows where they can get it. For example, a dairy phoned her recently wanting to know where they could get goat's milk for a baby who needed it; sure enough Mrs. Crowder knew where they could get some.

In addition to her several official and unofficial functions, Mrs. Crowder is also a dedicated housewife. Cooking

is one of her favorite activities. Sewing is another—she used to turn out fancy-work aprons of her own design by the hundreds for bazaars. Sampling and quilting are other activities she enjoys, as is decorating.

She and her husband also used to own an orchard behind their home and Mrs. Crowder sold fruit and flowers outside her country home. They sold the orchard a while ago, but Mrs. Crowder still grows flowers around her home, while her husband tends a vegetable garden and a few fruit trees on their property.

Her husband is retiring after 45 years at the end of April, and Mrs. Crowder will give up many of her offices throughout the coming year. They enjoy travelling and would like to drive out to Yakima, Wash., to visit their daughter, and see the American and Canadian West Coast, as well.

Mrs. Crowder's daughter was the last Canadian war bride to enter the U.S.

The Crowders also have two sons, one married and living in Windsor, the other at home.

When her daughter-in-law was ill a few years ago, Mrs. Crowder took care of her son, granddaughter and infant granddaughter for several months, all without missing a club meeting! If she couldn't go out to a meeting, the club met at her home instead!

The welcome mat's out for industry

OLDCASTLE — Located just south of Windsor on the old Talbot Trail, Oldcastle has always played the role of a country neighbor to its urban friends further north.

While the line between city and country has grown increasingly thin, the area still fol-

lows its traditional role. No where is this more obvious than in the development of the Sandwich South Industrial Park where businesses, often unsuitable to the inner city, have found a home.

The park's 263 hectares (650 acres) are roughly contained within the borders of the Eighth Concession road and the North Talbot

Road to the east, Highway 401 and the City of Windsor to the north and west, and to the south, its border runs along a line parallel to Highway 3 about 762 metres (2,500 feet) north of the highway. More generally, the park is just north of the hamlet of Oldcastle.

MOST OF the approximately 170 businesses in the park manufacture goods related to the auto

industry. But the businesses also manufacture something else that creates a very advantageous situation for Sandwich South residents: Taxes.

Approximately 27 per cent of the township's tax levy, or about \$942,000, comes from businesses in the industrial park, contributing to a desirable ratio of industrial/commercial assess-

ment to residential assessment of 40/60.

And it just keeps getting better, explains the township's administrative assistant, Elizabeth Neuert. Although industry began moving to the area in the mid-'60s, the park wasn't officially designated as such until 1970. For the first 10 years about 17 new firms per year were established but this pace slowed to about two or three during the recession, Neuert says.

HOWEVER, now the pace appears to be quickening again with about 10 or 12 new businesses moving in per year.

Obviously, the business owners feel the park atmosphere is contributing something to their efforts as well. A random survey of six firms provides some insight into what the park offers and the reasons behind its apparent success.

Common to many of the explanations given by owners and managers is the relative cheapness of land in the township compared to the city. Mentioned also is the tax rate and the general atmosphere in the area.

Take Dor-Co Sales and Service, for example. Originally, the company was in Windsor but when it came time to expand it chose the Sandwich South Industrial Park. The company, which manufactures and installs doors and accessories and has 11 employees, just expanded again to a larger building in the park in May.

Murray MacDonald, Dor-Co sales manager, says the main reason the move was made to the township was because of taxes. Land values were

also a factor. But the move of the automobile weatherstripping warehouse from its Prince Road, Windsor location was the lack of suitable facilities in the city, Hogue says.

WHEN THE decision was made to expand the warehouse, management had difficulty finding a building modern enough downtown.

Now that the three-person operation is in the park, and in its second new building, she says she likes the spaciousness of the location.

"I enjoy it out here. There's places for trucks to back up and wait, if they have to, which you wouldn't want in a residential area."

Bruce Lane, owner of Southern Wire Products Ltd., which manufactures wire products for the automotive industry, is also pleased with the progress of his company in the Sandwich South Industrial Park. Unlike the others, Southern Wire started in the township in 1977 because of the lower price of the land and has stayed. During that time, it has undergone two expansions and now employs about 35 full-time workers.

Although he complains that the taxes are still too high, he admits they are lower than in the city. He says he likes the atmosphere of the area where employees can use nearby picnic tables for lunches during the summer in a park-like setting.

"CLOSENESS of the

401 has been an advantage — easy for shipments to come right in from the highway," he adds.

"It's so close to the city, for all intents and purposes it's considered Windsor anyways," he says. "You still draw primarily from a Windsor workforce."

Another business which liked the lower initial capital outlay and operating costs of the township is Rapid Tool and Mold Ltd. That firm, a manufacturer of injection moulds and die casting for the automobile industry, was initially located on Meighan Road in the city but moved to the township in April because "the property and taxes are too expensive in Windsor," says part-owner Nick Onya.

Ivo Oppio, president of Classic Tool and Die Inc., also says his company, manufacturers of stamping dies for the auto industry, initially located in the park in 1977 because of comparatively-low taxes and land prices.

Besides lower taxes, accessibility, and cheaper land, Gary St. Denis, vice-president of International Controls, says he likes the services of the area, despite the fact there's no sanitary sewers. His company moved to the park from Provincial Road in Windsor almost four years ago.

"We have storm sewers and at least we have room for weeping bed," he says. "It's just fine out here."

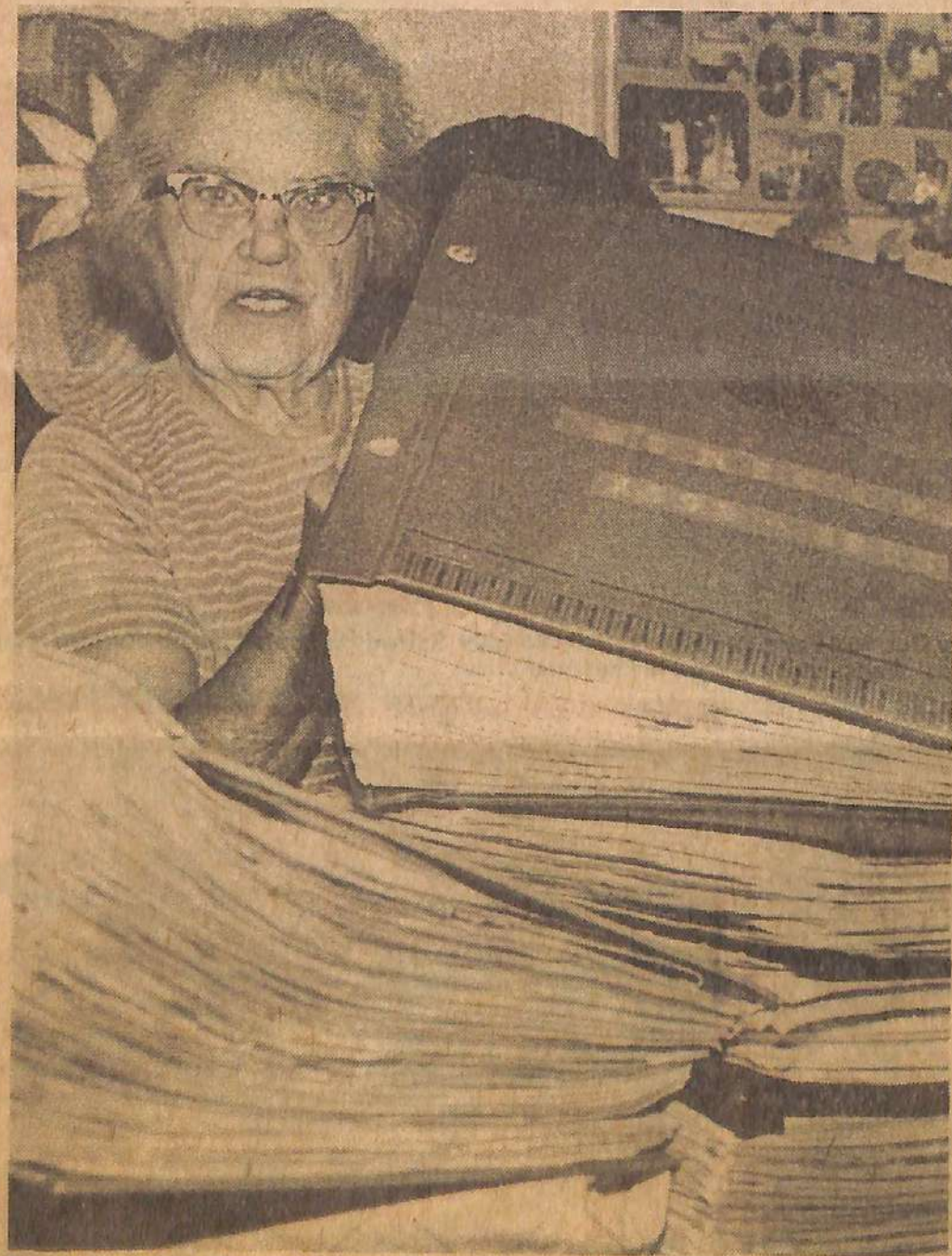
"IT'S ALSO a good location for deliveries," he says. "Freight companies always seem to have a truck in the area. It's very accessible."

"We do a lot of trade with the homeowner and I was afraid they'd say 'Oldcastle — I'm not going all the way out there.' But that hasn't happened."

"Even for me getting to work, it's been convenient. I live in Forest Glade and it takes me 10 minutes."

The fact the park doesn't have sanitary sewers and uses septic tanks instead, has never been a factor, he says.

Cherill Hogue, supervisor of the Waterville Cellular Products Windsor Warehouse, says her company moved to the township for somewhat different reasons. The main factor in the

Collection of clippings tells township's story

OLDCASTLE — Myrtle Crowder has watched Sandwich South Township and the hamlet of Oldcastle evolve for 58 years.

When she and her husband moved to their Walker Road home, their street was a rough dirt track surrounded by acres of farmland and there were no services.

Since then, the complexion of the area has changed dramatically with modern paved roads and highways, industries and residences, giving an increasingly-urban face to the community.

While Oldcastle and Sandwich South have changed over the years, Crowder has been recording the evolution in what has become seven volumes of newspaper clippings, pictures and transcriptions from municipal documents.

Myrtle first started this massive undertaking in 1950 when she was elected curator for the newly-formed Oldcastle Women's Institute. Part of her job as curator was to compile a history of Sandwich South Township.

Called the Tweedsmuir History, in honor of a former Canadian governor-general, it covers everything from births, marriages and deaths, to fires, annexations and airports.

IF YOU WANT TO KNOW when the area received telephone service, for example, Myrtle has it in her history. If you want to know when Highway 401 and the new Highway 3 went through the area, Myrtle has the answer. Railroads, agriculture and water services also receive attention.

After decades of collecting stacks and stacks of information, the 79-year-old mother of three, grandmother of six and great grandmother of four, shows no signs of losing her enthusiasm.

Given an eager ear, she will quickly launch into an anecdote about this person or that incident she happens to see mentioned in a clipping while flipping through heavy leather-bound volumes.

"There's hardly a day goes by that I don't find something for my history," she says.

The comprehensive nature of her history has led more than one person, searching for clues for a family history, to her door. Others, such as professional historians, have called on her services for the writing of such works as The Garden Gateway, a history of the Windsor area.

Most recently the Tweedsmuir History was called into action for the writing of a township history, an Ontario bicentennial project. The history, expected to be printed in about a month, was prepared by University of Windsor student Laura Langlois, who was born and raised in Sandwich South.

DRAWING ON CROWDER'S WORK, Langlois describes the early history of such communities as Oldcastle and Maidstone, originally called Maidstone Cross, both of which devel-

"For the most part, Maidstone was the central location of the Irish Roman Catholic community settled there in the early 1800s," Langlois writes. "However, it contained other European extractions as well, such as Dutch, English and Scotch, apparent, for instance, in the naming of the town. In 1833, Joseph Bennett christened the town with the name of Maidstone after his hometown of the same name in England."

The hamlet of Oldcastle also borrowed its name from the United Kingdom, taking the title of a community in County Meath, Ireland. And, like Maidstone, it was a resting station on the Talbot Trail for weary stage coach passengers travelling between Windsor and Leamington.

"However, the most significant factor to Oldcastle's development was the laying of the Lake Erie, Essex, and Detroit River Railway by Hiram Walker in 1888, which became the Pere Marquette Railroad in 1903, and the Chesapeake and Ohio in more recent years," Langlois states.

The railway contributed to the hamlet's development as an important grain shipping depot, a role it continues to play.

ANOTHER COMMON LINK between the hamlets of Maidstone and Oldcastle is in the fact both communities were once the site of toll gates established on the Talbot Road to help pay for its maintenance. The toll gates were eventually burned, as were gates at Essex, reportedly by vandals determined to end the charging of fees for the use of the road.

Transportation was one of many areas in which Crowder has specialized. An interesting tale of stage-coach travel on the county's infamously muddy roads during the 1860s is told.

"When the road was real bad, they sold three different fares," she writes. "First class — one stayed on the coach; second class — when they came to a bad spot, they had to get out and walk; and third class — if they got stuck, they had to help to get out."

One man reported travelling along the Talbot Trail by horse and buggy and finding a man's hat on the road at a particularly muddy spot called Willow Swamp.

"He got out and when he lifted up the hat there was a man's head under it. He was sunk down in the mud. He asked the man where he was going and the man said Windsor. Mr. Wigle invited him to ride with him. The man thanked him and said that he was on horseback."

AN ELECTRIC RAILWAY played a major role in the area after the demise of stage coaches and before 1929, she writes. The line was called the Windsor, Essex and Lake Shore Railway and included several coaches running between Windsor and Leamington every day.

"Maidstone Cross was one of the stops along the way to pick up passengers and mail," Crowder writes.

Incidental facts and anecdotes such as these fill the Tweedsmuir History, a legacy the former legal secretary will leave for generations of grateful historians.

Feed Supplier Takes Over at Windsor Raceway . . .

Taunting from his fellow factory workers played a part in making Dave Curtis of Oldcastle one of the biggest, probably the biggest, independent farm feed and supply outlet in Essex County.

"When I was working in the factory, the fellows used to say, if you farmers think the middleman makes all the money, why don't you do something about it, so I decided to sell my own crops."

Six years ago he began diversifying the Curtis family farming operation that had its beginnings 140 years ago, in the Oldcastle area. Dave started while he was in high school with 75 acres. Now he grows 700 acres of crops for his feed supply on the South Talbot Road just east of Howard Avenue.

Expansion of his business has been rapid. Dave says it had to be because the technology of marketing farm produce is constantly changing.

"As I see it, before long a farmer won't be able to sell his produce at home," Dave claims as he expresses the need to become firmly established while the opportunity is still available.

Each year he has expanded by including equipment in sales, taking the dealership a year and a half ago, for Swifts' products, adding new products like hay cubes, alfalfa pellets, shavings, saw dust and peat moss for bedding, until this year he took over Raceway Cartage,

a \$500,000 sales business supplying feed and bedding for Windsor Raceway.

At 26, Dave must be the youngest independent feed and equipment supplier in the county.

He rents equipment such as chicken pluckers, foggers. He sells, besides feed for all farm animals including dogs, started pullets, newly hatched geese, ducks, chickens, guineas and turkeys, medicinal supplies, brooders, rabbit pens, live animal traps, feeders, nipple feeding systems, even garden sized greenhouses.

Dave will mix feed to a customer's requirements, or as the veterinarian prescribes. In addition he began retailing Swifts feeds in 1977.

"We have Tizwhiz, a popular type of horse feed. And we make any feed as a customer wants it. Or if their vet wants certain vitamins added, we do it."

Dave says he aims to please, or as his T-shirts say, "We try harder."

"We are very customer conscious," he says. "Our friends are our customers."

He'll even give the shirt off his back, he joked. He will give 100 free t-shirts, 100 free hats, and every 10th customer will receive a door prize to celebrate the opening this month of Raceway Feeds. He has a regular free draw for a vacation in Florida for his customers.

"Things like that take the tension out of life," Dave says.

Dave knows all about tension from the days when he started farming while in high school and worked part time as well.

"To get my start I worked thirty-two hours a week on the night shift in a foundry," he explained.

Takeover of the Windsor raceway feed supply business is part of his continued expansion; his riskiest move since he left his factory job.

"It's something like diving into a swimming pool and not knowing how deep it is," he commented. He will expand that business to a full year, rather than 6 months of track service as it has been.

Dave is trying to make his business Canadian and within Essex County as much as possible because as a farmer he is aware of the farmer's price problems in competition with imports.

The three-inch hay cubes, in demand at the raceway in particular, are now made in Ontario so he'll be selling those. His hay is graded time of cutting.

Dave says he's the only retailer in the county selling Hinoat, a variety of oats exceptionally high in protein, 25% higher than most varieties. He grows them to have a high-quality feed, although the yield per acre is lower for Hinoat. The variety is a specialty oat developed for livestock food by the research branch of the ministry of agriculture.

He employs three men and expects them to offer the same customer service on which he is building his business. To help his customers, he has information sheets and government fact sheets on their interests, whether it is raising poultry or feeding race horses.

"If the customer doesn't come back you just go under, so right down the line we have to have quality and give service," Dave says.

In his search for quality, Dave realized the open wooden bins weren't adequate either for cleanliness or for best condition of the grain. Now it is stored in steel bins where the environment is regulated for correct temperature and amount of humidity. So each year has seen construction of new barns or installation of storage bins.

Mrs. Curtis deserves most of the credit for his success, he says.

"Without her I wouldn't be able to run this place. She is fifty per cent partner. She does the bookkeeping and takes care of customers."

Membership in farm organizations is important for farmers in Dave's experience as a farmer. He is a member of the board of the Essex County Soybean Growers, treasurer of the Essex County Federation of Agriculture and has worked with the local Farm Safety Association.

David Curtis, son of Ronald & Mary Martha (Heaton) Curtis, and grandson of Melvin and Ella (Ellis) Curtis, pioneers of Sandwich South Township. Dave purchased the pioneer farm of Elmar and Mabel (Pettipiece) O'Neil located on the South Talbot Road.

\$100,000 blaze destroys barn, hay and straw bales

A stubborn barn fire caused an estimated \$100,000 damage in Sandwich South Township Monday, and kept volunteer firemen busy for 12 hours.

The blaze, touched off by a back-firing truck, destroyed a huge barn and 18,000 bales of hay and straw.

Dave Curtis, of Curtis Farm and Feed Ltd., South Talbot Road, said the fire destroyed his entire inventory of hay and straw, which he sells mostly to area racetracks. Curtis, 28, said he believes it was the first fire ever in the 175-year farming history of his family.

The blaze apparently started at about 8:30 a.m. Monday when two farm employees said a 1969 International Harvester stake truck caught fire after being started inside the barn. The flames quickly ignited the thousands of bales of dry hay and straw and soon engulfed the entire barn.

Only 3 years old

The three-year-old structure was in flames when volunteers from both the Sandwich South and Sandwich West fire departments arrived. All 25 members of the Sandwich South volunteer force showed up during the day, said Fire Chief Frank Nostadt. Some of them were there for the 12 hours it

took to finally douse the fire. Although the height of the fire was during the first two to three hours, Chief Nostadt said, firemen remained on the scene dumping an estimated 60,000 litres (about 15,000 gallons) of water on the hay. Small pockets of smoke and flame erupted periodically during the day as the fire worked its way into the huge piles of hay.

"We were afraid the wind might change overnight," said Chief Nostadt. "We didn't want to leave it burning in case of a wind change. You can pour water on straw until you're blue in the face. The fire just seeps down into the stuff and flares up again."

Wind worrisome

Curtis said he was concerned the strong southerly winds might swing around and spread the fire to the adjoining buildings, including his family home and a cattle barn.

Only the charred south wall of the huge barn was left. Curtis said the barn had measured 21 metres (68 feet) wide, 37 metres (120 feet) long, and seven metres (22 feet) high. When full, it held 26,000 bales of hay and straw, he said.

Workers were successful in getting a baling machine out of the barn before it was damaged, but the stake truck was destroyed.

Curtis was hauling a shipment of hay

to Windsor Raceway, one of his many customers, when the fire erupted. He also sells straw, hay, germ oil, peat moss and other products to several Michigan racetracks.

"This (fire) basically set me back in terms of the inconvenience it was cause," said Curtis. "It's all insured, but I'll have to buy my straw and hay from West Lorne (west of London) to keep my contracts."

Losses at \$100,000

He estimated the wholesale value of the loss of the barn and contents will be approximately \$55,000, but retail value will put that figure over \$100,000.

The effects of the fire could be felt as late as spring, Curtis said, because thousands of gallons of water dumped on the fire could destroy an adjacent alfalfa field.

Curtis, a father of four, is a member of the provincial committee of the Ontario Wheat Board.

Recently, Curtis and five other hay and straw producers in Ontario, who call themselves "the Hayshakers," met in Guelph to discuss enlarging the Ontario hay and straw industry.

Curtis said the six major producers in Ontario supply 15 per cent of the province's needs and Ontario-grown hay and straw are highly regarded in U.S. markets.

Producers are madder than 'wet hens' over quota

Several Essex area chicken producers have been warned by Government inspectors that legal action may be taken against them if they continue raising chickens without a quota.

Last Friday at the home of Dave Curtis in Oldcastle, a gathering of "illegal" chicken producers grouped to discuss the effects of not owning a quota.

Regulations were passed in 1973 and only now are the producers without quotas in Essex County becoming aware that it exists. The regulation states only broiler chicken producers on the quota system can market their birds.

"The way things stand now that if a farmer raises 20 chickens without a quota he is doing so illegally. The farmer can get busted for selling a chicken and the consumer can also

face charges for buying it," claimed Dave Curtis.

The producers wished to remain anonymous since this is relatively new to them. None of the farmers present was on the quota system.

The general feeling was the large producers with quota systems would not be able to accommodate the specialty markets or the various ethnic groups. Essex area producers felt that if the law takes effect chickens would be mass produced and the general attitude would be, "take it or leave it".

"It seems the big only get bigger. As prices stand now it costs \$35 per hen for a laying quota. It's already been established, the big guys got it," claimed one producer. He also felt that if his son wanted to get into the business, he wouldn't be able to afford it.

The general concensus was to get some things back to the old way; the basis of a free country is diminishing rapidly.

"A farmer or anyone for that matter has the right to sell his produce on the market. Isn't it part of our new Constitutional right that we fought to have brought to Canada?" queried a hatchery producer.

A man from the north-eastern region of Essex has built a \$20,000 processing plant. Approximately 2,000 chickens go through his plant annually, although he is involved mainly in ducks and geese. The facility had to meet certain requirements: a processing room, a separate room for eviscerating, a washroom, employees' lunch room and an office. There are only four people working at the plant - his family.

Anything that is to go on the

market must be Government inspected, even if five ducks are being processed. The closest inspector is located in Windsor. If he is occupied at another location a man must come up from London. "A lot of tax payers' money is involved when the inspector has to drive all the way over, no matter how many birds I do," said the producer.

Some of the producers felt that if a Government inspector came to their farms and threatened legal action for producing 'bootleg' chickens, many farmers would prefer to get rid of the birds rather than worry about the expenses of court.

Dave Curtis' family has been involved in the chicken business for five generations. He has been selling chicks without a quota since 1973. He stated, "I'm not going to stop now."

Amherstburg soup kitchen

A soup kitchen operated by Christ Church, Amherstburg, for the last three years each Sunday in Lent after the 10:30 a.m. Service is the focus of the concept of a fully shared ministry within the traditional parish structure.

With a restructured administration the parish has found it possible to clarify and staff its pastoral priorities so as to achieve a maximum effect on each of its chosen tasks, and has been able to increase the involvement of the membership to a significant degree.

The Lenten program takes the Ten Days for World Development theme and each Sunday is directed to the use of the resources provided by the National Church program for instruction in the 10:30 a.m. service. The soup kitchen encourages self-denial by the sharing of a simple lunch of homemade soup and bread with beverage, the proceeds of which go to the P.W.R.D.F.

In addition, a Thin-a-Thon encourages participants to lose weight, while sponsors pay an agreed amount per pound to the Primate's World Relief.

Arising from the congregation's concern for others, the full financial sponsorship of a refugee Vietnamese family of three was assumed last Fall, together with numerous sponsorships of government-aided refugee "boat people" families, with the attendant moral and educational support necessary for their integration into Canadian society. This has been a richly satisfying experience and a member of one Laotian family will address the congregation on March 23 as part of the Lenten program.

Lay assistance in the services of the Church is another aspect of the shared ministry principle which is enhanced by a two octave Handbell team in addition to the choir.

Blaze has him puzzled

Dave Curtis was shaking his head, wondering why anyone would want to set fire to his barn — the latest in a series of incidents he feels are deliberately aimed at him and his family.

Flames engulfed the barn and threatened other buildings at his South Talbot Road farm, just south of Windsor, about 3 a.m. Wednesday. And there's no doubt the fire was deliberately set, according to Curtis.

The Essex OPP detachment is investigating the blaze.

The fire was the second setback within hours for the 31-year-old Curtis. Earlier in the evening he lost a bid to become the Progressive Conservative candidate in the federal Essex-Windsor riding.

"IT COULD HAVE been personal or it could have been politics. I don't know," Curtis said Wednesday. "But I have a hard time believing this fire started on its own."

"And, if it was deliberately started, they did an exceptionally good job of trying to cripple us."

Curtis said his ardent anti-abortion and pro-free enterprise political views may be the reason behind the fire.

He claimed this is not the first attempt to sabotage operations at the farm where he also runs a feed and seed business. He said mud and stones were poured into the oil intakes of three farm tractors last month and three weeks ago two diesel engines were destroyed after sugar was poured into gasoline tanks.

Curtis said he hasn't had a chance to calculate the damage from the fire, but said the losses would be high.

"WITH THESE OTHER five incidents, it's enough to substantially hurt us," he said. "I've got some insurance, but it doesn't cover anything we lost last night."

Curtis said his family and employees were away from the farm most of Tuesday night at the nomination meeting in Essex. He said everything appeared normal when they returned home shortly before midnight.

Curtis said the fire was spotted by employee, Tim Gray, who lives in a room above an equipment shed. Gray called over to the house to alert Curtis and his wife, Francine.

"At first I thought it was a dream," said Curtis. "I just couldn't believe what was happening."

By the time Curtis was up and dressed, the barn was already engulfed in flames. The fire had also spread to the roof of their home and there was another fire burning at a nearby shed where much of his livestock feed was stored.

The Curtis children, aged 11, nine, eight and seven, were evacuated safely, he said.

SIX HORSES AND two head of cattle were probably in a pasture adjacent to the barn when the fire broke out and were not injured, said Curtis. But he did lose all his poultry, including chickens, turkeys and ducks, as well as large quantities of feed grain, hay and straw.

The roof of the house was damaged. There was minor damage to the shed but the fire did spread to some of the feed.

"I'm working seven days a week now," said Curtis, who also works at the General Motors of Canada Ltd.'s Transmission Plant in Windsor. "There just isn't enough time for me to work any more to recover this loss."

Ontario Hay Association chooses county grower as president

"Hay is the largest market in Ontario," stated Dave Curtis of Oldcastle, newly elected president of the Ontario Hay Association. He backed up his statement with the fact that last year up to seven million dollars worth of hay was exported from Canada.

Members of the Ontario association may also become members of the National Hay Association, which takes in not only Canada, but the United States and England, he advised.

However, he voiced concern that the Ontario Association must make the public aware of not only its existence, but of its importance as a segment of the Canadian agricultural community.

"We must make the community aware that this association exists," he told 60 persons attending the annual meeting of the provincial association. Of the 60, 32 were members of the Ontario Hay Association.

Curtis traced the development of the organization back half a year ago to September 10, 1983, when producers realized the necessity of forming a group in which each member shared a common interest. He told of the founding of the National Association in 1901, and of its growth to 312 members.

Better care needed

"If hay is to become an even more important part of the agricultural process in Canada, better care must be taken of the soil," warned Dr. Ann Clark, a soils and crops specialist at the University of Guelph. "The economic loss, due to soil erosion in Ontario is \$74 million. Haldimand County (north-east of Tillsonburg) has lost one-third of its top soil in just 30 years of cultivation. What took over 10,000 years to develop from the glacial ages, was erased by one third in only 30 years in Haldi-

of using forages such as alfalfa and clover as cover crops. "The forage will cover the soil year round, and is an excellent deterrent for weeds. It can drastically reduce the problems of compaction and crusting. Few people realize the extent of compaction power of rain drops hitting directly on the unprotected land. In the long run, rain can cause compaction.

Dr. Clark feels that the deep roots from alfalfa pull new nutrients up to the top soil. "Find an economic use for the forage. It can be cut and sold as hay, or the seeds from the clover can be sold. The farmers that need the benefit of forage do not take the opportunity to use it. With the use of forages some nitrogen is being returned to the soil, but (Continued on page 18)

Hay largest cash crop in Ontario

Forage Information Day held in Tilbury

"Hay represents the largest cash crop in Ontario. Highest prices are paid for straight alfalfa hay or alfalfa hay mixed with timothy. In the fancy grade markets a good bale of hay can sell for \$2.00 to \$3.50," Dave Curtis, operation's manager for the Ontario Hay Association. Curtis spoke to approximately 75 farmers from Essex and Kent counties at a Forage Information Day in Tilbury.

Top quality alfalfa hay can be sold anywhere in the world, where there is a demand. The alfalfa must have an excellent green color and good texture. There are many hay deficient areas that it can be exported to. Last year Canada exported between \$4 million and \$7 million worth of hay. The

United States exported more than \$99 million, proclaimed Curtis.

The operation's manager felt that Ontario should have a co-operative marketing system and situate representatives in hay-deficient parts of the United States. They could establish contacts and direct the hay produced in Ontario to the customers.

Frank Anthony owns 4,000 acres of cash crops in the Acton area. He could not attend the meeting, but Henry Olechowski worked closely with Anthony and explained about marketing methods of hay. Olechowski is connected with the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food in Ridgeway.

When marketing hay locally, the seller must

have a direct broker. Any type of hay can be sold: square bales, round bales, stooks, standing hay. Frank Anthony has established a good reputation, as he exports hay to the central United States, Florida, the Caribbean and Europe. The United States prefers alfalfa or a timothy-alfalfa mix. The hay can be sold up until the half-blossom stage, and the bales should weigh between 60 and 65 pounds. In Ontario the farmers prefer early alfalfa for its nutritional value. Overseas, only the top standard of hay is acceptable. It is sold by weight rather than by the bale. Run a credit check before shipping any hay, warned the speaker. Shipping is the most expensive part of the operation. Always deliver what was agreed upon, if the buyer wants top quality - sell him top quality, advised Olechowski.

"When selling abroad use a reputable broker and mail an invoice as soon as the hay has been received. The buyers want 100% top quality green hay, because when they don't grow hay they expect only the best. The producer must establish himself and find his own market," stated Olechowski.

Jim Shaw owns 1,400 acres and cash cropped around the Ridgeway area. He planted an alfalfa hay crop in 1978. The following spring he sowed 10 pounds of alfalfa per acre. "Drying conditions are not favourable along Lake Erie and I made two mistakes; One, you cannot store hay outside for three months and expect it to be in excellent condition. Although I had the hay covered in tarps it was not good enough. Two, the unpredictability of the weather. Always remember that

the bales that sell for \$2.00 to \$2.50 each are number one top quality prime hay, and that is only a small percentage of the hay you have. I failed to realize that the entire crop wouldn't turn out as No. 1 quality," he said a bit ruefully.

"Who says we have to put hay through horses and cows? I would like

to see more research done. The animals only convert the hay into a 10% nutritional value. Why can't we extract the proteins and send them to places where they are nutritionally deficient? The farmer can produce one ton of alfalfa protein per acre, but what can you get with 60 bushels of soybeans?" asked Shaw.

Hay Association seeks support

Hay is Ontario's largest single crop at 2.5 million acres

Billed as the largest single cash crop in Ontario, hay is the target of concerted efforts on the part of the Ontario Hay Association for more support from the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food (OMAF) -- support which association president Dave Curtis of R.R.1, Oldcastle said is being offered other provinces' hay producers by their provincial agriculture ministries.

Curtis made the comments in an interview prior to the association's annual meeting in Windsor Saturday afternoon, March 30th. Only about six per cent of the province's 2.5 million acre hay crop is produced in the Southwestern Ontario counties of Kent, Essex, Huron, Lambton, Middlesex, Elgin and Oxford, according to the most recent OMAF statistics.

Curtis said the Prince Edward Island hay producers have two compactors for their 30 members -- one is 100 per cent funded by the province while the other is 20 per cent funded. Nova Scotia's 11 members have one compactor, 50 per cent funded by that province's ministry of agriculture and food. At present, Curtis said there is no input producers can see from OMAF.

"This is disheartening to members when you consider that hay is Ontario's single largest crop, with approximately 2.5 million acres in hay. When you consider hay is the largest single crop and Ontario is

leading all other provinces in farm bankruptcies and, with our high land taxes, heavy mortgage type debts on these lands, you think that type of acreage and that type of responsibility would be looked at in a serious manner by this province.

"To date, to producers, it's disheartening to even consider supporting something like the Ontario Hay Association when the province doesn't appear to be overly interested in working with it."

He said, to his way of thinking, when looking at 2.5 million acres of hay, it's "extreme negligence" to let producers sit at \$4-7 million in annual exports throughout Canada, while British Columbia is importing over \$10 million in hay from the United States. He said the U.S. and hay surplus areas are shipping out about \$99 million in hay and straw every year in exports.

Curtis said there's a lot of opportunity for growth in the Eastern seaboard of the U.S. and in the Southern states where there are large hay deficient areas Ontario hay producers can service. He said Ontario has a cost advantage over freight rates from Prince Edward Island.

"We have the opportunity available to us but the farmers are so short on operating capital because of nothing being done in this largest crop in Ontario that we need financial assistance similar to what Prince Edward

Island has -- 100 per cent funding on one machine, 20 per cent on another."

In addition to the funding, the producers have access to the province's computer terminal for inventory printouts and the province's ministry of agriculture assists in their office expenses and helps the producers conduct their office.

The Ontario producers have asked for this assistance, as well as a provincially funded marketing sales representative in the southern region of the U.S. to assist in developing markets there, but Curtis indicated such assistance was not coming from OMAF.

Curtis said he stopped growing field corn about six years ago because he didn't feel it was economically feasible.

He said he found it cheaper to buy it and run it through his corn cracker and sell it in wild bird seed and other ways. He said his land is valued at about \$4,000 an acre.

Looking on soybean production, especially on marginal land, Curtis said it doesn't make sense to grow 20 bushels of soybeans per acre at seven dollars a bushel when input costs are higher than that. He said, on marginal land, he needs \$10 a bushel. "There needs to be something, whether its parity pricing for agricultural incomes, which is being discussed most avidly in this community, or we have to have a realistic outlook."

"Now, we've grown soybeans on our own land since the 1940's. As

of this year, my own family farm is not growing any soybeans."

He said neither corn nor soybeans are profitable and the most responsible thing to do is stop doing it. "Hay is definitely, in our operation, the only thing which consistently makes money."

In the U.S., which is a large market, included are operators of standardbred and thoroughbred horse farms, as well as dairy, geese, cattle, goats, rabbits, chinchillas and sheep operations. Testing for extracting chlorophyll protein out of alfalfa is underway and there are conservation benefits to growing hay.

Hubert McGill, policy advisor, technology and field services, OMAF,

said the Ontario association is having some problems in getting organized in that its membership is limited in geography and numbers.

He said, as far as many producers are concerned, hay is not their major crop. A lot of producers produce most of their crop for their own use to feed their own livestock and have some surplus for sale, "but selling hay is not the major enterprise on many Ontario farms." This is one of the reasons why it is difficult for the association to interest large numbers of people. He added this is one of the reasons why they have had trouble organizing to the point where they can represent a broad range of hay producers across the province.

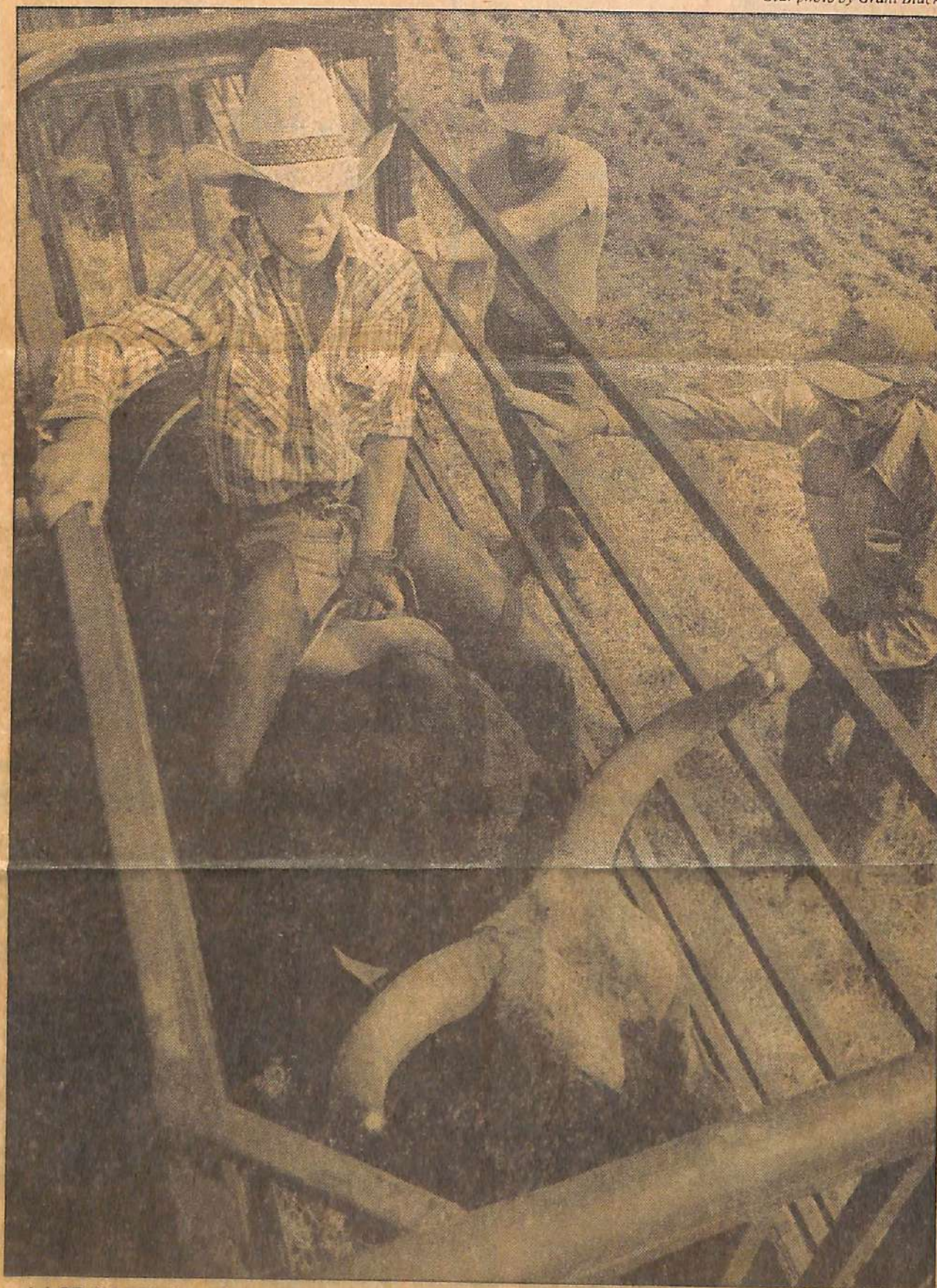

Cabin Endures Time

80-Year-Old Recalls Days of Pioneers

By BILL SHIELDS

OLDCASTLE—The area surrounding this tiny Essex County hamlet is not only rich today in modern agricultural development — but boasts a long historical background of pioneer families who worked to clear the swamp and bush lands.

Few of the pioneer homes remain in the district having been replaced by up-to-date structures which display the success of farming in this section of the county.

One of the oldest residents in the area is 80-year-old Jim Curtis, who was born and raised in this section of Sandwich South Township. Not only does Mr. Curtis still have fond recollections of the early days, he is one of the few residents of the area to be born in a pioneer log cabin.

Fit and able, Mr. Curtis still resides on the homestead his parents purchased approximately 100 years ago. Still on the Curtis farm, located on Con. 6 is the log cabin in which the family first resided until their son was 14 years old.

While the exterior has been

covered and the building converted to a storage shed, the interior is an example of the work which was required to construct such a building. The axe-hewed oak logs assembled row upon row have survived the elements for approximately 125 years.

Mr. Curtis recalls he was the youngest of three children in the family and he and his two sisters were born in the log cabin. The family later constructed the house in which Mr. Curtis and his wife reside today.

"The log cabin was there before Mother and Dad purchased the farm," Mr. Curtis recalls. Noting he is now 80, the Sandwich South farmer said the cabin provided a comfortable home for the family which was one of the pioneers in the area.

While the exact date of construction is not known, the cabin is believed to be one of the first constructed in this section of the township.

History records show the house was likely built about 125 years ago when the now flat and cultivated farm lands were covered with swamps and forests. The trees used

to construct the one-storey structure were cleared from the bush which was later converted to farm land.

Mr. Curtis said a family by the name of Merrick first settled on the property and constructed the house. It was after this his family purchased the farm and raised a family of three.

"All three children were born in the cabin as there were no hospitals in those days," Mr. Curtis said. His two older sisters have died and he is the only survivor of the family.

Recalling the design of the cabin, Mr. Curtis said it consisted of three bedrooms, living room, kitchen, pantry and a large hallway. The structure survived the cold winter nights with a wood stove heating system.

Despite the building's age its instructure is still sound and provides shelter for modern farm machinery. Now in semi-retirement, Mr. Curtis has fond memories of the days when he was a boy on the pioneer farm and the time he spent with his family in the cabin.

CYR

Ray Cyr Gets His Catch

Ray Cyr may look and talk like any other executive but a visit to his office or home reveals a different breed of person.

For his office in Maidstone, Ont. near Windsor, or at this home to the south of Lake Erie, Cyr can stand by the old proverbial saying that "two heads are better than one". It is at these locations that Cyr has mounted "trophies" from his hunting expeditions, trips that have taken him around the world.

One of his normal trips takes anywhere from six days to six weeks and involves travelling through very rugged country. Temperatures

have ranged from -50 F. to more than 100 F.

"Seeing countries like this is far better than any trips that a normal tourist takes. You live with the people, spend all your time with them and in fact, become one of them in a sense," said Cyr.

LANGUAGE PROBLEM

"Sometimes the language is a problem but in those cases, we make a lot of signs between each other," said Cyr.

The 57-year-old president of R.J. Cyr Company Ltd. has hunted all his life; although his first "safari"

was in 1958. He has successfully hunted more than 70 species of animals.

"The toughest animal I ever caught was a Rhodesian Kudu on my trip to Africa in 1976. We walked from sunrise to sunset for nine days just tracking this animal. We only saw him once during those days.

"Finally we caught up with him. At that point, he wasn't hard to kill. He had stopped on the side of a hill to watch three giraffes go by," he said.

During that trip, Cyr spent three weeks in Rhodesia followed by another 21 days in Kenya.

Other trips have taken him to the western Arctic, Asia, South American, Mexico, Indonesia and British Columbia.

"People always say that Africa is the best place in the world to hunt big game," said Cyr. "From my experience, I'd say British Columbia ranks a close second. There are so many different animals in the Rocky Mountains. The Variety of animals is unbelievable," he said.

One terrifying experience stand out in Cyr's mind when he starts discussing his treks through British Columbia — being charged by three grizzly bears.

"I thought there was only one of them. But after I shot the first bear, I found three more. One of them was charging and moving fast. He was only 20 feet away when I finally shot him," he said.

TREASURED CATCH

One of Cyr's treasured catches from the British Columbia trip is still with him — in the living form of a five-year-old mountain cougar. His name is Cimba and although he is caged, he does pose a menacing figure to any would-be trespasser on Cyr's property on Lake Erie. Cyr brought Cimba back when the cougar was only 10 days old. In addition to this large members of the cat family, Cyr has four deer,

"It's all strictly a hobby with me. I really enjoy hunting but I'd never do it for a business," said Cyr.
