9 pet geese killed in stabbing sprees

Rose Tako is bewildered and bitter. Since March 20, nine of her pet geese have been victims of brutal attacks.

Some were stabbed repeatedly and she found the skeleton of another in a field near her Sandwich South Township farm.

The most recent incident occurred Tuesday.

"It was a bloody mess," she said. "There was blood all over the place. One of them had all kinds of stab wounds, so I raced him to the veterinarian."

Thirty minutes later, the large white gander, which had about 20 stab wounds, was back in her arms, shaken and in pain.

"He's lost his voice from honking so much," said the Windsor elementary school teacher.

ALL THAT REMAINED of the others were pools of blood. Tako believes they were killed in their pen, taken away and eaten.

But she doesn't understand this. "They're not 'eating' geese; they're pets — Chinese wack geese."

A home-made hunting knife was found in their pen and turned over to Essex OPP. The incident is now under investigation.

"The OPP told me people are stealing waterfowl and even small cattle all over the county," she said.

The killings began March 20 when three geese were slaughtered. The skeleton of one remains in a field near the pen.

"I thought it was a dog (that did it)," she said. But then she found the stripped carcass.

"IT LOOKED like someone had taken a knife and scraped all the body meat off."

She fears there will be another attack and has put locks and chains on the chain-link gate to the pen. And she also plans to put up barbed-wire barriers.

So great are her fears she didn't want the location of her farm made public.

"I think it's despicable," she said. "I hope whoever did this chokes on a bone."

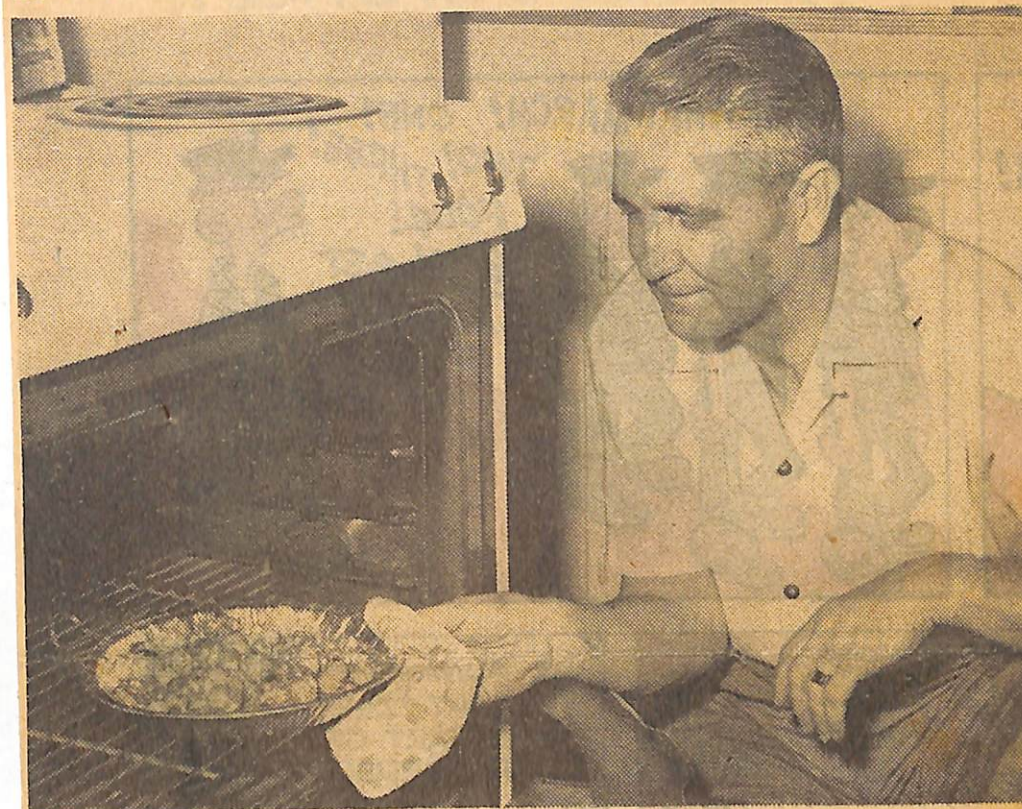

... one serving of baked marbles

Proof Marbles Are Actually All They're Cracked Up to Be

OLDCASTLE—Some of the time-worn adages—of the type which bewilder newcomers to Canada—mean little to Jack Tasker.

He scoffs at two in particular: "He's lost his marbles" and "He's cracked." A former mailman turned store keeper, Mr. Tasker has joined the two phrases. He "cracks" marbles.

Both of these well-known phrases have the same meaning, referring to someone whose mind is not what it should be; whose mind wanders, or who is just plain "cuckoo."

Mr. Tasker is not concerned with such reference to marbles. He buys them and sells them. But when he sells them, there is little resemblance to the original product.

Marbles are usually associated with the early spring and boys who have yet to reach

their teens. When Mr. Tasker is through with them they are for females only.

By cracking the marbles—no easy process in itself—he enhances their beauty. They then become centrepieces of costume jewelry, necklaces, bracelets and earrings.

When he's at work, and he only started this hobby two months ago, he takes over the family kitchen. And there are no ice cubes left to mix drinks with for a while afterwards.

He became interested in marbles after his sister returned from a visit to Arizona this spring. She saw a similar process in operation.

Mr. Tasker has changed it slightly, largely for the sake of efficiency. He first takes the marbles he wishes to crack, about 200 at a time, and places them in a thin aluminum pie plate—the type used for store-bought pies.

The pie plate of marbles is

placed in the oven for three to three and one-half hours. The timing is critical because of the next process.

When the marbles have absorbed the correct amount of heat they are removed from the oven and placed in a pan of ice cubes with more ice cubes placed on top. This is where the cracking occurs. If they are too hot they burst into little pieces; if not hot enough, little cracking occurs. In the latter case, the process has to be repeated.

In the other process, the hot marbles were dumped in cold water. This took longer and the water entered the cracks. It takes two to three days for the marbles to dry out.

Once the marbles are cracked—with ice it takes but a few minutes—they are ready for the next process. Chains, clamps, clasps and other small metallic items are available and they are assembled with the cracked marbles glued in appropriate places. This is the finished product.

Mr. Tasker doesn't have to worry about losing his marbles. His only son is 13. But he does have to look around when he wants to buy them. Some sizes are unavailable in

Maidstone Crash Worst in County Since '38 Disaster

2 Men, 3 Girls Dead,
Sixth Victim Badly Hurt

A fast-moving train hurtled broadside into a panel truck carrying two Windsor area men and four children Friday afternoon, leaving five of them dead at the Maidstone Line level crossing, north of Highway 2.

The dead and injured:

Pietro Vozza, 33, of 772 Langlois Ave.

Paul Drefko, 30, of R.R. 3, Maidstone.

Roberta Drefko, 2.

Peggy Drefko, 18 months.

June Taylor, 3, of R.R. 3, Maidstone, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Taylor.

Norma Louise Drefko, 4, was injured in the accident. She is in Metropolitan Hospital suffering from deep shock and a fractured right leg. She is in serious condition.

It was the worst rail crossing accident in the history of the immediate Windsor district. It equalled the worst ever in Essex County—five killed at Stoney Point in a level-crossing crash in 1938.

The panel truck with its load of six persons was traveling south on the Maidstone Line when it was smashed by the Canadian Pacific Railway passenger train heading from Windsor to London. Provincial police said according to impact evidence the truck was straddling the main-line tracks when the front of the locomotive plowed into it.

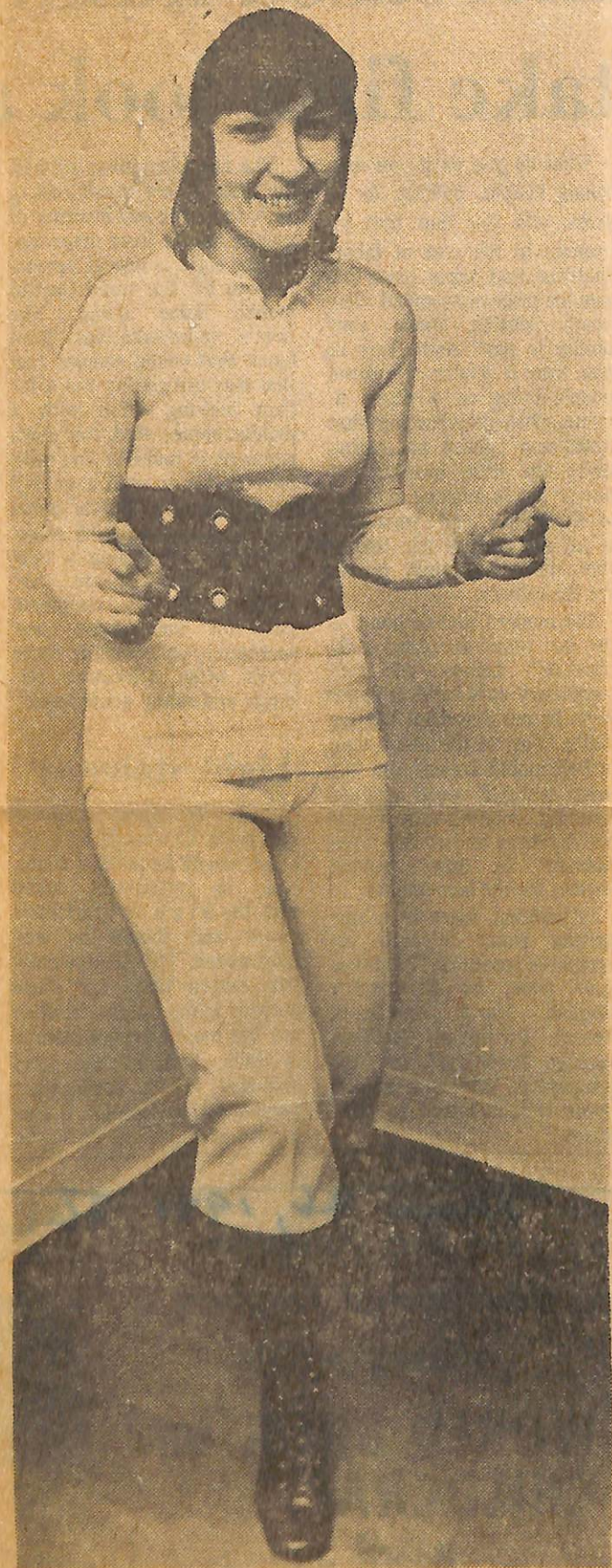

Business Leaders Tour Area Industrial Sites

Municipal and business leaders in Greater Windsor had a first-hand look Wednesday at recent industrial development in this area during a tour and visit to the Devon Park industrial area.

A two-hour bus tour sponsored by the Greater Windsor Industrial Commission attracted a group of municipal officials and businessmen who saw the industrial developments from Ojibway to Riverside.

This tour moved out Howard Ave. past the old Devonshire Race Track property which last summer was bought by new interests which have plans in mind for smaller industrial development.

The party moved to the Highway 401 and Highway 93 junction where Centri-Spray owns a 40-acre tract and is currently erecting two buildings, one for JIC Electric and the other for Windsor Steel Fabricators.

J. E. McKeown, industrial commissioner explained the company is having a problem obtaining water supplies to this area, but municipal efforts are being made to resolve this situation.

The tour then moved along South Cameron Blvd. where the party was able to see the new plant of Canadian Engineering and Tool and the expansion taking place at Trisen Tool and Die as well as a 23-acre site which is being planned for industrial development by W. J. C. Kaufman.

Swinging into the Sandwich West industrial park the group saw the 20 industrial plants which have located in this area, made more attractive by the controlled land prices under township administration. It provided an opportunity to see the extent of the International Tools Ltd. plant which employs 385 and Paragon Tools which is building an extension as well as the industrial mall which is almost completely occupied.

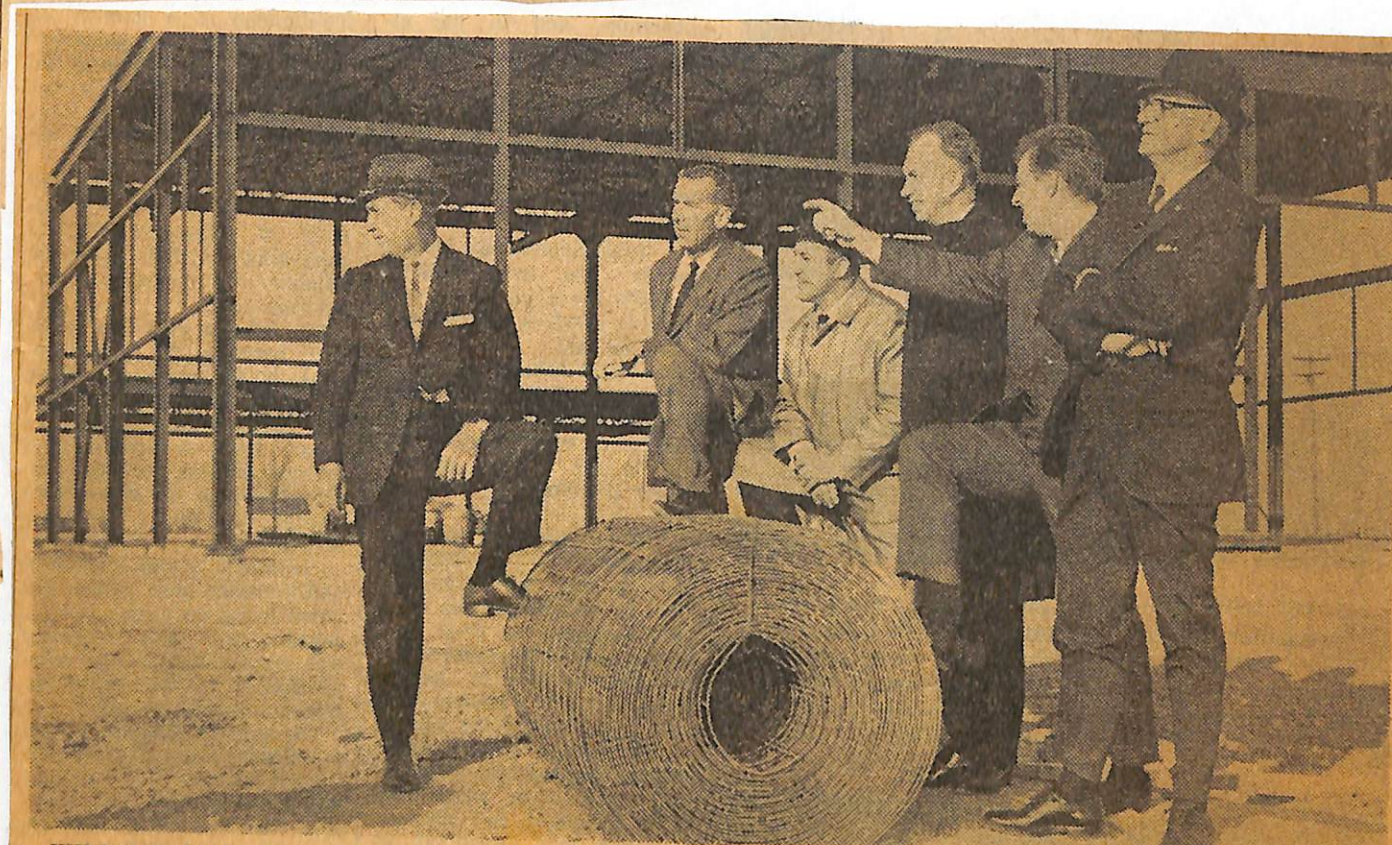
The tour then swung past the \$6,000,000 Windsor Raceway development and into the Morton Terminal and ship harbor and then past the developing \$2,500,000 site for Mount Royal Rice at Broadway and No. 18 highway.

The tour then swung along Peter St. where the new \$500,000 plant of Standard Induction Castings is being erected. In this same area Perfection Automotive is considering expansion and the tour moved past

the Huron Steel plant and past manufacturer. Also the new development along Central Ave. the Jamieson site where the \$8,000,000 hotel complex is to start early in 1966.

The tour passed along E. C. Row Ave. to the Metro Tool and McBride Stamping plant and a plant owned by Canadian Engineering and Tool soon to be occupied by a new machine tool

where Kaiser-Jeep and McInnes conveyors are among numerous plants located. Into Devon Park the tour gave the group a quick impression of development in this area which now reaches to 25 plants, all new within the past five years.

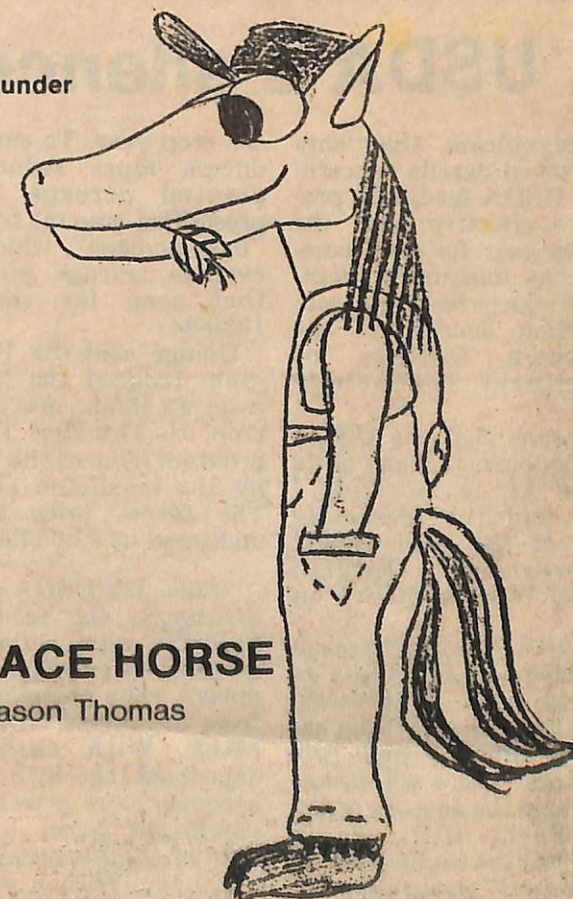

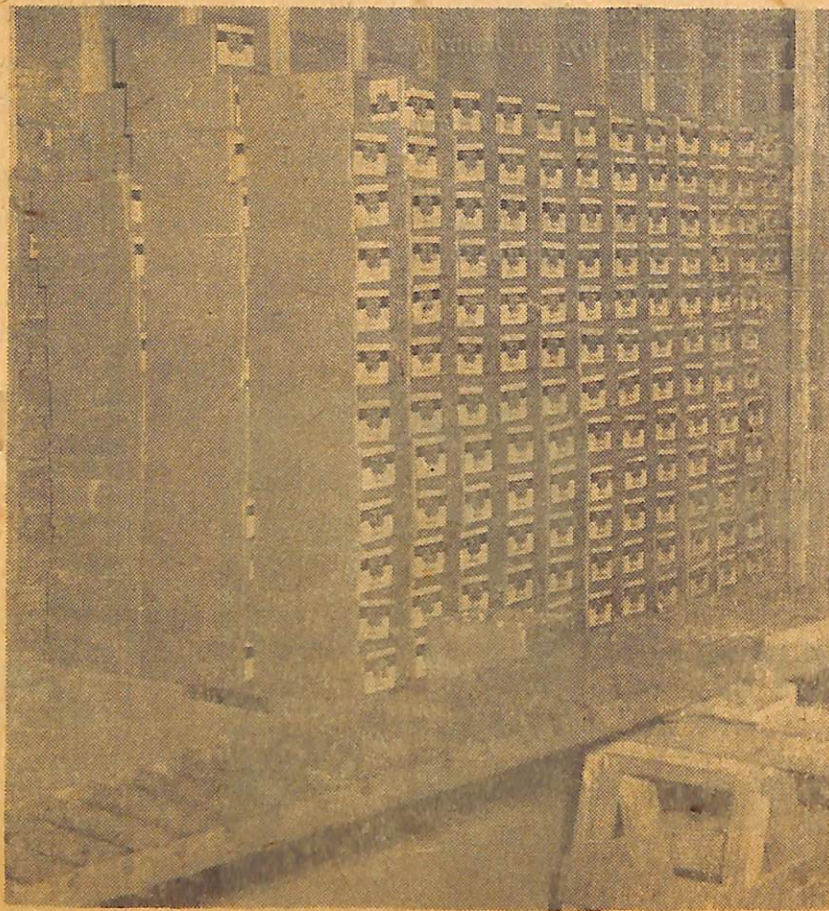

Canneries left out in the cold

FOR 55 YEARS, canned tomatoes have been rolling off the line at the Thomas family's Maidstone-area plant. But competition from Italy and Spain may force a halt to production at Thomas, and at every other Essex County cannery.

Italian and Spanish government subsidies are putting canned tomatoes on the Canadian market at lower prices than for those locally grown and packed. The Canadian government's Anti-Dumping Tribunal has given a green light to these subsidized imports, leaving the area's small, independent canners worried.

"We're a long-established business," says Bill Thomas, production manager at the cannery his grandfather started. "We'll probably be able to operate as long as anybody else in the business, but the way things are now, we can't predict what's going to happen. The Italian imports are certainly going to make a big difference.

"WE CAN BE COMPETITIVE with any other Canadian brand, and we'll operate as long as we can. If we sell our product we'll operate next year — but we're just living from year to year. With this business the way it is now, you can't look too far down the road."

Almost all of Canada's tomato production is based in Southwestern Ontario. In Essex County, nine independent companies can whole tomatoes. Together they'll pump about \$12 million into the local economy this year, and when tomato production peaks later this summer they will employ more than 500 people.

For most of the year these canneries sit idle, while small crews repair equipment and ship stockpiled tomato products. But as the tomatoes ripen in mid-August these canneries come alive with seasonal workers and re-activated machinery. Tomatoes are cleaned, canned and labelled with assembly-line efficiency, then moved to warehouses to await orders from buyers.

BUT LAST YEAR THOSE ORDERS didn't come. Subsidized European products cut so sharply into the Canadian trade that many local canners could not find buyers for their tomatoes, much of which still sit in cannery warehouses. And industry analysts say there are enough canned tomatoes still on the market to meet Canadian demands until December — even without the production due to begin later next month.

For local canners, it's a disaster. Some local firms are hovering on the edge of bankruptcy, while another — Wheatley-based Southland Canning Ltd. — has been in receivership since March. Southland bounced back from a receivership early in 1982, with hopes of strong sales in the latter half of the year to bring it out of financial difficulty for good. Instead, it was the worst sales year many of the county's canners can remember.

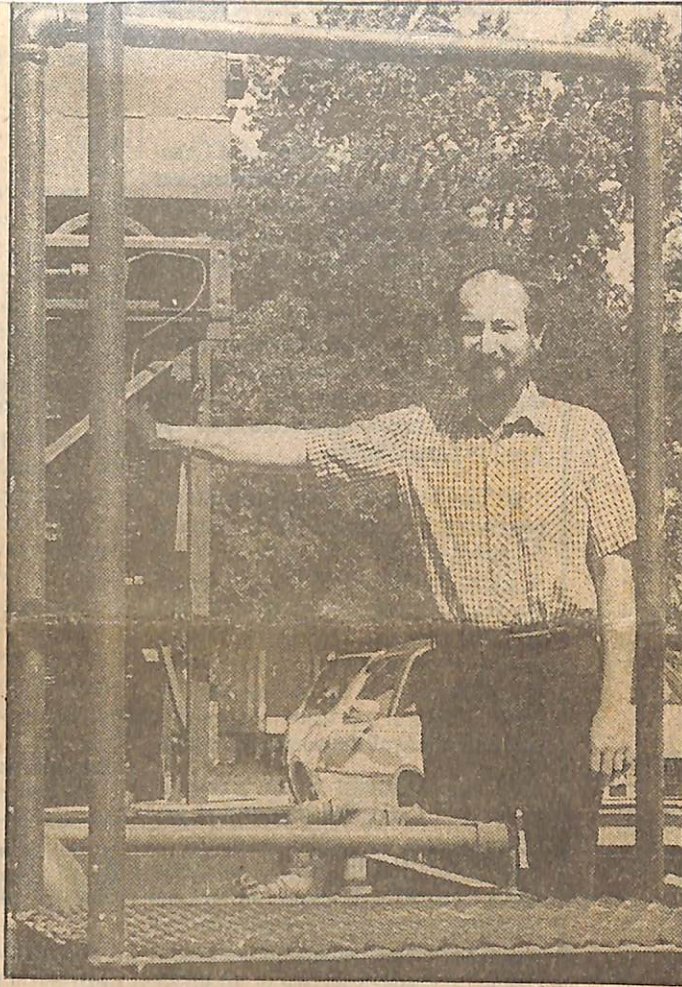
IN 1980, CANADA IMPORTED about 22 million kg (50 million lb) of canned tomatoes, enough to fill 30 per cent of the market. Almost half of those imports came from California, to supply Western Canada, with Italy, Spain, Portugal, Greece, Bulgaria, Israel and other countries sharing what market remained.

But last year, imports accounted for almost 45 per cent of the Canadian market, mostly on the strength of the Italian and Spanish subsidies. To make matters worse, local canners were packing the biggest-ever Canadian tomato crop, putting more Canadian tomatoes on the market than ever before.

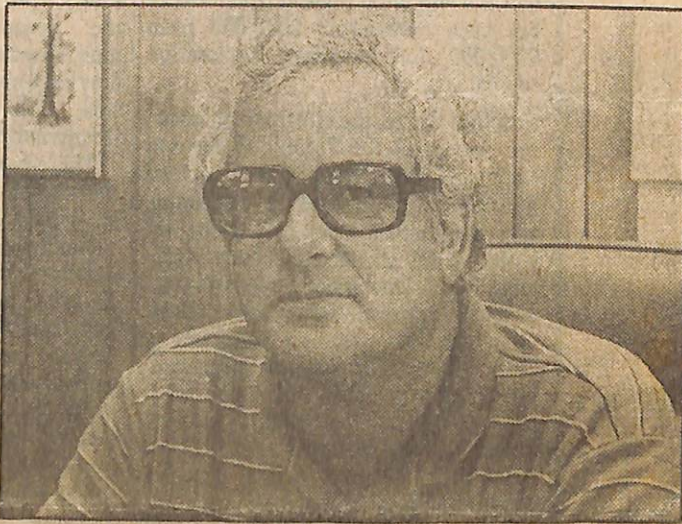
Canadian tomatoes that would have sold for more than \$15 per 24-jar case were cut to almost \$13 — well below the cost of production — to compete with the imports and to keep money moving through the heavily-financed local canning industry.

THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT did buy \$500,000 worth of unsold tomatoes to ease the canners' financial burdens, but those tomatoes are still unsold and congesting the Canadian market.

Local canners saw the writing on the wall early in 1982, when the Europeans began taking an increasing share of the market. They feared the same problems they survived in 1976, when Taiwan used Canada as a tomato dumping-ground. At that time, the federal government sided with the local canners, and slapped a surtax on Taiwanese tomatoes to save the local industry.

But before that government surtax was applied, almost half of Essex County's canneries were forced out of business.

THE CANNERS, THROUGH THE Ontario Food Processors Association (OFPA), sought help from the government again. But this time the government's Anti-Dumping Tribunal sided with the imports. In a June 28 decision, the tribunal refused to take action against the Italian subsidies — and blamed Canadian canners for putting too much of their own product on the market.

"They said the subsidized imports are not likely to cause natural injury to Canadian producers," says Jerry Pawlowski, a co-owner of Stoney Point Canning Co. Ltd. and an OFPA director. "Well, if this isn't natural injury, I don't know what is.

"We proved beyond a shadow of a doubt that there was a very high subsidy paid to Italian processors, as much as \$4 a case. That's like getting the tomatoes free.

"THE ONTARIO TOMATO-CANNING industry can compete in a fair competition, but \$4 a case is just too much," he says. "We can't compete with that."

The tribunal's decision comes after encouragement from both the federal and provincial government to expand Canadian tomato production, to replace imports. To stimulate Ontario production of tomato paste, a product not affected by the tribunal's decision, the provincial government awarded a \$3-million grant to the H.J. Heinz Co. in Leamington, and \$1.3 million to Primo Foods in Cottam, toward the cost of new equipment.

At its plants in Leamington and Dresden, Canadian Canners Ltd. has expanded and improved its tomato-processing equipment for its Aylmer and DelMonte products.

AND THE SMALL, INDEPENDENT canners — including Thomas Canning and Stoney Point Canning — have spent millions of dollars during the past four years to streamline and automate their plants.

"We were encouraged by the governments to increase our production, to replace imports," says Pawlowski. "And for the first time, in

1982, we had a decent pack. Then the tribunal slaps us in the face and tells us we created our own problems by over-producing.

"But we still didn't produce enough tomatoes in 1982 to feed Canadians. There's still room for imports."

The tribunal is a part of the federal Revenue Department. Its decision cannot be appealed. Federal Agriculture Minister Eugene Whelan could not be reached for comment.

"THE INDUSTRY HAS BEEN gearing up because the government has been urging everybody to replace imports," says Ted Chudleigh, OFPA manager. "And when we did, we got screwed.

"The feds just kissed us off," he says. "There's no way a reasonable person could have found against us. This was strictly a political decision. The fix was in and we got had.

"And five years from now, if nothing has changed, the Ontario tomato industry will be cut to 20 per cent of what it is now," says Chudleigh. "Heinz will survive and the big companies like Libby's and Primo that do specialty products, but the small companies that don't do anything unique are going to be gone. And that's going to have tremendous economic impact."

"THE TRIBUNAL," SAYS PAWLOWSKI, "has opened the doors to Canada as a dumping ground. There were certainly other countries following this case, like China and Bulgaria, and they're ready to use Canada as a dumping ground.

"I felt so sure they were going to find in our favor that I just can't believe it."

Pawlowski sells most of his tomatoes to food store chains for use as store-brand product, but he has no firm contracts this year. "I've already made commitments to put up a pack this year, but I just don't know what to expect," he says. "Normally you go into a season enthused, looking forward to it — but not this year. I'm going into this pack in a very unsecured position."

JOHN MUMFORD, MANAGER of the London-based Ontario Vegetable Producers Marketing Board, says the tribunal's decision is a major worry for farmers as well. But he says the canning industry can't expect farmers to absorb lower tomato prices.

"If things keep going the way they are, there's going to be more canneries going the way of Southland, and that's unfortunate," he says. "But the problem has been identified by the processors as subsidies on the imports, so how can they expect our growers to compete with foreign governments?"

Most local canners say they will survive through the foreseeable future. Others refuse to talk about the tribunal's decision and tomato market prospects.

JACQUES CARRIERE, MONTREAL-BASED owner of the Belle River Canning Co., says loyal buyers throughout Quebec should keep the company operating for at least another two or three years, but adds: "We can't afford to lose money every year. We'll see what the market is going to do."

And at Thomas Canning, Bill Thomas says customers loyal to the company's Utopia brand and the store brand sold in Quebec's Provi-go food stores should keep his cannery in business.

"We've made changes in the plant to be as efficient as possible, and we're not going to pack anything more than we think we can sell," he says. "But the way the economy is today, buyers are going to be looking at price more than ever, and there's a limit to how low we can go.

"It's something you can't do anything about. If your plant's not as efficient as the next guy's, then you can do something about it. But what can you do when you're up against foreign subsidies?"

"We'll struggle on, as long as we can."

Mr. Fortin was born in Windsor and lived in the area all his life. He was a member of St. Stephen's Anglican Church.

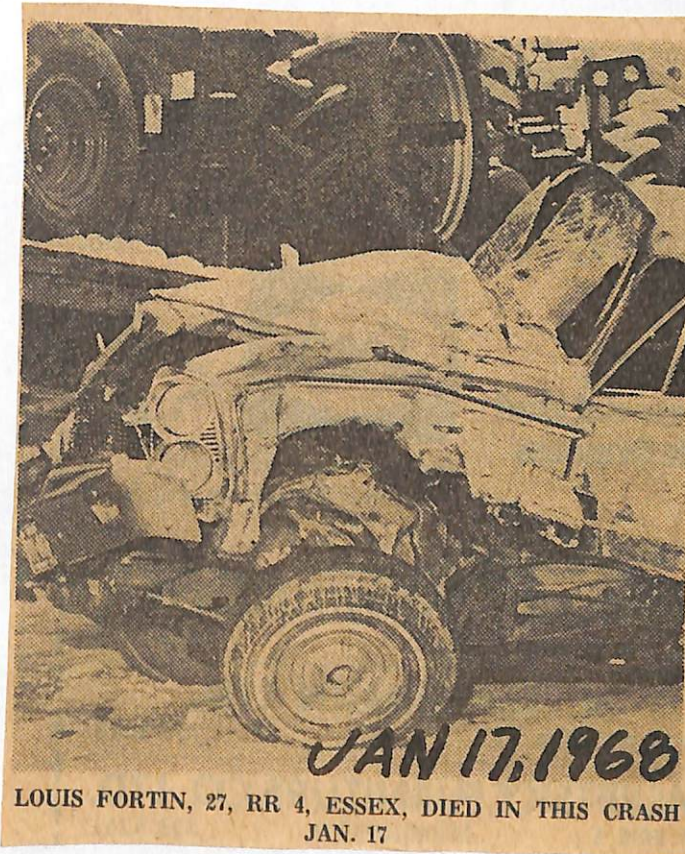

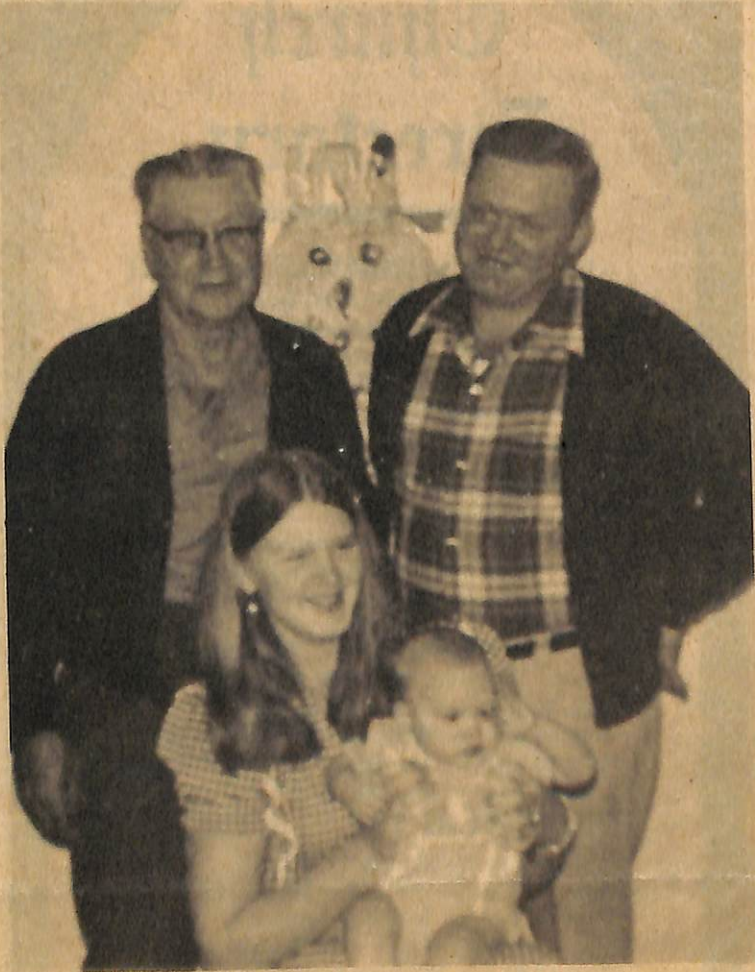

Joint venture can be good marriage

THIS SPRING, if Windsor manufacturers aren't exactly thinking of love, more and more are showing interest in marriage with a foreign partner.

Inquiries about foreign joint ventures are picking up, government officials say.

Part of that increase is due to the match-making role governments are playing to promote joint ventures. They consider them a good deal for cities like Windsor.

And some companies that aren't sure they want to go all the way with a partner are turning to licensing agreements, an arrangement Windsor-Essex County Development Commissioner Guy DiPonio calls "sort of living together, as opposed to marriage."

A joint venture is a new company or partnership formed by a local company with another company, usually from outside Canada, to produce a particular product. Often, the foreign partner brings the know-how and the local partner has the plant, labor and marketing experience. Both sides share equity and profits, and sometimes even form a joint management team.

A licensing agreement is simply the purchase by one company from a foreign country of the rights to make a product in a given market. There is no sharing of equity.

Mike Solcz, president of Valiant Machine and Tool Inc. of Windsor, has two "marriages" going with European partners.

They had good designs for hydraulic presses and they wanted to tap the Canadian market, so they provided the engineering and Solcz makes the presses and sells them across Canada.

Seven months ago, MGW Controls on

Provincial Road sat down with a U.S. firm that had high-tech expertise in servicing and repairing servo valves, pumps and controls. They jointly formed a third company call Servotechnology so that Canadians won't have to send those parts to the U.S. to be serviced.

Solcz and Servotechnology president Mike Weldon say joint ventures have their "ups and downs" but, with the right companies and in the right circumstances, they can work well.

Colio Wines of Harrow was basically a joint venture, with an Italian company providing winemaking expertise and a winemaker.

Ontario's Industry and Trade Ministry has been pushing joint ventures lately.

Jack Delaney, manager of locations for the ministry's Industrial Investment Branch, is a believer.

"We see the joint venture and licensing agreement as one method of getting the technology in place in a hurry," he said.

A foreign company may have a new process or machine and, rather than start a brand new company and plant for the Canadian market, it will strike a deal with an Ontario company. There's less investment or risk for the foreign company.

For Canada, Delaney said, joint ventures reduce imports; they give Canadians new capabilities; and they sometimes enable a Canadian-European venture to supply the huge U.S. market as well as Canada.

Licensing agreements have the same benefits but usually the local company puts up all the capital.

The advantages for the foreign company are that it can sell here without a big capital investment, and it can get a feel for the Canadian market by working with a company that has local experience.

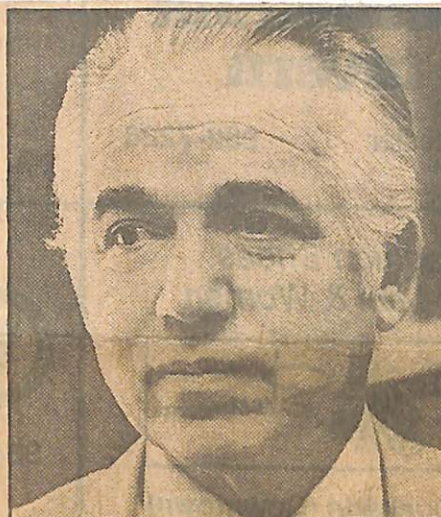
As money becomes tight, these arrangements are a new method of capitalizing a project.

Delaney said joint ventures and licensing agreements sometimes lead eventually to direct investment in Canada by the foreign partner.

Elfio Toldo, local consultant for the ministry, said he used to receive about one inquiry a year about joint ventures but there is much more activity lately.

Not all are panning out, he said. The pros and cons are the same as if you were going into business for yourself; you have to look at financing, the strength of the two companies, management, and all the other factors.

Guy DiPonio said Canadian law does not require foreign investors to take Canadian

partners, such as Mexican law does, but it does give tax breaks if Canadians control the company.

Several types of products are tailor-made for joint ventures.

Soft drinks are too bulky to import and can be made easily here, so they are often licensed to local bottlers.

A foreign company may want to produce in Canada for currency exchange reasons, or because Canada has a tariff on items such as textiles, DiPonio said.

He said the companies and people have to be compatible; a legal contract alone won't keep a joint venture together.

A Harvard Business School study found 30 per cent of 1,100 joint ventures didn't last.

DiPonio tells the story of a chicken and a pig who decided to form a joint venture, but the deal fell through when the chicken suggested their product should be bacon and eggs. "The lesson," says DiPonio, "is that there has to be equal commitment and contribution from both parties."

Canadian companies interested in joint ventures often find partners through the development commission or the Ontario government. Both keep a roster of inquiries from foreign companies. Sometimes an overseas branch of a Canadian bank will put two businessmen in touch.

There are also listings in trade journals, but many joint ventures begin by two people meeting at an international trade show.

DiPonio said joint ventures or licensing agreements can work in reverse too. A process developed in Windsor can be licensed to U.S. companies for a fee. That brings foreign currency into Canada. Sometimes the licence requires the licensee to buy materials or equipment from the Canadian firm and that generates jobs here.

A study of 37 joint ventures by University of Western Ontario Professor J. Peter Killing, found projects which set up a shared management arrangement were more difficult to operate than those with management dominated by one parent.

Often the managers found themselves either splitting into two distrustful camps, or else the general manager was caught between the two parent firms who both wanted to run the company.

The Mormon way: Centred on family and self-reliance

Jean Torok believes in motherhood, family life and the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

She lives in a large, brightly decorated house on the 6th Concession on the outskirts of Windsor with her husband, Alec, and their four children, aged seven to 18.

They are all Mormons ... among "the most jubilant people in the world," according to Mrs. Torok.

A native of Glace Bay, Cape Breton, the 37-year-old woman laughs easily and talks directly about her efforts to protect, provide for, and challenge her children.

One of the things she has done to protect them is assemble in the house enough provisions to last a year — in case of disaster, economic hardship or just a bad snow storm.

She has huge, sealed drums of wheat, hundreds of pounds of honey, soybeans, dozens of cases of canned food, candles, blankets, even toys. The stock also includes a large supply of coal, oil and logs to use as fuel to cook food and heat the house.

Mrs. Torok's food-storage plan did not originate with her, but with her church: It is a Mormon teaching that members be prepared for the natural disasters that are predicted in some parts of the Bible.

Besides the spiritual inspiration, food storage makes practical sense to Mrs. Torok, as it did to the founders of the plan during the Great Depression.

If her husband was sick or laid off from his job as a machinist at General Motors, she said, the family wouldn't suffer. And if they ever get snowed in, they don't need to worry about getting to the supermarket.

The work of preparing the stock is made easy, she said, by church bulletins which give detailed instructions on preserving food and rotating supplies. Some of the dehydrated foods are good for more than 10 years, she said, but wheat and tinned foods are regularly rotated.

She said church leaders instruct the members not to go into debt to store food, so local communities work together to cut costs.

In Windsor, her church ward, which meets at Roseland School, buys honey and wheat in bulk and divides it between the members. And at least one night a month, usually more often, Mrs. Torok meets with "sisters" to trade recipes, new ideas, left-over household articles and craft supplies.

"If you keep your ears open, you can learn

just about everything you need to know at church," she said.

In the past, the women have arranged to have instructors give lessons on subjects ranging from budgeting to auto repair to flower arrangement.

The congregation numbers about 200; they preparing to build a new church at Lauzon Road and Forest Glade Drive.

Food storage is only a part of a wider Mormon philosophy of self-reliance; Mrs. Torok said she is like a pioneer mother in many ways.

She tends a summer garden to supply most of the family fruits and vegetables, and she preserves and dehydrates foods herself. She even tries to make time grind wheat to bake bread.

Although she held a job outside the home for nine years, Mrs. Torok said Mormons prefer their women stay at home.

"I don't support women's liberation," she said, "but it's okay to work if your husband's income isn't enough — or, as in my case, he is subject to lay-offs."

For the last few years, Mrs. Torok hasn't worked. She said enjoys being home to greet her children when they come in from school.

"Our church instructs us to be really family-oriented," she said. "Monday is family home evening."

On that night, the church doors are closed and families spend time together. Mrs. Torok said the children stage a puppet show, dance, sing or help preserve food. Sometimes they go out to a movie or for a meal. The important thing, she said, is that they spend time together. Family members are even discouraged from using the telephone to talk to friends on Monday night, said Mrs. Torok.

"The problem with our society today is that families are falling apart at the seams," she said. "We want our families to be strong."

Single members in the church group are invited to spend the evening with various families, she said.

"I don't know of another place where you can get such a beautiful plan for your family as the Mormon church," said Mrs. Torok. "We are taught how to care for each other and how to help each other go through frustration periods."

"Other people might think we live a dull, restricted life," said Mrs. Torok — who doesn't smoke, drink coffee, tea or alcohol.

"But I'm as happy as I can be."

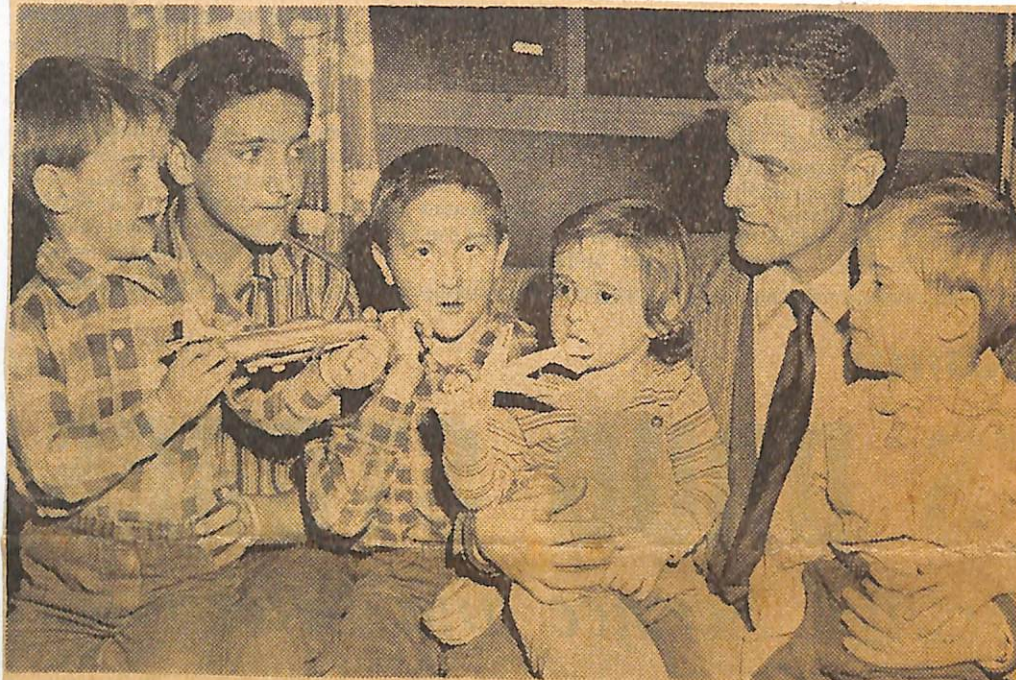

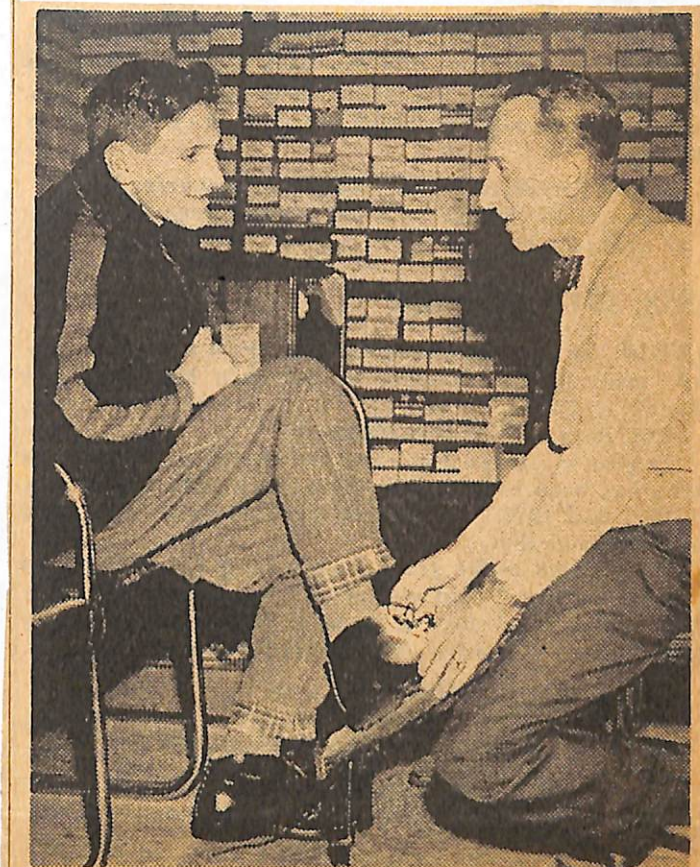

Eight Hurt In Three Accidents

Single-Car Crash On Grand Marais Injures Six

Eight persons were hospitalized in three accidents in Windsor and district over the weekend. All were taken to Metropolitan Hospital.

In hospital as the result of a single-car crash on Grand Marais Rd. at George Ave. are: William Ford, 18, of 9 Clark St. W., Leamington; Ralph Cummings, 20, of 17 Askew St., Leamington; Ray Taggart, 16, of 10 Georgia Ave., Leamington; Miss Vicky Loeffler, 14, of 728 Pacific Ave.; Miss Theresa Boudreau, 15, of 734 Pacific Ave., and Wilthew Cummings, 18, also of 17 Askew St.

In two other accidents Marlene Marier, 19, of 1009 Albert Rd. suffered forehead and knee lacerations, while Victor Vigneux, 21, of R. R. 2, Belle River, sustained possible fractured ribs.

The accident in which six were hurt occurred about 9 p.m. Sunday. Police report the car, driven by Ford, apparently ran off the road and struck a tree on the south side of Grand Marais Rd. The car was demolished.

Attendants from both A.B.C. and Windsor Ambulance, after placing three of the victims who were found lying on the roadway on to stretchers were attracted to the wrecked car by groans from the back seat. There they found the other injured.

Miss Boudreau suffered lacerations, shock and possible nose fracture; Miss Loeffler, lacerations and possible skull fracture; Ford, extensive lacerations; Taggart, lacerations and possible fractured nose; Cummings, possible punctured lung, fractured right wrist and internal injuries, an dhis brother, Milthew, multiple lacerations.

Marlene Marier was injured Saturday night in a two-car collision at Tecumseh Blvd. E. and Walker Rd. She was a passenger in a car driven by Clifford Fauteux, 29, of 1035 Cadillac St.

The car was travelling north on Walker Rd. when it was in collision with an auto driven by Russell Lesperance, 45, of 1516 Moy Ave. Damage to both vehicles was estimated at \$450.

Victor Vigneux was hurt on Highway 39 Saturday night in an accident in which three cars were involved near Emeryville.

Mrs. Eleanor Gravel, 35, of 158 First St., Belle River, was treated at hospital and released.

Ontario police detachment at Belle River investigated.

All injured were taken to hospital by A.B.C. and Windsor Ambulances.

Heroic efforts of the father, Walter Tranmer, 36, an unemployed decorator, are credited with saving the lives of his 34-year-old pregnant wife, Sybil, and the six children.

Mr. Tranmer, his family trapped in the upstairs of the burning home, climbed out on the roof and pulled everyone through a small window. This done, he jumped 15 feet to the ground, returned with a ladder and brought his family to safety.

Mrs. Tranmer and the children, Gail, 7 months; Susan, 2; Paul, 4; Kurt, 5; Mark, 10, and Rodney, 13, spent the rest of the night at Metropolitan Hospital.

Mrs. Tranmer suffered shock. Rodney and Mark suffered lacerations about the hands. However, all except the baby were released. The children are being taken care of by the Children's Aid Society until a new home can be found for them.

The fire broke out shortly before 3 a.m. Sunday.

"I awoke and smelled smoke. Everything was hazy," Mrs. Tranmer said. "I called to my husband and the oldest boy. I could hear some of the children coughing and my husband sent them upstairs and said he turned off the heater."

Mr. Tranmer said he ran downstairs and groped his way to a window which he opened because of the thick smoke.

"I turned off the space heater—it was an oil heater—and then I could see the flames spreading," Mr. Tranmer said. "I rushed back upstairs to get everyone out of the house, but by the time we got back to the stairs the flames were spreading up the stairwell.

"I took them back to the window and I broke it. I climbed out on the roof and began pulling the family through it."

He said the baby was handed out first. When he reached in for the next child the baby started to slide down the roof.

"I caught the baby just in time but it scratched its face a bit—poor thing," Mr. Tranmer said. "Then I got everyone out of the window. The children were screaming and crying, but I told them everything would be all right.

"I jumped to the ground and came back with a ladder and brought everybody down. It was real cold but I had thrown out some blankets and I put everyone in the car."

Mr. Tranmer said he ran over to his landlord's home about 300 yards away. The home was owned by Gordon O'Neil. Mr. O'Neil attempted to call the fire department but the telephone line was dead.

Sandwich East Twp. police noticed the flames and came to the rescue, but by then all the occupants had been removed from the burning home.

"I couldn't believe it," Mr.

Tranmer said. "In just a few minutes the flames were shooting out of the roof. It happened so fast I still can't believe it."

Anderdon Twp. fire department arrived at the scene some time later but nothing could be done to save the home by then. The fire had levelled it.

Mr. Tranmer and his family moved to Canada from Yorkshire, Eng., just three years ago. He has lived in Windsor for the past 1½ years. He is unemployed at the present time, having been laid off work by a local decorating and painting company.

All of the Tranmer family's possessions, including a new refrigerator and stove which have not been fully paid for yet, were destroyed. None of the contents was insured against fire loss.

The children are being taken care of by the Children's Aid Society. Mr. Tranmer sought direction from the Y.M.C.A., which in turn made arrangements for the family. Mrs. Tranmer, still suffering from shock, is staying with friends, Mr. and Mrs. John O'Connor of 241 Dougall Ave.

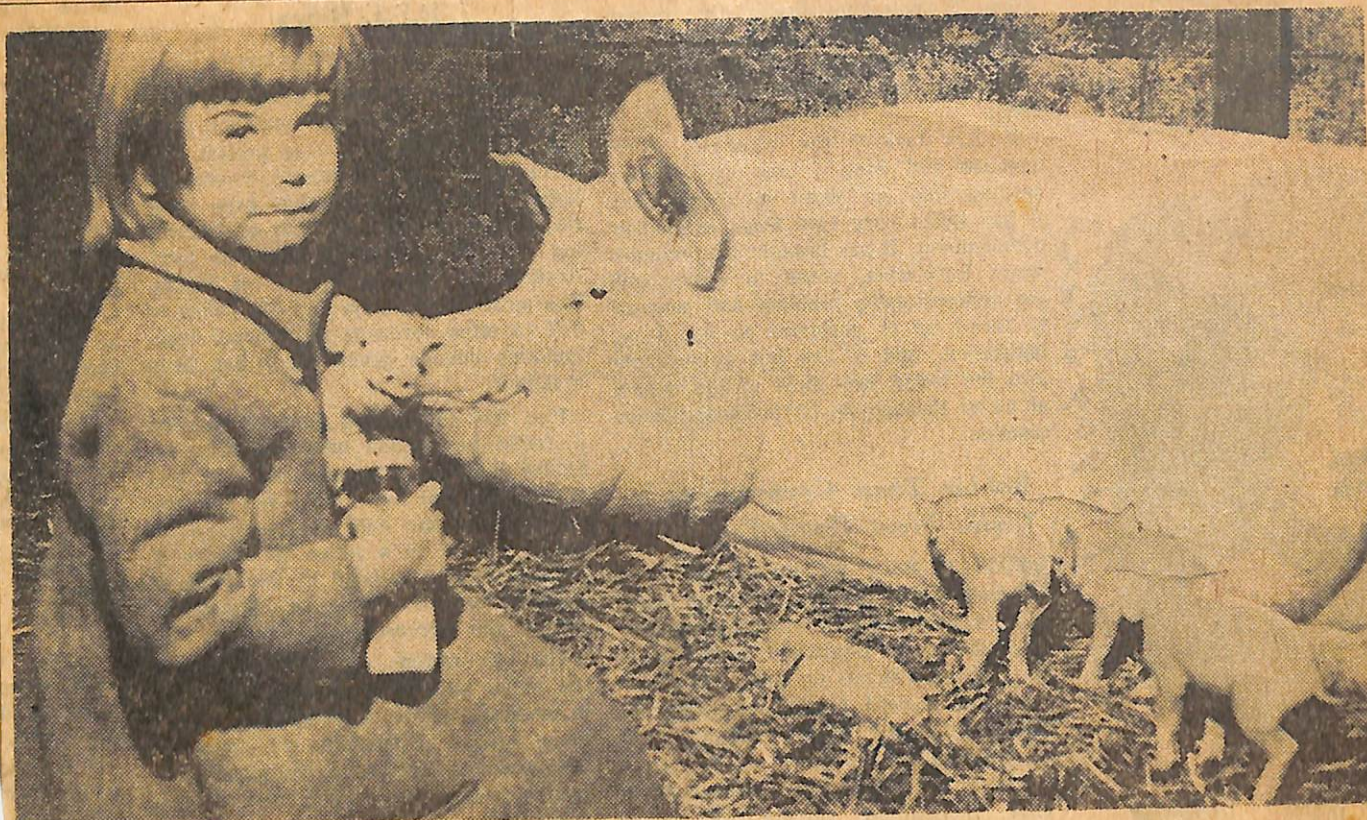

Minister Dies at 84

Rev. Joseph Tully Served in Area

An Anglican minister since 1910 and a World War I chaplain, Rev. Joseph Tully, former rector of St. Stephen's Church, Sandwich South, died Saturday in Riverview Hospital. He was 84 and was retired in 1947.

A popular and widely-known figure in church circles and in the life of the Windsor community, the late Mr. Tully was a familiar sight to many as he went for daily walks in his later years. He had a pleasant word and greeting for all.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday from the James H. Sutton Funeral Home, 937 Ouellette Ave. Special services will be conducted by the Royal Canadian Legion tonight at 8 o'clock.

Mr. Tully was born in Tilbury West Twp., the son of Thomas Tully and Mary Ford Tully. He attended schools in the area and went to Essex High School from where he graduated to become a school teacher before entering Huron College for his theological training.

Following ordination in 1910, his first parishes were in Oxford County at Eastwood and Innerskip. He later served at Thamesville and Bothwell and Moraviantown. In 1915 he joined the chaplaincy service and became attached to Royal Army Service Corps. He served in England at Bramshott Camp and with the Canadian Railway Construction Corps in France and at No. 1 Canadian Army Clearing Station on the continent.

After four years absence, he returned to Huron Diocese and became rector of St. Paul's and St. Luke's Churches in Brantford. In 1929, he came to Windsor and succeeded the late Rev. Edgar McKegney as rector of St. Stephen's. He remained in this charge until his retirement.

During his 18 years as rector

Rev. Joseph Tully, rector at St. Stephen's Church for 18 years retired and he moved to Amherstburg. He was 71.

THERE'S nothing to do once the cooler temperatures begin, you say? Then you've never been to one of Essex County's many conservation areas.

These nature-filled, colorful wood lots have something for everyone.

For camera buffs, the Maidstone Conservation Area on Puce Road 46 is the

ideal spot to capture the rich colors of fall, says Mike Turton, Essex Region Conservation Authority (ERCA) community relations supervisor.

A relaxing walk along the Puce River takes about one-half hour to complete. Along the way you'll find a variety of trees, that "all look quite nice now," Turton says.

Although bird watching is a little out of season, you can still see hawks at Holiday Beach throughout October.

Another eye-catching area is the Kopegaton Woods. Turton says this 10-hectare (25-acre) wooded lot offers the best and most varied tree species with many hard to find elsewhere in Canada.

For braver souls, there's group camping, usually a favorite of area Boy Scout and Girl Guide groups. Call the ERCA office to make arrangements.

Once the snow flies, Essex County offers plenty of cross country skiing areas. The best spots, Turton says, are Devonwood and Canard Valley conservation areas.

Devonwood, a 36-hectare wood lot on Hwy. 42, has three km (two miles) of ski rails.

For a more physical challenge, the Canard Valley area is interesting with beautiful hickory trees dotting trails that run along the Canard River.

The John R. Park Homestead and Conservation Area on County Road 50 and

Iler Road offers a special event every other month, says curator Dave Guthrie.

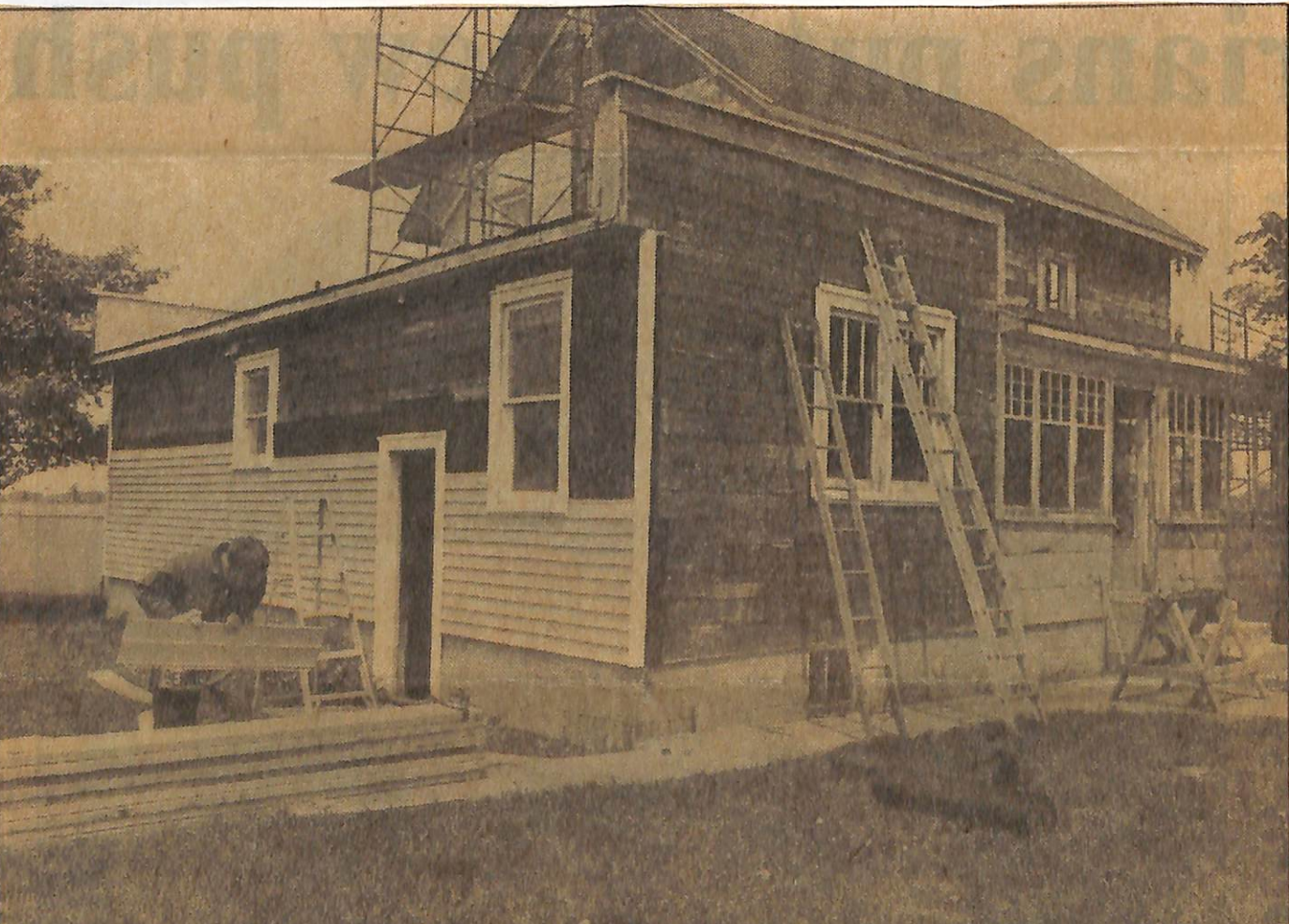

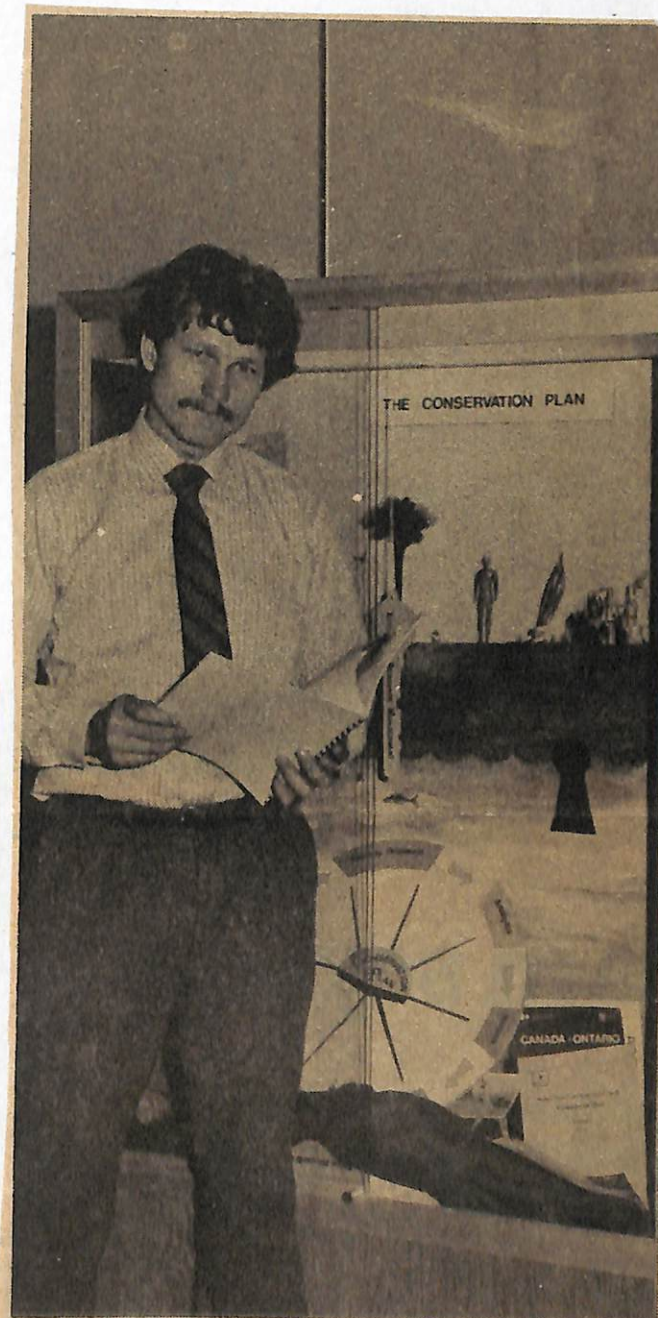

SOME DAY, the people at the Essex Region Conservation Authority (ERCA) hope, Hillman Marsh will be a county showpiece for recreation, education and conservation.

And the focal point for all this attention will be a reception centre now in the process of conversion from a century-old farmhouse.

Located near County Roads 48 and 37, about five miles east of Leamington, the house is ideally situated for welcoming guests to the marsh area.

Mike Turton, ERCA community relations supervisor, is particularly enthused about the role the centre, and the marsh, will play in the conservation authority's plans. Turton is the person behind the authority's foray into the world of education and the reception centre will provide the tools to make that all happen.

BEGINNING this fall, the conservation authority will begin a program of conservation education in co-operation with the Essex County Roman Catholic Separate School Board. The program will be different from previous programs because the board has made conservation a formal part of the curriculum for a one-year pilot project. And the reception centre, known as the Reid farmhouse, after its former owners, will be the classroom.

"We've been involved in education programs since the authority was formed in 1974," Turton said. "But it was always on a first-come, first-serve basis, as demand warranted. This is the first time we've arranged a formal program with the school board in which large blocks of time, and large blocks of students, are planned for in advance."

FOR ITS FIRST year, the conservation field studies program will include 80 days of instruction divided among the county separate school board's Grade 4 and Grade 5 pupils. Eventually it's hoped the program will begin early in primary school and continue to Grade 8.

The school board's cost in the program's first year is \$87.50 per day. That is expected to double if it is accepted beyond the pilot

Once the reception centre is complete, Turton said, the authority can provide children with an introductory lesson in a classroom format before launching into an exploration along the marsh's 2,300 feet of boardwalk, providing a much more effective form of education.

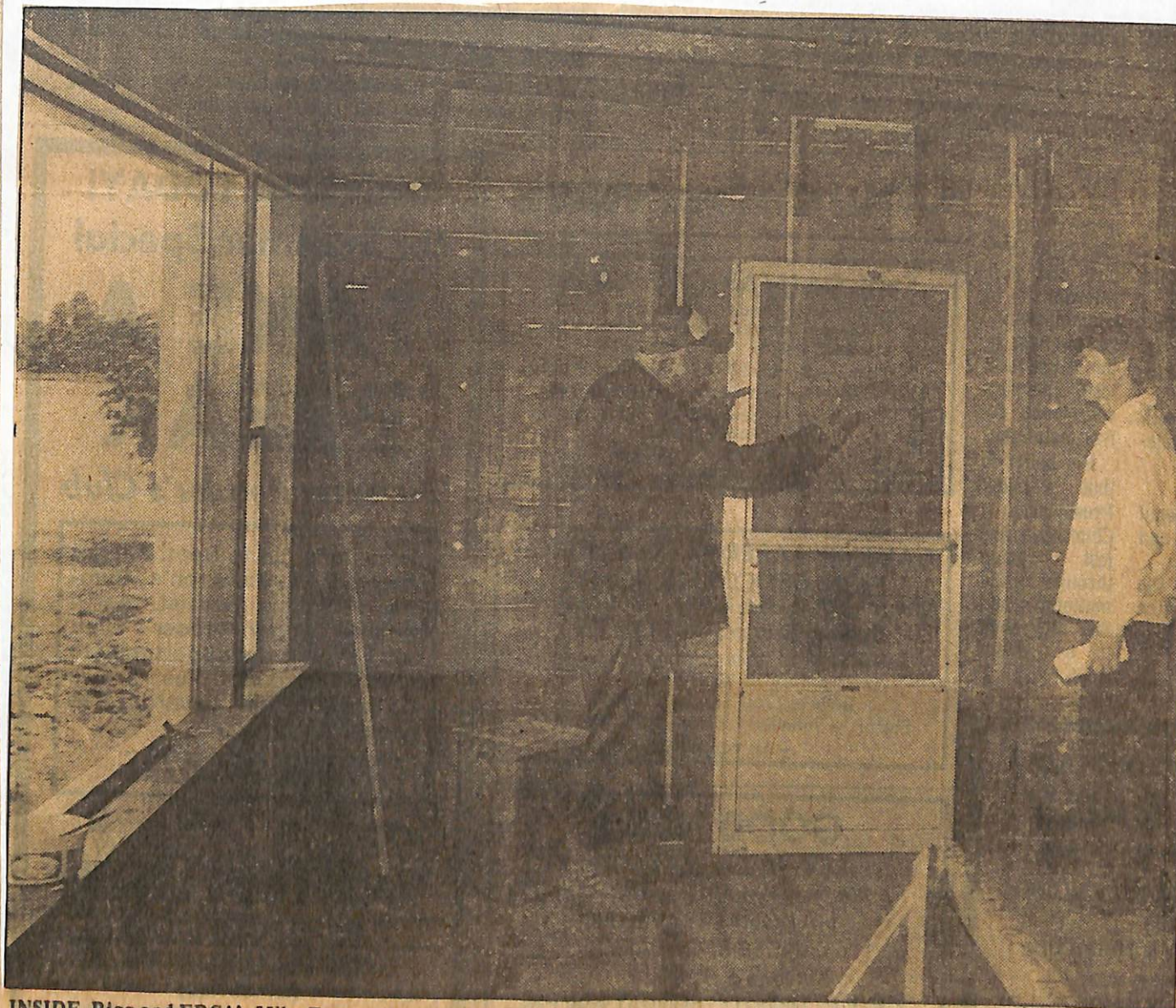
"It's not just a day away from school — it's part of their course of study," he said. "When I took my two field trips in public school it had nothing to do with the curriculum. It was a chance to eat donuts at the bakery and drink tomato juice at Heinz."

Work began on the farmhouse April 1 with the aid of a \$35,000 provincial grant

and is expected to continue to August. Wood siding is being replaced with vinyl siding, a new roof is being built, windows are being replaced, and indoors, new walls are being added and old ones removed to create an open, classroom area.

The fate of several farm buildings surrounding the farmhouse depends on the form the site takes in a plan being drawn by a landscape architect.

The plan may also include things like a picnic area, a canoe launch, a conservation tillage demonstration area and an entrance to the boardwalk trail system. Other sites in the 1,000-acre marsh area may be used to demonstrate further conservation practices like shoreline protection and the protection of wildlife habitat. Ultimately, Turton said, the focus must be on the outdoors.

"WE WANT the building to complement that," he said, adding a comment on the effectiveness of Point Pelee National Park's centre which "encourages you to go out and explore."

Of course the reception centre will be used by more than school children. Turton said he expects Hillman Marsh to grow increasingly popular with birders and people in general who enjoy a walk in a natural setting. The centre will increase the quality of their experience at the marsh by providing audio-visual displays and amenities like washrooms and refreshments.

"It will complement Point Pelee," Turton said of Hillman's future. "But it's two different styles of management. Ours is based on conservation, which implies management, and the national parks leave everything in a natural state."

A MAJOR aspect of the management to which Turton refers is the \$400,000 water level control project that Ducks Unlimited, a United States-based hunting and conservation group, plans for Hillman Marsh. The project involves construction of dikes, and removal of the marsh's plentiful carp population, to make it a better habitat for waterfowl.

Although the authority expects work to begin late this year, it's possible it won't begin until the spring of 1986. At present, Turton said, the project is on hold pending clarification of wording in a legal document involving use of a parcel of land.

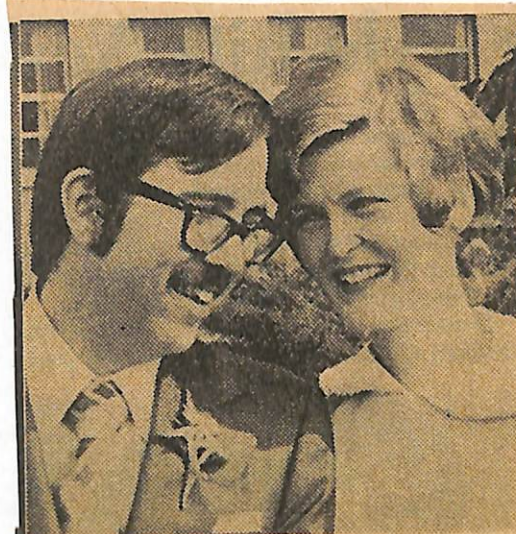

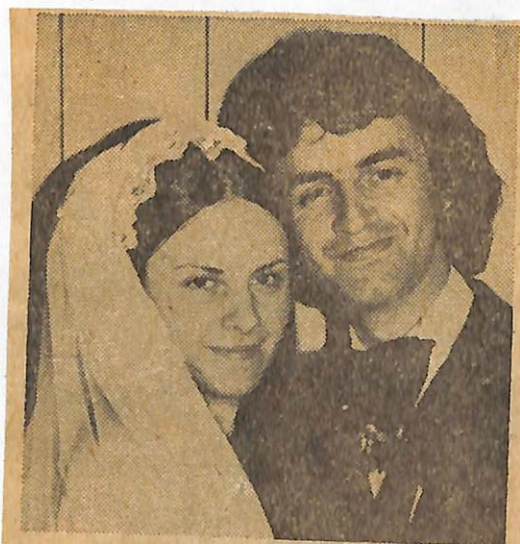

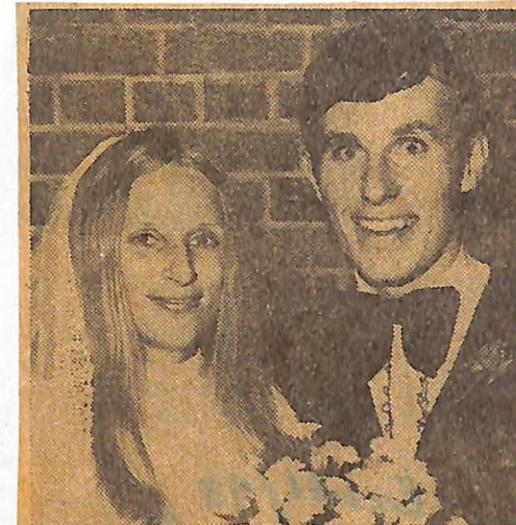

Kim Boscarol, of North Talbot Road. Both were already Junior Journalists.

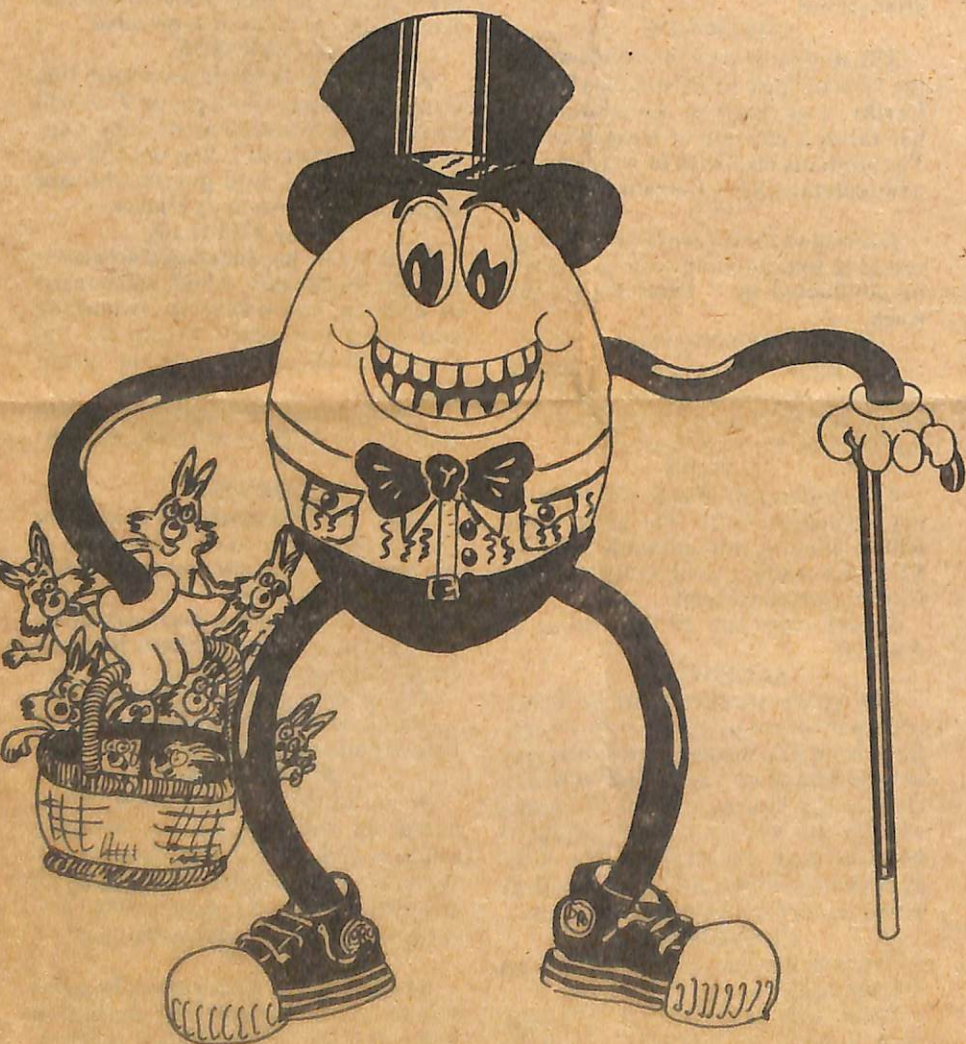
This was probably the toughest contest to judge since we started such competitions over a year ago. And it was also the most successful ever, as more than 400 entries were received.

Abstract collage is their livelihood



By MARLET ROOT

Roger and Joy Ure and their three children — Daniel, Michele and Randy — have for the past three years been travelling with professional artists from around the world ('World of Art') going through 22 U.S. states and covering most of Ontario and Quebec.

They have been showing and selling their version of abstract collage, an idea of Roger's conceived eight years ago.

Friends and family admired their work and so did Bowring Bros. department stores. Bowring, up until three years ago, was the wholesale outlet for the Ures' work.

The Ures no longer sell on a wholesale basis. Most of it they retail, either at various art shows they attend, or from their home studio, situated in the area of the Skyway Drive-in theatre just outside the Windsor city limits.

Living in a rural setting affords the Ures the space needed to carry out large-scale production of their collage, which is now their livelihood. Prior to making this a full-time career, Roger

was a mink rancher. He gave that up about five years ago when the collage business became too time-consuming.

"We use things from around the farm to do our collage," says Joy.

Masonite is sawed into rectangular and square

shapes. String, burlap, crushed paper, cornhusks, beans and whatever else is around the farm is glued on the pieces of masonite to add texture.

The Ures have developed a unique technique to color and finish the work, but that's their secret.

City of Windsor concrete tide flowing to farmland

Hog farmer spends \$90,000 on new facility even though tide is threatening

Only about four miles away from the Windsor city limits, and in view of the Chrysler plant, thrives a booming hog operation in what used to be solid farmlands.

Actually, where Ted Ure of Maidstone lives, the farmland is much the same as it was when his father operated a dairy farm. But recently Ted spent about \$90,000 on a new swine facility, even though the concrete tide from Windsor threatens him more and more each year.

"I think in about 10 years, probably 20, the city will finally reach me," he says.

He's confident, however, that the urban sprawl, already seen on the horizon, will not affect him in the near future. "I like to feel that I have a definite future here in farming; I sure don't want to give it up. We're just looking forward to the future and not looking at the urban encroachment."

While Ted may not be worrying too much about his farm, at least for now, Ed Cornies, director of planning at the Essex County, Civic and Education Centre believes that the majority of farms are safe, except for those near large cities, such as Windsor.

"When building a new town, you can take into account prime land. But most planners won't try to save farmland

adjacent to a city. It's just a losing battle."

Urban expansion into farmlands immediately adjacent to urban centres is inevitable, Ed says. "You have to expect urban expansion. You can't stop because of some close Class I land."

But, because of a better attitude in land planning and stricter regulations on rural and non-farming residents, the future of Essex County's farmlands are safe from the ever-expanding concrete and steel of the urban setting, the planning director feels.

The attitude of the 1960's was that farmers didn't want anything to do with planning. But they've come full circle, and now they want it."

Farmers at one time had the attitude that their land was theirs to develop and to do what with, Ed said. "The real progress is that they realize that farmland is a natural resource and that it must be protected."

The protection varies. Municipalities have the most power to restrict non-farming interests from agriculturally-dominant areas. But the main impetus was given by planning.

The whole attitude of planned rural and urban sectors started after the Second World War. John Maynard Keynes, noted economist, advocated for

(Continued From Page 1) a planned economy. The planned economy concept gradually filtered down to family planning, town planning, city planning, and eventually rural planning.

The first planning act was passed in 1947, but applied only to an urban situation. It's just been in recent years that planning for rural interest has become a major function in local governments, Ed said. The first planning act for a rural situation was passed about 20 years ago.

There was no immediate need for rural planning in Essex County at that time, but, with one-fifth of the labour force in the southwest corner of the county working in Windsor, the need now is evident, Ed says.

"The townships are saying, 'We like you to locate in an urban area if you're non-farming,'" he said.

The clout that farm planning has, Ed says, is ever-increasing. "Right now OPEC (Oil Producing Export Countries) is the big thing, but by the year 2000 food-producing countries, such as Canada, will carry the clout."

And a lot of people think it's about time. In a report from Environment Canada almost a year ago, it was

reported that between the years 1966 and 1971 Canada's towns and cities expanded into over more than 200,000 acres of rural land. Sixty-three per cent of this acreage was good agricultural land -- 134,000 acres of Canada's most productive soils.

Toronto was leader in urban sprawl into agricultural land: Toronto expanded itself into 29,047 acres; 97 per cent of that land was high quality.

Edmonton expanded into 16,189 acres; Winnipeg into 10,834; St. Catharines and the Niagara region, 12,572; and Montreal into 19,079 acres.

Essex County lost 26,759 acres in the period between 1961 and 1971. That's a severe per cent loss. And the land lost around the Windsor region had the highest soil capabilities compared with other areas in the counties that lost acreage to urban interests.

Because of the arrangement of sewage and services, Ed says it is sometimes cheaper to build on "prime land."

Ted Ure, in the north west corner of county feels that their "prime land" is not at stake. He told the Essex Farmer that the area farmers aren't thinking about urban expansion. "They all feel that city

takeover is eventually going to happen; they just hope it won't happen just yet."

And as far as speculators and rising land prices, that doesn't concern him at all. "If it was for pure economic reasons, we could sell out and buy a place

three times bigger somewhere else and pocket a couple of thousand.

Farmers well-established in the area are not affected by rising prices caused by speculators, Ted says. "But it does make it tough for younger farmers to get in. They're not making any more land, you know."

New hog barns take care, comfort into consideration

The need to modernize and expand hog operations has started somewhat of a building boom in one corner of the county with builder's taking into account the comfort of the animals, as well as productivity.

Andy Scherzter, R.R. 2, Tecumseh put windows into his new hog barn because he felt "too much was being taken away from the animals."

"I feel that by natural light the pigs will do better," he said. "We're taking away their ground and their light. I believe it's a must that animals have daylight."

Andy's new barn stretches a full 126 feet with a concrete slab floor and steel fencing for pens. The white steel walls do create a cheery effect, but Andy still feels the pigs have had too much taken away from them. He said it was an afterthought to install the windows on the south side of his barn.

His neighbour, Ted Ure of R.R. 3, Maidstone, didn't put windows into

his new hog finishing barn, but he believes in comfort for his animals as well.

Ted, who operates a 120-sow operation with his father, Elmer, said he built the enclosed loading ramp onto the barn so it would be easier for the pigs when unloading.

And his new \$90,000 finishing barn does not rely entirely on artificial ventilation -- he installed huge panels on the south side of the barn that can be opened up in warmer weather to allow for natural ventilation.

Ted's maternity unit, in a converted dairy barn, also has some comforts.

Tenderfoot matting, a floor made of expanded steel, allows for a comfortable footing for his newborn pigs.

A comfortable floor has also been Andy's plan.

In the nursery section of his new barn, Andy has provided for a water-heated floor -- heated to about

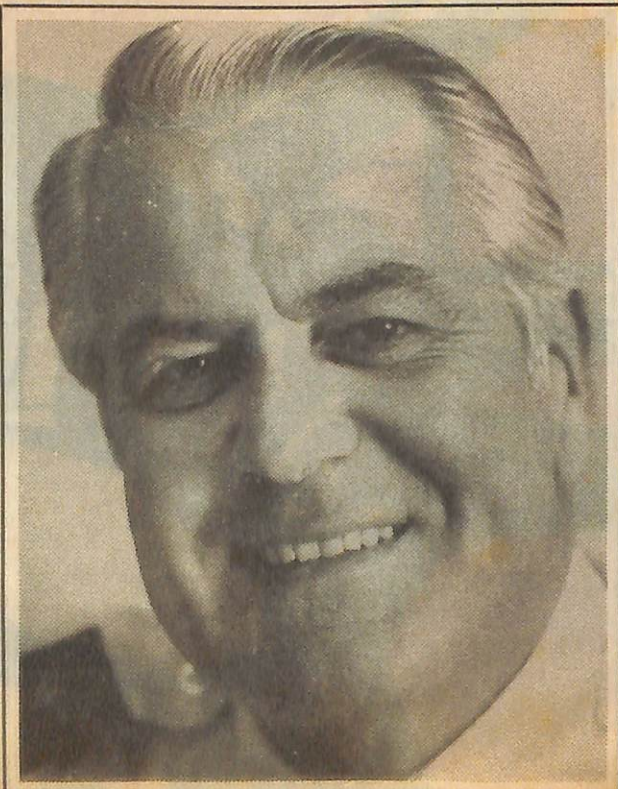

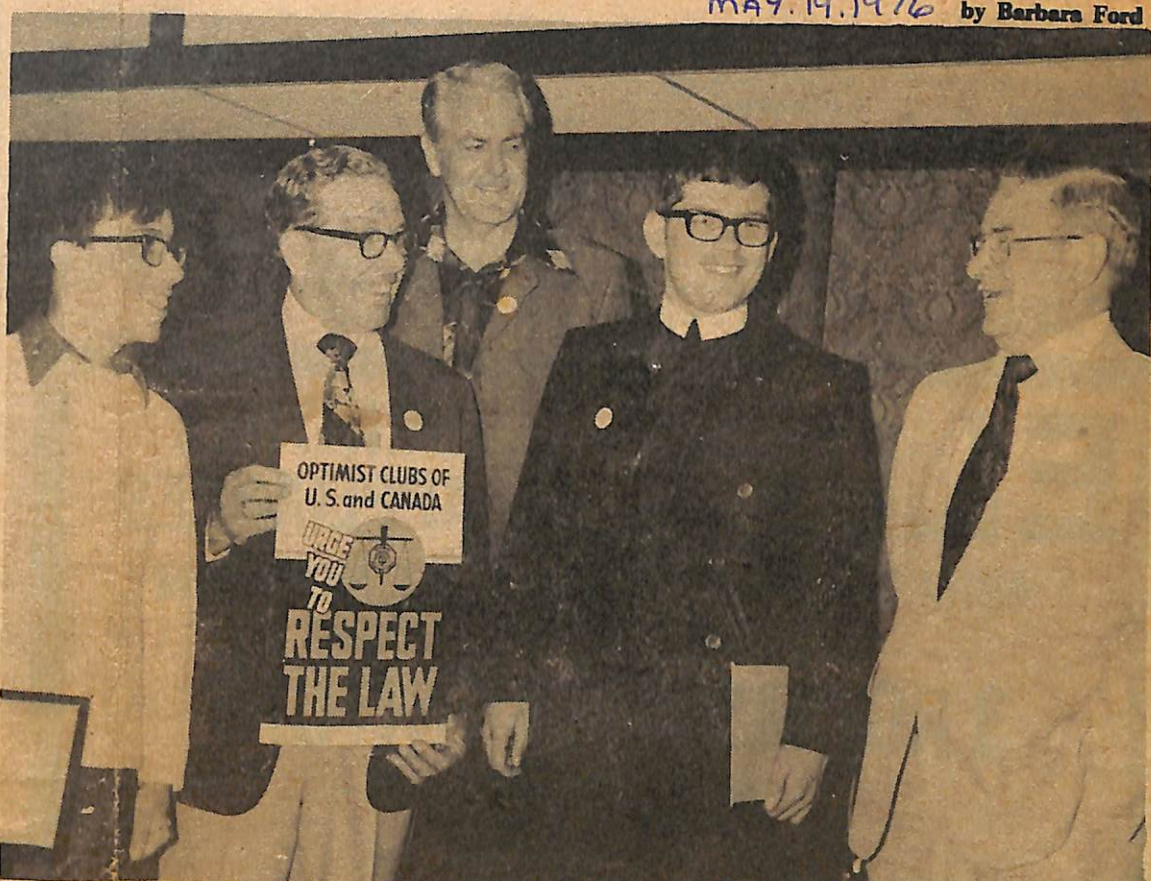

He's framed with success

ESSEX — A local real estate broker's hobby has turned into a thriving business.

It began about three years ago when Chuck Ure's wife, Lydia, brought home some shadow boxes (frames for three-dimensional crafts such as paper tole).

His wife was learning paper tole but was disappointed that the frames she purchased fell apart too easily.

"I said, 'Oh heavens, I can

make better shadow boxes than that,'" said Ure, who has been interested in wood-working from the time he was a boy.

A few days later, she asked if he could make some more. She had sold his frames to her friends.

That's when Ure started making frames for other people.

THE RESULT was Ure County Crafts, a retail and wholesale shop the couple runs on Talbot Street in Essex.

Ure developed his own techniques and designs for

manufacturing shadow boxes and picture frame mouldings.

He advertised in a craft newsletter and began taking orders. He also had a booth last June at a Canadian craft show in Calgary.

"People just flooded to the booth looking for shadow boxes," he said.

Ure County Crafts is now distributing its products from Ottawa to British Columbia.

He now has two employees in the back shop and his wife and two others work in the show and sales room up front.

"We moved into this building (on Talbot Street) in February last year and things have just been moving ever since," said Ure.

THERE ARE plans for expansion and he will likely hire more people in the future.

Meanwhile, Ure is finishing his 20th year in the real estate business, and although he has closed his St. Clair Beach office, he still operates the Essex office from the store.

Part of his success was in filling voids in the market and providing frames other manufacturers didn't.

For example, to overcome the problem of finding the right size shadow box for a paper tole print, Ure began to sell prints with matching frames.

The Ures sell a variety of craft materials for both the retail and wholesale market, hold seminars for craft store operators and supply them.

"As wholesale distributors, we supply them with all their needs," said Ure.

URE MANUFACTURES picture frame mouldings and sells them to other outlets. He also makes wood plaques and sells materials for a number of crafts such as silk flowers, quilling (a paper craft) and needlepoint.

The retail store has had customers "from Burlington, Toronto, Ottawa, Owen Sound. They come from all over," said Ure.

"We're always designing. If anyone comes to me and wants anything in particular made, we'll do it," he said, explaining the shop is involved in both mass production and custom work.

Ure Country Craft has survived the economic downturn without many adverse effects. "I was a bit apprehensive when the economy was down so low, but since we don't rely just on the immediate area, it carries you over," said Ure.

HE EXPECTS business to keep booming. "As long as you keep coming up with new ideas, there's no end to it."

The toughest competition in the picture frame manufacturing business comes from third-world countries such as the Philippines, which export intricate mouldings at prices Ure admits he can't match.

But he points out the quality of his mouldings is higher.

Between the picture frame mouldings he makes and those he buys from other manufacturers, Ure sells about 250 types.

That's a bewildering array of mouldings, but Ure is happy to recommend certain types to his customers.



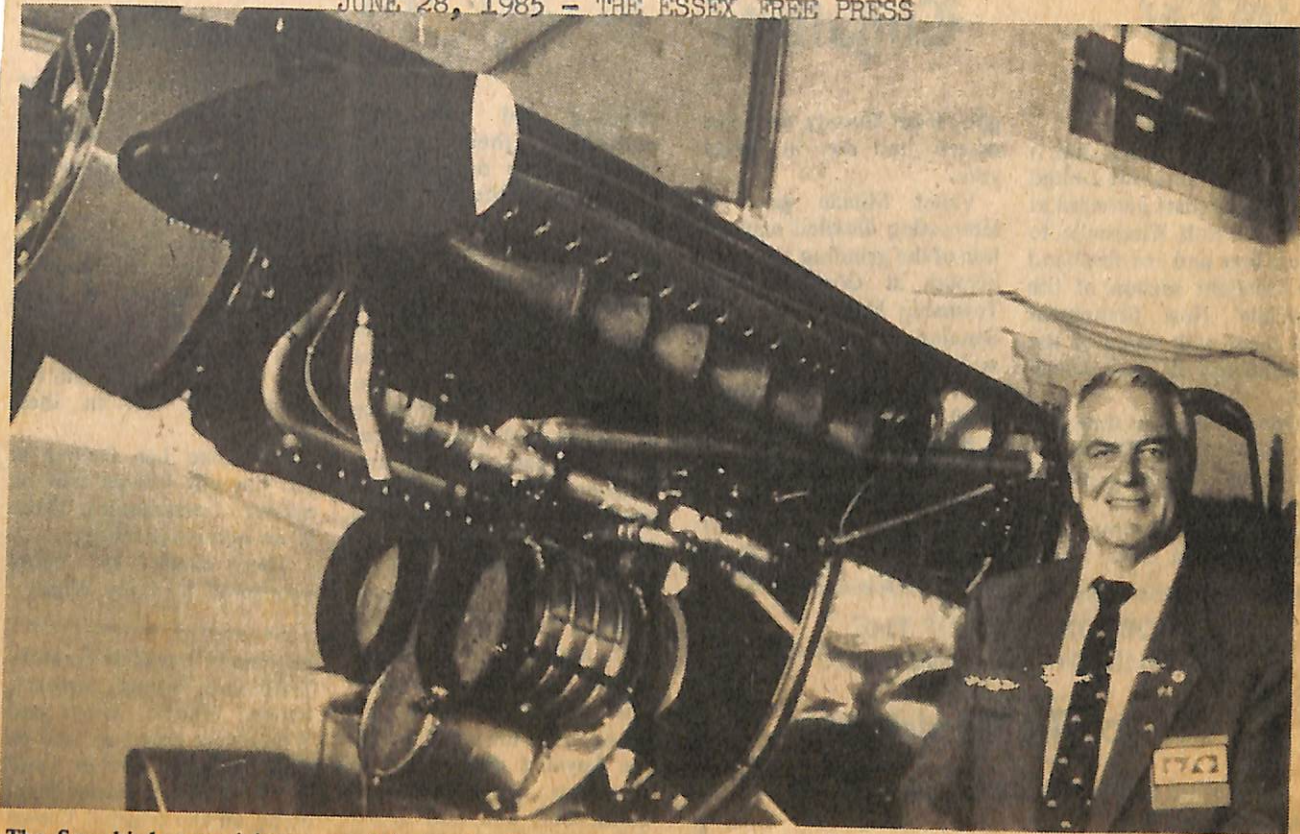

Snowbirds Thrill of Windsor Air Show

The Snowbirds are giving a thrilling opportunity to this area with their three-hour air show Monday, July 1st.

The Canadian Air Forces renowned flight team will perform intricate and thrilling aerobatic stunts and manoeuvres as a highlight of the 1985 International Freedom Festival.

Gates will open at the Windsor Airport at 10:30 a.m. The show begins at 1:30 p.m.

The festival committee didn't expect to get the Snowbirds when it placed the request. With the approval in hand a show was built around them, reported Jim Ure, president of the 1985 festival.

Barring bad weather, this show is expected to draw spectators from both sides of the international border. Planes will be on display at 10:30, with pilots on hand to answer questions. More than 40 vintage aircraft includes World War II fighters and bombers.

One plane was found four years ago in the Aleutians where it had lain for 35 years upside down with the pilots body inside it. This B40 is one of those on display.

The Canadian Harvard, a World War II flying trainer

used during the Korean War to spot the enemy for jet fighters, will be there. It was brought to Detroit from Spain where it was used for advanced training.

Replicas of World War I planes will fly in the show, which starts at 1:30 p.m. with sky diving, aerobatics, a military jet fly past, and finally the Snowbirds around 4 p.m. It was organized by Retired Canadian Air Force Lt. Col. Ron Holden of Oldcastle, whose military duties included organizing air shows.

He said there is parking space at the airport but police will be moving traffic along the roads in the vicinity of the airport to avoid congestion. There is parking available at the Devonshire Mall and the Famous Four drive-in theatre. Transportation from those two locations has been arranged by leasing 35 Transit Windsor buses. Use of the buses and parking lots is free. Entrance to the show was set at \$4 for adults and \$1 for children to follow the festival's aim of providing great entertainment with little cost.

Inside the grounds there are concession stands and a beer tent. Airplane rides will be available.

JIM URE is a giant of a man. Standing 196 cm (six foot, five inches), his size helps him carry out his duties as a Windsor police staff inspector.

John St. Aubin isn't as imposing physically but, when he opens his mouth and allows his financial training and expertise to come through, he can be just as overwhelming. It fits him well in his career as financial manager of Transit Windsor.

But both these men have something in common. They have used their skills to help Windsor's contribution to the International Freedom Festival gain financial responsibility. And, because they are volunteering their time, they typify the nature of the Windsor side of the festival.

THE WEEK-LONG extravaganza now into its 24th year simply couldn't exist without volunteers.

They fill the booths, bid welcome to the visitors and ensure that everything unfolds as it should.

In the past the Windsor half of the festival has not fared well, hampered by bad weather and some financial mismanagement. But recently things have begun to pull themselves together thanks to the commitment of the 15 people making up the executive committee of the festival.

In a way the two men represent the old and the new of the festival.

Ure, 54, has been sitting in various capacities on the executive for seven years. He's now the 1st vice-president. That role is important requiring him to sit in on meetings that president Hugh Naldrett can't make.

NALDRETT CALLS Ure, "the quiet voice of calm and reason on the executive."

But perhaps it was Ure's previous position with the executive that was more important.

He was the vice-president in charge of revenue events. These events are the major way for the festival to earn money. As a result the role played by the man or woman in charge of setting these up is critical.

Ure presided over the contracts with the Conklin Carnival midway and setting up the festival's Las Vegas Casino. That casino has been rated one of the best-run in the province by provincial officials, Naldrett said.

Both those moves were a major reason planning for this year's festival began with some money in the bank.

THE FREEDOM festival budget stands this year at \$280,000; all of which is spent during the 10 festival days.

It's high powered and, says John St. Aubin, it calls on the same skills one would need working for a major corporation.

"One thing working on the festival does, it forces you to think on your feet and make the right decisions so quickly," he said.

And those decisions range from the simple, such as arranging a bank of portable washrooms, to the difficult task of allowing for the free and easy flow of thousands of people. But they are decisions that must be made.

St. Aubin, 32, has been treasurer of the extravaganza for the past three years. He also carries the title of vice-president in charge of finance.

He got involved while employed as financial manager for Bob Pedler Real Estate Ltd. Bob Pedler was himself an active member of the committee.

NALDRETT SAYS St. Aubin, using his expertise, has implemented business practices that were also critical to keeping the festival in the black.

"He's saved us literally thousands of dollars. He's become our comptroller," Naldrett said.

By a fluke he may be uniquely qualified to be involved in this largest international festival. St. Aubin was born at a baby shower in Grosse Pointe, Mich., and because of that chance happening he held dual Canadian-U.S. citizenship until he turned 21.

During the week before the festival the pressures start to build.

St. Aubin often spends six or seven hours a day working on festival business. That's after finishing up a tough day at the Transit Windsor office.

HIS WIFE, LUCIA, who is now expecting the couple's second child, and three-year-old son William don't get to see John much during these last hectic days.

The work can be draining but "it's a challenge" and that's why he has continued to come back to the task for the last three years. Another reason is the contact with the carnival has "left a little sawdust" in his veins. Many a young man has dreamed of running away with the circus, perhaps this is just another way.

After seven years Jim Ure still enjoys the work with the committee.

In a way it's as if he's presided over the growing pains of a troublesome child now nearing adulthood.

He became involved while he was the community services officer of the police force. In that role he was working on setting up arrangements like crowd control.

"**SINCE THEN** I've been through the bad years, the inexperience, the mismanagement and the bad weather. Through it all I've met a good cross-section of people and that's been very satisfying," Ure said.

Ure, a 34-year veteran with the police force, is also a lifelong resident of the area. He's married and has three children.

His wife, Lu, gets almost as involved in the festival as Ure does, working hard on the casino operation.

The freedom festival has become one of this country's major events. It has been ranked right up there with the Quebec Winter Carnival and the Kitchener-Waterloo Oktoberfest.

But where does it go from here? Both men have their own thoughts on that future.

URE THINKS the show needs a permanent place and, as it grows in size, a professional staff.

Both recommendations would ensure continuity of service and some continued growth, he said.

The committee is already planning for 1984, St. Aubin said.

As the festival grows, St. Aubin envisions the possible creation of a subsidiary to the present non-profit organization.

That subsidiary could work for a profit, money that could be invested in a permanent home for the festival and placed into improving the types of entertainment provided.

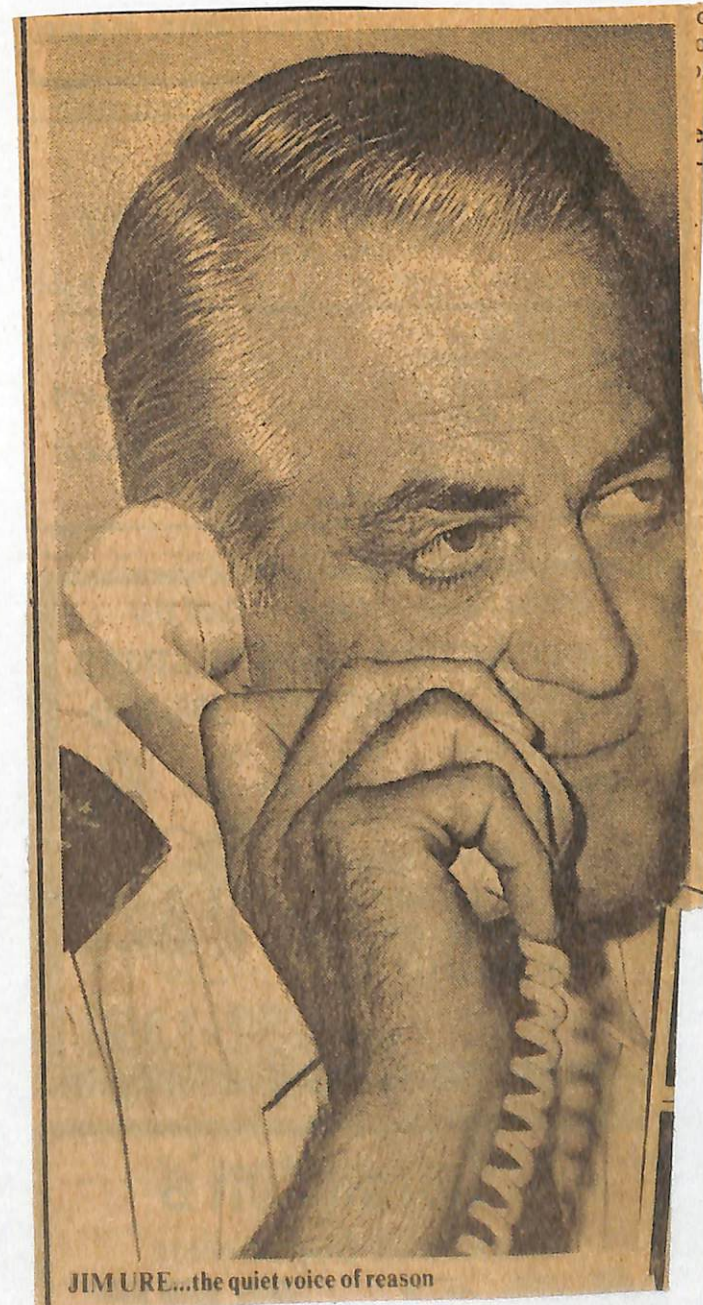
BOTH MEN have lived through criticism of the festival.

Last year attention was focused on garbage and noise caused by the crowds along the waterfront.

"I guess the first thing you've got to learn is not to react. Accept the criticism and try to correct the problems of the past. We have worked to get the Downtown Business Association with us and they are with us. That's how problems get solved," St. Aubin said.

And that's also how success stories are built.

The freedom festival isn't quite a full-blown success story, but with the help of volunteers like Jim Ure, John St. Aubin and others, from executive committee to festival hostesses, the future looks rosy indeed.

Festival a sunny success

The International Freedom Festival drew to a close Sunday night, ending 11 days that "couldn't have gone any better," said festival president Jim Ure.

The 28th edition of the festival was blessed by large crowds and fine weather, and now organizers can just relax and count receipts.

Ure said they should know in about a week how many people attended and the amount of money made.

The riverfront carnival was shortened to 11 days this year from 17 last year, raising concerns the Freedom Festival would face a serious revenue loss.

But Ure said the festival "may do just as well financially" this year. He said the carnival's shorter stay, prompted by protests that it hurts downtown Windsor's image, means the festival will have lower overhead that could balance some losses.

The festival, Ure said, generated more than \$500,000 revenue last year mainly from federal, provincial and municipal governments, corporate sponsorships, the midway and casino.

Ure said the Freedom Festival plans no major changes for next year. He said organizers would like to bring back an air show and plan to continue the Arts Alive program.

The festival has "gone great," Ure said. "The crowds were perfect, the weather was perfect."

He said the U.S.S. Glover, which docked at the riverfront for a week was a major draw attracting 5,000 tourists daily.

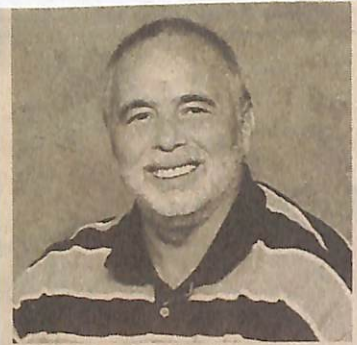

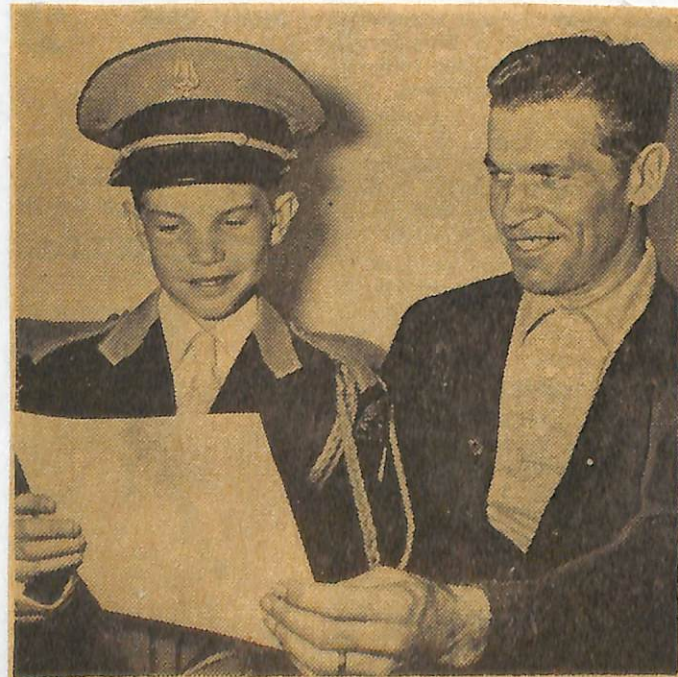

Wins Honors at Festival

If the buttons are popping off the tunics of the members of the Kingsville and Essex Associated Band, it is due to the great efforts of a small boy.

Richard VanEenoo joined the band two years ago, and with surprising speed learned to play the euphonium.

On seeing the two together, there appears to be more "horn" than "boy", but "size" proved no barrier, in this particular case, for when Richard entered the Windsor Music Festival on February 27th, he placed first in the euphonium solo class with 86 marks. Frederick Carter, the adjudicator, complimented him on his very good tone and breath control.

On March 1st, he captured another first and 84 marks by singing "Morning Song" in the boy's solo class of eleven years and under.

In the trombone solo class, on March 2nd, Jim Tebbs, of Riverside, won a first with 84 marks, and Richard was second with a mark of 83. Richard has been playing trombone for only three months.

Miss Nellie Imeson, of Kingsville, also a band member, was accompanist for the brass solos.

Richard is ten years old, and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George VanEenoo, of Maidstone. He is a pupil of Mr. E. L. Robinson, who is the bandmaster of the Kingsville and Essex Associated Band. A mark of 80 is considered "excellent".

A week of training in leadership camp has improved classroom performance for Ty Mergl.

Ty and Jackie Vanhoorne, both of the Maidstone area, were two of 39 young people between the ages of 17 and 22 who participated in two, one-week camps sponsored by the United Co-operatives of Ontario at Geneva Park, near Orillia.

"It made me enthusiastic about going back to school. I felt I could participate better and become more involved," Ty commented.

The Young Leaders Camp is open to participation by UCO and its 45 member co-ops, plus credit unions and other Co-operatives in Ontario such as Gay Lea Foods.

It was a first experience in such training for Ty but for Jackie it was an extension of similar summer projects in 4-H, neither knew exactly what was on the agenda when they decided to accept the challenge of the invitation.

For Ty, who is in his second year of communications study at Windsor University, the emphasis at the camp on communications was a great opportunity.

The results are noticeable, he says.

I STOPPED IN AT the Wooden Spoon the other day and learned the popular restaurant is celebrating its fifth anniversary.

I wanted to chat with owner Dorothy Verbridge but she was at home slaving over the proverbial "hot stove" making candy apples. Dorothy said she is the third generation handing out these treats from the family home out near the airport.

Besides the hundred or so trick or treaters she gets at home every year she says she has at least 100 regulars from both sides of the border who have been coming to the restaurant since Day One, and since the Hilton opened, the breakfast trade has expanded even more.

Ever since the opening, two women have been coming from Indiana to spend a week at the Holiday Inn dining at the Spoon and making their Christmas shopping spree a real adventure.

Nov. 5, 1984

Word gets around — sometimes around the world. A short while ago, two airline passengers — one from Windsor and the other from South Africa — got involved in a conversation. The Windsorite was doing a little bragging about our fair city and mentioned "a great little restaurant," but couldn't remember the name. The South African, on her way to Detroit for a first visit, asked if the establishment could be the Wooden Spoon. She was right, and this popular eatery was first on her itinerary.

Owner Dorothy Verbridge has many Americans as regular customers. A couple from Pontiac comes in every Saturday. A Dearborn family comes Friday and Saturday, sometimes for three meals a day! In fact, this family is responsible for making and installing The Spoon's new (but antique looking) coat rack.

A customer who moved to Hamilton was relieved to see nothing has changed when she came back after a year. She was sure Dorothy would have succumbed and applied for a liquor licence.

"In my three years here, I've had less than a dozen people walk out when they couldn't have a drink with their dinner," says Dorothy.

The Wooden Spoon provides a home away from home

WINDSOR— Dorothy Verbridge, owner of The Wooden Spoon, a new restaurant located at the corner of Chatham St. and Dougall Ave., likes no nonsense food at no nonsense prices. And it shows. Her restaurant is a refreshing change from stuffy waiters and overpriced menus.

Opened a little over a month ago, customers

have noticed the difference too. "It smells just like home," one said. Another added, "It's nice to come into a restaurant that doesn't have plastic food." I don't have a grill or a deep fryer," Dorothy explained, "and that does away with the restaurant smell."

The Wooden Spoon specializes in home

cooking, especially breakfast brunch and beef. From the six varieties of soup, to chili, roast beef and other assorted sandwiches, salads, pies, muffins, pastries and cakes, all are cooked and prepared fresh daily and nothing on the regular menu is priced over \$1.95. There are also daily specials, which range from Swiss

steak to lasagna, hot roast beef sandwiches, meat loaf, meatballs and gravy, cabbage rolls and baked beans.

Dorothy believes in serving pure food with no additives or preservatives. "My father was a butcher," she said, "and I was raised on standing rib roast."

She buys only Essex County beef because she believes in using area products and her roasts are fresh, not pre-cooked, pre-packaged or chryovacked. For coffee and tea, she uses distilled water, which is also available upon request for drinking. Sea salt is used on the tables and pure cream, not synthetic is used. "I won't buy stuff with junk in it," she said. "You'd be surprised how many salesman tried to tell me I can't cook beef without preservatives."

She added, "Everything is made when you order it and not ahead of time."

Beef is the house specialty and a fresh roast is cooked daily. "I think

people have forgotten what good beef tastes like," Mrs. Verbridge said. She added, "I absolutely refuse to re-

heat a piece of beef. It changes the taste."

The Wooden Spoon also carries pure juices not soda pop, which

Dorothy admits is hard. Fresh fruits are also available in season. ↙

"I always wanted a restaurant and it just sort of happened," Mrs. Verbridge said. "I talked to Bob in April and we opened October 9.

She said that deciding on a name had taken months. "We had dozens and dozens of names but we had to find one that fit the business." While checking on the restaurant's progress her husband Bill picked up a spoon and said "There's your name. The Soup Spoon." She felt it was close but not quite what she wanted. A short time later she came up with the name "Wooden Spoon."

The restaurant also feels a little like home. The atmosphere is warm and relaxed. An old fashioned brick walkway leads to the entrance and antiques owned by Dorothy and her brother are scattered throughout the two rooms. Assorted chairs, (some from Carnegie Library) are pulled up to tables covered with kitchen motif table-

She also tries to use only brown eggs, which she said she cooks" as naturally as possible. Our eggs are poached in boiling water. Most places do them in jiggers with butter."

The Wooden Spoon is located in a building that was constructed at the turn of the century, according to owner Bob Hayes. "It costs a premium amount of money to bring a building back to its original state," he said, that when the building was originally constructed all the lumber and bricks were hauled in by horse and carriage.

Aside from the restaurant, the building also houses a gift and china shop, beauty parlor, clothing store and office space.

cloths topped with clear plastic. "It may not suit a decorator," she said, "but it's the way I want it."

Dorothy is no stranger to cooking for large groups. For years she cooked for church groups at St. George's Anglican Church, Scout groups, county fairs and Shriner dinners. A year ago she also started

another business called Dot's Catering.

The Wooden Spoon seats just under 60 people and employs a full and part time staff of four. The restaurant is not licensed.

"I don't agree that you have to have liquor," she said. "There are enough people around who enjoy good food without

liquor." She added, "I hope no one will stay away because of it."

She also hopes to hold private parties and showers after hours. For those she will obtain a banquet license to serve liquor.

Mrs. Verbridge added that while she was apprehensive about the restaurant at first, she finds it rewarding. "It

will be more so as time goes by," she said. "I like meeting people. "I am meeting people I worked with 35 years ago."

The Wooden Spoon is open from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. six days per week. However, the hours are flexible and may be extended near Christmas.

Euchre club fosters lifelong friendship

Fifty years ago, eight women chatting among themselves, probably on the old "party line" telephones, decided they ought to get together once a month to play cards.

A night out.

In some cases, it disrupted their husbands' lives. It meant they'd have to put the kids to bed, fend for themselves on a night alone, though there was never any doubt as to who put the night's meal on the table.

It also meant these women had to make their own way on foot to their neighbours' homes.

"Our husbands would never drive us or give us the car," said Dorothy Verbridge, one of the original members.

Now, walking to a neighbour's house doesn't appear to be much of a chore.

But we're talking the country, not the city. We're talking about Baseline Road in old Sandwich South 50 years ago.

We're talking about neighbours where "next door" was actually spaced

out in acres, not feet.

We're talking about distances when trekked in the winter meant cold to the bone. But once inside, the warmth of eight women together at card tables set up in living rooms and playing euchre made all the difference.

All were stay-at-home moms.

All grew up together in this community.

Dorothy, commonly referred to as The Mayor of Baseline, and someone who has 1,000 stories tucked away in her 76-year-old brain, says the euchre club was formed because "we had nothing to do out there."

By 1956, Baseline Road, the place of her birth, had all these young moms, all lobbying for "a night out," she said.

Eight women seized upon the notion of a euchre club.

But it wasn't about cards.

It wasn't about playing a game.

Or strategy.

Or "trumping" someone.

It was about "getting together."

It was about neighbourhood.

It was about investing in each other's lives. It was about having someone listen to you.

It was about someone who shared your troubles, your joys, stories about your kids, your family, the things you considered important.

Dorothy maintained most people in

the city don't know their neighbours, and certainly don't rely upon them.

"We know everybody here," she said. True enough.

And Dorothy is there to put in her two cents, like the time a neighbour had found an old cistern on his property — once the property of Dorothy's family.

"He had thought about using it as a wine cellar, but I told him about an old root cellar we had in the house and there were steps that went down to it.

"Those steps were filled in. I told him, 'Take out those lilac bushes and dig down and you'll find it.'"

The neighbour followed her advice, and uncovered an empty room that had lay hidden for years. It now serves as a wine cellar.

But back to the euchre club.

The talk meanders all over the map, skipping from one subject to another.

That's the way the conversation went with Dorothy, and friend and neighbour Josie Lyder, who has been a steady member of the club for 40 years.

"We were all young back then," Josie said. "We shared so much over the years, celebrating the birthdays of our kids together, watching them grow up and going to their weddings, and now the grandchildren."

The club continues, and will celebrate its 50th anniversary in September with a party at Ingra Bisson's place.



She's the daughter of Bertha Bisson, who was one of the originals.

They expect some 30 card players at this event.

Today, the physiognomy of the club has changed.

"We don't all live in the neighbourhood near each other. We're all from here, but some have moved."

Five euchre club members reside in Chatham, Lakeshore, Essex and Tecumseh. Three remain on Baseline, including Josie.

Dorothy quit years ago, but shakes

her head and wonders why.

Mostly, she guesses, because she was running a restaurant, the old Wooden Spoon, downtown.

And so begins another story.

And in a way, that's what this club was all about. Storytelling. Laughter. Sadness. Showing each other pictures of grandchildren. Even a little bit of conniving when you thought you might win.

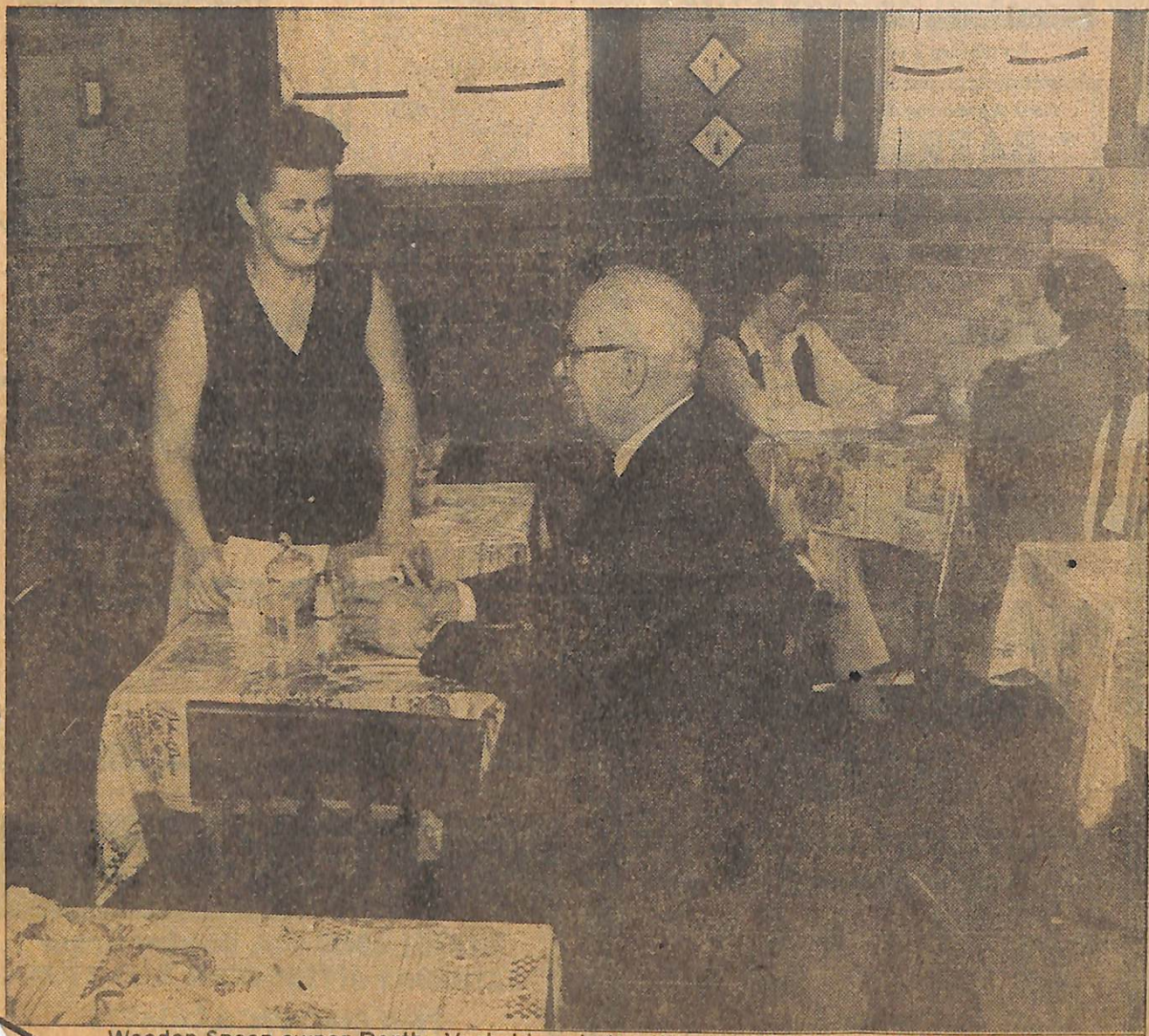
But in the end, it isn't about winning. It's about friendship. Lifelong. Enduring.

"I learned a lot from her," says Mrs. Dorothy Verbridge of her English-born grandmother.

The results can be seen in Mrs. Verbridge's creation, The Wooden Spoon in downtown Windsor.

Such things as roast beef every day, a resolutely country atmosphere reminiscent of the better sort of English tea shop, and a strict insistence on home cooking.

Everything served for every meal comes either from one stove in the kitchen or from an

ordinary kitchen-size oven in the next-door Our Bakery, also a Verbridge creation.

The management philosophy is "anti-commercial," in the owner's words. That has led to some policies that the ordinary restaurant owner would condemn for driving away customers.

The Wooden Spoon serves breakfast and lunch only, for instance, except for Friday evenings, when the doors stay open for Friday night downtown shoppers. There's no alcohol served, says Mrs. Verbridge, and there won't be. They don't ordinarily take reservations, and sometimes there's a wait.

But in the two years it has been open (the anniversary is next Thursday) the Wooden Spoon has attracted a steady clientele of downtown business people, regular patrons from Windsor, and friends from farther away.

The customers are mostly nine-to-fivers, again in Mrs. Verbridge's words. And they keep coming back.

The English passion for morning coffee and afternoon tea is not honored by name in the menus, but it's there, with little

frills such as buttered toast, Danish pastries, and natural bran muffins. Pies, home made on the premises daily, come with whipped cream that's frothed up just before serving.

Only faint hints connect the Wooden Spoon with health foods. And if you're frightened of health foods on the grounds that they lack flavor, don't worry.

The roast beef we ordered had plenty of solid beef flavor, the soup of the day, vegetable in our case, could have represented Essex County at a garden show, and the desserts — well, how can you fault fresh whipped cream for flavor, or neat little apple sections with old cheddar cheese, for both flavor and health?

There are many health-food touches — "natural ingredients," sea salt instead of regular salt, and distilled water (from a distillation machine on the premises) used in the tea and coffee.

An Irish friend, tea-conscious to the point of fanaticism, was a bit doubtful about ordering anything brewed with distilled water. But it came in in a genuine little Brown Betty pot, a high recommendation in itself, and after a few sips he bestowed the supreme accolade: "Now that's tay."

The lunch menu is small — a daily special, soup or chili, the house roast beef in either a hot sandwich or a complete dinner, and a half-dozen sandwiches, plus plenty of salads.

The food is substantial — you don't leave half-hungry, and it's easy to load up on calories if you feel like it.

Prices are reasonable. Breakfast specials begin at \$1.50 for two eggs and toast, the roast beef is \$3 for the sandwich and \$4.95 for the dinner, and salads start at \$1.30. Our bill, for a satisfying dinner for three, was \$19.85.

The Wooden Spoon is in the lower level of an expertly restored building at Chatham and Dougall, called The Corner. You don't get a basement feeling: the glassed-in foyer, plus plenty of big windows, create more of a courtyard atmosphere. The surroundings are peaceful and relaxed.

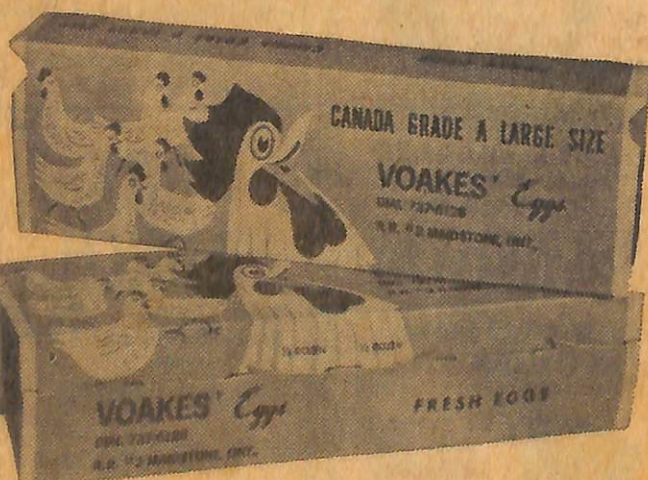

She found the so-called "security guard" even obliging enough to agree to help unload trays of plants from a truck for her. That kept him occupied for about 45 minutes. Next she knocked a buck off the price of some plants he said he wanted to buy. Then he left.

He headed home and that's when surprise and embarrassment set in for Julie. The customer had lugged boxes of plants for three-quarters of an hour without questioning or complaining and didn't even get the minimum hourly wage.

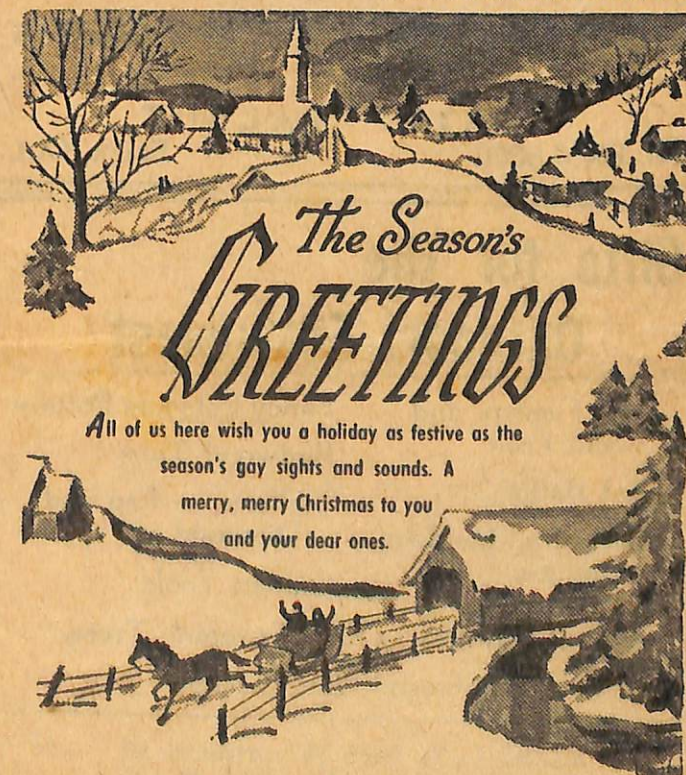

Harold Voakes:

How does a man who has sold eggs all of his life — and his father for over 50 years before that — become a gourmet cook? "Out of necessity," is Harold Voakes' answer.

Voakes, owner of Voakes Eggs and Genii Plants and Gifts, located in the city market here in Windsor, says the need grew during his teens. At the time his mother

worked, and "when I came in from school, I would start cooking various meals. Before long I found I really enjoyed cooking and was constantly experimenting with new dishes."

Over the years cooking has become one of the most important aspects of his life and Voakes thoroughly enjoys the challenge of complicated and involved recipes.

A favorite of his involves boning a whole turkey, stuffing it, then roasting it with an orange sauce.

How does Voakes spend his spare time? "I'm a workaholic, but when there is extra time, I do enjoy bowling," he says. Voakes also likes to go out for a whole evening and eat. "My favorite place is the Himalayan Restaurant here in Windsor."

An active member of the Windsor Chefs' Association, Voakes took part in the preparation of the dinner honoring Chef Hans Bueschkens as the only non-European chef

elected president of the World Association of Cooks Society.

And what would one of Voakes' favorite meals be?

"That's a difficult question, since most of my favorites involve gourmet meals. The kind that might turn off your readers."

However, Voakes was able to come up with a few specialties. The first is an unusual recipe for eggs. And to end the meal we have a simple Cherries Jubilee.

DEEP FRIED EGGS

20 medium eggs
4 pounds sausage meat
bread crumbs
seasoned flour
egg wash (2 eggs beaten)
1 quart tomato sauce
10 sprigs parsley

Boil eggs for 10 minutes. Cool under cold running water and peel.

Divide sausage meat into 20 portions. Dry eggs well and form the meat around eggs.

Roll in flour, dip in egg wash, then in the bread-crumbs.

Deep fry in hot oil for eight minutes.

Serve with tomato sauce and sprigs of parsley.

CHUNKY BEEF

3 pound beef chuck
6 ounces shoulder bacon
20 small onions
1/2 pound small mushrooms

2 cups beef stock
1 teaspoon tomato paste
2 cups red wine
2 tablespoons flour
2 cloves garlic
2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 large carrot (diced)
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons brandy

Cut meat into two-inch pieces and set aside. Cut bacon into half-inch cubes and set aside. Peel onions and prepare beef stock, dice carrots and smash garlic. Now you are ready to cook.

Place butter into a casserole dish and heat over medium high heat. Add

onions and brown slightly. Add bacon and brown. Remove both onion and bacon and set aside.

Add meat and brown evenly. Flame with brandy. Stir in flour, taking care it doesn't lump. Cook for one minute. Stir in red wine, stock, tomato paste, garlic, and carrot.

Season with salt and pepper. Cover and simmer for one and a half hours.

Add onions and bacon. Continue cooking for three quarters hour.

Add mushrooms and cook another 15 minutes.

Garnish with chopped parsley.

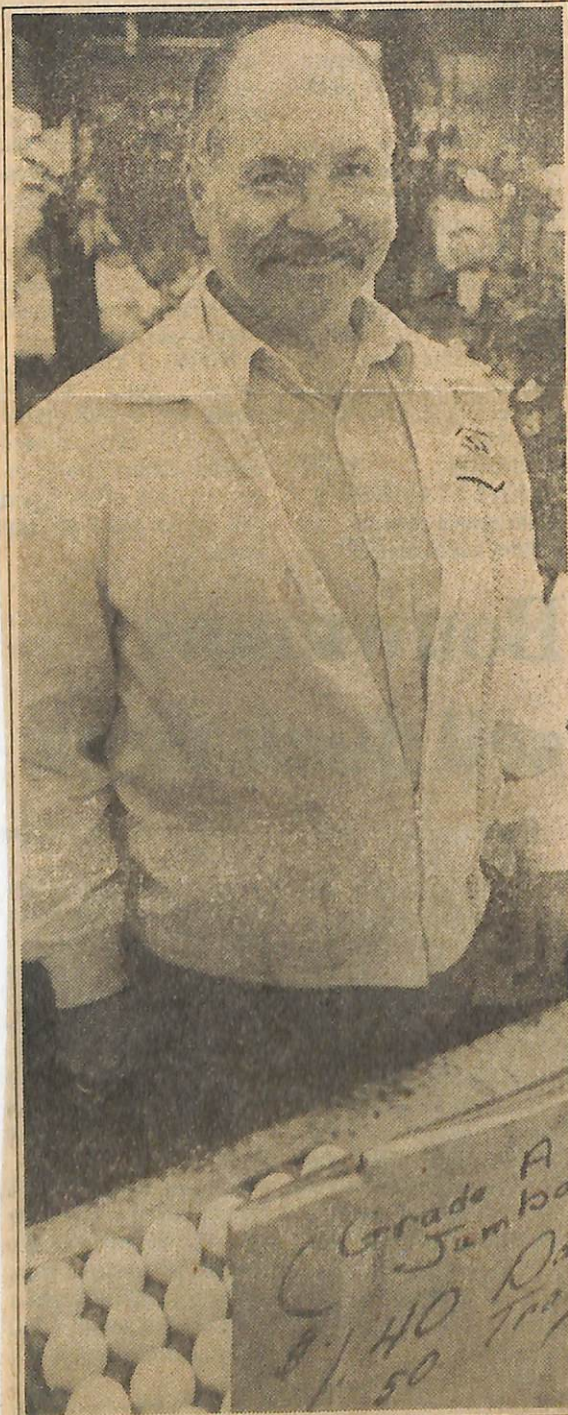
CHERRIES JUBILEE

1 ounce vodka
2 ounces sherry
1 can cherry pie filling
3 ounces water
2 ounces cherry whiskey
ice cream

Empty cherry filling in a frying pan. Add cherry whiskey and water. Stir. Cook for 10 minutes over medium heat.

Pour mixture into a heat-proof serving dish. Pour vodka over mixture and flame. When flame has died, add dry sherry and flame once again.

Serve over vanilla ice cream and serve immediately.

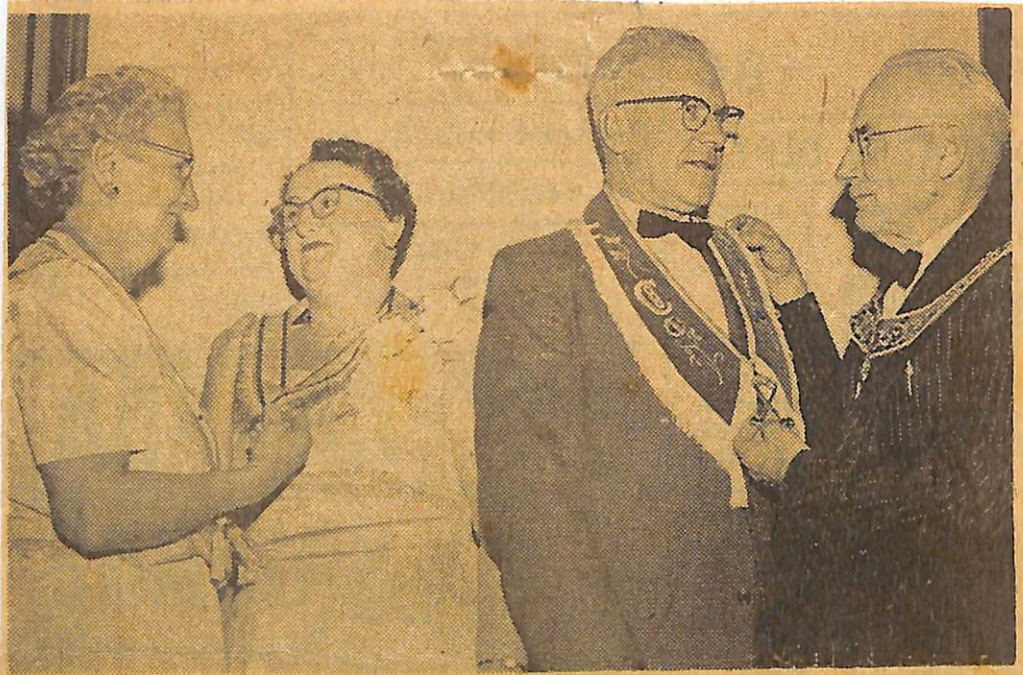

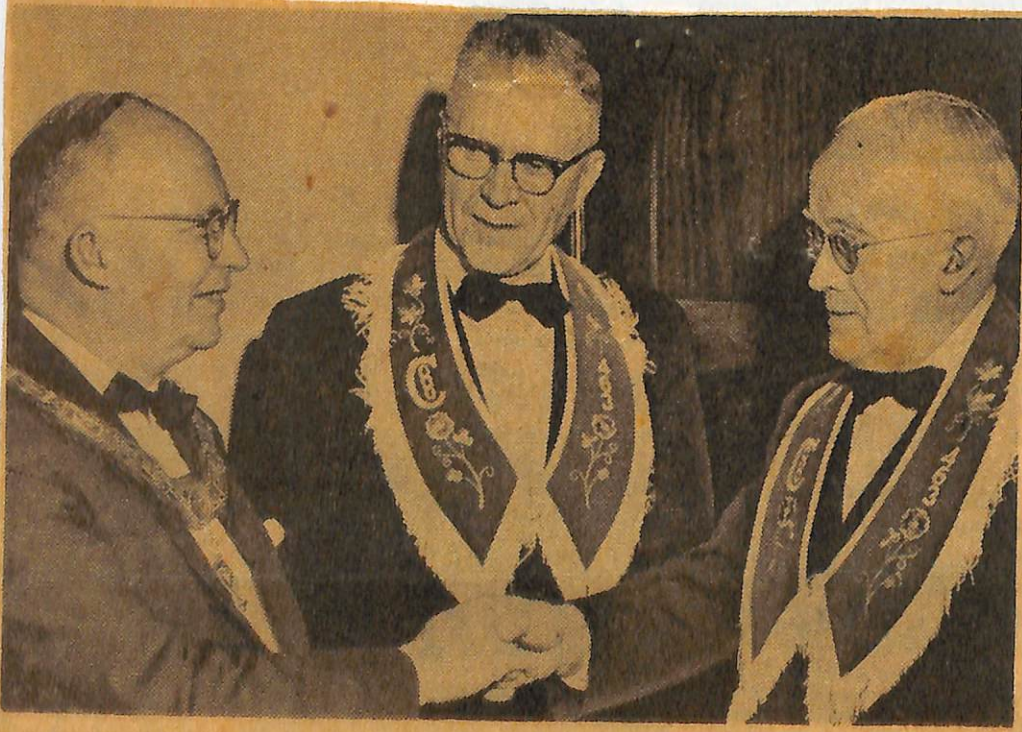

Meals on Wheels in Essex

ESSEX — Essex shutins got a bonus in their Christmas stockings this year when the final approval was given for starting Meals on Wheels in the community.

Sponsored by the Essex and District Social Planning Council, Meals on Wheels provides low budget, hot meals Tuesdays and Thursdays to those unable to prepare their own.

The program is financed by "break-even" payments from recipients — usually \$1.25.

Cost of containers to keep the food hot is borne by Essex County.

Marion Richards, co-ordinator of the program, said the main purpose is to improve the "nutritional status" of the disabled, elderly and convalescents, allowing them to maintain their independence in their own homes.

A second factor, she added, is the social contact provided by the volunteers who deliver the meals.

In a letter to doctors, clergymen, nurses and public health officials, Mrs. Richards, who is on the board of the social planning council, asked for help in identifying those who would make proper use of the service.

Initial planning for Meals on Wheels began in 1976, when a survey conducted by the planning council showed that such a service was lacking in the community.

At the council's monthly meeting last October, Mrs. Richards was named to in-

vestigate starting up the program.

For the next three months, she involved herself and the council in intensive planning, visiting everyone from the county's public health nurse to co-ordinators of similar programs in other communities.

The service officially got under way Jan. 9 with six recipients. By the end of the month, the total was up to 12.

Death Strikes As Family Drives From Wedding Youngsters Hospitalized After Headon Collision

THAMESVILLE—A headon crash on Highway 2 near here Monday night, which caused fatal injuries to a Windsor couple, has orphaned four Windsor children.

Dead are Mr. and Mrs. Helmut Wahl, 640 Scofield Ave., Windsor. Mrs. Wahl, 35, was dead on arrival at Chatham Public General Hospital while her husband, who is 40 years of age, was pronounced dead at the scene.

The four Wahl children and another passenger in the Wahl car, Mrs. Otilie Mueller, 31, 3361 Bert St., Warren, Mich., are also in hospital and her 14-month-old son, Harry, was reported unharmed on arrival at hospital.

The driver of the other vehicle involved, Americo Martini, 48, St. Catharines, was treated at hospital for a fractured right arm. His condition is satisfactory.

Still in hospital today are the four Wahl children with the most seriously injured being 10-month old Evelyn who is reported in critical condition. She is said to have sustained two fractured legs and severe internal injuries. Ronald, 3, is in fair condition with internal injuries and facial lacerations while Heidi, 7, and Rolfe, 4, are in satisfactory condition.

They have not been told their parents are dead.

Mrs. Mueller was reported to have sustained a fractured right arm and undetermined internal injuries. Her condition is satisfactory.

The accident occurred about one mile west of Thamesville early Monday evening.

According to police reports, the Wahl vehicle was westbound at the time and was involved in a headon collision with the eastbound Mantini vehicle. The Wahl family was on the way home from a wedding in Toronto.

A third vehicle, a bread truck driven by Lawrence Chauvin of Thamesville, crashed into the other two.

The Wahl vehicle was a 1953 automobile while Mantini was driving a panel truck.

Investigation into the fatality, which brought the 1961 total for the Chatham O.P.P. headquarters area to 45, is being conducted by Corporal James McNiven and Constable Robert Wright.

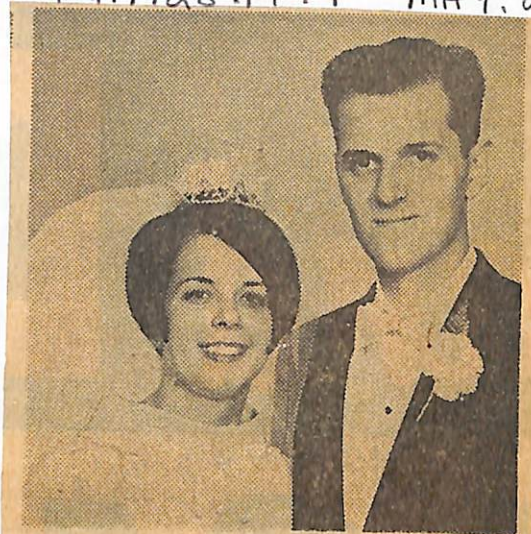

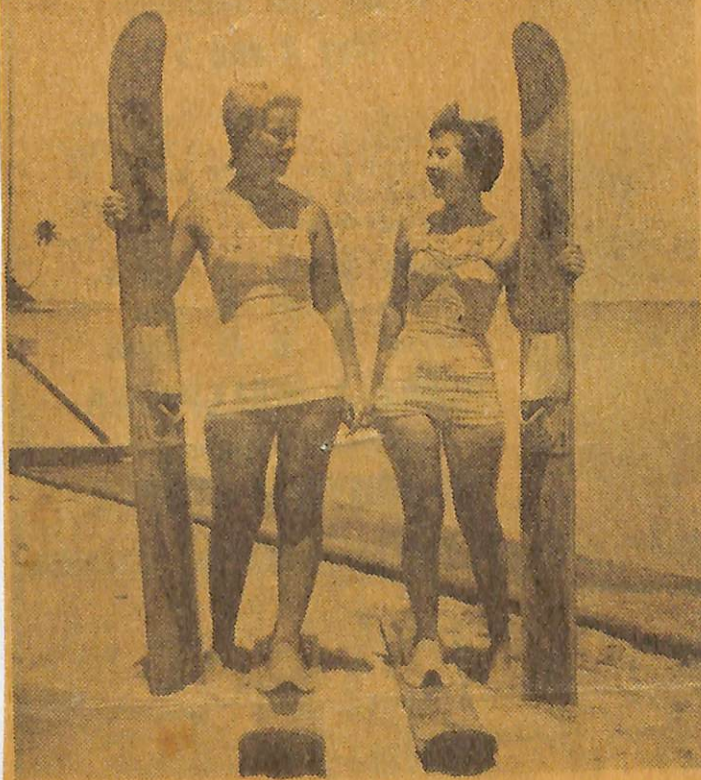

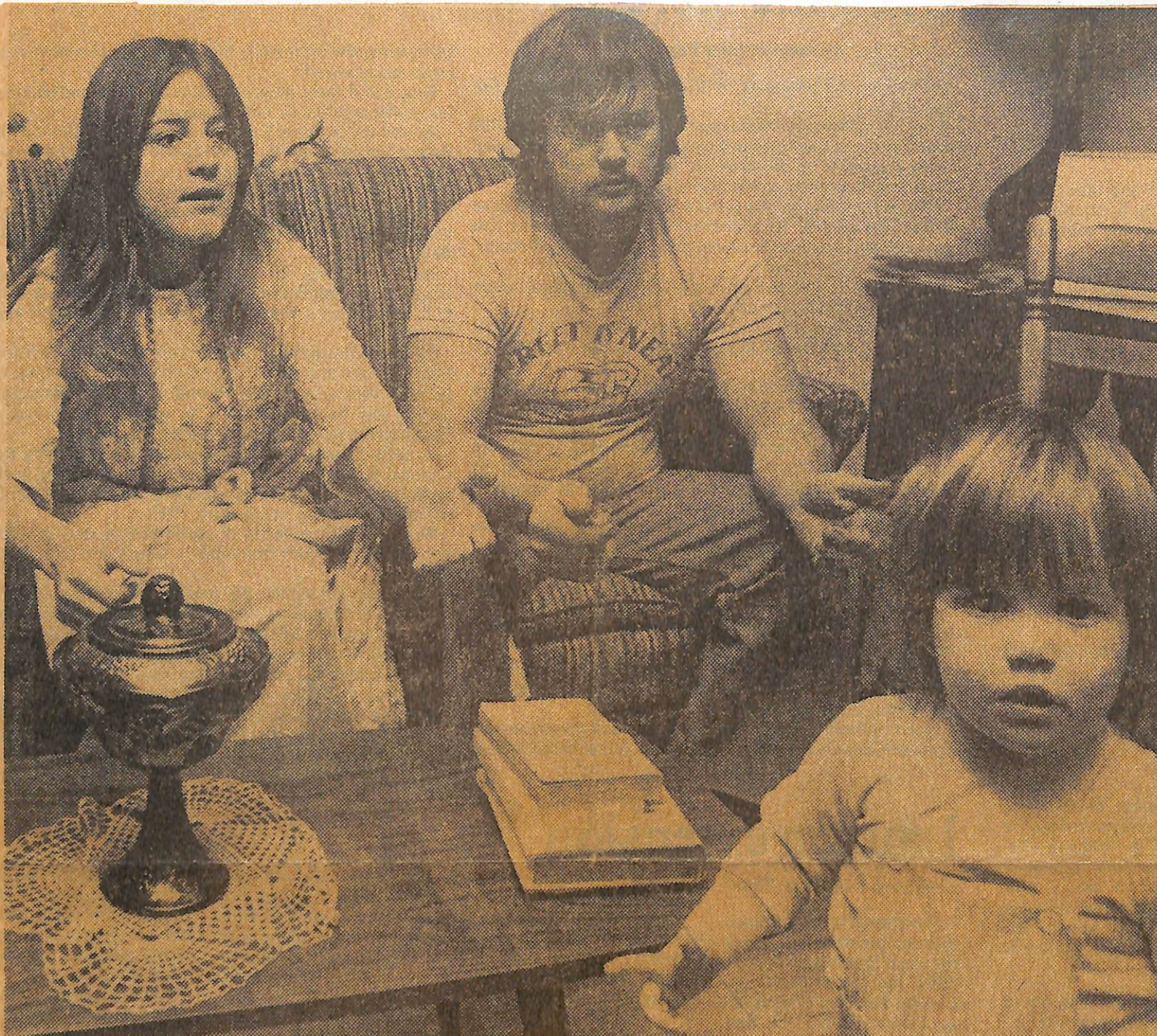

Former Mayor Frank Wansbrough is carving out a new career for himself as a tour organizer, guide and consultant. Although not an accredited travel agent, Frank is adapting his hobby of travel into a functioning business. Last year he organized and escorted a tour group of 30 people from this area for a three-week trip to Bavaria, Austria and Switzerland. The group moved through Europe in a private luxury bus that took them into 12 communities. Now, he is organizing a three-week tour to England, Scotland and Ireland in August and in 1979 he is planning another tour to Europe. Frank co-ordinates his travel arrangements through the Travelwings travel agency in Windsor. A native of Toronto who grew up in Windsor, Wansbrough spent more than four years in the Royal Canadian Air Force, including a tour with 6 Group Bomber Command as a photographer. House deal and home gone in fire

Rick and Marie Walters learned Tuesday of a firm offer to purchase their home. The deal was to be closed by Friday.

But Wednesday, the deal and their home went up in smoke as fire destroyed the interior of the single-storey frame house at 4680 Walker Rd.

The Walters, their 20-month-old daughter Shantelle, and a friend escaped unharmed at noon Wednesday after flames erupted in an attached garage at the rear of the house and spread to the main structure.

Windsor fire department officials said this morning that the cause of the blaze, which caused an estimated \$40,000 damage to the house and an additional \$10,000 damage to contents, is under investigation.

There was no damage estimate for the garage or the automobile inside which belonged to a friend of Walters.

Fire officials said the fire apparently started in a workshop area at the rear of the house, which was insured.

The young couple, married in May, spent Wednesday night with Mrs. Walters' parents on Janisse Drive. Early this morning, they were still recovering from the shock. They had made no offers on other homes while waiting to sell.

"We were sitting in the living room having a cup of coffee," explained Walters, a 28-year-old Chrysler Canada Ltd. employee. "My wife noticed some smoke coming in around the back door from the garage.

"As soon as we opened the garage door, we saw the flames. Then the smoke detector went off."

Walters said a real estate agent had telephoned Tuesday saying a buyer had been found for the house. Walters, who has owned

the house since 1971, put it up for sale in October.

Today, a For Sale sign still clung to a tree in the front yard, but the interior of the house was a blackened shell. "I was pretty sure I had it sold," Walters said.

Mrs. Walters, 25, said the effects of the fire just began to sink in this morning when the couple sat back and realized what they had lost.

"We're just trying to get over it now," she said. "Everything with our name on it, we lost. It just makes you sick to your stomach."

Her husband said that many of the couple's wedding gifts, still wrapped, were destroyed, along with a camper that had been parked beside the house.

"My hair was singed. I had a new Ski-doo in the garage and tried to get it out. We lost that, too."

Firefighter Fred Mireault cut his hand while fighting the blaze but returned to duty after receiving stitches.

After considerable thought, I have decided to get back into the political rat race," commented former Windsor Mayor Frank Wansbrough at a press conference Monday.

can," he said. "I will not make any campaign promises with the exception that I will work hard to better the City of Windsor."

Mr. Wansbrough said that city council in its present form is indecisive and has no priorities for spending money. If elected, he will continue to work on the re-vitalization of the core area in Windsor, and towards a new downtown hotel.

Although the former mayor does not care for Windsor's ward system, he believes it is easier to get elected with it. "It's much easier to reach all the people in the confines of a ward when campaigning than it is to reach everyone in the city," he said. "But I think city wide elections

are better for Windsor."

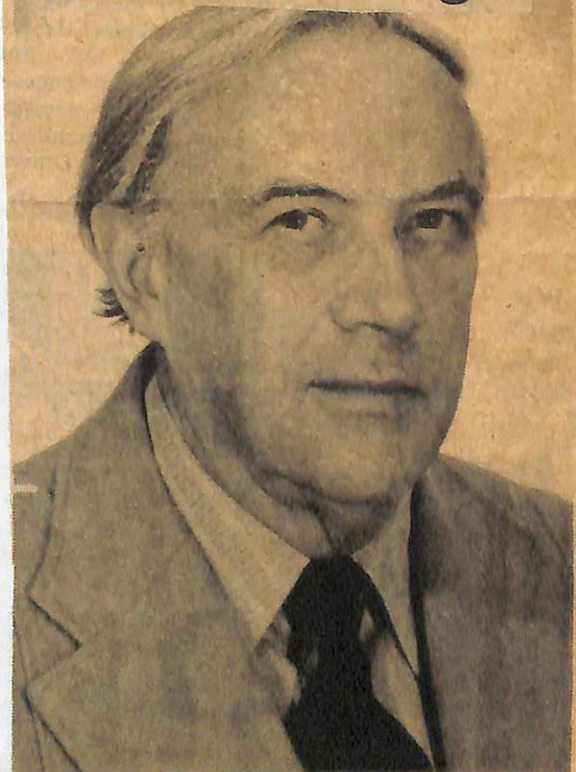
Good public response from Ward 3 in previous elections was a factor in deciding which ward to run in according to Wansbrough. However, the decision was made weeks ago and had nothing to do with candidates who have currently announced their intentions to run.

First elected as an

alderman in 1961 and serving as mayor for five years, Frank Wansbrough is confident his input to council will benefit Windsor.

Wansbrough is 59 years old and believes it is time to get his experience and knowledge back working for Windsor. "For the past four years I have just been enjoying life," he said.

Centennial explained

What is the Centennial Commission?

Briefly, the commission is an agency of the federal government responsible for the over-all promotion of Centennial activities, under the chairmanship of that outstanding Canadian, John Fisher.

Every community in Canada has been asked to appoint a chairman and a committee to co-ordinate efforts across Canada. The administration of the confederation grants program comes under the guidance of the federal commission.

The province of Ontario will construct an edifice of permanent value to be known as the "Ontario Centre for Science and Technology", located in the Don Valley of Metropolitan Toronto. This bold concept will take its place in the front ranks of similar institutions around the world.

Here in Windsor our Centennial project, one of the first

to be approved by the commission, is the river front park taking shape between Ambassador Park and Curry Ave. The monies for this project were made available through the capital grants program, which meant the federal government's \$1 per capita, was matched by the same amount from the province of Ontario, and by \$1 per capita by the city of Windsor.

The idea of a pedestrian mall in downtown Windsor has caught the fancy of most of the merchants of the downtown area, and within a month a general meeting will be called to consider implementing of the idea, guided by reports now being prepared by various departments of the civic administration. The mall, if deemed feasible, will be on Ouellette Ave. from Park St. to Riverside Dr. (cross traffic on University, Chatham and Pitt Sts. would be unchanged). Through the use of a mall, a freshness and beauty will be added to an automobile dominated en-

vironment. A mall could feature many interesting artistic, cultural, and recreational aspects, such as a fountain, a zoological display, a supervised tot-lot, art exhibits, band concerts. The possibilities are many and downtown is hopeful of a receptive attitude to the mall.

Tedd Szalay, chairman of the streets decorations committee, is planning for a gaily decorated city for the entire year, and is looking for the cooperation of industry and business to assure the success of his committee's work. What would a celebration be without decorations? Plan now on what you will do to improve the look of your business or home, so that the many thousands of visitors expected to enter Canada through the Port of Windsor will have a lasting impression of Windsor and its people.

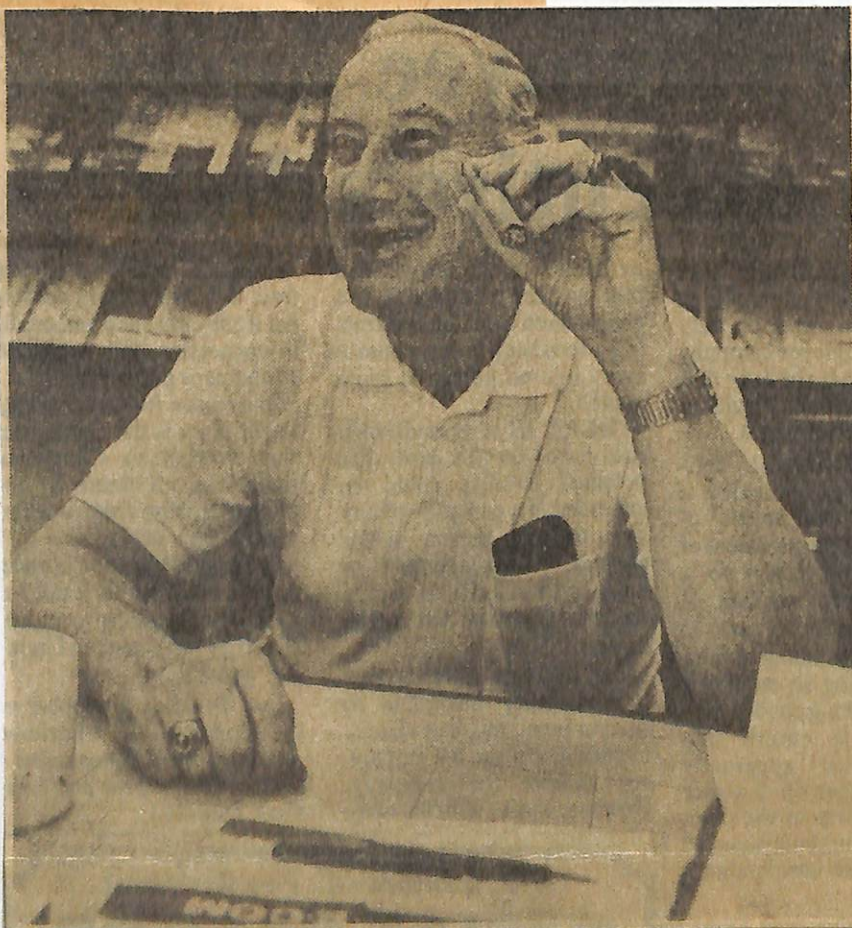
The citizenship award was presented at the Civitan Club dinner in the Majestic Restaurant Wednesday evening.

The new Windsor Public Library was officially opened Saturday afternoon with a short ceremony then turned over to its owners . . . the people of Windsor.

Mayor Frank Wansbrough opened the \$3 million building by presenting a ribbon-wrapped book trolley to librarian Betty Magee.

The mayor described the facilities as "something great for all of us," and joked he had been bringing books over from the Carnegie Library all week.

He was also the buyer of the first book from the bookstore

located just off the foyer of the building.

Library board chairman Frank Mascarin offered the mayor a publication on municipal reform and the mayor anted up \$2.

Telegrams of congratulations from Premier William Davis, Sen. Paul Martin and Agriculture Minister Eugene Whelan were read by Mr. Mascarin.

However, the message from Mr. Mascarin and other board members was "use the building."

Peter Britton, vice-chairman of the board said, "this is just a building until

you the citizens make use of it."

Library director Fred Israel was presented a symbolic key to note the opening of the actual doors of the building.

Mr. Israel congratulated his staff and said "it took great team work and a spirit of co-operation during the nine-day move," to accomplish what they did.

The Carnegie Library closed Nov. 14 and moving to the new building at 850 Ouellette Ave., began the next day.

Mr. Israel concluded by inviting the nearly 500, who turned out for the ceremony, to tour the facilities.

Among those who took Mr. was Mrs. Jane Lorne, the great-granddaughter of Windsor's first librarian, William Kay.

Tours of both the main floor featuring the family reading room, bookstore and film with language centre and administrative offices were available from the library staff members who were wearing identifying yellow flowers.

Prior to the official opening a souvenir brochure and a program was handed out to all arrivals.

Music was provided by the J. L. Forster Concert Band.

A number of books, cash donations and art objects were received by the library to mark the official opening.

Included in these were a collection of books, pictures, maps and films from the embassy of the U.S.S.R.

A painting dated 350 B.C. was donated by the ministry of antique arts of the government of Italy through Elio Danelon, vice-consul in Windsor.

An extensive program featuring library tours, craft demonstrations and films will be featured throughout the week.

Quiet life a change for one-time mayor

THE SIGHT OF Frank Wansbrough dining alone in a downtown restaurant is one in sharp contrast to "the days that were."

The first half of the 1970s saw him as Windsor's flamboyant mayor with the straight talk and sometimes surprising moves — such as the time he boot-ed the Happy Hooker out of his office after she burst in unannounced to promote her book.

His noontime mainstreeting while walking from City Hall to Ye Olde Steak House and back was something to behold — a towering fellow puffing on a long cigar while moving along Ouellette Avenue like a battleship under full steam. The people loved exchanging pleasantries or political jabs with their mayor.

Although still outspoken when the spirit moves him, life is much quieter now for the 65-year-old veteran of business, sporting, military, political and community circles.

"I still like people but I like being on my own once in a while," says the longtime widower with no children. "I went through a lot of being invited out nearly every night."

During his first year in office as mayor following the 1969 election, he attended about 1,000 meetings and had 350 dinners with organizations.

"**THE FIRST YEAR** I overdid it, really. I never turned down an invitation. Then I had to start turning some of them down. It was affecting my health.

"At any of the ethnic dinners I went to, I was respected as the mayor. They were genuinely happy to have me there. But the non-ethnic groups just expect you to be there and if you're not they give you ----."

On the matter of meals, he declared that he wasn't "snubbing the Queen" as a reporter suggested when it was learned the ex-mayor wasn't accepting the invitation to dine with Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip as originally scheduled for Friday, July 20, in Windsor. The owner of Frank Wansbrough's Plaza Travel Limited had already planned to be in Western Canada conducting one of his Wander with Wansy tours.

"And I will be happy to accept if the invitation is re-issued under the new date for the luncheon."

The new Windsor luncheon date with the Royal couple is Oct. 1.

At the moment, he even has plans to be absent from the Sept. 29 ceremony to induct him into the Windsor-Essex County Hall of Fame. He expects to be in Germany conducting a tour.

ONE OF HIS favorite stories is his sequel to the episode involving the tossing out of Xaviera Hollander, the Happy Hooker, before he was defeated at the 1974 polls by Bert Weeks, an election that stretched to two days because of a blizzard.

"I met the Happy Hooker three years later in a restaurant. She came up to me and said: 'You remember me. One time you kicked me out of your office.'"

"I told her not to feel bad because I've been kicked out of the same office myself."

Frank was so revered by the owner and the patrons of Ye Olde Steak House that they named a steak sandwich after him. The menu listed it as the "Swanky Frankie."

He covers a lot of topics in a short time.

Of the complaints about the carnival on Riverside Drive during the International Freedom Festival, the man who served as chairman for six years declared: "I think the festival is a fabulous thing for the two cities, even though the carnival is considered a nuisance. I live right beside it. I can stand it for two weeks as long as people are having a good time. It's necessary for finances."

OF HIS REPUTATION for being a heavy smoker of cigars, he said: "That's a falacy. I smoke only two or three cigars a day. I like one after a meal. I belong to No. 5 Humidor (Detroit chapter) of the Cigar Smokers of America. I'm the only Canadian. I'm the one who makes it international."

"I also belong to the Sons of the Whisky Rebellion and the third group is Wansy's Warriors — the guys who elected me to council meet once a month."

On politics: "Guts politics I detest. I like to work as a team and get things done."

He had no comment about his political future or aspirations.

"I'm enjoying the travel business, although it's frustrating at times."

He hopes to put together the material he gathered in 1977 for three travelogues on Europe. He just hasn't had time, he says.

Frank points with pride to three of the accomplishments during his term as mayor:

"The Roseville Gardens housing development came through free land from Ford of Canada. Then we took housing away — the city bought the Rose-land Golf Course and didn't allow housing on it. And we got the Carling-O'Keefe warehouse for \$350,000 for the Art Gallery of Windsor."

HE'S ALSO PROUD of the new city flag and city emblem produced through design contests.

Frank, who served for five years as an alderman before becoming mayor, has been on the scene in many other ways, ranging from refereeing basketball teams, coaching football teams, working as a photographer, doing a weekly stint as a radio commentator and being a member of several community organizations.

The Toronto native came to Windsor with his parents when he was five years old and shortly afterward moved to Detroit for a six-year period. His father was a railway ticket seller.

The family returned to the Windsor area to reside in the clear air of Oldcastle as an aid to Frank's health.

He attended St. Genevieve Separate School and School Section No. 7 in Oldcastle before entering Assumption High School. With his graduation from Assumption High in 1937 came a basketball scholarship to Lawrence Institute of Technology in Detroit where he spent a year in business administration.

Frank joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1941 and served 4½ years as a photographer and instructor in aerial photography.

HE PLAYED ON several championship basketball teams during his Second World War service, ending as a member of the RCAF Overseas Champions at Bournemouth, England, in 1945.

Less than a month after the end of the war, he was in business in Windsor as an industrial, commercial and wedding photographer. He bought Ed Lamoureux's Camera Shop in 1952, put his own name over the door and sold out to his partner, Dave Douglas, in 1967.

He coached the AKO Fraternity junior basketball team for 13 years, during which time the team won eight Ontario titles, four Eastern Canada trophies and, in his last year as coach, 1960, the Dominion Junior Championship.

King-size invitation for mayor

Windsor Mayor Frank Wansbrough received an invitation Thursday that matches his stature, physical and official.

Much to the chagrin of City Hall mailboy Andy Breschuk, the mayor received in the mail a postcard invitation measuring no less than eight feet in breath and four feet in height.

For Mayor Wansbrough, who approaches six feet four inches in height himself, it was an apt request.

It invited him to the Tom Paine rock musical slated for the University of Windsor on

April Fool's Day and the two days following, April 1-3, each evening at 8 p.m.

The giant invitation required no less than \$9.62 postage to send it on its way.

But the mayor, never reluctant to match wit with anyone, was considering to send the director of the musical, Gerald Campbell, his response on a roll of toilet paper.

The response will be a polite and impressed declining since the mayor will be on vacation in Germany at the time of the festival.

Windsor Friday August 15 1975

Frank

Eight months after Windsor's civic election, *The Star* looks at what has happened to the two key men in the mayoralty race — the incumbent, Frank Wansbrough, who was defeated, and his successor, Bert Weeks. Today, the spotlight is on Mr. Wansbrough. Tomorrow it will be focused on Mayor Weeks.

With an itchy travelling foot, a well-honed palate and sensitive shutter finger, Frank Wansbrough never was one to sit still for long.

Eight months is more than long enough.

So, with his hand freed from the responsibilities of the mayor's gavel, he is once again combining his skills as a photographer with his other love — travel — and preparing to move into the travelogue business.

At the same time, he is starting to pursue a dream that has been simmering on the back burner during a decade of city politics... by putting his appreciation of good food and good service to work by buying a restaurant.

Before spending five years as a city alderman and five more years in the mayor's chair, Frank Wansbrough earned his living as a professional photographer and proprietor of a camera and sport shop.

His travel plans call for trips through Bavaria, Austria, and Switzerland where he hopes to produce and market travel films a-la George Pierrot.

Restaurant-watching as a hobby goes back to a trip he made to California 20 years ago when a visit to an embryonic restaurant sparked an interest that led to years of study and comparison of restaurant food and how it is served. He has since harbored the dream to launch a "really unique" restaurant in the city.

* * *

Frank Wansbrough WAS Windsor for the five years he sat in the mayor's chair, 1969-74. His big cigar was as much Windsor's image as is Ouellette Avenue.

After his first year as mayor he said he attended 1,000 meetings and 350 dinners. The pace never slackened.

Suddenly, in the snowy aftermath of an untypical December election, he found himself as the unsuccessful mayoralty candidate, on the outside looking in, with time to spare for the first time in years.

Following the defeat, there was a "fantastic month of relaxation" in Florida.

Then there was another month of catching up on details that had been allowed to slip during the campaign and holiday.

"That's when I started getting itchy," he said. "I don't want a nine-to-five job where you have to punch in and out, but I can't stand sitting around either."

He began planning the European tour.

Currently, besides taking a hard look at tomorrow, he is filling a void created by the death of the bookkeeper at his former camera shop.

He also spars once a week on radio with another veteran of city politics, Elizabeth Kishkon, a former alderman.

There are few places from which a person can drop from top to bottom as rapidly as the political roller-coaster of municipal affairs.

There have been exceptions, but the office of mayor of Windsor has generally been a stepping stone to nowhere.

David Croll went on to bigger things politically and ended in the Senate.

Other than that, the political achievements of former Windsor mayors could be written on a postage stamp.

Wansbrough says with a laugh: "I told Pierre Trudeau three years ago that I was ready for the Senate. I'm still waiting to hear from him."

But it is premature to relegate Frank Wansbrough to the graveyard of broken political dreams.

The same qualities that made him king of the castle at City Hall — enough pizzaz for

candidate to ride to Ottawa on the federal Liberals' history of success in the riding.

However, Mr. Gray said Wednesday he plans to remain in Ottawa.

Meantime, Wansbrough makes no bones about being overjoyed at getting away from concerning himself with every whim of the voters.

"Politics is taking a back seat as far as I am concerned right now.

"I didn't even want to run for mayor this time... in fact, I didn't want to run last time.

"I never got the political bug like some people around this city who keep running and running."

He hasn't even got around to deciding whether he is Liberal or Conservative and his disdain for party politics and the toe-the-party-line-no-matter-what philosophy is thinly veiled. For one thing, he doubts that he could play the game without breaking a lot of the rules.

"The party can't be right all the time and I could only do what I thought was right."

One thing he is not about to do is become

the city's critic-in-residence by second-guessing the new administration.

"I don't agree with the things Bert Weeks is doing all the time, but I didn't always agree with him before he was mayor either and he didn't always agree with me."

He admits now that he would have run again if the snow-plagued election had been nullified immediately.

He said he consented when asked by a group of friends if he would try it again if the election was successfully appealed because of the snowstorm.

But then lawyer Paul Mullins "came out of the blue" and launched his own appeal that had absolutely nothing to do with the original idea of his friends to attempt to have the election invalidated.

"I never contributed a nickle to the Mullins' appeal," he said.

By the time the court decision was handed down in June, he said, he had resolved to not run again no matter what the verdict.

He said he did not want to give up the good feeling of getting out from under the

magnifying glass that constantly points at the mayor's office.

"I felt good when I decided not to run again. The relief from pressure is unbelievable. You can't do anything — not even cross the street the wrong way — without somebody criticizing you."

One of his favorite expressions over the years when subjected to criticism was "hindsight is great."

He uses the same expression when looking back at the election.

He said his campaign team knew they needed an average turnout to win. With the normal number of ballots cast, he said, they would have been able to beat Weeks by more than the 3,500-margin that toppled Roy Battagello in his first effort.

The snowstorm on election day ensured there would be a small turnout, which in addition to other factors not related to the storm — he lost nine of the 11 predominantly Italian-speaking polls, for instance — snelled defeat.

"The weather was no doubt a factor," he said, "but I have this funny feeling that Bert Weeks was running in the same election and that just as much snow fell for him."

The tumble from the mayor's chair and a move from the fancy highrise LeGoyeau Apartments to the third floor apartment above the building he owns on Ouellette Avenue that houses the camera shop he once owned, has changed the ex-mayor's perspective on at least one key issue: the Valhalla Inns affair.

The question of whether the hotel should have been allowed to be built at the foot of Ouellette Avenue changes with your vantage point.

As mayor, he was in favor of parkland along the waterfront, but only as long as the city could afford it.

He stands on his belief that the city could not afford to pass up Valhalla's offer for a hotel on the old BA Hotel site.

But as a private citizen whose picture-window view of the Detroit skyline is blocked by the BA relic, he thinks it will be just fine if it becomes parkland.

"We will be leaving a park for our grandchildren," he said, "but we will be leaving our grandchildren a debt too."

The Wansbrough years in office were predictable in one way — he could be depended on to cut the right ribbons, sign the first cheque for innumerable fund raisings, and drink the first beer at a myriad of festivals.

But they were unpredictable years too.

There was the time, for instance, when he simply refused to participate in the ritual of carrying a stretcher in a National Ballet of Canada production.

Then, of course, there was his famous put-down of the Happy Hooker when she burst into his office unannounced as part of a publicity tour for a new book. He made national headlines by throwing her out.

The second of three sons of a railway man, he was born 56 years ago in Toronto and moved to Detroit when he was five.

He has had a spot on his lung that was diagnosed as tuberculosis, and his family moved to the fresh air of the Oldcastle area.

He overcame the problem and has enjoyed good health ever since, including a battle to keep his weight down by dieting.

He combined playing basketball with going to school at Assumption High School and a stint in the Air Force as a photographer.

Coaching basketball after the war, he won a Canadian championship as well as several provincial honors with the AKO Fraternity junior team.

Elected to City Council in 1964 in his first attempt, he served three terms until being elected mayor in 1969.

"I can look back on what I think were five damn good years for this city," he said, reflecting on his terms in the mayor's chair.

"I have no apologies to make."

any two politicians, an uncontrolled instinct for straight talk despite the consequences, distrust of the pompous and impatience with the unimportant — undoubtedly contributed to his defeat at the polls.

Those same qualities, combined with an unabashed love for Windsor, got him elected in the first place and will also make him a tough man to keep down.

He is blunt, as usual, in weighing his political future and responding to rumors that have been flying around those in the city who relish political gossip:

"No, I'm not interested in running in the provincial election... I have been urged by a party to run."

Federally?

"I'd be interested."

"That's a whole new ballgame... it's Canada and the world."

He won't go into details at this stage but the yarn that was being spun by local political buffs was that if Herb Gray had decided to run provincially, his Windsor West riding would have been wide open for a

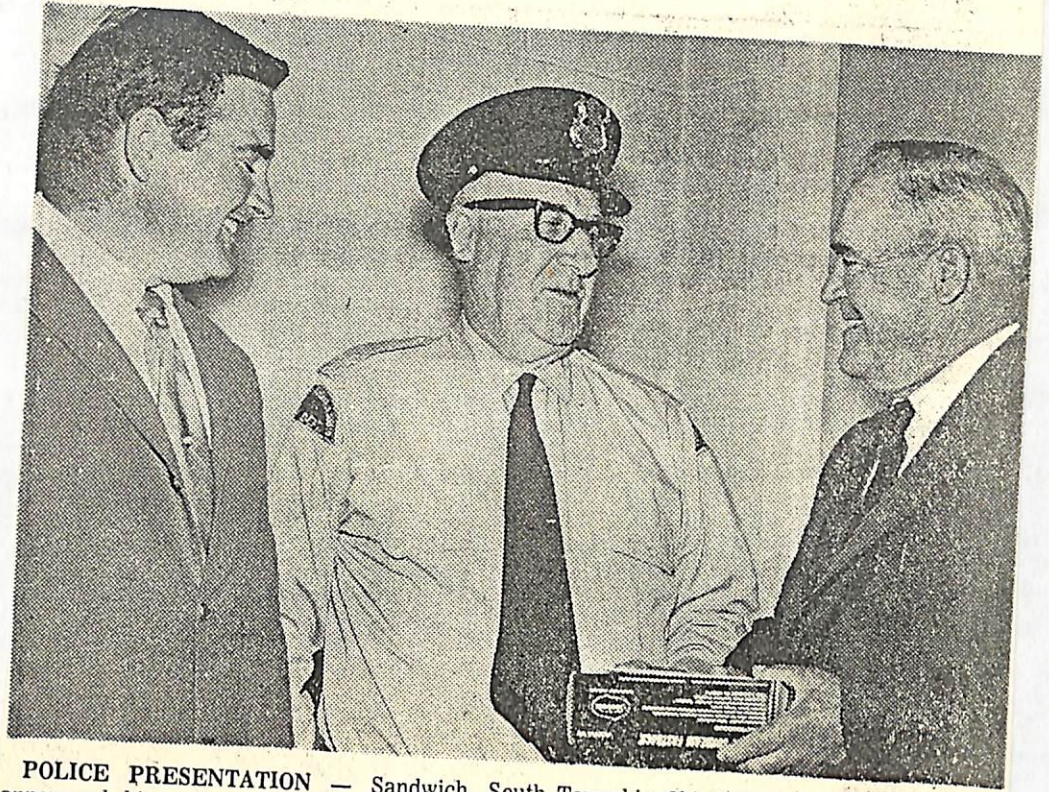

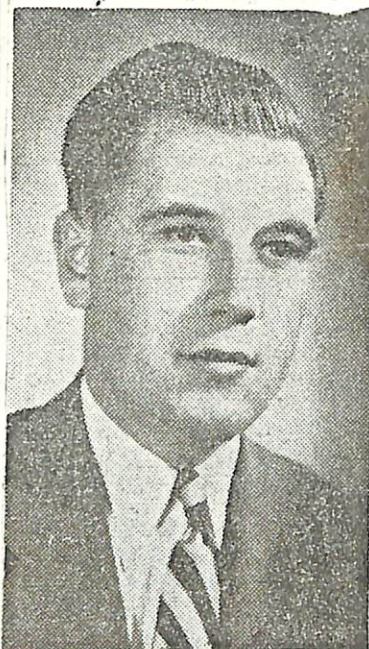

Mrs. Webster is really quite remarkable when you consider that she is 85 years young.

She has made eight gorgeous quilts for her eight granddaughters plus a few crib quilts. Most of the patterns were her own but one, the wedding ring, is traditional and the other was store-bought. Making quilts is perhaps not so remarkable by itself but when you consider that she only started quilting in 1960 when she was 71, then it is quite a feat.

Although she is no longer quilting, she said she is interested in keeping up the art and offered to help anyone who would like to learn.

Knitting and crocheting never did strike her fancy but lots of needlepoint pieces adorn her sofa and chairs in the Webster living room at 2217 Lincoln Road. She has

also done a few pieces in crewel (brightly colored ones too) that are extremely attractive and hang framed on the walls.

"Keeping busy keeps me out of mischief," said the spry octogenarian. One could assume that is the reason why she has now started to hook rugs.

Even though she is 85, Mrs. Webster still drives "all over the place". She has church and club meetings to attend, a euchre club to go to and all sorts of things to do. She will soon have to take her sixth driving test, the one senior citizens are required to take each year. As long as she continues to pass the test, she thinks she will keep driving.

She makes her own hard soap in her basement. She saves all her cooking and baking grease and washes it to get all the silt out. That is done by putting it in boiling water, the grease rises to the top and Mrs. Webster skims it off. She adds Gillett's lye to the grease "and a touch of ammonia or borax to make it whiter and then all my old perfume for fragrance, then pour it in molds. Anyone can do it. The recipe is right on the lye box."

Mrs. Webster used to play the organ for Redeemer Anglican Church and for St. Stephen's Anglican Church. She still likes

to play the piano in her living room and enjoys learning new pieces of music but not "that rock stuff".

Mrs. Webster said that God has been good to her. She has raised six children and has enjoyed pretty good health. She just wishes her husband's health was a little better but "I take good care of him".

Mr. and Mrs. Webster used to own a farm on Walker Road in Sandwich South. They bought their home on Lincoln Road four years ago but just moved into it in September. They have had lots of work done to make their home snug and cozy.

They are both looking forward to Nov. 21 when they will celebrate their 60th wedding anniversary. They were married in 1914 in St. Stephen's Anglican Church. Because of Mr. Webster's health, no definite celebration plans have been made but Mrs. Webster thought a family gathering might be in order.

Already Mrs. Webster is looking forward to next spring to when she can plant her flowers and vegetables in a big patch in her backyard. She knows exactly what she is going to plant and where.

One has to wonder if this busy woman is really 85 or if she is pulling our leg.

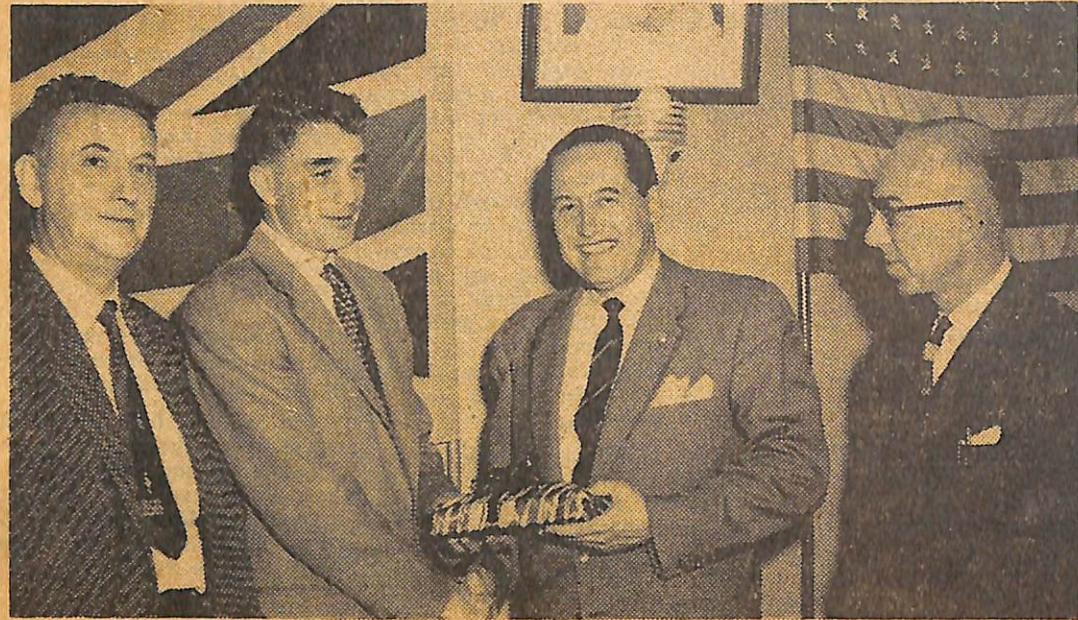

The 91-year-old former reeve of Sandwich South passed away at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Lionel O'Neil, late Wednesday night. The flag on the town hall at Oldcastle flew at half mast on Thursday, in his memory.

His brothers, who predeceased him, were William, 90, and Richard, 94.

He was born in Woodville, Victoria county, on October 3, 1850, the son of the late Thomas Webster and Martha Cliff, who came from Leeds, England, and settled in the bush at Woodville.

He spent his early life in Victoria County and when 24 came to Essex County, following the trade of miller and stone dresser. He worked for Thomas Vollans of Sandwich West for 22 years.

The next three years he spent with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, in Detroit; and in 1895 he bought the land on which his son, Glen Webster, now resides.

TERMS AS REEVE

In 1900 he was elected reeve of Sandwich South, resigning two years later owing to pressure of other duties. In 1917-1918 he was elected reeve once more.

He was a devout Anglican, and a Mason.

In 1881 he married Miss Mary O'Neil, of Sandwich South, who predeceased him in 1914. They had five children: Glen, who resides on the home farm; Garnet, of Newmarket; and Mrs. Lionel O'Neil, of Paquette. George and Lottie died when young. Quilting, a form of needlework, was a technique more than 1,000 women in Essex and Kent Counties were actively involved in during the past few months.

A Quilting Summary Day was held at the Essex United Church Hall March 31 at which all of the women's institutes and ladies groups of the two counties displayed quilting prowess.

Quilts, oven mitts, pil-

lows, aprons and various other articles revealed quilting techniques learned during classroom sessions. Techniques included piecwork, applique, Seminole patchwork, trapunto and reverse applique.

Highlights of the day included a presentation by guest speaker Mrs. Marg Eberle of Highgate, and a film titled "Patterns of Love" produced by Canada Packers, which holds a quilting competition each year.

Also highlighting the day's events was a huge

red and white quilt ensemble complete with provincial emblems and the flag of Canada made by 91-year-old Irene Webster of R.R. 1, Oldcastle.

Mrs. Webster finished the quilt in December, 1980, just before her 91st birthday, and she told viewers it was by no means the first quilt she had ever made. Each of eight granddaughters have been recipients of one of her fine quilts.

Good friend and teacher Mrs. Bessie Putman of R.R. 1, Windsor said she had told Mrs. Webster one "was never too old or too young to learn the art of quilting," and she then admitted that Mrs. Webster had taught her a few more ideas during quilting sessions. "It used to be that all farmers were general farmers. We all had our own chickens, cows, pigs and grain crops. We kept our own milk, butter, cream and made fresh bread. We ate lots of pork. Today a lot of old farmers ask (the urbanites) what's wrong with prok (that you don't eat it)? We were raised on it, and that's true, we were."

Farmers today usually only have one type of livestock and grow crops to feed it, or they will grow cash crops and have livestock, she said. Then there are those who specialize in other areas such as growing vegetables.

Irene's father had 250 acres of crop and livestock. "He and my mother worked hard. They set up my five brothers on 50 acre farms to start them out. Today the young can't start farming because it's so hard to get started. Who can afford to give them 50 acres?"

"This is where I think the government should do something to help them start out."

As an example of some of the difficulties facing the young, she named "two boys down the road who want to farm and are helping their father."

"These fellows have a \$65,000 combine, one of the newer, larger machines. It's only good for one month's use and then it sits the rest of the year. Now that's an investment."

Farm prices, she said, aren't good enough to pay for all that. Larger machinery is making it terrible for a young boy to get started. If the machine isn't in use, it should be housed so it will keep longer. That's another expense and it means some have to leave machines outside.

In 1920, Mrs. Webser said, she paid \$25 for a hundredweight of sugar. The price didn't go up for a long time and that wasn't until recently. She always wondered why. Now it, along with everything else, is higher priced.

"It takes everything a young farmer makes to pay for his machinery and other investments to farm. The 50 acres my father worked for to give one son costs \$100,000 today."

For a young farmer, that's a lot of borrowing power needed.

These costs "aren't balance right at all. Sure," she said, "larger machinery which costs more means it's easier to get the crop off" and it's quicker and more land can be worked. But, she leaves the sentence hanging, wondering who can really afford to buy the extra land, to expand or to even get started.

In her younger days, when the farm was still in operation under Glen, Mrs. Webster said she used to help with the chores, watch the children, and take care of the house. She has filled her spare time with many crafts and hobbies and still does them today.

But still, she said, "I wish I could have some of that home made butter and bread."

When she looks out her back porch window now, she remembers that once there were many barns and sheds outside. They are gone now. One son, a dentist from Hamilton, had them taken down a few years ago, when his father gave up farming to old age and sold the land.

None of the Webster children stayed to farm. That, through time, changed too.

Today vs. yesterday, which was better?

Irene Webster, a woman of great spunk, agility and grace, lives in Essex county. She was raised here since the time of her birth in December 1889. Her father was a butcher who peddled meat throughout the countryside. She had five brothers. She was 24 years old when she married the late Glen Webster, also resident of Essex.

She lives in a house on a century-old farm near Oldcastle which at one time boasted a log cabin. The 100 acre farm was rented by Glen's father, John in 1880, until he moved there and later built the brick home Mrs. Webster occupies. Only 25 of the 100 acres were cleared at first. Glen, as the youngest son who stayed to help on the

farm after his marriage in 1914, inherited the farm.

John, a miller by trade, Mrs. Webster said, always lived on the farm until he died. He was Reeve of Sandwich South Township different times.

Just like John, Irene's father helped to set his sons up in farming. Five brothers were each given 50 acre parcels of land which were earned and owned by Irene's father.

Glen and Irene had six children who all married and moved away from home, she said.

Why is all of this important?

Because things have changed, Mrs. Webster said.

New life for the old farmhouse

PAQUETTE CORNERS — Irene Webster is just delighted about what's happening to that old farmhouse over on the 6th Concession of Sandwich South Township, just west of here.

What's happening is that the two-storey brick farmhouse is getting a sort of reverse facelift.

IRENE WEBSTER is delighted because her nephew — "he's such a nice boy" — and his wife

are the ones responsible for giving the old house a new lease on life.

She's also more than a little pleased that when Ron and Joyce Holden are all done "building a new house inside the old one," the house will look almost exactly

the way it did when Irene Webster was growing up there, back around the turn of the century.

Ron Holden, in paint-splattered cap, T-shirt and blue pants, smiles when he hears about his aunt's delight.

"Have a look around." And with that, he heads out into the yard to help a workman bring in some cupboards for the old summer kitchen at the back of the house.

HAVING A LOOK around the old Holden farmhouse is a lot like having a look around a house just being built. All the floors, ceilings and walls have been ripped out and replaced; new plumbing, new wiring and a new furnace have been installed; two bedrooms have disappeared; a stairway has been moved; new windows have been installed throughout and, just now, the workmen

are busy plastering. Pretty soon, a new three-by-six metre (10-by-20 foot) 'Florida' room will have been added, adjacent to the kitchen.

And "in two weeks, hopefully," the Holdens will claim their earthly belongings from a movers' storage shed and move in.

For Ron Holden, it's a homecoming. For he, like his aunt and his father, grew up in this old house.

When he graduated from Assumption High School in 1949, Ron Holden wanted to join the air force, right away.

His father, Stanley — Irene Webster's brother — wouldn't hear of it. But Ron, who already had his private pilot's licence, wouldn't be dissuaded.

SINCE THEN, HE'S travelled all over — living in five provinces and two other countries, Germany and the United States — in the line of duty.

Along the way he got married, had three children (two sons now in military college, a daughter in university) and finally wound up, two years ago, in Halifax as a lieutenant-colonel.

Last December, after more than 30 years in the service, he retired. "I always wanted to come back home." In January of this year, he and his wife did just that, and took over the old farm from his father, now living in an Amherstburg apartment.

At one time, the 6th Concession of Sandwich South Township was known as The Holden Road. For good reason.

The land on which Ron Holden's farmhouse sits was purchased by his great-grandfather from the Crown in 1861. It's been in the family since. The original Holden — John Holden — built a log cabin on the property. His son, Willard, built the present house.

THAT WAS BACK in 1897. "He got all the stone for the foundation from Amherstburg. He used to start out at 4 in the morning with a horse and wagon to haul it back." He and a hired man

who was "handy with a hammer," built the foundation and then the house.

When Willard died, he left each of his five sons a farm and the youngest son, Stanley, got the family farm.

Some of Ron Holden's kin still live on The Holden Road. It was only natural that, some day, he would, too.

When they looked at the old house, Ron and Joyce Holden weren't sure what they would do.

They thought, briefly, they might tear it down and build a new one on the site.

But ripping down the old and building a newer, smaller, house would have cost more — he would rather not mention dollar figures — than ripping the innards out of the old one and starting from there.

BESIDES, "THERE was the sentimental value" and the exterior of the house was as sound as the day it was built, almost.

So it was that on Feb. 8, Ron and Joyce Holden and a crew from the Beaudoin Brothers construction firm in Amherstburg rolled up their sleeves and went to work.

And so it will be that in a couple of weeks time, Ron and Joyce will move into the 20th — "and hopefully the last" — house they have lived in since marrying 24 years ago.

A little while after that, once they've done the papering and painting and the final touching up, they're going to throw a party.

IRENE WEBSTER will be invited, of course. So will her sister, now living in Detroit.

And so, naturally, will Stanley Holden and his wife who "haven't set a foot in here since we started," and are dying to see what it's all going to look like.

It's going to be quite a party. As Joyce Holden puts it: "It'll be the biggest house-warming party that's ever been held" on The Holden Road.

Willard Holden would like that.

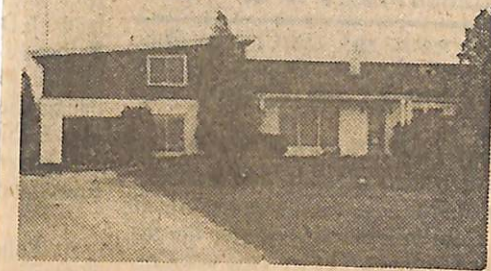

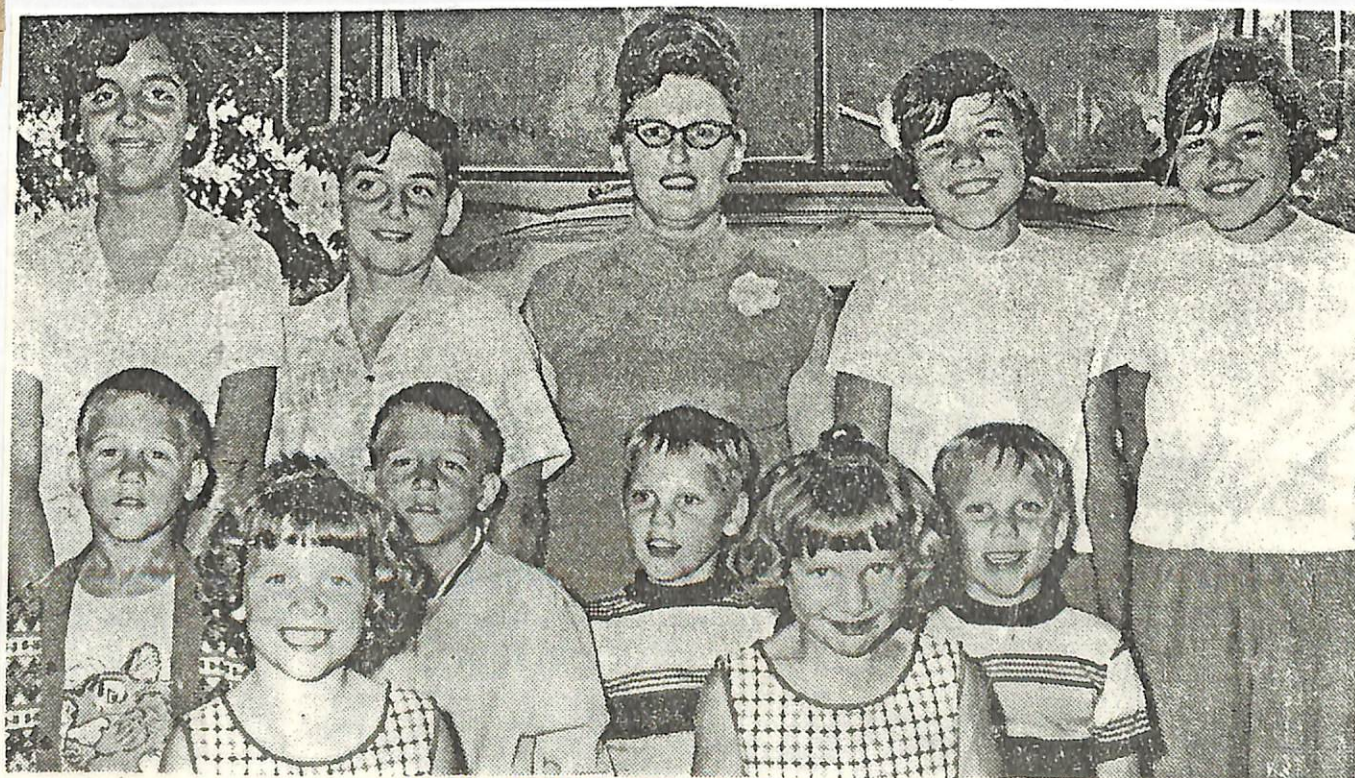

Sir: Regarding the article "Innocents in Hell", The Star, Saturday, Aug. 22.

We, the undersigned read the article "Innocents in Hell" and were shocked and horrified with the action of Wendy Nesselth. After reading it we were left with these questions:

1. What's the difference between what Wendy did to these handicapped people and what the parents are doing?

Abuse doesn't always come in physical form. Abuse also takes place when one invades the privacy of the helpless and robs them of their pride and dignity.

2. What was the purpose of the article?

Is it public awareness and education? If so, the article should also contain information on the services presently available to the handicapped population in this area as well as mention the percentage of handicapped people living in deplorable conditions as described versus those living in loving, supportive homes!

3. Is it an effort to lobby for money or additional staff?

No one is denying the shortage of funds and the needs for adequate staffing but, is this the way to go about getting it?

Will additional funds alter certain situations? In the meantime, is the existing staff utilized fully to support these unfortunate individuals as per their job descriptions or is part of their time spent on lobbying?

4. Is it lobbying to change existing legislation?

Again, we do not deny the need for this but, must we exploit the retarded in order to do it? Should the very person whose role it is to guard the rights of these people be the initiator of this exploitation?

As parents of handicapped children, the action of Wendy Nesselth left us with an overwhelming fear of the future. Her actions have destroyed in us an enormous amount of faith and trust that our children will be in "good hands" after we are gone.

This article and her involvement in it, also makes our hearts bleed for the parents who have just learned their child is mentally retarded and then read this article. How much hope can you destroy without destroying the total family?

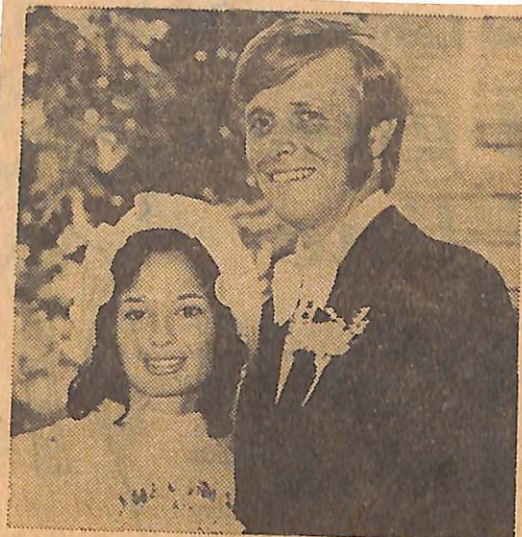

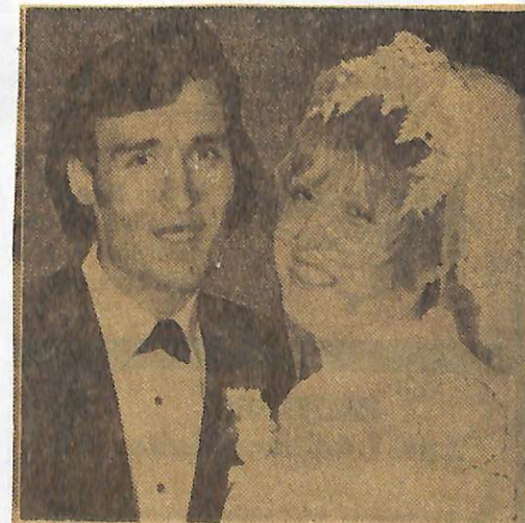

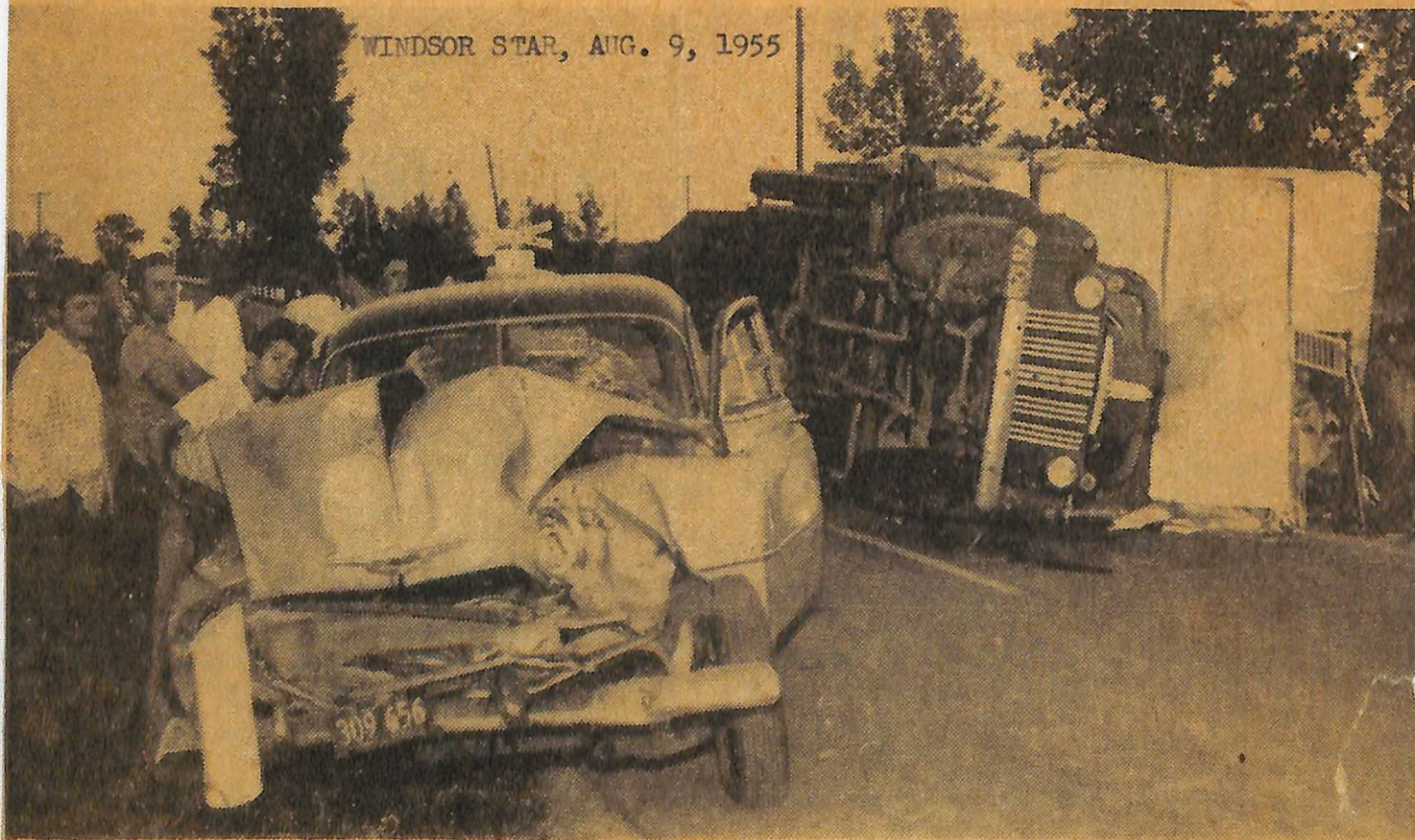

Howard White ends another career

At age 84, it was time to retire

Two years ago, Howard E. White figured it was time to step down as editor of Friendship News.

He was 82 years old and the responsibility for putting out the monthly paper was sometimes more than he could bear.

Well, Mr. White is 84 now and while he has definitely stepped down as editor he has not completely stepped out of the picture. He maintains whenever the new editor, Al Stephenson, needs his help, he will be available.

It was not Mr. White's intention to ever become the editor of the paper published by the Senior Citizens' Centre at 65 Elliott St. E. He was 'persuaded' to do the job.

"In 1968, when Mrs. Knights (Mrs. Dorothea Knights, the executive director of the centre) asked the members of the centre if they were interested in having a monthly paper, all responded most favorably and a committee was set up to decide on the format and the content," said Mr. White.

"Members of the club were asked to place their suggestions for a name for the paper in a box at the centre but none of the ideas were acceptable. Later, at a meeting of the committee, Thomas Clifford suddenly suggested the Friendship News and we unanimously voted in favor of the name."

Mrs. Knights was made editor-in-chief, Mr. White editor and members of the committee were given their responsibilities for submitting their reports on various aspects of the centre... choir, orchestra, crafts, entertainment, registration, etc.

The policy of the paper was that it was to be a paper for seniors, nothing religious or political. The paper would be entertaining (with jokes and little stories), instructive and informative.

"The first issue of our paper was Jan 28, 1969 and the 28th of each month was chosen as the date for publication. The paper then only had about eight pages and our circulation was about 300. Since then, our paper ranges between 16 and 22 pages and we now print about 700 copies every month," said Mr. White.

"We felt it was in our interest to have our paper become well known so among those included on the mailing list were the Mayor, members of city council, police chief, fire chief, The Windsor Star, radio and television stations, federal and provincial government representatives and several service clubs."

HOWARD WHITE, age 88, added his award to the many earned over the years in various endeavors. He's the type of person who sees a need in the community and then works to meet it. CKWW honored him as Citizen of the Week in 1970. He was the first publisher of the seniors' Friendship News, and his efforts worked in getting snow and ice removal for seniors, cheaper bus fares for seniors in Toronto and the first brass band at the Elliott Street Centre. Howard likes to see things done right.

One accomplishment of which Mr. White is very proud is the fact that the paper has never been in debt.

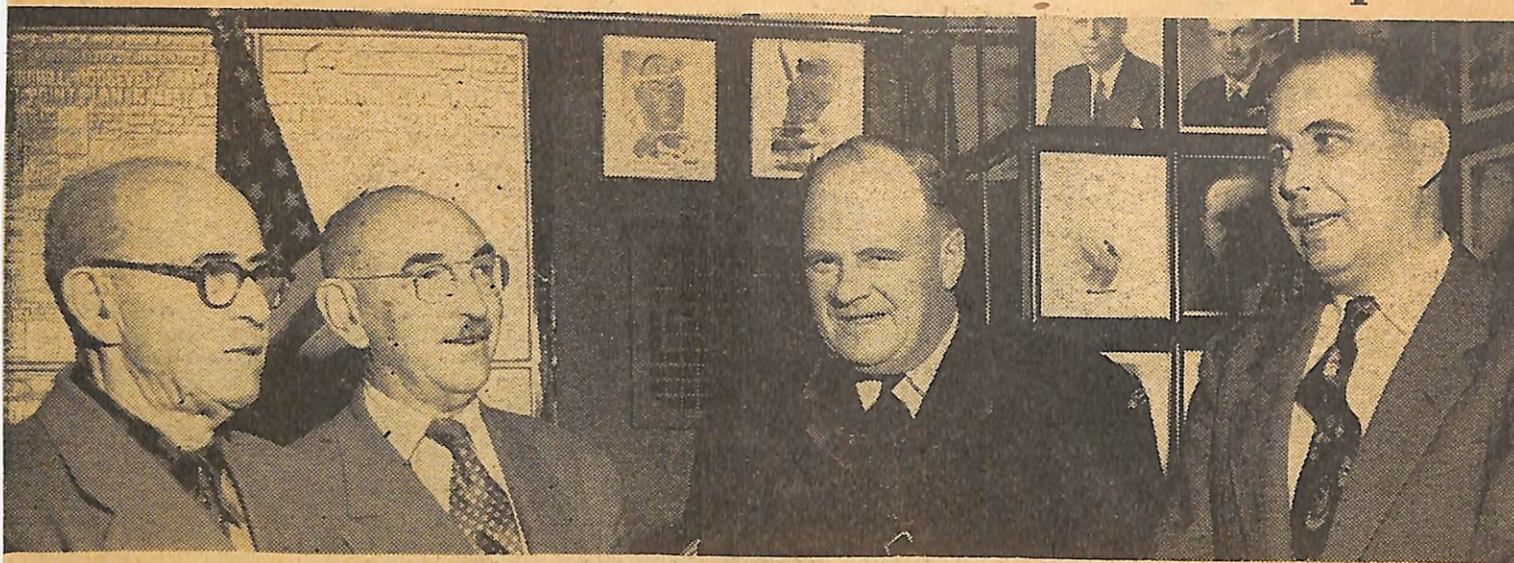

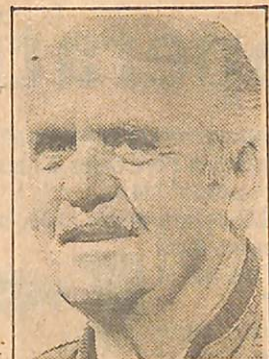

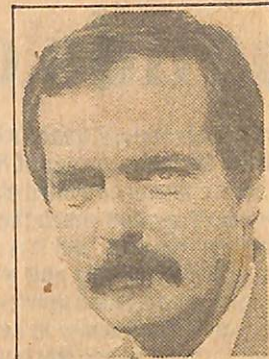

Two Head-on Collisions Occur 45 Miles Apart

AUGUST 2. 1952

Two head-on traffic collisions on No. 2 Highway, 45 miles apart, claimed the lives of a Roseland resident and a Chatham motorist during the night.

The dead:

- Arthur Gordon Williams, 22, father of two.
- Charles Edward Dagneau, Chatham.

Four other persons were injured in the two accidents.

Nov. 25. 1955

Congratulations to incumbent council of Sandwich South who were successful, on Monday, in retaining their seats in the Sandwich South Council by defeating the fourth man in the race, William D. Williams, a foreman, of Roseland. Frank Jobin led the field followed by Clyde O'Neil and Llewellyn Gerard. Reeve Percy McKee and Deputy Reeve Edward Dumouchelle won their seats by acclamation on nomination day.

Dec. 14. 1956

NEAR HOME

Mr. Williams, resident of Rose land, died shortly after his car was involved in a head-on collision on Highway No. 2 near the intersection with Pillette road, near his home.

In Metropolitan Hospital with injuries not considered serious is Albert Carswell, 25, of 233 Berin avenue, Islington, York Township, the driver of the other car.

The accident happened 200 feet west of Pillette road and 1,000 yards east of Williams' home. Mrs. Williams, at home and asleep, did not know of the crash until informed by police.

The driver in each case was the only occupant of the car.

Police said Williams, rushed to Metropolitan Hospital by Windsor Ambulance Service, died as he was being taken from the entrance to the top-floor operating room.

CAUSE UNDETERMINED:

Cause of his death was not immediately determined. A coroner will be called today to examine the body. Whether or not there will be a post-mortem examination or an inquest has not been decided yet.

The accident happened at 10:30 p.m. Police determined Williams was driving east, and Carswell west toward Windsor. Carswell was bound for Detroit, to visit friends there.

Little is known as to how the accident happened.

Late last night, with one driver dead and the other under hospital treatment, police had to rely for the most part on physical evidence.

The Carswell car came to rest in the north ditch, its left front pulverized by the impact:

The entire front of the car was smashed back, its cowl cover crumpled.

The steering wheel in the Carswell car was twisted into pretzel shape, the wheel and column forced in an upward position against the windshield.

ENGINE TOSSED OUT

The Williams car came to rest in the centre of the roadway, lying on its right side, its front end completely demolished, and its engine, in pieces, lying a few feet from the remainder of the wreck.

Crankcase oil, from the Williams car, was thrown over a stretch of the highway.

Damage to the Carswell car—a late model—is estimated at \$1,000. The Williams car, the front end wrecked, the front wheels torn off, was a complete loss.

Carswell's injuries were defined as slight concussion, cut over the right eye, cut to one arm, bruises and shock.

TRAFFIC SNARL

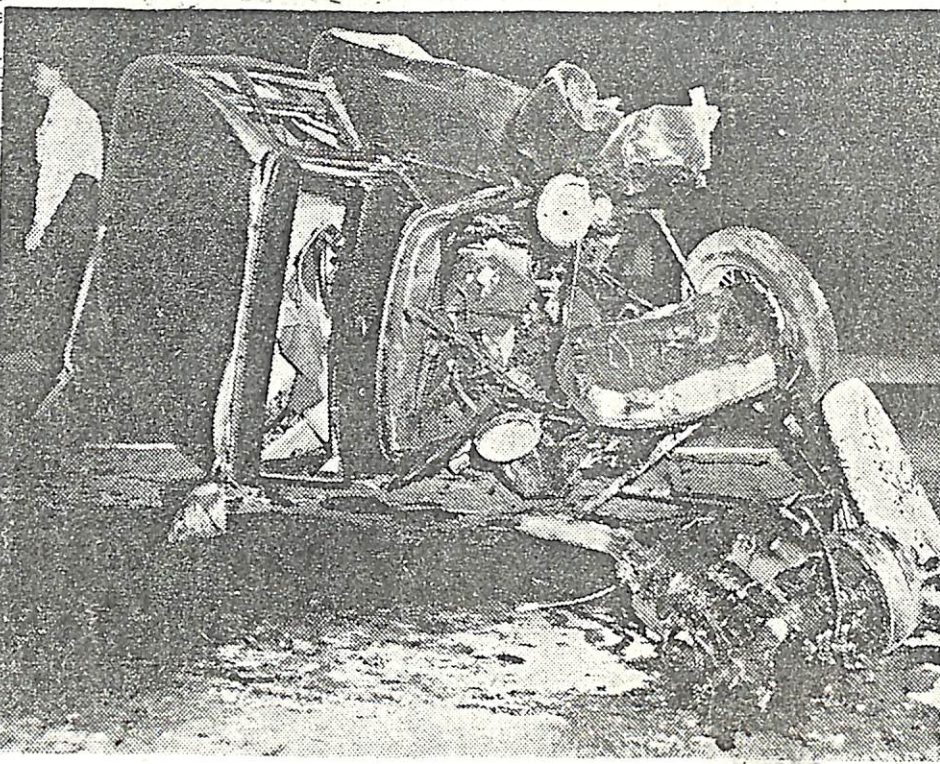
Father-in-law of Williams, who was not immediately named, was called to identify the body. The body was removed to the Windsor Ambulance morgue.

The crash caused a traffic snarl. Eastbound traffic, including heavy transport trucks, were threaded over the shoulder of the road and past the wreckage.

Westbound traffic was diverted down Pillette.

Provincial Constable Dave Hardy of the Essex detachment handled the investigation.

Sept. 16, 1983

No livestock, but lots of furniture passes through T.D. Wismer's barn each week at his Friday night auctions. In his 60 year-old barn on Concession 4 in Anderdon, he has auctioned everything from dented pots and pans, to priceless collectibles for almost 16 years.

He and his partner Randy Renaud, 32 of Maidstone sing-song their way through five or six hours of items that have steadily trickled in from customers during the week.

Recently T.D. helped a man unload a cumbersome old fridge, not bad for a 72 year-old man who's made auctioning his business since he was a kid.

"I knew when I was an adolescent that I wanted to be an auctioneer," T.D. says. "My first auction was in 1938, for Frank Nicholson, held in Sandwich South, he recalls. With a clever head for dates and prices that hasn't failed him over the years, he can list the details. "I took on that sale for a fee of \$10 and three hours of work. My next one was again in 1938 for George Beckett on Highway #2.

He auctioned with horses that went from \$165 to \$250 apiece. There were cattle and implements also, but no tractors. "You'd never see a tractor around here in those days, everything was done with horses," he says, speaking from experience. He was a farmer with his father, the late Theodore A. Wismer. "We worked together until he died. I kept up the farming until about 18 years ago," he says.

Before his auction barn was started at the 4th Concession headquarters, the barns nearly overflowed with 200 hogs.

He mainly auctioned around Windsor, and the local area with his past partner, Ray Hunter, for 35 years until Ray died four and a half years ago.

It was a long and happy partnership, he says with shining eyes. "I remember when I first met Ray. He was shovelling coal in McGregor, near the mill." Bill

Meloche at the McGregor Hardware store had recommended him. "I had Ray come to my home, and told him to auction something to me and my family, to see how he'd do. It was a close friendship from then on."

T.D., whose first name is Darwin, prefers to be addressed by his initials because one of his two sons is also a Darwin. "People mix us up," he laughs. He also has two daughters. All his children are grown and have left home. T.D. and his wife Florence still live in their large home that

was his father's.

Randy Renaud was brought in as his partner while T.D. was in the hospital. Randy loves auctioneering, and learned his trade at Repperts Auction School in Indiana. "Of course I learned most of my practical skills from T.D.," he says.

Of Repperts School, he says: "We learned to take apart the English language, and put it back together fast, and make it rhyme." According to Randy, country music singer Leroy Van Dyke went to the same

school, and was subsequently inspired to write his famous "Auctioneers' Song."

Randy and T.D. catalogue items that are brought in by the public from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Saturday, then auction them on Friday nights. Entry to the Auction Barn is free.

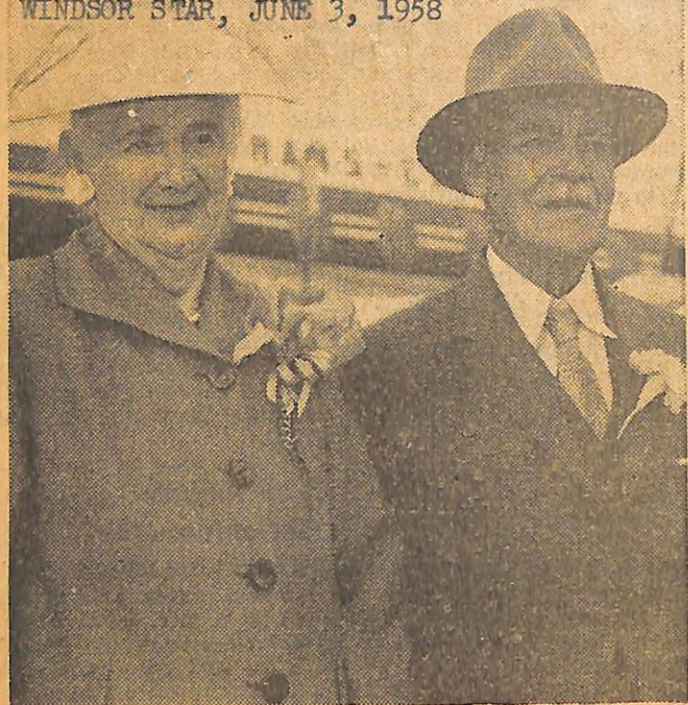
Una was declared dead on arrival at Metropolitan Hospital from a broken neck, a fractured skull and crushed chest.

Rape is rape: Each case as bad as the next one

Just the word "rape" can send chills into the hearts of most women. It is, by any standards, a despicable crime.

The dictionary definition of rape is the forcible and unlawful carnal knowledge of a woman against her will. The Criminal Code of Canada says that a male person commits rape when he has sexual intercourse with a female person who is not his wife without her consent, or with her consent if the consent is extorted by threats or fear of bodily harm.

These definitions of rape are clear and to the point.

The recently reported comments of the defence attorney and the judge in the sentencing of a convicted rapist in Windsor were most interesting but they generated several questions in my mind. It would seem from the quoted comments that the seriousness of rape could hinge on the age and maturity of the victim, her sexual experience, how many children she had borne, whether bones were broken or blood spilled during the encounter and her vulnerability to psychological damage.

With this in mind, I could assume that if I were raped after threats on my life and physical well-being, but suffered no outward signs of violence, the intimate violation of my body could be rated low on the "scale of seriousness of rape" because I am a mature older woman, have had two children and because of these factors might possibly take this violation of my person in my stride psychologically. These assumptions would be laughable if they weren't so tragic.

The serious psychological trauma experienced by a victim of rape could affect not only her life but the life of loved ones for many years to come. A recent report in The Windsor Star said that experts regard rape as the ultimate attack on the integrity of a person, short of murder. The report also states that federal authorities in the U.S. and Canada estimate that only 10 per cent of rapes are reported, which would mean 40,000 rapes occurred in Canada in 1978 with 400 of them in the Windsor area. The victim often hesitates to report the attack because of fear, embarrassment, guilt and the hassle she may encounter because, unfortunately, the age-old presumption that the rape victim is guilty until proven innocent still prevails in many instances.

Crisis Centre

The Sexual Assault Crisis Centre in Windsor reports that about half their cases last year were rape victims between the ages of 20 and 64 years of age and many had borne children. The victim in the rape case mentioned above was 20 years old at the time of the incident, had a child and was a mature woman in the eyes of the court. These facts apparently made the rape "slightly less serious than if she had been a 17 year old who would have suffered great psychological damage". Would it be presumptuous then, with these criteria in mind, to assume that many rape cases in the Windsor area could be considered "less serious" — whatever that might mean.

When does immaturity end and maturity begin? How is one's state of maturity determined and is maturity based on mental, physical or emotional qualities? How can anyone accurately determine the psychological repercussions with which the victim might have to deal in the months and years to come?

To me rape is rape. I have difficulty understanding why the extent of a rape victim's maturity, her age, her reproductive history, her sexual experience and her ability or inability to cope psychologically with the trauma of rape should have any bearing on the seriousness of the crime committed against her or the sentencing of her convicted rapist.

Then again, I am not a lawyer and obviously do not understand the complexities of the law and its ramifications. However, I am a woman with a strong, gut feeling for the victims of this heinous crime and can only pray that it never happens to me.

Wong enters guilty plea in gun mishap

A city doctor, charged after accidentally shooting his wife May 12, pleaded guilty in provincial court Wednesday to careless use of a firearm.

He'll be sentenced Feb. 7 by Judge Donald Ebbs.

Dr. Colin Wong, 54, admitted responsibility for the shooting that left his wife, Helena Wong, with a compound fracture of the left leg. She was shot twice — once slightly below the knee and once about mid-calf — during an argument at the family's Russell Woods home.

Mrs. Wong was taken to Hotel Dieu by ambulance, where she underwent emergency surgery.

Court was told an argument broke out in the kitchen about 3 p.m. between Dr. Wong and his daughter's fiance, Brian Feldman. Dr. Wong left the kitchen for the bedroom where he kept a .22-calibre handgun, and confronted Feldman and other family members in the main hall.

Evidence showed Feldman grabbed Wong's arm. The gun discharged three times and Mrs. Wong fell to the floor screaming.

Wong's lawyer, Frank Montello, said his client has outstanding character references and is very well respected in the community as a doctor and businessman.

"You will never, ever see this man in a court of law again," said Montello, and asked Judge Ebbs to consider granting Wong a discharge.

But Crown Attorney Denis Harrison said the crime calls for a substantial monetary penalty.

"No matter what the accused may have felt, there was nothing to justify him getting a loaded handgun. I oppose the granting of a discharge. It's against the public interest in cases involving firearms and violence causing injury."

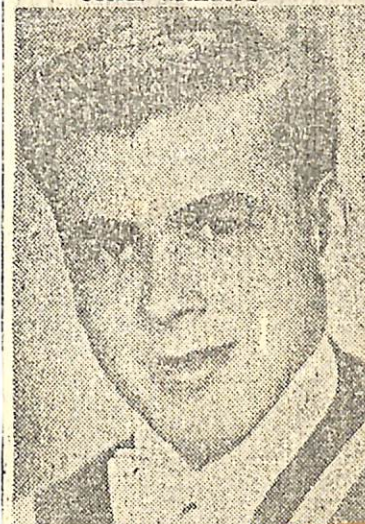

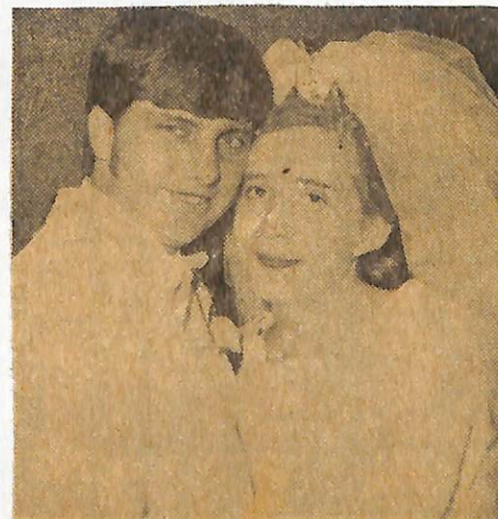

So you've finally decided to get rid of your bulky eyeglasses. Contact lenses, you say, are just the thing for your new image. They may well be, but some eye specialists say contact lenses are also a "mixed blessing."

"If they are abused in some way, they can lead to complications," says Windsor ophthalmologist Dr. Ernest Zarzour.

Although almost anyone can wear contact lenses, if they're not properly cared for they can damage the cornea. If that happens, they can never be worn again, says British Columbia optometrist Dr. William Jackson.

Dr. Jackson and two partners have been conducting a year-long study involving about 800 patients to determine if the health of the cornea suffers or is altered at all with soft contact lenses.

They have found five categories for "at-risk" patients:

- those who overwear their contact lenses
- those who don't switch to eyeglasses in order to give eyes a rest
- those who wear old or damaged lenses
- those who don't follow up with professional care
- those wearing improperly fitted lenses.

He said they found at least one of the five problems in each of the patients observed.

Dr. Jackson said such a "short-sighted approach" to wearing contact lenses will result in blurred vision and sore, red eyes during the early stages. The final stage comes when one can no longer wear contact lenses, and has to go back to eyeglasses. The blurring will remain temporarily but can still be corrected in time.

Many patients suffer complications because they don't receive proper instructions when they purchase the lenses, he said, or they simply do not follow the instructions. Contacts should be taken out 30 minutes to an hour before bedtime and then at least half a day a week.

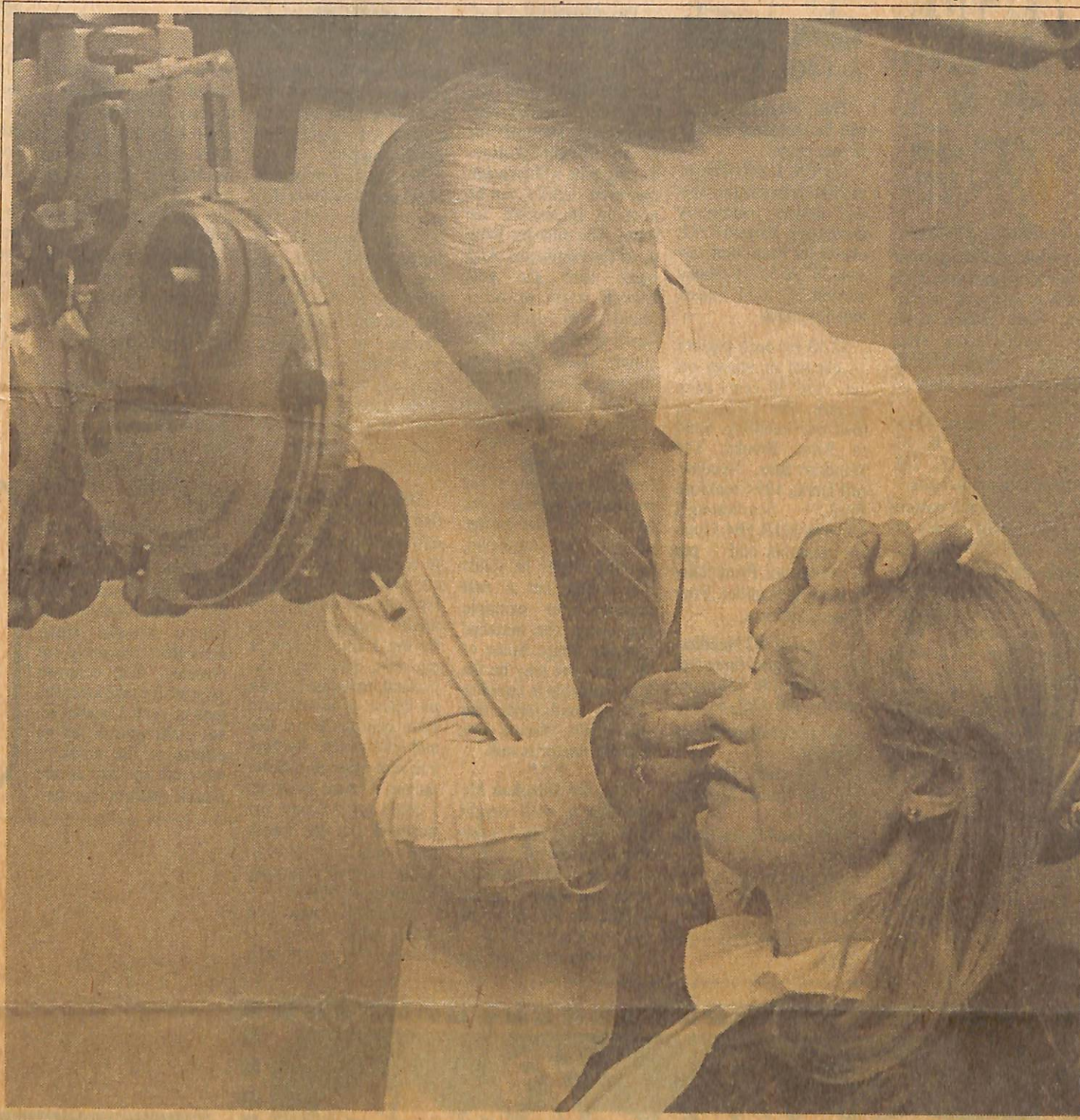
"ANY LESS than that gets to be dangerous," Dr. Jackson said. "Common sense says if you've worn your lenses more than normal — for example if you go out on a Friday or Saturday night — then compensate for it the next day."

The cumulative effects of overwearing contact lenses for 40 to 50 years is permanent damage to the cornea, but "with proper care, (contact lenses) shouldn't affect the eye in any way, and you shouldn't have to change them for 20 to 30 years."

Dr. Zarzour says corneal vascularization — blood vessels entering the cornea — comes from either poorly fitted contact lenses or from abuse. He agrees that wearing them too long or letting them become dirty provokes complications.

Three types of contact lenses are available: conventional hard lenses, the increasingly popular soft lenses, and a fairly new type called "gas permeable" lenses.

HARD LENSES started the trend, but they are by no means the most popular today. Because they tend to block out oxygen the eye requires, more complications tend to emerge. Made from a plastic similar to plexiglass, they are inflexible and, because of their inability to

let water or oxygen pass through, adjusting to them is difficult.

Persons with severe astigmatism, however, are forced to wear the hard lenses because the corrective prescription needed can only be put into the hard lens. If these lenses are properly cared for, they can last a lifetime.

Soft lenses are worn by an estimated eight out of 10 who wear contacts, says Windsor optometrist Dr. Robert Archambeault. They are made of hydrophylic (water loving) plastic which absorbs approximately 35 to 70 per cent water, giving oxygen an opportunity to pass through. They are flexible and quite comfortable, but wearers have to sacrifice some clarity for comfort, Dr. Archambeault says.

They do not last as long as the hard lenses (they can easily tear or, left out of the eye or solution, can dry up quickly) and not all sight

problems can be corrected with soft lenses.

GAS PERMEABLE (or semi-soft) lenses have all the characteristics of hard lenses, but allow oxygen to pass through to the eye. Made of a silicone-like material, they are inflexible but, because oxygen does travel through the lens, they are relatively safe.

Extended-wear contact lenses are also being offered now. Originally developed for those who couldn't see well enough to insert lenses in the first place, these lenses can be worn continuously for up to two weeks, Dr. Archambeault said. But there are drawbacks. Not only are they the most expensive type of lens, they also interfere with the eye's metabolism.

"It's like a person going to bed with their shoes on. It just doesn't make any sense," says Dr. Archambeault. "You have to give the eye a break."

The extended-wear contacts are made with

about 70 per cent water content, which would provide enough oxygen to the eye, but aside from convenience, there are no added benefits. Patients wearing those lenses should have their eyes monitored closely by their ophthalmologist or optometrist to be certain no infections set in.

The cost of a pair of hard lenses is between \$100 and \$300. Soft contact lenses and gas-permeable lenses sell from \$125 to \$300 and extended-wear lenses, the most expensive, cost \$250 to \$450. The wide range in prices is caused largely by the needs of the patient and the cost of follow-up examinations by a doctor.

There are bargain-rate contact lenses and, even though they're attractive, doctors say they're not a bargain in the long run. "There's no follow-up or monitoring," says Dr. Archambeault. "That takes time and time costs money."

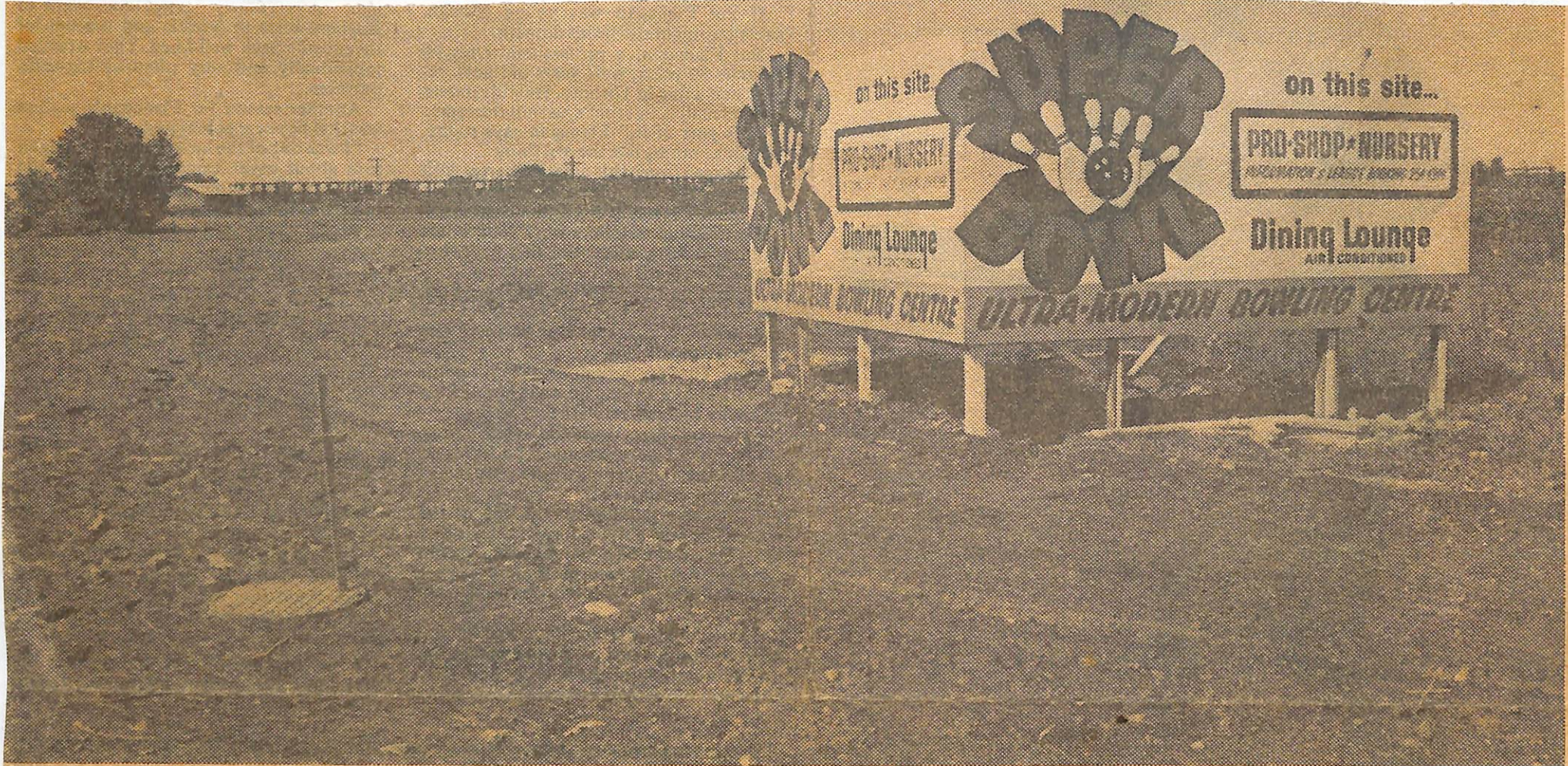

\$2-million centre set for '78

Zarzour name returning to bowling

About 20 years ago, the father of Donald and Ernie Zarzour owned a bowling alley across from the Vanity Theatre on Ouellette Avenue. That's not there anymore.

The younger Zarzours used to help father out and now they want to put their name back into bowling.

In about 60 days, they will watch the beginnings of their new \$2-million bowling centre in Forest Glade.

The Zarzours have been involved with bowling for years now. Donald is currently manager of a bowling establishment in San Diego, Calif. He will leave that job when this new centre is built. Before his job in California, he managed bowling centres in Royal Oak, Mich.

Ernie became a doctor in 1959 and is now specializing in optometry. He has his own optometry office on Tecumseh Road West.

Dr. Zarzour wasn't happy with the bowling establishments available to the people living east of Walker Road, so he had to do something about it.

"Bowling has got to be expanding," he says. "There are 75,000 people east of Walker Road who need a place to bowl."

Windsor has 200 lanes for bowling — including 22 five-pin lanes. Bowlero carries the biggest weight with its 74 lanes.

The new bowling centre to be called

Super Bowl, will feature both five and 10-pin lanes as well as a dining lounge, nursery, pro shop and barber shop.

"We're going to do it first class," says Dr. Zarzour. "We've planned this for an entire recreational area."

Current plans are to feature 60 bowling lanes — 48 10-pin and 12 five-pin alleys. With the huge parcel of land, purchased on Tecumseh Road East at Forest Glade Drive, there's plenty of room for expansion, either with more bowling lanes or another recreational building. Dr. Zarzour is thinking of adding roller skating, racquetball and other indoor activities to his complex at a later date.

The Zarzours began planning for this some five years ago, when they purchased the land. Last year, they put up a sign announcing the planned building of the Super Bowl.

"We were practically booked right up shortly after we put up that sign," says Dr. Zarzour.

But the lanes, originally planned to be completed this fall, will not be ready now until next year.

Building permits, zone changes and other customary red tape — to be expected when building something new — have held up the project. Sewer construction was completed last July, though, and the actual construction should begin within two months.

"All we're waiting for now is the financing to come through from Toronto," says Dr. Zarzour. "We should get started within 60 days and then it's four months to completion."

The new 60-lane mixed house was going to be the biggest in Canada, until Bowlero on Tecumseh Road West expanded to 74 lanes last winter. Bowlero also planned to open another house in the East End at one time.

"Bowlero got wind of our idea to build," says Dr. Zarzour. "Every place has improved since we started planning this."

But the Zarzours' wish is not to be in competition with other lanes. They don't really think that can happen.

Dr. Zarzour says with the 75,000 people east of Walker Road, there would be no competition, but rather an incentive for new bowlers.

"I'm enthusiastic about it," he says. "Windsor is my home and I wanted to do something for it."

The \$2-million price tag is for the bowling alley alone. Other items to be included are not finalized yet, so a total cost for the whole area will not be available for quite some time.

The proposed restaurant within the bowling centre is probably going to be a franchise operation, according to Dr.

Zarzour, but full details are again sketchy at this early date.

The mixed house (five and 10-pin lanes) will be the only one in Windsor (Windsor Recreation burned down last year). The location for the new centre seemed ideal to Dr. Zarzour.

"The east end — that's where the action is," he says. "Windsor needs this bowling alley."

The city has been planning for a number of years to put Forest Glade Drive through to Riverside Drive. This would add even more people to the new lanes with faster transportation.

Another boost to the planned bowling establishment has been the continuous drop in interest rates. Dr. Zarzour notes the cost has dropped substantially from his original estimates.

Burlington architects John and Gordon Craddock have been working on the plans for the new centre. Craddock built a similar centre in Burlington.

The new lanes will not include the new automatic scoring system, though, because Dr. Zarzour isn't satisfied people are ready for it yet. The wires for that system will be installed, just in case the demand arises.

The target date for completion of the new lanes is now the spring of 1978. The Zarzours say the delays are over.

New lanes to hold grand opening

The Super Bowl (not the NFL championship game, but bowling's version) will make its grand opening Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 15 and 16 at its Tecumseh Road and Forest Glade Drive location, directly behind Glade Place movie theatres.

The 32-lane building, complete with lounge and dining facilities, is Windsor's newest bowling place, providing an establishment for the thousands of bowlers in the east end.

It's a much-needed facility, with the closing two weeks ago of Joe Dumouchelle's Golden Mile Lanes on Tecumseh Road East. Golden Mile went into receivership and its doors are shut tight.

"Joe was a plumber, a carpenter — he did everything," says Dumouchelle's wife. "He worked from 9 a.m. till 12 p.m., but it didn't work out."

However, Joe isn't going to give it up without a fight.

"I still have three weeks to go," he says. "If I can come up with five or six — or even 20 — partners within those three weeks, I hope to buy it back, outright."

WHAT HE NEEDS is at least \$400,000 to purchase the 18-alley building . . . plus a few more thousand to renovate the place.

The grand opening of Super Bowl will feature Michigan pro bowler Joe Joseph, who still holds several PBA records. Joseph will hold a clinic on Saturday for anyone interested on bettering their bowling.

The Stroh's Brewery team will compete against the best from Windsor in a tournament on Sunday, marking the first in what Super Bowl owners Dr.

Ernest Zarzour, a Windsor eye specialist, and brother Don hope will be the first of a series of annual Thanksgiving weekend tournaments. These will be "involving teams from the Toronto, Hamilton area, maybe" says the good doctor.

The Super Bowl, of course, has been "open for business" since the start of September, with all sorts of league bowling, including the Super Bowl Major Handicap on Tuesdays at 9 p.m., the Ladies' Classic League on Thursdays at 7 p.m. and a huge junior program on Saturdays.

The building is fully air-conditioned, complete with a pro shop. And there's plenty of parking.

"THE ZARZOUR family are Windsor people," says the doctor. "My father was one of the original proprietors of a bowling alley many years ago, called Vanity Recreation. We are returning to the bowling industry with our experience."

At Bowlero, Dave Uras of Two Stars bowled 83 pins over average to lead his team to victory in The Windsor Star Mixed League. Flo Anderson was

runner-up, 82 pins over average.

Old local store takes on modern look

MAIDSTONE — Local residents mourned the passing of John's Grocery Store when it closed a few years ago.

The tiny market in the red brick building had occupied a spot on Talbot Road for most of this century.

But the old brick building is back in service today under a new name — Maidstone Variety.

Although the inside has been gutted and modernized, the exterior of the building hasn't changed much, except for a chemical cleaning of the bricks to bring out their former charm.

The new owners are Paul Zinyk and Murtle Lacroix. The 47-year-old Zinyk owns Pleasant Park Machine — a tool and die shop in Oldcastle.

ZINYK LIVES near the hamlet, and like other area residents, rued the closing of the old grocery store. As a result, he and Lacroix decided to invest in the building as a "hobby" venture.

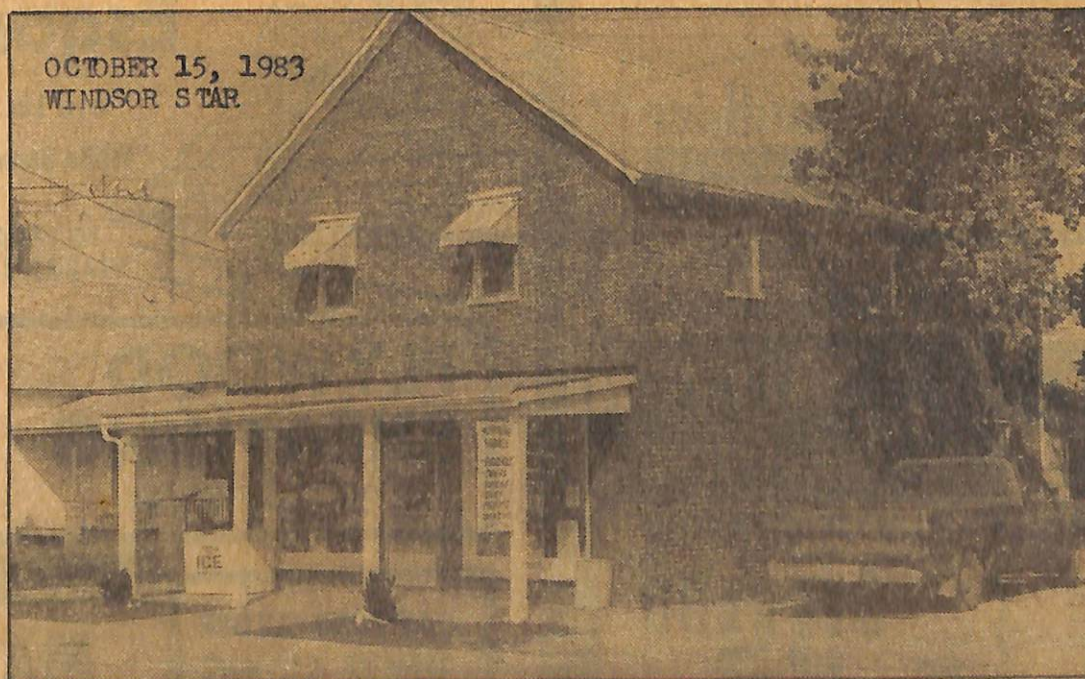
Zinyk said the old walls wielded artifacts that provided hints into the building's history. Among the treasures: an old wooden planer, a root beer syrup bottle, a 1939 pub licence plate and a penny dating back to 1914.

But no one knows the building better than next door neighbor Frank McCloskey. He said his grandfather, also named Frank, built it around the turn of the century.

It served first as a place to build wagons and later coffins.

"I can remember hiding in the coffins as a little kid," Frank said.

MIKE AND Camela John took the building over in 1915, and operated the store for more than 60 years. Mike is now dead and Camela lives in a nursing home in Essex.
