Township School Area of Sandwich South

The regular June meeting of the Board of Public School Trustees of Sandwich South was held on Tuesday evening, June 16th, in School No. VI. All members of the Board were present, as well as a delegation of ratepayers from No. VI district, and Kenneth MacKenzie, Chairman of the Board, opened the meeting.

It was pointed out that the Junior Room at No. VI has only one exit, and on motion of Arnold Axcell, seconded by Wilbert Snyder, it was agreed that a second door should be installed for fire exit purposes. The secretary was asked to get recommendations from the fire marshal.

The ratepayers of No. VI area requested that a pressure system be installed in the school, with indoor plumbing. The Board pointed out that no drainage system at this school had ever been devised which was effective, but it was agreed, on motion of Mr. Snyder, seconded by Mr. Axcell, that a survey be made by civil engineer C. G. Armstrong to determine whether a pressure system would be practical

and what steps would be necessary to drain the property.

The question of salary maximum for teachers was again discussed, and on motion of Mr. Banwell, seconded by Mr. Snyder, it was agreed that the basic maximum should remain at \$2,800. Allowances for university degrees and principals are to be in addition to the basic maximum.

On motion of Mr. Banwell, seconded by Mr. Axcell. Mrs. Marion Tiers, of Windsor, was appointed teacher of the Junior Room at No. VI.

It was agreed that a ventilating fan should be purchased for the Junior Room at No. I which, because of its low roof, becomes very hot in warm weather.

On motion of Mr. Banwell, seconded by Mr. Axcell, it was decided to proceed with plans to have the Junior Room at No. VI painted, as well as No. IV, and the outside of No. X.

The secretary was asked to purchase a flag for No. II school, and plans for a picnic at No. I were approved.

Disbursement list covering disbursements in the amount of \$3,315.62 was read and approved on motion of Mr. Axcell, seconded by Mr. Snyder.

Area man dies from head injury

A critically injured Windsor-area man died of head injuries in a Denver, Colo., hospital on Wednesday, two days after a car-sized boulder crashed into a sightseeing bus.

Douglas MacKenzie was 67.

The Sandwich South Township farmer and his wife, Susan, were the only Canadians on the 28-passenger Gray Line bus travelling through a mountain pass 96 km northwest of Denver.

Mrs. MacKenzie remains in Denver's St. Anthony Hospital Central suffering from serious bruises, said son-in-law John Pentland, of St. Clair Beach, Wednesday. The MacKenzies are the parents of Windsor Star photographer Bev MacKenzie.

A work crew from the state's highway department was routinely clearing rock from the mountainside above the accident scene when the operator of a front-end loader pushed the two-tonne rock onto a flat area about nine metres long.

The rock continued over the edge of the area and fell through several hundred metres of trees before crashing onto the highway and hitting the bus.

Disciplinary action against the work crew will depend on an investigation, Dan Hopkins, a highway department spokesman, said Tuesday.

He told reporters earlier this week that rock-clearing is standard procedure in areas where there is a potential for rock falls.

WINTER PARK, Colo. — A Windsor-area man is in critical condition after a car-sized boulder crashed into a sightseeing bus Monday.

Douglas MacKenzie, 67, a Sandwich South Township farmer, is in St. Anthony Hospital Central in Denver with head injuries after the accident, which left six people dead and at least 17 others injured. MacKenzie and his wife, Susan, 56, who was not seriously injured, were apparently the only Canadians on the bus.

The accident occurred when a Colorado Highway Department road crew dislodged the boulder, five metres wide and two metres high, above U.S. 40, intending it to land on a flat surface. It bounced instead through trees and hit the bus travelling below.

The MacKenzies were on a holiday trip that began in mid-July, travelling through western Canada and the United States by motorhome. They were among 28 passengers riding the tour bus on a side-trip.

Their daughter, Windsor Star photographer Bev MacKenzie, was at her parents' farm Tuesday morning, working in the garden, when her mother contacted nearby relatives. Mrs. MacKenzie was listed in fair-to-good condition with minor injuries but was severely shaken and her daughter left immediately for the Denver hospital.

According to her husband, John Pentland, the MacKenzies were in Edmonton when the city was wracked by killer tornadoes July 31, but were not affected.

"THEY BOTH WANTED to see Colorado," Pentland said.

Two other daughters, Colleen and Gayle, were on vacation in the Georgian Bay area and could not immediately be contacted. Colorado officials were assisting the family in flying the two from Warton on the Bruce Peninsula to Detroit, so they could catch a flight to Denver.

Tragedy struck the MacKenzie family last week when Mr. MacKenzie's brother, Stewart, a Windsor parks department official, died suddenly at home of a heart attack.

Colorado Gov. Roy Romer has said the state accepts responsibility for the seven deaths, and is assisting victims and their families.

An AMI Air Life flight nurse who was on the first medical helicopter to arrive described what she saw as "a gruesome scene."

"We've all seen a fair amount of gruesome things," said Mardean Haines, 32. "But I've never seen one quite like that."

The accident occurred about 11 a.m. at the bottom of 3,448-metre Berthoud Pass, about 96 km northwest of Denver, said Dan Hopkins, spokesman for the Highway Department.

The Gray Line tour bus was headed west when the boulder, described by the Colorado State Patrol as "about the size of a VW bug" and weighing about two tonnes, bounced down the mountainside.

Hopkins said a road crew was routinely clearing rock on a switchback above the accident scene about 11 km from the resort town of Winter Park.

"THE OPERATOR OF a front-end loader pushed a large rock over the edge of the roadway onto a large, flat area about 30 feet (nine metres) long," Hopkins said in a prepared statement. The rock continued over the edge of the area "and down through several hundred feet of trees onto the highway below, where it collided with the bus."

Said Hopkins: "It was a normal rock-clearing operation such as those done statewide where there is a potential for rock fall. There's never been an incident like this."

He did not know what precautions usually are taken in such work.

Any disciplinary action against the crew members will depend on the outcome of a Highway Department investigation, Hopkins said.

Sgt. Larry Tolar of the Colorado State Patrol said Rod West, a Gray Line driver for nine years, saw the boulder falling and swung the bus to the left in an attempt to avoid it.

"The rock collided with the right front of the bus where the passenger door is and came down through the whole right side of the bus," Tolar said.

There was a "tremendous amount of damage," Tolar said. "It looked much like an explosion. The whole side of the bus was ripped out." See AREA, A4

Schmidt said the 362-km "One-Day Big Circle" tour, which runs daily from Memorial Day to Labor Day, travels over Berthoud Pass on U.S. 40 and stops in Grand Lake for lunch. After driving through Estes Park, the \$30 US scenic ride travels back to Denver.

Four of the injured were in critical condition Monday night at three Denver hospitals. Those who received less severe injuries were admitted to several hospitals and clinics, and some — including bus driver West — were treated and released.

Six of the 28 passengers — many from foreign countries — escaped injury.

Two of the dead were identified by Grand County Coroner Dave Schoenfeld as Arlene Johnson, about 60, of Renville, Minn., and John Killeen, about 60, of Denver.

Schoenfeld said it is believed the other four victims are married couples from Australia and Alabama. Their names have been withheld pending notification of relatives.

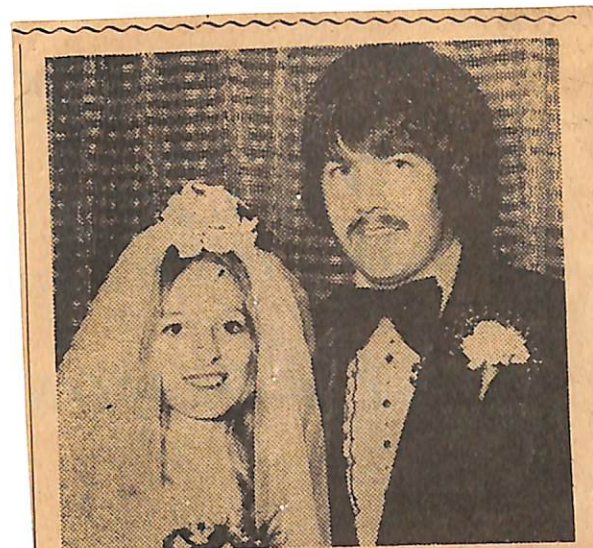

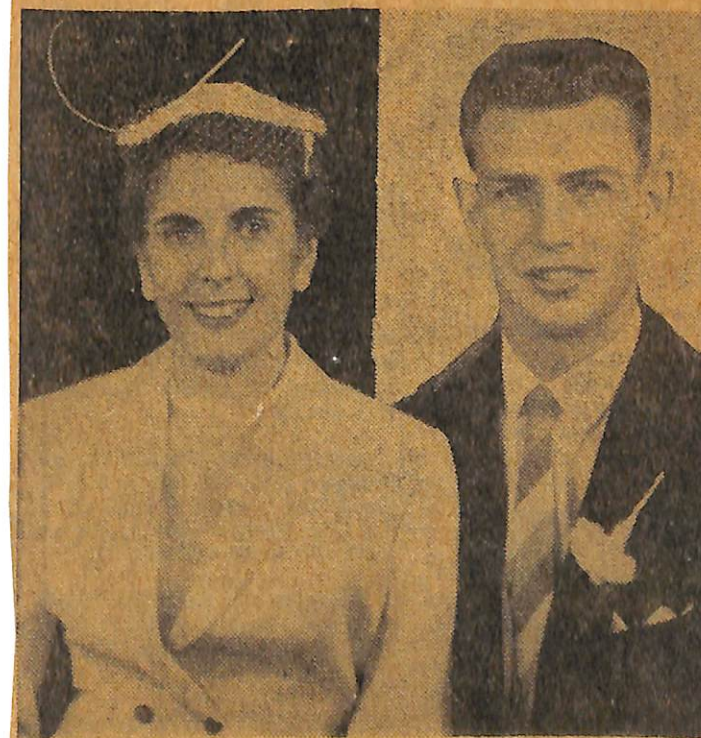

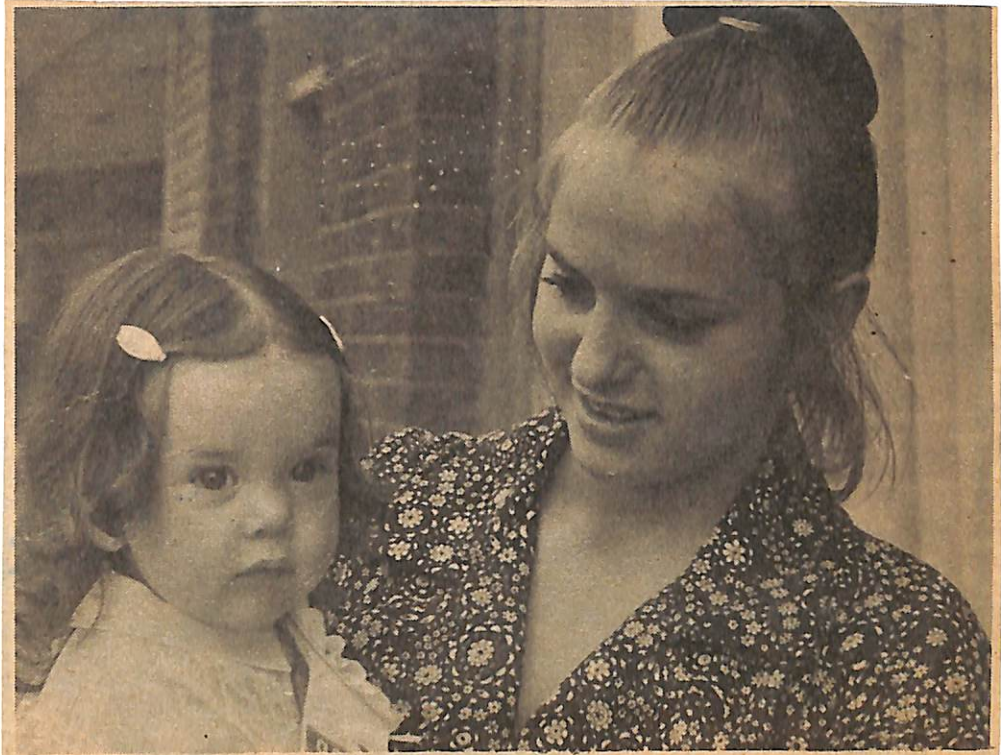

Study of Common Roots Draws Interest . . .

History is fascinating and a chance to learn more about the roots of Essex County attracted about 150 persons to a conference at the Civic and Education Centre in Essex Saturday.

It was a meeting of historical associations of the county at which representatives outlined their accomplishments in preserving history and their future goals during the morning session.

In the afternoon David Glick, director of education at Greenfield Village and the Henry Ford Museum, said museums and artifacts were useful only if they transmit knowledge from one generation to another. Artifacts, he said, like books, are to be used and not just stored on shelves.

"If we ever forget we are working with things of people, we lose the meaning."

Museum pieces should be used for reference points, he said.

"If knowledge is only stored it is of no use. You've got to use a museum. Museums are still on conducted tours of people, admiring the museum and not coming to grips with what is its meaning. It's now how much we can squirrel away but how much knowledge we can transmit," he said.

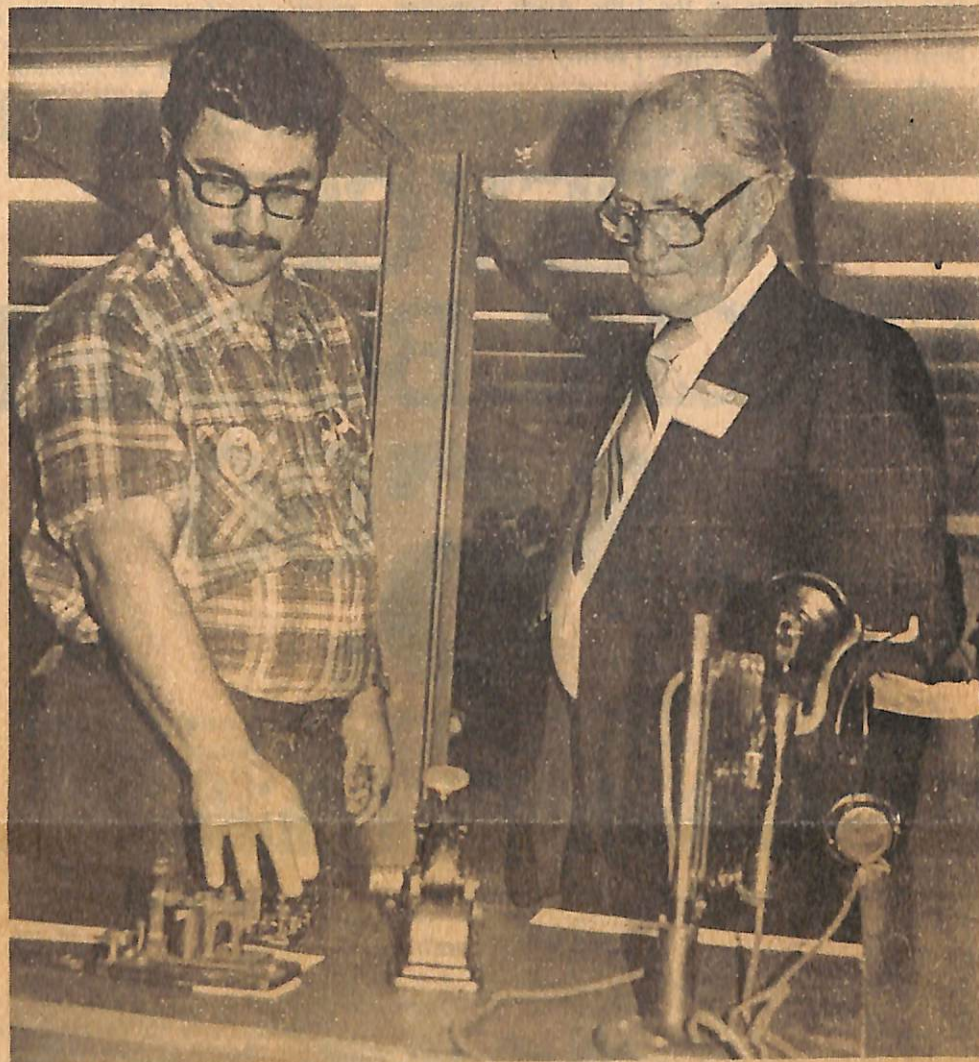
He said it is not enough to keep spinning wheels, but more common things like ice tongs or milk bottles should be preserved.

Everything must go through the junk process as they move from current to antique and in that process survival is often not included, he said.

"An electric sewing machine is still knowledge locked up of the thirties."

He recommended preservation of historical buildings on their site, if at all possible.

Dr. Larry Kulisek, Cottam, chairman of the event, said the program was organized

by Gladys Golden, Harrow, Co-vice-president of the Essex County Historical Association, to create closer co-operation between historical associations in the county and prevent duplication of effort in obtaining knowledge of the county's past.

He said the association hopes to circulate a common newsletter, carry out joint projects that would broaden the vision of local groups in preservation of the county's history.

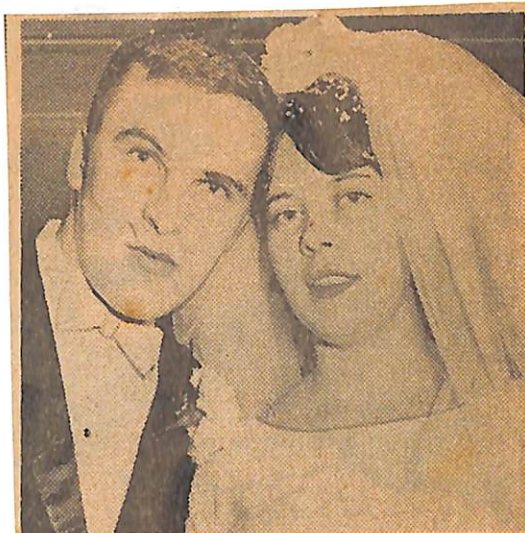

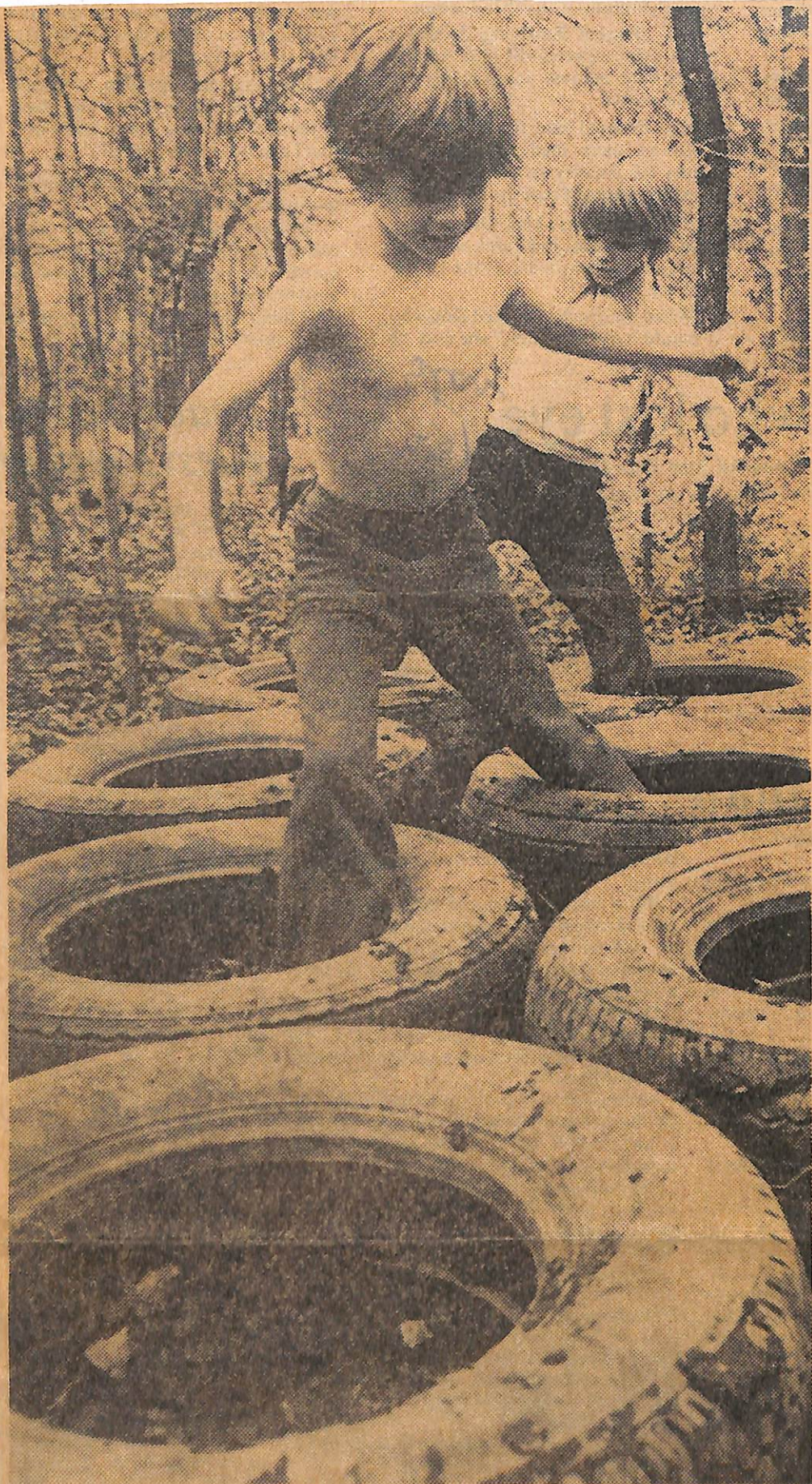


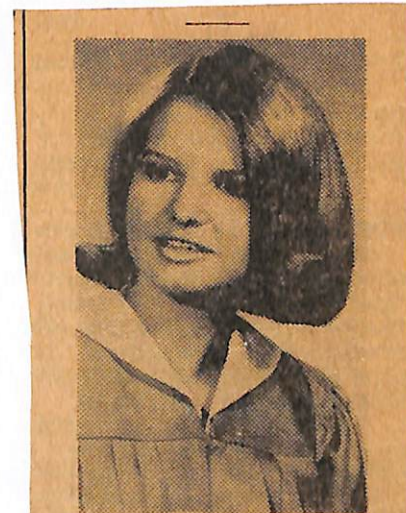

Making A Game of Understanding Your Friends

Do you think you know your friends very well? Can you tell how any one of them will act in a given situation? There's a game that helps you prove how well you know them and provides fun doing it.

The game is Psychologizer. Its inventor is Tom Managhan of Oldcastle, who has a doctorate in social psychology.

Psychologizer, as the rules explain, "is for people-watchers who pay attention to the interests, attitudes and habits of others and who like to predict what others might say or do in response to typical and not so typical situations."

Players take turns being the opinion giver and by flicking the spinner, determine which of six categories the situation will concern. Three are amusing and three are serious but all are about subjects that interest people.

Then a card is pulled from the designated category and the situation read aloud with the four alternatives in dealing with it. The opinion giver secretly chooses which one is most applicable. Meanwhile each of the other players try to guess which course of action the opinion giver would take and each wagers an amount on his or her guess according to how well that person thinks (s)he knows the opinion giver. For correct answers a pawn is moved forward the amount of the wager; for mistakes, it goes back that much.

While the object of the game is to win, the fun is in the guessing, or the "psychologizing" as its inventor dubs it.

Length of the game may be pre-determined by the players. The first section gives you a bachelor's degree, add the second for a master's and if you make it to the end you are surely a doctor of psychology. At least your pawn will have a cap and tassel.

To add intrigue, a little square top is snapped in place as a graduation cap on the pawn when it reaches the bachelor degree, then a tiny tassel is dropped through the hole provided to signify the master's.

Tom compiled the more than thousand questions in 2½ years of planning. The

six categories are Love and Sex, Politics, Sports and Recreation, Personality, Philosophy, and Morality. Each category has 168 situations with four optional responses for each.

He says he wanted to create something that would have mass public appeal.

"Trivial pursuit really interested me and I thought as a psychologist I should be able to come up with something people would like. I thought of what people are interested in and worked from there".

Unlike Trivial Pursuit you don't have to know endless and trivial information to do well on the game. You don't have to know any facts and you don't have to do well to have fun. That comes in trying to assess your friends' responses.

"People will become interested in trying to decide what the other players would do in a given situation. It's a great way to find out about people," Tom says.

It's a party game, best when played by six to eight players although fewer can play.

After Tom first identified all the ingredients to make it successful, he saw the possibilities of threat to a player's self-esteem in the game so he removed that by making it fun.

"Then I converted all that into the format of a game."

During the creation years he thought of different situations that people might find themselves in and the ways they might react. This was what took the time and he treated it much as one would a hobby.

"Then the rules came up fast," he says.

The lawyer he consulted for copyright was so fascinated he asked for the privilege of investing in the game and persuaded three others to throw in a share.

"I had no trouble coming up with 27 shareholders. Most are friends and relatives."

If its success rivals that of Trivial Pursuit, they can anticipate being in a much higher income bracket.

Tom, who works at Maryvale in Windsor to develop treatment programs

for emotionally disturbed adolescents, and his wife Carol, took a year's leave of absence from their jobs to promote the game throughout lower Michigan and Southwestern Ontario as far as Toronto. He formed his own company in Oldcastle to handle promotion and distribution. He is president of the Managhan Toy and Game Corporation and Carol is treasurer.

One promotional strategy he is using is staging Psychologizer theme parties for college students.

"They are great for creating a fad and spreading it," he opines.

There are 36 Ontario retail outlets carrying the game and 11 in Michigan. Knowing there is no point in approaching a games manufacturer with something unproven, he hopes his promotion will indicate the game's popularity to attract a major games supplier to buy the rights.

With a game as exciting and interesting as this, there seems to be no need to wish him good luck.

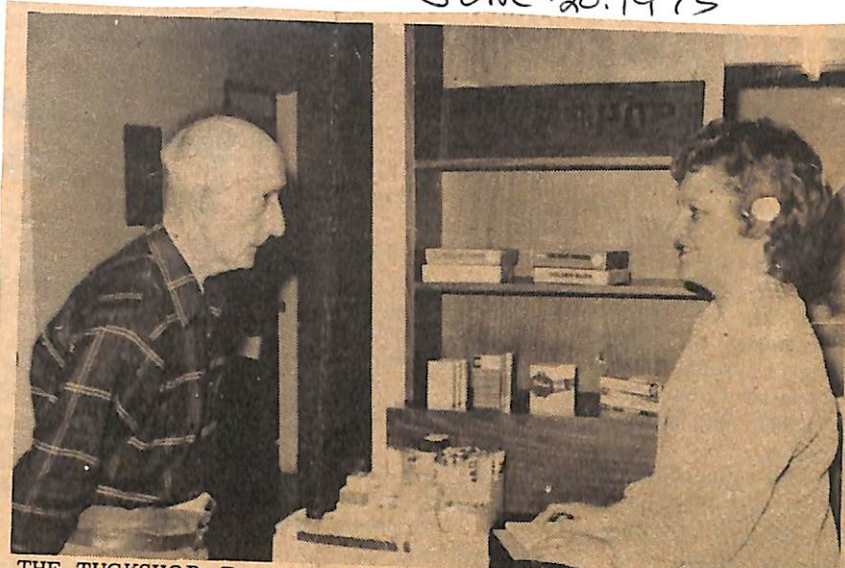

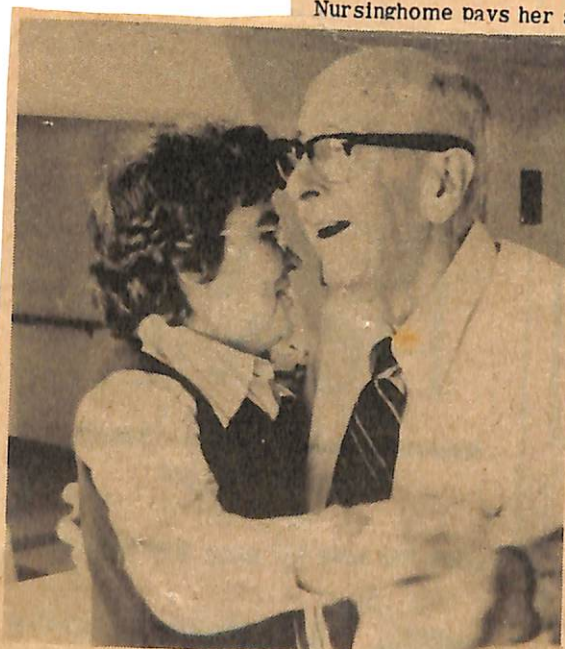

The name of the game is winning wealth

THE OBJECT of this game is to see if Tom Managhan can buy a villa on the Riviera.

The play takes place on a familiar game board called Windsor, Ont., and the players are Managhan's family, friends, associates and business acquaintances.

The name of the game? Psychologizer, a word Managhan coined to describe that little psychologist in us all.

We've all engaged in psychologizing: What would so and so do if he knew that so and so was...? So and so would never wear anything like that... or would she? What would you do trapped in a room with your worst enemy?

Managhan, 35, plans to turn idle speculation into cold cash.

Psychologizer, as Managhan explains in the rules of play, is for "a people-watcher who pays attention to the interests, attitudes, and habits of others and who likes to predict what others might say or do in response to typical and not so typical situations."

Managhan's predicting his game will appeal to a game-hungry public that has turned Trivial Pursuit into the runaway Canadian success story of the 1980s.

WE'VE HEARD THE stories about some nobody who banks a dividend cheque in the thousands every few months because he was lucky enough to get in on the ground floor of Trivial Pursuit with an initial investment of a measly few hundred bucks. One Montreal investor allegedly bought a villa in Spain with his money.

Trivial Pursuit was like winning the lottery for them and there's no reason it can't be like that for the 27 backers of Psychologizer, said Managhan.

The 35-year-old psychologist at the Maryvale Adolescent Treatment

Centre in Windsor has the credentials. He got his doctorate in social psychology at the University of Windsor in 1981 and eventually got hired at Maryvale to develop treatment programs for emotionally disturbed adolescents.

AN INCURABLE psychologizer himself, Managhan said the idea came while driving north with his family to a cottage near Sault Ste. Marie.

The Managhans — Tom, his wife, Carol, and two children, 14-year-old Tina and 11-year-old Brien — passed the time imagining what they'd do if they won a million dollars.

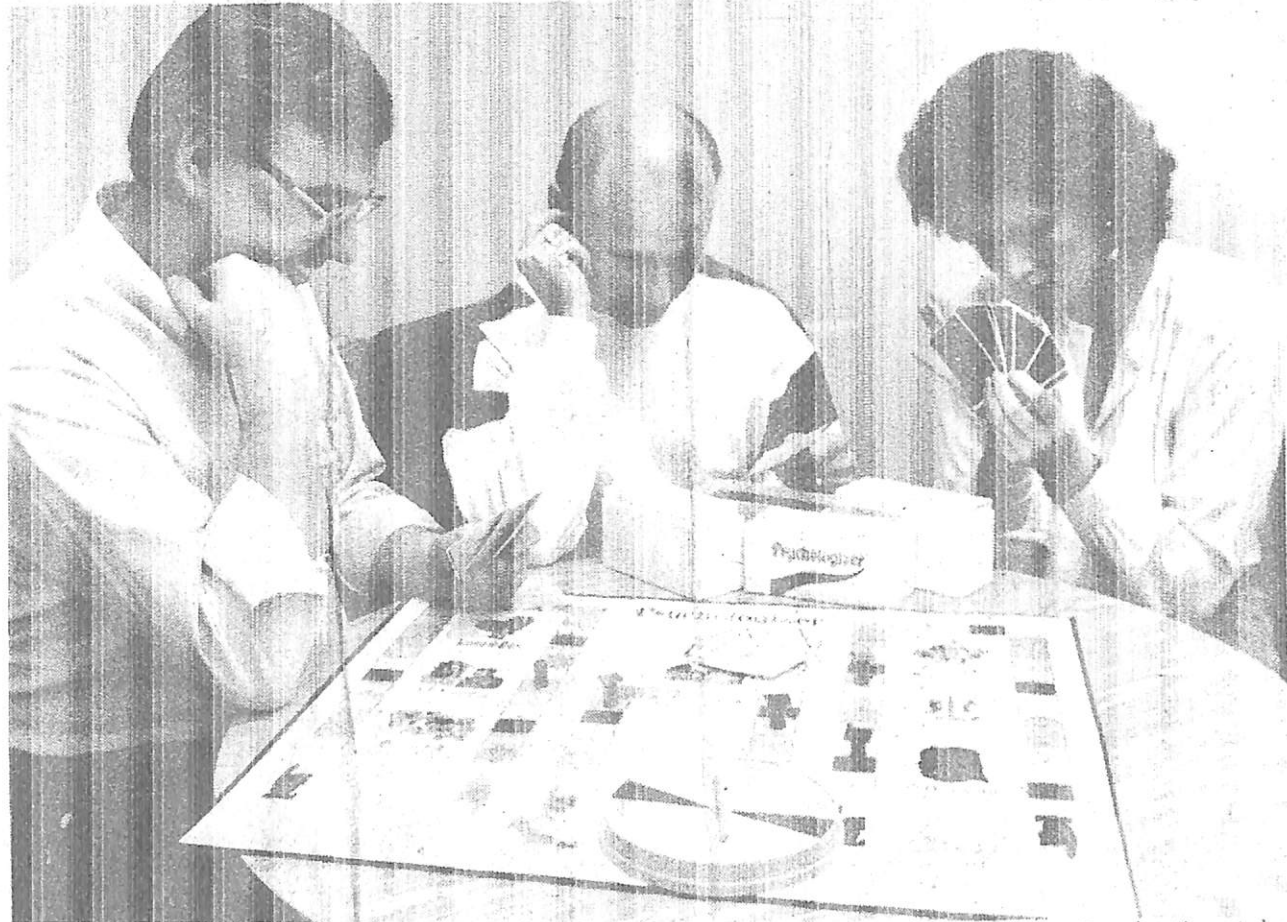
"Then we started imagining what other members of our family and our friends would do with it," he said. "What we were doing, I realized, was psychologizing."

When he decided the idea had marketing potential, the next step was developing his sources: "I started going around with my ears perked up, listening to other people doing the same thing and kept a running record of situations. Then I'd try to make certain situations fit motives."

The result was a catalogue of people's preferences, biases, emotions and political views.

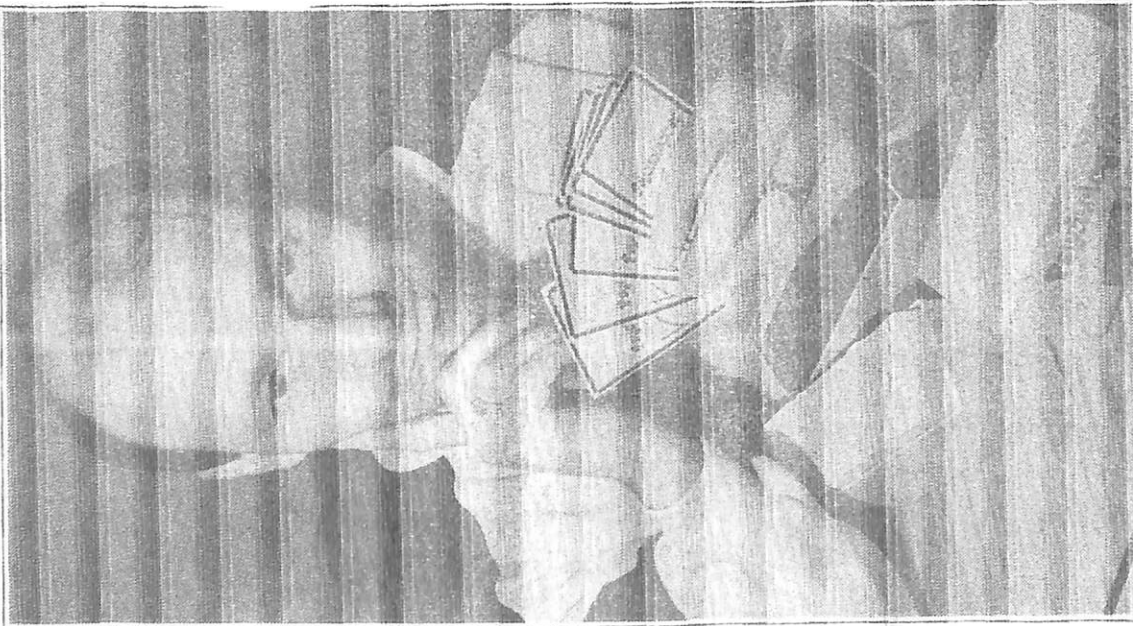
"Of course, I was trained to spot attitudes and I came up with thousands of different attitudes and opinions. My background in rating and personality

scales and tests helped me develop the game, but they aren't necessary to play it."

"The great thing about being an amateur psychologizer is you don't have to know anything to be an expert. And people like that will get a kick out of Psychologizer."

"It's not like Trivial Pursuit," said Managhan. "You don't feel stupid if you don't know a bunch of silly facts. And it's a great way to find out about people."

MANAGHAN COMPILED his questions, just over a thousand of them, during a three-year planning period. There are six categories: Love and Sex; Philosophy; Politics and Current Events; Morality; Sports and Recreation; and Personality. Each category has 168 questions and each of those has four optional responses.

Just as he was getting the concept off the ground, somebody told Managhan about a new game on the market called Scruples. He said he nearly fainted when told about the concept, a game that tests people's motives and attitudes in various circumstances.

"I thought, oh no, all my work was for nothing. That was basically what I was working on."

But he insists Scruples is unlike Psychologizer, which is meant to be a fun way to spend a party with friends. Although some of the situations are serious-minded and will spark heated debate, there's nothing in Psychologizer that requires a player to deliberately lie about himself as in Scruples.

Although the object of the game is to reach a certain point on the board first, the appeal of Psychologizer, said Managhan, is not in winning but in learning about yourself and friends.

"PEOPLE WILL become interested in the process of playing rather than the object of the game," he said. "Psychologizer won't appeal to the real competitive spirit."

It took Managhan 2½ years to write the questions. Then he bundled up the concept and visited a lawyer to see about copyrights. Not only was the lawyer helpful, he was fascinated enough with the idea to convince three other partners to get in on the ground level of investing in it.

Getting investors was easy, said Managhan. Probably due to the precedent of Trivial Pursuit and that universal urge to gamble on something, Managhan soon had the \$136,000 needed to design and manufacture the first 5,000 games.

There are 27 shareholders with various levels of commitment. Managhan's family and in-laws are involved, along with some friends and people who work with him at Maryvale.

Managhan formed his own company based in Oldcastle, where he lives, to handle promotion and distribution. He's listed as president of The Managhan Game and Toy Corp. on company business cards; his wife's the treasurer.

One investor is already working on a version of Psychologizer for adolescents, so the game is sprouting a cottage industry of other games, just like Trivial Pursuit.

Managhan realizes his biggest obstacle to gaining acceptance for Psychologizer is that "it's just another board

BELIEVING college students make up the majority of games players, Managhan has convinced St. Clair College and the University of Windsor to stage Psychologizer theme parties. London's Fanshawe College will have one, too.

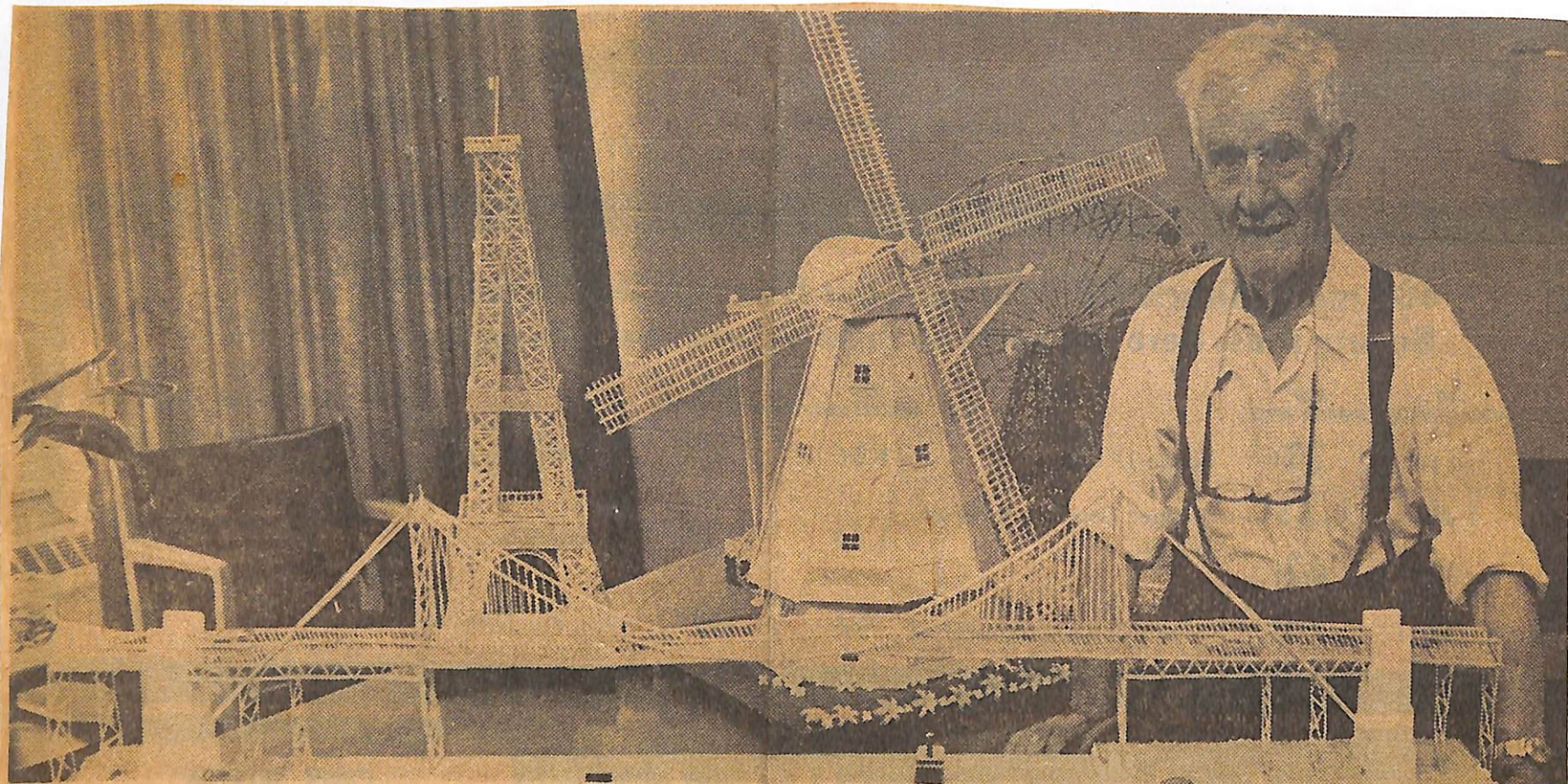
He and his wife have spent the last few weekends promoting the game in stores in Ann Arbor, the home turf of the University of Michigan. Managhan has a trademark on the game and copyright in Canada and the U.S.

Because of the value of the U.S. dollar against the Canadian, Managhan figures he can sell Psychologizer in Michigan for the same price he'll charge here, about \$35, including taxes and duty.

Right now, distribution is limited — there are 36 retail outlets carrying the game in Ontario, 11 in Michigan. But Managhan hopes the idea will catch on enough this Christmas to attract a major game supplier to manufacture and distribute it.

Maybe then our game player can cash his tokens in on that villa on the Riviera. And his friends can visit in their new yachts.

But then, that's engaging in a little psychologizing, too, isn't it?

Up, up and away--some fliers prefer to build their own

It takes more than a jumbo jet or an SST to impress the men who build and fly their own airplanes.

While wives and neighbors watch in exasperation, these pilots and craftsmen spend countless hours tinkering with fabric, glue, and tubing in garages, basements, and barns throughout the area. And all for the feeling of satisfaction that comes when the planes, some weighing less than 1,000 pounds and spanning less than 30 feet, finally take to the skies.

Most homebuilders belong to the international Experimental Aircraft Association, represented in the Windsor area by Chapter 185 formed 10 years ago. It's an organization which may soon adopt a new name. Chapter president Bob Daudlin noted serious consideration is being given to the title of "Sport Aviation Association."

Mr. Daudlin is among those who feel the EAA name, while now recognized in more than 53 countries, is "perhaps a misnomer" for a group which has encompassed other facets of private flying.

"Sports Aviation" will have a wider connotation, including aviation enthusiasts other than homebuilders and the 'warbird,' antique and classic aircraft categories," he said.

Some EAA members believe the term "Experimental" implies that flying your own plane entails more than actual risk.

"It sounds too much as if we are just nailing things together," said George Mann, of 576 Ducharme. Another member, Ernie Bardsley, of 711 Kennedy, said while the EAA title implies that homebuilders have some leeway to build as they want, it also could be interpreted as signifying that they are apt to "cut corners" along the way.

Mr. Mann, now finishing a Volksplane probably most noted for its 40-horsepower Volkswagen auto engine, and Mr. Bardsley, who has been "puttering around" with a two-seater Flutterbug, are typical of about 40 members of the EAA here.

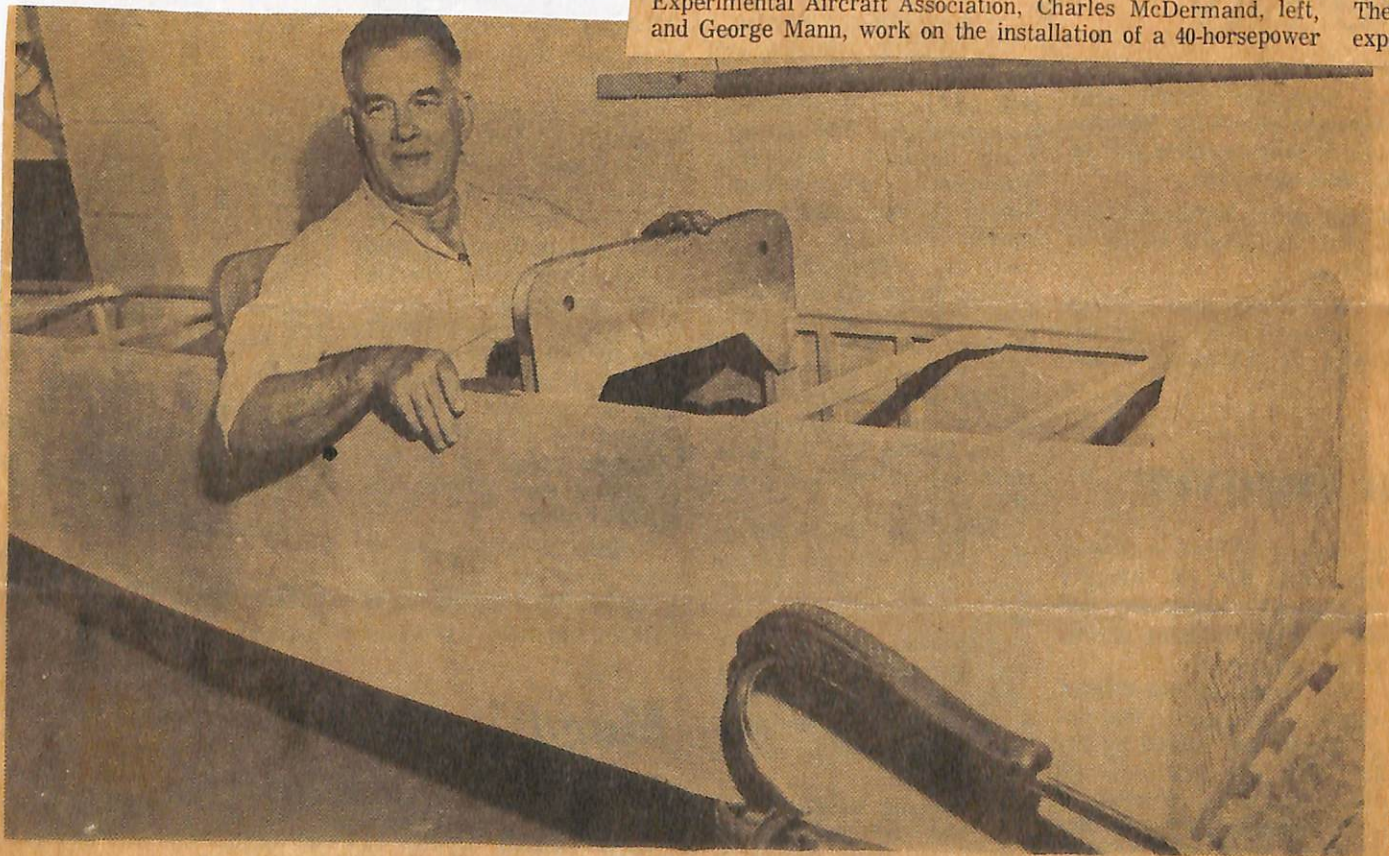
Mr. Mann has been flying a vintage J-3 Cub for 17 years since he "got into an airplane accident while we were

'A lot to look forward to'

Arthur still flying high at 91

LEAMINGTON — When you see Arthur Mann walking the halls at Sun Parlour Home for Senior Citizens, you wonder why he carries the cane.

It scarcely touches the ground trailing in the wake cause by his brisk passage down the corridors.

A spry and twinkle-eyed 91, Mr. Mann shows and says he has "a lot to look forward to." There's never an idle moment—nor is there a routine.

His most recent project was construction of a model of the Eiffel Tower in Paris. Laboring only with a supply of glue

and 12,000 matchsticks, he took four weeks to complete the model.

His only reference for construction was a picture postcard of the original.

"He never sits idle," one nurse said. At almost any time, Mr. Mann can be found either working on some pro-

ject such as the most recently completed one, or crocheting, another of his hobbies.

A native of England, Mr. Mann came to Canada in 1905. He settled in Windsor and was employed at the Fisher Bodies' plant until his retirement. Married 60 years, his wife died at the home two years ago.

About 25 residents at the home are actively engaged in the production of arts and crafts artifacts at the home. About ten of these exhibit their crafts at Toronto Exhibition every fall and have won many prizes there.

The residents take great pride in the production of dolls, candlesticks, pin-cushions, woven baskets and hooked rugs in their four-times-weekly craft sessions.

One of the most actively engaged, Mr. Mann loves flying. Both of his sons, he says are active flyers, George being a commercial pilot.

"I even flew back to England last year for a visit," he says. "But most of all I like to fly with my sons."

"I flew last Sunday," he said. "Right over this building."

"Did you like it?" one nurse asked.

"You bet your life I did," was the reply.

Look, it's a bird - - - it's a Volksplane

The basement of a house is an area that can be put to many different uses: storage, recreation, laundry tubs, father's workshop . . . you name it. Usually it tends to be used for all these things.

It can even be used to build airplanes, as at least two members of the Windsor Experimental Aircraft Association are doing.

George Mann is building a "fun plane." It's a one-seater light plane, powered by a 1,500 cc. Volkswagen engine, for solitary Sunday afternoons when you just want to get away from it all.

The Volksplane, as it is known officially, will be a companion for Mr. Mann's 14-year-old Piper Cub. It will cost about \$1,200 and will take 1,000 man-hours of work.

Not the high-speed and expensive "executive" aircraft, the Volksplane will cruise at about 80 to 85 miles-per-hour and that's about as fast as you want to go with an open cockpit.

Besides, when you fly as Mr. Mann does, to "just get fun out of it, you know" you don't need a lot of speed to keep you up there.

Mr. Mann started working

on the plane last November and put 400 hours into it before he stopped to repair the wings on the Cub.

He expects to be ready for a test flight early in the fall.

It is a small plane, 440 pounds, with a 24-foot wingspan and over-all length of 18 feet built out of birch plywood and spruce supports held together with glue. The only metal is in the aluminum landing gear and wing and tail supports.

Although the Volksplane is not produced commercially — it is exclusively a home-built model — Mr. Mann estimated

it would sell for approximately \$10,000 on the open market.

Ed Romiens has been working on a glider, in his basement at 443 Ellis St. W., for "four or five years," and expects to be at least another year completing it.

"I'd better finish it pretty soon or I'll be too old to fly it," he chuckled.

Mr. Romiens has to build it in sections — each wing is 26 feet long. One wing is done and he's working on the other. The fuselage, to be 22 feet long, is next.

Virtually every part is made from either sheet or structural aluminum, and the finished product will weigh only 400 pounds, said Mr. Romiens, who makes his living as a structural steel estimator, at Canada Bridge.

His glider is really a high-performance sailplane, he pointed out. A glider has a glide-ratio of 20:1 — that is, from a mile high, it will glide 20 miles before touching down — whereas the ratio in his sailplane is 45:1.

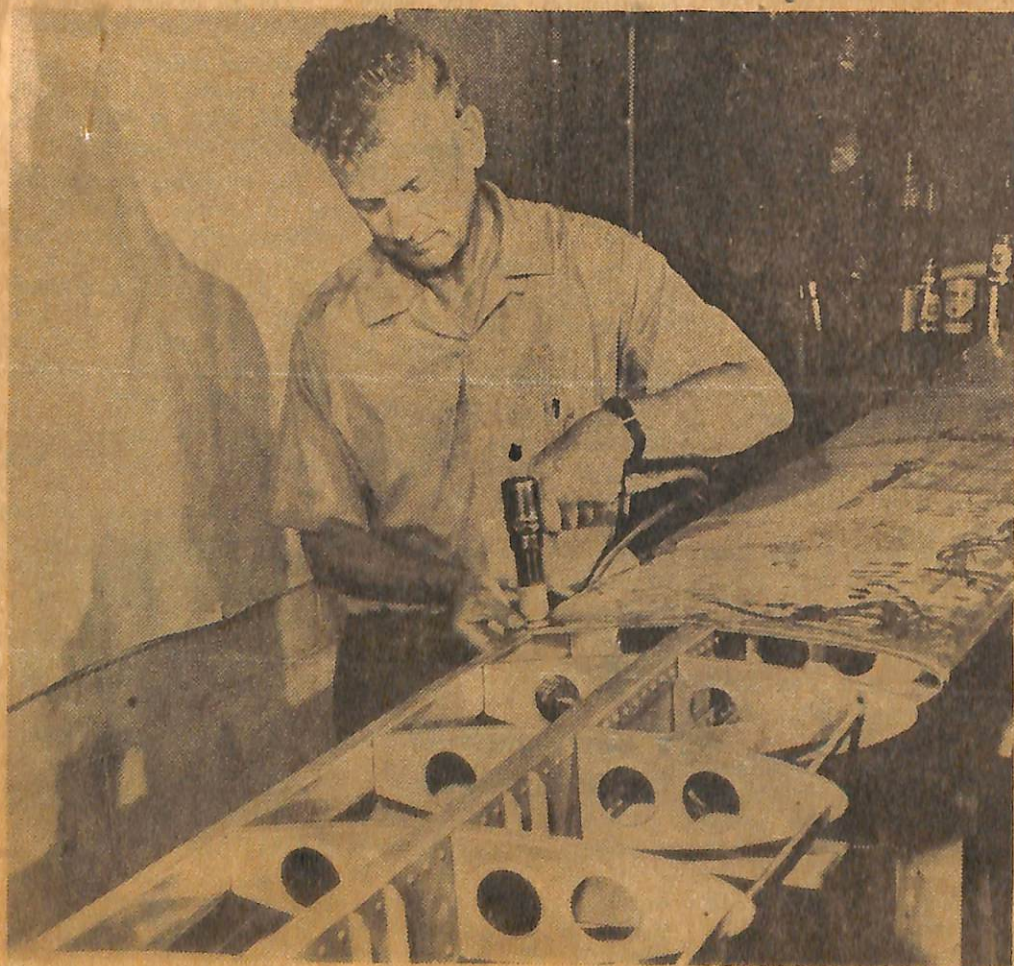
He said he has spent about \$1,000 on it to date, and expects to complete it for under \$2,000.

Mr. Romiens returned Sunday from two weeks at the Canadian Forces base in Trenton, where he was instructing air cadets in gliding techniques.

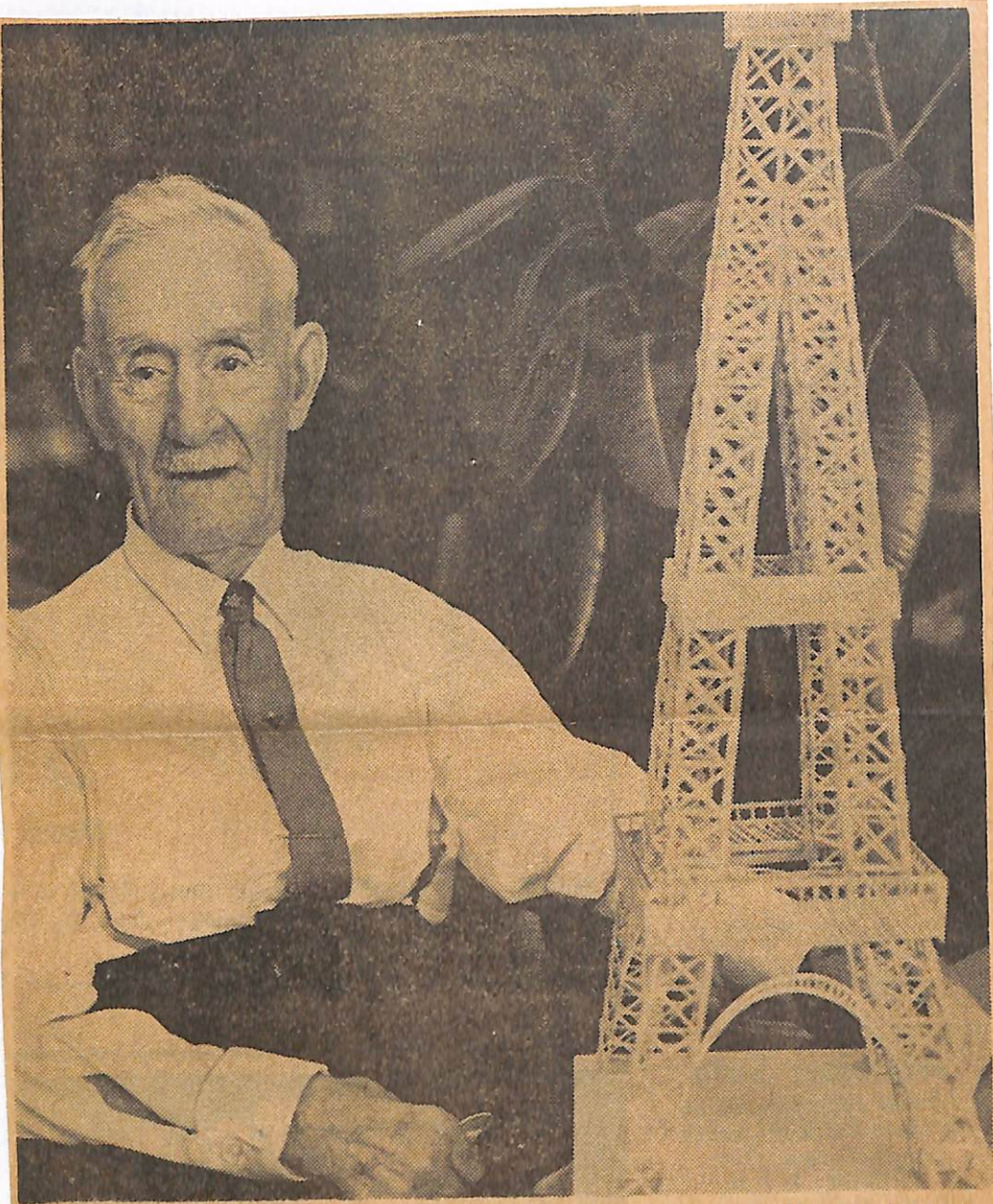
He said he did a little power-flying during the war, but for the past 10 years, has stuck to gliding. "It's a challenge to stay up when there's no power. You're relying on Mother Nature to keep you aloft," he said.

Gliding is less dangerous than power-flying, he said, because "there's no gasoline to catch fire."

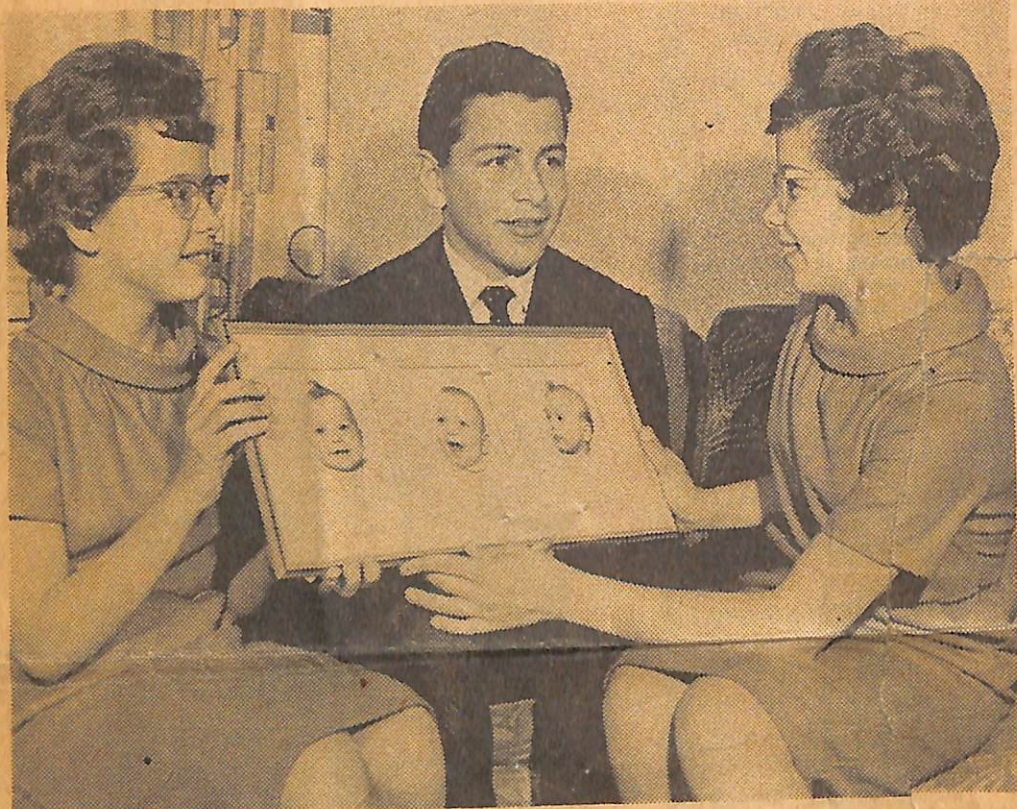

In the days of the rural operator, Maidstone Annie was the connection of a less travelled farming community to the outside world. Fire chief, doctor's helper, nurse, ambassador of happiness and a little newspaper along the far-stretched lines of the township.

"Doctor MacDonald is at Bill Smith's. Mrs. Smith is having a new baby. "Doctor Rogers is at Joe Miller's. Joe is down with the flu." "You want to know where the manager of the Co-op is? oh! he's at the St. Stephen's chicken supper."

"Frank McCloskey just went over to the church we will see if we can get him." "What was the score of the ball game? We haven't heard yet but we will tell you."

"There is a fire at Jim O'Connor's so will have to ring eight rings and get some help over there".

APRIL 3, 1964

"Glory be to God, "Johnny" Robinson those lines are in an awful shape after that storm." (Johnny Robinson at that time was telephone lineman of the township). Now he is lining up the bad-boys at the County Courts).

"Bill you have a bad pain well put some ice on it and take a drink of liquor until I find the doctor."

For 38 years this was the life of Annie in between raising a wonderful family and keeping on top of the pulse of a rural township's people.

The rural township of Sandwich South municipal phone system has gone to the Bell with the progress of the county and so has Mrs. Annie Markham passed on to a telephone operator's heavenly home.

People will dial numbers from here all over the continent of North America but that burping little box on the desk will never take the place of "Annie's" pleasant "Number Please". Good morning Bill, Joe, John, Mary, Kate, Colleen. It's such a pleasant morning."

It is said automation will gobble the working man in time but if the passing of Annie Markham is a sample of the loss of the human touch, life will have no aim and no heart.

Annie has gone to better world we believe and should there be sainthood for people in this community our Annie is well on her way even in death.

Should you pass through Maidstone early in the morning there is a little old lady still slowly walking to St. Mary's Church saying, "Number Please", Glory be to God I am supposed to be praying not answering numbers now.

New Horizons a Reality for Artist

It's Grandma Markham we have in our midst, instead of Grandma Moses. She is Marie Markham of Maidstone.

Marie did get an earlier start than Grandma Moses, but her 60th birthday was a memory when she began painting.

"I always wanted to paint but with twelve children I had no time and no money to do it."

This month her works are on display at Essex library. They represent a cross-section of her paintings that have been done on order for customers across Ontario and Michigan.

"I have been commissioned to do pictures for people in London, Oshawa, Cornwall, and in Michigan."

Those people are apart from her family, which Marie fondly refers to as her own built-in fan club.

Her paintings are their wedding gifts, for the 44 grandchildren and 16 great grandchildren.

But whether her work is for direct sale, on commission or as a gift, Marie says sales are not the issue.

"It's the enjoyment I get out of doing it. It's wonderfully pleasing."

That enjoyment goes far beyond the creation of a picture for this vivacious lady. It's the satisfaction of finding new "horizons" in later years, in being busy, and involved, in knowing there is always something waiting to be accomplished.

Kattis Is Rotary's Peace Ambassador

If fostering peace is the goal of the Rotary International student exchange, then they have taken a giant step forward by bringing Kattis Nilsson from Sweden to Canada.

She comes from Laholm, a small town on her country's west coast and is presently staying at the James Markham home in Maidstone Township while attending St. Anne's High School in Tecumseh.

This vivacious and perceptive 16-year-old was involved in the peace movement in her school as a leader.

"I'm just one person but I'm going to go back with a message. You have to start somewhere. I hope people show more respect for other people's cultures, try to understand each other so there is more peace in the world."

And the exchange has worked beyond enlarging Kattis' experience as a peace ambassador. Two of her earlier hosts, Wayne and Margaret Langlois are visiting her parents while on a European tour. Their daughter is in Finland on a Rotary exchange.

Kattis has stayed with three families since she came in August. The other hosts were James and Dale O'Neil of Maidstone. She will return in July.

As a youth ambassador while here she has given slide presentations of Sweden and will gladly do so for any interested group. And when she returns she will do the same about Canada for her own people.

The main requirement in being accepted to the program is ability to "make a year on your own in another country," Kattis reported.

"I think it great that Rotary gives young people a chance to do what I've done. I've been lonely a lot of times

and said, I'm going home. You have to want to complete the program yourself."

And Rotary lends support. "If you are terribly lonely one person from Rotary will talk with you." She says all this in fluent English with very little accent.

Kattis decided to apply for the program after a friend returned from a similar program. It will mean a loss of a school year although she has attended high school here. "My friends will be a grade higher."

But she knew that in making her decision and appears to be convinced that loss is more than recompensed by the exchange program.

"I've grown a lot. I've had to think ahead for myself instead of saying, Mom, I need this or that. I've learned a second language."

Having the basics from studying English at school may have helped.

Learning to cope has provided direction. "I've been thinking of many things (for a career); politics, journalism, teaching, missionary work in the third world."

Now she has assurance. "I know I want to work with people. I know I can handle myself. I've learned a different way of life (and have been able to adapt)."

She values also knowing Canadians as friends and has managed to grasp the fact that in this vast country one area is not the entire nation.

"Your country is really huge. Your capital (city) is so far away (from here). And your country is really, really young compared to Europe."

Only seven per cent of Sweden can produce food for the 8 million population, 90% of which lives in the south.

"We don't need as much meat. Lots of the food you grow here is fed to animals."

Families grow their own vegetables and the Nilssons like to leave their home near the sea for an inland summer cottage because at that time of year the population of Laholm increases threefold.

Her mother is a school nurse and her father the headmaster of elementary school. She has a younger brother and sister.

The school system is very different, Kattis says. Children start at seven and graduate after nine years. Most subjects are mandatory.

She says the differences in family life are small but noticeable.

As for Rotary, the club is more visible here.

Despite lonely moments, Kattis says she has never wished she hadn't entered the program, in which her hosts have contributed much to making her content.

She applied for the exchange for the experience.

"I felt I needed something added to my life. At the beginning I did it for myself, to do something different."

"I think it's great Rotary gives young people a chance to do what I've done. The organization sponsors this for the good of it and the families I lived with didn't get one penny."

WHEATLEY — It was just another snowmobile outing, like the many others the two best friends shared this winter.

But it ended in tragedy for 15-year-old Deborah Markham of 41 Plumbrook St., Leamington, who became the second area victim of snowmobile accidents in two days.

She died from injuries suffered when the snowmobile she and her friend were riding struck a tree on the bank of a frozen creek bed about 1.6

km (one mile) south of Wheatley.

The friend, 14-year-old Hendricka De Waal, of Wheatley, was critically injured and taken to Leamington District Memorial Hospital. She is in serious but stable condition in the intensive care unit after an emergency operation for internal injuries Monday night.

Constable Ken Drouillard of the OPP Merlin detachment said the girls were travelling at an undetermined speed along a branch of a

stream known as Two Creeks when the snowmobile struck a snow-covered tree stump at about 4:15 p.m.

It caromed off the stump and slammed into a tree, throwing Markham, the driver, into the tree. De Waal flew into her friend.

Two Creeks in Romney Township, is about 366 metres (1,200 feet) wide and extends about five km (three miles) from Lake Erie into Wheatley Provincial Park.

Drouillard said the girls were not in the park, but on

private property when the accident occurred. They were discovered by another snowmobiler who flagged down patrolling OPP Constable Jim Dickson.

Less than 48 hours earlier, 21-year-old Peter Cada of Maidstone died after being struck by a snowmobile on Lake St. Clair.

An autopsy was to be performed today at Metropolitan Hospital in Windsor.

It was to have been just another outing among the many the two teens shared,

De Waal's parents said from the Leamington hospital waiting room late Monday night.

Markham's parents interviewed at their 41 Plumbrook Drive home this morning said they didn't know all of the details of the accident and funeral arrangements would be made today.

Greg Markham, her father, a foreman for a contractor at the Essex engine plant, said visits between the girls' homes weren't uncommon. He said his daughter didn't

have much experience operating a machine although the family owned one several years ago.

He and his wife Ruby have one other child, David, 13.

"They were regular teenagers," Markham said. "Deborah liked art, music; she really liked school. She was an honors student." Both girls were in Grade 10 at Leamington District Secondary School.

"They were best friends," Harry De Waal, of Erie St.,

Belle River history . . .

. . . comes with land purchase

New park goes back to early settlement

BELLE RIVER — When Belle River takes title to the 12-acre Markham estate it will acquire more than just a new park.

The estate is all that remains of one of the first homesteads along the north shore of Essex County.

A history of the family shows that Harry Markham, born in what is now Belle River in 1837, was probably the first white child among the Indian settlements along the lake.

His father, Harrison Markham, a convert to Catholicism after his marriage, took all nine of his children to the nearest church for baptism.

That "nearest church" was a two-day trip away in Sandwich.

Later, it was in the Markham house that the first services were held in the area. Many of those attending came from great distances to hear mass read by an itinerant priest and sleep overnight on the floor to ensure they would be in time.

When Harrison died in 1852, probably from sunstroke, his wife's courage and dedication didn't desert her. Olive Markham proved to be a remarkable lady.

"She had the courage of a man," the family history relates. "She loved and was loved by the Indians. She welcomed run-

away slaves from the South. She was a sort of court of final appeal in local affairs. There being no midwife at hand, she attended the sick and at times even brought them into the house."

Elizabeth Markham, born in 1839, the oldest daughter, later told members of the family about the primitive conditions under which they lived in pre-Confederation Upper Canada.

She recalled the stir that the first friction matches caused when imported into the village, and the excitement over the first oil lamp, coal stove and railroad telegraph.

The Markham family originally came to North America by chance. Daniel Markham, whose family owned land in Nottinghamshire, England, was shipwrecked off the coast of Massachusetts about 1630. He married, but when his young wife died, he returned to England.

He left behind a son, Daniel, who later founded a town named Enfield, in Connecticut. Five generations later, Israel Markham left Enfield for Longmeadow, Mass., where Harrison and another brother, Sylvester were born.

Both men immigrated to Canada in the 1830's, founding branches of the family in the Belle River-Stoney Point area that still exist.

The park property that the town recently purchased for

\$110,000 is likely the site of an original crown grant deeded to the family sometime in the 19th Century.

All that remains are the six acres of woodlot and six acres of untilled fields.

Of the house and original outbuildings, nothing is left.

The town has not yet decided what it will do with the park, although the most likely use will be to make it into a passive recreation area for hikers and picnickers.

Although the park is not technically "regionally significant" — a term the Ministry of Natural Resources and the Essex Region Conservation Authority use to decide grants — it is an important part of the north shore's heritage.

Wheatley said. "They went to school together and always visited back and forth."

Monday afternoon they took the school bus to De Waal's home, hopped on the snowmobile and drove down a creek bed on the west side of Pier Road.

The mishap occurred about one km (.6 miles) from the De Waal home.

De Waal described his only child as an experienced snowmobiler who had been driving for three years. He had bought the 1978 Yamaha 340 machine for his family and their friends to enjoy, he said.

He described Markham as an attractive, polite, well-brought-up teen-ager who enjoyed ice skating and roller skating with his daughter.

"They are just real good

kids," he said. "Both of them."

Drouillard said the accident was probably the result of inexperience. The girls were not required to have a licence because they were on private property, but the constable said young people who drive snowmobiles should be properly trained or accompanied by adults.

Rain, heat or strike... rural mails go through

OLDCASTLE — Outside Windsor's sprawling, modern mail sorting plant on Walker Road, pickets walk in the hot sun as the strike by the Canadian Union of Postal Workers enters its 11th day.

Just down the road, there's another post office, separated from the main sorting plant by two kilometres (1.2 miles), years of tradition and a different union.

Step through the door with the torn screen and you're greeted with the friendly smile of Marilyn Martin, postmaster of Oldcastle.

The tiny post office in the 55-year-old building on Highway 3, around the corner from Walker Road, has the aura of another era.

And yes, this post office is open.

Martin is busy sorting mail in wooden slots behind the old-fashioned wicket with its worn counter.

The Oldcastle Post Office is one of the many rural post offices open despite the strike.

It's not that the rural postal employees decided not to join their urban counterparts in a work stoppage, but they're members of the Canadian Postmasters and Assistants Association, a separate bargaining unit.

And so the mail goes through, what little there is.

The small post office on the outskirts of Windsor is a family affair.

Martin's husband, Barry, delivers and picks up the mail of rural route customers. They live in an apartment at the back of the building.

Thursday was Martin's busiest day since the strike began. She processed 75 letters, compared to the normal volume of 900 to 1,500 a day.

Many other days since the strike began, only one or two letters found their way to the Oldcastle Post Office.

Most days, "I feel like the Maytag repairman," said Martin.

Robert Emmons, Essex postmaster and supervisor for five rural post offices in this area, said all employees still working have reduced workloads.

"But at least they've got a workload. I've got nothing here," said Emmons, explaining the Essex postal workers belong to the CUPW union and are on strike.

Emmons said the rural postal workers have been instructed only to go out on their routes if they have enough mail to warrant it.

They won't travel their routes for only one or two letters, he added.

He stressed the rural post offices are only accepting and delivering local mail.

For example, if you want to send a letter to Toronto, it won't do any good to drop it off at a rural post office, because the mail won't go anywhere.

Part of Martin's mail volume Wednesday came from a local company which sent out bills. Two weekly newspapers were dropped off at the Oldcastle Post Office for delivery to local customers.

Union Gas had earlier delivered its local bills to the post office.

The Oldcastle Post Office delivers mail to 300 rural route customers and has about 70 general delivery boxes.

Most of the general delivery customers don't seem to know the post office is open, and mail is beginning to collect in the boxes, said Martin.

Meanwhile, Martin swelters behind the wicket in the post office, awaiting the occasional customer and an end to the strike, and envying the children playing in a sprinkler behind the building.

Neither rain, snow, heat nor strike will keep her off the job.

Motorcycling only a part of club's requirements

Members not only need to be able to ride a motorcycle, they must be able to drive a firetruck.

The Red Knights, based at Oldcastle's Sandwich South Fire Department, make up one of 43 chapters in Canada and the U.S. and Barry hopes to attract new members.

"Wives are welcome as social members," says the burly 37-year-old.

Since early this year, he's been the township's only full-time firefighter and much of his relaxation time is spent giving bike rides to his family, including wife, Marilyn, 34, and three children, Shawn, 12, Chris, 10, and Theresa, 6.

"The purpose of our group is to promote a better image of biking, a more positive outlook by the public."

The club also socializes with other chapters and Barry is working on a joint ride with the Blue Knights, a policemen's biking club.

"We want to do something for the community and we've chosen the burn unit, at Metropolitan Hospital, as our interest."

"We'll be working to raise money for them as soon as we get more organized."

Barry's wife, Marilyn, who works at the Oldcastle Post Office, says she's an avid bike fan. "I just love it. You get to meet other firefighters' wives. Just being able to get together with people with the same interest is great."

"We've had barbecues and we just came back from a weekend in Brantford."

Membership is \$35 a year and the only requirement concerning bikes is that they be street-legal. No dirt bikes, Barry says.

"It doesn't matter what size. We'll just limit ourselves to what speed the smallest bike will go."

Although there are only 14 Essex County firefighters wearing the club's red leather vests with the Red Knight crests, Barry hopes to raise the number to 25 by next year.

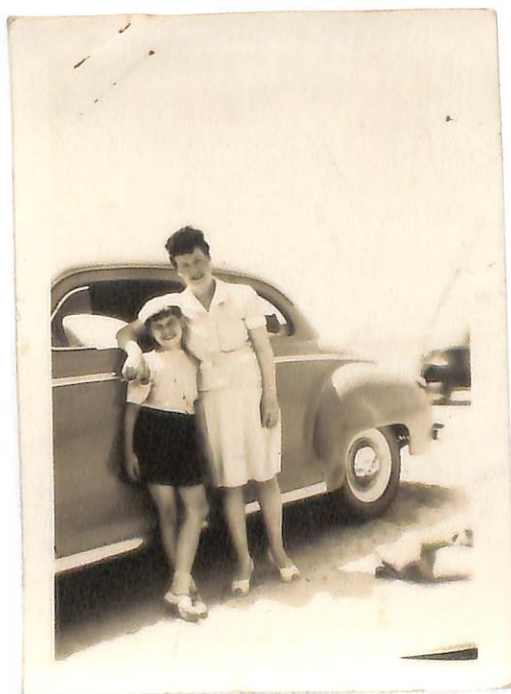

showers from her friends. Mr. and Mrs. Martincic are staying with the grooms' parents until they are able to build their own home next door.

Mrs. Martincic speaks excellent English because she spent her senior high school year in New Jersey on an exchange scholarship.

She has been in Canada only one month but says she likes it already.

Ecuadorian TV Producer Visits Here . .

show on Channel 8, Quito, designed to assist women of Ecuador in understanding the government of their country and in improving their homemaking skills. Mrs. Chauvin is the first woman television broadcaster in Ecuador.

An Ecuadorian producer and broadcaster of television has been a recent visitor to our area.

Evangeline Chauvin who directs the show, *Woman and the Home*, through Quito's channel 8, visited her daughter, Mrs. Fernando Martincic and her family in Sandwich South near Maidstone.

Mrs. Chauvin is the first woman television director in Ecuador. Her appointment opened a door for recognition of women of her country and her informative program has provided new hopes and possibilities for every woman who views it. The program views the social, economic and political scene as well as the interests of homemakers in cooking and handicrafts.

It is seven years since she began directing a children's program, a position offered to her because of her ability as a teacher with 30 years experience. More recently she was asked to organize and produce the

first women's hour of television, four days a week from 4 to 5 p.m.

While she and her husband were visiting with their daughter's family she has been collecting Canadian recipes for her cooking class. She was particularly delighted by our homemade pickles. Canning is comparatively unknown in Ecuador - a country where fresh food of some type is grown locally most of the year.

To widen the horizons of Ecuadorian women, Mrs. Chauvin adds to the traditional subjects of child-rearing and home care, an insight into the political situation of their country. Each Monday she interviews personalities who are involved in political, social or economic conditions and she conducts a talk show for the public to make comments, and ask questions. Another valuable feature is her presentation of interchange between youth and the older generations.

Her Monday show explains the difference in the two constitutions being proposed by the Ecuadorian government, which has been a military dictatorship for the past seven years.

At the time of takeover the government promised they would eventually call an election and apparently the time has come, Mrs. Chauvin said through her daughter who interpreted the conversation for us.

Her show presents both sides of the proposals, discusses changes that could be made, in preparation of her listeners to vote on the referendum regarding the proposed amendments.

Once this question is settled the people will vote for a president from two candidates, she explained.

Since most of the people own a television set despite the relative high cost, her program is viewed by a high percentage of the population as well as by many in Southern Columbia.

Future plans include involvement of youth and more dialogue between generations.

Being so well known has its disadvantages, she says, but bringing new hope and insight to the women of her country has given her a challenging and interesting career. So much so that her remarks in Spanish could easily be interpreted as enthusiastic.

While information for women may be a recent innovation in her country, one bank has been bringing technical information to farmers for 52 years. It is the National Development Bank of which Mr. Chauvin is an auditor. Its 54 branches provide technical knowledge in crop and animal production through a staff of agricultural experts.

Mr. Chauvin said his country would benefit by interchange of visits with Canadian technicians.

"It is something like the David Frost show, only aimed at both housewives and career women. Mother has guest interviews, cooking corner, sewing hints and advice on domestic problems," says Cecilia.

Cecilia is sharing the home of her husbands parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fernando Martincic Sr., while her husband (Fernando) and his father build a new house next door on Ninth Concession.

Cecilia is learning to cook her husband's favorite Slovenian dishes, but he has also

learned to like her Spanish taste treats.

While she waits for her new home to be built, Cecilia plans to enrol in classes at the University of Windsor. She would like to have a degree. She is a qualified bilingual secretary, and in a pinch she could make her French do.

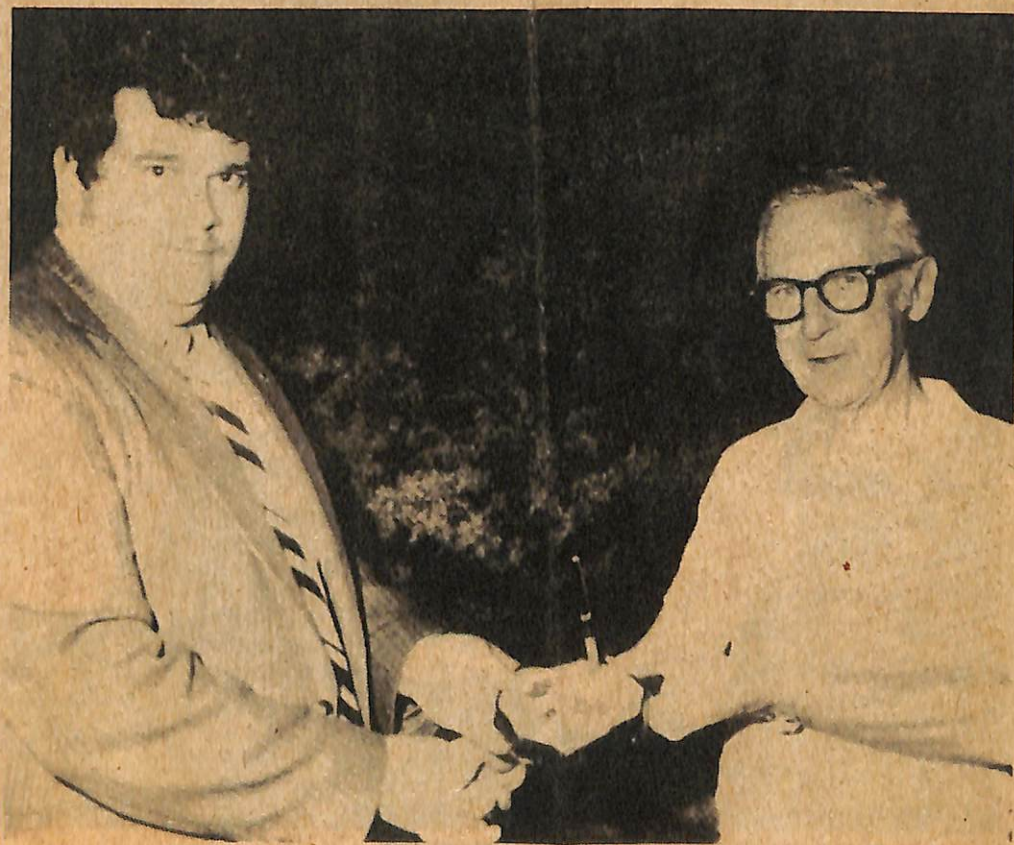

swimming, sports and just sitting down and watching TV.

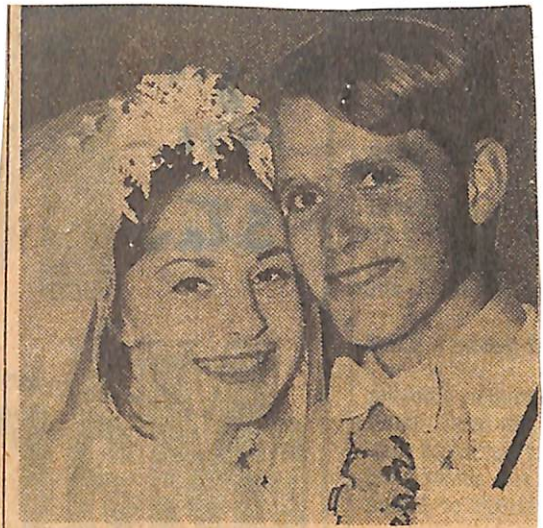
But enough of that and, as the old saying goes, "All good things must come to an end." As this summer ends I can always turn back and say, "I grew up a little during the summer of '78."

Rescue attempt futile in blaze

CHATHAM — The father sat mute, staring at the smoke pouring from his burning home... hoping against hope that his three young children had somehow escaped.

Earl Joseph McAuliffe, formerly of Windsor, had been called from his job at Chatham's Motor Wheel Corporation of Canada Ltd. plant by the news that his house was burning and his three children, Darin, 4, Tara, 3, and Paige, seven months, were missing in the flames.

McAuliffe's brother, Bernard, of California Avenue in Windsor, said today funeral arrangements are being made with Windsor Chapel, 1700 Tecumseh Road East. Arrangements are incomplete.

At least two of the children, Darin and Tara, were baptized and the parents were married at Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church, 863 Giles Blvd. E., Windsor.

Bernard McAuliffe said his brother's family moved to Chatham in February after living for about a year on Olive Street in Windsor. Both the mother and father were raised in Windsor, he said.

The fire broke out shortly after 9:30 a.m. Monday, while the children were in their second-floor bedroom.

McAuliffe's wife, Rosemarie, was home at the time. When she was unable to get the children out, she ran to the neighboring home of Mrs. Mac Stennett, screaming that her children were in the building and asking that the fire department be called.

"She was almost in a state of collapse," said Mrs. Stennett.

By the time firemen from the Harwich Township North and South fire departments arrived, the home was a mass of flames.

"There just wasn't anything we could do to save the children by then," said Fire Chief Verne Henderson.

Firemen poured water into the burning building, hampered in their efforts by a lack of water.

The chief said his forces were joined by two trucks from the Howard Township fire department and began hauling water from a pond near the Mull Side Road and Highway 401, a distance of about two miles.

The McAuliffe's had moved to the two-storey brick farm home about six weeks ago from Chatham. It is owned by George Kereluick of Oxley Drive, Chatham.

Firemen say the damage will be in excess of \$25,000, although no official estimate has been given.

Shortly after the arrival of the firemen, Mrs. McAuliffe was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in Chatham by the Chatham ambulance service

where she underwent surgery for extensive lacerations to her left wrist.

She had sustained the injuries in her efforts to rescue the children.

Neighbors of the McAuliffes who had arrived at the home soon after the fire was noticed, said they had been rebuffed by heat and flames in their efforts to get to the children.

Firemen battled the flames for more than an hour before they were able to reach the upper floor to remove the

bodies of the three children. All were found in the second-floor bedroom at the front of the house.

Robert Kaufman of the Ontario Fire Marshal's London office, Constable Morris Elbers of the provincial police at Ridgeway and

Henderson began the investigation of the cause of the fire Monday. The investigation was to continue today.

Coroner Dr. Peter Green of Blenheim, who pronounced the three children dead at the scene, said Monday he would not decide if an inquest

would be held until the fire marshal's investigation was completed.

Constable Elbers said there would be no autopsy.

The interior of the century-old house was destroyed by the flames which raged for more than two hours and continued to smoulder for several more after the fire was brought under control.

The house is located on Con. 10 of Harwich Township, about a mile east of the Mull Side Road, 15 miles southeast of Chatham.

He was a fighter to the core who would not give up an inch if he believed it belonged to his club — the SHAMROCKS of MAIDSTONE baseball club; he was no fence rider and at those meetings he really spoke up his mind and therefore you knew where he stood.

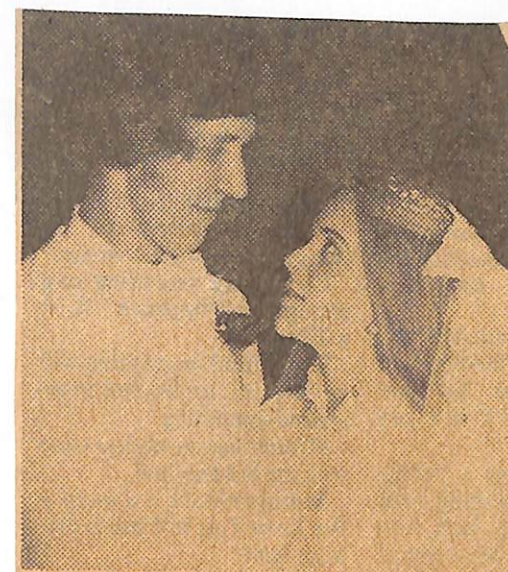

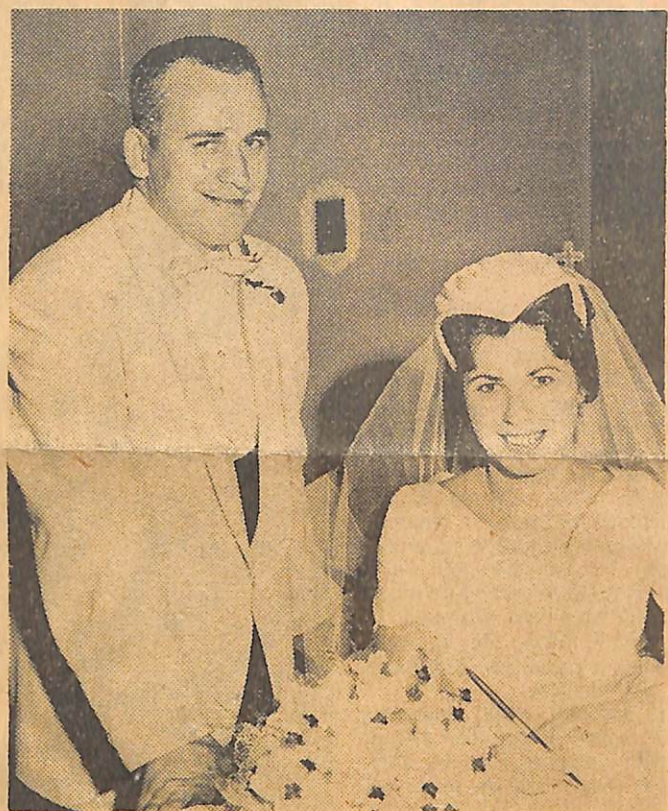

Rescue Bid By Father To No Avail

Volunteer Crew Discovers Body At Parents' Bed

By DON HARRIS

McGREGOR—A four-year-old Anderdon Township boy lost his life early this morning when he was trapped in his parents' burning home.

Dead is Michael McCann, son of Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm McCann of Walker Rd.

His father, 27, is reported in fair condition at Hotel Dieu Hospital with severe burns to his neck, back and arms. These were suffered while trying to rescue the boy from the blazing home.

The mother and a three-year-old daughter, Kelly, escaped uninjured.

Anderdon Township Fire Chief Eric Hooper said the fire broke out shortly before 4 a.m. when an oil stove exploded.

"Mr. and Mrs. McCann were asleep in one bedroom and the children in another," the chief added. "The father raced into the children's room and carried Kelly to safety. He was unable to locate his son."

The boy was found by volunteer firemen and members of the Amherstburg, Anderdon and Malden rescue unit some two hours later lying on the floor beside his parents' bed.

He was pronounced dead at the scene by Dr. E. C. Harris of Amherstburg. The body was removed to the Kennedy Funeral Home in Essex.

Some 20 firemen from the Anderdon volunteer fire squad answered the call. When they arrived the home was engulfed in flames.

Chief Hooper said it took less than a half hour to extinguish the blaze, but that his men were unable to enter the building because of dense smoke.

A number of the firemen had to be given oxygen at the scene by the first aid squad for smoke inhalation.

The floor of the one storey frame building caved in when men were finally able to enter, but no one was injured.

Both township fire trucks were at the scene, as were two ambulances and a number of police cars.

Traffic on Walker Rd. was confined to one lane, but police officers managed to keep cars moving at a steady pace and there was no tieup.

The McCanns' were renting their home from their next door neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Renaud. They moved into the house late last fall.

The fire marshal's office will be asked to make a complete investigation of the blaze.

Chief Hooper praised the people of the area for their assistance. "They did everything possible to help us," he said. "This included serving coffee and doughnuts to my men while they battled the blaze in mid 20 temperatures."

He also gave the fire truck drivers a pat on the back. "The roads were like a sheet of glass," he said. "They had to perform a miracle to get on the scene as quickly as they did."

Anderdon Township Reeve Charles Evans and Deputy Reeve Lloyd Bondy said this morning the township council will do everything in its power to assist the stricken family.

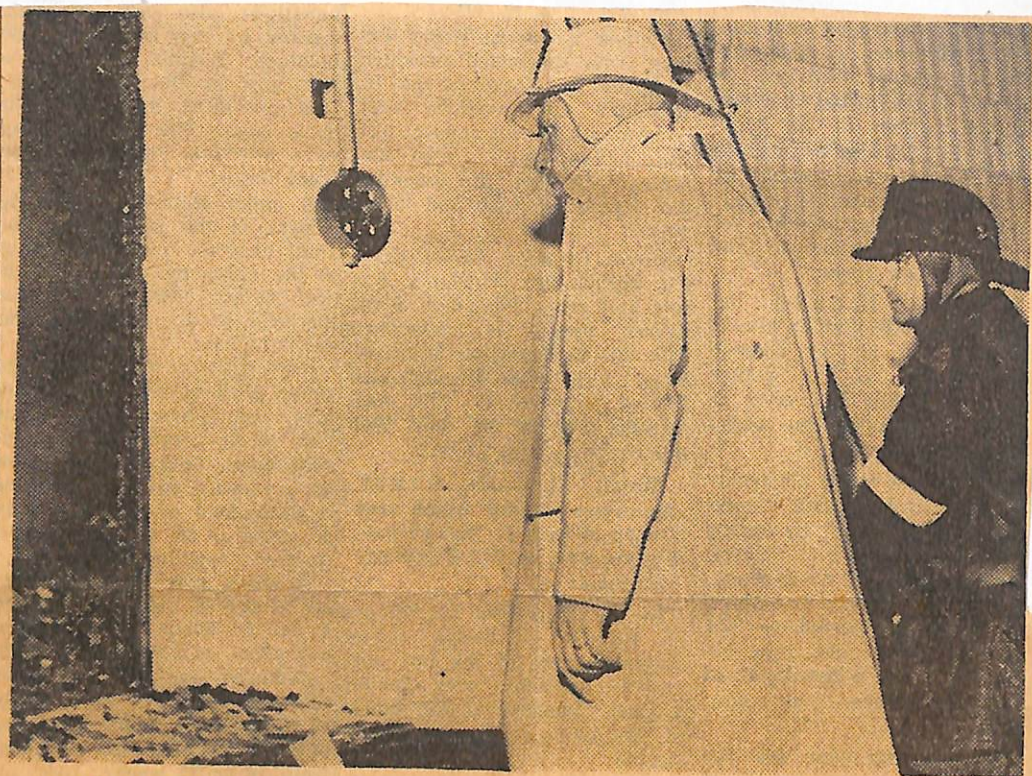

Family of 5 Hit by Blaze

A Sandwich South farm family of five has been forced to abandon the second floor of their home following a blaze Monday that destroyed the roof of the house. No one was injured.

The home is occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Vince McCann, who farm on Concession 11, a quarter-mile north of Highway 98.

Neither McCann, his wife nor their three grownup sons were in the dwelling when it caught fire. Mrs. McCann was in a nearby barn building working with two hired men when she saw flames leaping from the roof. No estimate of the loss has been made, but in addition to the destruction of the roof, furniture in two bedrooms was also destroyed.

Anderdon firefighters, who drove 11 miles to the scene of the blaze, said they believe it started in a chimney.

Their efforts were aided by those of the family and neighbors who formed a bucket chain 20-strong and also dragged downstairs furniture out of the house.

John McCann passed away at his home, 158 Curry avenue, Windsor, on April 20th, after a short illness. Mr. McCann was the last living member of his family and was born here in the village, on his father's farm, the late Mr. and Mrs. Patrick McCann, in June 1867, and was baptized in the old church, by the late Rev. Fr. Scanlan. Mr. McCann was a maintenance man with the N. Y. C. and was pensioned 22 years ago. Deceased moved to Windsor from here in 1911. He stood helplessly as airplane burned

Ken McCarthy remembers his feeling of helplessness.

First on the scene of Monday's fatal crash that killed three people, McCarthy (no relation to two of the victims, also named McCarthy), watched black smoke and flames roll up from the plane he saw nosedive into a farm field.

After frenzied moments of running around the wreckage and finding no one had escaped, he stood silently beside the twisted wreckage, with his wife, her sister and husband.

"It's an awful feeling to know someone is in there and they haven't got a chance," McCarthy said later that evening from his RR 3, Maidstone, home, 3.2 km (two miles) east of the crash scene near Windsor Airport.

"I felt frozen standing there because there's nothing you can do."

BUT HE, WIFE Barbara and Ben and Sheila Ducharme had tried.

The McCartlys' were just leaving from a visit at the Ducharme home on Baseline Road at 8th Con., Sandwich South Township, about 2:45 p.m. when

Ken saw the plane coming from the east, about a kilometre away.

"It wasn't that high, I figure about 200, 250 feet," said McCarthy, a diesel mechanic.

"I saw the plane's nose at quite a steep angle. The tail was, I betcha, eight to 10 feet below the nose."

Within seconds, he saw the plane begin to nosedive, and crash in trees near Ducharme's property. The couples sped .8 km (a half mile) to the scene in McCarthy's pickup.

Upon their arrival, they saw only the wreckage with small flames shooting from the fuselage. There was no sound.

"IT WAS A HEAVY wind," blowing away flames and smoke and McCarthy said he stood so close, "you could see there was no way to help anybody."

Five hours after the crash, he recalled another crash — the mid-air collision of two planes, July 10, 1979.

He was in the area that time too. He recalls being at the scene and the same sickening feeling that came with seeing emergency crews handle the fatalities.

"Your stomach just rolls."

Darryl Howe, 14, just happened to be looking out the kitchen window of his

grandfather's home Monday afternoon when he saw a plane flying low in the cloudy sky near Windsor Airport.

He remembers thinking it might be rehearsing for a coming air show.

Less than two km (1.2 miles) away, people around Windsor Airport saw the plane circle slowly before its final runway approach.

DORIT GIRASH, sitting in the office of her aviation firm at the airport, barely noticed radio communication between the plane and the control tower on her office monitor.

As Darryl saw smoke rise from behind

trees fronting the farm field, Girash heard a sudden long pause on her monitor.

Seconds later, both realized the single-engine plane had crashed.

Darryl ran out, yelling for his father, Jack, who lives beside grandfather, Wellington, on Ray Road.

And after telling Jack the plane had crashed, the 14-year-old kept on running — to the scene half a kilometre (550 yards) away as his father shouted to his wife to call police and fire departments.

"I JUST WANTED to go over and

see if I could do anything to help," Darryl said.

But Howe, like other people who had rushed to the scene, realized there was nothing he could do.

And as the Grade 8 pupil from nearby Tecumseh's A.V. Graham Public School watched the wreckage burn, "I was thinking about the people inside."

Girash left her office and watched with the crowd, stretched along Baseline Road, as emergency crews put out the fire and began the investigation.

Back in her office, Girash said she

remembers radio communication concerning the plane's landing gear.

THE PILOT WAS uncertain his gear was down and received control tower's permission for a flypast to check it visually.

"He said his landing gear didn't work," Girash said.

After he went around the airport, the pilot radioed the gear was down and Girash remembers the tower's final permission to land.

Girash didn't think much of the communication — flying conditions were good. She'd been up earlier that day with a student pilot.

But later, her staff who saw the craft, told her it was flying low as it swung back for a final approach.

"An employee told me he was really slow and low; he was really dragging it."

ANY NUMBER of factors could have led to the accident, she said.

Concern about the landing gear could have affected the pilot's concentration. Its role may be determined from the Transport Canada investigation.

Girash said a cockpit indicator light turns on when the landing gear is down and locks in place.

Occasionally, the light won't come on — even

though the gear is down, she said.

Witnesses said the plane appeared to slide sideways before twisting and flipping into a nosedive.

Where Christmas Begins in September

The fun of preparing for Christmas starts early at Kathy McCarthy's house.

A year in advance initially, then in a full-time, through-the-week pace by September. As this creative mother of two little girls makes and sells her wide choice of Christmas decorations she files ideas for next year. It's September when she gathers artificial and dried flowers, cones, ribbons, bells, all the Christmas trappings to entwine them in wreaths or arrange them as centre-pieces.

"Things I don't have time to make this year, I'll put away as new ideas for next Christmas", Kathy explains.

Recently she held an Open House when most of her creations were sold. But she continues to make floral pieces with fresh evergreens until Christmas. And she arranges fruit baskets with unique treats for those who place an order.

For her sale last year Kathy distributed flyers and got an amazing response. So this year she notified a few, ran a newspaper advertisement, and depended on "word-of-mouth".

So for two days Kathy was busy transforming her home into a Christmas showcase. The shelves of her china cabinet and bookcase and the walls were cleared to give place to the decorations, artistically displayed on tables, chairs, plate rails, even the floor.

New this year, decorated straw hats, wall hangings and greater variety in indoor and outdoor wreaths.

There are live cyclamens, dried flowers, fresh evergreen arrangements, crocheted snowflakes, tree ornament novelties, folk art (made by a neighbor who prefers to be incognito), stuffed novelties, hand embroidered table or chair pieces.

"I try to come up with new ideas, like the music in the arrangements," Kathy explained. "Most are different. I had new products to work with this year. For example, a new line of brass and wicker".

Her home is her shop, named Country Flowers because she lives on the South Talbot Road at the 10th Concession of Sandwich South Township. She works in her basement. Some items are the creations of family or friends. Grandma (Mrs.

Earl) Pulleyblank crocheted the snowflakes. Many know her from the days the Pulleyblanks operated the greenhouses and flower shop in Essex until it was sold to Helen's Flowers.

The interest passed to Kathy through her father, Bob Pulleyblank, who operates Suburban Landscaping.

The emphasis is on Christmas now, but Kathy's business runs all year with specialties at such special dates as Valentine Day and weddings whenever there is an order.

She learned the love of creating beauty with flowers

from Mrs. Pulleyblank.

"Grandma had a flower shop in Ridgetown and each summer I would spend a few weeks there working with her".

Kathy studied floral design at Guelph University and worked for florists until her first daughter was born.

"Since then I've been home with my children. I think that's important. And they like to help. They are good helpers. They can fuss around with things like this," indicating a small centerpiece, "put the pine in arrangements".

She started her business making bouquets on order for friends and working on assignments from florists. It was a year ago that she expanded to a full-fledged business.

"I love to do (floral arrangements for) weddings. I make the bouquets and boutonnières, decorate the church and hall".

It would seem she has the best of both worlds - being at home with her children and running a successful business that gives scope for her creativity.

County of Essex a son of Michael and Catherine (Dunn) McCarthy. This is an old pioneer family of prominence, the father being a native of the Co. of Cork, Ireland where he was born in 1790 and where his wife was born nine years later, (1781). They married and in 1836 started for America crossing the Atlantic Ocean in a sailing vessel. The journey required 11 weeks on the water, and it may easily be asserted that they were weary indeed when they reached New York. In that great metropolis of the States Mr. McCarthy worked at the shoe making trade for three years, accumulating enough capital by that time to make the journey to Canada in order to secure a home in the opened-

up lands on Sand. South, Talbot Rd. The first home of the family was but a log cabin in the wilderness but later it gave way to a comfortable house of hewed logs in which the pioneer lived the remainder of his life, dying in 1868. His wife had passed away 10 years before, and she was always tenderly remembered for she had shared all his trials and hardships. Both were consistent members of the Catholic Church and it was mainly through the father's efforts, joined with a few other early settlers and Christian men that the church was established at Sandwich. Both he and his wife lie buried in the Sandwich Cemetery.

Mr. McCarthy had 3 brothers who also came to Canada - Richard, now deceased, settled in Sand South on the Talbot Rd. and reared a family;

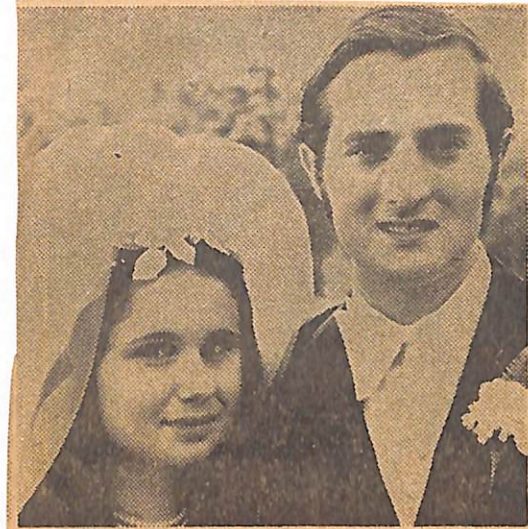

The crowd, the number of contestants and the smooth way in which the events were run off, amazed even the directors of the Essex County Plowmen's Association.

While there had been much work expended in promoting the plowmen's meet and organizing for the event, it was the first straight furrow contest in the county and no one expected as big a turnout at the gate and on the field.

There were 46 contestants in the nine events and in the events which were open to Kent County

as well as Essex, the Kent plowmen took the major share of the prize money, showing that they have been at the straight furrow competition for a longer period.

The life of a nurse is one of study, self-sacrifice and dedication, graduates of the Hotel Dieu School of Nursing were told Sunday.

scales and tests helped me develop the game, but they aren't necessary to play it."

The great thing about being an amateur psychologist is you don't have to know anything to be an expert. And people like that will get a kick out of Psychologizer.

"It's not like Trivial Pursuit," said Managhan. "You don't feel stupid if you don't know a bunch of silly facts."

"And it's a great way to find out about people."

MANAGHAN COMPILED his questions, just over a thousand of them, during a three-year planning period.

There are six categories: Love and Sex; Philosophy; Politics and Current Events; Morality; Sports and Recreation; and Personality. Each category has 168 questions and each of those has four optional responses.

Just as he was getting the concept off the ground, somebody told Managhan about a new game on the market called Scruples. He said he nearly fainted when told about the concept, a game that tests people's motives and attitudes in various circumstances.

"I thought, oh no, all my work was for nothing. That was basically what I was working on."

But he insists Scruples is unlike Psychologizer, which is meant to be a fun way to spend a party with friends. Although some of the situations are serious-minded and will spark heated debate, there's nothing in Psychologizer that requires a player to deliberately lie about himself, as in Scruples.

Although the object of the game is to reach a certain point on the board first, the appeal of Psychologizer, said Managhan, is not in winning but in learning about yourself and friends.

"PEOPLE WILL become interested in the process of playing rather than the object of the game," he said. "Psychologizer won't appeal to the real competitive spirit."

It took Managhan 2½ years to write the questions. Then he bundled up the concept and visited a lawyer to see about copyrights. Not only was the lawyer helpful, he was fascinated enough with the idea to convince three other partners to get in on the ground level of investing in it.

Getting investors was easy, said Managhan. Probably due to the precedent of Trivial Pursuit and that universal urge to gamble on something, Managhan soon had the \$136,000 needed to design and manufacture the first 5,000 games.

There are 27 shareholders with various levels of commitment. Managhan's family and in-laws are involved, along with some friends and people who work with him at Maryvale.

Managhan formed his own company based in Oldcastle, where he lives, to handle promotion and distribution. He's listed as president of The Managhan Game and Toy Corp. on company business cards; his wife's the treasurer.

One investor is already working on a version of Psychologizer for adolescents, so the game is sprouting a cottage industry of other games, just like Trivial Pursuit.

Managhan realizes his biggest obstacle to gaining acceptance for Psychologizer is that "it's just another board

BELIEVING college students make up the majority of games players, Managhan has convinced St. Clair College and the University of Windsor to stage Psychologizer theme parties. London's Fanshawe College will have one, too.

He and his wife have spent the last few weekends promoting the game in stores in Ann Arbor, the home turf of the University of Michigan. Managhan has a trademark on the game and concept in Canada and the U.S.

Because of the value of the U.S. dollar against the Canadian, Managhan figures he can sell Psychologizer in Michigan for the same price he charge here, about \$35, including tax and duty.

Right now, distribution is limited - there are 36 retail outlets carrying the game in Ontario, 11 in Michigan.

But Managhan hopes the idea will catch on enough this Christmas to attract a major game supplier to manufacture and distribute it.

If that happens, Managhan and his investors will sell the rights to Psychologizer for a handsome profit and future royalty cheques.

Maybe then our game player can cash his tokens in on that villa on the Riviera. And his friends can visit in their new yachts.

But then, that's engaging in a little psychologizing, too, isn't it?

THE OBJECT of this game is to see if Tom Managhan can buy a villa on the Riviera.

The play takes place on a familiar game board called Windsor, Ont., and the players are Managhan's family, friends, associates and business acquaintances.

The name of the game? Psychologizer, a word Managhan coined to describe that little psychologist in us all.

We've all engaged in psychologizing: What would so and so do if he knew that so and so was...?; So and so would never wear anything like that... or would she? What would you do trapped in a room with your worst enemy?

Managhan, 35, plans to turn idle speculation into cold cash.

Psychologizer, as Managhan explains in the rules of play, is for "a people-watcher who pays attention to the interests, attitudes, and habits of others and who likes to predict what others might say or do in response to typical and not so typical situations."

Managhan's predicting his game will appeal to a game-hungry public that has turned Trivial Pursuit into the runaway Canadian success story of the 1980s.

WE'VE HEARD THE stories about some nobody who banks a dividend cheque in the thousands every few months because he was lucky enough to get in on the ground floor of Trivial Pursuit with an initial investment of a measly few hundred bucks. One Montreal investor allegedly bought a villa in Spain with his money.

Trivial Pursuit was like winning the lottery for them and there's no reason it can't be like that for the 27 backers of Psychologizer, said Managhan.

The 35-year-old psychologist at the Maryvale Adolescent Treatment

Centre in Windsor has the credentials. He got his doctorate in social psychology at the University of Windsor in 1981 and eventually got hired at Maryvale to develop treatment programs for emotionally disturbed adolescents.

AN INCURABLE psychologizer himself, Managhan said the idea came while driving north with his family to a cottage near Sault Ste. Marie.

The Managhans — Tom, his wife, Carol, and two children, 14-year-old Tina and 11-year-old Brien — passed the time imagining what they'd do if they won a million dollars.

"Then we started imagining what other members of our family and our friends would do with it," he said. "What we were doing, I realized, was psychologizing."

When he decided the idea had marketing potential, the next step was developing his sources: "I started going around with my ears perked up, listening to other people doing the same thing and kept a running record of situations. Then I'd try to make certain situations fit motives."

The result was a catalogue of people's preferences, biases, emotions and political views.

"Of course, I was trained to spot attitudes and I came up with thousands of different attitudes and opinions. My background in rating and personality See THE NAME, C2

Son of victim testifies at trial

The day of her death, Lois McDonald and her husband were scheduled to see a marriage counsellor, Mrs. McDonald's 16-year-old son, Gerald, told a Supreme Court jury Wednesday.

This evidence came to light at the trial of William John McDonald, 41, of Anderdon Township, who is charged with murdering his wife, Lois, 33, Jan. 10. The trial began Tuesday.

In a shaking voice, Gerald McDonald told the court that the night before his mother died, he overheard his father vow that before he'd see the counsellor, he'd get the truth out of his wife.

The youth said his father often accused his mother of seeing other men. He said that he had never seen his mother display interest in other men and that she spent every night at home with the family.

Constable Donald Dufour of the Anderdon Police Department testified Tuesday that McDonlad entered the police station the afternoon of Jan. 10 and told police he had hit his wife and that she might be dead.

Constable Dufour told the nine-woman, three-man jury he followed the accused to his home where he found Mrs. McDonald lying between the living and dining rooms face down in a pool of blood.

After checking and finding what appeared to be a slight pulse, Constable Dufour said assistance was called for and, upon returning to the body, he observed a gash over the left eye and on the back of the head.

Constable Dufour was called back to the stand Wednesday and Defence Attorney Dona'd Tait requested an examination of the officers notebook.

The first recording of McDonald's initial entrance to the police station noted the accused stating, "I just beat my wife up but I don't know how bad." This was changed to "I just assaulted my wife but I don't know how bad. She may be dead."

The constable told the court he later changed "beat" to "assault" because "it sounded better" and was more in line with police terminology.

Dr. Benjamin Dunn, Windsor pathologist who performed the autopsy on the body at Grace Hospital about six hours after death, testified that death was caused by bruising to the brain with hemorrhaging into the material surrounding the brain.

ing to the brain with hemorrhaging into the material surrounding the brain.

He described to the court multiple head lacerations on the body of the deceased, brain bruising, a fractured right rib and multiple hand lacerations.

Dr. Dunn said it was "very unlikely that the bruising to the brain could have been caused by a single blow." He added that the brain injuries could have been caused by a fist.

But a fractured cheek bone and a large laceration on the scalp could only have been caused by an instrument other than a fist, the doctor said.

Sergeant Gordon Lucier, Anderdon Police Department told the court he attended the McDonald residence on the afternoon of Jan. 10 to search for a possible murder weapon.

He said he searched the entire house and could find no weapon that could have caused the death of the woman. He also stated that there was no evidence of alcohol in the house.

The trial continues today.

An Anderdon Township man was found guilty Tuesday of murdering his wife last Jan. 10 by a nine-woman, three-man Supreme Court jury and was sentenced to life imprisonment by Mr. Justice Samuel Grange.

William John McDonald, 42, who had pleaded not guilty to murdering his 33-year-old wife, Lois, asked the judge how long he had to wait until he could be paroled.

Mr. Justice Grange, who explained that the sentence was mandatory for that offence, said parole could be available to him after serving 10 years.

Mrs. McDonald's badly-beaten body was found in the living room area of the couple's home after McDonald arrived at the Anderdon police station and stated he had hit his wife and that she might be dead.

A Windsor pathologist, Dr. Benjamin Dunn, told the court that death was caused by bruising to the brain with hemorrhaging into the material surrounding the brain.

He described other bruises and lacerations and said it was "very unlikely" the bruising to the brain could have been caused by a single blow.

A 16-year-old son, Gerald, testified that the night before his mother died, he overheard his father vow that before he'd see a marriage counsellor, he'd get the truth out of his wife.

He testified earlier that his parents were scheduled to see a marriage counsellor the day of his mother's death.

The youth said he had never seen his mother show interest in other men although his father had often accused her of seeing other men.

Two doctors and a psychiatrist were called by defence counsel Donald Tait and testified concerning McDonald's mental state.

Dr. Walter Yaworsky, a Windsor psychiatrist, said McDonald hoped the outcome of his trial would

prove him right in his suspicions of his wife.

He said the accused admitted during a psychiatric examination that he had beat his wife several times before and that he was concerned that Harvey (Mrs. McDonald's supposed lover) would be at the trial.

Dr. Yaworsky explained the incident as a psychological explosion, stating that with McDonald's paranoid personality, limited intelligence, his controls broke loose and he became violent.

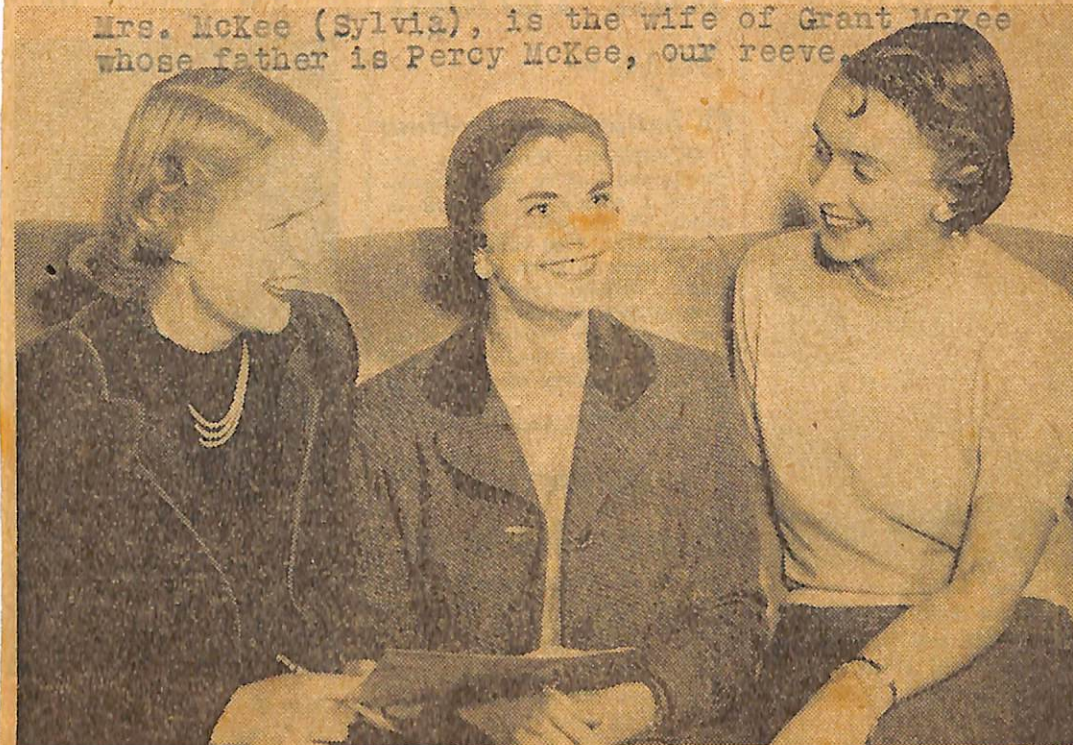

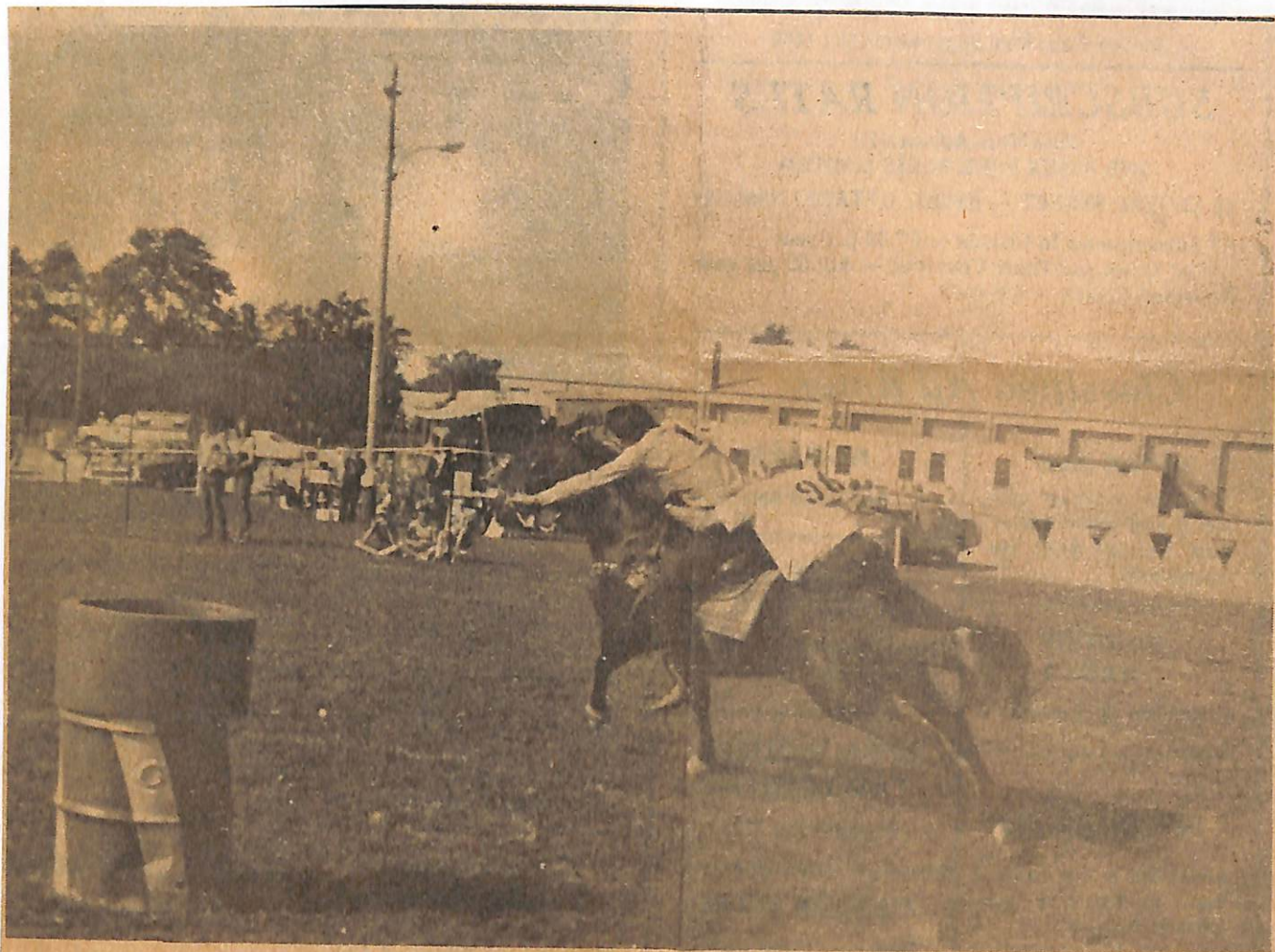

At The Top Instamatically

Anybody knows a 13-year-old attempting to become a photographer is an amateur. But a grade 7 student, Pat McGuire, has 'clicked' with a professional-quality portrait that took top award in an international competition.

It is a study of a boy playing his violin. The intent expression of concentration, the complementary background that contrasts the subject, the angle of observation, all spell professionalism.

No he didn't use an instamatic as the title suggests. He works with a 35 mm through-the-lens viewer.

Pat's early interest in photography prompted him to take a course from a friend's father who is professional.

"I had seen the work his dad did and that inspired me," explains Pat.

When he decided to enter the competition through his school he got his friend to pose. With the loan of a photographers umbrella, he took eight shots.

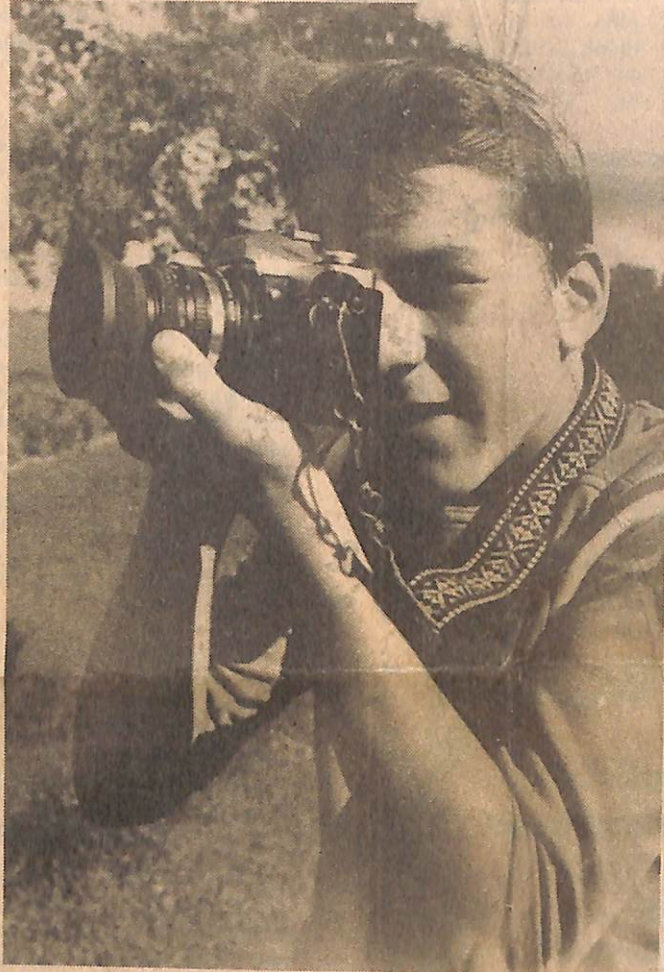
"I entered color character portrait. There are six or eight categories for photography (in the competition)."

To be eligible one must be a student at an accelerated Christian school. Pat attends Windsor Christian Academy, a private school which qualifies.

The first step is Canadian competition at Orillia. As well as several categories in each class there is a wide range of types of competition from sewing to athletics.

Winning first prize there qualified him for the international contest in Flagstaff, Arizona. His topped 52 pictures in the color character class.

Catching the proper expression, balancing the rich glow of the natural wood of the violin with skin tones and

background contribute to a winning portrait but choosing the one of eight that would attract the judges is another skill.

Pat put that on the line when he decided to enter one with a rainbow-like arc from tip to handle of the violin bow. It was a fluke that added interest to the picture because it suggested the swinging motion of that bow across the strings as the boy played his lively tune.

Pat doesn't know what caused it, nor do those he consulted for an explanation,

other than it could have been a refraction of light.

Where does he go from here? For one thing he will enter competition again. For another, he will improve his photographic skills with the goal of becoming professional.

"Next year I plan entering a couple more (categories of photos), scenic and still life," Pat said.

The five-day Arizona convention that attracted 5000 young people provides fellowship and competition.

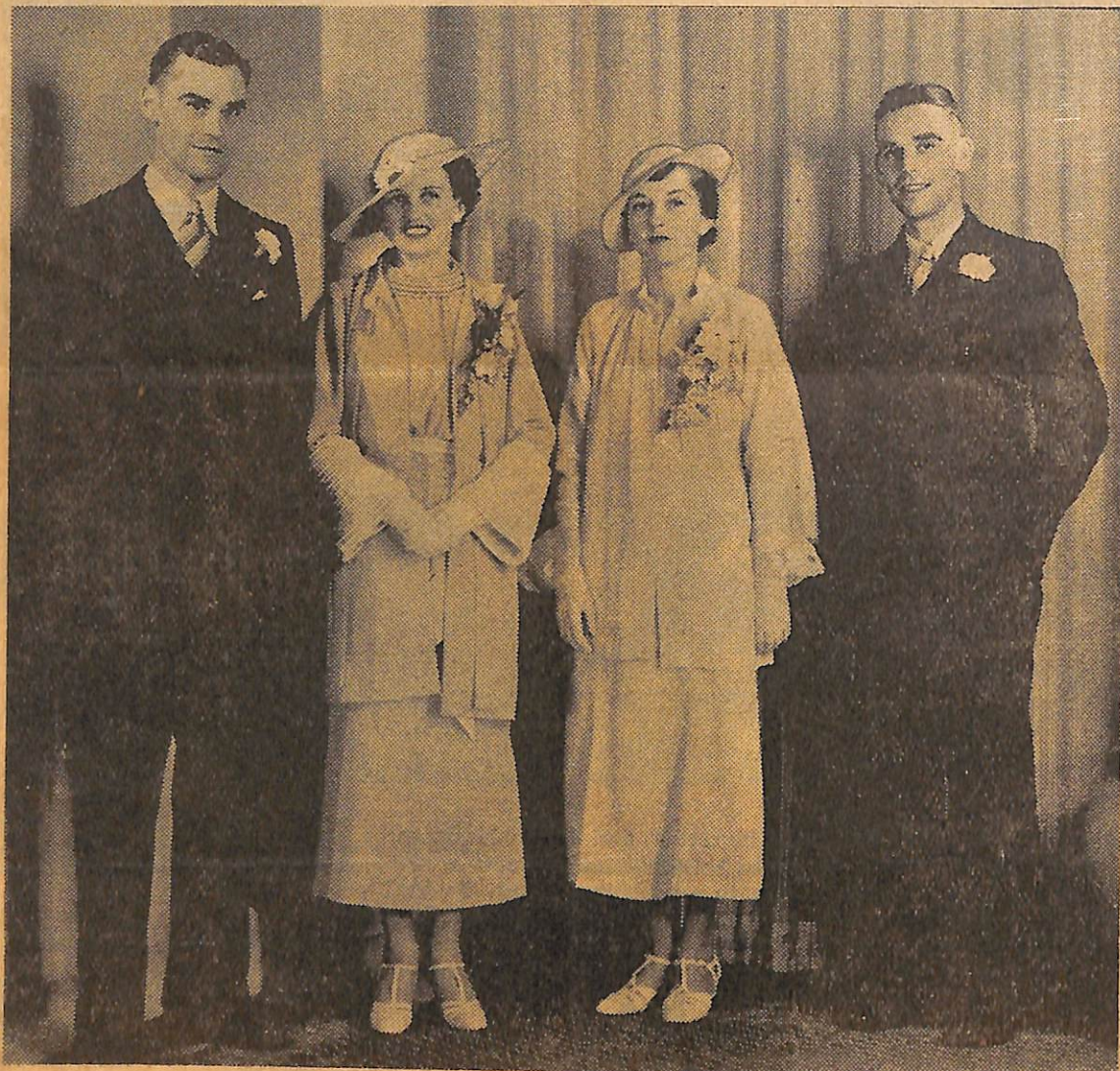

New technology centre in Windsor helps industry remain competitive

While a number of Windsor district tool, die and mould businesses haven't given in to computer-aided designing and manufacturing (CAD/CAM), they soon may have no choice, says Ronald McGuire, general manager of the new Canada Ontario Centre For Advanced Manufacturing-Windsor.

Pressure is being applied by major auto and auto parts manufacturers which eventually will make it almost impossible for those firms to compete, simply because they won't be able to read the blueprints. Instead of the blueprints we remember, the auto firms will be sending out computer printouts for quotes, McGuire said.

His position at the centre — one of three Ontario Centres for Advanced Manufacturing (OCAMs) — has suddenly put McGuire on the front line of this high technology battle. The OCAMs are part of an Ontario Crown Corporation formed under the Ontario Technology Centres Program in 1982 to promote awareness of advanced manufacturing technology and to speed up its application by Ontario industry.

THE THREE centres — the CAD/CAM Centre in Cambridge, the Ontario Robotics Centre in Peterborough, and the Canada-Ontario Centre at 2795 Kew Dr. — are staffed by industry-experienced experts. They operate on a reasonable fee-for-service basis, providing educational programs, hands-on

training and unbiased technical consulting.

The pressing needs to automate design and manufacturing processes and to use robotics and advanced manufacturing engineering technology are inescapable, said McGuire. "The longer we wait, the harder it will be to compete."

MARKETING AND Communications officer Joseph Daly, of Rexdale, said the aim of OCAM is to help Ontario business and industry become more competitive in an increasingly automated world by becoming more productive. OCAM's officers and staff have been recruited from the private sector and are able to give bottom-line orientation to the needs of clients.

McGuire said that potential users are invited to test the many demonstration systems at the centre before making an investment. They can contract for equipment use to evaluate how the technology can help them in their specific applications.

"The Ontario CAD/CAM Centre in Cambridge promotes awareness of computer-based tools and provides clients with professional consulting assistance in CAD, CAD/CAM and CAE," Daly declared.

"The Ontario Robotics Centre in Peterborough promotes awareness of Advanced manufacturing technologies and provides expert, in-plant technical consulting in the use of flexible automation in all sectors of manufacturing.

"And the Canada-Ontario Centre in

Windsor promotes awareness of advanced design and manufacturing technology and provides professional applications assistance in the Windsor district tool, die and mould industries."

SUCH SEMINARS as "bar coding problems and solutions" held recently and the "automated inspection" one scheduled for Feb. 27 are put on by the Canada-Ontario Centre in Windsor to give firms a closer look at how to solve their in-house problems using the computer and high technology.

CAD/CAM, robotics and flexible automation technology are particularly suited to Ontario manufacturing operations, many of which have short-run production requirements.

Small and medium-sized manufacturers make up about 80 per cent of the province's manufacturing sector.

JEAN KROES, client services manager with the Canada-Ontario Centre here said these technologies can help companies reduce time spent on product designs, improve the management of inventory, manpower and process control, boost productivity and cut costs. They also can help improve product quality.

What's this new technology about?

Jonathan Dakin, applications consultant at the Windsor centre, says computer-aided design uses computer graphics to enhance the speed, accuracy and efficiency of the design and engineering functions. Computer-aided manufacturing puts the data from the CAD process into the manufacturing process.

From design geometry, he said, programs can be created to direct the sequence and operation of numerically-controlled machine tools on the factory floor.

SUCH ROBOTICS is a key element in flexible automation as it applies to factory operations. It includes welding, spray painting, production, materials handling and automatic inspection.

Daly agrees that advanced manufacturing technology is necessary if Ontario is to successfully compete in world markets.

"These technologies point the way to greater cost efficiencies in Ontario business and industry, to greater productivity and higher product quality," he said. "All are critical to an international competitive edge."

THE GROWTH rate of application of advanced manufacturing technology in the world is predicted to be 30 to 40

per cent a year, McGuire notes. To hold its own, he said, Ontario must match this trend not only in the larger enterprises, but in medium and small-sized companies as well. The latter in particular require outside advice and assistance, McGuire said.

A key element in flexible automation as it applies to factory operations is that robotics can be used in welding, spray painting, assembly, materials handling and as well, they perform many hazardous and repetitive jobs. Approximately three per cent of factory jobs can now be done by robots.

The challenge is of larger proportions however. Canada currently has 1,200 robots in operation — 85 per cent of them in Ontario — compared to an estimated 20,000 in the United States and more than 40,000 in Japan.

On a per capita basis, Japan is using eight times the number of robots as Canada.

two years, of any Ontario government on record. He said the province has increased spending on agriculture by 72 per cent and that he'd like to see this increased even more.

McGuire, of the Family Coalition Party, said Canadian farmers have two options, to produce less food per acre and convince the rest of the world to do likewise or to farm less acres and convince the rest of the world to do likewise.

"Because of the high yields our silos are full, and working on a simple basis of supply and demand, we are in trouble," said McGuire.

McGuire said free trade is not good for either agriculture or the automotive industry.

All four candidates lent sympathy to residents concerned about and/or living next to landfill sites.

McGuigan said waste should be landfilled, but only

on impermeable clay ground. Ashton said you still need some landfills but that recycling is another alternative. Hayes said landfills are not the answer, although they must be used to some extent, and that more emphasis should be placed on recycling.

Concerning the question of funding for Catholic Schools, and other schools, McGuigan said "I don't think you can rule out funding for other denominations (down the road)."

Hayes said his party is in favour of extending funding to other private schools. McGuire supports full funding of all schools. Ashton said there is not enough money or resources to fund two different school systems.

McGuigan was born in Cedar Springs, where he still resides, and grows cherries. He has been a member of parliament since 1977.

Hayes was born and lives in Maidstone Township, is a

past member of the Essex county council and has worked in agriculture. He's been a member of the provincial parliament for two years.

Ashton was born in England where at one time he worked as a coal miner. He has been a resident of Belle River and Emeryville and has worked with a number of chemical companies.

McGuire was born in and resides in Maidstone Township and works for General Motors.

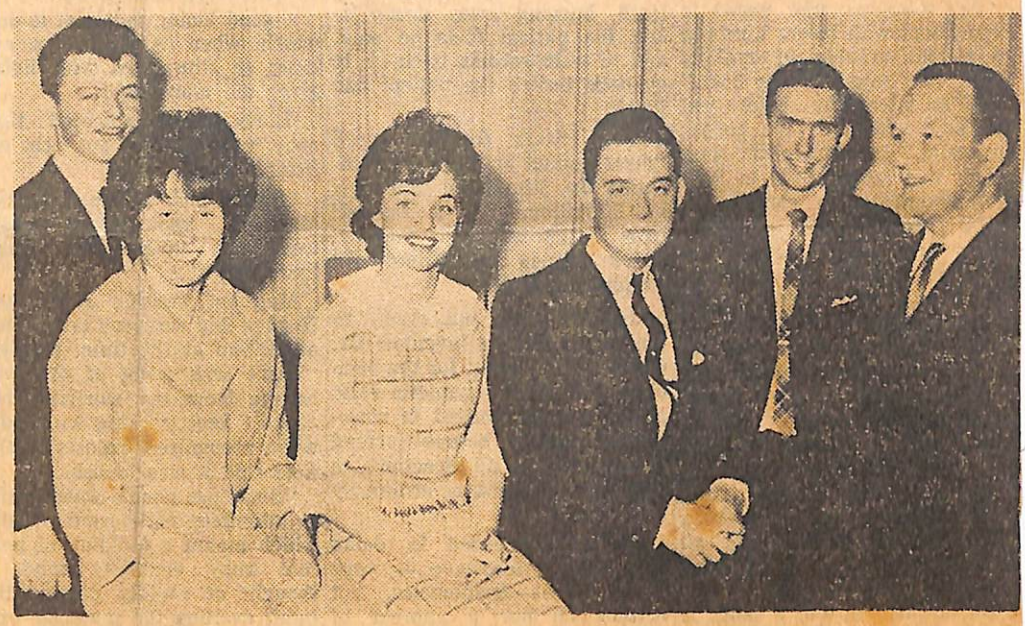

Students Say 'No' to Uniforms

Less time was taken to argue about uniforms for girls, where less contention existed. In addition, many boys would consider such an argument as dangerous ground.

The Liberal administration contended that uniforms would allow reflection of true character by action rather than by type of clothes. With the advent of uniform attire, students would not have to spend as much time fussing with ordinary clothing or selecting clothes to wear the following day.

The administration could see uniforms improving the school spirit and moral standards in the type of clothing worn. It would do away with "keeping up with the Joneses" in clothing and might substitute the slogan to deal with academic achievement. A cross-section survey of the school showed that uniforms were favored 182-62.

Model Parliament Ruling Party Saved by Bell

ESSEX—The government of the first model parliament at the 1,000-student Essex District High School was saved twice by the bell—the assembly.

March 24, 1964

A Liberal minority government was defeated on its major piece of legislation before the senior assembly and again before the junior assembly, but the school bell thwarted any requests for resignation.

The model parliament was an effort of the debating club—in its first year at the school—with the debate on a contentious subject, school uniforms.

William Murdoch, former Speaker of the Ontario Legislature, acted as governor-general to read the Speech from the Throne. He did not touch on the school uniform problem, but referred to another issue just as important, of lowering the voting age.

He said there had been a growing demand to lower the voting age from 21 to 18. He said those advocating the change were basing their arguments on the contention that if a young man is old enough to be taken into the armed services at 18, he is old enough to express his opinion in our free elections.

"There is an old adage—'the future belongs to those who prepare for it'—and the question of the voting age will be resolved by young people themselves; in the responsibilities they are willing to accept, and the preparation they undertake toward this end," he said.

Jim MacKenzie, acting prime minister of the minority government, later explained the reason for defeat—too many absentees. "The combination of the three other parties, Progressive Conservative, Social Credit and NDP, voting against us was too much," he said.

Some members of parliament were of the opinion they voted according to conscience rather than along party lines, so the government would not be overthrown. If conscience was their guide, they were conscientiously party members and voted against the government.

Both assemblies appeared to agree with the feeling of the parliament when it opposed uniforms for boys of slacks, shirt and tie and jacket or blazer. As in most area high schools, few students wore ties or jackets. The opposition was on type of dress and cost.

Mr. MacKenzie said that he plans to sign a contract with one of the local packing firms in the near future.

"You'd be surprised just how great the demand is for rabbit meat," he said. "This is especially true in hospitals and among people who are on strict diets."

Mr. MacKenzie said the meat tastes much like chicken. The only difference is that it has little of the dark meat that is found on its feathered friend.

The MacKenzie's have converted their garage into a home for the rabbits. Each mother and her family have a separate cage.

"It really doesn't take too much work to care for them," Mr. MacKenzie said. "The only real problem is that at least one of us has to be at home every day to feed and care for them. This has put a damper on any vacation plans that we might have had for this year."

Law Enforcement Held Example to Ontario

Crown Attorney Guest Speaker At County Council Banquet

The excellence of Essex County law enforcement agencies and advanced principles applied in its courts of justice are setting an example for the rest of Ontario and other parts of Canada too, believes Col. Bruce J. S. Macdonald, crown attorney.

This is what he told members of Essex County Council gathered Thursday night at Dominion Golf and Country Club for the warden's annual banquet.

Mr. Macdonald, guest speaker, told his representative audience that Essex had comparatively little serious crime.

"Our Windsor police department is doing an excellent job in the energetic prosecution of crime and my office is trying to do an energetic job, too," he said.

"Essex County jail's population is away down from last year, due principally to the police department being constantly alert and quick to apprehend the criminal."

In Windsor, too, there had been a "tremendous improvement" in law enforcement through the introduction of greater mechanization, he said.

Switching back to his report on conditions in Essex County, Mr. Macdonald spoke of the "tremendous" traffic problem, accentuated by the volume of U.S. traffic on county highways and of the prevalence of driving offences.

"But under the leadership of the attorney-general I'm hopeful that we will be able to find some solution to the problems that bring death to scores of our people."

The adequacy of penalties for drunk driving was a judicial question, but the County Council could rest assured that nowhere in Ontario was the law respecting drunk driving so

rigidly enforced as in Essex County.

Mr. Macdonald referred to the rule that all motorists now arrested are charged with drunk driving and that any reduction of the charge rests with the court. Moreover, more blood tests were now conducted on these motorists than anywhere else in Canada.

Six crimes reached alarming proportions in the summer of 1955, but there was less juvenile crime, he said.

"Now we have appointed probation officers and it is their job to salvage the lives of these young people. We want to keep them out of the jails because we know that is where they associate with criminals and embark upon careers of crime."

Mr. Macdonald closed with a suggestion that Essex County Council reconsider the need for a new, more adequate and more dignified court house.

"I feel that as a citizen of this county I would be remiss in my duty if I did not mention this matter. I trust that this county, one of the wealthiest in Canada, will do what it can to construct a temple of justice worthy of the great people who live here."

J. K. McLean, Harrow, was chairman, one of several ex-wardens guest of the 1955 officeholder, Percy McKee.

During the evening three candidates for the post in 1956 were introduced to members, Reeve Eadie Watson, Mersea; Reeve Thomas Dufour, Malden; and Reeve Melvin Armstrong, Leamington.

Reeve Armstrong mentioned Leamington last provided the warden of Essex County 25 years ago. Mersea's last warden held office in 1946 and Malden's last in 1948.

TRUCK CRASH NETS 10,000

Damages totalling more than 10,000 dollars were awarded two Maidstone township men by the Ontario Court of Appeal recently in a judgment upsetting a Supreme Court trial last September.

Eli Malenfant and Earl Beetham, joint owners of a truck which was involved in an accident on No. 3 Highway near Oldcastle, were awarded 50% of the \$21,711 assessed as their damages in the crash.

The award is against Percy McKee, owner, and Lloyd Taylor, the driver of the other truck in the accident, both of Oldcastle. Last September, Mr. Justice G.A. Gale assessed the damages of Malenfant and Beetham at \$21,711 but found them 100% responsible for the accident and dismissed their claim.

Appeal Justices Laidlaw, Hope and G. McKay, sitting in Toronto last week, reviewed the case and rules that there was negligence on the part of both drivers in the accident. Both drivers were found 50% negligent and McKee and Taylor were found liable for 50% of the damages named by Malenfant and Beetham. The Appeal Court also assessed the full costs of the appeal and of the original trial against McKee and Taylor.

Former warden buried

Funeral services were held today for Percy McKee, a former reeve of Sandwich South Township and warden of Essex County.

Mr. McKee, 81, died Sunday. He is survived by his wife Annie, two daughters and a sister.

Mr. McKee, a prominent Oldcastle farmer, was a leader in the county in raising beef cattle.

He was an unsuccessful candidate for the Progressive Conservative party in Essex South in the 1949 federal election and served as county warden in 1955.

Services for Mr. McKee were held at St. Stephen's Anglican Church, with burial in the church cemetery.

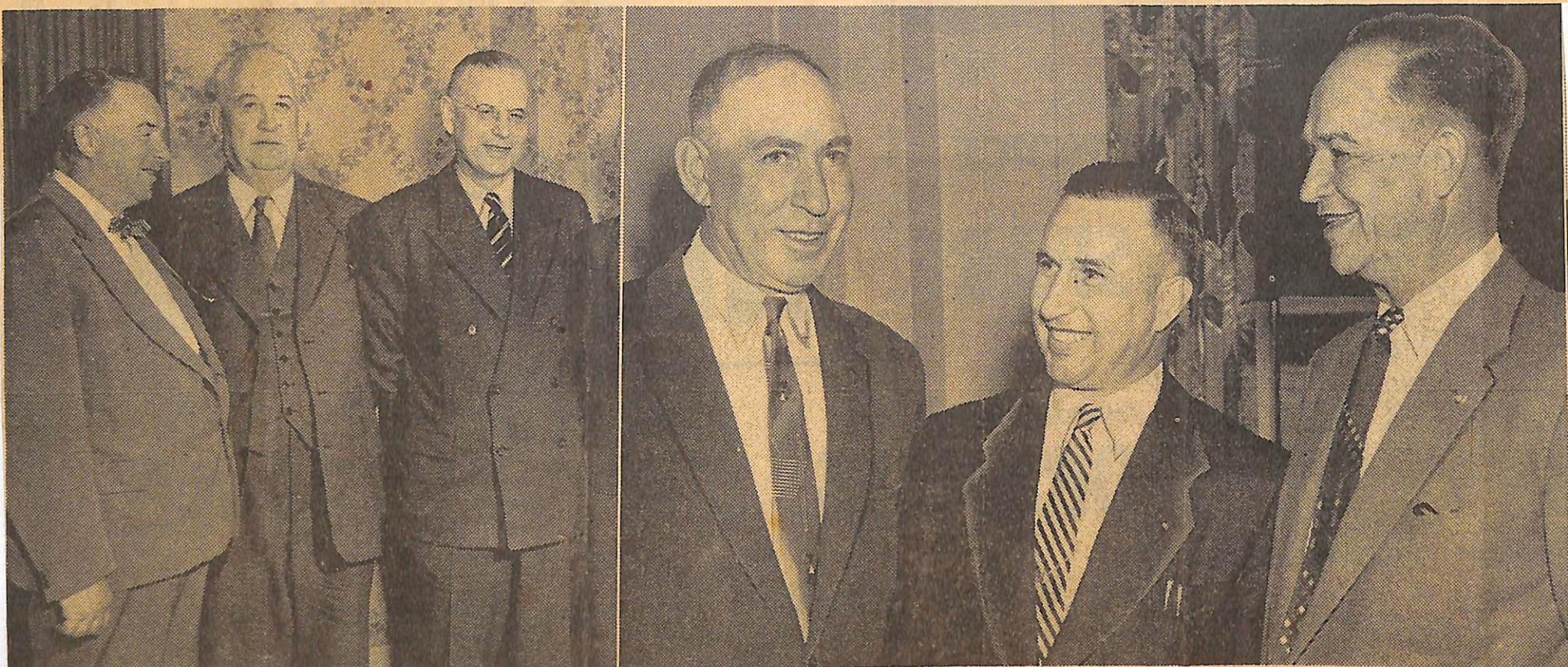

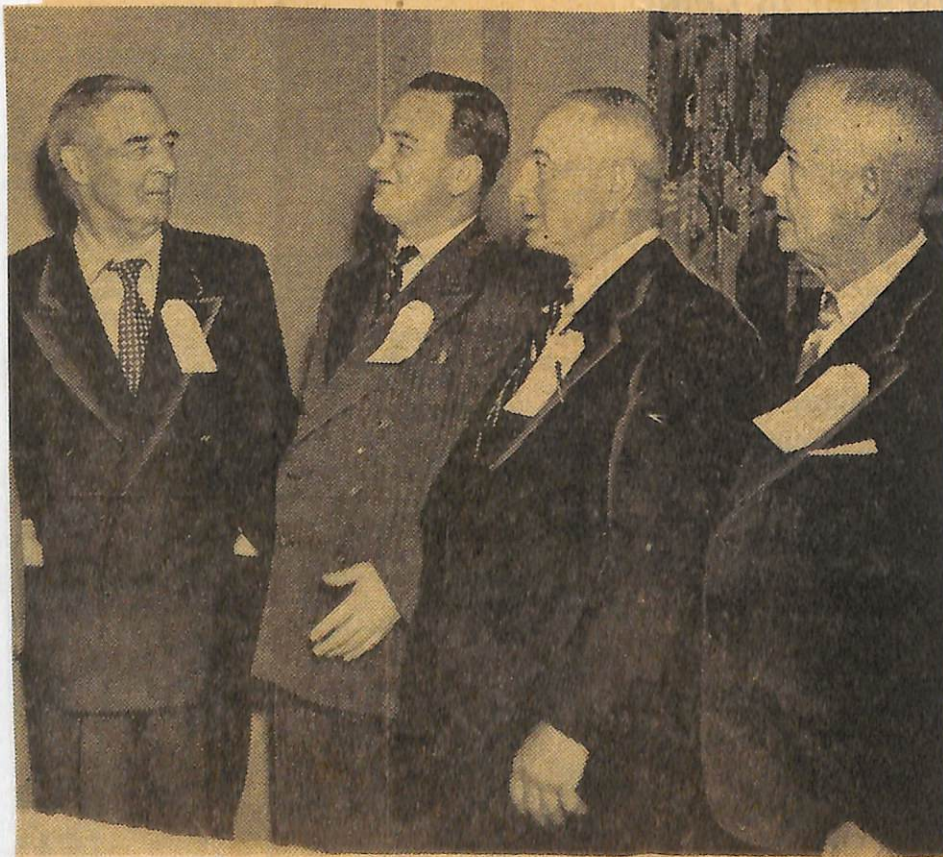

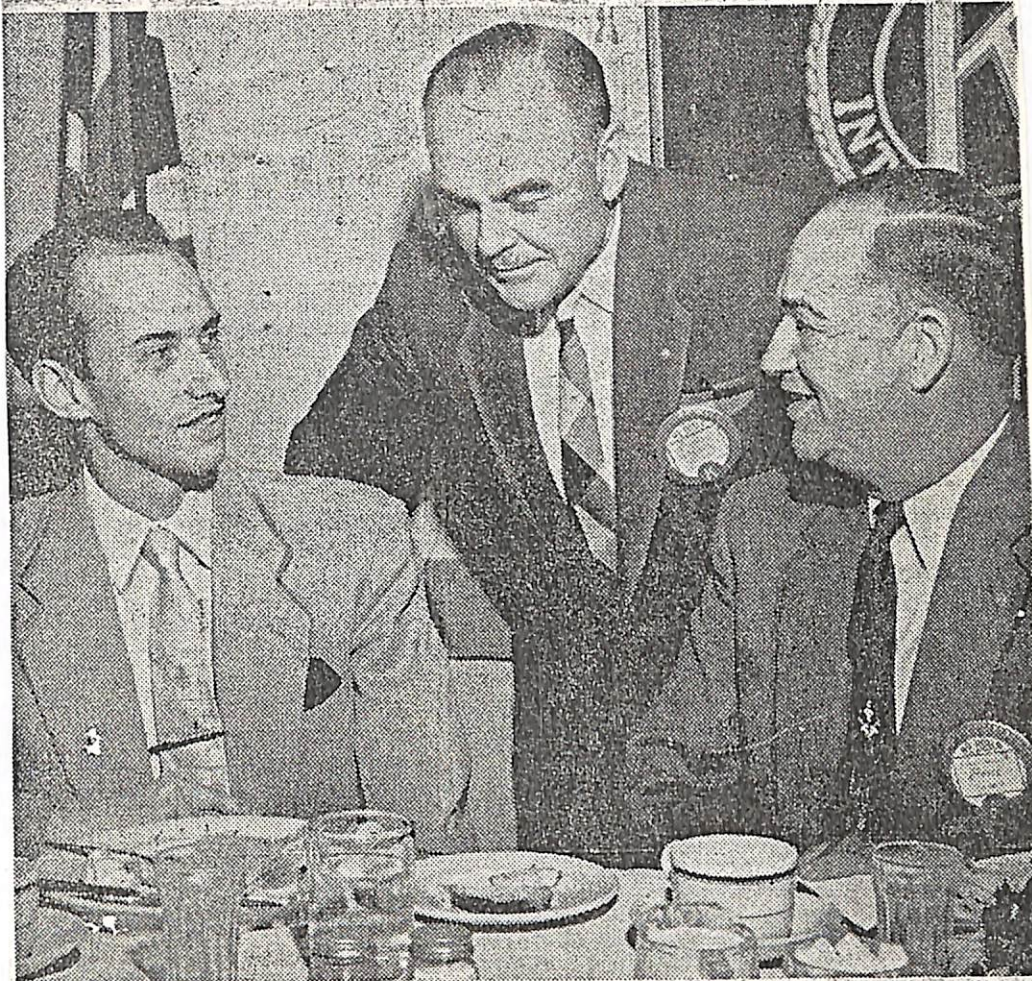

Reeve McKee Pledges Continuance of Economy

South Sandwich Council Hears Chief Executive's Inaugural Speech

Sandwich South Township council is going to continue to practice the "same tight economy" as in the past, Reeve Percy McKee said Monday when he gave his inaugural address.

Reeve McKee promised his electors that he and the new council would attempt to get as near the full value of the tax dollar in Sandwich South as possible.

"Of course we have no control over the inflation of our money," the reeve said. "We have no control over increased operational costs or the increased costs of our schools."

He promised that the new council would try to deal with each and any demand made on council. He promised that every problem would be dealt with to the "best of our ability."

In his address, Mr. McKee informed the township taxpayers that little work will be done on roads in the township. He said this was due to the development of the new super highway No. 401, which will run through the township.

"We cannot make many changes or improvements on roads in the township until we find out where new cloverleafs and overpasses leading to and from the new highway will be located."

Reeve McKee said the new super highway will definitely make some changes on transportation in the township. However, repair and other essential road work will be handled by the council.

"There is a definite need in Sandwich South for better roads and more hardtop roads," Reeve McKee said. "We plan to cope with the situation and do as much as the budget allows us."

The reeve also urged council to take a "new look" at the civil defence situation. He said that much work is being done in the U.S. and Windsor and felt that residents of Sandwich South Township should be ready in event of an attack.

"I have made a definite arrangement for more co-operation with the Windsor Civil Defence Group," he said. "Due to our proximity, I would like to see our township have a civil defence organization that would co-operate with Windsor."

He said that council would be "doing something" if it didn't do anything else but obtain some printed material on what should be done in the event of an attack and distribute it among township residents.

The possibility of having school children hear lectures on civil defence measures was discussed by council following Reeve McKee's address.

McKee Hits Cigaret Tax

Says Reduction Would Aid Tobacco Growers

A reduction in federal cigaret taxes would cut smuggling of American cigarets and instil new life in the Southwestern Ontario tobacco-growing area, Percy McKee, Progressive Conservative candidate in Essex South, told a meeting at the Sandwich South town hall last night.

OVER-TAXATION

"Have you ever seen more monuments to the stupidity of a government than the empty, unused burley tobacco barns in Kent and Essex counties?" Mr. McKee asked. "We have not only lost our tobacco market in Great Britain through bad salesmanship, we have lost our own Canadian market by stupid over-taxation and the creation of smugglers."

Finance Minister Abbott's department, Mr. McKee charged, "has apparently gone all out to create a job for our Royal Canadian Mounted Police."

His greatest reason for becoming a candidate in Essex South, Mr. McKee said, was "to help overthrow a government already too dictatorial and too long in office." The present government has "long since ceased to be by the common people," he said. "The policy of the government is dictated by a very small group

and in some cases, the group gets down to an individual."

Speaking of honesty in government, Mr. McKee recalled that Sandwich South taxpayers get a tax accounting with their tax demands. He contrasted this with the federal government, where, he said, when irregularities were found in the national defence department, "they pulled down the curtain and said hands off, instead of uncovering the whole transaction and saying this is what happened."

Mr. McKee also criticized Trade Minister C. D. Howe for quoted statements that Canada sold 25,000,000 pounds of tobacco to Britain in 1952 and will sell 30,000,000 pounds in 1953.

The facts are, he said, that in 1952, Britain purchased 10,000,000 pounds of tobacco, and agreed to purchase another 15,000,000 pounds "as, if, and when they had dollars to pay. "That means," he said, "that we still have 15,000,000 pounds of the 1952 crop to deliver. I would like Mr. Howe to tell us when we will start on the 30,000,000 pounds that he has promised to sell for us in 1953."

Turning to income tax, the Progressive Conservative candidate said that the common people have had very little consideration. Although people over 65 have been given an additional \$500 deductible, young couples get no consideration when they marry, he said. 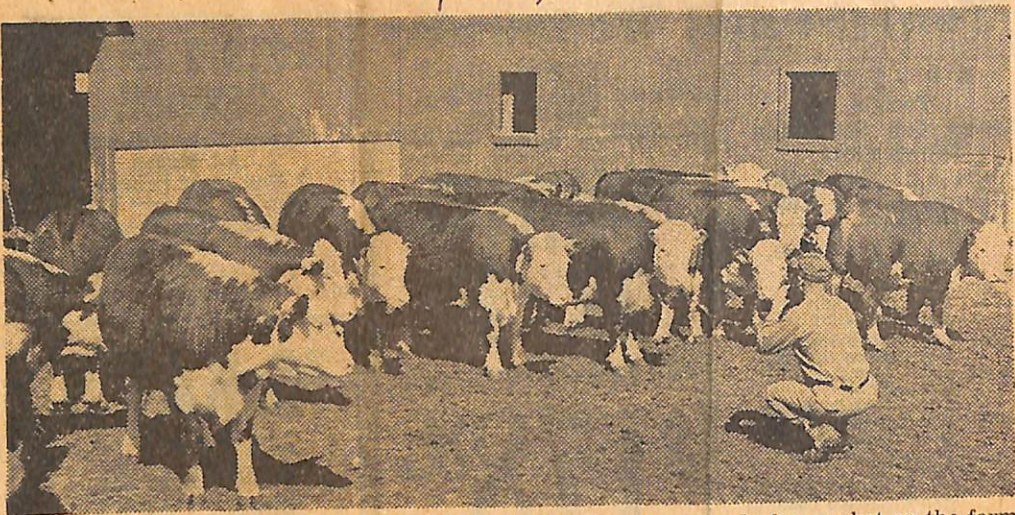

Ranching Profitable in Essex

By AL WORBY

OLDCASTLE—Raising of beef cattle is not considered of major importance in Essex County—but don't say that to Percy E. McKee.

The 65-year-old Sandwich South Twp. farmer has some fixed ideas about beef cattle in a cash-crop county and, more important, he has made the ideas work. During 1960, he sold at least 2,300 head for slaughter and has between 1,300 and 1,400 head to be marketed between now and July.

It's not that Mr. McKee has anything against dairying. McKee Farms on Howard Ave. had milk cows as its mainstay until about 15 years ago. Then the switch was made to beef.

much like a ranch during the summer months. Youths of the neighborhood turn cowboys to help round up the pastured animals when they are ready to go to market.

At first, beef production was on a relatively small scale, but it increased from year to year. Last year, when the present peak was reached, Mr. McKee and son, Grant, brought in 52 carloads of cattle from the west.

Maybe he would not be considered a rancher by western standards, but in Essex County he's a big cattleman. About 400 head have been wintered at the 650-acre McKee farms and close to a further 1,000 head are being readied for market by the father and son team on other farms.

"Back about 10 to 12 years ago," said Mr. McKee, "people weren't interested in feeding cattle on a grain basis. Now we could have as many head 'boarded out' as we wanted."

Farmers winter cattle at so much per pound gain in weight rather than a set amount per head. Under this system, good management pays off.

Of the cattle brought in by Mr. McKee, several carloads were sold to district farmers and they wintered them. Included was the prize-winning load at the Moose Jaw stocker sale last fall.

This 35 head went to Charles J. Brush and his son, John M., Con. 3, Colchester South Twp. The average gain per animal over the winter was about 400 pounds.

"All of them would make red brand beef now," said Mr. McKee, who credits Mr. Brush with being about the most efficient feeder of cattle in the county.

It is possible to bring beef cattle from the west and feed them through the winter in Essex County only because of attractive freight rates. First impression of many farmers is that feeding of beef cattle in the county, with its high production costs and intensive cultivation, is uneconomical.

Mr. McKee, a former reeve of Sandwich South Twp., and warden of Essex County, has proven that raising of beef cattle here can be profitable. But costs have to be watched carefully in an area such as this, where land values and property taxes are high.

The obvious problem is to obtain a sufficient quantity of hay. Mr. McKee buys it in the field and does his own harvesting.

Whether or not Mr. McKee could be called a rancher is open to question. Some experts claim a rancher must have sows and carry out his own breeding program. He raises his own calves until they are of marketable size. Mr. McKee concentrates on importing cattle and wintering them.

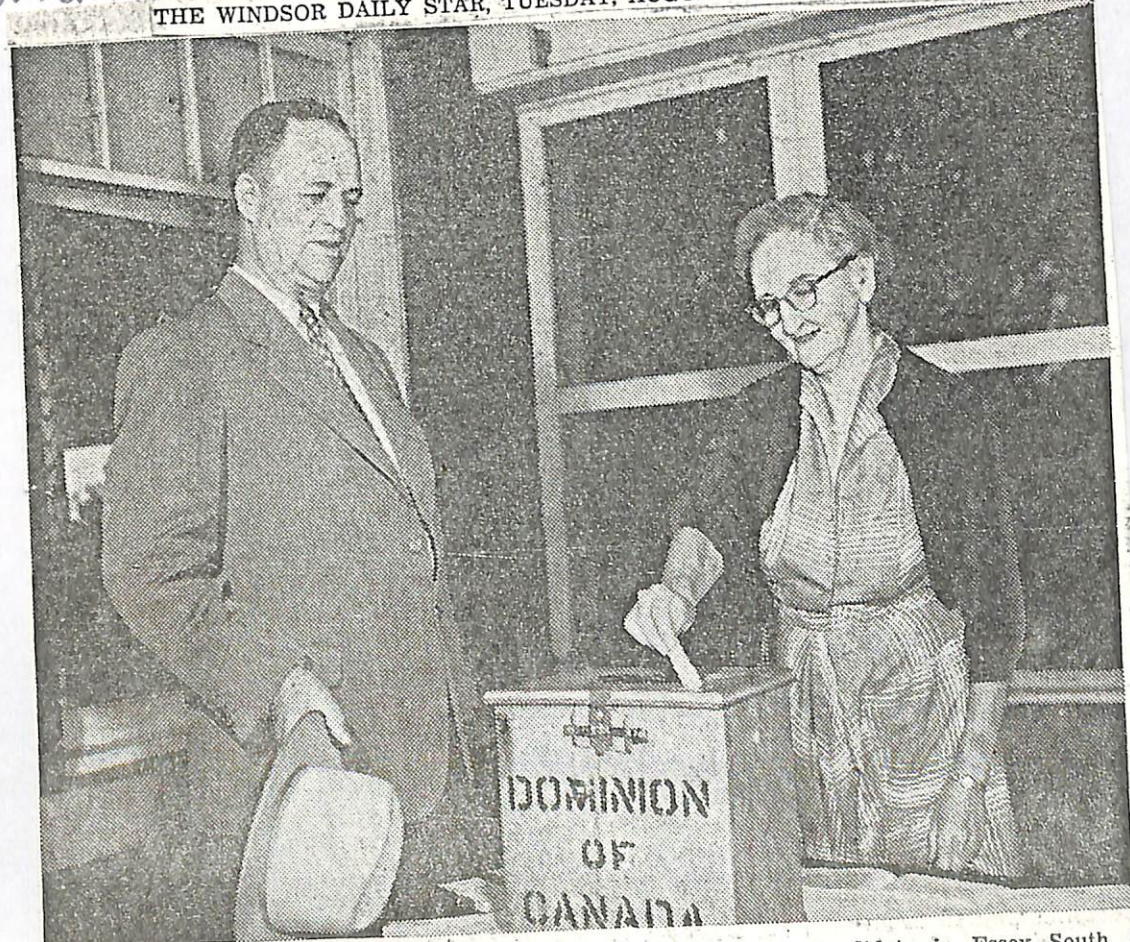

Next our dairy industry. Our average export of cheese 1943-47 was 111,721,000 lbs. Today we are not exporting any. Dairy cows that a few years ago were worth something are now worth exactly what they are worth to make bologna. Our fluid milk market is only a small part of our dairy industry, and when we lost our outside market for cheese some farmers went into beef cattle helping to create a surplus of beef. I could go on and tell you about the stability of our poultry industry. For a short time eggs have been a good price but only last year some chicken men sold their flocks to pay their feed bills. That is just how stable our market is. I say, as the Honourable Geo. Drew has stated, we need floor prices and some all out effort to get back some of the markets we have lost. We certainly should not adopt Mr. St. Laurent's attitude when he said our commonwealth monetary problem belonged more to the United States than it does to us.

It is remarkable that I should have prepared a few words to say on our Government Bond situation this morning and on going in town at noon to get Mr. Graydon, find that our party leaders had already been in some argument over our bond value.

Mr. St. Laurent stated at Sudbury that if a Conservative government were elected in Canada our bonds would go down. To-day's quotation on provincial bonds under a Conservative government is above par and no issue is as bad as being worth only 88½, that is you would lose \$11.50 on each one hundred dollars worth you might have purchased.

You who work in the shops purchased those bonds, out of your pay each pay-day. You believed each \$100 you saved that way was worth \$100 over and above the decrease in the value of the dollar. The Federal Government refuses to keep their bonds worth 100% on the dollar. I say Mr. St. Laurent should be the last one in Canada to infer that our bonds would become valueless under a Conservative government, when they have lost their value as much as they have under our present government.

The Hon. Paul Marin, speaking in the north in the last day or two stated that this was the proper time to cut our national debt when everyone is prosperous. I want to say that Mr. Martin is certainly not interested in wheat production at \$1.47 per bushel or early potato production at \$1.25 per bag or beef production with red brand beef at .35c per pound. The wheat producer, the potato producer or the beef producer are certainly not in a very good position to cut their overall debt very much. Mr. Martin also stated that taxes had been cut in five out of the last seven years. Have you noted any cut in any of the last ten years? The taxes have only gone one way and that is up.

I propose that when we establish our new government at Ottawa, we collect only the money we need in taxes. That our government bonds be given some stability. That is, we should be able to take any government bond to the bank at any time and sell it for 100 cents on the dollar or leave it for security and borrow the full face of it for any purpose the owner sees fit.

McKee Speaks at Amherstburg

Mr. chairman, ladies and gentlemen: On Saturday night I mentioned the stability of our government bonds. Tonight I am going to talk about our farming industry.

Mr. Paul Martin stated recently that everything is going good for the farmer. Let us look at the facts. I will not say anymore about the loss of our burley tobacco market. It should be conceded that our present Federal Government has lost that.

I probably know most about beef so I'll talk about it first. In 1951 when a working man went to the butcher shop and had to pay \$10 for a Sunday roast no farmer wanted to see the price go quite that high. In the fall of 1951 I sold females for farmers to start beef herds, Calves for \$150 each, yearlings for \$235. These men, have fed these cattle for nearly two years and in some cases couldn't get their money back.

Through some slip in our Health of Animals Dept., we got foot and mouth disease in Saskatchewan in February of 1952, so our government traded with New Zealand and their beef came to the United States and ours went to England. That was alright, but instead of selling the beef in the United States at the prevailing price it was frozen and kept till U. S. production had caught up with consumption and then dumped on the U. S. market doing a very good job of helping to deprive the American market and losing us several million dollars.

In the fall of 1952, Mr. Gardner inferred that the .28c floor he had established was going to apply until we got our U. S. market back, so we bought stockers sometimes as high as .23c per lb. We fed these cattle through the winter of 1952-53 and this spring we were lucky if we could get .21c per lb. so we lost an average of \$40 per head on cattle carried through the winter of 1952-53. The beef industry is not healthy and I know whereof I speak.

Next comes our pork production.

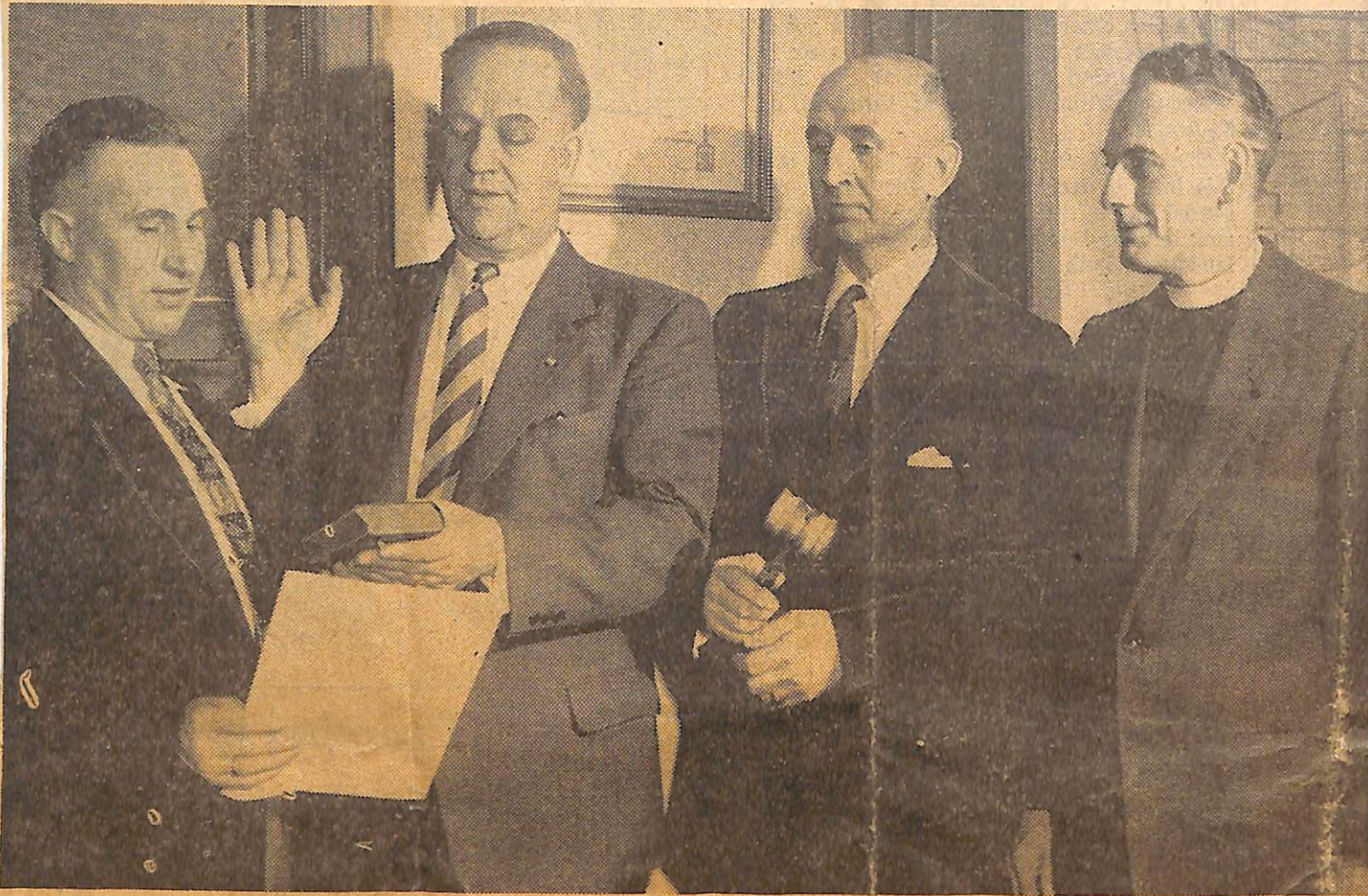
In 1943-47 we exported an average of 472 million pounds, today we are not exporting any. A farmer can get into or out of hogs in a hurry. Last fall the price was bad the Federal Government had canned so much pork that they let the price go down apparently to cut production. Farmers sold females for \$35 or \$40 each and went out of production. Now we haven't enough pork for our own consumption so the price is up.

Whether enough farmers are going to go back into pork production right away to take care of our own needs I can't say. I know I'm not because with no outside market for any surplus, pork production is just a little hazardous for me.

Next comes our wheat production.

Wheat today is \$1.47 per bushel. This year we have an exceptional crop which will help some, but on an average crop of say 30 bushels per acre, take out \$5.00 for combining; \$6.00 for fertilizer; \$4.00 for seed; \$10.00 for preparing soil; \$4.00 taxes, a 100 acre farmer with all wheat would have \$1,500 for a gross income to take care of depreciation on buildings and live. The wheat grower is certainly not in a healthy condition especially when our present market is glutted with wheat.

Defeats Two After Six Leave Race

Inaugural Speech Urges Improvement Of County Roads

Percy McKee, reeve of Sandwich South Township, was elected warden of Essex County Tuesday afternoon following a council vote in which he defeated two other nominees.

Bashfully throwing his hat in the ring for election as warden, Mr. McKee simply said he would leave it up to council members and their judgment.

In the subsequent election, Mr. McKee triumphed over Reeve Lawrence Brunet of Sandwich West Township and Reeve Willard Morris of Tilbury North Township.

In the first ballot in which members of the council were nominated, a total of nine were slated to run for the warden's chair.

They were: John Walstedt, deputy-reeve of Maidstone; Reeve John George of Belle River; Reeve Bernard Roy of Sandwich East Township; Reeve M. A. Tracey of Rochester Township; Reeve George Hayes of St. Clair Beach; Reeve Alvin Vermette of Anderdon Township; Reeve Willard Morris of Tilbury North Township; Reeve Lawrence Brunet of Sandwich West Township and Reeve Percy McKee of Sandwich South Township. Six later dropped out.

Ex-Warden Howard Bruner of Gosfield South Township then explained to county council members the rules of voting and added that the winning warden must have a "clear eight-vote majority."

Within minutes, the council was informed that Mr. McKee was the new warden. Reeve Brunet and Reeve Morris, Mr. McKee's two opponents, passed through a motion putting Mr. McKee into the warden's chair.

In his inaugural address, Mr. McKee thanked the county council for "the fine support that you have given me."

Mr. McKee said that he didn't look "to being the best warden" but added that he looked forward to being "as close to the best as I can possibly be."

The new warden urged members of the 1955 county council to come forward at any time and correct him if any one of them thought he was doing something that was not right.

Coming quickly to business the new warden said, "County council has some \$75,000 in government bonds. The roads in the county are not in good shape. I know we overspent the road budget last year but I wish you would take a closer look at the problem."

Mr. McKee said that he didn't know what the \$75,000 was earmarked for. He said he knew the money was earning three and a half percent interest for the council but he said there must be a way to divert that money.

"I do know that the roads are not improving as quickly as the road committee would like them to," Mr. McKee said. "I think that this large amount of money could successfully be used to improve the entire situation over the county."

Following Mr. McKee's brief inaugural address, the council heard various former members congratulate the new warden and the council.

First Public Meeting.

The first public meeting, in the interest of Percy W. McKee, Progressive-Conservative candidate for Essex South, was held in Sandwich South Township hall, on Tuesday evening, with a full house in attendance.

"I should first tell you why I am a candidate in this election," Mr. McKee stated. I consider it the duty of any Canadian citizen to do anything he or she can do to keep our government and the affairs of our country managed as well as possible.

I believe in a two party form of government because as the number of parties increase, the chance of good government decreases. In France, there are fourteen or fifteen parties and they have had nineteen cabinets since the second world war. No government can be useful when in office only a few months.

The greatest reason I am your candidate is because I would like to help overthrow a government already too dictatorial and too long in power.

The name House of Commons is supposed to mean by the common people. I want to say here and now that the present federal government has long since ceased to be by the common people. The policy of the government is dictated by a very small group and in some cases, the group gets down to an individual.

I want to say a few words about honesty in government. This year when the taxpayers of the Township of Sandwich South received their tax demands they also received a statement as to where our money came from and where it went. Our senior government should set the example to us and not we to them. They certainly have not done too well. When they found certain irregularities in the National Defence Department, instead of uncovering the whole transaction and saying this is what happened, they pulled down the curtain and said hands off; that is all you will be allowed to see.

Speaking further about honesty, at a nomination meeting in Lambton County, Mr. Howe stated, which was quoted in the Windsor Daily Star, "Last year, we sold Great Britain 25,000,000 pounds of tobacco. This year we will sell them 30,000,000 pounds of tobacco." The facts are in 1952 they sold 10,000,000 pounds of tobacco which they collected for. Great Britain agreed to purchase as, if and when they had dollars to pay for another 15,000,000 pounds of tobacco. That means we still have 15,000,000 pounds of the 1952 crop to deliver. With seven months gone of the year 1953, I would like Mr. Howe to tell us when is his date of delivery of the 15,000,000 pounds and when we will start on the 30,000,000 pounds that he has promised to sell for us in the year 1953.

Speaking further, regarding tobacco taxes and Mr. Abbott's arrangement regarding cigarettes, I will quote from a report of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Customs seizures during the year totalled 4,147, which is an increase of 1,243 over the previous year . . . With a few notable exceptions, smuggling is confined mostly to United States cigarettes which, because of the wide disparity of prices in Canada and the United States, continue to be the favorite commodity of the smuggler. The quantity seized is approximately 400 percent greater than the preceding year and one seizure consisted of a quantity only slightly less than 1,000,000 cigarettes. Despite their heavy losses arising from these seizures, smugglers continue to gamble for large potential profits found in this illegal traffic, which is centered mainly along the Quebec-United States border, although there are indications that the traffic is extending to other areas."

Mr. Abbott's Department has apparently gone all out to create a job for our Royal Canadian Mounted Police. Canadian cigarettes should have no more tax than American cigarettes and in that, we can produce the tobacco here. Let's use a little horse sense and stop this smuggling by selling our own people our own products at a price they can afford. I am for a 25c package of cigarettes.

Next comes the income tax department. I maintain that the common people have had very little consideration in this period of inflation. Our dollar has gone down till it is worth 49c. The man over 65 has been given an extra \$500.00 deductible although the young couple gets no consideration when they marry. When a young couple marry, they should have at the very least an additional \$500.00 deductible to help them purchase a

home, furniture or a car. The members of the House of Commons saw fit to take an extra \$2,000.00 deductible. Let's be fair and give the young couple some consideration.

I mentioned earlier the loss of tobacco market in Great Britain. Have you ever seen more monuments to the stupidity of a government than the empty unused burley tobacco barns in Kent and Essex Counties. We have not only lost our market in Great Britain through bad salesmanship, we have lost our own Canadian market by stupid overtaxation and the creation of smugglers.

Ladies and gentlemen, I say this is time for a change.

WALTER MCNEILLY

June 1, 1974, -Windsor Star: Water and Red Tape son't mix ran the headline. - Alan Henderson. About 8 years ago, Walter McNeilly was vervally assured by a real estate agent that Sandwich South Township Council was contemplating a waterline past the house he was to buy in the hamlet of Maidstone.

So far, the only thing that's gone past his bungalow on Highway #3 is the traffic.

But, he's a patient man and he's prepared to wait longer even though the debate concerning the waterline by the councils in Sandwich South and Maidstone Townships has taken on all the proportions of a United Nations agreement.

In the meantime Mr. McNeilly and many of his neighbors continue to pay up to \$200 annually to have water trucked on to their properties and his wife Claudette, continues to get family drinking water from town in a five-gallon plastic bag.

He and his family, which consisted of six children up until last year - there's three at home now- have adjusted to their dalemma which they are quick to concede is no different than hundreds of other county residents.

Sandwich South Council is anxious to prodeed with the project and has authorized engineers to prepare working drawings for the project.

Maidstone Township Council will hold a public meeting Thursday night at Maidstone Cnetral School on Conc. 7 and 8 sideroad to determine if residents are still interested, particularly since cost estimates for the project have risen. Engineers from LaFontaine, Cowie, Buratto and Associates, Ltd., will be on hand to explain the finances for the project and answer any questions. If the project is endorsed it would take about 2½ months to complet drawings and then several months of red tape before the project could be advertised and tendered.

Mr. McNeilly said because of a water shortage he and his family use about the 5000 gallons it's estimated a family his size uses in a year. He never washes his car and he's even reluctant to use the meagre amount of water that he does for the few plants that he has at the back of his house. "Once I used two pails of water for my raspberry plants and I really felt guilty", he said with a laugh.

Although the family bathes regularly "we dān't do it every day" and "we don't throw a piece of paper in the toilet and then flush it."

Mr. McNeilly and three of his neighbors draw water from a cistern at the front of his house. About once a week during the summer months, a large tanker truck - the type used to carry milk - pumps about 2,300 gallons of fresh water into the cistern at \$15.00 a load. Mr. McNeilly and his neighbors used to draw water from a community well but when the property was sold to local developers, the water supply was cut off. He and his neighbors then decided to construct a cistern, which was given approval on a temporary basis, at a cost of \$600. Because it was a temporary structure until the waterline was installed, the walls of the cistern were not given a permanent seal. Mr. McNeilly believes it was because of a drainage ditch just a few feet away that the water in the cistern cannot be used for drinking purposes unless it is boiled.

Despite the inconveniences, Mr. McNeilly and his family consider themselves fortunate that they do not have to rely on well water in the area, which has an unusually high suphur content. Up the street for example St. Mary's Separate School, there's a strong smell that resembles rotten eggs in portions of the school near the washrooms. For those who use the sulphur water, it's necessary to replace plumbing fixtures about every three years. R. H. Pike, who also lives in the hamlet said he has been a resident for 12 years and has replaced his fixtures, which become choked with mineral deposits, about every three years. Mr. Pike said it cost him about \$75 to replace the fixtures "but I'm not as bad off as those who can't do it for themselves and have to pay some one to do it". Mr. Pike estimated it cost some home owners about \$300 to have the job done.

There are more than five miles of pipeline to be installed in the two townships and the total cost has been estimated at \$365,000. The question now for families like the McNeilly's is whether the price of inconvenience is greater than that of a waterline.

July 4, 1975 - Grants have been confirmed from the Government to install the above water line from Essex which would furnish water to the O.P.P. and two schools, Maidstone Central and St. Mary's at Maidstone at approx. \$300 to the 140 users.

The art of writing with a flair was close to dying out until recently.

One of those who are students of its revival is Fran McKim of Essex. She has been doing this stylized writing, known as calligraphy, for more than five years.

Only a few years ago the only persons who could hand write a diploma in fancy hand script were those of the old school, people in their eighties. Now when machines can spew out any style of writing you wish, the art of doing it by hand is popular again.

"One of the finest things a lettering craftsperson can do, is to make the essential form of letters to be beautiful themselves," Fran explains.

As a hobby she makes booklets, writes announcements, or puts a name on school diplomas, certificates and makes posters or signs for church and school.

Recently she taught her craft to students at Colchester North Township school

Calligraphy comes from the Greek work Kalos, meaning beautiful, and graphos, meaning writing. One of the

most popular forms is the Italic, a slanted alphabet called Chancery Cursive. Fran says this is easier to do than styles with strictly vertical letters. "I have a hard time keeping them straight."

Other styles are Old English, Foundation or Book Hand, Celtic, Roman and Gothic.

"It would be nice to learn them all, but it would be time-consuming," Fran said. "We did the Roman and Gothic alphabet when we first started."

She studied calligraphy in

two 11-week courses at Kingsville High School. The instructor, Gene Ryan, formed the Society of Scribes and members display their work at Art-in-the-Park shows.

At one time only men were calligraphers although that changed at least a hundred years ago.

Fran finds more women share the interest now than men. She hopes someday, when farm and family chores consume less of her time to expand her skill.

Harrow Fair Summer Highlight for 4-H

With a beef and swine auction, showmanship classes, and achievement days, Harrow Fair is the summer highlight for 4-H members.

The Stevenson family of Olinda make the event a summer vacation of sorts. Cousins, uncles, aunts and grandparents (Ora and Garnet) practically live at Harrow Fair. Indeed some of them stay in a camper on the grounds, from the time they enter their Guernsey cattle until they take them home.

"Mom helps at the fair and stays with us overnight," said Marlee Stevenson. "So does my mom," added cousin

Mandy McNames. "It's quite a family affair."

Marlee said when school closes for the summer her first thought is Harrow Fair. "You look forward to it from year to year and just can't wait for it to come." Mandy added, "Right now everybody is getting excited."

They were taking time out from training the calves they will show at the fair. For Marlee it is the fourth time. For her cousin, Kent McNames, it's the third show. Marlee's brother Scott was getting ready for his first competition until his broken leg ended his chance of training his calf for the show. Mandy McNames and a friend, Tanya Green, are showing for the first time.

Four of the yearling Guernseys in the Garnet and Bradley (father and son) Stevenson dairy herd will be among the calves shown in 4-H competition. There are classes for poultry, swine, homemaking projects, display - judging, horses, rabbits, beef and dairy cattle.

The fair runs from September 1 to 4.

"The calf is judged for conformation - - such as straight legs and back and proper height for its age, Marlee explained."

"But the points for showmanship require practice. To-night we were breaking them to lead with a halter. It takes them three or four days to get used to the halter (on their head). They have to learn to stand and walk properly."

Another family busily preparing for the Harrow Fair 4-H events is Kristie and Lorne McKim of Essex with their dad, Robert who has been a leader of the beef club for 22 years.

Kristie has been raising and showing beef calves

since she was 12. She is 17 now. Lorne is in regular competition for the first time this year but he has been showing in the junior class for those under 4-H age of 12 since he was 6.

Their beef steers have been getting the best grain, the right amount of exercise for tender, properly marbled meat, since they bought them in the spring.

Anybody interested in the best in freezer meat should be at the Friday auction at Harrow Fair to bid on the 4-H animals offered. It starts at 3 p.m. Except for the prize-winning animals the bids are at market prices. The pork animals are sold at 3 p.m.

In both cases competition at the fair constitutes achievement days, necessary to complete the club. Kristie McKim has completed 15 clubs and Marlee Stevenson has 10 to her credit.

Showmanship is of significance to Kristie. Her dad says it teaches a lot of patience. "They are working with an animal that outweighs them by 800 pounds or more (in the case of a beef steer) and if they get impatient with it they end up having more problems leading it."

Some 4-H members have gone on to professional showmanship. From Essex County with a 4-H background, Marty Unholzer of Woodslee has made a career of showing dairy cattle. As well Debbie and John Nostadt learned showmanship of beef cattle in 4-H and now work in the big-time rings.

Both the McKim and the Stevenson - related 4-H members chose their animals according to what was raised on the family farm. The McKims' calves will go to the slaughter house for beef

after the auction. The Stevensons' will return to be part of the dairy herd.

When asked if it was difficult to part with their steers knowing their destiny, after three or four months of care and training, the McKim 4-H members said no, they are conditioned to that from the beginning. They hope to make some money on their animal, but they could lose. "It's a gamble," Kristie commented.

Although the grand champion and reserve may bring three times the market price, Kristie and Lorne aren't counting on that prize. Their interest is in showmanship. Kristie will compete in that class at Western Fair in London.

"It gets pretty exciting around this time of year," Kristie explained enthusiastically.

"You meet new friends, learn a lot, and have a lot of fun," Lorne added.

Those were almost the same words as Scott Stevenson used about 4-H. "It's a fun way of learning," he said.

All of his family agreed 4-H provides fun, social functions and learning experience, especially in competition at Harrow Fair.

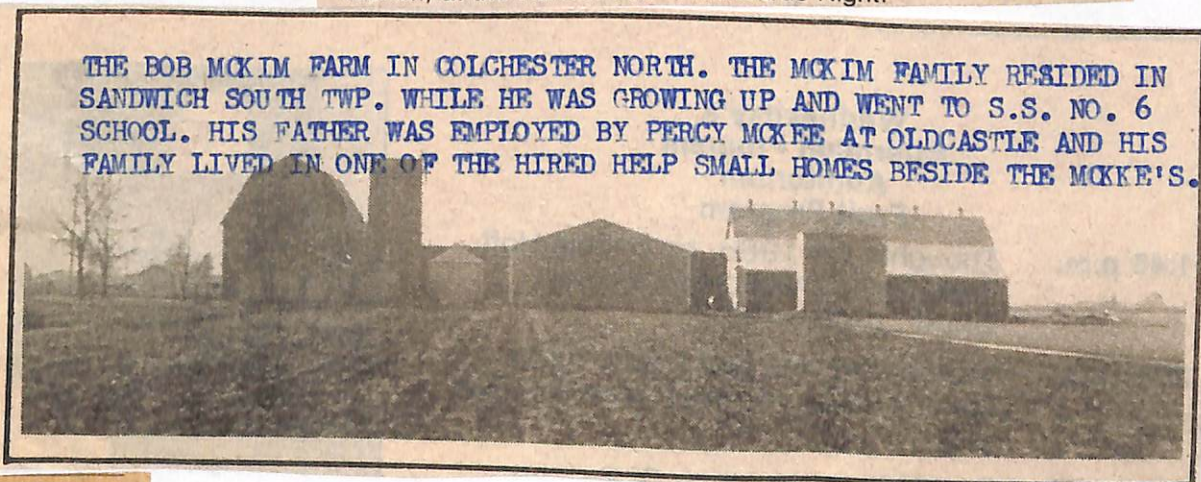

Maidstone's Margaret McLean has lyrics published

A Maidstone homemaker trades apron for a song

 MAIDSTONE — From poetry to music. That's the story of Maidstone homemaker Margaret Cutting McLean.

After years of writing poetry, Margaret has had lyrics accepted for recording by the Columbine Records of Hollywood, California.

"I never had any idea anything like this would happen," the shy, Maidstone resident said.

"It's a sad song, the kind she writes most easily although she writes of comedy and sometimes of joy. "It seems so real to me when I'm writing that I become emotional myself," she said. In January a letter arrived that notified her the song was being considered for commercial recording and national release in an album, The Now Sounds of today. Friday a telegram said her lyrics had been accepted.

Her song lyrics are filled with a strong emotional impact as they tell the story of an old man being attracted to a small boy who closely resembles the son he lost in

an accident years earlier. In a brief span of time the bond between the boy and man was terminated by the old man's death.

A part of her goes into every poem.

"When I get the urge to write, the lines keep going through my mind," she explained.

If there are other things that must be done and she refuses to obey that urge she has no peace. "If I go to bed without writing I'll wake up in the night with those lines still going through my mind. Once I write it then I feel content."

She's not sure why she submitted her poem in answer to an advertisement for song lyrics. She'd seen the ad many times before and friends have urged her over the years to "do something with her work."

Until last September she had kept very few of her works. While buying school note books for her youngest child, she decided to buy one for organizing her recipes. But that urge to create hit her and she put her words into the book instead of recipes.

When she finally decided to respond to the ad she looked through her book and chose the song which she entitled, Old Man On the Bench.

She writes with a directness and a sense of confidence, using a pen and making no revisions. She says the story is not plotted ahead of time but unfolds as she works. Only 45 minutes were spent in writing her successful poem.

"I just sit down and write. I have no idea what I am going to write. Usually when I get half way through I'm beginning to have in my mind how it's going to go. The rhyming comes to me as I write."

This strong creative ability has been part of her since childhood when she wrote letters to her friends in rhyme but she shyly kept her accomplishments hidden from her family.

"When I was a child I wrote a song and was singing it and playing it on a guitar when my brother heard me and wanted to know where I heard that pretty song. I was too embarrassed to tell him I wrote it."
