# Wiring Fault Seen Cause Of Outbreak

Noise In Attic Alerts Youth To Raging Blaze

Despite the efforts of both Tecumseh and Riverside fire departments and the aid of local farmers the home of Charles Dame on Highway 2 at Lesperance Rd. was destroyed by fire Saturday.

During the four-hour attempt to quell the flames the firemen were supplied with water by local farmers with tank trucks.

Three local wells were dry after the farmers had transported an estimated 10,000 gallons of water to the scene of the fire.

Neither Mr. Dame nor his wife and five children were injured in the blaze which started shortly before 11 a.m. Saturday in the empty attic of the house.

Most of the furniture from the house was salvaged by Mr. Dame with the help of neighbors.

While firemen fought the flames a large crowd of local residents stood among the house furnishings watching the flames devour the house under the helping hand of a strong wind.

By 2:30 p.m. the fire was nearly out, but only a charred superstructure of beams remained of the white, two-story, wooden building.

The Dame family were being cared for by a neighbor over the weekend. The house — whose value is estimated at \$8,000—was insured for \$5,000.

"We were talking in the kitchen when we heard a crackling sound from upstairs," said Mr. Dame's 17-year-old son, Lawrence.

"I went upstairs and heard sound like hail falling on the roof. I thought it was that, and I was just about to go downstairs again when flames shot out from under a beam.

"My uncle, Reggie, was sleeping in a nearby bedroom so I shouted at him to get up and

Mrs. Alice Dame and her other children, Isabel, 15, Donald, seven, Jimmie, five, and Pamela, four, quickly fled to safety. Mr. Dame who rushed over from his nearby blacksmith's, called Tecumseh Fire Department.

Mr. Dame and neighbors then emptied the house of as much furniture as possible.

# Mr. Dame the Smith--a Mighty Man is He

Even if the spreading chest-nut tree is holding its own against the expanding age of technology, the village smithy has lost a lot of ground. The one time bustling trade of shoeing horses is becoming a lost

Farriery was once the main

source of income for most blacksmiths but now, in this area, there is only one man fully equipped and actively engaged in the business, Charles

The Dame blacksmith shop, at Lesperance Rd. and Highway 2, is much the same as when it was built nearly 50 years ago. There is no spreading chestnut tree but a step inside the door carries you back to the days when the horse was king.

The anvil still rings out rhyth-mically and the forge blows a cherry red. The forced draft is created with an electric motor, however, instead of the hand bellows. The supporting timbers inside the wooden building show the teeth marks of the countless numbers of horses that have been shod there.

The business was started by Frank Dame and his son Charles learned the trade by watching his father work. "In those days there was no hydro in the building and I had to

hold the lantern. After a few years of that I could do the work myself," Mr. Dame said.

Mr. Dame believes he is the only farrier operating a shop in Essex County. The traffic, however, has dropped to about 1,000 horses per year. "It is a rare occasion now when I shoe a work horse. They are all

pleasure horses now," he stated.

Farriery is no longer a selfsustaining trade and Mr. Dame supplements his income repairing farm machinery. The pleasure horses are more difficult to shoe than the work horse. The wall of the hoof, into which the nail must be driven, is thinner on the lighter animals.


Mr. Dame has three sons but only one, 11-year-old Jim, has shown an interest in the blacksmith shop. "I'm not eager to have him enter a dying trade," Mr. Dame said.

The future of the shop after Mr. Dame retires is uncertain but, for the present, there is still this romantic link with the past.





# Sports enthusiast 1968 Frank Dayus dies

Frank E. Dayus, 76, former Windsor alderman (1930-1938) and founder of Dayus Roofing Ltd., died Sunday in Hotel Dieu after a long illness.

He was a leading sports enthusiast with special interests in softball and stock car racing. Dayus Stadium, among the first of its kind in this area, was named for him. The stadium was the home of the Windsor Jets, a fastball team. For his interest in youth and in sports, Mr. Dayus was awarded the MicMac Hall of Fame Award in 1961.

Funeral will be Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. from the Walter D. Kelly Funeral Home, 1969 Wyandotte St. E. with Rev. Herbert W. Hyland officiating. Burial, Victoria Memorial Cemetery. A Masonic service will be held tonight at 7:30 by members of Palace Lodge No. 604, of which Mr. Dayus was a member.

Mr. Dayus, during his council service, was acting mayor on several occasions. In 1940, he was an unsuccessful candidate for mayor.

A native of Dillon, Col., Mr. Dayus formerly lived in Charing Cross, Blenheim, Stratford and Hamilton. He resided in Windsor for 49 years, in later years at 3905 Riverside Dr. E.

He was active in community welfare activities. His first job in Windsor was with Ford of Canada. In 1920, he started in the roofing business. After retirement in 1956, he continued his interest in civic affairs, youth activities and sports. He sponsored several teams in the Ontario Amateur Softball Association and eas on the organization's executive.



Two Essex County males were among the 53 persons who died accidently in Canada during the weekend.

A Harrow man was killed Sunday when he lost control of his car on County Road 11 and smashed into a bridge abutment just north of County Road 12 and a Maidstone teen-ager died when his motorcycle collided with a car on Walker Road just north of Highway 3.

Thomas Barton, of RR 3, Harrow, was prono unced dead on arrival at Metropolitan Hospital, according to the OPP Essex detachment.

An OPP spokesman said the Barton vehicle was travelling north on County Road 11 when it apparently left the road and hit the bridge abutment.

A motorist spotted the car in a ditch and notified police. Time of the accident was estimated at between one and

Mr. Barton was alone in his late-model vehicle at the time of the accident. The OPP is conducting an

Joseph Deehan, 16, of RR 1, Maidstone, died early Saturday when the motorcycle he was riding was in collision with a car driven by Norman Allan, 17, of Cottam.

OPP said the motorcyclist fell into the centre of the road, where he was struck several minutes later by a passing motorist. According to the OPP, this motorist stopped, looked at the body, and drove on.

While several witnesses saw the second occurrence and have a description of the car and driver, the OPP are asking, the driver to come to the station voluntarily, not for prosecution purposes but for making out a report.

The traffic deaths bring the unofficial number of persons . killed on Canadian roads this year to 1,219.

A survey by the Canadian Press from 6 p.m. Friday to midnight Sunday showed 44 traffic deaths, five drownings, one fire death, one carbon monoxide poisoning, one electrocution and a man who died when pinned under a vehicle he was repairing.

Quebec led the death toll with 18 traffic fatalities and two drowinings.

In Ontario 11 people died on the roads, two men drowned while fishing and a man was electrocuted when a flag pole he was attempting to raise fell across hydro lines.

There were six road fatalities in British Columbia. Alberta had three road deaths, the carbon monoxide poisoning and the man who died when pinned under the

Nova Scotia had two traffic deaths, including a man who died when his car collided with a moose. New Brunswick also had two traffic fatalities.

In Manitoba one person drowned and another died in a road accident. Another person died in a traffic accident in Saskatchewan while in Prince Edward Island one person

There were no accidental deaths in Newfoundland. The CP survey excludes industrial deaths, slayings and known suicides.

# Her anger lingers long after break-in

Time has dulled the worst of it for Lorna Brouillette, but the 75-year-old woman's teeth are still set on edge every time she opens a drawer.

Her modest west-end home was ransacked by thieves Nov. 21 while she was out shopping for groceries at a nearby supermarket on senior citizens' discount day. The incident left her hurt and angry but vowing that she won't change her lifestyle.

"It was an awful feeling, but I'm all right," she said this week. "You feel funny. No one really knows what it's like until that's done to them. I mean, they went into everything - you'd be surprised. They even went into my records and pulled the albums out."

"THEY DID IT all in such a short time. . . they just go like the speed of

She was only gone for about 45 minutes that morning, returning home to a devastating violation of her privacy. The thieves had apparently pulled a car around to her back door, and, sheltered from view from the street, stole a television set, antenna rotor, jewelry and a prized \$400 clock.

In the process, they pulled clothing from closets and drawers, spread the contents of cupboards over the floor, bed and countertops and ran their hands over possessions. It was, she said later that day, painful and humil-

Mrs. Brouillette is still shaking her head over her actions when she discovered the break-in.

"DIDN'T I DO a stupid thing, though?" she said. "Instead of running to the neighbor and asking her to phone, I walked right in. That was a crazy thing to do. I'm just so thankful they weren't still in the house. I wasn't thinking that they might be in here

"At least I didn't come into contact

Just the knowledge that such people exist is enough to make her wary of going outside even in broad daylight, let alone at night.

It's awful, she said, when you think about it.

The number of break-ins at Windsor homes and shops continues to climb, according to the latest statistics presented to the Windsor Police Commission Tuesday. From January to November of this year there have been 3,120 burglaries or attempts, up 18.3 per cent from the 2,636 break-ins reported for the same period last

"YOU WORK like hell all your life to accumulate a little bit to enjoy your old age and it comes to this," she said. "My girlfriend lives in an apartment on Ouellette and she tells me not to worry about moving. She said hardly a day goes by that someone doesn't steal someone's purse. They knock on the door, push it open and go right into the bedroom.

"It's gotten so she won't open her door to anyone unless she knows who

His knack for taking on challenges helped him make his dream a reality and in June 1999 Zephyrus Orchids was born.

Setting up a lab in a spare bedroom, Doherty began doing contract lab work from his home. Last fall he set up a greenhouse beside the Bloomin' Gardener in Oldcastle.

Doherty speaks about the never-ending desire he had to start his own business.

'I wanted to work somewhere where I could make those decisions as far as what to grow and who to sell them to," he says.

Armed with a degree in plant bio-technology from the University of Guelph, Doherty headed off to work at an orchid greenhouse in Hawaii.

Then he worked at a local greenhouse in Essex County and eventually became a manager for a 50,000-square-foot facility in British Co-

He currently juggles a job at Jamieson Laboratories along with taking care of business at Zephyrus Orchids.

Although he could have continued to work for other growers, Doherty could not quell his desire to be his own boss.

"In Canada we are relatively large, but there are larger facilities in California and Florida," he says of Zephyrus. "In order to stay competitive with them, we needed some kind

Wanting to grow the ultimate orchid, Doherty poured about \$190,000 into the facility and worked on perfecting the climate conditions in the greenhouse so his plants could blossom.

"The plants get better water than I do at home," he says.

His mother Marsha speaks of her son's passion, which blossomed at an early age.

"Out for a walk...he would see something nobody else would. He'd see a flower hiding beneath some leaves. He had a keen eye for noticing things."

She says her son has always had only one goal in sight.

"He has been very focused," she says. "This is what he wanted to do. He wanted to have a greenhouse and he wanted to grow orchids."

Lise Levesque, a co-worker at Jamieson Laboratories, agrees Doherty is a determined

"He's not afraid to tackle things," says Levesque, who nominated him for the award.

She says Doherty has succeeded in tapping into a market that wasn't well served in Windsor. With many orchid lovers out there, it's only a matter of time before they flock to Zephyrus Orchids.

"He's also got a lot of perseverance because these plants don't grow overnight," she says. "This is something you really have to dedicate yourself to from beginning to end."

And the toughest challenge Doherty has faced is waiting to see his fruits of labour. Since orchids are a long-season crop, he's

had to wait 12 months to see a finished product.

"That's a long time to go without having products for sale," he says.

But waiting is part of the game for Doherty. Winners of the Business Excellence Awards will be announced at a gala on Feb. 7 at the Cleary International Centre. Also in the running for the young entrepreneur award are Aaron Edwards of the Victoria Tavern and Claudia Kalaydjian of Elmara Flower Kitchen and Garden Center.

V.O.N. Symbol of Hope Trim Nurses Have Vital Role

Norma Louise Drefko can't walk. She hasn't been able to since Sept. 20, when the greater part of her 4-year-old world was wiped out.

She was in a truck with her father, two sisters, and two other persons on that day, when the truck was struck by a train.

Norma was the only one who came out alive-and she came out in a state of deep shock, with a fractured leg and ankle.

Now Norma is home from the nospital, her leg finally freed from its cast.

She chatters animatedly to her mother, Mary, but is still shy with strangers.

But there is one other person the comes to the house three imes a week, whom Norma trusts and loves. That is attractive, 23ear-old Miss Mary Kempster. Without Miss Kempster, life would be much less cheerful for Norma and Mrs. Drefko.

Mary Kempster is a member of the Victorian Order of Nurses.

"I don't know what I'd do without her," said Mrs. Drefko, who is expecting another child in May. "I never knew what the V.O.N. was like till this happened.'

Three times a week, Miss Kempster's small light blue car draws up in front of the neat, pink-painted Drefko cottage on R.R. 3, Maidstone.

Her regular routine is to bathe Norma, dress her, and - now that her leg is out of the castgive it a strengthening massage.

And strength is returning to the injured limb, though slowly. An attempt to make Norma crawl on the floor - again for strengthening purposes - only made the child scream last week; but Miss Kempster says there is definite progress. In fact, she is sure that the leg will mend perfectly.

Doing the work that Norma's mother cannot do sounds like a full day's work in itself. But the Leamington-born nurse averages 10 calls a day.

She cares for other children,

and for elderly people as well bathing, dressing, administering hypodermics, in general performing all the nursing duties that can be done in the home.

She is well prepared for her work. A registered nurse, she also studied at the School of Nursing of the University of Toronto.

Mary Kempster has been with the V.O.N. for a year and a half. She is one of 20 blue-uniformed nurses giving comfort to the bed-

ridden and chronically ill in Windsor, Sandwich East, Sandwich West, Riverside, Tecumseh, and St. Clair Beach. Diseases as serious as cancer and tuberculosis come under her care. In really serious cases, Miss Kempster, or one of her colleagues, is available for night duty.

There is a charge for V.O.N. services; but the charge is adjusted to suit the circumstances of the patient. Mostly, the V.O.N. is supported by the Community Fund and municipal grants.

The nurses have been serving Windsor for 30 years - and the organization has been growing every year. In 1956, for example, V.O.N. nurses made more than 34,000 visits.

There will certainly be more than that in 1957. But nowhere will the welcome be warmer than in the pink cottage where blonde, blue-eyed Norma Drefko waits with a smile for Mary Kempster.

Mrs. Robert Gauthier heard the jarring noise of the crash while at her home immediately south of the railway line. When she looked toward the crossing, she said, the train had gone by but she saw pieces of the-wrecked truck in the air just before they hit the ground.

The crossing is unprotected except by an "X" railway sign. The railway bed is above the level othe Maidstone Line road.

The squashed main wreckage of the panel truck was found 156 feet down the line from the crossing with the engine about another 50 feet ahead. One wheel landed 273 feet east of the crossing.

Two tiny shoes were left by the side of the rails.

The train, a locomotive and two passenger cars, stopped about a quarter-mile down the tracks. It was the C.P.R.'s No. 634 which left Windsor at 3:40 p.m. for London. In the crew were Harold "Shorty" Clampitt, conductor, and Ed Slyford, engineer.

Mr. Vozza, listed by the company as the driver, was making a special run into the Tecumseh area, Henry Drouillard, owner of Superior Cleaners, said. It was off his regular delivery route but he made the trip to deliver cleaning previously picked up by Mr. Drefko.

Mr. Drefko had picked up the clothes during the week he worked for the cleaning firm. He had left the firm but returned for the day to help with the deliveries. Two of the dead children and the surviving girl were his daugh-

The main wreckage of the flattened truck fell apart when an attempt was made to drag it away with a tow truck.

The train continued to London after about a three-quarter hour delay. A C.P.R. Chicago to Montreal passenger train cleared the crossing about an hour after the accident, reducing speed to move through the small crowd of spectators lining both sides of the

Cpl. Robert Barron and Const. D. P. Allison of the Essex County provincial police detachment investigated the accident.

"So myself and a janitor ran down to the Market Lane and there he was on the ground with two or three men holding him.







# Woman's OHIP bill stirs up NDP boss By John Coleman

TORONTO — A Windsor-area woman who paid \$597 out of her own pocket for two eye operations is evidence Ontario's health-care system is failing, says New Democratic Party Leader Bob Rae.

Rae told the legislature Friday Jeannette Drouillard, 56, of Sandwich South, was billed \$1,518 for two cataract-related operations and Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) premiums paid \$921, or 61 per cent of the cost.

"The province is encouraging the destruction of a health-care system with universal access," said Rae, who advocates an end to extra-billing by doctors.

When contacted Friday night, Mrs. Drouillard's husband, Aurele, 59, said he and his wife knew before the operations they would be billed extra but he didn't expect the bills to be quite as high as they were.

HE SAID THE size of the bills were a bit of a surprise when he received them, "but what can you do about it if your eyes have to be fixed?"

Drouillard said his wife's vision was so bad she couldn't see well enough to read before the operations, performed in November and March by Dr. Charles Dyson in London.

The retired Chrysler worker said the burden of paying the bills has been made easier because they have paid them on a monthly payment plan. But, he said, the bills have still had an effect on how they spend their fixed monthly income. "Even though your income is fixed you still have everything to pay." he said.

still have everything to pay," he said.
Drouillard said he thinks OHIP should pay the entire bill for people on fixed incomes.

THE DROUILLARDS were sent to the surgeon in London by a local doctor, and "as far as we knew, he was the only (doctor) there that did (the operation)."

Rae said Mrs. Drouillard was informed the surgeon at Victoria Hospital in London would extra-bill or charge rates higher than fees covered by OHIP. But she didn't realize it would be so much.

"It is the ordinary people, in this case the wife of a retired Chrysler worker living on \$694 a month, who are paying the freight," Rae said.

The NDP leader said the experience of Jeannette Drouillard contradicts statements by Health Minister Larry Grossman last week that only the better off in society are extra-billed.

GROSSMAN TOLD the legislature Friday the experience of Mrs. Drouillard is only one example of 60 million OHIP claims filed each year.

The health minister, who favors extrabilling as a safety valve for doctors unhappy with OHIP, said the Drouillards should complain directly to the Ontario

Medical Association.
Rae said regardless of their means and income, a great many people in Ontario are being presented with additional bills because doctors chose to opt out of OHIP.

He said Mrs. Drouillard had little choice in the London area because nine of 16 ophthalmologists have opted out, and 47 of 48 anesthetists have opted out.


Grossman maintained the system remains workable for all citizens, and anyone seeking medical attention within OHIP rates can do so by phoning the Ontario Medical Association.

His accomplishments are many for a man who never graduated from elementary school.

"Father said I had to stay home to plant corn. When it was done I said there was no use going to school now. I'd missed the spring examinations. So he said if I didn't want to, I didn't have to."



## Local Volunteers V Bicentennial Medal

Twelve of the 1.984 Ontario citizens chosen to receive Bicentennial medals are from the Essex area; four are Essex residents.

On December 9th the Bicentennial will focus on volunteerism with the presentation of Ontario Bicentennial Medals to 1,984 citizens for services to their community. Special presentations will take place in a series of ceremonies across the province, as close to that date as possible. Plans are for 30 ceremonies to be hosted by a cabinet minister represented by local provincial parliament members.

The recipients of the medal were selected by their communities and through public nominations during Bicentennial year.

Eileen Hodgins, a Brown Owl for the 4th Essex Brownie Pack for 26 years, co-founder of Camp Wandalee on Pelee Island and division commissioner is one Essex resident. Another is Hazel Kerr who has been a Scout leader for many years and a member of the Essex Figure Skating Club executive for 15 years. Lorraine Ouellette works with Recovery Inc. to help patients lead normal lives again. And Nellie Tucker was a leader of Girl Guides and Brownies for more than 30 years and leads the Salvation Army Teen Bible class.

Beatric Hunter is the only recipient of the medal for Colchester North Township.

She is president of the local Women's Institute which she helped organize in 1962, president of the area Essex County women's institute, and she works for Girl Guides, 4-H clubs, the cancer society, heart fund and local hospitals.

For Gosfield North township, Joseph Newman was chosen. He has served on the board of directors of Cottam Farmers, Essex County Milk Board and Kent-Essex Co-op Insurance, counillor for his township and the county, reeve of his township and one-time Essex County Warden.

The chairman and organizer of the Ruthven Apple Festival was one recipient for Gosfield South. He is Ronald Hicks. Others from that municipality are Tony DiMenna who assists new Canadians in learning English and Hugh Rogers, past reeve and warden.

Maidstone Township has four recipients: Mildred Cline who works in 4-H, women's institute and cancer society; Charles Diemer a founding member of the Ontario Agriculture Hall of Fame, of the Woodslee Credit Union and other cooperative organizations, and a worker in farm organizations; Shirley Sinkevitch, a volunteer at La Chaumiere seniors home; Grant Thomas, whose enthusiasm for the principals of conservation led him to be a member of the Essex County Game and Fish Advisory.

Robert Trepanier, member of the Rochester Volunteer Fire Department for 20 years and present chief was that municipalities' only recipient.

Edward Dumouchelle, who has been involved in council since 1927 and has attended every function since then, was the recipient for Sandwich South.

Margaret Birch, Parliamentary Assistant to the Premier, who chaired the selection committee for reading the nominations commission.

"was a moving experience when one realizes that day in and day out across the province, volunteers give their time and energy to help their fellow citizens. ## Sandwich South Treasure of 37 Years Honoured

The reeve who is said to have been Sandwich South township's treasure, has been honoured by the province and the township.

Ninety-four year-old Ed Dumouchelle was nominated to receive Ontario's bicentennial medal, and more recently the fire department presented him with a customized trophy for distinguished service.

"If it hadn't been for the steps taken by him as reeve we wouldn't have the fire department we have today," said Fire Chief Frank Nostadt.

"His leadership in establishing the fire department, his decisions when we went into planning, how he brought us through annexation, is something the ratepayers can admire," his successor, Bob Pulleyblank stated. "He is one of the treasures of Sandwich South."

Mr. Dumouchelle served on the township council for 37 years, nine of them as reeve. Establishing the tire department was the only thing to do, according to him.

"We were paying Anderdon Township to handle our
fire calls. After Sandwich
East was added (to Sandwich
South) they phoned to say
the township was too big for
them (to answer its fire calls)
so I came to council and said
we'd better get a machine of
our own. In three months we
had it."

Typical of the decisive way he handled municipal affairs. He recalled some of those

decisions during the depression of the thirties.

"During the dirty thirties,
--- I remember clearly, --- a
woman was thrown out of her
home with what little
furniture she had piled up by
the road. Her boy, about nine
years (of age), came to the
house and said his mother
wanted to see me. She had
no place to go. I looked
around a bit and found a little
flat. I put her in there.

But the bedreem window didn't have a curtain and I went and bought a curtain for her. At the next council meeting they asked me who gave me the authority to spend that money."

Tapping his head with a finger, Ed Dumouchelle repeated his answer of years ago, "I said nobody did but my own common sense. Put yourself in that position and see how you'd feel in having to undress without a curtain on your window!"

But no spendthrift was he, according to Bob Pulleyblank who served under him on council. "There was always the saying Ed never spent the taxpayers' money. That is the outstanding thing I remember. He always made council remember where the dollars came from."

And Sandwich South residents revered him for it, Bob added. "His faith was a tower of strength. The bottom line was his belief in his faith and his family. It made him an outstanding person in the community."

When the person who supported him most died in 1967, Ed retired. That was his wife, Lily, and he speaks of her yet with pride and affection.

His daughter Doris recalls
Dad bringing council
members home after
meetings.

"Mom would say, Doris, your Dad is bringing the councillors home. You get sandwiches ready."

Another of his five daughters recalled the New Year celebrations when Dad won an election. They were held annually in January, right after the holiday.

"We'd have a party at the house. All the councillors and staff would come. New Years is never like the parties I remember as a child."

Lily provided the same hospitality for the needy. Ed recalled another experience of two children coming to the door for help. "Lily asked if they nad breakfast. They said, no, there's no bread in the house. We ain't got nothing. Lily fixed breakfast for them."

"I never saw anybody in trouble that I couldn't help them with something. Help them get a job or some-thing." And he repeated his comment about common sense being his authority for his action. All this was in his early days on council, when members had to insist that anyone applying for welfare bring the licence plates off his car, if he had one, before his application was granted, to avoid any of the welfare money being spent on gas. That was not considered a necessity in the depression days of the thirties.

Taking a stand for the township in Windsor's bid to take over the airport in 1966 was the triumph.

"Sandwich South came through annexation better than any other municipality," Bob Pulleyblank maintained. And the decisions he made when we went into planning, on whether we were content to be covered with houses or maintain our rural identity, have kept us rural."

Ed explained it. "I went to a meeting with city hall (Windsor) when they were reaching out and grabbing. They wanted the airport in the worst way. We told them they could have a piece in the area of Tecumseh but we were going to keep the airport. So they (Windsor councillors) pulled in their horns and went home.

The airport paid a big tax (about \$56,000 a year at that time) and asked us for nothing so why should we give that away," he said with all of his indignation surfacing.

The Roseland area of Cabana and Howard was annexed from the township at that time.

"All Windsor wanted was the assessments. We hired a lawyer and put up enough arguments!"

The Ontario Municipal Board ruled in favour of the township, that was one of many wins. "We had twenty-six appeals to the OMB (against the township) and we lost one," Bert Bedford reported. He was township clerk when Ed Dumouchelle was reeve.

"Ed made the policy and council followed," Bert explained. "I was working for a person that carried out good policy."

"They were a great team, Bert and Ed," Bob Pulleyblank added.

At the time of annexation Sandwich East disappeared with most of it becoming Sandwich South.

"Windsor didn't want Sandwich East," Ed said. "It was a tough go to take," he said of the enlargement of boundaries and loss of the residential area of Roseland.

"We had to broaden our services. I said we'd take it and build from there."

He had seen the township through much growth from the time he became a councillor in 1928.

In those days the brick municipal hall - torn down in recent years, - was heated by a wood stove.

"The old town hall was cold. Like an ice box. There was a big old stove to heat it and we'd shove in a log of wood three feet long."

"I remember old Mr. Brett coming to council the first meeting of every year," Mr. Dumouchelle continued, "He'd have a pocket full of cigars."

That was W.R. Brett, first of the family to own the Free Press.

"And I remember young Ken coming in knee pants. In those days you didn't wear long pants until you were eighteen or nineteen."

Serving on council was not part of a plan but once he got the "feel of it" Ed hung on. Joe McCarthy and Mose Laforet nominated him into the 37-year career.

"I went to a council meeting to see what was going on. Two others were nominated but refused. So I ran for councillor."

One election with some opposition was recalled with humour.

"A couple of fellows asked me if I wanted to win that election. I said yes, I always ran because I wanted to win"

They said do you know how much it is going to cost you. I said yes and they said, two bottles of whiskey." Get well wishes and prayers to Edward Dumou-chelle, father of Marjorie McGuire and Fr. Gerry Grant C.S.S.R. who gave a mission at St. Mary's two years ago.





## Art Expert Apr. 12 Dies in U.S.

Joseph N. Dumouchelle, a native of Maidstone and one of Detroit's best-known authorities on art, died Wednesday at Detroit Memorial Hospital after a long illness.

Born in Maidstone in 1906, he moved at the age of 18 to Detroit, where he founded the Dumouchelle Art Galleries.

Joseph N. Dumochelle. a native of Maidstone, and one of Detroit's wellknown authorities on art, died Wednesday of last week, at Detroit Memorial Hospital after a long illness.

Born in Maidstone- in 1906, he moved, the the age of 18, to Detroit, where he founded the Dumouchelle Art Galleries.

Mr. Dumochelle attended the St. Joseph's School annd Walkerville Collegiate. He was a member of Beach Grove Golf Club.

Surviving are his widow (nee Chrlotte Lepain) three sons, Larry, Norman and Ernest, and two daughters, Joanne and Rosemary, at home; and five sisters, Mrs. Clarence Ryan (Alice, River Canard; Mrs. Alfred Campeau (Jeannette) Riverside; Mrs. Herve Daignault (Lottie); Miss Antionette Dumouchelle annd Mrs. Harold Sjostrom (Marie), all of Windsor; another sister, Mrs.Irving Marentette (Bernadette), died in 1955.

He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Dumouchelle, of Tecumseh Road East, Sandwich East.

Funneral services were held at St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church, Lake Shore Road, Grosse Pointe Farms, with burial in Mount Olivet cemetery.

Friends and relatives from throughout the county are expected to gather at the home of Henry Dumouchelle, Cabana Rd. E., Sandwich West Twp., to honor this man who has watched the county grow from bush and swamp to one of the leading agriculture centres in the country.

Henry Dumouchelle was born in a log cabin along the Grand Marais Drain. This home had been built by his grandfather, Pierre, who had come to Canada from France in 1819.

Mr. Dumouchelle recalls that in 1865 his father, Ignaze, traded a horse and cart for 125 acres of land at Howard and Cabana Rds., which is now known as Jackson's Corners. Another log cabin was constructed at this site and remained there until 1895 when it was replaced by a new home.

Mr. Dumouchelle says that the new home was built only after his mother threatened to tear down the little log cabin with an axe.

Shortly after the new home was built it became known as Dumouchelle's Tavern and was a stopping place for the coach to Leamington.

Today the home still stands although it is vacant and its windows boarded.

Mr. Dumouchelle attended school on Cousineau Rd., and then at the old No. 6 in Sandwich South.

He was married to Bridget O'Neil Feb. 26, 1889. She was born to Irish parents in a log cabin situated where Highway 2 and Walker Rd. now intersect. This building stood until a year ago when it was destroyed by fire.

Mr. and Mrs. Dumouchelle had three boys and three girls, all of whom are still living. Edward, reeve of Sandwich South; Harry and Pat, are all well-known farmers in Essex. His daughter, Evelyn (Mrs. Joseph McCarthy), lives nearby and Charlotte (Mrs. Jerry Cecile) in Tecumseh while Miss Lela Dumouchelle lives at home with her father.

Mr. Dumouchelle moved to his present home on Cabana 66 years ago and worked in the fields there until he was more than 80 years of age.

Mr. Dumouchelle died in 1931. Besides his six children, he has 25 grandchildren and 73 greatgrandchildren.

Mr. Dumouchelle for the past three years has been confined to a wheelchair, but is exceptionally bright and enjoys talking with his children while dragging away on his favorite pipe.

A favorite trip taken by the Dumouchelles and their neighbors was the Town of Sandwich via Cabana road and the Huron line. with substations on Howard at Cabana and at Tecumseh road. A ticket purchased at the first station needed only to be shown at the other two points. Where Howard avenue crosses Giles coming into Windsor there was a wide coulee spanned by a bridge for both horse and pedestrian traffic. South of this, that is south of the cemetery, was the little coulee. Further out on Howard at the Grand Marais, a plank bridge was sometimes covered with water in wet weather. People in the area immediately south of Windsor were therefore, forced to go around by Sandwich (town) in wet weather. The trip into Windsor for mail was made only once a week. The weekly Windsor Record cost \$1.50 a year. Letters were few in those days.

#### Mill Popular

Vollans' mill on the west side of Howard avenue, about a mile south of the present King's Highway No. 3, was a popular spot. It was a combined grist, saw and carding mill. To it farmers from all around brought their grain for grinding, and from it they took home their flour and feed for stock. Wool carding had been done in the homes before Vollans opened his mill. Henry Dumouchelle's mother was one who performed this task. She also spun the yarn. The cloth was woven in the locality and finally brought back to the home for the mother to make into clothing. Everybody raised a few sheep to make all this possible.







#### **Boy Finds** Baby's Body

The body of a newborn girl was found in a cardboard carton in a ditch on the School sideroad north of Highway 3, near Oldcastle, Wednesday afternoon.

### Baby Victim Of Exposure

The newborn baby girl whose unclad body was found Wednesday in a carton by the side of a ditch on the School lane, north of Highway 3, near Oldcastle, is believed to have died from exposure.

An autopsy performed on the baby's body at the Windsor morgue by Dr. H. W. Asselstine, Windsor pathologist, established death as being caused by exposure.

The infant, which is believed to have been no more than 24 hours old, had been born alive, weighed eight pounds 11 ounces and had not been fed from the time of birth.

Police believe the body had lain in the 10-foot ditch for three days before it was found by Charles Durocher, a 17-year-old

neighborhood boy.

Corporal Charles Elford and



Two Windsor union men have been jailed and refused bail after the five-month-long picketing of the Windsor Drive-In Theatre by members of the local projectionists' union burst into violence Friday night. The theatre is situated on Walker Rd. near Highway 2.

The two men arrested were identified as Edmund Kobryn, 36, of 1660 Langlois Ave., and Douglas Craig, 35, of 1857 Malta St. Kobryn is charged with common assault and Craig faces a charge of obstructing a peace officer in the execution of his duty.

Both men were arrested by O.P.P. Const. W. B. O'Rourke of the Windsor detachment. They were refused bail.

John Dydzak Jr., owner and manager of the drive-in theatre said he called police about 8:30 p.m., after the picketing broke into violence when patrons ignored "Stay out-not union,"

Mr. Dydzak said at least six persons were roughed up by the picket line, one of them a young girl who had a placard broken over her head when her mother and father ignored the picket line and started into the theatre driveway.

The new \$150,000 theatre has had picket lines thrown around it since its March 10 opening when Mr. Dydzak refused demands of Windsor Local 580, of the projectionists' union that the peatre become a union shop.

Mr. Dydzak, an Ontario government-licenced projectionist, his wife and daughter run the theatre. Employees of the snack bar and the ushers are part-time workers. Operating four hours each night, the owner along with an apprentice projectionist, operates the camera equipment.

John Ostrow, 23, McGregor, head usher, gave an eyewitness account of the riot.

"This was the worst one I ever - they were kicking cars, punching people and using insulting language." he said.

The head usher said O.P.P. officers were slugged by members of the picket line. He told The Star he was chased when he got a camera from the theatre office and started to take pietures.

Both Mr. Dydzak and the usher said many cars received dents and scratches when they were jumped on, kicked, and hit with wooden placards.

Mr. Dydzak said three patrons had agreed to file charges against the men involved.

He said after he called police one squad car arrived then called were at least 17 police officers on the scene, including some offduty constables.

"But before the police came it had gone mad-they were open-

ing car doors and slapping peoples faces," Mr. Ostrow said.

According to Mr. Ostrow, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Jones, of 1334 Victoria Ave., was slugged over the head with a placard by one man,

He said the convertible, driven by Mrs. Jones, started into the theatre when men kept yelling for it to turn around and head out.

"That guy (Mr. Jones) was really mad. He got a bump on the head in the fracas and wanted to get out and take them on,' 'Mr. Ostrow said.

The usher said Mr. Jones' car later entered the theatre, dragging one union placard from its

He said other cars were jumped on by groups of men who kept shouting to motorists to go to another theatre. None of the roughed-up persons required hospital attention.

Mr. Dydzak said he had "been tipped off," to watch for trouble Friday night and said he also anticipated a similar occurence tonight.

Mr. Dydzak said he recognized only one projectionist among the men involved in the riot and said the man has been coming out each night since Local 580 threw the picket line around the drive-

When informed of the riot. Edward L. Dale, business manager of the local said he knew the theatre was being picketed but said he had heard nothing of violence until told by The Star.

"I know we are picketing the place because it is unfair to organized labor-all trades -not just projectionists," Mr. Dale said.

Friday night's demonstration was orderly until police ordered picket lines not to bar traffic.

The Dydzak family also runs drive-in theatres in London, Hamilton and Chatham. Operated by members of the family, the theatres have been repeatedly asked by the projectionists' union to hire union men.

In 1955 the Ontario Labor Relations Board granted conciliation services, and according to the union, gave the right to negotiate with the Dydzak family. Mr. Dydzak Sr., told the board he no longer controlled the theatres since he had leased them. Negotiations soon afterward broke down and the theatres were picketed.

In an interview with The Star early Saturday morning, Mr. Dydzak Jr., said the pickets have forced stoppage of milk delivery to his home at the drive-in.

Prior to the riot Friday night, Mr. Dydbzak read a prepared statement over a public address system at the theatre asking patrons to ignore the picket lines stating that because he owned the drive-in, he felt he was within his rights to operate the camera equipment.

He said a capacity audience attended the Friday night movie. The theatre can hold about 1,100

# All Quiet At Drive-in After Riot

Saturday Threat
Of More Violence
Fails to Materialize

An expected recurrence of violence at the Windsor Drive-In Theatre failed to come off Saturday night as squads of provincial police controlle' 50 men picketing the drive-n.

The pi-ket-plagued theatre on Walker Kd., near Highway 3, owned by John Dydzak, Jr., was for the most part the scene of only angry shouts by picketers as Saturday night moviegoers drove into the theatre.

Two city union men were arrested in a riot Friday night which saw 10 carloads of O.P.P. officers battle with picketers who became angry when the patrons ignored placards and shouts that they stay out of the theatre because it is non-union.

Remanded to July 24 in police

Remanded to July 24 in police court Saturday morning were Edmond Kobryn, 26, of 1660 Langlois Ave., a member of the Iron Workers Local 700, who is charged with assault causing bodily harm, and Douglas Craig, 35, of 1857 Malta St., a member of the Carpenters' Union Local 494, who faces a charge of obstructing a police officer during the Friday night riot which resulted in six persons receiving minor injuries.

Picketing of the Dydzak family-run theatre has been carried on for five months by the Projectionists Union, Local 580. Three other unions, the Laborers Union, Local 625, the Iron Workers and Carpenters locals joined in picketing the drive-in only recently.

Picketing of the drive-in since its March 10 opening stems from Mr. Dydzak's refusal of union demands that he hire union projectionists. Mr. Dydzak, a licenced projectionist, his wife and daughter manage the \$150,000 theatre.

Fifteen O.P.P. officers under the command of Insp. Harry Ramsbottom and Sgt. J. H. Hatch stood by Saturday night as the union men with placards paraded in front of the theatre entrance.

Only sign of violence Saturday was when a picket ignored police warnings to stay away from cars and objected to being removed by a police officer.



VER THE YEARS one of the more fun-filled ways of going to the movies has been to pack up the gang and head for the drive-in. Unfortunately, for outdoor movie lovers that time may soon be over.

But for now the show still goes on. On a recent warm July night cars file in one by one, leaving a cloud of dust behind them on the dry gravel road. They jockey for position - the back rows are the best - set up their lawn chairs, bring out the munchies and perhaps a few beers, and wait patiently for the sun to set and the flick to begin.

Some prefer to work off a little energy with a frenzied game of frisbee. Others snuggle with pillows and blankets in the rear of their hatch-back, making small talk.

Little children scurry in and out of the concession stand, dressed in pvjamas and flip-flops. Older kids amuse themselves with video games in the lobby.

The anticipation builds as the light grows dimmer. Soon a horn honks, followed by a chorus of beeps and a flash of headlights - the crowd is growing anxious.

Then, the movie begins.

"It brings back memories, good memories, of when I was young and single," joked Ron Woltz, 29 as his wife, Michelle, 28, looked on. "I came with the guys and (sometimes) with dates. We'd try to pick up girls."

Woltz said he still likes to meet new people at the drive-in. He and his wife attend a few times a summer to relax. Being able to smoke is also an attraction for Woltz - you can't smoke in an indoor theatre.

THE WOLTZS were spending an evening at the last remaining drive-4 - a multiple screen theatre run by Famous Players, located on Walker Road.

It was originally called the Twin Drive-in when it opened in 1966, and later was expanded into a fourscreen theatre. The Twin had plenty of company in those days, with the

Skyway Drive-in located on County Road 42 near Windsor Airport and the Windsor Drive-in on Walker Road near Highway 3.

Dydzak Drive-in Theatres Ltd. is the owner of the now defunct theatres. John Dydzak, manager of the two family-run drive-ins, still lives near the Windsor and he remembers the good-old days.

"We used to pack the place. In fact, we had to refuse cars there were so many," Dydzak said. "We used to run all winter using heaters."

"I don't think it paid off though. It cost a fortune to put all that cable in.

"Cars used to be lined up down the road. We'd get about half families and half young people and on family night we'd charge a \$1 a car. They used to pack up the car, even (people) in the trunk.

"We made money at the snack bar selling hotdogs, popcorn and pop. Kids would run around in their pyjain theatre in Windsor - the Famous mas. We even advertized 'come dressed as you are'.'

Dydzak says the heyday of the drive-in theatre - the 1950s and '60s - was followed by a steady decline during the 1970s. In 1976, a decision was made to lease the two Windsor theatres, along with five other driveins owned and managed by the Dydzak family in Hamilton, Chatham Robinson likes the fact the drive-in and London, to the predecessor of the Cineplex-Odeon chain.

CINEPLEX OPERATED the Windsor theatres for 10 years until their lease ran out in 1986. Poor attendance was cited as the main reason for their closure.

Today, it seems drive-in theatres are slowly becoming extinct. A recent Southam News story cited a current survey of motion pictures stating that in 1985-86 there were 1,-007 cinemas, including 219 drive-ins, across Canada - an overall drop of 23 per cent since 1980-81.

In 1985-86, drive-in theatres reported a total attendance of 5.6 million, a drop of 55 per cent from 1980-

Gillian Howard, director of public relations for Famous Players, cites two main reasons for the decline video-cassette recorders and rising land value.

"Certainly VCRs have had a great impact on theatres," Howard said. "And drive-ins that were originally on the outskirts of many cities have now become very valuable pieces of property as cities expand.

"Land value has become so great that people really can't say no when approached to sell them.'

Urban sprawl hasn't yet taken over the land upon which the Skyway and Windsor sit. Dydzak attributes the demise of drive-ins mainly to the VCR.

"With VCRs you can rent a film for (less than) the price of one admission. I believe very, very much that it caused the downfall.

"A lot of my friends own drive-in theatres in Detroit and a lot of them are closed. We're not the only ones who are feeling it."

Although Dydzak admits to being very sentimental about drive-ins he takes a walk through the grounds of the Windsor every morning he's pessimistic about the future. "I think they're on their way out."

BUT THERE ARE many people in Windsor who hope his prediction is incorrect.

Randy Robinson, 28, and his girlfriend Sandi Rowland, 25, were returning to the drive-in after a fiveyear absence and said they were hopeful that the drive-in wouldn't disappear.

"There are too many people downtown. It's more casual and more private here," said Robinson.

He admitted the sound was not as good as an indoor theatre's, and he would probably go to one if the movoffers two movies for the price of one and he said he would be back.

A small group of friends who meet at the drive-in at least three times a month, sat on lawn chairs set up between their cars. Darryl Dunne, 23, joked that it's not as easy to get a parking spot downtown.

"You can smoke and it's more comfortable," Dunne said.

His friend, Bruce Sedran, 26, said he wasn't bothered by poor sound

"We always come to the all-night show," Dunne said. The Famous 4 at present offers only two all-nighters a

LAWRENCE AND Elaine Pinsonneault relaxed in their car as daughters Nicole, 8 and Brandi, 6, spread out with pillows and blankets on the top of the car.

"We come out a couple times a month. The kids like it and it's the only place you can go with them," Lawrence said. "The kids can run around and amuse themselves.

The price is right too. Children are admitted for free, with the adult admission of \$6.50 each.

Pinsonneault said the sound and picture quality are just fine and added, "It makes you feel like summer's here."

An employee who preferred to remain anonymous said the theatre is well staffed and "we try to keep on top of things before problems occur." There are always police officers on duty on the weekends.

Like any other theatre, attendance fluctuates. "The draw depends on the movie showing. If it's a good one, it can fill the place up.'

To many people the drive-in is a social outing. Paulette Savoie, 16, said she goes to the theatre almost every weekend with friends who've only missed one weekend this sum-

"It's a social outing. We go with people we know and we meet people we don't know," Savoie said. "It's more fun if you're with a bun-

ch of people," agreed friend Lynn Gelinas, 17.





# A dream that lost its edge of joy ...

Red tape is like magic. Intantly, it can turn dreams into nightmares.

Al Enns decided to turn his woodworking hobby into a husband-and-wife business about six months ago, but it didn't take long before the 30-year-old former Ford tool grinder almost wished A & M Woodcrafts had never been founded.

What he thought would be a simple matter of converting the 173-squar-metre shed behind his new home just north of the hamlet of Maidstone became a quagmire of government

Enns problems began when he asked that a 200-amp electrical service be installed in the shed for his tools.

The electrician he hired requested the Ontario Hydro inspector in Essex to approve the location of the service.

The hydro inspector told Enns he would have to contact the Ontario Ministry of Labor because Enns wanted to operate a business.

Suddenly, Enns found himself facing an expenditure of about \$15,000 to set up a business instead of the \$5,000 cost he had forecast by doing the work himself.

The ministry demanded that plans for the shop be submitted to their engineers for

The engineers told Enns the paint shop required fire-proof walls, steel doors and leaded glass, explosion-proof lights, switches and an explosion-proof fan.

The woodworking shop needed dust-proof lights and plugs, magnetic switches on the tools as a safety measure to ensure they would not re-start after a power failure and a back door. A \$3,000-plus dust collection system was required in the woodworking shop.


The \$500 wiring job he had already done in the shop was no good and all the wiring had to be protected in conduit pipes.

An electrian had to be hired to re-wire the shop, install the lights and connect the 200-

amp service.
"It just went crazy. We had done what we could on safety for our own benefit and then all of a sudden, we were faced with this," said

"The thing is, you can see the purpose in all these things but we didn't expect to get hit with this all at once," Enns said.

"It would be different if we were going to

hire somebody, but this is a husband and wife operation.

In addition to desartment of labor stipulations, when Enns told Bell Canada he was going to open a busness and wanted an extension phone connected from his house, the company charged him \$65.

Ontario Hydro wanted a \$150 deposit, and the Enns don't know if they can get it back.

"Ontario Hydro tells us the deposit is refundable, but they won't say when we can get it. They tell us if we pay the bills every month, they might consider refunding it." Mrs. Enns

The costs have hade self-employment for the Enns a more difficult proposition than they first thought

"It's a lot harder to make the payments on the extra money we had to spend ... We figured we had enough money to set up the shop from selling our house. We didn't figure on the added expenses," Enns said.

Luckily, Enns was able to pick up some used equipment after scouring the city. He estimates if they had been bought new, they would have cost him another \$4,000.

Even more irritating is that his tools are used in the same type of work in basements across the country without the safety features he has been forced to install.

Zoltan Ambrus, the department of labor engineer who ordered the changes to the shop plans, said that under the new Occupational Health and Safety Act, the safety devices are mandatory even if the operation is a family

"It doesn't matter if it's a one-man operation or not. The regulations apply," Ambrus

"If it's a hobby, it's a different story but as soon as you start selling, it's no longer a hob-

And it appears that a hobby can only be changed into a nightmare, not a dream.



# For Essery, it's a chance of a lifetime

ROCHESTER, Mich. — Tonight, Scott Essery will be standing in the middle of the field as 80,000 pairs of eyes watch his every move, as 80,000 sets of lungs cry out their hearty support and 80,000 minds prepare to

offer their criticism.
Yet Essery, the 24-year-old Windsor punter who will make his National Football League debut tonight with the Detroit Lions, says he will try to ignore the pressure and just do what he does best.

"I'm trying not to think about that," Essery said after a Lions practice at Oakland University this week. "Naturally, it's going to be hard to block out, but I'm going to have to try. I've got to keep in mind what I've got to do and not think about the people, or the oncoming linemen. This could be my future."

The veterans on the team, of course, are used to the noise of the Pontiac Silverdome where the Lions will play Cleveland Browns in their first pre-season game of the year. Even many of the rookies have played before similar, if not bigger crowds while in

BUT ESSERY, WHO played his university football with Windsor Lancers of the Ontario Universities Athletic Association, cannot imagine what playing before 80,000 critics will be like.

"In Bowling Green last week (in a controlled scrimmage against the Browns), they had 23,000 people out to watch," he said. "That's the most



I've ever played before in my life." Then he laughs. "It's not like playing

for the Lancers where you're lucky to get a couple of thousand people out."

Technically, Essery is fighting for the Lions' punting job with Tom Skladany. Realistically, he is trying to showcase himself to other teams for the day when he is cut from the team.

Skladany, 27, is a four-year NFL veteran who has established himself as one of the best punters in the league. He led the National Conference last year with a 43.5-yard average and the league with 37.3-yard net average. He played in the Pro Bowl last year and is not a man ready to be beaten out for his job.

ESSERY REALIZES this, and so his hopes lie in being able to show

other teams he can play.

"I want to let as many teams as possible get an idea of how I can kick," he says, "so if (the Lions) let me go, they've got some film they can pass

"We play Cleveland, Oakland, Cincinnati and Buffalo (in pre-season), so that's four teams that'll see me right there. And the teams they play next will get the films of their previous games, so I could get a lot of exposure just by playing in a couple exhibi-

"That's what I'm hoping, to be picked up if I'm cut or put on waiv-

Lions head coach Monte Clark has been impressed with Essery's punting, but has been noncommital as to how long he plans to keep the Windsor player. Essery punted twice in last week's scrimmage against the Browns and Clark said that he plans to use him tonight.

"I'D LIKE TO give him a chance," Clark said. "He's shown a strong leg, but needs to be more consistent.

"Skladany's ankle is hurting a little bit, so (Essery) might kick more than

The Lions now have 74 players in camp. They will have to cut to 70 players Aug. 24, to 60 players Aug. 31 and to the final roster of 49 players (raised from 45) Sept. 6.

Clark will use the Lions' four preseason games to test what he has called the finest crop of rookies to attend training camp in his five years as head coach.

However, he also wants to win.

"We always like to win," Clark said. "No matter if we're playing tiddlywinks, we want to win. But we can't sacrifice that for the work we want to get done. Also, we don't want to show things we may want to do later.



As the land was cleared, logs were hauled to the saw-mills and large stones that were dug out were burned to break them more easily.





## The Milton Farough family Fourth generation Faroughs start herd of new type of beef

The Milton Faroughs are another family that prove family farming has a long way yet to go. The original 125 acres has been in the Farough family for 103 years, since Milton's grandfather bought it in 1868. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Farough still live in the family homestead, Milton and Ila are next door, and in the house next to them, their elder son Edward and his

It's the younger son Wayne. who really likes farming, a decision he made while still a very small boy. When the Times staff visited the Faroughs, Wayne was on his way home from Hensall with four Charolais - Hereford cross. which he has bought as the start of a herd of this new strain of beef cattle. He saw the different crosses of Charolais at the Royal Winter Fair, that had been brought in from Alberta. Wayne entered 4-H compe-

Wayne entered 4-H competition in Soybeans at the Royal these past two years and took first place. He had been keenly interested in 4-H work, having completed 23 clubs with a 75% or better score. This year he participated in five 4-H clubs, tractor, oats, soybeans, corn and beef and placed first in all.

The elder son, Edward, graduated from Ridgetown School of Agriculture in 1964. Although he is a transport driver he is very interested

She raised 40 ducks and 100 roosters which she dresses for sale. "Grandpa Farough helps me pick them (pluck off the feathers). We still have the ducks to do, but the roosters have all been sold." she explained. All the work of raising the ducks and roosters plus dressing them for sale adds up to a lot of hours and the profit return figured on a per hour basis is small.

At one time Milton and his father raised pheasant poults for release in the township. "We raised them for six or seven years, until the township stopped selling hunting licenses and didn't want the birds. They are selling licenses again but we didn't bother trying to raise any more pheasants, "Milton reported.

It wasn't easy; young pheasants are subject to chilling and diseases, and pick each other to death. When they were six weeks old they were released throughout the town

town School. He would be growing some new strain of seed or use some new cultivation method, then on certain dates area farmers would visit his farm to see the results. The Oldcastle Agricultural Society used to bring in registered seed grain for their members and hold seed contests, Milton took much of the responsibility for that program. When it closed a few years ago a trophy was bought and given to the Essex Crop and field Improvement Association to be presented each year to the winning 4-H member.





The record performances of two blind swimmers led Windsor-area participants at the 1978 Ontario Games for the Physically Disabled.

Alan Farough of Maidstone broke one Canadian record, came within a few ticks of lowering another he already owns and tacked on a Games' mark for good measure Sunday at the St. Clair College pool.
Alan Connors of Windsor

set a Games' record and had second- and third-place finishes in two other events.

Farough knocked almost five seconds off his Canadian mark of 2:04.87 in the 100metre butterfly with a clocking of two minutes, then chopped 31/2 seconds off his Ontario record in the 100 freestyle with a 1:25.5 clock-

His time of 1:43.8 in the 100 backstroke was just a shade

Connors earned his Games mark in the 50-metre backstroke, lowering the previously-existing record of Chelmsford's A. Mainville by 12 seconds to 57 flat in an unopposed race against the clock.

Connors also had two second-place finishes (100 free and 100 back) and a third in the 50 freestyle.

David Uhrin tacked on two firsts in swimming events among blind contestants, swimming the 50 freestyle in 58.7 against his own Games' record of 57.04 and adding the 50 'fly in 1:13.6, well off the mark of 59.05 held by Farough.

Windsor athletes won five other events in the cerebral palsy category, two of them by Susie Chick in the 25metre freestyle swim and slalom-manual, an event in which teammate Anne Marie Demers was second.

Chick also had a second in track at 60 metres and a third in the club field event.

DeMers won the 60-metre dash in her classification and Pat Hennin led a one-twothree Windsor finish of Helena McCormick and Jo-Anne Stockwell in their 60-metre sprint in another classification. Hennin also had a third in the club field event.

Bill Cherry was the other Windsor winner, taking the slalom-manual wheelchair race and finishing second in the 60 metres.

In other cerebral palsy events, Steve Newman had a second in the slalom-manual and a third in the 60 metres, Laurie Hutchinson had a second in the slalom-electric and Tim Green a third in the slalom-manual.

## Alan Farough Excels

Alan Farough, 16 of Maidstone, captured six gold medals at the Canadian Summer Games for the Handicapped, held in Edmonton from August 20 to 27.

Alan won the medals in swimming events, with top place in the 100 metre butterfly and backstroke, the 200 metre and 400 metre free style, 400 metre individual medley and a 400 metre freestyle relay.

Alan is the son of Russell and Joyce Farough of Maidstone. He is a student of the W. Ross MacDonald school for the blind in Brantford. His parents give credit to the school for providing the training facilities that enabled Alan to compete in the Ontario Games and the Canadian Games. He has several medals in Ontario competition.

He became eligible for the Canadian Games by winning two gold medals in swimming and a silver medal in wrestling at the Ontario Games in Brantford last June.

"You were chosen for the Canadian Games according to your performance in competition," Alan explained.

He carried out an intensive training session during the summer at the Essex Memorial Pool where he swam at least an hour each day, starting with swimming the length of the pool 25 times a day and working up to 60 times.

He entered 9 events missing out in wrestling and running events.

Standards are high. Alan said any competitor who was only entry had to beat the record, or if there is no record, set a good one. "If there are three people in an event only the top two get medals and if there are two in an event only the gold is given. That's so no one will do a poor job and win anyway".

Alan was chosen to represent the blind in the torch lighting ceremonies in which four persons participated, each to represent one of four categories in competition; the blind, the amputees, para and quadraplegics, and cerebral palsy victims.

Alan won his medals for wrestling and swimming. He was first in the 100 metre for se style in 1 minute and 25 conds. He broke the

Ontario record of 2 minutes for the 100 metre butterfly stroke by 4 seconds.

He finished second in the breast stroke but no medal is given for second place when there are only two contestants unless a record is broken. He did the backstroke in 1.41 minutes but again no medal was given because he was the only contender.

Alan will go on to the Can-Am games. He is the son of Russell and Joyce Farough.

The torch lighting was part of the official opening of the games held Friday night.

The objectives of the

games is to provide an opportunity for physically disabled persons to participate in sport and to bring emphasis to their ability rather than their handicap. The games also develops community interest in their sports, permits athletes to participate in high calibre competition and to foster friendship among the athletes from different areas of Ontario.

It is to maintain the high calibre of competition that no medal is awarded unless a record is broken when only one person competes in any category, and a second place medal is not given if only two persons compete.

## Alan's blindness no real handicap

MAIDSTONE - Ever nce he was five years old n athlete. He became trong, dedicated and orked hard to achieve that

He had everything an athte could want - everyhing, that is, but his sight.

Alan is blind. He was born ith a congenital cataract roblem. He sees only imag-s and only when they're irectly in front of him.

There are some things, lough, that can sometimes bstitute for sight. Alan has esire, athletic ability and a ersonality that makes them both come together.

Alan is a student of W. Ross MacDonald School (a chool for the blind) in Brantford. He gets to come home every weekend to visit his parents who live on a farm near here. Things are going well.

When he was five, Alan started taking academic Alan Farough wanted to be classes at the Brantford school. He played sports for fun with other students.

But since 1975 (when the government started more athletic competition for the handicapped), Alan has taken athletics seriously. And he has the medals to prove it. He's a wrestler and a swimmer.

Wrestling isn't that diffi-

"The moves aren't any different," says Alan, now 18. "And when I'm wrestling, my opponent has to keep in contact with me all the time - those are the

Alan has about 50 medals from both wrestling and swimming events. He's been all over Canada and to Chicago once for the Pan-Am games for the physically disabled.

He has won gold medals every one of the three years he's entered the Ontario Games for the Physically Disabled and he came back with medals from the Canada Games at Newfoundland that would work with him. two years ago and Edmonton last year.

Alan also spends time in recreational baseball, football and hockey. There isn't a sport he doesn't enjoy.

Alan is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Farough. His mother, Joyce, is partially blind and so is his brother, David. Alan's other two sisters have normal sight.

Alan is in Grade 10 at the Brantford school. He says others his age have tried going to regular high schools, but he doesn't think He's happy where he is.

## City athletes perform well in olympics for disabled

Windsor athletes turned in their best performance ever at the Ontario Games for the Physically Disabled which ended in Sault Ste, Marie Monday.

Fifteen athletes shared 40 medals including 28 gold, eight silver, and four bronze while setting four Ontario records, five Canadian and one world record.

Only two of the 17 athletes who competed didn't win medals," said coach Doug Wilton.

The four-day event brings together the best handicapped athletes from across Ontario to compete in four categories including wheelchair, those with cerebral palsy, the blind and

Wilton said Windsor's total performance equalled those of some other southern Ontario centres, though competition between cities is not generally recognized. Wilton added the emphasis is on individual performance.

One of Windsor's best over-all performances was by cerebral palsy competitor Patricia Hennin, 16, who captured five gold medals and broke four Ontario records.

'She won every event she entered," Witon said.

They included the discus throw, 60-metre wheel chair dash, and the 25, 50, and 100-metre-free-style swims.

Patricia said she was "happy but tired" shortly after her return home about midnight.

"I'm still excited," she said.

Patricia, who will enter Grade 11 this fall at William Hands Secondary School, joined other Windsor athletes at training sessions two and three nights a week this summer.

"I'll keep training for next year," she said, adding that she first plans to relax a couple of weeks.

Other medal winners in the cerebral palsy division were Susie Chick, who won a gold, two silvers, and one bronze and broke an Ontario record; Laurie Hutchinson, two golds, one Ontario record; Keith Bondy, one gold which broke an Ontario record, and one bronze; David Harshaw, two silvers, two bronze; and Dan Frimer, one silver.

In the amputees division Windsor winners were Danny O'Connor, three golds, three Ontario records; Angelo Mariani, three golds, three Ontario records; Ron Renaud, two golds, two Ontario records, one silver.

In the blind division Windsor winners included David Uhrin, 22, who won three golds medals which also broke Ontario records. In the 5,000 metre walk, Uhrin broke both a Canadian and world record by completing the circuit in 31 minutes. The previous record was about 33 minutes.

Other blind winners were Alan Farough, four golds which broke four Canadian records and one silver; and Alan Connors, one gold, one Ontario record and one silver.

Carol Dobson won three gold medals and set one Ontario record in the wheel chair division.

Wilton said both Farough and the amputee winners will attend national competitions in Vancouver Aug. 12. There are no national finals in the other divisions.

## Blind athlete has day among friends

MAIDSTONE — Shortly after noon Monday the cars began pulling into the drive and the crackling of dry wood in a brick barbecue sent sparks shooting skyward.

Friends, neighbors and family gathered for the backyard outing to congratulate Alan Farough on his double-medal triumph at the recent World Olympic Games for the Disabled.

Farough returned home from Arnhem, Holland Sunday night with a bronze and silver medal and what he jokingly refers to as a 'Dutch tan'.

he jokingly refers to as a 'Dutch tan'.

"It was raining all the time," he says about the lack of sun during his three-and-a-half week stay.

Canada sent more than 100 athletes to this year's Olympics and of the 38 Ontario natives, he was the only one selected from the tri-county area.

Farough, the youngest of five children, is blind. Born with a congenital cataract problem, he has only five per cent vision in one eye.

Competing against other blind athletes from 42 countries, the sturdy 19-year-old came away with a silver in the 82-kilo class for wrestling and a bronze for swimming the backstroke leg in Canada's entry in the 4x100-metre medley relay.

Although he missed out on a third medal in the 100metre backstroke, Farough was well-pleased with his sixth-place finish.

"I took a half second off my best time in the regionals (in May) and I bettered that by three seconds in the first heat and by almost another full second in the finals. I was trying hard but I didn't expect to take that much off my time."

His time of 1:28.08 could well be a Canadian record but Farough isn't all that interested in finding out for sure. Breaking and holding provincial and nationals records in the pool has become old hat for the modest teen-ager even since he started competing back in 1976.

Farough started playing sports for fun with other students at the W. Ross MacDonald school for the blind in Brantford. His natural ability and desire soon led him to competitive swimming and wrestling. He missed the first-ever Olympic Games back in '76 but over the last few years Farough has competed all over Canada as well as parts of the U.S. and England.

Canada's Olympic disabled team, happily unencumbered by political boycotts, selected him in January.

Farough kept a tight schedule during the ensuring months, often leaving an afternoon training session at the Brantford Aquatic Club and heading to an evening wrestling practice at school. Any spare time went to homework and weekend trips home to the farm.

With summer vacation lying ahead, he'll slow down for a few days at least. Monday morning he was busy sorting through the many pins, pennants and key chains he had traded for at the Olympic Village.

A representative of Minister of Agriculture Eugene Whelan, federal MP for Windsor-Essex, dropped by in the afternoon to present Farough with a Canadian flag for his accomplishments across the Atlantic.

Members of the Oldcastle Women's Institute and the

Members of the Oldcastle Women's Institute and the United Church Sunday School Group also stopped by for a hot dog or two. Both organizations and the Sandwich South Fire Department donated money to help finance Farough's trip to Holland.

The Windsor Lions Club also reimbursed the Faroughs for his round-trip airline ticket.

Well-deserved congratulations followed Farough all afternoon long but one day of sitting on his laurels is enough for this hard-working youngster. He's anxious to start training at the University of Windsor pool. After all, the Ontario Games are just two weeks off and then there's the Canadian Games in Vancouver this August.

The Faroughs will no doubt be firing up the barbecue for a few more victory celebrations before this summer is over



## Who, When & Whatnot

Anybody who has looked about while in a funeral procession in the Windsor area should be able to youch for the fact that life goes on pretty close to normal as the dead go by.

Yes, there are some people who take time out from whatever they're doing to be still until the procession has passed by. You'll see cars and trucks stopped on road shoulders here and there and you'll see pedestrians at a standstill on streets and sidewalks.

You might even see an elderly person doing what was the common practice of another era. I saw such a person a yearand-a-half ago from a car in my father's funeral procession to Victoria Memorial Cemetery. Bob Fawcett, a retired builder, who had built my parents' home in 1927 and who was a friend ever after, was not well enough to get to the funeral but he was out on the porch of his Walker Road home, standing erect with his hat over his heart. It was the way most people showed their respect for the dead whether they had known them or not - many years ago in the Windsor area.

Just getting people to come to a simple stop for a few moments as a mark of respect for the departed seems to be a major accomplishment in the Windsor area. (Not to be confused with cases wherein drivers stop through necessity while a cortege goes through an intersection against a red light.)

In sharp contrast is what's done in Nova Scotia, where my wife was last week for her brother's funeral. During a fivemile final earth journey through and around Sydney, EACH AND EVERY VEHICLE stopped along those five miles. Included was a bus, running on a schedule, no doubt, but stopped nonetheless. The drivers became motionless not only in the heart of the city but also on the outskirts, on a section of the Trans-Canada Highway where traffic is usually moving quickly because of people in a hurry. My astonished wife was told that that's the normal procedure down there. More evidence that the Maritimers are a special breed.





## The Doctor Is On The Right Track

## breeding and treating the racers

With a mobile clinic in the box of his Ranchero, a mobile laboratory at Windsor Raceway and a clinic at his farm, Dr. Robert Fetherston almost manages to be two places at one time.

Dr. Fetherston is an equine veterinarian, or in the more familiar term, a horse doctor.

In the rare moments he is not travelling through the country to a sick horse, or examining one in the raceway stables, he is working as a market breeder of horses at his Maidstone Township farm where his practice is located.

He has a herd of seven standardbred mares and five foals, three race horses and three quarter horses.

There is one more thing going for him among the horses. The quarter-horses are the nucleus for a different type of race horse.

The doctor sees a future in quarter-horse racing in Canada because of its growing popularity in the United States. So one of his mares, a retired thoroughbred, is in foal to a quarter-horse sire.

"By breeding this very fast thoroughbred mare with a racing quarter-horse, I hope to have stock."

hope to have stock."

"They are the fastest horse on a short run," he said of the quarter-horses.

With a mother who won on the long distance and a father good on the sprint, the foal should excel on the race track.

"This sport is new to Canada. It will come here soon," he predicted.

One two-year-old quarterhorse is being trained to race.

"Hopefully it will be ready for the large stakes," he commented.

Like \$100,000.

Most of his foals, usually five a year, are sold as yearlings in select Toronto horse auctions.

"My mares are bred to the best stallions from all over Ontario. If you are breeding horses to sell you are known as a market breeder. So you breed to choice stallions," the doctor explained.

As he walked along the alley between the stalls in his stable he indicated the qualifications of each. "This mare earned a hundred thousand, this one fifty ...."

Dr. Fetherston established his herd in 1975, a year after he moved to his 30 acres on Malden Road, about two miles northwest of Essex. The three race horses he owns are racing in the United States.

In addition to growing hay and providing pasture for the horses, the farm affords space for a half-mile race track where his trainers work his standardbreds.

Michael and Fran Heath are his farm managers.

The barn accomodates 16 horses so he has room for sick or injured horses while he treats them. A new building will provide a clinic on the farm with offices for a laboratory technician and a room for performing surgery.

While he was establishing his horse racing and breeding projects he worked for the Windsor Equine Clinic on highway #3 until October of 1977 when he opened his own practice as an equine veterinarian. Before that he worked for two years in London as a veterinarian for small animals and horses in his first job after graduating from Ontario Veterinary College at the University of Guelph.

"I have two forms of practice, one for race horses and the other for pleasure horses," the doctor explain-

The two divide their busy season between summer and winter.

"For six months the clinic at Windsor Raceway is the site of activity during the winter racing season. During the summer and fall there's more activity on the road with the mobile clinic for the pleasure and western horse which make the rounds of the horse shows."

It was the high number of horses in Essex County that brought him here. Growing up in a North Bay family that raised quarter-horses fostered the doctor's interest in working with animals.

The mobile clinic built into the box of his Ranchero with amazing compactness is complete. A pull-out drawer here and an open lid there reveals x-ray equipment, stethescopes, equipment to see inside a horse from both fiberoptic scope, everything needed to treat a sick or injured horse immediately. Medication is refrigerated and water is heated. A telephone in the cab brings him the message from the office for his next call.

His lab service in a mobile office at the race track in Windsor, the only one of its kind in Ontario, provides immediate diagnosis for the horses there.

"If there is something wrong with a horse in the morning I can tell the owner by mid-afternoon what is wrong."

Fay Best, who is a registered animal health technician does the lab and technical work for his Windsor Raceway Laboratory Services. For the benefit of the race horse owners, she does this technical work for the other veterinarians treating the race horses at the track stables.

"Fay runs the lab, developing x-rays and doing all intense lab work. All of mine and for others. Being a registered technician means she can make the analysis of blood and urine samples."

Such tests are made on twelve to fifteen horses a day. Ms. Best's work and the mobile telephone make it possible for the doctor to carry out his work in two places at one time.

His receptionist is Millie Reeb, a farm neighbour. Ada Tuite of Woodslee is his bookkeeper.

Ninety per cent of his work is done where the horses are, either at their stable or at the race track. The remainder is done at the farm but that will change somewhat when he begins performing operations at his new office and hospital at the farm.

The doctor has one more activity going, --- a summer horse show. Last year he hosted the Essex Equestrian Association.

## A dream stalls in an underpass

Roger Fick has plenty of time to polish and tinker with the red, flat-nosed transport truck that was his dream come true just last spring.

The 27-year-old truckdriver has had time on his hands ever since the dream turned into a nightmare one month ago

Fick was feeling pleased with himself as he motored into the city Sept. 29, hauling a trailer loaded with boxes of Absorb-All, a cleaning agent used to remove oil and grease from garage floors.

It was his third day as a truck owner working as an independent broker for Newman Trucking of Cottam.

Before the day was out, Fick was sus-pended from his job and unable to find

HIS 1965 GMC tractor cab is an oddity by its age but a tribute to Fick's mechanical ability

He keeps working on the cab in the driveway of his small rural home near Essex awaiting the day when he'll be able to get back on the road and again support his wife and young daughter.

Fick was a victim of the truck-eating railway viaduct crossing Tecumseh Road West near Wellington Street.

The trailer he was hauling hasn't been the only one resembling an open sardine can after losing a confrontation with the ancient underpass.

Twenty-three trailers plugged the subway between 1971 and 1981. Two trailers, including Fick's, have taken the plunge this year.

A truckdriver for five years, the closest Fick came to driving in the city was travelling Huron Church Road while hauling flatbeds loaded with scrapped cars across the Ambassador Bridge

"I DON'T think I drove under that thing (viaduct) three times in my life with a car," Fick laments.

He wouldn't be in such trouble if Windsor police hadn't charged him with careless driving several days after the acci-

He believes the charge was unjustified and plans to prove it in court.

Because of the charge, he was suspend-

ed from the trucking company, a standard procedure, according to owner Jerry Newman.

#### \$50,000 Elevator Now Open

MAIDSTONE—A \$50,000 privately-owned grain elevator has opened here at the height of the corn harvesting season.

Donald Flood and his son, Robert, are partners in Maidstone Grain Exchange Ltd. The elevator is equipped for almost automatic grain handling.

In addition to four 5,000bushel reinforced concrete soilos, facilities include a corn sheller and a cleaning mill for both corn and soybeans.

Little labor is involved in the enterprise, with machinery doing almost all the work. Started this spring, the buildings are compactly constructed with the concrete silos supporting the several floors of operation.

The silos were built by a contractor, but the rest of the construction was done by local labor, some of it volunteer. Without this, according to Mr. Flood, cost could not have been kept down to \$50,000.

Corn and soybeans are bought directly from the farmer, and after preparation shipped in quantity to dealers.

The elevator was designed to allow expansion as required.

# **Evasion of Taxes**

# **Police Find** 'Lost' Books **Of Company**

Voracious Rat Destruction Theory Debunked by Court

A Maidstone grain merchant and his father were fined a total of \$26,000 and costs by Magistrate Fred K. Jasperson Friday for evasion of income tax.

James T. Flood, who was accused of evading almost \$40,000 in taxes, was found guilty of evading \$19,700 in taxes.

He was fined a total of \$20,-000 and costs or 18 months in

His father, Ross Flood Sr., was fined \$6,000 and costs or six months in jail. He pleaded guilty to evading \$11,400 in 1950.

One of the grain firm partners. Donald Flood, a son of Mr. Flood Sr., was fined a total of \$75 and costs a week ago. He had pleaded guilty to evading taxes totalling more than \$1,300.

James Flood and his father were given two months to pay the fines and court costs. They still must pay the back income taxes, plus interest at 6 percent per year.

The fines climaxed a lengthy and difficult investigation which kept a team of eight men from the Department of National Revenue occupied for 655 days. They started checking the firm's books in the fall of 1954.

R.C.M.P. raids were necessary to secure the books as James Flood insisted most of them had either been lost or eaten by rats.

Magistrate Jasperson commented: "It is obvious that the investigation took so long because of your failure to co-operate in any way with the department. Your conduct was flagrantly unlawful.

"Your actions placed a burden on all other Canadian taxpayers i and on the Department of National Revenue, and they clearly reveal your unlawful intent to defraud the government.'

In fining Flood Sr., Magistrate Jasperson said: "Your offence was deliberate and you have made no effort to pay the amount you owe to the government."

James Flood admitted during his trial that he had made false statements to evade paying taxes, but maintained the evasion amounted to a little more than

Magistrate Jasperson, in his written judgment, said: "There is no doubt the accused sought to evade his own tax, and his own tax must be computed on the basis of his legal share in the partnership profits. By the partnership agreement this was 20 percent. It would then follow that the amount of tax would be the amount he has admitted evading."

"However, in my opinion the extent of evasion does not end there. The effect of the accused's deception goes farther. It results in an evasion of the tax payable by the four other partners on the accused's own inititative."

The other partners, James, Donald, and Ross Flood Jr., and a sister, Mrs. Margaret Sweet, admitted during the trial that James Flood instructed them as to what income they should list in their tax returns for the years 1950 to

In the three charges against James Flood, penalties were composed of fines, additional amounts which were percentages of the additional taxes which the other partners should have paid and percentages of the additional taxes which Flood should have

# Female executive thriving in a male-dominated world

HARROW - A combination of good timing and good luck has landed Joan Flood of Essex close to the administrative top in the male-dominated world of

Mrs. Flood is manager of the Harrow branch of Cyanamid of Canada Ltd. The position was virtually handed to her a year after she ended a nine-year career as part-time secretary and order clerk for the compa-

When the last of her four children started school, Mrs. Flood decided to work full-time. Because no opportunity existed then with Cyanamid, she quit and became head of Windsor's volunteer services depart-

Then, the manager of Cyanamid's farm supply centre in Harrow was transferred and Mrs. Flood's experience in the business, combined with management courses she had taken, made her the obvious choice to fill the position.

That was in May, 1976.

Since then, sales of fertilizers, insecticides and herbicides at the branch have increased, but Mrs. Flood isn't claiming any credit for the success just yet.
"It's too soon to evaluate that," she says.

But she has added her own personal touch to the branch office's operations.

One problem, for example, was the lack of work space for the servicing of rental equipment during the winter. Because the work couldn't be done outside during the winter, it was never ready when the farmers needed it in the spring.

Under Mrs. Flood's direction, a workshop is now being constructed.

Mrs. Flood's job advises farmers what types of fertilizer and herbicide they need, according to soil and

weather conditions. It's a job she describes as mainly

During the winter she visits farmers, discussing their needs before ordering supplies for the spring rush

She is in the second year of a four-year correspondence course in agronomy offered by the company. But when things are busy, she can often be found on the loading docks slinging 50-pound sacks into waiting trucks so the farmers aren't kept waiting.

"Service plays such an important part in the business and the quicker you get the customer in and out, the happier he is going to be," she says.

During the busy season, the centre is open six days a week from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. She has more than 300 cus-

Mrs. Flood's family background, plus her outgoing nature, has been of great assistance in her new business, she says.

She grew up on a farm, where her interest and understanding of farm situations was developed.

She has also married into a family of grain dealers, R.C. Flood and Company of Maidstone. Her husband, Charles, is a son of the company's founder.

He has also taken over a lot of domestic duties, making it easier for Mrs. Flood to pursue her career.

She says she is concerned about the effects her long working hours may be having on her family but she also recognizes the opportunity she was offered may have never come again.

A woman in management is stymied, she says, because she is not free to move on to more responsible positions. But that doesn't worry her, she says, because her present job is both exciting and satisfying.

It also affords her an opportunity to travel, attending business conventions where she is often the only woman present.

# Woman Manager for Farm Supply Outlet . .

While women's liberationists are complaining that women are being passed over for managerial positions, Joan Flood of Essex acquired a management position in an all male business. It's so much the man's world that she is usually the only woman attending company conferences.

She is the manager of the Harrow branch of Cyanamid of Canada with seven employees and 300 customers.

The job was offered to her a year after she left the company as part time secretary to take a job in the volunteer services department of Windsor.

Her former boss at the Harrow farm supply center was transferred, Suddenly, Mrs. Flood's on-the-job training, combined with the management technique courses she had completed at a nearby community college, made her the best candidate to fill the job. Cyanamid asked her to return to the company and take over as manager of the farm supply center.

Like any service operation, the success of the center depends as much on the personality of the person running it as it does on products or location.

Since she became manager in May of 1976, sales of their fertilizers, herbicides and insecticides have increased but Joan isn't taking the credit yet.

"It's too soon to evaluate that," she says.

She has taken steps to increase efficiency. A workshop is under construction at her suggestion. It will provide a place for the employees to repair Cyanamid's rental equipment during the winter when other work is slack. Because the work couldn't be done in the cold weather equipment wasn't ready when needed

in the spring rush.

It's Joan's responsibility to advise farmers of the proper application of fertilizers and which herbicides work best according to type and condition of soils also in consideration of weather conditions.

She is in the second year of a four-year correspondence course on agronomy offered by Cyanamid.

Joan has the outgoing personality needed for the job and the interest and ability to do it well. She says a childhood on a farm helped and she married into a family of grain dealers, R. C. Flood and Company of Maidstone. Her husband, Charles, is a son of the founder. Joan says family gatherings mean farm topics of conversation.

It's a public relations job, she says. In the winter she visits farmers to discuss their fertilizer needs before ordering supplies for the spring rush. And when the rush is on, she can often be found loading the 50 lb. bags into waiting trucks so the farmers aren't delayed.

"Service plays an important part in the business and the quicker you can get the customer in and out, the happier he is going to be."

During the busy season, the centre is open six days a week, from 7 to 7. Joan is concerned about the effects of her work on the lives of the younger of the couples four children but she also recognized the opportunity for such a position may never have come again.

A woman in management is stymied, she says, because she is not free to take more responsible positions, but that is of no great concern to her because she finds this job exciting and satisfying.

# For Kathy Flood, a belief in Clark

Kathy Flood is a sacrificial lamb in this

She knows it, although you would have a hard time getting her to admit it in public.

Mrs. Flood, the 40-year-old mother of four daughters and a son, is making her second run at federal politics, as the Conservative candidate in Essex-Windsor.

That's the riding that over the past 17 years has become the personal baronial manor of Eugene Francis Whelan, the popular agriculture minister in the former Trudeau government.

The last time the riding sent a Tory to sit as its representative in Ottawa was in 1958, when John Diefenbaker was the party lead-er, and his particular brand of charisma resulted in the biggest parliamentary majority in Canadian political history.

Since then, though, Windsor and Essex County have been less than hospitable for the Conservatives.

In fact, Tory support has eroded to the point where the party now runs a consistent third, behind the Liberals and New Democrats

Party support is so low that even though Mrs. Flood increased her party's vote by nearly 70 per cent in last May's federal election, while picking up six of every 11 votes that Whelan lost, she still only polled 6,889

Results like that would discourage most candidates from running a second time, especially when the election is in the dead of winter and campaigning door-to-door requires an economy-sized box of Kleenex, mukluks and a pair of Stanfield's.

But not Kathy Flood.

She believes the Liberals under Pierre Trudeau will destroy the country and that Joe Clark is the only thing that stands in the way of that destruction.

Sipping on a hot cup of coffee at her

campaign headquarters on Tecumseh Road East, she says with determination: "We have a message to get across, which is very important.'

That message is that the day of the free handout is over and that Canadians must begin to stand on their own feet.

The Crosbie budget last December was intended to reflect that view, Mrs. Flood

Rather than attempt to paper over such deep-rooted problems as unemployment and inflation, she says, Crosbie warned Canadians that they must be prepared to swallow bitter medicine in the short-term if they want continued prosperity over the long haul.

"We have to get that message out. If we do nothing, we'll never have a chance.

"Trudeau always said WE had to do it. but he never did anything, where Clark is saying we're doing it together.

Had to get involved

"That's why I'm running. I just felt I had to come out and get involved.

Later, while canvassing in her Tory-col-ored blue-and-white skidoo suit, she reored blue-and-write sky she's running. turns to the theme of why she's running.

"It's not that I'm a great politician," says, with uncommon candor, "but I don't like what's going on and at least I can say that I gave it a try.

"You know, it's so easy to criticize. It's a lot easier than to come up with something concrete."

Choosing her words carefully, Mrs. Flood wonders if part of the Tory lack of success doesn't have something to do with they way the media perceives things.

It's not that they deliberately distort things, she says.

Rather, it's that if one party is constantly portrayed as being behind, or running third, voters begin to perceive that party in those terms and dismiss its chances without, giving it a proper hearing.

### 100 Cars Of Wheat

50,000 Bushels Yet to Come

MAIDSTONE - R. C. Flood Grain Co. Ltd. loaded its 100th railfroad car of wheat from this season's crop.

This and the approximate 5,000 bushels shipped by truck means the handling of 200,000 bushels of the bumper crop.

While this is not a record for the company - it happens every 10 years or so - the crop is not all off and another 50,000 bushels may be handled by the time the season

Harvesting has been delayed by high moisture conditions and oats are now ready for combining. High winds on the weekend flattened considerable oats and some of this had to be cut at once, delaying finish of the wheat harvest.

The 100 railroad cars represent a full train and nearly onefifth of the anticipated Essex County crop.

According to Jim Flood, manager of the grain firm, most of the wheat received at the plant was heavy and of good quality. It had earlier been indicated 25 more cars expected. that the best wheat in the county this year had been grown in Maidstone and Sandwich South Twps., close to the Flood plant.

During the rush part of the delayed harvesting season long lines of trucks and tractor-

Ross Flood, operator of the R. C. Flood Grain Co. Ltd. feed service mill at Maidstone, was honored by the Shur-Grain Division of Canada Packers Limited at a dinner in Toronto, September 18 marking the 25th Anniversary of Shur-Grain Feed Service. The Flood mill has held its Shur-Gain franchise since August 8, 1938—the first year of Shur-Grain Feed Service.

At the gathering, held in conjunction with Shur-Gain's Annual dealer feed conference in Toronto, presentations were made to a total of 36 charter dealers—all of them local dealers from various points in Ontario who were among the charter members of the Shur-Gain feed service mill system.



"You go to the market place every day for there is no refrigeration so you buy the food fresh. Meat is butchered everyday so it is fresh but the flies are always

There were sweet drinks that were safe for us to drink. That's what they have instead of pop. We had to boil the water, or filter it, so we drank a lot of the sweet drinks."

The natives have a tolerance for their drinking water and that at times created a problem. "They'd offer you freshie and you didn't know if it was safe to drink so you had to ask yourself if you would risk getting sick rather than hurt their feelings (by refusing to drink it)."

And the 100-plus temperatures (fahrenheit) exhausted the young people but failed to make them lose sight of their mission.

She tells of the work. "We worked with 17 churches and Campus Crusade for Christ at established Bible study the Bible study group for groups. Our work was done in four cycles. We showed the film and met people, enstart Bible study, reshowed the film, then helped the people establish a program for continuing study.'

The population is of East Indian and Negroid people, most of whom follow the Hindu religion although many are Muslims. She reported 86,000 saw the film and about 5,500 showed interest. They were welcomed non-denominational Christian pastors and congregations.

The schools teach English so most could converse. Accomodations were prearranged. "It was the richer people who had us. Some of us stayed with a Hindu woman whose husband is in Canada," she explained and added, "We paid for our own food."

Terry-June knew they were regarded as special guests by the way they prepared a birthday party for her.

"She used icing that was sent from Canada and flour is hard to get there so it was pretty special that she used her supply of those things to make me a cake."

Many of the people have friends or relatives in Canada who send them assistance. "The only way they do well is to have friends or relatives in Canada. Many live in one room with five or six children. A man working in a sugar factory might make \$23 a day but that's not enough to buy a meal.

There is no ghetto or upper class distinction. Homes of the rich are mixed in among homes of the poor.

# Lloyd Fraser, 19, Sandwich South, Killed, Two Hurt

#### Auto Misses Turn, Runs Over Field Into Ditch June 6th

A Sandwich South youth was killed and two Windsor youths injured in a crash on Walker road near Sinisac's Corners, at a sharp turn south of McGregor, early this morning.

Dead is Daniel Lloyd Fraser, 19, Highway No. 3, Sandwich South, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Fraser.

In Grace Hospital for observation are Edward Guitard, 20, 1166 Monmouth, and Robert Kincaid, 20, 320 California.

#### MISSES TURN

The accident occurred at approximately 3:30 a.m. when the car, driven by Fraser, missed a turn about a quarter mile south of Sinisac's Corners.

It plunged through a four-foot ditch, traveled 210 feet across a pasture and nosed down into a ditch on the farm of Henry Grondin.

The two injured youths managed to get out of the car and walk to Lucier's Hotel at Sinisac's Corners.

A call for an ambulance was put through and Windsor Ambulance picked up Guitard and Kincaid and took them to Grace Hospital.

#### SAID NOTHING

Nothing was said at that time by the two about Fraser having been in the car.

One of them said during the ambulance ride to Windsor that the driver was dead in the car.

Fraser's body was found in the car about 4:30 a.m. by Douglas Lucier, owner of the hotel, and Gerald Sinisac, operator of a nearby garage.

The two men went in search of the car after calling police and ambulance for Guitard and Kincaid. When they found it Fraser's a body was slumped over the wheel. Police arrived within minutes tand a second call was made to Windsor Ambulance. The body was paken to the Windsor morgue, where it is being held pending a doossible post mortem.

Cause of death was not immediately known.

Hospital authorities said this morning neither Kincaid nor Guitard is in serious condition. Both were shaken up and "confused."

## Oldcastle Man Displays Ultimate in Courage = Harry Fraser Battles To Regain Lost Health

Loses Voice, Memory by Paralysis But Works Daily at Recovery

A spark of hope is being built into a new life by Harry Fraser, 47, Oldcastle, who lost use of his voice, both legs and one arm from being twice stricken by crippling illnesses.

Does he have hope of returning he did after he recovered was

"He sure does and I'm certain he's going to make it," said Mr. Fraser's wife, Loretta. "He's really working toward recovery."

He wears the brace to this day. "He studied at night school and dialogue in accounting."

With no memory of the alphabet, common househol objects and even the names of parts of his body, Mr. Fraser is slowly but surely wending his way along the road back to normal life. He is learning to write with his left hand but is desperately handicapped because he forgot the alphabet in a stroke suffered 13 months

Then his hospital bed was noved into his home and Mr. Fraser began to work toward ecovery

Mr. Fraser learned young just ow tough life can be.

At 21 he was stricken by polio while working as a spot welder for General Motors. The attack left his left leg para-lyzed, but his fighting spirit won out. Instead of returning to his old job. Mr. Fraser went to night school and bettered himself because of his illness.

"There were a lot of things about his life that we changed," said Mrs. Fraser, "The first thing

won a diploma in accounting." Mrs. Fraser said. "Then he became personnel manager at the old flying school (a wartime project). Later he went auditing on his own."

From there Mr. Fraser went to the purchasing department of Chrysler, and two years ago was once again the victim of unkind fates. The Frasers' son, Dan, 19, was killed in a traffic accident.

A few months passed and the stroke came along. At that time, Mr. Fraser had worked himself up to the position of secretary - treasurer of Ecclestone Construction. Now he is hard at work once again building himself a new life.

# Story on missionaries distorted isolated facts

Sir: As a Presbyterian, I wish to take issue with the article which appeared in The Windsor Star on August 25 entitled "Native violence blamed on missionaries." This article has done a great disservice to a group of people who, with the exception of the occasional misfit, are dedicated, responsible and sincere individuals fulfilling Christ's last great com-

It is true that any missionary (and they are very few) who tries to "westernize" the indigenous people does them a great disservice. However, some change is the natural effect of the impact of the gospel, i.e., cannibalism, devil worship and witchcraft. Enlightened missionaries of any group don't worry about such things as dress codes and tobacco. I know from much contact with missionaries of the groups taken to task in the article that they are only interested in those changes which are the natural result of the gospel's impact on one's life.

These missionaries, much to their credit, will not bend on matters of the gospel. Christ's commission was to

"go into all the world and preach the gospel." — He said nothing about changing people's dress (or lack of it). However, He said nothing either about changing the gospel to fit any one culture and any church or mission that bends or changes the gospel does the gospel a fatal disservice (witness the mixed bag of "Christianity" in some areas of South

But then the anthropologist tells us that these missionaries are confusing the indigenous people and after all, anthropology as a science is one of our 20th century inventions. But before we do lip service to this 20th century god, we should perhaps talk to some missionaries about the confusion anthropologists have been known to cause. Witness the anthropologist who so upset an indigenous tribe in the Andes of South America that it was only the intervention of the missionary he was trying to undermine that spared him from possible serious injury.

I'm very glad that the apostle Paul didn't listen to the "anthropologists" of his day or perhaps you might be having me for lunch one day.

Seriously, anthropology has a great deal to say to us and informed missionaries are the first to take serious note of what responsible anthropologists have to say. All cultures change, as testified to by the wrenching changes in our own culture in my lifetime. To say that any culture will not or should not change shows a basic lack of understanding of human

Basically, I guess the difference is that missionaries love people, anthropologists love cultures. If I have to choose, I'll opt for people every time, even if it does result in some culture adaptation. I can't believe that devil worship and cannibalism is good for any culture.

The Windsor Star and the wire service from which this article originated owe these groups an apology. Nothing is accomplished by such reporting (which, by the way, really is editorializing). I'm confident that this article represented a gross distortion of some rather bizzare and isolated facts. Gentlemen, this is not responsible news reporting.



"I didn't see the funnel of the tornado, but my son, Percy Jr., saw it. It went right by on the other side of our house . . ."

That's what happened at the home of Mrs. Percy Frith, on the North Talbot Road in Sandwich South Township, Tuesday night, and it was a scene that was repeated throughout much of Essex County.

A short but violent storm accompanied by winds gusting up to 60 miles an hour tore through the tri-county area, dumping more than an inch of rain and causing widespread damage to power lines and trees.

A barn was blown down on the Frith property, and the roof on the machineshed was ripped off by the strong winds.

Hydro and telephone service was disrupted for several hours in many areas as lines were snapped by trees that had been uprooted.

The weather office at the Windsor Airport reported that winds hit the 62-mile-an-hour mark, and 1.2 inches of rain fell in the three-hour period ending at 8 p.m. Tuesday.

Minor flooding was reported in low-lying areas close to Lakes Erie and St. Clair.

There were no reports of any serious injuries as a result of the storm.

The spokesman at the Windsor Airport weather office said that despite the seemingly high winds, there was no official report of any tornadoes in the tri-county area.

The winds were the result of powerful downdraughts created by the thunderstorm and didn't come anywhere close to approximating the force created during a tornado.

"Winds are up to 300 miles an hour during a tornado and there have been reports that the force is enough to drive straw through wooden boards," the spokesman said, "During the tornado, absolutely nothing is left standing."

The Windsor Utilities Commission received more than 300 calls concerning downed power lines and blackouts.

A WUC spokesman reported this morning that "everything is back to normal and power is restored."

Individual homes in the Tecumseh area are still being looked after, a Tecumseh Utilities Commission spokesman said today.

"We lost the main fuses at the substation," he said, "and there were three areas that were causing us concern."

A fruit stand on Tecumseh Road, just east of the bypass, was flipped into the air and dropped on its side, and there were many reports of property damage in the outlying areas.

Blackouts were reported in Anderdon and Malden townships. They ranged from three and a half to five hours.

A barn, owned by Wayne Jones, Concession 5, Anderdon, was severely damaged by the storm, and another barn was downed on Conc. 7 in Malden Township.

Mrs. William Sharpless, of Conc. 13, Colchester North Township, reported 10 large trees were uprooted or damaged on her property.

A delapidated barn, which was scheduled to be dismantled anyway, was unceremoniously flattened.

Mrs. Sharpless said the sky became "really black" just after 5 p.m. and so she herded her children into the basement.

"We were only down there about a minute when I went back upstairs to close some windows. I looked out and there were the trees lying on the ground and barn flattened. It happened so fast," she said.

Mrs. Joe Boretsky reported debris from a barn located near the Morton Tobacco Co., on Walker Road in Sandwich South Township, was "scattered all the way to Oldcastle."

A garage was flattened and a fence ripped up at the rear of 1629 Armanda Ave. Some windows were also reported to have been blown from their frames.

Immediately after the storm, eight work crews in Windsor, comprising a total of 20 men, were dispatched throughout the city to repair lines, replace blown fuses, and remove trees and branches from wires.

Traffic was disrupted when huge branches broke off and fell across Riverside Drive at Jefferson Boulevard. A giant limb also fell across the roadway in the 500 block of Crawford Avenue but traffic was still able to get through by passing under the limb at its highest point.

Several cars were reported to have been heavily damaged because of fallen trees.

The Windsor fire department received 21 calls but the majority were reports of fallen trees.

Windsor police reported a small number of minor accidents, some of which occurred during the heavy periods of rain.

In Chatham, some homes were damaged by falling trees, roads were blocked to traffic and live hydro lines lay strewn across lawns and roadways.

A hydro spokesman said crews worked through the night cleaning up after the storm. The fire department had 14 calls in two hours, but there were no fires reported. There were no reports of lightning strikes.

The River Road in Dover Township was blocked to traffic as men worked to clear away torn trees and power lines.

The main force of the storm appeared to have missed Lambton County.

Near Oxley, a sailboat with one man aboard capsized four times about one mile offshore, but was righted each time and appeared to ride out the storm successfully. Colchester South Township police kept the boat under observation and were ready to call in the Coast Guard if a signal for help was given.

Canadian Coast Guard officials reported they were not called on for assistance, but their U.S. counterparts assisted nine boaters to shore in Lakes St. Clair and Erie.

In Michigan, the high winc and storm caused a series of automobile accidents and left at least one house burning.

Flat Rock State Police in eastern lower Michigan reported three persons hospitalized with minor injuries after the storm hit a trailer park.

A pair of tornadoes reportedly touched down in Bay County, sheriff's deputies said, and another was reported to have touched down in Washtenaw County.


Mr. and Mrs. Dallimore came to Cottam 23 years ago to a congregation of people who were meeting in a private home.


