James Snow, Minister of the MOTC. Gammon will receive, in return, the first set of the special amateur radio operator's plates from Snow.

Bob Gammon's hobby has helped make 5,000 amateur radio operators very happy, and when you see the designation VE3 on Ontario plates, you'll know why.

Mr. Gammon's hobby is collecting licence plates, and it was his collection that was largely responsible for helping convince the Ontario government to issue special licence plates to ham radio operators.

A three-man committee, including 33-year-old Mr. Gammon, who is a ham operator himself, made a presentation to James Snow, minister of transport and communications last December, in an effort to convince him to issue the special plates to licenced operators.

His visual presentation included color photos of his collection of radio plates from every province and U.S. state — except Ontario.

The transport minister was impressed, and on March 18 announced the government's plan to issue the plates. The new plates will begin with the designation VE3; the radio operator's call letters follow.

Mr. Gammon, an ambulance driver for the Ontario ministry of health for the past six years, started collecting the plates in 1970.

"Soon I had them from 40 states. I wanted the remaining 10, got them, then the Canadian provinces, and it just ballooned from there", he said.

Today the resident of Sandwich South Township has 600, valued at \$500, the most expensive being a \$25 Yukon plate.

Mr. Gammon, married for two years, has 200 of his

plates prominently displayed on the walls of his radio room. The remaining are filed, indexed, boxed and kept ready to trade or sell.

Aside from the common plates, he has 10 Bicentennial plates of the 20 that have been issued; eight amateur radio plates from the Yukon, and of course the first radio plate issued by Ontario.

There's the Governor's plate from New Jersey; National Guard plates from six states; disabled veterans' plates from Kentucky and Tennessee; the extra plate made for the Wisconsin resident who was awarded the congressional medal of honor (these plates never expire); some foreign plates from Mexico, the Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico, the Canal Zone and Guam."

"There's one from American Samoa which is shaped like a palm tree, measuring 10 by 14 inches. I also have plates from the Northwest Territories in the

shape of a polar bear", he said.

Mr. Gammon is one of an estimated 1,900 licence plate collectors. They belong to an organization called the Auto Licence Plate Collector Association (ALPCA), founded in 1948. An annual fee of \$10 entitles members to a roster of the 190 other collectors, a bi-monthly newsletter which contains feature articles on collectors and their collections, and an advertisement section in the back.

The association also holds yearly conventions. License plates are brought and adjudged in such categories as "most unusual" and "oldest". A huge buy-and-swap period follows.

"I won a ribbon last April in Michigan for my Canadian ham radio display," Mr. Gammon said.

And with the addition

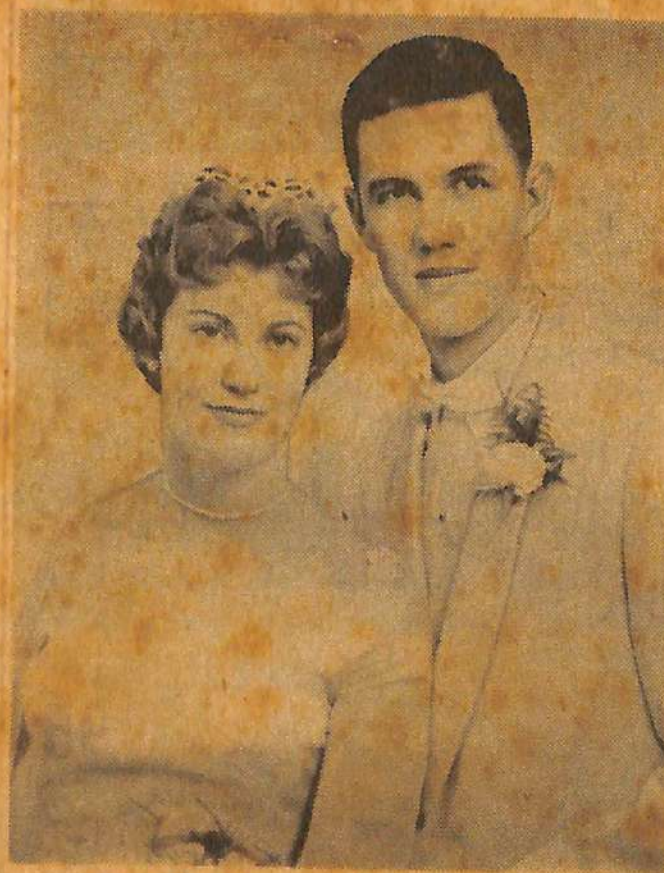

## Essex County's pork producers elect new executive

For Essex County's pork producers, 1986 held fair prices, but with agriculture the future is never predictable, the county's association was told at its annual meeting.

Three resolutions were approved at the meeting, and the executive was elected, says Perry Pearce, of RR 3, Wheatley.

The Ontario Federation of Agriculture's resolution to restrict imports of agricultural products made with chemicals (such as Alachlor) found support with the Essex pork association.

The resolution was approved and will be forwarded to the Ontario Pork Producers' Marketing Board. From there, if accepted, it will be presented to both the provincial and federal governments.

Also approved was a resolution for the association's directors to hold quarterly meetings rather than semi-annual meetings. Pearce said it's hoped this will remove some of the work load placed on the provincial directors as far as provincial business is concerned.

Defeated was a motion to ask the Ontario Pork Pro-

ducers' Marketing Board to look at setting prices.

Elected to the executive, along with Pearce, were: vice-president Kevin Kimball, RR 5 Leamington; secretary George Vandenbrink, RR 2 Amherstburg; treasurer Madonna Gemus, RR 1 Oldcastle (Gemus is also a provincial director); and provincial director Larry Shepley, RR 2 Essex.

The Essex County Pork Producers' Association will hold a dinner meeting at the Ciaciaro Club in Oldcastle at 6:30 p.m. on Feb. 19.

Have you ever enjoyed barbecued sausage at a public gathering? The warm, spicy melt-in-your mouth kind?

Was it being served by the Essex County Pork Producers? If so, the pork could have come from the barns of Madonna Gemus, Oldcastle.

## The Lady Lays the Pork Production Foundation

The pig breeder at Gemus Farms is attractive 27 year old Madonna Gemus.

She operates a 360-sow farm that produces about 7,000 weaner pigs yearly.

Her farrowing business is

part of the farrow-to-finish production at Gemus Farms, Oldcastle. Her brothers, Vince and Craig, are in charge of the weaner finishing. Their father, Gerald Gemus, who is a well known

pork producer, is overseer but it is up the woman in this family enterprise to produce enough pigs to make the business successful.

Madonna's first vocation was selling for United Co-operatives of Ontario. The oftener she made sales at farrowing barns, the more attractive that business became.

"It was the little pigs that did it", she said. "I knew Dad wanted to expand his finishing business to include farrowing so I decided to take care of baby pigs," she explained of her decision six years ago.

Now her routines include castrating young pigs, charting pregnancy tests and production records.

For her start, her father hired a herdsman to take care of the breeding. When he left Madonna felt she had enough experience to take over. In reality that meant investing in the business as well as taking complete responsibility.

She said it is unusual for

women to be involved in the breeding because some would be afraid of the boars. Many women take care of farrowing and the young pigs.

"It's all in the handling. The boars are typical of all males, you have to let them think they are in charge," she joked.

As she talks about boar selection she refers to charts on the walls of her barn office that tell when sows were mated and to what boar, how many pigs they produced, when heat period is due. Genetic deficiencies in the piglets are noted. If there is a problem common to several litters, checking the records will tell if they all had the same sire. If so, his days are ended.

She tried artificial insemination to avoid in-breeding but didn't get a good conception rate.

"I get a better rate from drawing semen from my own boars". She frequently uses this for inseminating gilts.

All of her sows are York-Landrace so to replenish her stock she has some boars of the same cross. For fresh blood lines, dad assists in making the selection of sires to be purchased.

"You are always learning. If you screw up you may not see the results for four months down the road (gestation period) but at least you will know for next time."

The sows are housed in separate stalls and moved along in rotation to the end of the line, arriving when they should be ready to go to the farrowing crates.

"We move them on a Saturday morning and they are usually due the next Thursday".

Madonna checks those in the section that should be in heat, sees that they are bred, and six weeks later does a

pregnancy test.

Being in charge of the farrowing puts the success of Gemus Farms firmly in Madonna's hands. If she fails to produce the required weaners then her brothers have fewer pigs for market.

"If there are raised eyebrows around here, it is me they are looking at. If we are not getting production I am asked why. Dad checks the production records and if they are not good I'm asked about it. And if they are good he comes to me about that too".

Her herdsman, Rob Drefke, assists with castration, breeding, giving shots and general maintenance.

They leave the barn at 6:30 every evening and alternate daily returning to check the animals around 11:30 p.m.

"I can't be married to the barn. You have to have your outside life or you'd smell like a pig and look like a pig".

Her commitment to pork production goes beyond the barn. In her interest in promoting consumption of pork she is planning a sports triathlon to tie in with such a campaign.

Two years ago a wine and pork festival promoted by Madonna, although mildly successful didn't attract sufficient attendance to warrant repetition.

As well, this first woman to join the Essex County Pork Producers is a director and councillor who takes the local proposals to the annual conference. There was no problem for Madonna in joining this previously all-male organization of which her father is a well known, active member.

"They immediately assigned me the job of secretary. That may have been a little bit sexist, but I enjoy doing it", she reported.

This 29-year-old woman runs a 360-sow operation that produces about 7,000 weaner pigs yearly. Her business is part of the farrow-to-finish production of Gemus Farms. Her two brothers take over the weaver pigs and raise them for market, to be some of the food your neighbour grows.

Their father, Gerald Gemus is overseer but it is up to the woman of the family, Madonna, to produce enough pigs to make it all successful.

The eldest of six daughters, she decided to become a pig producer on the family farm. It was the little pigs that captivated her.

"I knew Dad wanted to expand to include farrowing so I decided to take care of the baby pigs."

That was eight years ago.

Farrowing refers to care of the sows, breeding them and production of piglets. A farrow-to-finish business means raising pigs from birth to market weight. Some farmers buy pigs after they are weaned; i.e. weaner pigs, and grow them until they reach market size. That is called a finishing business in the pork world.

Neat in denims and heavy boots, her blond hair smartly styled, Madonna takes charge of the breeding, farrowing (the birth), and care of the piglets.

"When people think of women working in the pig barn, they expect they look after the baby pigs. Women might be afraid of the boars (male pigs)."

And there is a heavy responsibility. "If you screw up you may not see the results for four months down the road."

That's the time it takes to prove whether the mating has been successful.

As she talks about boar selection she refers to her wall charts in her barn office that record when each sow was mated and to what boar, how many pigs were produced and when the next mating period is due. Genetic deficiencies in the piglets are noted. If there is a problem common to several litters, the records will tell if they all had the same sire. If so, his days are ended.

Being in charge of the farrowing puts the success of the Gemus Farms in Madonna's capable hands. If she fails to produce the required weaned pigs then her brothers have fewer pigs for market.

"If there are raised eyebrows around here it is me they are looking at," Madonna jokes. "If we are not getting production Dad checks the records and I am asked why. And if they are good he comes to me about that, too."

Madonna hires a herdsman to assist with castration of the male piglets, breeding, giving shots to prevent disease. They leave the barn at 6:30 every evening after a day that started early in the morning. They take turns returning at 11:30 p.m. to check that all is well with the animals.

Madonna's work in producing pork for your barbecue goes beyond the barn. You may meet her stylishly dressed, as she makes contacts to promote the use of pork.

As well, she is the first woman to join the Essex County Pork Producers and has acted as director, secretary, and a councillor, who takes local proposals to pork producers' conferences.

An Essex area corn producer recently won honours in the PAG Paymaster Yield Contest for 1985. Craig Gemus was among the top three. Stan Dixon led the field in Middlesex county with a record 188.8 bushels/acre with PAG SX 123. In Kent county, Rene Verlinde's 183.2 bushels/acre with PAG 839 earned him first place in this hybrid category, while Craig Gemus

of Essex county achieved 156.4 bushels/acre with PAG SX 239 for the lead in this category.

PAG spokesperson Peter Robinson said the annual yield contest had attracted a record number of participants in 1985. "We're seeing greater interest in the Paymaster Yield Club from larger more successful producers -- the type of farmer

who has large crop or livestock production goals and who needs a greater degree of predictability for all his outputs."

Mr. Robinson also felt that the increased interest in PAG's Paymaster Contest was a direct result of the several new hybrids introduced by the Princeton company for the '85 season.

## Dead Driver at Wheel As Car Crashes Garage

A brand-new car with a dead Maidstone man at the wheel crashed wildly through a 50-yard lot off Walker road Saturday afternoon, smashing through a wire fence, a frame garage and into another car before finally coming to a halt.

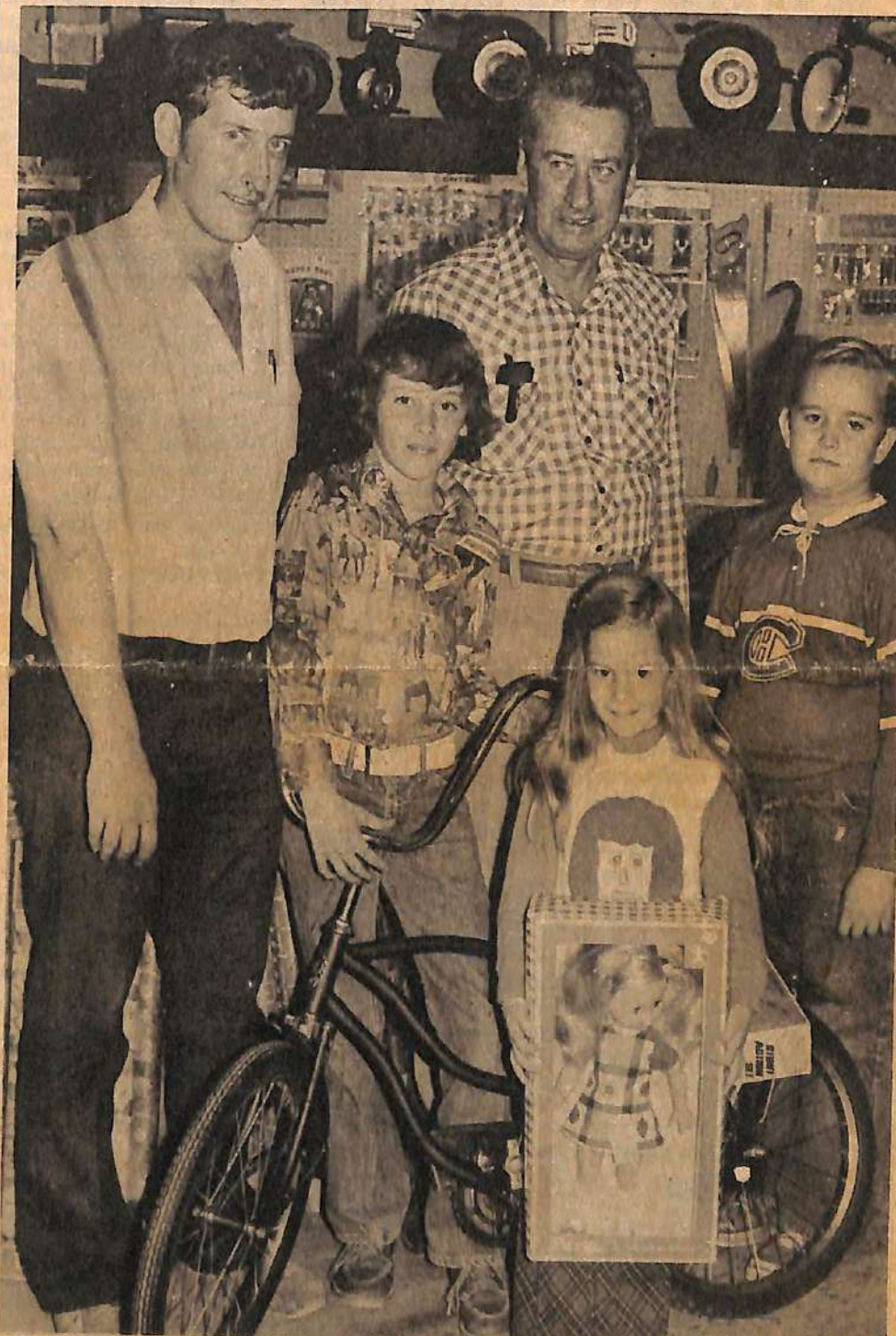

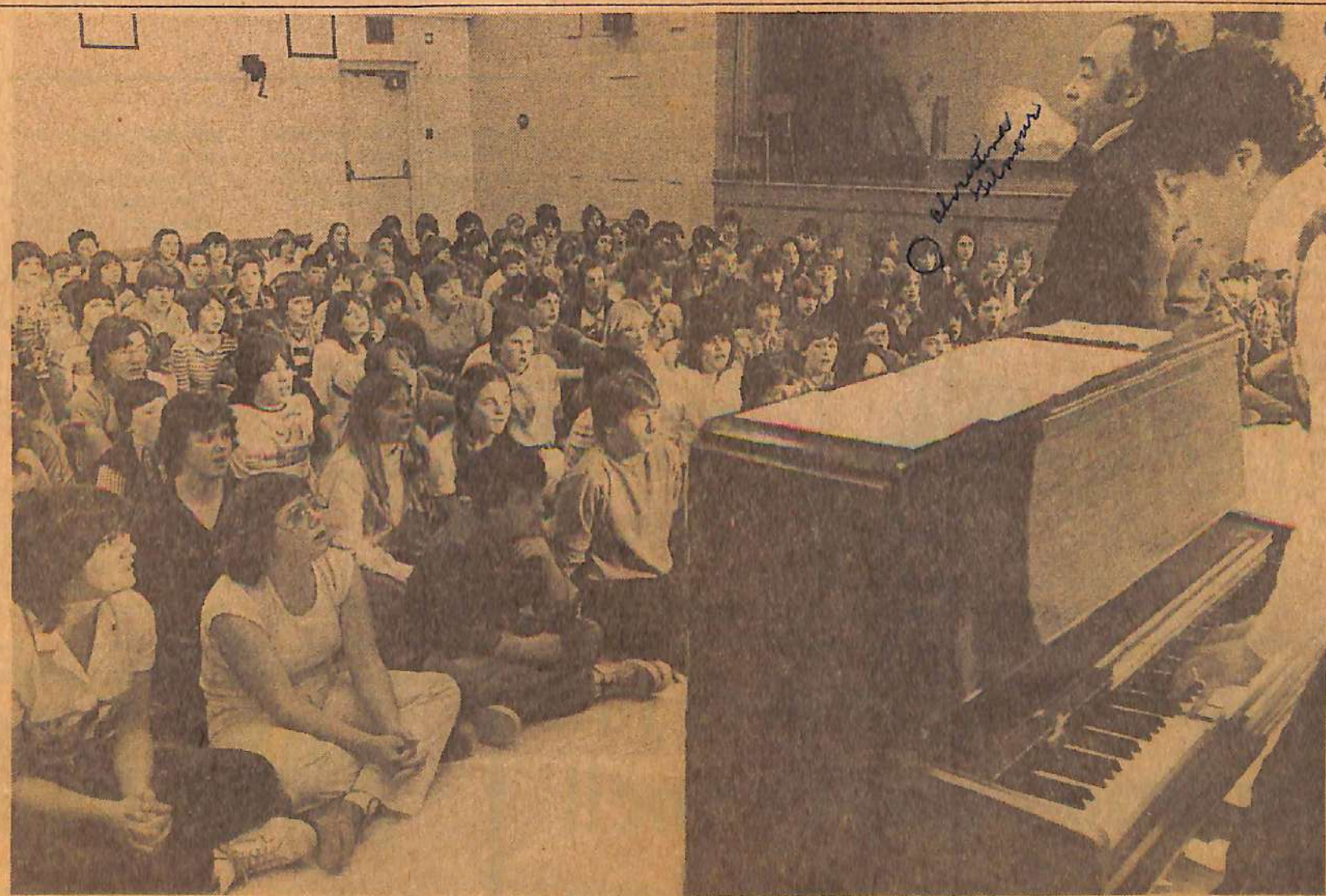

# Old marine relives his day of glory

Richard Collier was just 18 years old and had been in the Royal Marines less than a year when he and his regiment embarked on what was to become one of the most important expeditions in Britain's naval history.

On April 23, 1918, St. George's Day, a force of sailors and marines set out to disrupt Germany's U-boat campaign by raids on Zeebrugge and Ostend, Belgium.

Their exploits resulted in six Victoria Crosses—never before nor since have so many decorations for valor in action been awarded to British fighting men engaged in a single operation.

Mr. Collier, 78, now a resident of Windsor, recently returned from a voyage back in time.

He returned to England and the sites of the battle and became reacquainted with the men who fought beside him on that memorable day in 1918.

There are only 40 survivors in the Zeebrugge 1918 Association and Mr. Collier is one of the youngest.

The average age is 84. The oldest, said Mr. Collier, "is 92 and fit as a fiddle."

At one time there were 300 aboard HMS Vindictive, the old cruiser which fought the Germans. But that was before the battle began.

German submarines were threatening Britain's position in the war by attacking the ships carrying food and raw materials to the United Kingdom. Their cargoes were all that enabled Britain to maintain her part in the struggle on the Western Front.

So on April 23, 1918, the Dover Patrol of the British Royal Navy made an attack on the enemy submarine bases at Zeebrugge and Ostend.

HMS Vindictive went alongside the "mole," an artificial harbor joined to the mainland by a bridge at Zeebrugge, and landed a raiding party.

Hell was let loose from the batteries of big guns on the mole and on the mainland.

The Royal Navy sank six of their old obsolete ships to block the entrances to the Zeebrugge and Ostend submarine bases.

At the same time a British submarine loaded with five tons of explosives, was placed under the bridge that joined the mole to the mainland and the explosives detonated, separating the mole from the mainland.

HMS Vindictive, badly damaged with her three smoke stacks almost falling, was able to make it back to Dover.

There were few survivors and all the officers were killed.

Mr. Collier was wounded by shrapnel and spent a few weeks in hospital.

Mr. Collier said his last visit to the battlegrounds, before his recent trip, was in 1925 when he went to the unveiling of a memorial at Zeebrugge.

After the war was over he worked as a hospital attendant in England. During the Second World War he worked for the home guard.

In 1953 Mr. Collier came to Canada and worked as a nursing orderly for the Metropolitan Hospital until he retired in 1968. He now lives with his daughter's family on Walker Road, 5325, Oldcastle.

And the trip to England to revive old memories was his daughter's idea.

Mr. Collier said, "She said I'd better go to Zeebrugge and have a holiday in England while my health is good."

Mr. Collier lived for 18 years from Nov. 1960 to Oct. 28th, 1978 with his daughter Muriel (Mrs. Hugh Gilmour) her husband and his five grandchildren. They moved to 25 Milne St., Essex, in 1978 and he still lives there.

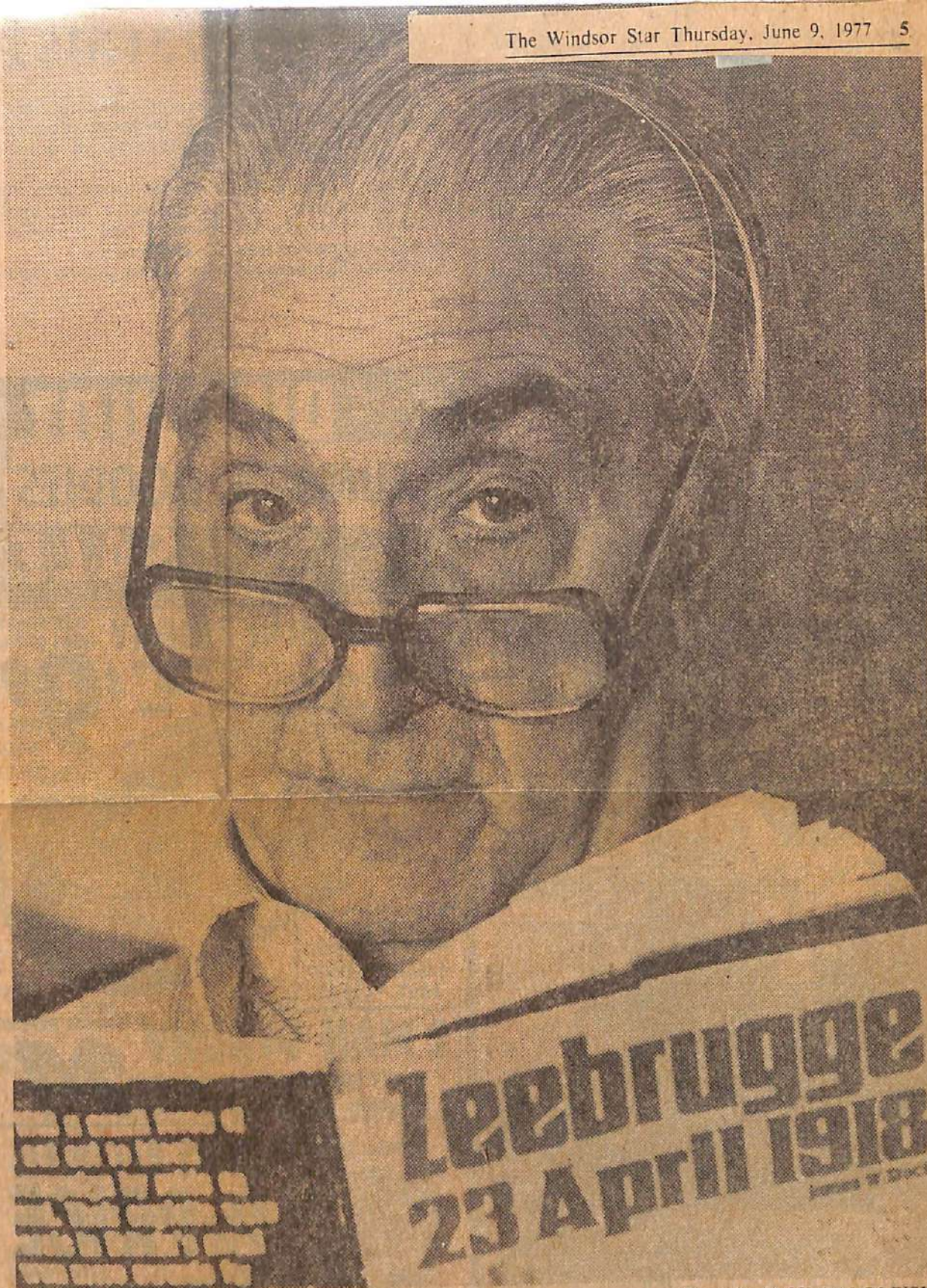

Mr. Collier left Canada for England on April 20. He said, "We had our first reunion in the Imperial Hotel in London after many years."

Sixteen of the 40 survivors attended this year's events.

There are two other Canadian members of the Zeebrugge 1918 Association. Both of them live in British Columbia but neither was able to go because of bad health.

Other activities included a visit to the war memorial cemetery in Dover and a visit to the Royal Marine barracks in Deal where a service was conducted.

The highlight of the trip was April 23 when the group crossed on the ferry from Dover to Zeebrugge for a number of memorial services.

Mr. Collier spent the rest of his time touring England and Scotland. He returned to Canada last weekend.

Recalling his most enjoyable moments Mr. Collier said, "I was looking forward most to seeing some of the fellows—I hadn't seen them for so many years."

And Mr. Collier is looking forward to next year's gathering. He said his friends had told him that "even if they have to crawl to get there, most of them would like to go."

## Learning While Teaching in Japan



A teaching mission has been a learning experience for the Alan Gold family of Woodslee.

Alan Gold and his wife, Margaret Ann, were in Tokyo, Japan, for three years as missionaries of the United Church of Canada. He taught mathematics at the International Christian University (ICU). With them were their two children, Margaret Jean and John.

It was three years of learning a new language, experiencing a different culture and lifestyle. Biking was the mode of transportation, meeting and seeking to be friends with the Japanese was a daily experience and for Mrs. Gold, cooking was a challenge.

The university, established by churches in North America and Japan, is funded by government subsidies and endowment funds as well as student fees.

As missionaries the Golds were involved with the church on campus. "We acted as faculty advisers. There was a student retreat weekend twice a year and we worked with the organizing committee," Alan explained.

As well Margaret Ann held weekly meetings and they hosted Open House twice a year when the students came for discussions. Also they went with the students on

hiking trips several times a year.

Up to ten per cent of the first year students enter as Christians. Many others say they have no religious beliefs. At graduation the number of Christians has doubled, on the average. Christians in Japan represent about one percent of the population.

The attraction of ICU for students is its international status rather than because it is Christian, Alan Gold claimed.

"All that is compulsory is to take an introduction to Christianity, not to make them Christians but so they understand the ideas and history of Christianity from the academic viewpoint, rather than to convert.

The attitude of the university is service," he continued. If they are interested there are a lot of opportunities to become Christian, but it is not pushed on them. I think that is the proper approach."

All teachers must be Christians. Alan, who is an active member of Woodslee United Church, was given leave of absence from his teaching position at Windsor University, to which he will return this fall.

He taught in English with the regular load of courses in the science division in mathematics. The policy of the school is to have 20 per cent of the staff English speaking. Because of that regulation a higher proportion of graduates get jobs as translators. Among the Japanese employed at the United Nations, more than half are ICU graduates, although this small university has about 2000 students only.

His wife conducted two United Church Women's-sponsored groups in Bible study and English conversation, to any interested woman in Tokyo, a fee was required. She conducted also, two Bible reading sessions for students. Since the Golds home was on campus they were hosts to these groups and other student activities.

Under these circumstances Mrs. Gold didn't learn much of the language. The children speak, read and write Japanese fluently because they attended the local schools for two years. For the final year they went to an English school to prepare for return to Ontario education.

"My teaching responsibility was very rewarding," Alan reported. "The students were very industrious; it was a pleasure to teach them."

That was the result of the strict discipline Japanese children are required to learn. It was something Margaret Jean, who went to Japan when she was 11, was ill-equipped to handle after learning our routines.

Her band experience as a flautist was one example. She anticipated the fun of playing in the band as a group. Instead she was expected to practise scales alone or spend four hours a day learning how to sit and how to breathe properly.

A student's decision on an extra-curricular activity such as sports or music was a three-year commitment, no possibility of switching from music to basketball, ever. This came under Loyalty.

A pleated skirt, vest over a

blouse and a jacket without lapels was the girls' style while the boys wore black in military style.

Class meetings were frequent. "We discussed an awful lot of things, behaviour, self-discipline and mottoes, like think, learn and do."

As well they took correspondence courses in our education system. John said it was like going to school twice a day. Since the school year starts in April and they went to Japan in the fall, they lost one year.

Margaret Ann mastered Ikebana, the Japanese art of flower arranging. She has an instructor's certificate so she will be offering to teach those skills soon.

Irregular school schedules made a difference to her role as mother. There was no way of knowing when the children would be home from school and classes were held Saturday morning, a time the Gold family think of as family day. And parent-teachers meetings were held frequently and during the day.

The Golds had no car. "I did my grocery shopping on a bicycle with a carrier front and back. It was a 15-minute ride.

Public transportation is good. We had bikes and rode our bikes to get a bus," Mrs. Gold explained.

And the bikes were safe at the bus stop. Bikes and umbrellas might be borrowed, but if you look around you will find them. It is a very honest society.

To cook in Canadian style would have been very expensive so Margaret Ann used Japanese ingredients to cook our way. "For a long time it was Mid-Pacific style," Margaret laughed. I was just beginning to learn how to cook such things as bamboo shoots and burdock roots when I left."

John learned to make rice balls wrapped in drier seaweed as a Cub Scout project.

"It was standard lunch box food. It was tasty and the seaweed is crispy; paper thin," he explained.

The Golds are the second Windsor University family to spend a three-year term at the ICU. As a result the University has established a student exchange with the Japanese school.

"There is a continuing benefit to the University Windsor. It has set up a student exchange. ICU has done a lot of this, but mostly with the United States. This is the first in Canada. Starting this year there is an agreement for two students each year for a one-year term."

The family is looking forward to this since one of the students spent some time in their Japanese home. And it will provide the opportunity to keep their new language in good form.

When it came time to leave there were mixed emotions, especially when it was good-bye and off to the airport. About twenty people were standing on the lawn under umbrellas while others crowded the living room to bid a fond farewell.

"I feel very much it was a privilege to be able to go to Japan. We had a great deal to learn. I feel I have learned more than I taught," Mr. Gold said in appreciation of knowing the Japanese people as friends.

## Try Ikebana for Beautiful Flower Display

A distinctive way of arranging flowers with style and character is the Japanese Ikebana (eek-ay-bana).

Margaret Ann Gold, of Woodslee, who studied the art for three years in Japan, demonstrated her skills to the Essex Horticultural Society members.

Our term bouquet does not apply. Three flowers in the right setting make an appealing arrangement, when Margaret handles it. Either straight lines at carefully studied angles, or curves that are apparently more casual are the basis. To get this effect, Margaret Ann has learned the technique.

For a few flowers in a wide vase she used a stick of the same height to control the flowers.

"Cut the top on a slant and split it at the top to put the first stem at an angle. Cut an angle on the other end of the stick to fit the side wall of the vase. Put the flower stem in the split of the stick," she explained.

If the flower stem or branch is thick enough to split, she would do so to fit it over the hidden stick.

Branches play a major role in Ikebana and Margaret ruthlessly cut away most of the leaves ... usually leaving only a few at the upper third. Always the Japanese attempt to emphasize the universe, and the seasons.

Flowers are always turned upward as if to the sun, and Margaret Ann balanced them on the supporting stick.

In the wide vase she used supporting sticks, horizontally and crossed, that divided the space into four and arranged flowers in no more than two of the sections.

Basins are as effective, or more so, than vases in Ikebana. A few flowers in a small holder at one side with comparatively large water surface creates a peaceful illusion.

Unusually shaped vases allow for much creativity in this art of flower arrangement.

"The Japanese like to use wicker and driftwood and the whole thing is part of the arrangement," she explained.



Margaret Ann Gold demonstrates Ikebana, the Japanese design of floral arrangements, which she studied in that country during the three years the Alan Gold family was there as United Church missionaries. Mrs. Gold is a licensed Ikebana artist and teaches the art to interested individuals.

In no case did she have more than a few of either flowers or branches. One interesting display was of two branches of Japonica or Japanese Quince, with most of the leaves stripped, but a fruit on each. With two or three small flowers near the base this was striking.

Bittersweet provided the curving effect and with some

brown and green contrasting branches created an unusual table arrangement.

Always cut the stem underwater. "If air goes in first, an air bubble will stop water going up the stem," she advised.

Mrs. Gold is licensed to teach Ikebana and will do so for those interested.

# Japanese Missionary Teaches Rural Advancement



Dr. Alan Gold, who returned this summer from a three year teaching mission in Japan, chats with Rev. Hoshino Masaaki who is working in the London Conference of the United Church of Canada as a missionary. He will use his experience in a rural charge to aid the United Church in understanding the needs of rural congregations.

How to strengthen rural churches is the focus of a Japanese missionary's work in Ontario for three years.

Rev. Hoshino Masaaki is working in the St. Paul's Botany four-point charge between Chatham and Ridgeway in the London Conference, until the end of 1985. Then he will work at the conference office on the rural life committee.

He was asked by the conference to aid in rehabilitation of the United Church of Canada rural churches.

The Japanese minister has served a rural charge in Northern Japan for 17 years and has experience on various rural committees as well as being involved in community activities.

He found the way to building a Christian congregation in a Buddhist community was to work with the farmers in their every day life, influencing them for Christianity by his example. He is using that concept here and in the four months he has been here has harvested potatoes, weeded fields, made cement and helped build a barn.

His work will aid the United Church officials in understanding the needs and problems of those in the rural church, said church officials at a Presbytery meeting in Cottam, who say the church is realizing the importance of the role of the farmer in society.

Brought here by the London conference, Rev. Masaaki will work in the rural environment with the members in the fields and as a preacher, before going into more general work throughout the conference. As a member of that body's rural life committee, he will be a resource person.

Rev. Masaaki was influenced by his grandmother to be a Christian after she was converted by a Canadian missionary. When he was 14 he accepted her repeated invitations to go with her to church. She died soon after and her legacy to him was her Christian faith, he said.

During his study to be a preacher, there was a farm at the seminary where he trained. Through that he visited dairy farms and began to think running one of those was preferable to being a minister.

He is amazed to find Canadians know very little about his country.

"Many Japanese girls know Anne of Green Gables. The boys know the animal stories by Canadian author Seton. When I studied we read famous Canadian books in our social studies".

His experience working in a non-Christian community was different than here but he is well aware being a Christian in Canada has a different value.

"I meet a lot who call themselves Christians but it is just a social custom", he stated. "In Canada the church is sometimes like a social club". He says the situation has two sides; "on good and one not so good. In Japan, especially in the rural church, it is not a social club. It is serious".

Because Rev. Masaaki has some difficulty with English, especially in understanding this reporter's spoken words, we talked with Dr. Alan Gold, who spent the previous three years teaching in Japan, as our interpreter.

The reason for the depth of faith in his country is an 'invisible persecution', he said. Although there is freedom of religion, family traditions that still exist create problems for the young Christian through disapproval by relatives, neighbours and the community.

On the need for spiritual growth, the missionary said it goes with evangelism.

"You cannot separate an evangelistic approach and spiritual life from dealing with social problems. They are together".

"Preaching the gospel is not a purely spiritual question but has to do with the entire life of society ... not just in personal beliefs but a person's whole life and the society they live in.

The minister is here with his wife and two children. Their eldest son remained in Japan.

After graduation, as he sought to become a farmer, he came across a small rural Christian charge without a minister. From there it would seem he was guided to his present work.

"When I saw the charge I could not help staying there but I didn't think I would spend seventeen years there," he said.

He opened a Sunday School but failed to attract those from the Buddhist faith.

"So I tried to visit them but I lacked the courage", he said of attempting to convert them to Christianity.

"But I met an excellent farmer and I began to work with him in the rice fields. But they didn't come (to church). They are Buddhist-Shinto. Many families have more than two religions".

Finally, months of hard work with the villagers proved to be the way to reach the people.

"One day a farmer came to the manse and said, 'I am an atheist and a communist,' Rev. Masaaki reported. 'You work very hard but I never heard you say anything about Christ'".

In the end it was the fellowship that attracted the man to ask to become a disciple of this Christian Japanese minister.

His church has grown but many of the young people he baptized left in their search for employment. With 18 members they enlarged the church. He introduced Bible Study and has tried to create a new rural culture.

"The important thing for us is that we live together peacefully", he said.

Rev. Masaaki admitted the idea of a Japanese Christian missionary coming to Canada has brought questions, especially at the customs when he entered the country.

Of agriculture in Canada, he says farmers have too many machines and are wasteful in their use of land.

When questioned on the latter criticism he said wastefulness of land was both inefficient use and lack of conservation and he recommended a return to the small family farm.

"Where can I find a housekeeper for my ailing mother? Where can I go to meet people? Can I hire someone to shovel the snow from my sidewalk?"

These and much more complex questions come to the desk of Joyce Gold at Community Information daily.

You are seeking unusual information if she or Bonnie Kriz can't help you locate the service you need.

Joyce smiles modestly when she says the credit for the wealth of information available is not all hers; that a lot of people have worked to prepare the files.

She has instigated many of the ideas that are now helpful projects for local people. She has been the co-ordinating person that has made the growth of the program continuous and rapid.

Joyce would say that is her job. And she would add she doesn't have all the answers. If she doesn't, she usually finds one that will lead you to someone who can help you.

Mrs. Gold volunteered her services when Rev. Gordon Geiger was looking for people to work on a social planning council which was organized in 1975.

One of the first projects of the planning group was to fill the need for a community information office and referral centre. I was looking for some kind of volunteer work so I became a member of the social planning council, she said.

The first office was in Essex United Church but those quarters soon became too small. When the Essex Culture and Recreation Centre was ready for occupancy, the office was moved there (115 Talbot Street North).

As the work and program changed, Joyce became the executive secretary of the newly organized Essex and District Social Planning Council and director of Community Information. It's in the capacity of director you find Joyce when you dial 776-6262 for information about where to find various services or read her column of questions asked under the upside-down question mark in the Essex Free Press. She is also vice-chairman of the Essex County Housing Au-

recreational activities, service clubs, social agencies, everything you can think of was published by the Community Information Centre and updated in 1978. It has become a handy tool for the municipal offices. Copies are free to any person.

Her work is most gratifying, Joyce said.

"I find providing information and helping people extremely gratifying. I enjoy the contacts with people in the various agencies."

It's a direct contrast to her career as an interior designer when she worked for nearly ten years co-ordinating style and colour for customers of a leading Windsor furniture dealer. She is a graduate of the New York School of Interior Design and she also studied at Wayne State University after her two sons and two daughters were on their own.

"It's entirely different. I find people in social agencies are very caring people. My work is not the same as in sales where I was selling service."

"In this work I find providing information extremely gratifying. I find I need resourcefulness to provide answers to some questions and I get all kinds. If you can really find the answers to help people, it is very worthwhile."

Her personal contacts with agency personnel gives her knowledge of who can help when you have problems and her work on the United Way budget and program review gave her insight into the purposes of the various agencies.

# A new name, a new charter, for ECS

ESSEX — The Essex Community Services organization has been restructured as the Essex and District Social Planning Council and has adopted a new charter and constitution.

The changes reflect the growth of the service from a three-morning per week operation to a daily service that last year handled 477 requests for assistance and information.

In addition to the restructuring, the council moved this week to establish a summer recreational program for youths in the community's schools and to initiate a study on the need for day care services.

The recreational program is expected to employ six students from May through August and a grant has been applied for under the Young Canada Works plan.

A study done under the Local Initiatives Program

has shown substantial interest from rural students in the area in recreational programs.

The program will be sponsored by the creative leisure and recreation committee of the planning council. Committee chairman Bernard Neice of Essex said the summer program would culminate in a sport festival that would include crafts and drama.

The committee had been established last summer to look into the lack of communication between various recreational organizations in Essex.

Mr. Neice said the Essex recreation committee had been asked to co-operate in expanding summer programs in the town but had declined.

Duane Horton, chairman of the Essex Day Care Committee, told council members that a grant had been applied for under the Student Com-

munity Service Program to study the need for day care.

Mr. Horton's committee was established a year ago to look into the situation and since then has sponsored panel discussions and conducted a survey.

But the committee chairman said the committee could no longer wait for county or provincial action on day care. He said the committee itself is preparing to found a day care centre.

Mr. Horton said he felt the service was needed by mothers who were responsible for their families so they could "jump off the welfare merry-go-round."

The Essex Community Services organization was established in 1975 and a community information service was later set up under Mrs. Joyce Gold of Oldecastle.

Mrs. Gold, now secretary of the planning council, said that as well as providing information and giving

assistance, the council will try to identify trends and needs in the community and initiate follow-up action.

She said transportation for small groups was badly needed in Essex and suggested a service club might take on the project to provide a van to take persons needing medical attention into Windsor.

Since its founding, the organization has set up programs for seniors for the county division of the Wind-

sor YMCA, established a counselling service and offered assistance in public health and children's aid programs.

Mrs. Gold said the legal aid and family service programs are now looking for a location in Essex.

Essex Deputy-reeve Ed Allen said the council was planning to lease the former Sun Parlour School from the Essex County Board of Education for the use of such organizations.

Directors to the council are: Bernard Neice, Robert Hunter, Joan Flood and Marcel Lefebvre, all of Essex, and Duane Horton of Gesto to three-year terms; Hans Kriz, Helen Strachan and Earl Heil, all of Essex, and Glenn and Helen Brown of Maidstone to two-year terms; Eunice Henderson, Margaret Turville and Father B. Clark, all of Essex, and Gordon Olafson of Gesto to one-year terms.

"We try to identify unmet needs in the community, either by taking action ourselves or by letting other organizations know what is needed."

Joyce Gold, executive secretary of the Essex and District Social Planning Council, stated the council's function simply, but anyone who has ever worked on committees will know what a tremendous workload is behind such a statement.

You can call from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday to Friday at the Community Information number 776-6262. Joyce Gold will help you make the arrangements. She says the service is free but donations are welcome.

# Community Services Offers Help

## TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

In his report of the transportation committee, Earl Heil, chairman, said members of the Transportation Committee in 1980, provided 922 rides, 505 within Essex and 417 to Windsor. There were 18 from Woodslee/Rochester, 47 from Gosfield North, 29 from Colchester North, 1 from Maidstone and 1 from Sandwich South. Transportation was for medical purposes to clinics, doctors, dentists, hospitals, drug stores and other health facilities. It served 2 wheelchair patients. A number of rides were provided for 19 volunteers. Several elderly people were able to visit with friends and families in the hospital. A total of 11,585 miles were logged.

In November, for the sixth year, arrangements were made for transportation of senior citizens and the physically handicapped to Sear's Annual Christmas Party. Members of local service clubs provided volunteers to help load and unload and also provided the vans. Three buses were provided by Essex Transportation and driven by volunteer drivers for 100 people.

Since 1976 a bus from Essex Transportation has been used to take seniors from Maplewood Apartments and others to downtown Essex once a week for shopping and errands and once a month to shopping malls in Windsor.

In November the Transportation Committee submitted its 1981 budget to the United Way and a Special Project Grant of \$5,756 has been approved. This year the Council is deficit financed by United Way and accordingly any surplus on the years operations, other than the arising from individual donations and membership fees, is refundable to that organization.

The committee applied to the Ministry of Community and Social Services for funding under the "Home Support Program for the Elderly". This grant which will cover 50% of our 1981 budget was received. The balance must be raised in the community.

## MEALS—ON—WHEELS

The Meals-On-Wheels are prepared in the Essex Nursing Home and delivered by volunteer drivers, to

Maplewood Apartments all over town. Containers supplied by Essex Council through the Sun Park Home for Senior Citizens.

The first half of the charge was \$1.25 per meal and increased to \$1.50 in 1980. All of that is paid to Essex Nursing Home.

The meals are served 2 times a week - Monday, Wednesday and Friday in 1980, 2055 meals, with a total of 468 volunteer hours.

In January and June ladies of Essex United Church are the volunteers April and September taken care of by the ladies of Holy Name Church.

In October and November are taken care of by the ladies of Essex Gosport Tabernacle. February, March, July, August, November and December taken care of by individual volunteers. The report was given by Janny VanVeen.

## COMMITTEE ON LEISURE AND VANDALISM

At a meeting of the Committee of Leisure and Vandalism, the following recommendations were considered:

that the town of Essex should hire additional recreational staff. With additional staff, it does seem feasible to recommend more programs for youth.

the kinds of additional recreation programs recommended by the committee were those which included a decrease in emphasis on structure.

that the responsibility for dealing with vandalism be shared by the public.

that programmes for teenagers be developed which are essentially non-structured, non-competitive and inexpensive and that municipalities make facilities available for these types of activities.

that parents and youth be involved in the planning and implementation of leisure programs and that efforts be made to determine their actual needs and desires through research conducted by such groups as recreation departments or citizens organizations.

publicity in the local paper is necessary to alert the town of Essex to its problems with vandalism and what could be done to counteract this trend.

The Committee's present position is to make itself aware of any new programs for youth that it feels needs support or to whom it can offer assistance.

The community was asked to make more use of the Essex and District Social Planning Council by its chairman, Helen Stachan.

At the fifth annual meeting in Essex Thursday, Mrs. Strachan said, "Let us co-operate in planning for our area. If you have a project that needs our sponsorship consult with the Council and our information service for ideas and materials to assist you."

The Handi-Van for the elderly and handicapped in Essex district has expanded its services and the problems of troubled youth have been a major concern in the past year's activities of the Council.

Its chairman told members that a committee on leisure and vandalism will study recommendations presented by the Windsor-Essex County Children's Services committee.

The Council received \$21,311 in grants last year with more than \$15,500 of that from United Way. Its operating costs were \$22,000 but other forms of funding covered the difference.

More use of the transportation system increased expenses by more than \$5,000 but local donations and grants from service clubs of \$3,500 and a grant of \$7,950 from the minister of community and social services plus an additional \$1,500 from the United Way covered the increase plus the \$3,200 deficit in 1979.

New members of the board of directors of the Essex and District Social Planning Council are Euta Johnston, Peggy Duthie, William Bernath, Margaret Crawley, Pauline Olafson

The social planning council became a full service in early 1976.

## COMMUNITY INFORMATION

In October, 1975, the Social Planning Council inaugurated Community Information as an information and referral service. With grants from the Department of the Secretary of State and the United Way of Windsor-Essex County, an office was set up in the basement of Essex United Church and staffed by volunteers three mornings a week.

Since early 1976 it has become a full time service with one full time staff person.

The office is located in the Essex Culture and Recreation Centre. Two-thirds of the funding is provided by the United Way and one-third by the Ministry of Culture and Recreation.

It helps people find solutions to social, legal, health, governmental and environmental problems by either providing information or by referring enquiries to the appropriate service available. Extensive

resource files of local services and government agencies, departments and their functions are maintained. There is no charge and all enquiries are confidential.

In 1980 there were 801 requests for information or referrals.

The office provides space for Legal Assistance of Windsor to meet with clients one afternoon a week and for the Volunteer Service Bureau of Windsor and Essex County as needed. In 1980, 98 appointments were made for Legal Assistance and 71 for the Volunteer Bureau.

The office also serves as a base for the Van Transportation service for the elderly and handicapped.

The Community Information Directory was updated and printed in the summer of 1980 by a student, Miss Cathy Vadjik, provided by the United Way through a Canada Employment Summer Student grant. The Essex Chamber of Commerce contributed \$250 toward the cost of printing 1000 copies of the Directory. Joyce Gold is director and June Quinn is the assistant director.

## OHC Recognizes Joyce Gold

Recently, the Essex County Housing Authority celebrated Ontario Housing Corporation's 20th anniversary by presenting a good citizenship award to previous chairman, Mrs. Joyce Gold, for her outstanding contribution to social housing in the community during the history of the housing authority. Chairman Victor Penner of Leamington made the presentation.

He heads the seven-member Essex County Housing Authority which administers 439 units for senior citizens, 41 units for families and another 10 units in buildings in the private sector.

"The Essex County Housing Authority has provided many families and senior citizens with decent housing over the years," OHC chairman Allan Moses said.

"The members of the housing authority may not receive that much attention or credit, but believe me, they provide a crucial service to the Essex county community, and we're very fortunate to have such a talented group of people in our social housing system."

"Many of our celebrations involve our local housing authorities," Moses says. "It is not widely known that social housing across Ontario

is administered by volunteers, by hundreds of private citizens who donate their time and energy to help house the less fortunate in their communities.

We're very proud of these citizens. They're the backbone of our social housing system in Ontario, and we plan to highlight their achievements during this anniversary year."

When OHC began in 1964, the federal and provincial governments embarked in partnership on a decade of building public housing.

By 1974, the number of OHC units had blossomed from the original 6200 to more than 50,000.

In the mid-1970s the focus changed to an approach which allowed OHC to subsidize low-income tenants in units in privately-owned buildings. The number of units subsidized by OHC in the last 10 years has more than doubled from 50,000 in 1974 to more than 115,000 in 1984.

At the same time, the costs to provide social housing have increased dramatically. Generally, tenants in social housing pay about 25 per cent of their income in rent. In 1984, the average tenant pays rent of \$174 a month. The average unit costs \$418 a month to maintain, and thus

the average rent subsidy is \$244 per unit per month.

The government of Ontario had decided to place social housing in the province under the control of one central organization: Ontario Housing Corporation.

OHC has grown to become the largest social housing agency in Canada and the second largest in North America as it celebrates its 20th anniversary.

Currently OHC subsidizes one in every 10 rental households in Ontario -- one in every seven rental households in most major cities in the province.

In 1984, OHC will spend some \$50 million in maintenance fees, \$60 million in municipal taxes and \$70 million in utility bills.

To keep OHC in operation more than \$300 million a year in rent subsidies must flow from federal and provincial coffers.

"Assisted housing has grown to become one of the largest and most important social programs in Ontario," says OHC chairman Allan Moses.

OHC provides subsidized housing for low-income families with dependent children, senior citizens, physically handicapped persons and mentally-retarded individuals.

Frances also gave advice on how to prepare flowers for a show.

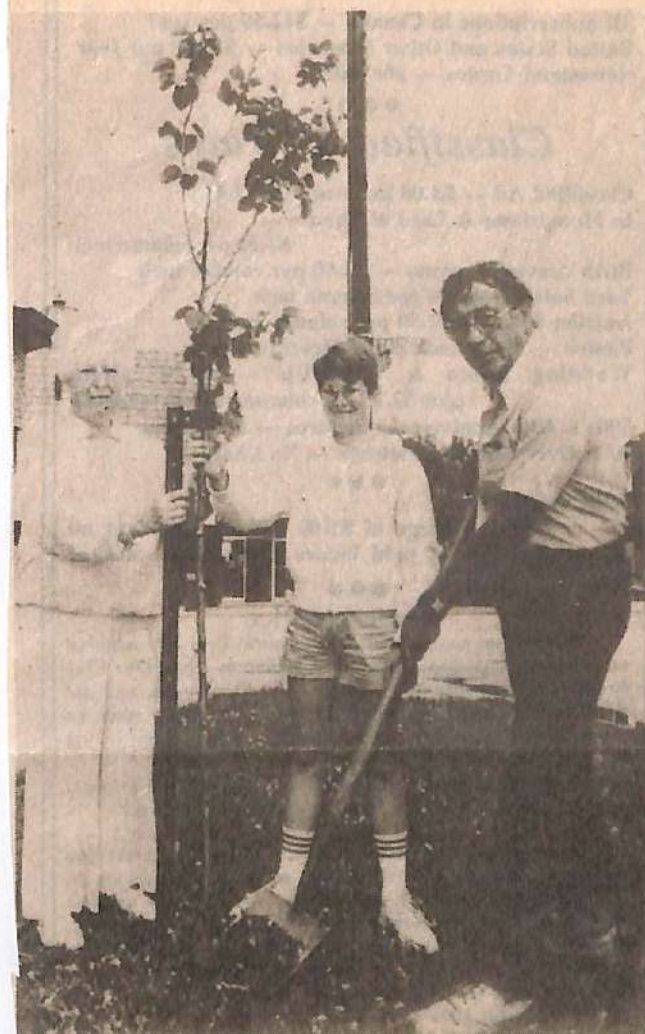
Doris Parr and Laura Tofflemire presented the winners their prizes.

## Disabled woman launches new career with greetings

**MAIDSTONE** — Judith Gould of Maidstone is a Registered Nurse who is currently unemployed in the health field, not because there is a shortage of positions in the field, but because of Judith's mode of transportation — a wheelchair. It took awhile for Judith to become used to her chair but, now that she has used it for some time, she knows that it provides mobility for her and means an otherwise unavailable source of independence.

In 1973, Judith was involved in a serious boating accident and soon afterward she began losing her balance and the sight in her left eye. After months of visiting doctors, her problem persisted. Judith was determined to get some answers.

She knew something was wrong so she began consulting the medical journals and other documents that she had access to as a nurse. Stunned after recognizing that some of her symptoms were similar to Multiple Sclerosis, Judith began consulting with experts in neurological medicine at London's University Hospital. They confirmed only a portion of her suspicions.

She was now unable to function effectively at work and was tiring a little too easily. Finally, after exhaustive testing, Judith received an answer — she was one of the many young victims of Multiple Sclerosis. This condition, which attacks the central nervous system, progressed rapidly and soon Judith was faced with a difficult decision. She could either give up the active pursuit of a career or redirect her

interests according to her abilities. Judith's decision was to adapt to her changed lifestyle and carry on with life.

Adaptions included the wheelchair, a wheelchair lift to get her in and out of the house and additional changes within the house to accommodate the wheelchair. These changes were made with financial assistance from the Ontario March of Dimes, an organization which helps physically disabled adults like Judith lead full and productive lives.

In 1976, Judith opened up new avenues by studying an art course entitled "Printing with a Press". Judith has turned what started out to be a hobby into a successful business. She began to experiment with her new-found talent by imprinting wild flowers on the front of greeting cards. Her proficiency increased and she is now turning out professional looking cards, some with original verses. Orders for her greeting cards pour in from as far away as Australia.

Her initial interest in

wild flowers has expanded into the field of herbology. She is now studying a correspondence course in herbal medicine and feels North Americans should pay more attention to natural cures for stresses in our hectic lives.

Judith believes in herself and takes pride in her artistic contribution. Even though her lifestyle took a tragic turn she has accepted the challenge of overcoming her disability.

OLDCASTLE — A symbol of a way of life might soon be missing from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Gray, Conc. 8, Sandwich South.

If Mrs. Gray has her way the lunch pail her husband carried for 40 years as a railroader will be thrown away.

It has withstood the rigors of temperature extremes along the New York Central right-of-way from Niagara-on-the-Lake to the middle of the Detroit River.

"No more lunches for me to pack," said Mrs. Gray. But she seemed to say it to cover up for her husband's feeling of being at "loose ends."

He was back at the New York Central yards "on business" and to talk with the boys. He was forced to retire a year ahead of the scheduled time because of a bad heart.

He doesn't expect to do much in retirement. "He's worked too hard for the past 40 years."

That's the trouble," Mrs. Gray maintained.

A native of Ridgetown, he

started to work as a track laborer there for the then Michigan Central Railroad in 1918. He was made section foreman at Niagara Falls in 1922 and at Pelton in 1925. He was foreman at numerous other stops on the main line before becoming yard foreman at Windsor in 1950.

They have lived at Oldcastle since 1939. Their only child, Mrs. Elmer Herdman, lives on a farm near Essex.

Mr. Gray, now 64, admits some "rough times" trying to keep the switches open during bad weather but his wife is more specific.

"Many times he was called out at night and once he was out 48 hours straight in a blizzard before he came home just to change clothes and get something hot to eat. He fell on a snowdrift just as he was leaving to go back to work and couldn't get up. It was straight to bed for him. That was too much."

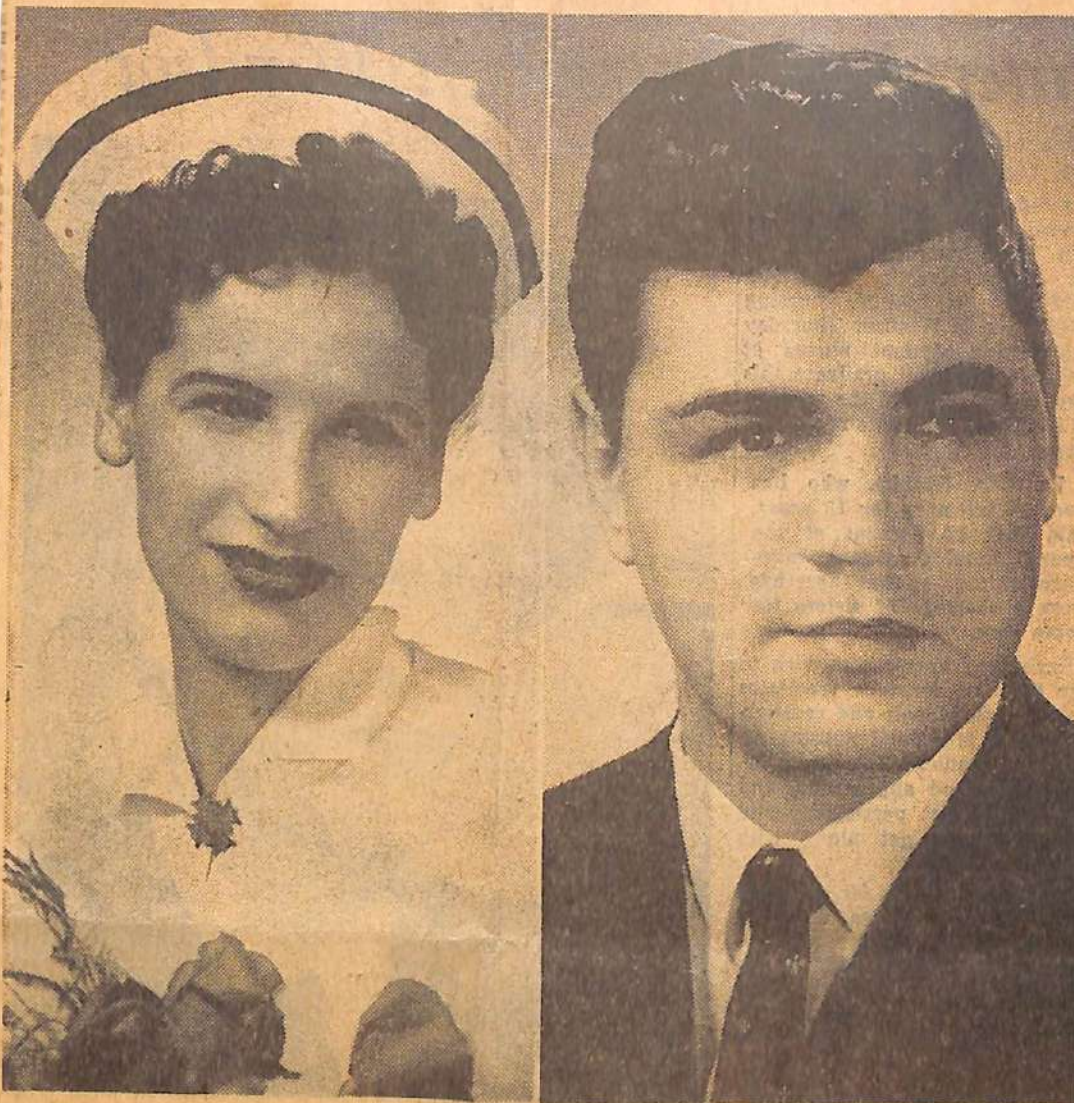

For Your Own Sake . . .



WHAT'S IT SAY — Jody Dicker and his Big Brother, Volker Haas, of Essex, read the proclamation Mayor Edmund Michael has just signed declaring Big Brother Week in Essex to be observed February 15th to 21st.

Being a Big Brother has a lot of pluses for the Big Brother, Volker Haas finds.

He has tried it for nearly two years and thinks it's great. "It's a rewarding experience for both sides," he says.

It was a bulletin at work that made the decision but he had been thinking of it for three years as he heard about it on radio and television. That sign at work, "Big Brothers Are Needed," that prompted him to apply; he was interviewed and accepted.

"After acceptance he was given his choice from the waiting list with the help of the Big Brother agency that attempts to match the interests and personalities of Big and Little Brothers.

Volker's Little Brother has become a friend of all the family.

"My little boy is crazy about Jody. He's a year old and every time Jody comes into the house he is really excited. We have strong family relationships and we take Jody along when we go places with the whole family, relatives; everybody. And Jody makes a great camper.

His Little Brother is Jody Dicker who says, "I get to do different things I wouldn't get to do without a Big Brother. It's kind of like having a very good friend."

Jody finds his school marks have improved.

The director of Big Brothers, Ernie DelPup says the ideal arrangement for a Little Brother association is for the Big Brother to be with him for four hours a week but once every two weeks is acceptable.

"The purpose of Big Brothers is to give individual support, guidance and counselling for boys who for any reason are deprived of a father. Ideal age for Little Brothers is between 7 and 12 and a Big Brother must be 21 or over.

Big Brother Week has been set aside to recruit volunteers to the Big Brother Movement and as a tribute to the Big Brothers and Little Brothers of the agency.

The proclamation will reach individual communities to make the residents aware of the opportunity to become involved in the program.

"We are an Essex County agency to help boys in the county and city. Essex has five boys waiting and we need Big Brothers who will give time, guidance and love to them.

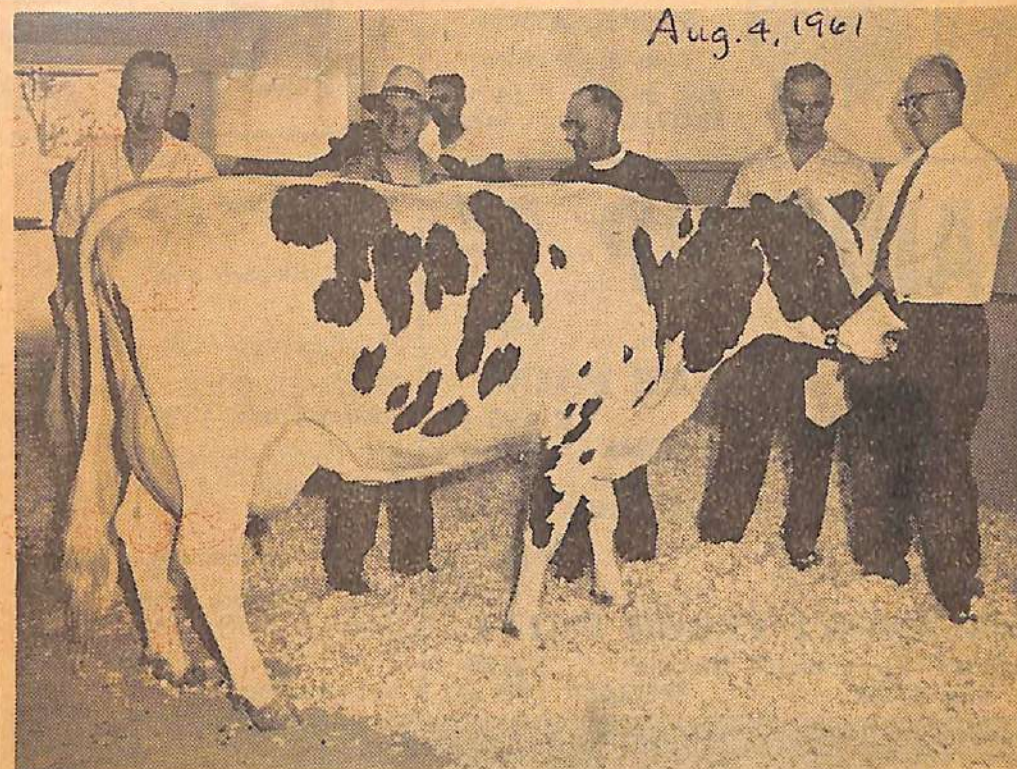

# St. Stephen's Church rector cites highlights of year abroad

## Tells of differences in Anglican setup

By KEN CAUNCE

Anglican laymen in England haven't the same sort of responsibility for the upkeep of their church as they do here, Rev. E. C. Grey of St. Stephen's Anglican Church, RR 1, Oldcastle, said.

The rector recently returned from Great Britain after a year's exchange of pulpits with Rev. Peter Ralph-Bowman.

Mr. Grey served the village churches of East Camel and Queen Camel, Somerset, in southwest England.

In making remarks on the differences between the two, (which were not meant as criticisms,) Mr. Grey said in England, the people don't feel as responsible for their clergymen.

"You're living under glebe-lands. Part of your income comes from the rental of those lands."

The salaries are paid out of the church commissioner's office in London. The amount the parish actually pays is about one-sixth of the salary, Mr. Grey said.

"Here the parishioners pay for the rectory and for renovations. They're responsible to see that I'm comfortable and happy," he said.

He added that though the

administration of the two churches is different, there is a stronger and growing feeling in England in favor of the Canadian way or responsible laymen.

In the Diocese of Huron, there is a three day annual

synod. In England, it lasts one day, and the laymen do not really have much responsibility, Mr. Grey said.

A native of Northumberland, Mr. Grey said one value of exchanges is that visiting England "would give you a contact with history. It sobers you up to think about it."

## Rector Going to U.K. For Year's Exchange

A 62-year-old minister is leaving his two churches near Oldcastle for a year as minister at two 13th-century-built churches in southwest England.

Rev. E. C. Grey, rector of St. Stephen's Anglican Church near Oldcastle and Church of the Redeemer, Colchester North Township, will leave Wednesday for England. The boat leaves Montreal Thursday.

The exchange of pulpits takes effect Oct. 17 and ends Oct. 9, 1966. Coming from the more than 700-year-old churches in Queen Camel and East Camel, Somerset, will be Rev. Peter Bowman and his wife.

Mrs. Grey said the exchange was arranged by the bishop of Huron and the bishop of Bath in Wells.

Such exchanges "don't happen too often," Mr. Grey said, but he wanted the trip for personal reasons. He left England 35 years ago, and he and his wife, who will accompany him, have friends and relatives they wish to visit.

They have a 17-year-old daughter, Margaret, to see. She is a student apprentice at an equestrian school near Sirencester.

Besides the tradition, the churches Mr. Grey will take over have other features. The bells at the Queen Camel church are said to have the heaviest peal in the world for six units.

The West Camel church tower is 86 feet high. "The rectory had a new addition put on in 1830," Mr. Grey said.

The two villages have a combined population of about 900 persons.

Mr. Grey, who has been at St. Stephen's for 5½ years and is still rector despite the trip, is taking a month's holiday in England and Ireland before settling in West Camel.

Both clergymen are leaving their material possessions to each other. Mr. Grey can look forward to a 1939 Rover car. Mr. Bowman will have the facilities here.

He is expected in Windsor about Oct. 11.

In one of his own churches there was a wooden screen that still stands between the choir and the congregation for more than 500 years ago.

The bells of one of the churches had been there before the Reformation, he said.

Another feature of ministering in England is that the Anglican Church there is the state church — which means that the Anglican parson is the parson for the whole village.

"He has a responsibility for all the people of the community, no matter what their religion," Mr. Grey said.

"Here, I'm just another minister," he said.

One highlight of the year was the proximity of Lord (G.F.) Fisher of Lambeth, the former Archbishop of Canterbury, who he visited.

He had sort of a "loose arrangement" as a curate in a nearby village, Mr. Grey said.

Another highlight for the St. Stephen's rector was the visit to Coventry Cathedral, a structure he found "in touch with the times."

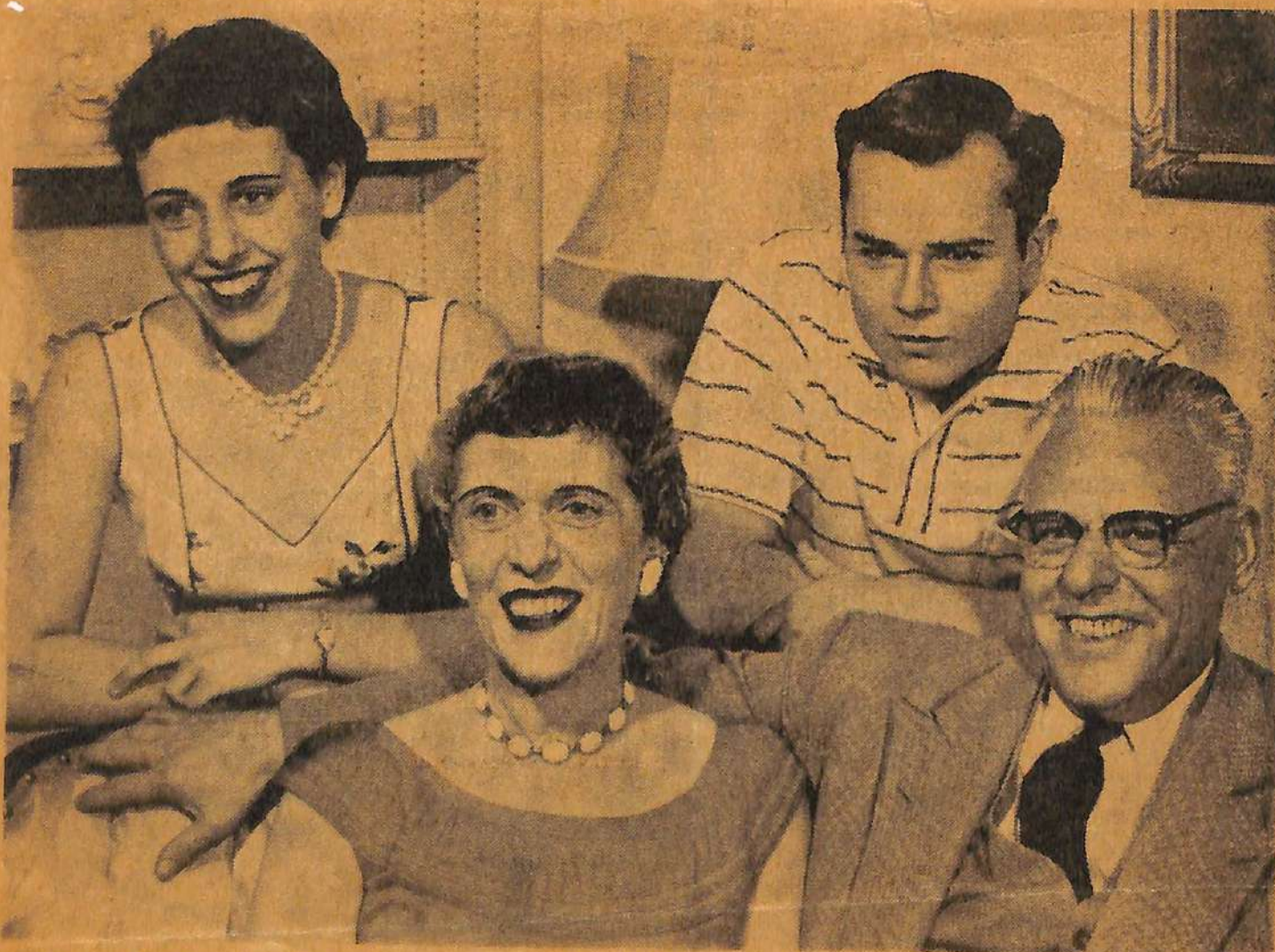

# Prominent soldier, ex-MPP dies at 82

Lt.-Col. William Griesinger, 82, prominent soldier, politician and businessman, died today at Metropolitan General Hospital.

Col. Griesinger, a native of Windsor, had been in failing health for several months and was taken to hospital late Tuesday night.

He was admitted to hospital for a checkup a week ago but had returned to his home at Central Park Lodge.

Anderson Funeral Home is in charge of funeral arrange-

ments, which are incomplete.

Col. Griesinger was a Progressive Conservative MPP for Windsor-Sandwich from 1945 until he resigned in 1958 and served as minister without portfolio in 1946 in Premier George Drew's cabinet.

Later that year, he was appointed chairman of the Ontario Liquor Control Board.

In 1949, he was appointed minister of planning and development and became a member of the Ontario

Northland Railway Commission.

He held this post until 1953 when he was appointed minister of public works for Ontario, and it was in this capacity that he directed an early start on the western end of Highway 401 at Windsor.

First elected in 1945, he won re-election in 1948, 1951 and 1955, but lost out in a bid for re-election in 1959.

He was appointed to the board of the Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg Railway in 1960 and became vice-chairman.

In 1963, he became a member of the Riverview Health Association which administered Riverview Hospital and served as chairman for two years.

Col. Griesinger attended Park and Dougall public schools and Windsor Collegiate.

At the time of his death, he was president of the Windsor Lumber Co., a firm he joined in 1914 loading and unloading lumber. He became president in 1958.

His military career goes back to 1911 when he joined

the Essex Fusiliers as a private.

In 1915 he enlisted with the 19th Battalion, CEF, and in the fighting in France he won the Military Cross at Vimy Ridge.

After the First World War, he served in the militia in Windsor and in 1931 became commanding officer of the Essex Scottish Regiment.

He relinquished command

in 1937, but at the outbreak of the Second World War, he was recalled and organized the Second Battalion of the Essex Scottish.

He also served here as area commandant, in charge of all troops in Essex.

He was honorary lieutenant-colonel of the Essex and Kent Scottish from 1967 to 1971.

A member of All Saints Anglican Church, Col. Griesinger was a 32nd degree Mason and belonged to the Windsor Club and the Essex Golf and Country Club.

In 1957, he received an honorary doctorate of laws from Assumption University of Windsor.

He also belonged to the Windsor Rotary Club and was a member of the Windsor Goodfellows.

He is survived by two children, William, who is general manager of Windsor Lumber and a daughter, Rosemary, Mrs. Richard Williams of Canton, Mich., and five grandchildren.

His wife, Adele, died a year ago.

**TECUMSEH'S LEGENDARY** railway station master, Albert "Mac" Graham, keeps rolling along like the rolling stock he once controlled.

A stranger likely wouldn't know by the fast pace he maintains, that this jack-of-all-trades has just turned 90. He also makes a habit of "staying away from doctors and pills."

"And I've passed my driver's test again," he beamed.

It's the good cooking of his 89-year-old wife Janet that keeps him chugging along.

Mac's on-the-go lifestyle is old hat to people who know him as:

● A veteran of 50 years in railroading with Canadian National, Wabash and Grand Trunk lines; followed by eight years of semi-retirement as summer employment manager at the Green Giant plant.

● A 31-year school board trustee for whom Tecumseh's Albert V. Graham Public School was named in 1971.

● A founder of Tecumseh's first Protestant house of worship — Tecumseh United Church,

established in 1946.

● A perpetrator of practical jokes.

● Founder and current treasurer of the Sun Parlor Retirees Amateur Radio Club. He's there weekly teaching senior citizens and the blind how to operate ham radios.

● Founder of the Tecumseh Senior Citizens Centre and Golden Age Club in 1974.

● Founder of the Tecumseh Tennis Club in 1978.

● Founder, in 1940, of the Tecumseh Cribbage Club and still a participant on a weekly rotating basis at Tecumseh hotels and bars.

● Life member of Masonic Lodge 521 of Ontario.

● Active member of Tecumseh United Church and the church's men's club.

● Fisherman, gardener, telegrapher, father, grandfather, great-grandfa-

ther, good sport.

Mac has a way of fooling people, ranging from his wife to town officials.

On fishing trips he uses his walkie-talkie to call his wife, disguises his voice and strings her along for a while before she catches on.

And he delights in telling how he pulled the wool over the eyes of town officials during the 1939 Canadian visit of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth.

"Thousands of people were around Tecumseh's CNR station. The mayor, Ed Morand, and the town clerk, Volney Bouteiller, got word that the Royal Train flew by Stoney Point and wasn't stopping along the way. They asked me to send a wire asking for a two-minute stop for the children. I wrote out a telegram addressed to the mayor and council saying 'Will stop two minutes in front of children. Please have presentation and speech ready. Signed, The Royal Tour.'

"The mayor began wondering about what to say in his speech and Volney went home to get a red ribbon and a bunch of peonies from his garden for the Queen.

"I thought to myself if that train goes through here fast, my name's mud. But it slowed down a bit. It didn't stop, but it slowed down and the King and Queen were on the back, waving. Nobody mentioned anything about it not stopping or about the dummied telegram."

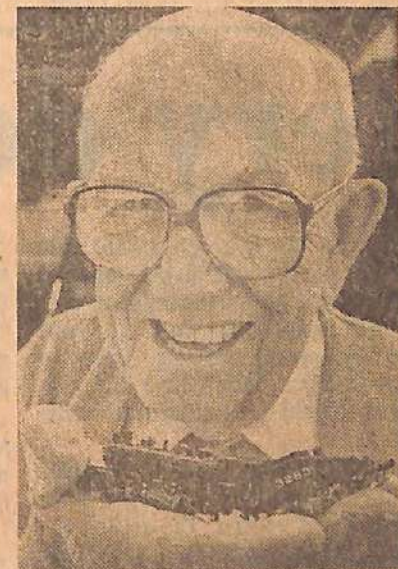
Sometimes things backfired. An example involved Tecumseh sports king and printer Bert Lacasse, who arrived at the station to pick up a parcel one day.

The CNR auditors had also and Mac was anxious to impress them so he asked Bert to sign for the parcel. But Bert blew it when he replied he had been picking up parcels at the station for 20 years without signing for them and he was "not going to start signing now."

He didn't and left with Mac in a pickle.

**THE STATION** "was the place where the bad news came" in the years when the telegram was a major means of communication.

During the Second World War, it was Mac who received and delivered telegrams advising that Tecumseh

servicemen had been killed or were missing in action. He always had St. Anne's parish priest, Msgr. Gilbert Pare, accompany.

"When we walked up the sidewalk, the people in the house would be screaming before we got to the door. They knew what the news was," Mac said.

Mac began his railway career in the Lindsay, Ont., area at age 15 in his native Omeme, where his parents, David and Lena Graham, ran a general store with Mac's help.

He got "hooked" on a railway life while delivering bread to the station. His first job was assistant ticket-selling agent, checking baggage and handling express for \$48 a month.

The CNR was called the Grand Trunk then.

Three years later he was night operator at Waubashene 12 hours a day, seven days a week, for \$71 a month.

**MAC MET**, his future wife Janet Davenport, when he was transferred to Midland as night operator. He met her on the phone — she was a Bell Canada night supervisor.

It was Janet who gave him the nickname, Mac, to distinguish him from another Bert she was dating.

At Newtonville, his wife joined him as assistant agent.

One job he couldn't stand was dispatching trains of seven railroads over the international bridge at Fort Erie.

"It was a rip snorter of a job. I got to hell out of there. There was an easier way to make a living, you know what I mean?"

After five years at St. Catharines, he moved to Tecumseh in 1935 to be near his family in Detroit.

Mac and Janet, looking forward to their 65th wedding anniversary on Sept. 5, have two sons.

## Car Buffs Shine 'Em for Summer Shows . . .

The rush is on to put the final touches on the fabulous street machines that have

been undergoing face-lifts, body rubs, and intensive interior operations in various garages throughout the Essex, Kingsville and Leamington area.

The owners are members of Street Machines Incorporated, a car club so new it is still waiting for approval from the Ontario government for incorporation. It is a branch of an American club, believed to be the first in Ontario.

Car shows begin in earnest in the spring, when the weather is good enough to drive the precious vehicles without danger to body parts through salt-corrosion or accident caused by winter driving conditions.

In case you are wondering, as the Ontario government did when they received an application from the club, what street machines are, they are defined for the purposes of the club as modified vans, cars, trucks, or restored vehicles from the year 1949 or newer. Usually they have a high-powered engine but the club discourages racing.

"The idea behind the club is not to have racing cars," said vice-president John Gujban of Cottam.

"We like the high-performance engine but people think of them with loud exhausts and big tires, driven by somebody laying rubber all over the road. We

promote the image of a high-performance car drive responsibly."

John has put aluminum high-rise intake, changed the cam and transmission, added a heavy duty rear end, to his '71 Duster 340.

"That's my toy," he admits.

Membership in the local club totals 18 with 17 of those from the county and 1 from Windsor, Nick Nowitski the president.

He has spent \$2000 modifying the engine of his '65 Falcon and adding a complete fibreglas front end, a 5-inch pro stock hood scoop and mags.

Once they start modifying they never seem to cease. They spend the winter working on them or on other people's cars to raise money for more changes to their own.

Imagine a 380 h.p. engine in a Dodge Colt. A Leamington member, Frank Herman, has put the big engine half way into the front seat area, moved the seats back, built in a new dashboard, added wide tires and made his Colt wild. Its uni-body scarcely could contain the horse power of the 380 so he rebuilt it with a frame, put in upright steel piping to add safety and make it look wilder, and given it a multi-colour paint job. Only the shape of the body resembles the original Colt.

It meets all the safety regulations, as do all members cars.

"It's so unique there are no replacement parts. If something breaks I will have to make it all over again," he said.

He's proud of the fact he has built it all from the floor up instead of buying ready-made parts or kits. He says he will build another one on an Arrow as soon as he finds one that has been wrecked. The Colt had been written off after an accident.

Winning a few trophies at the car shows is a big attraction. Owners travel hundreds of miles across the country, sometimes hauling that special car on a trailer.

The Essex County Street Machines Incorporated hasn't been established long enough to hold a show because the Ontario government requires a club be organized a year before it approves incorporation and without that a show cannot be held. The year is up this month but it's too late to plan a summer show. They want to run one along the lines of the Detroit show of last year that raised \$1400 for muscular dystrophy research.

Show or not, the club promotes friendship with common interest, a good trading place for parts and advice, a source of assistance, and its standards improve the image of the high performance cars.

Club rules state members shall not act in a way that would degrade the club. The enforcement committee that makes an inspection of the cars at every meeting, changes every three months. A member is ousted if he fails to bring his car to meetings and all cars must

be kept street legal with condition to be maintained or improved.

The show brings extravaganzas of custom-styled sheet metal often bearing slight resemblance to a conventional car; many are powered by super hot engines, have plushly carpeted interiors with glittering paint jobs, as wild as they are shiny.

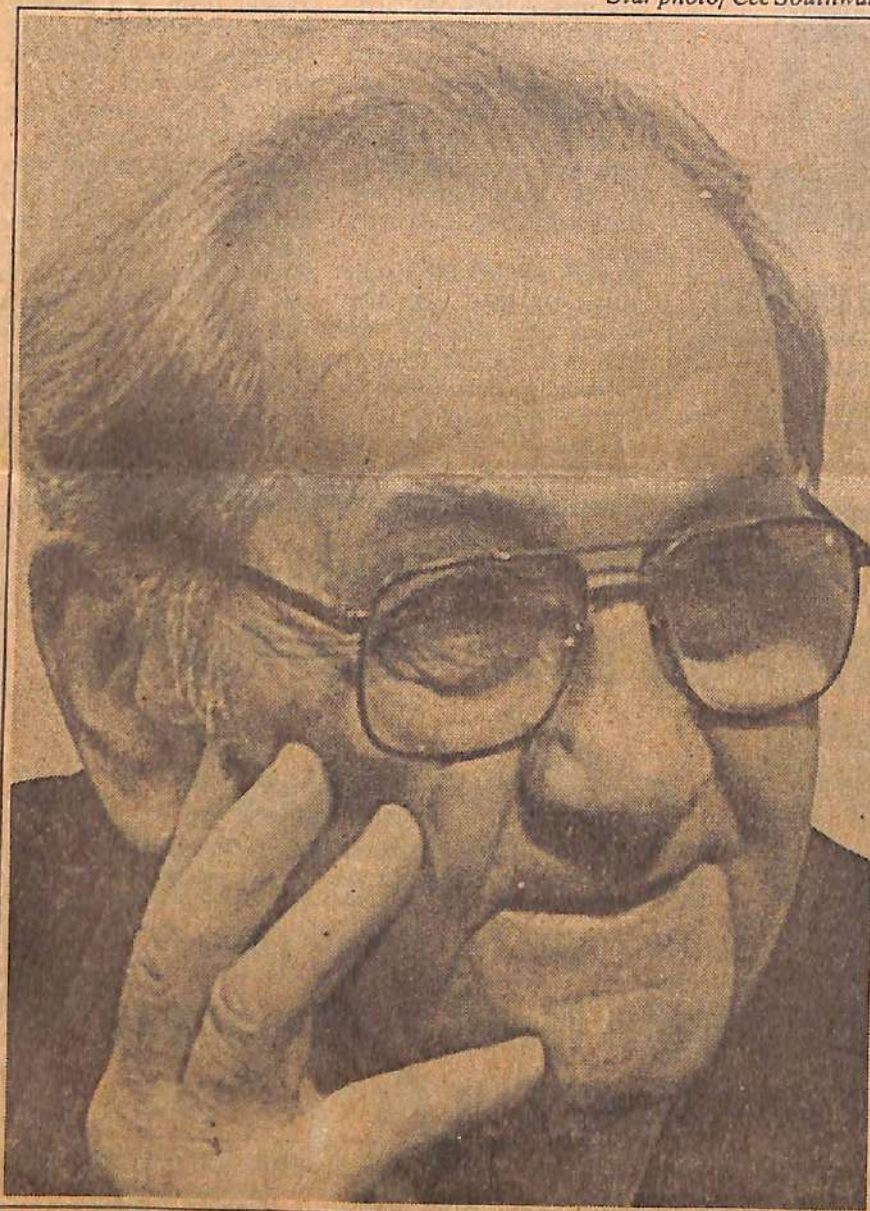

He's a certified manufacturing engineer and founder of F. Gurbin Eng. & Mfg. in Essex.

**YOU'D NEVER GUESS** by his appearance and alert mind he is 70 years old. But, when he starts dropping names of companies and associates that were here and gone before many of us were born, there is no doubt.

That didn't pan out, he said, "so I punched cattle in the foothills of the Rockies in Alberta, then farmed in

the Peace River area during the Depression," he said.

**HIS FIRST JOB BACK** in eastern Canada, he said, was "designing and making die casting dies for Schultz Die Casting, in Wallaceburg — the first die casting company in Canada."

After getting married in 1933, he began working for Ford Motor Co., as a toolmaker.

"But I liked designing so I became a tool designer."

His desire to design and invent became insatiable, so he left Ford to become production engineer at Eaton Wilcox Rich. Then, in 1939 he returned to Ford to take charge of special service equipment.

He was eventually transferred to the U.S. where he was in charge of design and manufacturing of special services equipment made by Ford and used by the military.

**THE END OF THE** war was the beginning of a new life for Gurbin. It wasn't long after, he became one of the first independent tool and die designers and manufacturers in Canada. He founded F. Gurbin Engineering & Mfg. in 1944 and since then, has designed or invented odds and ends like dies for a jet engine manufacturer to patenting an ice tray that dispenses only one ice cube at a time.

Gurbin played an important role in the designing of disc brakes and helped in designing dies for manufacturing army tanks. He also designed the methods used by the automotive industry to weld nuts to automobile frames as well as inventing, designing and manufacturing an airator that farmers now use to circulate air through grain storage bins.

He designed the sluice gates used in Toronto's underground sewage system as well as tooling to cut steel.

**"I LEFT THE FORD** Motor Company organization to start my own business," Gurbin recalled. "It was just after the war. I went into tool engineering and ironically, Ford became my first customer."

Located at the same site at 331 Gosfield Ave., Essex, where he started his little company more than 35 years ago, F. Gurbin Engineering & Mfg. today specializes in the design and application of "tooling and machinery for the production of goods, automotive as well as all branches of commodity processing," Gurbin explains. His company may be small but it is known to every major industry in the country for its innovative designing and engineering techniques.

**BESIDES INVENTING**, patenting, designing and manufacturing, since the early 1970s Gurbin has been pounding on doors and desks, trying to encourage governments and governmental agencies to "recognize, foster, promote and capitalize, any individual of any talent. What I am saying is that money should be made more available to small businessmen trying to set up their own companies, particularly companies in the tooling industry."

He said it is virtually impossible for many design and tooling companies to get started because the governments are not making money available to them.

But that's another story. I'll tell you about it some day, he said.

## Church Provides for Hearing Impaired

The hearing impaired person can clearly hear the service of song and worship at Essex United Church.

A small unit, that can be held in the palm of your hand, has its own microphone to pick up all the sound around you. Not only can you hear the minister when he speaks, but you can hear the congregation singing or reading psalms.

A U-shape device, much like the doctor uses to take blood-pressure, plugs into the hearing unit. Each end of the U-shape fits into the wearer's ears.

The microphone in the unit may be turned off so that only the minister's voice is heard.

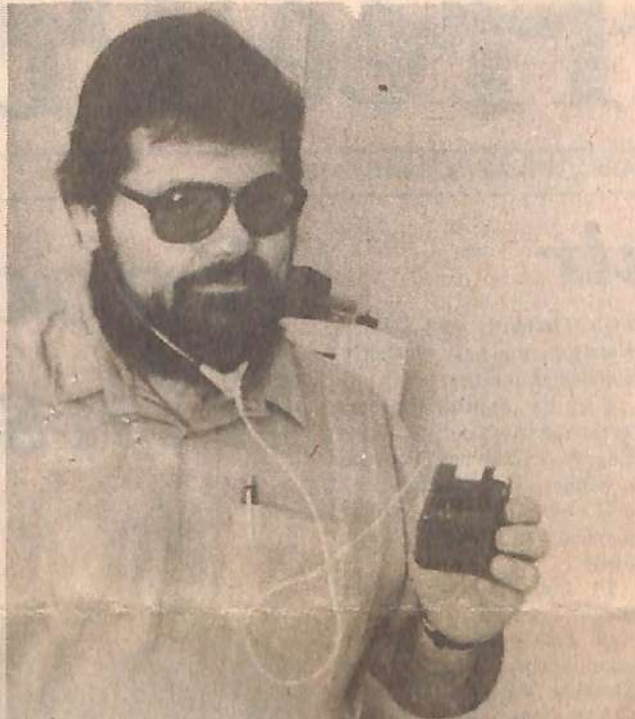
For persons that wear two hearing aids, only a loop of wire worn around the neck and connected to the unit, which can be put in a pocket, transfers the sound to the aids.

"If there are hard-of-hearing people at a funeral I can take the transformer unit and they can take the hand-unit so they can hear the service," explained Rev. Douglas Mitchell, minister of Essex United Church.

"Or at a meeting I can set the transformer on a table and they can hear the discussions with their own unit on."

"The most difficult thing is adjusting volume," he continued, "So it's very easy to use."

The idea was suggested by the late Florian Gurbin who had used it in another church where he visited. It was he who helped organize the fund-raising toward the \$5,000 cost of six units, the main transformer and the recharging unit. More individual hearing units can be pur-

chased at \$620 each. Donations have come from friends and from members of the congregation, but more are needed.

"It is part of the concern of our church for people," Rev. Mitchell stated.

Your name is put on the unit you use so you get the same one each Sunday. How-

ever the part that goes into the ear is easily washed.

All you have to do is go to narthex and ask for one, then get instructions for adjusting the volume to suit your need and you need never stay home from church because you had trouble hearing.

"Everything down here will stay," Mrs. Haas pointed out. "Then in the hot summer we will have some place to go and there will be extra bedrooms for guests."

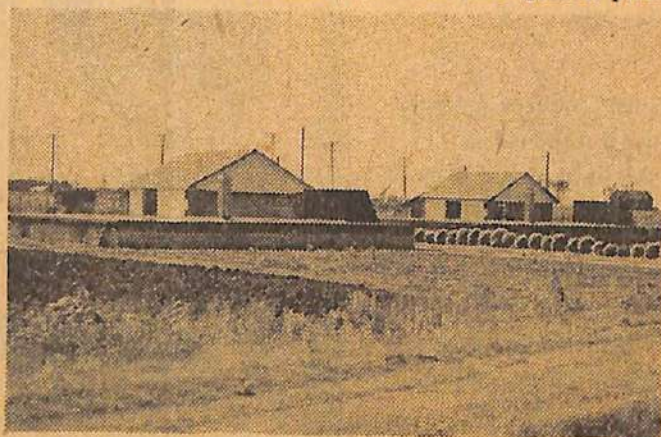
A snag has developed in the brothers' plans. Both work as welders for A. C. McCrindle

## Windsor Plant Hospital Gets X-Ray Equipment

Ford of Canada has just completed installation of new X-Ray equipment in the Windsor Plant Hospital. Costing some \$16,000, the equipment will be used for on-the-spot emergency diagnosis and periodic health checks of Company employees.

In addition, in-plant X-Ray will greatly assist in prevention and control of silicosis and other chest diseases when the Company receives authorization from the provincial medical authority to conduct a regular chest X-ray program.

The Windsor Plant Hospital is now equipped to

handle virtually all emergencies and provide treatment and surgery (under local anaesthetic) up to and including skin grafts. It consists of a first-aid room, eye examination room, a clinic for consultations and examinations, operating and physiotherapy rooms as well as the diagnostic X-Ray. The hospital handles not only emergencies and disease prevention programs, but will also give injections when ordered by an employee's physician for a condition which otherwise would prevent him from working.

During the main work shift, two doctors are on duty, with a staff of eight trained nurses and first-aid attendants. A reduced staff is on duty during the other two shifts.

Besides the hospital in Plant 2, there is a first-aid room in this plant as well as in Plants 1, 5 and 6. All are equipped with oxygen, plasma substitutes, anti-shock equipment, etc., and all are manned by trained staff.

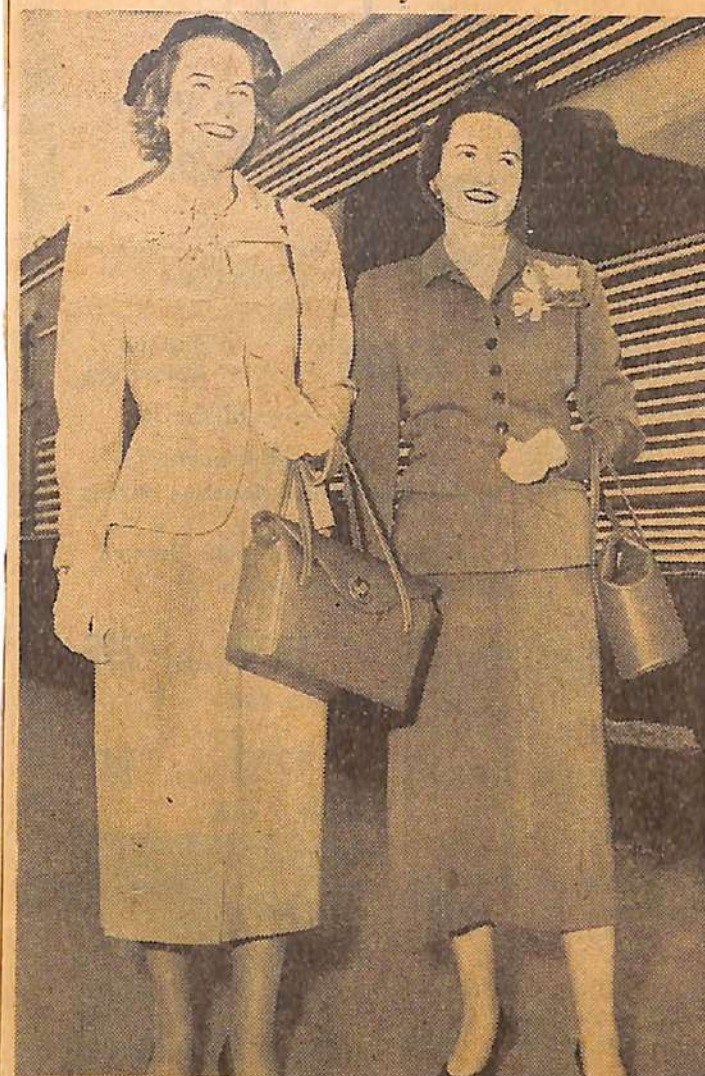

The store has been a landmark in the village for over a hundred years. It was established by the late Thomas Moran, who opened the general store, then composed, besides groceries, of yard goods, hardware, shoes and boots, etc., and who was appointed the first Post Master for Maidstone Cross. He opened it when the first log church was built and St. Mary's Parish was formed. In 1890 he sold out to the late Ignatius Halford (Nace), who was also appointed Postmaster, and he served the community for over fifty years and was honoured with a Medal after His Majesty's Coronation from George the VI for serving fifty years as Postmaster. In 1943 the Walkers came and Mary C., his wife was appointed Post mistress, the position she still held. Many happy memories are linked with the Store and to the older generation, the business will indeed be missed.

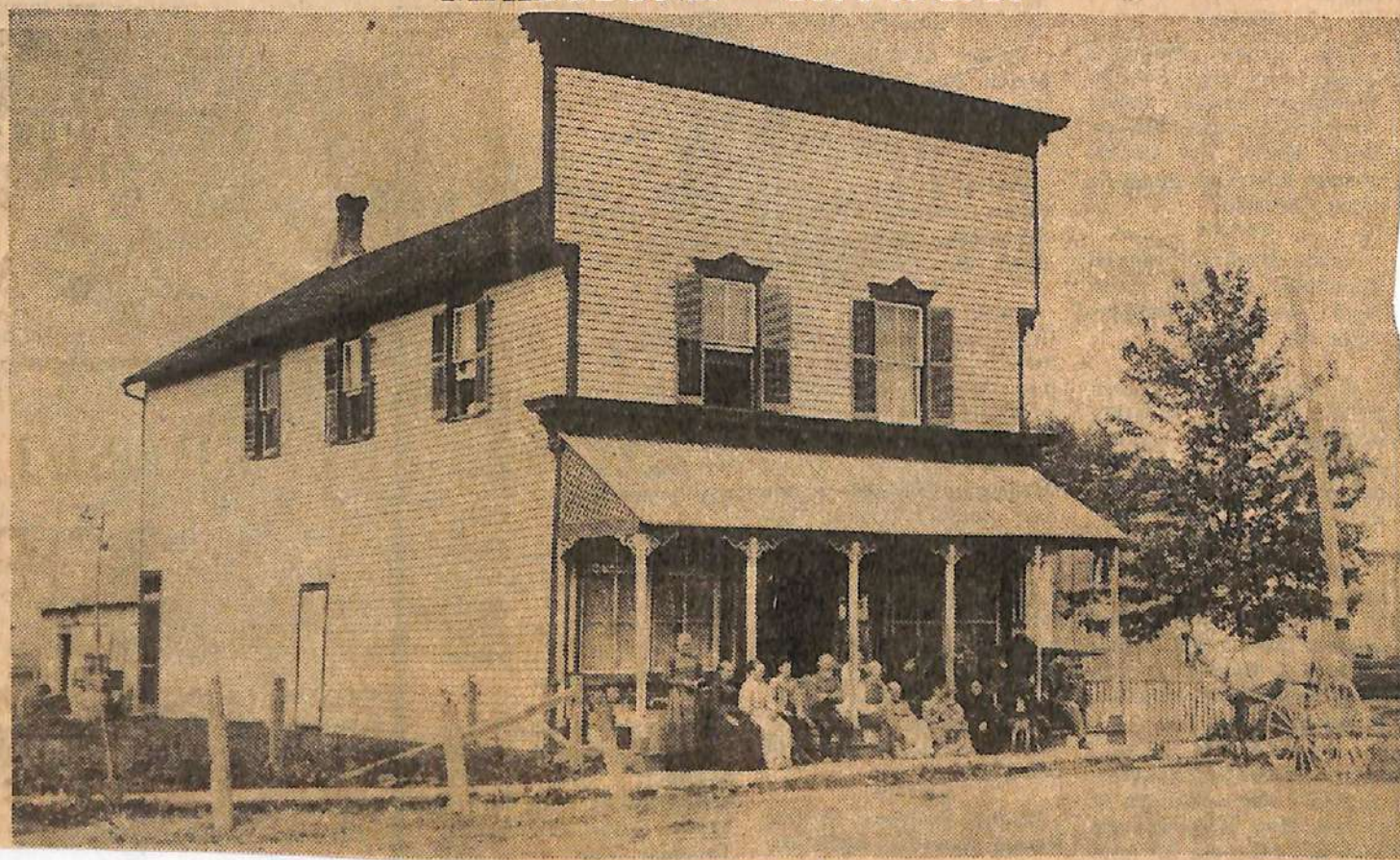

# Couple works at keeping costs in line

The meal was probably fair to good, the wine didn't offend the taste buds and the service was adequate. But when the bill arrives and the waiter wants \$25 for two plus a tip, was it really worth it?

No doubt, many people

think a night out of the house and away from the children for awhile is worth this price.

Some people don't want to spend this kind of money on restaurant food and a lot of people simply can't afford it.

A combination of these two reasons led a group of nine in the Windsor area to form a gourmets' club.

The club's motto is simple: enjoy a good meal and wine in the company of good friends at a fraction of

the cost of going out for dinner.

Peter and Rosemary Halford of Maidstone are members of this newly formed gourmet club. They recently hosted the first meal the club has had.

It was a cold meal that included shrimp, turkey, ham and imported wines. Cost for nine: about \$55.

"There was plenty left over so we invited a couple of relatives over the next day for a meal," said Rosemary.

Mr. and Mrs. Halford are outgoing people who like to have friends drop around often. It's not unusual to have company a couple of nights a week.

Peter is a French professor at the university and both husband and wife belong to a church group so they know lots of people.

It could be a hard blow to the pocketbook to do so much entertaining if the Halfords didn't work at keeping costs down. And they do work at it!

Rosemary makes most of her daughter's clothes and her own. She also sews for her two young sons and occasionally for her husband.

All the curtains are homemade. The drapes in the family room, which cover two walls of windows, cost only \$25.

They bought the material at a textile mill in Hespeler, which is near Kitchener-Waterloo.

It means that a better part of a day is spent driving to the mill, but consider the bargain. It's tough to buy a curtain rod these days for \$25.

Their home has a number of furniture pieces that was junk now turned antiques.

The psychiatrist's couch in the family room cost \$10. It was a mess but the springs were still good, explained Peter. They recovered it to match a chair and the \$25 draperies.

Peter bought the four dining room chairs for \$25.

the middle of Gene Whelan farm country.

They don't farm, but they're surrounded by farms with vegetable and fruit fields.

The Halford home is built on the farm belonging to Peter's father. His brother lives next door and lots have also been allocated close by for another brother and a sister.

A neighbor raises cattle. Another one has pigs. So the Halfords buy their meat in bulk, knowing they're getting a good deal and a trustworthy product.

Fruit and vegetables come cheaply, too, since they usually pick their own.

Peter has just finished picking 200 pounds of sour cherries at a cost of 15 cents a pound.

About 120 pounds have gone into a batch of cherry wine, now brewing in the basement.

There will be about 200, 26-ounce bottles by January at an average cost of 25 cents a bottle.

"Cherries make a fairly respectable wine, God willing, and a little help from St. Vincent," (the patron saint of wine makers), Peter says.

He's been making his own for about five years. He'll also whip up a batch of grape wine and the two lots get them through many months of home entertainment.

The rest of the cherries, about 80 pounds, will go into jam-making and pies. That's Rosemary's contribution.

"She cooks very well," volunteered her husband. Her cooking indirectly led to the formation of the gourmet club.

"You go out and spend a bundle on a meal that's sort of blah and you realize a much better thing could be made at home for a lot less," Peter said.

She makes her own pickles, breads and desserts. It's a great help that the barter system is alive and well in Maidstone.

"A farmer down the road has currants so I march down there with a couple of loaves of homemade bread and ask if he wants to trade. The kids and I pick the berries," Rosemary said.

Peter learned his winemaking from books and Rosemary, being a city girl, also learned to make bread and preserves from books which were often borrowed from the library.

Here are a couple of their favorite recipes. A paper-

back called *The Art of Wine Making* (Anderson and Hill) is highly recommended by Peter and Rosemary finds another paperback called *Beat Rising Food Prices — Make It Yourself* very useful. It's published by Consumer Guide.

## CHEDDAR HOT SPREAD

2 c. cut-up cheddar cheese  
¼ c. melted butter or margarine  
½ c. milk  
about 2T. chopped parsley and fresh dill  
1 T. pimiento  
¼ tsp. Tabasco

Peter found the recipe works best if you start off by adding the melted butter to the milk in a blender. Add the cheese a bit at a time. Add the other ingredients and cover. Blend until smooth. Refrigerate in a cheese crock or a bowl before serving. It's great with homemade bread or crackers.

Here's his favorite cherry wine recipe, too.

3 lbs. sour cherries  
3 lbs. sugar  
3 T. acid blend  
2 Campden tablets  
1 packet of wine yeast  
½ tsp. pectine enzyme  
1 gallon (160 oz.) hot water  
1 tsp. yeast nutrient  
He's had best luck with

the lighter, German yeasts. Use only sound fruit and remove pits and stems. Crush cherries and put all ingredients except wine yeast into the primary fermenter.

Add hot water and stir to dissolve sugar. Cover with a plastic sheet and stir the must daily. When it's cool, add the yeast. Take a specific gravity reading. It should be 1.090.

Ferment about five to six days or until the specific gravity reading is down to 1.040. Strain out fruit pulp and press. Siphon into gallon jugs or carboys and attach fermentation locks.

Rack in three weeks and again in three months. When wine is clear and stable, bottle.

Peter says it's quite dry, has about 12 per cent alcohol.

This is one of Rosemary's favorites. It can be used for a variety of things such as Chelsea or cinnamon buns. One of the variations is included.

## COFFEE CAKE DOUGH

1 c. milk  
½ c. sugar  
1 tsp. salt  
½ c. margarine or butter  
¼ c. warm water

1 pkg. dry yeast  
1 egg  
4 to 4½ c. flour

Scald milk and stir in sugar, salt and margarine. Cool to lukewarm. Measure water into large warm bowl. Sprinkle in yeast; stir until dissolved. Stir in milk mixture, egg and half the flour. Beat until smooth. Add remaining flour to make a stiff batter. Cover. Dough may be kept in refrigerator up to three days.

Grandmother's buns are a variation of the coffee cake recipe. Here goes: use ½ of the above recipe. On a lightly floured surface, roll dough into a rope five to six feet long. On a greased baking sheet, make a double coil by holding one end of the rope down and winding around three or four times. Lift rope and form a smaller coil on top of long coil by winding around once or twice.

Tuck free end down inside centre coil. Cover, let rise until double in bulk, about 1½ hours. Bake at 375 degrees for about 25 minutes.

Drizzle with orange glaze made from one cup of confectioner's sugar, two tablespoons concentrated frozen orange juice and one-half teaspoon vanilla, all of which has been beaten until smooth.

## Language professor speaks of good wine

When a beer strike hit in 1968, University of Windsor Professor Peter Halford wasn't about to sit through a dry spell.

Instead, the French language professor turned to winemaking.

Now with each grape season, the professor can be found along with seasoned wine makers picking through the cases of grapes that pack railroad cars each fall.

"I love it. It's a great hobby and you can't beat the price," he said.

Halford carefully sorts through the boxes and once he gets the cases of California grapes to his Maidstone home he again picks through the grapes, carefully discarding mildewed or rotten grapes.

"BECAUSE I MAKE such a small amount I can take the time to pick the best grapes out of the cases," he said.

Commercial outlets, he added, "are running a business they can't hand-pick the grapes. They just dumped the cases into the crushers," he said.

At the "Chateau Halford," the professor crushes the washed and sorted grapes with a clean crusher.

"One year I cleaned the grapes but not enough," he said. Unknown to Halford the grapes had been sprayed with a fertilizer that didn't come off with just a good rinsing. "It affected the wine. Now I am very careful when I clean them."

HE STORES THE crushed grapes

in plastic bags lining sanitary garbage cans in his basement where he babysits them as they ferment.

According to his wife, Rosemary, their house was designed to accommodate the wine making. "We knew we'd never have a family room in the basement. That's where Peter does his winemaking," she said.

The professor likes to experiment. "It's a lot of fun to make your own wine. You combine grapes, try different yeasts, see what you end up with, and if you like it you make a note of what the wine was, how you made it, all the details so you can make it again," he said.

HALFORD HAS notes dating back to 1971 and says one note says simply, "all gone by February. That was a very good season," he said and laughs.

Unlike other winemakers, Halford cheats a little with his grapes and gets twice as much wine.

After the grapes have gone through fermentation, Halford hand presses the pulp for the remaining juice and lets that ferment. "I make a second wine, a false wine."

The false wine is usually ready for consumption by Christmas, he added. The other "should be just right about May."

Halford, who began with a mulberry wine, proceeded to cherry and onto grapes said one of the benefits is the price. "I can make a bottle of wine for \$1.50. And it's good wine. You can't buy a good commercially-made product for that price," he added.

# Heinz has county 'covered'

**L** EAMINGTON — If you like ketchup on french fries, relish on hamburgers or baked beans with potatoes, chances are very good you've tried at least one H.J. Heinz product.

In fact, it's almost impossible to avoid the Heinz label. The firm produces over 750 products, 600 of which are produced in Leamington.

With \$350 million in sales in the most recent fiscal year, the H.J. Heinz company is one of the undisputed giants in the field of food processing.

Its workforce of 1,500 makes it the largest single employer in the county. The total annual payroll is rapidly approaching \$60 million.

H.J. Heinz has made Leamington a prosperous town, insulating it from recessions and giving the community its identity as the Tomato Capital of Canada.

"I think the association between H.J. Heinz and Leamington has been a good one," said vice-president of manufacturing Tom Halford, the senior Heinz executive in Leamington.

The company has not only provided employment to generations of Leamington residents, it has also improved the quality of life in the town through its donations of land for parks and recreational facilities. It's generally agreed that the Frank T. Sherk Centre would not have been built if H.J. Heinz had not donated land for the building on Sherk Street.

**T** HE FIRM ALSO agreed to pick up any deficits during the first two years of operation. Fortunately, the deficits have been small.

Although a member of management, Halford, 43, is typical of the majority of employees at Heinz. Most have many years of service. Nearly half the workforce — about 650 — have been with the company at least 20 years.

Halford joined the company in 1966 as a management trainee after graduating from the University of Windsor with a degree in fine arts and French.

The father of four still lives on the family farm in Maidstone, commuting to Leamington each day.

Although his working life revolves around the tomato, Halford does not grow the vegetable on his farm, preferring less intensive crops like corn and soybeans.

"I have no conflict of interest in that regard... you have to be a full-time farmer to grow tomatoes," he said.

The 14-hectare processing plant in Leamington handles around 40 per cent of tomatoes grown in Ontario — or 232,000 tonnes. The value of the contracts alone to local farmers is \$25 million.

This year, tomatoes purchased under contract will be processed into 22.7 million litres of paste, which will serve as the raw material for a host of Heinz products — ketchup, spaghetti sauce and soup.

Other crops grown under contract include cucumbers, apples, peas, squash, pears and peaches.

Heinz is also the biggest manufacturer of baby food in Canada, capturing almost 90 per cent of the total market. As far as ketchup — its most famous product — Heinz has about 75 per cent of the market share.

Sometime this summer, the company will unveil a new vegetable drink to go head-to-head with V8 — a vegetable cocktail drink made by Campbell Soup Ltd, one its chief competitors in the food business.

Like so many others of its products, the formula for the new product will be researched and tested in Leamington. "Basically, anything we produce

in Canada we developed here (in Leamington)," Halford said.

Of all the countries where Heinz has factories — United States, Canada, Australia and Britain — the market penetration for Heinz products is highest in Canada.

Not all products developed in Leamington have automatic market acceptance. Halford said he is still shaking his head over the lack of enthusiasm for Spaghetti Starter 1-2-3 — a sauce that only required the addition of water and allowed the consumer to add the spices, meat and vegetables.

"It's tough to break into a new market, where you have established

names like Prego and Ragu. Just like it would be with us with ketchup."

Heinz has a staff of 35 working in research and development. The company has recently completed a five-year, \$13-million expansion which improved its production and storage capabilities. On the drawing board is a \$20-million expansion, involving major improvements to the ketchup filling process.

Although Heinz dominates in the field of ketchup production in Canada, the company cannot afford to rest on its laurels, Halford said.

"If I'm a dedicated Ford buyer and I see another company offering superior quality at the right price, I'm going to go to that product."

LEAMINGTON — When Tom Halford walks through the Heinz Canada plant in Leamington, he can't remember the first names of all 1,100 employees. There has been some hiring lately.

The Heinz vice-president walks the 13 hectares (33 acres) of shop floor often and encourages everyone to let him know if something is bothering them. If he can't satisfy them, they are free to call the president whose telephone number is published.

"If employees are reasonably well-paid and respected as human beings," Halford says, "you get more out of them than if you stand over them with a stick." He talks about a "culture" at Heinz Canada. "We try to be sensitive to the wants and needs of our people, every one of them."

Those aren't just platitudes, according to The Financial Post's new book: The 100 Best Companies to Work For in Canada. Heinz Canada is the only company with its major operation in Essex County that made the grade.

Union Gas in Chatham was the next closest, while there are branches here of several other winners including Speedy Muffler King, Bell Canada, Canada Trust, Royal Bank, London Life, Manufacturers Life, Great West Life, Shoppers Drug Mart, Canadian Pacific Hotels, Canadian Tire and Air Canada.

The Post compiled a list of 170 candidates by polling key business people and then visited each plant and interviewed employees before naming the best 100 companies.

Heinz Canada fell into the Post's "Classic" category of "solid companies that demonstrate real care for employees, but with a more traditional management flavor." It is a little stodgier, the Post said, than go-go, dy-

and the quality of products but he would like to see them evolve into support staff with more responsibility for quality and with the people doing the work. He is currently considering a form of employee process control designed to do just that.

Regularly-scheduled meetings where employees and managers discuss problems and solutions, sometimes called "quality circles", is another idea that interests Halford, but he has seen some that degenerate into gripe sessions. Group decision-making is essential, he says. "You can't implement from above." He wants to make sure meetings produce a meaningful dialogue and to that end, he thinks everyone would benefit from training in problem-solving techniques.

Currently, the system at Heinz Canada is for employees to complain through their immediate supervisors. If that "sounding board" doesn't produce results, the employee is free to talk to someone higher up in manage-

ment, all the way to the president "although we would like a crack at solving the problem first if someone isn't satisfied," Halford says.

The plant has a drug and alcohol program jointly sponsored by the union and company which has proven to be a real benefit, Halford says. It was the union's idea.

There is also a stock-purchase plan to which the company makes a 10-per-cent contribution, and a company store where employees can buy scratch-and-dent Heinz products. All Heinz foods sold in Canada are made at the Leamington plant.

The Financial Post book took a couple of shots at Heinz too. It found promotional opportunities were good but "on the slow and cautious side for women", and it said "workers looking for the meteoric rise to the top, and a high-pressure environment, would not fit in here."

Managers say the company has become more dynamic in the past three years and is now "moderately aggressive."

The Post also said employees and management both agree communications could be improved. But compared to many other companies, Heinz seems to be on the right track. "If you're reasonable with management," says employee Linda Collard, "they will co-operate."

names like Magna International and Apple Canada.

Halford says relations aren't perfect and management is always looking for ways to do better. It has recently reactivated a company newsletter, and helped pay its employees' membership fees at Leamington's new sports complex — for which Heinz Canada donated the land.

Wages are about \$14 an hour and benefits like the dental and eyeglass plans are above average, but Halford says it's personal relations that make Heinz a nice place to work.

Policies aren't dictated from headquarters in Pittsburgh, he says, although the parent company was also listed in a recent book called The 100 Best Companies to Work For in America. The Leamington plant is allowed virtually unlimited freedom to set its own management style, and even the recipes for soups and ketchup are changed to suit the Canadian taste, Halford says.

What does management do to keep the working atmosphere so pleasant?

Halford says some management courses offered by universities or consultants are used, and he is particularly impressed by In Search of Excellence and other books by Tom Peters and Robert Waterman Jr. Pet-

ers writes about the few American companies he considers excellent, such as IBM, and how they do it. He stresses getting close to customer's wants and bringing out the best qualities and the optimum productivity in employees.

"We've been working at it (implementing some of Peters' ideas) in an informal way for years," Halford said. "There's not a food company in Canada that can really touch us. We're the best."

One of Peters' suggestions that Halford takes to heart is "management by walking around."

A continual pursuit of excellence and asking "What does our customer need?" — plastic bottles are the latest innovation — has helped boost Heinz Canada's sales to more than \$310 million a year and led to the building of a new \$8.5-million storage area. About 60 per cent of the ketchup sold in Canadian grocery stores is Heinz.

Employee relations can't be changed overnight, Halford says. Rather than a set of new procedures, it's a spirit that grows within a company and the confidence people have in management.

Danny Halmo and model of parent's home

### Danny's house...a real model home

MAIDSTONE — When Danny Halmo takes on a project, he does it in grand style.

Danny spent nine months last year building a scale model of the family's home at RR 3 Maidstone.

The model is built on a one-to-eight scale and is nine feet, two inches long. It weighs 150 pounds.

The model was built by Danny and four other Essex District High School students as a project for their framing course in the combined Grade 11-12 shop course.

"My parents really had no idea how large this thing really is," Danny said. It is 46 inches high and 52 inches wide.

"We had to take out the living room window just to get it in the house and then had to remove the balcony railing to get it up on the balcony."

Danny, who wants a career in home construction, said one of the hardest parts of putting the model together was trying to get hold of the half-inch nails with one hand and hammering with the other.

He works part-time in his

father's jewelry store in Windsor, so fine detailed work is not new to him.

"We worked from the actual house plans," he said. "The model isn't exactly the same as our house, because we made some changes when we built it six years ago."

"But all the wood pieces in the model are scaled down two-by-fours and two-by-10s and each one is held together with the same number of nails that would be used in a real house." The model is perched on a balcony overlooking the family living room and could, from a distance, be mistaken for an

oversized dollhouse.

"Yeah ... except it's too big even for that," said Danny.

"No one had any idea what I was talking about. I kept telling them the thing was huge, but until they had to take the window out of the

living room, they couldn't appreciate it.

"People keep telling me I should finish it off — you know, put siding or something on it. But that's not why it was made."

## Says one who left the city: 'It's worth it, no matter what'

For Cyril and Jean Halmos, the big move — from South Windsor to a nine-acre property near Maidstone — was worth the time and trouble.

It was, they say, even worth the year and a half they had to live in the basement of their unfinished home while working on the building.

Seven years ago, the Ottawa Street businessman, his wife and eight children were living on Lynn Street in the Roseland area. They were close to a park, schools, church and a shopping centre. But the pressures of a growing family forced them to start looking for a larger home.

For several years, they had been interested in buying a home or some property in the country; this was their opportunity. Cyril was a city boy, Jean was from a farm near Essex, but they both wanted out of Windsor.

After looking in the LaSalle area for some time, Mr. Halmos, 44, heard about eight acres and a house for sale in Sandwich South Township, about five miles from Essex.

"He found this property in the paper one night, and drove out at 10:30 at night and shone the car lights around," Mrs. Halmos said. "He came back and he was really excited."

"I came back the next day with the real estate agent and I was sick." It the clear light of day it looked more like an empty, neglected field than the dream location they wanted.

The property, including a small orchard, was choked with weeds. The frame house needed work and the place had a generally shabby appearance.

But Mr. Halmos was sold on the property. He put in an offer two days later and it was accepted almost immediately.

That was in May of 1971. After work and school, Mr. Halmos and the older children came out to the place and cleaned the yard and house. The used it on weekends and for parties, almost like a holiday cottage.

They decided to build a new, larger house, but ran into problems when township council refused for 10 months to grant a building permit, because of concern over installation of a septic system.

Council finally relented and the house was built — well, almost built — by September of 1972.

What was built was the shell. The Halmos' Windsor home had been sold and they had to move before the new house was finished.

So, for about 18 months, the family lived in the basement while slowly finishing the large, five-level structure.

Now, firmly established, the Halmos say they won't move. An extra acre of property next door was purchased and the frame house which originally stood on their property was moved to their new land.

That house is rented, providing extra income for the family.

As well, four acres of their land is cultivated by a local farmer under a sharecropping agreement. The income from the crops pays half the Halmos' property taxes.

The taxes, by the way, are low. They pay \$575 per year, compared to the \$625 paid yearly for their Windsor home seven years ago. Mr. Halmos says his home would be taxed at \$2,000 a year in Windsor now.

Reluctant to say how much he paid for the land in 1971 or how much it's worth today, he will admit the

value of the property and the two houses could have tripled by now. But he stressed that the increase is not typical, because of the low original price he paid and all the work he and his family put into the property.

It may sound too good to be true — large parties outdoors in good weather, bonfires, wiener roasts, fishing in a nearby pond, all 25 minutes from downtown Windsor. But the Halmos say it is true. For them, life in the country has been rewarding, presenting few problems.

"Out here everything is natural," Mr. Halmos said as he ticked off a list of advantages for his children, aged five to 18 years.

He said that, in the city, you just can't have experiences such as seeing a hawk circle lazily overhead, catching a tree frog, looking at the stars unobscured by air pollution.

"I saw the influence that was being absorbed by my kids. I wanted them to live freely, on their own."

Mrs. Halmos shops in Essex, where, she says, prices are about the same as in Windsor, but the lines in stores are shorter.

Both parents drive, reducing the inevitable transportation problems which come up when a large family lives in relative isolation.

The children attend school in Essex and school buses pick them up at a nearby intersection.

But the older ones, although they enjoy living in the country, admit they sometimes feel cooped up at home.

"It's not having transportation that's the main problem," said 18-year-old Danny, who is finished high school. "You have to go quite a distance to get anything exciting."

Infrequent buses to Windsor or hitchhiking are the only means of getting to the city if parents or friends can't supply rides.

But the children said a lot of their friends come out to see them, taking advantage of the privacy afforded by no immediate neighbors and plenty of room outside.

"I like it here," said 16-year-old Christine. "There're no neighbors watching you. You can do what you want. People in Windsor tell me they like it better here because there's more privacy."

Two existing wells on the property provide all the water necessary for both homes, but a tractor had to be purchased to keep the 500-foot roadway to the nearest township road clear in the winter. Even during last winter's snowy, cold weather, the family had little difficulty getting in and out.

They aren't completely cut off — there are several homes and farms in the area. And their large doberman pinscher dog, who escorts the younger children to and from the school bus stop, provides plenty of security.

Mr. Halmos' advice to anyone contemplating a similar move to the country is simple: "It's worth the effort. It's worth it, no matter what. We got acquainted with the wind and the stars and the rain."

And living so far from regularly plowed roads, municipal services and convenient entertainment is more than matched, both parents agreed, by the benefits of a freer lifestyle.

It also gives a good excuse for not showing up for work in bad weather, Mr. Halmos laughed.

"When you have a snowstorm, when you're snowed in... you don't feel guilty about not going to work."

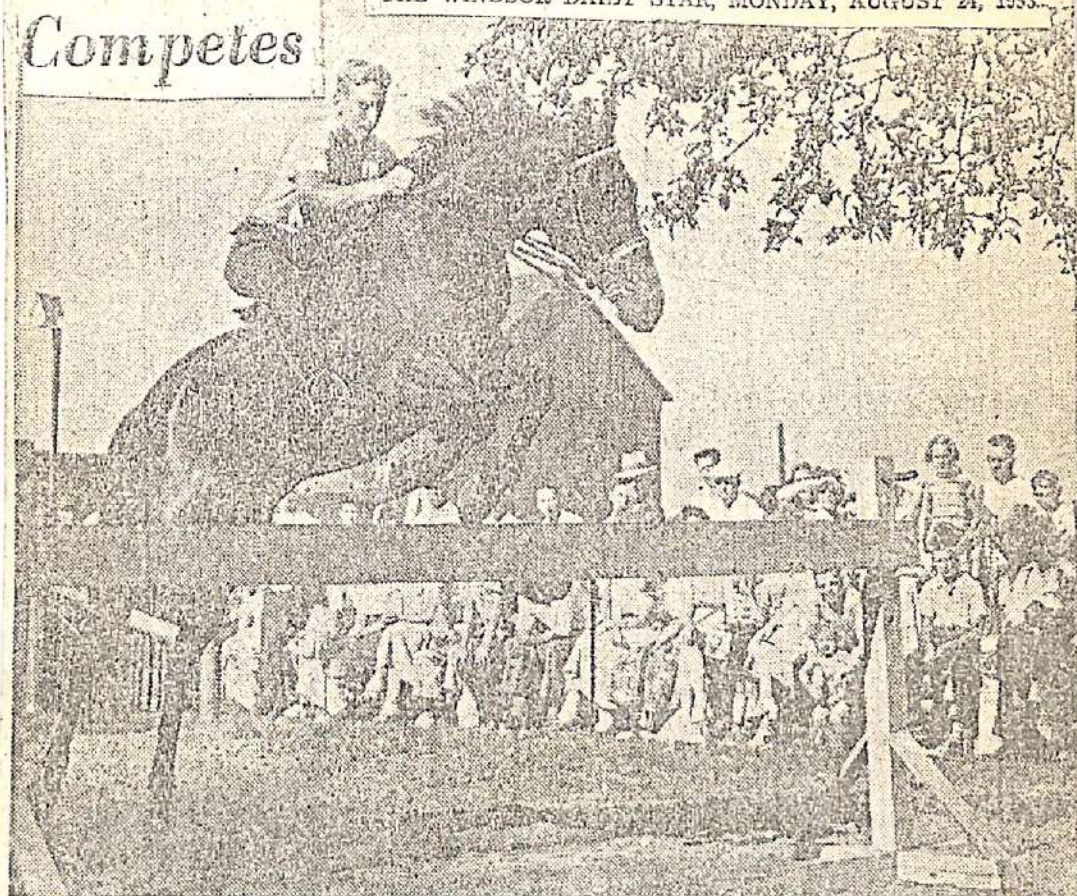

## Runner bitten by fitness bug

LEAMINGTON — Ben Hansen is training for a race for the first time in his 56 years.

He'll be one of the oldest competitors in the eight-km (five mile) Wild Goose Run near Kingsville this weekend as part of that community's Migration Festival.

"I just want to prove I can do it, just for myself, that it's never too late," he said.

"I might be the last guy to cross the finish line but that certainly wouldn't bother me."

Hansen started training six months ago, just after he was released from hospital for heart difficulties.

His doctor ordered him to watch his diet and shed some of his 102 kg (225 pounds).

"He told me that if I didn't, I might get away with it, but I might not," Hansen said. "He scared me into it."

"You have to get motivated to start exercising, but it's so easy to overdo. I started walking and for the first few months did nothing but walking, then faster and faster."

"Just six months ago I couldn't run 100 yards without losing my breath, but I'm now to the point where I can run five miles and feel good about it. I entered this race more or less as a challenge."

### Loses 13 kg... so far

So far Hansen has managed to lose 13 kg (30 pounds) and he plans to lose another 6.5 kg (15 pounds) before the end of the winter.

"My ideal weight is 180. That's exactly what I weighed when I was in my 20s," he says. "Right now I'm in the best shape I've been in since my 20s."

"I swore I would do what I could to bring myself back when I was lying in the hospital. From what I've seen of people dropping dead with heart attacks, there's a lot of cases I don't think were necessary."

Hansen owns and operates Oak Farms, four acres of commercially-grown greenhouse roses, on Oak Street in Leamington. He came to Canada from Denmark in 1955, and bought Oak Farms in 1962.

He and wife Gertrude have three children, aged 14 to 23.

Hansen tries to run every day in an abandoned quarry behind his greenhouses, where he's usually joined by the family's Labrador retriever, Buck.

He tries to make his workouts an hour long, but isn't exactly sure how much he's running or how fast his time is.

"If I can run seven days a week I run seven days a week, but if I can run just three days a week I only run on three days."

"I still have fun. I was at a convention in Minneapolis last week and I ate more than I should and I drank more than I should, but now I think about how much running I have to do to take that off."

The Wild Goose Run starts from the Jack Miner Public School, just north of Kingsville on Division Road, at 10 a.m. Saturday.

The race, which will wind through the Gosfield South countryside, is sponsored by the Essex County Striders running club, the Migration Festival and Colasanti's Tropical Plants.

Entry fee is \$3. About 300 runners are expected.

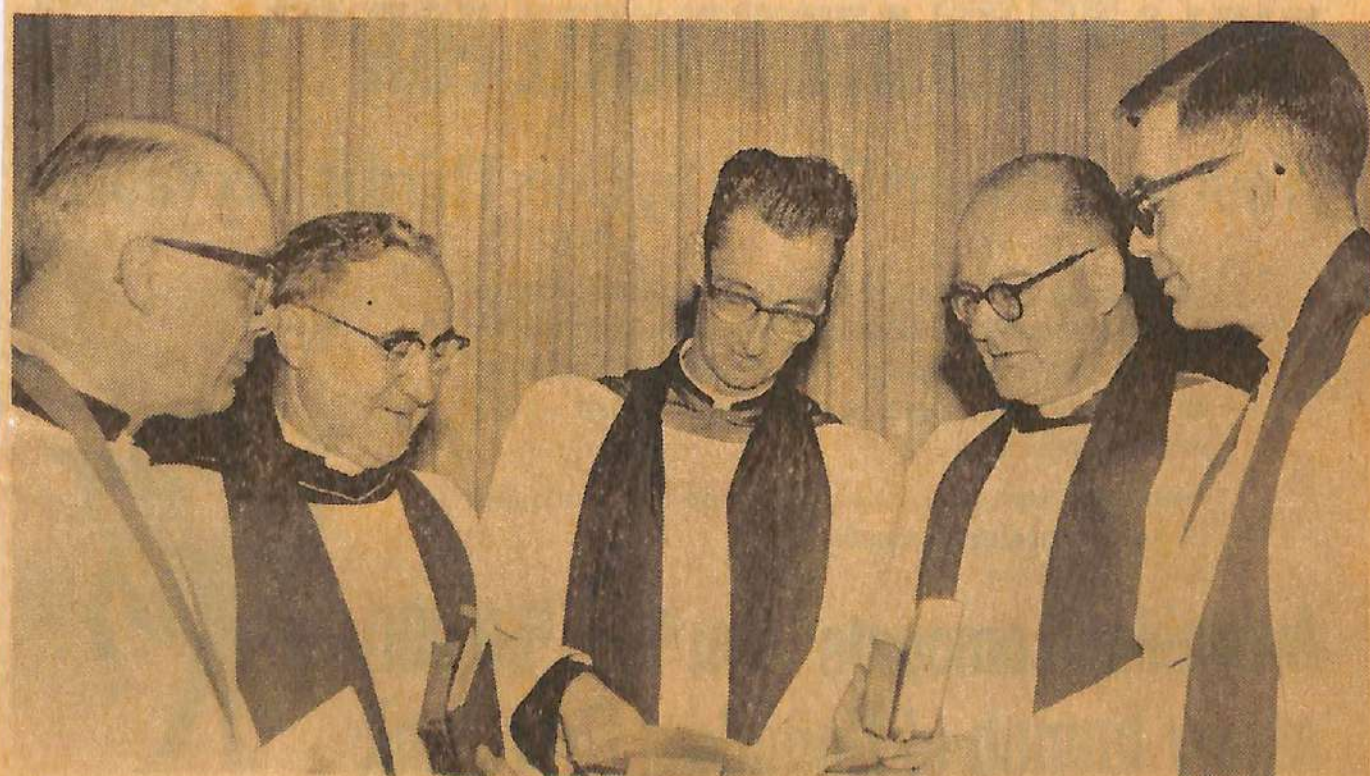

## Rev. H. W. Harding Dies at Brantford

Rev. Henry Warden (Harry) Harding, who left Chrysler Canada Ltd. at the age of 60 years to enter the Anglican ministry, died suddenly this morning in Brantford.

Mr. Harding, 61, was appointed June 1 assistant curate to Venerable Archdeacon F. C. McRitchie at Grace Anglican Church, Brantford.

He graduated from Seager Hall, Huron College, last spring and was made a deacon May 27 by Rt. Rev. G. N. Luxton, Bishop of Huron.

# New Career for 60-Year-Old

H. W. (Harry) Harding, who has been working at Chrysler Canada Ltd. for the past 14 years, is entering the ministry.

Mrs. Harding is also active in church work. She is a Dominion life member of the Women's Auxiliary and a member of the diocesan board of the Anglican Church.

When Mr. Harding who lives at 860 Scofield Ave., leaves for Seager Hall this September, he goes well prepared. For the past three years he has been studying theology at home and writing weekly exams.

Working all day as a systems and procedures analyst at Chrysler Canada Ltd. and study-

ing evenings seems like more work than one person can handle; but for Mr. Harding it is only part of his chosen mission in life. His spare time is spent doing church work — and high on the list of church duties is that of preaching.

# Some basic rules in floral design

A colorful, well-balanced floral arrangement adds life and the finishing touch to any decor.

One-sided arrangements (those to be viewed from the front only) are ideally placed against walls in living rooms, bedrooms and hallways while rounded arrangements such as the Edwardian or Williamsburg serve their decorative function best when used as centrepieces.

It's easy to make your own arrangements by following a number of basic rules. By purchasing uncut flowers and greenery from a florist or picking them from your garden in the spring then arranging them yourself, you'll not only save money but experience a feeling of pride in self-expression.

Evelyn Morris of Chilver Road, teacher of the Board of Education night classes in floral design, offers some valuable suggestions in this regard.

"It's important to know the color scheme and start with the vase itself to fit the decor of the room," she said.

The colors of the flowers in the arrangement should accent the predominant color scheme of the room which is set by the drapes, furniture and rug. The vase should be in keeping with the mood of the decor. If the furniture is Mediterranean, a heavy, ornate vase would be suitable. If the furniture is traditional, a daintier vase could be used.

You will be working with mass or form flowers which will create the basic arrangement, filler flowers to add variety and cover up the mechanics of your arrangement and, of course, greenery to give it the finished look that occurs in nature itself.

Some types of mass flowers to choose from are: carnations, mums, daisies, roses, camellias, yarrow, bouvardia, allium, dahlia and zinnias.

Form flowers which are characterized more by their interesting shapes than mass flowers which are invariably solid balls of flowers include: lilies, calla, orchids, daffodils, jonqui, amaryllis, tulips, antheriums and strelitzia (bird of paradise).

Such flowers as poms, statice (purple, yellow, white and pink), seafoam statice (dried statice), German statice, gypsophila (baby's breath), accacia or mimosa are categorized as filler flowers.

Eucalyptus, leather ferns, dock or sour dock, sorghum, sea oats, huckleberry, wheat, Scotch broom, dracaena and pussy willows can be used as greenery or foliage.

Basic rules to keep in mind before beginning include: never have two flowers one above the other or in a straight line side by side; if the flowers are all the same size, flowers should be placed farther apart at the outside and small spaces between flowers nearer the centre or focal point; don't be afraid to loosen up or primp flowers; don't be afraid to use a dark filler flower to give the arrangement depth; make the arrangements full but not crowded; watch that flowers step down well (do not form a ski slide) and profile of arrangement rounds out well; don't use too many greens or it will look weedy.

Mrs. Morris advises you do not criss-cross stems where they may be seen and avoid working with an even number of flowers.

"One is more inclined to form a square with four flowers — which is poor designing," she said.

Never put large flowers such as peonies or mums smack in the centre. Put three or five flowers in a line or place the large flower off-centre.

Always cut flowers with a clean knife. Scissors close the stem so they can't drink water. If a stem is particularly woody it will have extreme difficulty taking up water so mash it. Cut stems on a slant. In the case of roses, cut stems on a slant and slit stems up about an inch.

Use a block of oasis (porous material which is green in color) or styrofoam particles as a base for the arrangement. Commercial plant preservative may be used according to directions.

The following steps are to be taken when making a one-sided arrangement.

Cut a block of oasis to fit the vase and wedge it in securely. Pour in water until the block is saturated. Put masking tape in thin strips in a criss-cross over the block and cross-tape the ends with a short horizontal piece of tape to be sure the tape doesn't come undone.

Cut mums or other mass flowers from their one main stem. The tallest should be approximately two-and-one-half times the height of the vase. Others will be shorter by degrees.

Place the tallest mum almost in the centre. Place the second tallest mum to the left of the tallest flower and the third tallest just to the right of the tallest. This creates a high left interest and low right which is pleasing to the eye. Place much lower, shorter mass flowers to the extreme left and right of the three tallest. These will delineate the width of the arrangement.

Place a leaf behind the tallest flower to give it backing then just fill in everywhere with filler flowers. Keep in mind they should never be placed one above the other or exactly side-by-side. Add greenery where it looks best.

Always leave a space at the back of the arrangement so water can be added.

The following instructions are to be followed when making an Edwardian or Williamsburg arrangement.

Cut block of oasis to fit the vase, wedge in, add water, tape and cross-tape.

Place greenery first — one bunch in each corner first then fill in with more greenery all around so a solid ring of greenery is formed. Huckleberry was used by Mrs. Morris. Leather ferns are equally suitable. If a knife won't cut through the stems of greenery, use clippers.

Place tallest flower in first almost in the centre. Mrs. Morris used pom mums for mass flowers and carnations for filler flowers.

After the tallest flower is placed in the block of oasis, simply surround it by other mass flowers then fill in gaps with filler flowers. Again, follow the rule that no two flowers are to be placed side-by-side or one-above-another.

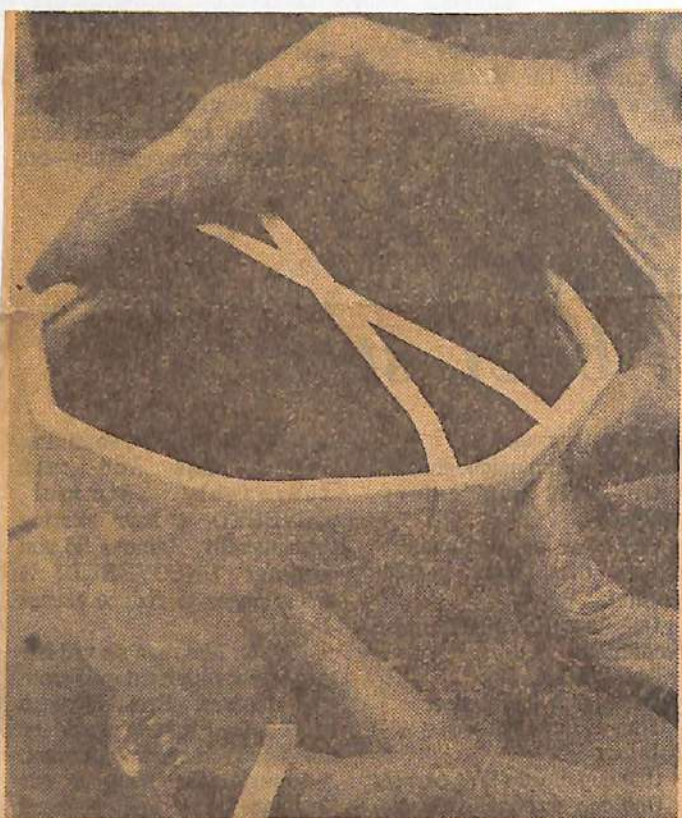


## THE EDWARDIAN OR WILLIAMSBURG—

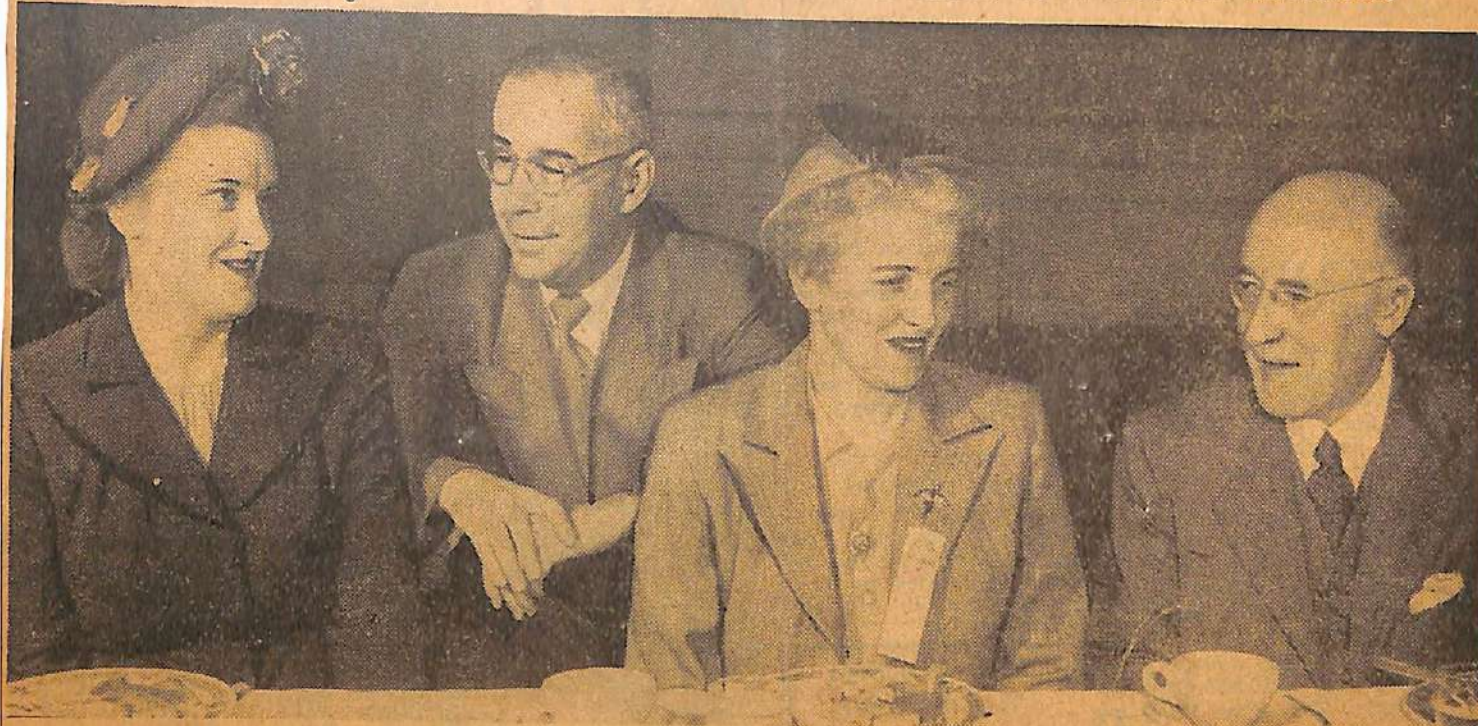

## Postal Security For Essex Residents

If you are 60 or over and live in Essex, someone is watching out for you.

This time it is your mail carrier.

Even if you aren't 60 but live alone and would like the security of knowing someone would get help for you in case of an accident or emergency, you can register with the postal security alert being introduced in Essex.

Every household will receive a flyer and a registration card in the mailbox that explains the project. In addition those on old age pension will receive a card with their cheque.

You send the registration card to 115 Talbot Street North, Essex, where it is kept on file at the community information office. All mail carriers in Essex are alert for signs of a problem that indicates need for assistance and if they have reason to think something is not as usual, they will notify the community information office. Staff will check your file and notify the person

indicated on your card to get in touch with you.

The project is sponsored jointly by Essex Retirees and the social planning council, with the co-operation of the postal service. No need for anyone to lie injured for days before he or she is found.

The plan was introduced for the first time in Canada by Windsor, and Marcel LeFebvre of the social planning council brought the idea to Essex through the United Way. Essex council picked up the tab for \$192 for the leaflet printing costs.

Woodworth says consumers may start buying bottled waters out of concern over pollution, but the taste is what keeps them coming back. "It's a combination of both factors that has contributed to the growth of the bottled water business."

# ...Nor any drop to drink

On a desk in Milton Hartley's garage is a row of spice bottles.

One is filled with grains of what appears to be sand. One holds chunks of what could be a reddish clay. Another contains a grey chalky substance.

What's in the bottles used to be in drinking water, says Hartley. Each bottle is neatly labelled — Harrowell, Lake Erie near LaSalle, Tecumseh.

"Water is not clean," he says. Hartley sells water purifiers.

\*\*\*

"People either find it too complicated or they get careless ... you must maintain the equipment properly."

"Yet there are dozens of in-home water treatment systems on the market. 'We haven't been able to

show there are any disadvantages as long as they are properly maintained," says Dr. Joseph Jones, Windsor's medical officer of health. "But we haven't found any advantages."

"IF YOU DON'T use it properly, then sure as fate you'll have problems," says Coutts.

Says Jones: "It really boils down to personal preference."

For those who sell water purifiers, it's more than just personal preference.

Milton Hartley is firmly convinced

his purifier — which filters and then distills water — produces "safe, clean" water.

He can't prove there are health benefits to drinking distilled water, but says his rheumatism cleared up and a friend's kidney stones disappeared since they bought distillers.

He also claims former prime minister Pierre Trudeau and Queen Elizabeth own water treatment systems.

He says of his customers, "pretty near everyone has found some benefit."

## Have You Had Your Chemical Cocktail Today?

It's the in thing to have your own still. Water still that is.

Milton Hartley of Oldcastle will sell you one, a small one to set on your kitchen cupboards, for about \$400 or a larger one, depending on your needs.

He is an agent for Pure Water Canada because he sincerely believes the product he sells can give you better health. He says the arthritis that prevented him from working began to disappear three months after he began drinking distilled water.

But it's not the question of whether the minerals in water are a health problem, but the growing widespread worry of water pollution that concerns most people. Whether the water they drink comes from a deep drilled well or out of a pipeline from the lake after it has absorbed the waste from Windsor and Detroit, there's a question about its purity.

Filtering it through sand takes out the filth, chlorinating it kills the bacteria, but some chemicals aren't removed that easily. And if the chlorine is strong enough to kill bacteria, what else can it do?

Industrial solvents like benzene and toluene, both known to be carcinogenic, filter through soil into underground layers of rock or gravel that hold water which eventually flows into wells.

Pesticides, chemical and industrial toxic wastes filter into drilled water. Underground, who can tell what course the streams take and how farm toxic wastes are carried. The family on the farm beside the landfill site in Maidstone Township has its water brought in, courtesy of the county, because water in the well has been found to be unfit for consumption.

According to a report in the June 22nd issue of Maclean's magazine, provincial officials who tested St. Clair River found 17 chemicals in the drinking water in Windsor.

"After sheepishly admitting they 'don't know what it means,' they added the caveat that people in the vicinity of Canada's largest concentration of petrochemical plants would be 'prudent' to avoid drinking the water",

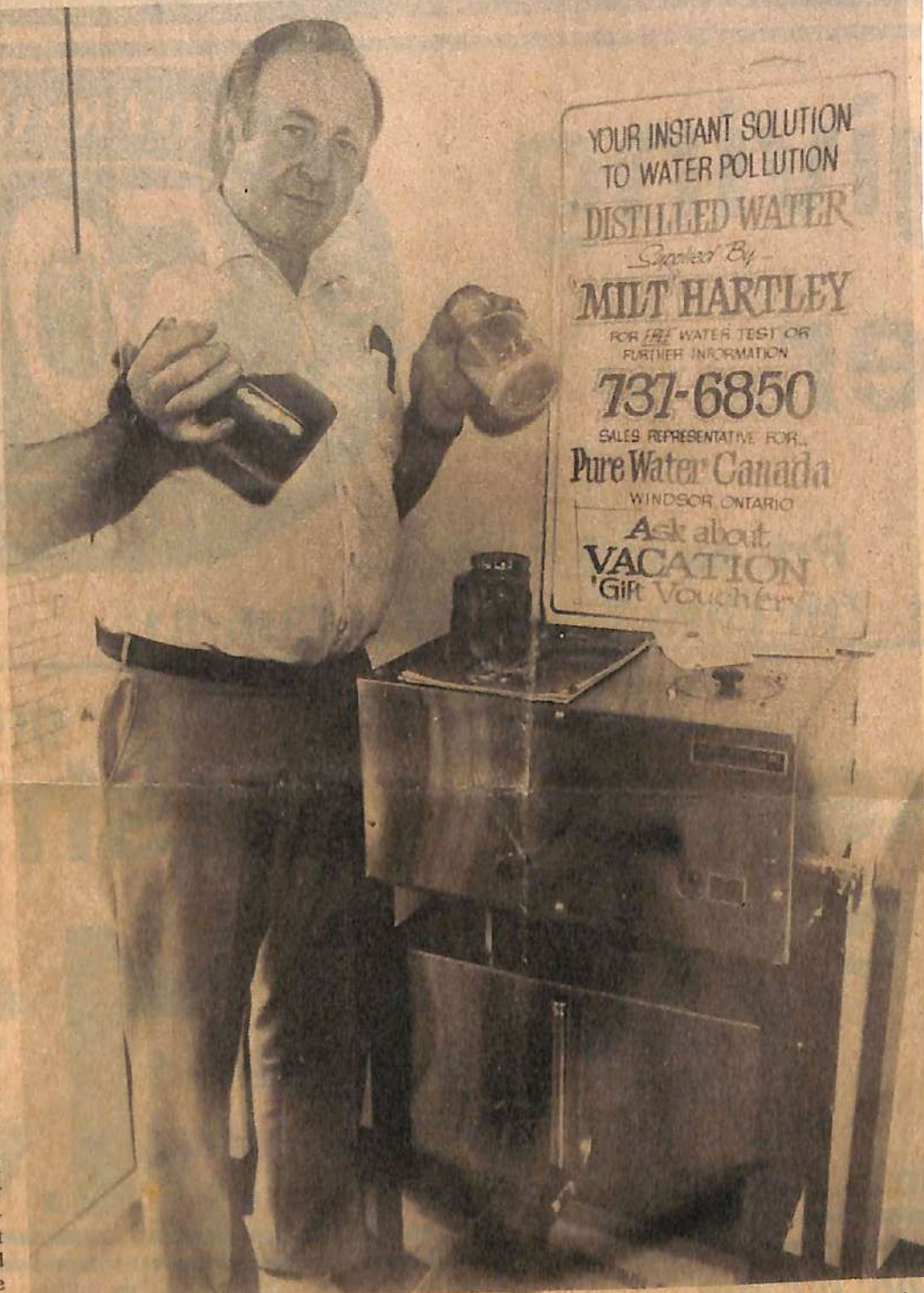
The same article questions the safety of using chlorine and says it can produce carcinogens when it combines with other organic substances in drinking water. Federal scientists are looking for links between chlorinated water and cancer mortality rates and testing to see whether chlorinated water contains mutagens which can react in body tissues to cause genetic damage.

The increase in sales of Purified water or Canada

Dry's Mont Blanc bottled water is proof of the search by Canadians for pure water.

But bottled spring water is not proof positive of safe drinking water. And even if it is free of toxic pollutants, those minerals leave your circulatory system looking like the inside of a scale-covered tea-kettle, says the purveyors of distilled water.

Milton Hartley is with Canada's largest distributor of distillers, Pure Water Canada which last year did a \$1 million trade in water purifying machines. Prices range from \$400 to \$2,000.



He says his health has improved so much since he bought his own distiller that he began selling the machines because he wanted to pass along his good fortune.

"I had arthritis in my back, my hands, and my knees. I started to get better three months after I got my distiller," he said. Then he added, "I'm not saying the distilled water cures arthritis but it can relieve most types."

Milton says his company's tests have shown there are 250 parts of inorganic material per million in tap water. It claims it takes 97 per cent of that material out of the water in one distillation.

"If you find a little scum around the cooked potatoes, that's inorganic material from the water," he explained.

He'll give you a free water test without obligation. He'll also show you the samples of residue left in the distiller after water has been purified in it - one bottle of brown water and another full of stony deposits with the appearance of lime.

"He has sold machines in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick as one owner spreads the word about pure water.

Milton ignored literature he received in the mail until someone called on follow-up to offer to test his well water. When he looked at the pamphlet and read that it could help those with arthritis the door was open to the salesman.

"It was one of the best instruments of my life," he says.

The smallest machine can sit on the kitchen cupboard top or a larger one comes with its own stand.

Buying bottled water from a distiller is possible at about \$1 a gallon. It's available at Treats N Things in the Sadler Plaza. Depending on the size of your distiller, you can prepare your own for from \$6 to \$15 a gallon. The treatment process of heating the water and catching the steam, distillation, drops most impurities.



# Vacation in Haiti no holiday for teen

Gavin Farrell will have some stories to tell when his friends ask him how he spent his summer vacation.

Instead of the usual summer tales the 15-year-old will be able to tell his Grade 10 classmates at Riverside Secondary School about his working holiday in a remote village in Haiti, the Caribbean island recently hit by violence in the overthrow of its president, Jean-Claude Duvalier.

Farrell left his parents and sister for a seven-week odyssey, with five weeks spent in a small Haitian town, helping to build a church.

Run by the American-based Teen Missions, an interdenominational group that sends teens to missions across the world, Farrell joined 30 other young people in the town of Passe Catabois in northwest Haiti.

"I missed cold drinks, everything cold," said Farrell, of the less than modern facilities in the town.

They fetched warm water from a hand pump, used sleeping bags and air mattresses instead of beds, lived without flush toilets and battled the typical tropical ailments.

"Everyone had Haitian Happiness — that's diarrhea," said Farrell. "The whole team was put on their backs for four days."

He said that one night a group of 500 neighboring townsmen gathered at a small river just outside Passe Catabois, waving machetes and wooden clubs.

**PEOPLE AT** the mission speculated the townsmen had sold their own donated food on the black market and that they might attack in search of the mission's food.

Another group of men, also carrying machetes, gathered to defend the

mission.

"The orders they had was as soon as (the raiders) crossed the river they should kill them," Farrell said.

The night ended peacefully when the raiders decided to head back to their own village.

It was the second summer Farrell has spent in Haiti with the group. Last year he lived in another small village, and had a voodoo priest as his neighbor.

"It was fun," Farrell said.

He decided to go to Haiti because it was the most inexpensive trip offered. Teenagers involved in the program had to raise money to cover the cost of the trip, and Haiti cost only \$1,800.

For Farrell, it was worth the months of long effort of finding 25 sponsors, friends and family, to pay for the trip.

He saw a riot, drove past the ruins of Duvalier's palace and bartered with street vendors.

He came back to his Esplanade Drive home with a duffle bag, a wicker basket and carry-on bag, all filled with wooden statues, souvenirs and 10 rolls of exposed film.

**HE HAD BOUGHT** so much, the only clothes he was able to bring home were the ones on his back.

His mother was relieved when he finally stepped off the plane in Detroit.

"I was hoping he wouldn't go," said his mother Ethel. "But, whatever dangers there are in going away, there are just as many dangers here in Windsor for a boy that age."

"He's just a boy to me, yet he's done something like this. I'm proud of him."

Mrs. Roy Hartley, who lives in the high-rise apartments in Windsor's redevelopment area on University Ave., has much to say in thanking the Institute of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation.

The Institute is one of the 20 social and welfare agencies benefitting from the 19th annual United Fund campaign now underway. The objective this year is \$650,000.

Mrs. Hartley is an example of the help this agency can provide to the needy in greater Windsor.

She had been living in a house in the country that lacked many conveniences, including indoor plumbing. The Institute urged her to move into the city and found accommodation for her in the high-rise apartment building.

They processed her needs and obtained

a wheelchair for her through the Ontario Department of public welfare. As a result of moving into town, Mrs. Hartley began availing herself of the home services provided by the Victorian Order of Nurses.

She and her son, Timmy, are both victims of muscular dystrophy. Through the efforts of the Institute, the youth has been trained in electrical repair work through the provincial welfare department's program.

Mrs. Hartley's husband, who died a few years ago, was also helped by the Institute. The agency provided him with an artificial leg several years ago.

This family is but one example of the more than 300 cases handled each year by the institute.

### Scientists Overcoming Crippleers

Knowledge, gradually accumulating like water behind a huge dam, may soon punch a hole through the impregnable dam of muscular dystrophy. The tiny gap will slowly get larger as knowledge gnaws away at its edges until the cruel crippler crumbles entirely.

This small ray of hope came from a young medical scientist Thursday night at a meeting of the Essex County Muscular Dystrophy Association of Canada in the V.O.N. Building.

Dr. Gaetan Jasmin, 35-year-old assistant professor of experimental pathology at the University of Montreal is one of the many who are on the brink of thrusting the spearhead of knowledge through the dam.

He sincerely believes that given enough knowledge, man can beat any disease. "The men who send sputniks and rockets around the earth believe that eventually they will reach the moon and then Mars. I have the same belief; eventually medical research will lick all diseases."

"Ten years ago this talk was nonsense," he said, "and rightly so. 'But we've been fortunate in that other scientists, in other fields, have provided us with weapons to fight these diseases.' He was referring to 'electronical instruments, such as microscopes, and tissue culture and bio-chemical means of exploring the diseased cells."

The doctor says the clue may be found in the study of enzymes, the body's catalysts. Enzymes, according to Dr. Jasmin, trigger the combination of oxygen with body chemicals to produce energy.

Once muscular dystrophy has a foothold, the enzymes don't do their job. "This is a fundamental aspect of the disease and their may be other approaches. But if we can prove it's an enzyme abnormality, we someday may be able to help supply what is lacking."

He said there have been some encouraging results with children have "definitely improved," he said.

The doctor also pointed to genetics as a possible crusher of disease. If medical research can discover a way to destroy hereditary disease before an infant is born, or even conceived, the disease would soon perish.

A Roman Catholic, Dr. Jasmin says the church would have no restrictions on this method of stamping out disease. "In fact, the church is trying to develop methods of birth control, which are within the religious boundaries."

"It will be a much better world," he said quietly, "when most of the sickness, pain and sadness can be removed."

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## Wheat, Corn, Oats Follow Red Clover

### Foresight, Planning Give Good Yields

#### The Star's South Essex Bureau

MAIDSTONE, — Any farmer would be proud of the nice field of corn which is growing on the Joseph P. Hayes farm on the Ninth Concession of Sandwich South township. He wouldn't feel ashamed of Mr. Hayes' wheat field, either, because unless the crop is damaged by hail or wind and rain it will give a harvest of at least 50 bushels to the acre.

#### GOOD EXAMPLE

Good farmers practise crop rotations and the Hayes farm is a perfect example of what rotation of crops can do and what the Essex County Soils Committee has been purchasing for years.

On the Hayes farm are examples of crop rotation at work. In one field a thick stand of mammoth red clover almost three feet high was being plowed down. That is the first step in the Hayes crop

plan. This field will be planted in wheat this fall. When the wheat is harvested next summer the field will be summerfallowed and the following year will be planted in corn. Following the corn will come a crop of oats, with the land seeded to red clover again so the cycle will keep on going clover, wheat, corn, oats, clover.

Mr. Hayes has a corn field which was planted May 22. The corn stands about two and a half feet, is a dark green, healthy color and is the best field of corn in Essex County.

#### SAVES ON FERTILIZER

It hasn't been planted with any commercial fertilizer. The field had red clover two years ago, before it was put into wheat. "I only use fertilizer with oats and wheat in this rotation," Mr. Hayes explained "It works better."

Incidentally, in that cornfield, the soil was of a nice crumbly texture, as it was in all the fields on the Hayes farm.

The Hayes farm of 200 acres was of particular interest to Ken Standing, who is doing soils ex-

tension work with the Essex County Soils Committee, which has contended that the fertility of Essex County clay soils can be maintained, even with cash crop farming, if a proper rotation is maintained and legumes are used as a green manure crop.

## Car Hits Ditch On Highway 98

Ed Hayes, 29, of R.R. 3, Maidstone, was seriously injured late last night when his car went out of control on Highway 98 and overturned into a five-foot ditch.

## EMERGENCY TREATMENT

The injured man was removed from the wrecked car by Windsor Ambulance attendants and rushed to Metropolitan Hospital for emergency treatment. A police escort picked up the speeding ambulance on Walker road at the city limits for the trip to hospital.

Ontario Provincial Police Constable Arnold Rundle was at a loss to explain the accident. Hayes was less than a mile from his home, and was on a stretch of road that had not a single curve for some distance.

Apparently the car went out of control about a mile east of Walker and shot off the road near a concrete culvert. As it left the road it overturned and crashed down into the bottom of the ditch with the driver trapped inside.

No complete examination was possible at once. In addition, to the numerous lacerations there is a possibility of several fractures and internal injuries.

Mrs. Hayes was notified of the accident and was taken to the hospital by police.

Joe Hayes escaped injury the past week when he fell from the top of his house while repairing the roof. Joe claims his wife jibed, "That if Joe had fallen any place but on his head he might have been hurt badly."

## Probe Asked In \$40,000 Farm Fire 1957

### Sandwich South Barns Destroyed, Chief Raps Drivers

The Ontario Fire Marshal's department will be asked to investigate a blaze of unknown origin which Saturday night swept through a 67-year-old barn and two other farm buildings on the Conc. 9 Sandwich S. farm of Joseph Hayes. Loss has estimated at near \$40,000.

Chief Jack Delisle of the Anderton Fire Department said today he had turned over all of his information on the fire to the Essex detachment, Ontario Provincial Police. They will forward it to the fire marshal's office.

Mr. Hayes, owner of the 75-acre farm, praised the efforts of his cousin and neighbor, Gord Jobin, who managed to save several thousand dollars worth of implements and machinery from the barns before they collapsed.

During the height of the blaze, Mr. Jobin backed a tractor beside the flaming buildings and hitched a chain on a 150-gallon tank of gasoline which he managed to pull clear.

Mr. Hayes said the blaze was first discovered shortly after 8 p.m. by his daughter Angela, 25, and his sister-in-law, Mary Healey, 61, of Detroit.

"When they first looked out, they thought it was just the headlights of a car playing on the door of the barn," Mr. Hayes said. "I took a second look and realized that the barn was burning."

Mr. Hayes received burns to his left hand and arm while attempting to help firemen quell the blaze.

Flames leaped 200 feet into the air, spewing sparks and bits of flaming debris onto neighbouring barns, threatening at one time, to destroy two additional buildings.

A bucket brigade was formed by neighbors and passing motorists who managed to extinguish a blaze on the roof of an implement shed before firemen arrived.

Fire Chief Delisle was critical of the "inconsiderate motorists," whom he blamed for tying up his pumpers for almost half an hour before he could get to the blaze.

Twelve firemen fought the fire for almost three hours with two pieces of fire-fighting equipment. They managed to extinguish a fire in a corn bin shortly after their arrival, but could not save the rest of the buildings.

At one time, police estimated, traffic was lined up bumper to bumper for almost three miles along conc. 9 as a result of motorists who tried to get near the fire. Hundreds lined the roadside and the farmyard within minutes of the outbreak and before it was over, the crowd had swelled to almost 2,000 persons.

Mr. Hayes said he also lost about \$1,000 worth of implements in the fire. The barns were all empty except for a small quantity of seed for spring planting which was destroyed.

He said that most of the spring planting had been finished when the fire struck.

Mr. Hayes said he was covered by only \$3,000 worth of fire insurance on all the buildings, and said he felt that it would cost in the neighbourhood of \$4,000 to replace the buildings destroyed.

## Death Takes J. G. Hennin

Jan. 7, 1955

Joseph George Hennin, 73, of Roseland, former Warden of Essex County and long-time reeve of Sandwich South Township, died Wednesday at Hotel Dieu following a lengthy illness.

Born in Tecumseh in 1881, he lived in Windsor for several years and attended Windsor Collegiate. For the past 50 years he had lived in Roseland.

In 1903 he married the former Alice LeFebvre.

He opened the first grocery store in Roseland 50 years ago and was appointed the first postmaster of Roseland.

After operating his grocery store for 17 years, he opened an insurance, loan and investment office in Windsor and until he became ill, remained active in the affairs of his business.

About 10 years ago his health became impaired and he was forced to give up his social, church and community activities.

He was a member of the Third and Fourth Degree, Knights of Columbus and was a devout Roman Catholic. He was past president of the Holy Name Society of Immaculate Conception Church and also of Sacred Heart Church.

During the past 25 years he made substantial financial contributions to the support of churches and charitable organizations.

Mr. Hennin served as reeve of Sandwich South Township for 25 consecutive years.

He was elected the first president of the Essex County Children's Aid Society and after it amalgamated with the Children's Aid Society of Windsor he was elected first president of the combined body.

In 1948 Mr. Hennin was honored by the people of Sandwich South for his quarter century of faithful service to his community. Attending the meeting were people from all political and religious creeds and a great tribute was paid to Mr. Hennin.

He was also appointed by Bishop John C. Cody as a member of the advisory board of the Oxley Retreat House in which capacity he served for two years.

Mr. Hennin is survived by his widow Alice and a sister Miss Lena Hennin of Tecumseh.

### Sandwich South Pays Tribute.

This past week the Union Jack at the town hall here, was lowered to half mast, as the township, as well as the County of Essex, paid tribute to one of its outstanding citizens, in the person of former Reeve J. G. Hennin, who was, for 25 years, key man in the township Council. He had passed away at Hotel Dieu, Windsor, on Saturday of last week. Mr. Hennin resided on Howard avenue, in Roseland. He had been ill a long time.

For over 50 years Joe, as he was known to many, served this area as a business man and in public affairs. Very few people devote their time to the affairs of the public as did Mr. Hennin. Through war, depression and lush years, Joe guided the affairs of this township to place it in the position it holds in the metropolitan area of Windsor today. During the great depression years this area was hit by the financial slide and neighbouring districts fell by the wayside into default, and heads fell in many of the different townships that went to the polls. This township still re-elected Joe to the Reeve's chair because the people maintained that confidence in a man who weighed every move carefully and thoughtfully.

No man could have represented this area with the confidence and sincerity as did this calm gentleman of the old school who worked for his township and county, and the people who elected him and worked with him. It takes men of the calibre of the late reeve to ease the strain of the life we live in, and the late Mr. Hennin did that for many of his people, in a calm and friendly attitude that will long be remembered by the old and young alike.

Should this community decide to reward its public workers by memorials or otherwise, our late friend should be at the top of the list.

Man has but a few short years to serve his God and his fellow man on this earth and his reward, it is said, shall be in heaven. Our late friend did those things well and left his mark that younger men should follow.

JOSEPH G. HENNIN was born in the Township of Sandwich East (now the Town of Tecumseh) on the 15th day of September, 1881. He attended the Tecumseh Public School, and the Windsor Collegiate Institute.

At the age of 17 was given a permit by the late Theodule Girardot Inspector of Public Schools to teach school and was appointed a member of the teaching staff of the Tecumseh Public School Board. Salary of \$150.00 a year.

After one year he resigned that position and operated a grocery store in Tecumseh. In the year 1905 was married to his present wife, nee Alice Lefevre, and shortly after, opened the first grocery store in the district of Jackson's Corners (now Roseland).

Shortly after was appointed the first Postmaster of Jackson's Corners. In December 1932 the business and premises were sold to the present owner I. L. Whipple.

In the year 1903, was elected a member of the Sandwich South Township Council, and after serving two years as a Councillor, was elected Reeve for that Township and continued in that office for twenty three (23) consecutive years thereafter.

Was elected Warden for the County of Essex in the year 1941. Was always interested in church and social work, particularly child welfare, and neglected children.

Was the chief advocate of the formation of the Essex County and Pelee Island Children's Aid Society, and for five years this Society operated and until it amalgamated with the Windsor Society, was its only president.

Upon the amalgamation of the two Societies was elected its first president.

Immediately after disposing of the grocery business in 1932, became an associate of the late Joseph Truault, in the Fire and Automobile Insurance and Mortgage Loans. Acquired this business for himself in the year 1933, and continued until 1945 when he sold the insurance part of the business.

Since that time is operating a private Mortgage Loan and Conveyancing Business with offices on his farm located at 195 Coyote St. Windsor, Ontario.

Notes on JOSEPH HENNIN — Dick Roe.

In the early days it was the custom in France to send out to the Colonies young men who were studying for the priesthood. It was thought advisable to thus give them an opportunity to make certain that they wished to continue in the church ministry.

Among those who decided not to continue were three young students: Girardo, Christino and Hennin. Young Mr. Hennin who became the grandfather of Mr. Joe Hennin our former Reeve, married and became a school teacher, teaching at Tecumseh for thirty years.

Mr. Hennin started a winery at Sandwich, whilst Christino became postmaster at Tecumseh.

Joe's father was a farmer. Joe was born on the farm at Tecumseh. Joe taught school until he went into business with a team and grocer's wagon. His route was through the local countryside. He became a well known figure as he went from farm to farm, and settlement to settlement with groceries and meat. He married Alice Lefevre, both being quite young, dashing and handsome.

Alice's mother was a DuCarme, a sister of Mrs. Virginia Morand. She died when Alice was an infant and Alice was adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Parent. Her foster parents had received a grant of land from the British Government for taking up arms under the British cause in repelling the invaders from the South. About 1905 a friend advised Joe to settle in Jackson's Corners.

A small four roomed house was moved from its location on the South end of 25 acres owned by Mr. Ed. Turk to the North end about where Hutson's store now stands. Mr. Ed. Turk was an Englishman and his 25 acres were from the Lennon drain (which crosses Howard near Mr. Saville's) to the present Cabana Road.



The Lennon Drain derives its name from a Mr. Lennon who owned 25 acres from the Drain to the Point at Howard and Dougall. Mr. Lennon was a bachelor, who, after his sister died lived alone. One night he fell while carrying an oil lantern, he burnt to death and the house burned down. Mr. Ferdine Morand was one of those who discovered the body. The ruins of this house can still be seen in a clump of trees near the Point.

Joe brought Alice along to look at the four roomed house, with the idea of starting in business as storekeeper. In spite of the fact that the place was run down, overrun with weeds and conveniences were nil, Alice undertook to make her home there, and Joe went into business. This old house is now a part of the home of Ellis Loyst.

Joe had the only telephone for miles around and he just loved to be called night after night, by people living in the country, to call a doctor for them. He was the first postmaster of Jackson's Corners, and served for some years. He later moved across the street where there was a hotel, and started a store there. Bill Whipple bought him out in 1923 and Joe went into Insurance with Joe Breault. When Mr. Breault died, Joe took over the business. # Bereaved mothers need some compassion, too

Sir,

I am writing to comment on a recent article dealing with the grief process experienced by parents upon the death of a child at birth or shortly after.

I applaud the sensitivity and insight shown by the author and hope that these modern views are now being practised in Windsor area hospitals by all health care personnel.

In the article, the author urges that the bereaved mother be given a private room in which to deal with her loss. Several years ago when our first daughter died the day after her birth, I was put in a semi-private room with another new mother and told that by viewing this mother's infant several times a day, I would "come to terms" with my loss sooner. I cannot describe how incredibly painful it was for me to watch my room mate cuddle her healthy newborn.

No one knows what to say to someone who experiences such a loss. Just being there, putting a hand on the mother's arm and listening are what is important.

Eighteen years ago, the hospital

staff kept urging me to forget the baby who had died, to cheer up. At no time did they acknowledge the tragedy that had befallen our family. In fact, the staff tended to avoid me.

I am very relieved that now that the effects of an infant's death are being recognized, the parents are urged to talk about their fears and disappointments and to work through their grief.

As the article stated, the infant's death is often the young parent's first

close encounter with death. The shock is overwhelming.

A friend, whose baby had died under similar circumstances, visited me in the hospital. We talked and cried and held each other closely. The nursing staff sent my friend away and admonished her for "upsetting" me. Again, I was told to cheer up.

We are all more enlightened as to the aspects of death and dying in the '80s. I just want to urge health care

professionals to remember the special needs of these bereaved parents.

My family and friends were my support group but how I could have used an understanding look or compassionate touch while in hospital.

Less than a year from our infant's death, God graced us with a second daughter but the brief presence of our first daughter will never be forgotten.

# These seniors' plates are full

United Way  
dishes out  
assistance

ESSEX — A hot meal once a day may be taken for granted by most people, but not by 87-year-old Nellie Herdman.

Nellie, who has difficulty preparing her food, is the grateful daily recipient of a hot meal courtesy of the Meals on Wheels program of the Essex and District Social Planning Council, a United Way county demonstration project.

The former school teacher lives on her own in a senior citizens complex in Essex; one of 12 people in town who are assisted by the program. She has been on her own for 22 years since her husband died.

And she finds the meals ample enough to fill her hearty appetite.

"I'm a farm girl you know, so I have a good appetite," says the bright-eyed native of Hagersville, Ont., near Hamilton. "I think the meals are nice — they give you good slices of meat and nice vegetables."

"AND THE MEALS aren't monotonous. They change them all the time. All I have to do is make my own tea."

The meals, which consist of soup, meat, vegetables and a dessert, cost \$1.50 each and are delivered to seniors' tables Monday, Wednesday and Friday at the noon hour. The elderly can also take advantage of a Meals to Wheels program on Tuesdays and Thursdays, sponsored by a local seniors group, through which they are taken to a senior's home for lunch.

Janny Vanveen, coordinator of the 19-month-old Meals on Wheels program, says enthusiastic volunteer help at the Essex Nursing Home (where the meals are prepared) and from interested citizens makes the program a success.

"The kitchen staff that prepares the meals do it without pay and the meals are delivered by volunteers in their own cars," she says.

VANVEEN is assisted by staff members Mary Richards and Joan Foster who

coordinate drivers and patients.

Vanveen said there is little problem getting volunteers as local churches and women's groups take turns at delivery service.

And the best feature of the program, according to Van-

veen, is that it is self-supporting.

"We have no budget. The \$1.50 goes straight from the people to the nursing home to pay for the food. All the work is volunteer."

Six weekly volunteers run two meal routes with containers donated by Sun Parlour Home in Leamington. Two people make each run, one driver, and one to deliver the meals.

Of the 12 people served by the program, half live in seniors' homes, the other half live in their own homes or in those of their family.

Joyce Gold, executive secretary of the Essex and District Social Planning Council says she is pleased with the response the Meals on

by various citizens groups determined there was a need for family services and an information and referral centre in Essex.

WORKING WITH FUNDING from the United Way, and the provincial ministries of community and social services and culture and recreation, the planning council now offers a Community Information Service, and a handi-van transportation for seniors and the handicapped in Essex.

Gold estimates the 1980 budget to be about \$25,000. In 1980, the council received \$15,548 from the United Way and worked with the remainder of a \$5,700 grant it received as a United Way special project in 1978.

Wheels project has received.

"Response has been very good," says Gold, who began her career with the council in 1975 as a volunteer with the Community Information Service. "The only problem getting volunteers is around Christmas and summer vacations, but that's to be expected."

The social planning council was born in 1975 after studies

Gold says because of more funding from the government this year, the demand of the council on the already strained coffers of the United Way will be less in 1981. But she adds the decrease in demand will not affect services.

Future plans for the council include a look into the problems of adolescents and youths in the Essex area.

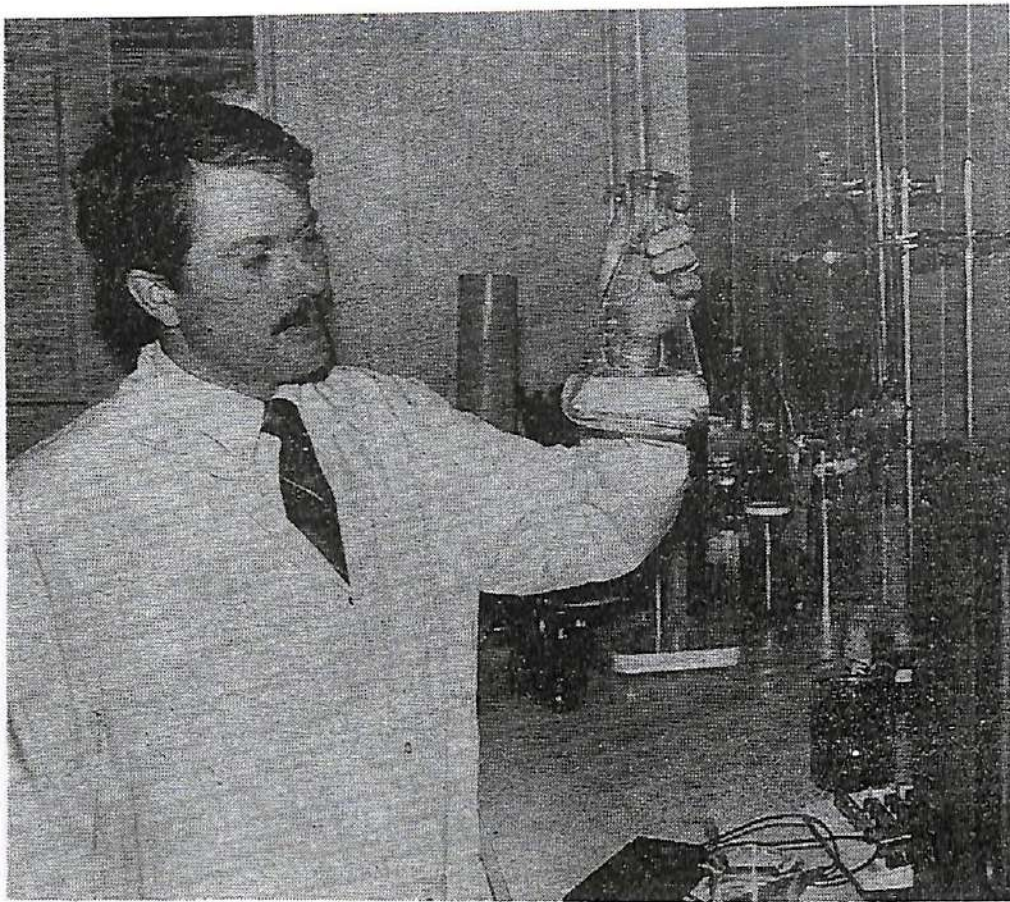

## Firm leads in lubricants

Commonwealth Oil, of Harrow, is one of the biggest little oil companies in this part of the country.

It employs only six persons full time, but somehow this scarcely known lube-blending plant supplies nearly every tooling shop in these parts as well as some of the major auto manufacturers in the world with its lubricants.

So Fred H. Herdman, president, can say without hesitation: "Commonwealth Oil has the best electric discharge machining (EDM) fluid in the world."

Technology Today, a publication of the Ontario Research Foundation, quoted him recently for saying it as did Tech Talk, a plant management and engineering publication, in its recent October edition.

Commonwealth Oil has been producing that particular machining fluid for only a few months, yet the Ontario Research Foundation and dozens of users in Southwestern Ontario have said they think Herdman's new product will soon become a big seller.

**ALREADY**, SOME of the largest firms in North America with electric discharge machining tools have switched to using Commonwealth Oil's EDM fluid. Ford Motor Co., Peerless Plastics, Rockwell, Canadian Salt Company Ltd., National Auto Radiator Mfg. Co. Ltd., Linton Systems in Toronto, Allied Chemical, General Electric in New York, now are buying large quantities of Commonwealth Oil lubricants.

Most recently, Herdman was discussing a "turnkey" contract with a major oil company in South Korea, which could result in Commonwealth Oil building and equipping a lube-blending plant in South Korea for sale to the new owners when it is operating satisfactorily.

"We would build the plant and equip it with our technology. They could then blend lubricants using our formulas. It appears that South Korea knows all about the technology of tooling and building automobiles, but they don't have the lubricants that we do," Herdman said.

**TWO OTHER** unnamed firms in countries abroad are considering similar arrangements.

Herdman said he is optimistic about such contracts. He sees how Commonwealth Oil products could become world products much quicker if they are blended in other countries. Already, the Harrow firm is selling EDM fluids and lubricants to a major tooling firm in Switzerland.

The EDM fluid is only one of many natural and synthetic lubricants the little Harrow firm has developed. Its products range from automatic transmission fluids to HD motor oils, from synthetic lubricants to hydraulic oils.

**HERDMAN CONCEDES** it may take several years to happen, but believes that his formulations will put Commonwealth Oil among the three big producers of EDM fluids in North America, a market with a total value of \$20 million annually. Herdman's story dates back to when Herdman was a boy and "must have gotten it (the oil) mixed in my blood while riding around with dad in his oil truck making oil deliveries." He says the oil business has been an important part of his life ever since he was old enough to tinker with it.

"It's like a hobby now. I live it and breathe it. I wake up in the morning and it's still on my mind from the night be-

been compounding industrial lubricants since 1983. But it has only been in the past year or so that a number of his lubricants have swept many of the other well-known names off the shelves of just about every tool and die or machining shop in Essex, Kent and Lambton Counties.

**"BUT I'M NOT** alone. Vince Curtis, a consultant and chemist working out of Hamilton, is responsible for the EDM, for one thing. He spends most of his time in our lab. And Rick Dawson, in charge of sales and technical service, is doing his part in showing many of the local shops why our products are better than many."

Curtis was a specialist in lubricants and specialty petroleum products for the Ontario Research Foundation when Herdman enlisted the foundation to help him formulate a superior EDM fluid. His dad, Jack Herdman, who has been in the oil business for more than 30 years, "is my right hand. I couldn't possibly get along without him. He's here day and night, doing things I wouldn't think of doing...we burn a lot of midnight oil," Herdman says.

He said EDM fluid must remain physically and chemically stable during use and have a low density in order to promote rapid separation of the metal particles produced by the machining action.

**EDM FLUIDS** used throughout the tooling industry before Commonwealth Oil formulated its EDM fluid were white, odorous and lacking in an extended lifetime.

"We introduced EDM-244, a truly superior and revolutionary fluid because it has a longer fluid life, it has a proven field performance, reduces chances of fire...has more rapid flushing at the point of cut and has extremely low odor levels," Herdman said.

Dawson said the health and safety features of Commonwealth products are as important to Herdman and Curtis as the lubricating and cutting features. Their products have a low order

of toxicity, or skin, eye and lung irritation. None of the lubricants and synthetics are flammable nor will they deteriorate even after years of being exposed to light and air.

**EVEN THE** floor absorbent powder, Floor-Dry, that Commonwealth Oil imports for local distribution is non-toxic, non-corrosive and odorless. Herdman said he imports it from Nevada because of its safety features—it absorbs spills immediately leaving the floor dry and safe.

The dozens of products Commonwealth Oil blends begin as virgin oil from a refinery in Sarnia. It oil is trucked to the plant in Harrow where it is mixed in seven blending tanks ranging in size from 6,000 to 16,000 litres.

Delivery trucks carry the blends to their destinations, daily to locations in Essex, Kent and Lambton Counties.

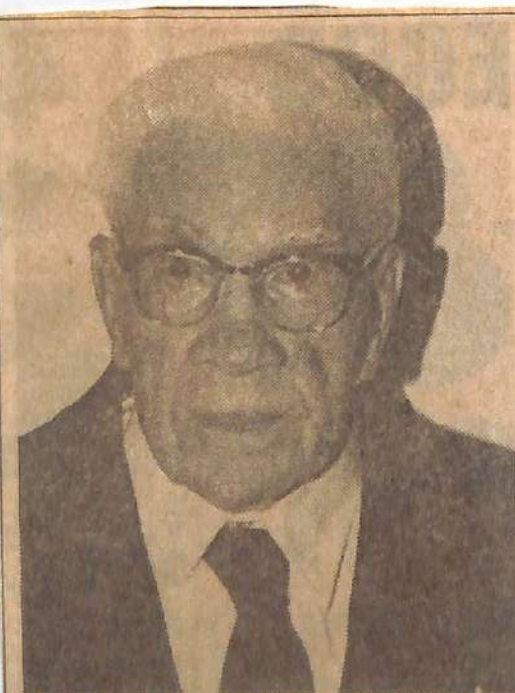
